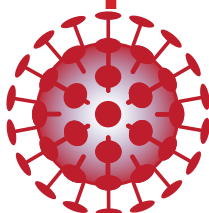

Construction on referendum project ahead of schedule

Board authorizes upgrades for projects

WITTENBERG — Construction at all three schools in the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District has been progressing a bit ahead of schedule for some areas due to the school shutdown because of the pandemic, according to Matt McGregor, project manager for Hoffman Planning, Design and Construction. Wittenberg Elementary/Middle School, Birnamwood Elementary/Middle School and Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School have renovations and additions that are part of the \$13.5 million referendum that was passed in November of 2018.

Without staff and students to work around, there have been some opportunities to change work schedules with some of the contractors, McGregor said at the April 27 school board meeting.

Many of the contractors have

moved to working four 10-hour days as part of the COVID plan put in place by Hoffman Planning, Design and Construction. This will allow time for surfaces where the coronavirus might live to dry out.

The masons were the only construction group to stay at eight-hour days as that group would have needed overtime for each day after eight hours. McGregor noted that, since their work is outside, with no cross contamination issues, and it's a small group of workers that this would be acceptable.

McGregor also presented three options for board approval.

The ceiling in the auditorium needs to be removed to install new duct work and lights. The original plan was to install new standard ceiling panels, but the board voted to spend an additional \$9,500 to upgrade to better acoustical tiles. Scaffolding will go up June 1 for the project, and board member Dan Stewart requested an estimate on what it would cost to paint the auditorium at that time.

The family consumer education room refurbishing was already in the budget to cover the cost of new ceil-

ing, floors and other renovations. The original plan was to reuse the old cabinets. Dombeck Custom Cabinets in Elderon gave a quote for all new cabinetry including upper cabinets, which had not been there, and a face-lift for the countertops.

Board member Bree Krueger-Schmidt, who works at Dombeck explained that the new cabinets would hold up better than the old ones. The board voted to spend \$34,450 on the upgrades.

McGregor noted that the original plan also included using the existing island, but said that the five food stations with stove, sink and cupboards would be of better quality, and up to industry standard that is easier to clean and maintain. The board agreed to spend an additional \$47,842 over and above the initial cost for plumbing and electrical.

Superintendent Garrett Rogowski brought to the board the replacement of two heat exchangers for the pool for \$24,360. The project was paid in full through the donation from the Helping Foundation.

Aspirus updates visitor guidelines in Wisconsin locations

WAUSAU — Aspirus patients in the system's Wisconsin hospitals and outpatient centers now have an additional source of support.

New visitation guidelines, as of May 19, allow limited access for family and friends while still following important safety practices.

As a basic safety measure, all visitors to Aspirus care facilities will be screened for fever and symptoms prior to entering and will be required to wear a mask or face covering at all times.

"To slow the spread of the COVID-19 pandemic, Aspirus adopted

rigorous safety measures, one of which was visitor guidelines," said Ruth Risley-Gray, Aspirus senior vice president and system chief nursing officer.

The following guidelines now apply at Aspirus' Wisconsin hospitals inpatient and outpatient areas: Adult patients may receive one visitor, age 18 or older, per day. Exceptions may be made for terminal patients. Pediatric hospital patients may have two adult support visitors at a time. Labor and delivery patients will follow the same guidelines as above, with no more than two siblings allowed to

visit for a maximum of 30 minutes each day.

In hospital emergency rooms, adult patients may have one support person over 18 years of age. Pediatric patients may be accompanied by two adults.

In outpatient clinics, adult patients may be accompanied by one person over the age of 12. Patients at outpatient cancer infusion centers may be accompanied by one person 18 or over.

I was hoping to download something by Carl Hiaasen from InfoSoup, the library website, but nearly everything I hadn't read was already checked out.

Eventually, I found "Bad Monkey." Like his other books set at the far end of Florida, it is full of oddball characters and laugh-out-loud situations. The plot is extremely convoluted, but I'll try to sketch it out.

Andrew Yancy knew he wanted to be a cop from the day thieves ransacked his grandmother's house during her funeral. He eventually worked his way up to detective status. Sadly, Yancy's temper got the best of him when he overheard Bonnie Chase's husband berating her in a public square. Yancy was in the middle of an affair with Bonnie, and he came to her aid by attacking her husband with a vacuum cleaner hose. I won't say what Yancy did, but the husband sued him and the sheriff demoted him to restaurant inspector.

Yancy detests "Roach Patrol" and asks Bonnie to get her husband to withdraw the lawsuit. Yancy decides to end the affair when Bonnie

eateries and brooding about the new house being built next door. Evan Shook owns the four-story monstrosity that defies city codes and blocks Yancy's ocean views. Shook wants to sell fast and return to New York.

About that same time, a tourist couple hooks a human left arm while sport fishing. Yancy's boss does not want the hassle of an investigation, so he instructs Yancy to take it to Miami, hoping they would take it as their case. There, he meets Dr. Rosa Campasino. She does an "autopsy" and notes that the arm was not cut off in a boating accident, plus it is missing a very unique and expensive wristwatch.

confesses that her real name is Plover, and she's fugitive after jumping bail for having sex with one of her high school students in Oklahoma.

Now Yancy spends his time inspecting local

After some back and forth, the arm is identified by Eve Stripling as belonging to her husband, Nicky. It is assumed that he died when his fishing boat went down. Several things about the event don't ring true, and the detective in Yancy just can't let the case go.

Without real authority, he begins to dig into Nick Stripling's life. It isn't long before the young man who worked on the boat that caught the arm is gunned down, adding more fuel to Yancy's investigation.

Meanwhile in the Bahamas, Neville Stafford has been notified that his beloved property on Andros Cay has been sold to a developer, and he must leave. Neville "owns" a small, scraggly monkey named Driggs. The animal is said to have appeared in the "Pirates of the Caribbean" movies but was fired for several nasty habits. In hopes of stopping the developer named Christopher, Neville enlists the aid of a feared old voodoo crone known as Dragon Queen.



Neville is OK paying with rum, but he is sickened when she demands he give her Driggs. He sadly agrees as he must get his property back.

Yancy has uncovered

a history of Medicare fraud, two murders and more, but legally, he can't do anything. But Yancy won't let the law keep justice from being done. The tangled storyline soon has Yancy, Rosa, Neville and Driggs working together to find and arrest Eve Stripling and her elusive boyfriend Christopher.

Eventually, the truth is revealed. When justice comes, it is in a way that no one expected. I don't know how Hiaasen does it, but he sure knows how to keep a collection of characters involved and interesting.

We can be thankful that our lives don't reflect a Hiaasen novel, but any time we want a little weirdness, all we have to do is go to a public library and check it out.

Wittenberg teacher awarded WICPA grant

WITTENBERG — Cheryl Muscha, business and information technology instructor at Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School, was awarded a 2019 Accounting Career Awareness Grant from the Wisconsin Institute of Certified Public Accountants Educational Foundation Inc.

Wisconsin high school accounting and business teachers who attended the WICPA High School Educators Accounting Symposium on Nov. 15, 2019, were eligible to apply for an accounting career awareness grant from the WICPA Educational

Foundation. Muscha was one of 32 teachers to receive a grant.

Many of the grant projects involve multiple teachers, administrators, college or technical school faculty, and CPAs. The foundation encourages teachers to be innovative with their grant activities and to share the activities with other teachers.

"My students and I were able to attend career events at Lambeau Field and talk to their accounts, spend time at accounting firms like CliftonLarsonAllen in Green Bay and WIPFLI in Wausau, and hear entrepreneurial stories while we eat at places like Doc's Harley Davidson and Wausau on the Water,"

said Muscha.

The sole purpose of the grant is to expose students to an accounting career, Muscha said. She was awarded \$981 for 2019-2020. Muscha and her students were able to take their trips before the shutdown.

"Students love these trips. It opens their eyes to private and public accounting and business in general," said Muscha. "WICPA pays for everything, so students have no cost. Even their meal and fun experiences like laser tag at Wausau on the Water are covered."

In the past two years, she was awarded grants that were about twice the amount awarded this

school year and she was able to purchase materials for class, but the WICPA are reducing funds available for materials because they would rather see the out of classroom experience, said Muscha.

"The WICPA Educational Foundation's Accounting Career Awareness Grant Program is an exciting opportunity for teachers and students to explore a variety of career opportunities available to those with an accounting degree," said Michael E. Friedman, CPA, former president of the WICPA Educational Foundation. "It also reminds them that accounting can be fun."

Grants given to 48 city businesses

More than \$175,000 awarded to assist with occupancy costs

SHAWANO — The city is reporting that 48 Shawano businesses have received money from an emergency grant program aimed at helping local businesses with occupancy costs during the economic shutdown that was forced by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The city awarded a total of \$175,098, with businesses receiving an average of \$3,500.

The temporary relief program was designed to assist small businesses with immediate grant assistance of up to \$5,000 to help cover occupancy expenses for up to 60 days — including rent, mortgages, utilities, insurance and other property-related business expenses.

Federally funded programs, including the Economic Injury Disaster Loan and the Paycheck Protection Program, had been made available to small businesses, but both of those programs quickly ran out of money due to the demand, leaving small businesses who weren't first in line out of luck.

The local grant money came from the city's Tax Incremental Finance (TIF) districts.

TIF districts are areas where municipalities invest in infrastructure, such as sewer and water, to attract development where it might not otherwise occur, or to make improvements, such as eliminating blight.

Student debt financial flu sickening our economy

The United States is sick with a financial flu.

Our country has a health care crisis with the COVID-19 virus. Thousands of people are dying daily, and there is no end to this tragedy in the immediate future. Our economy is suffering at a level we haven't seen since the Great Depression. People have been having to make difficult decisions when it comes to how to spend the limited resources they have available.

There is a parallel challenge that is facing those who have acquired student debt. Even before the coronavirus, that debt depressed the purchasing power of a large part of the labor force. Many of those 46 million students affected are a part of the \$2.5 trillion owed in student debt.

Many borrowers have not been able to afford a home or even a car. Others with a little more income still have had a difficult time paying for mortgages, auto loans and daycare. One in three report the amount owed on their loan exceeds their monthly rent or mortgage bill.

The millennial generation (those born from 1981-1996) is the most educated in history. However, millions continue to be burdened by crushing student loan debt. Of those individuals who are now 25-34 years of age, 45% carry student debt. When baby boomers were that age, the figure was 16%. Young households have lower incomes and fewer assets than previ-

ous generations did at the same age. This debt has disproportionately affected students of color, low-income students, first-generation college students, women, veterans and seniors. These students have needed more help in accessing their educational dreams.

Higher level educational degrees are a prerequisite for a majority of gainful employment in modern-day America. According to Andrew Ross, professor of social and cultural analysis at New York University, "Today, it is impossible to ignore that work-force entrants, especially the college educated, have to take on large debt burdens simply to prepare themselves for employability."

In 2015, three-fourths of the graduates had some amount of debt with an average being more than \$35,000 per student. Despite this statistic, Republicans in Congress have killed, stifled or otherwise repudiated any comprehensive loan forgiveness.

Part of this resistance could be traced to the student loan industry. Student debt is profitable. Last year, Sallie Mae and Navient had a combined profit of \$1.2 billion. Interest rates are set yearly so debts from each

year of education could have a different interest rate. Rates doubled in 2005 and doubled again in 2013.

Thankfully, due to the pandemic, federal government loans have been granted a temporary disaster relief forbearance through Sept. 30, which may be adjusted based on further direction from the U.S. Department of Education. During this time, no payments will be due. All interest on loans will be waived.

Sixty-four percent of graduates with debt in Wisconsin puts the state in the top ten in the nation, according to the 14th annual report on the burden of student loan debt on college graduates by The Institute for College Access and Success. The amount of debt being carried by graduates also ranks high compared to the rest of the nation. Wisconsin class of 2018 graduates leaving college had an average debt load of nearly \$32,000.

Gov. Tony Evers realizes that student debt is preventing folks from starting a business, saving for retirement and holding back our state and our economy. He has signed an executive order creating a Governor's Task Force on Student Debt. The task force will be tasked with assessing student debt in Wisconsin and providing long-term strategies to reduce education-related debt, prevent abusive practices by loan companies and improving financial literacy education.

One in five students in the United States were behind in student loan payments before the pandemic. Due to workers being out of work or having reduced hours for long periods of time, budgets will be even tighter after there is a vaccine for COVID-19. There are bound to be even more student loan defaults.

Moving forward, we need reform. The accumulation of more and more student debt by future post-secondary students is not sustainable. We need to ensure that a great education at our technical colleges, two-year universities and four-year universities is not out of reach for Wisconsin students and families.

"If the United States is to have any kind of durable middle class in the 21st century, it will be to match those countries that provide free public education (beyond high school)," Ross said.

It should not be acceptable to have nearly two out of three graduates starting out their careers with tens of thousands of dollars of debt. Our government needs to come up with plans for loan forgiveness and for supplementing most of the expense of education beyond high school. If we don't, our country will continue to contend with a financial flu that sickens our economy.

State program set up to spur recovery

Small and minority-owned businesses eligible for grants

MADISON — Gov. Tony Evers announced \$75 million in assistance for small businesses as part of the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation's "We're All In" initiative.

The program is a comprehensive effort to celebrate and help Wisconsin's small businesses get back on their feet and support best practices to keep businesses, consumers, employees and communities safe, the governor's office said.

Funded largely by federal dollars received through the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act, this initiative will provide direct assistance to small businesses most impacted by the duration and restrictions of the COVID-19 pandemic.

These \$2,500 cash grants will assist with the costs of business interruption or for health and safety improvements, wages and salaries, rent, mortgages, and inventory. Businesses will be able to apply for grant assistance in early June.

The We're All In initiative will include:

- Grants in the amount of \$2,500 to small businesses with 20 or fewer FTEs impacted by COVID-19 that have not already received WEDC COVID-19 assistance. Up to 30,000 businesses may receive grants. More details about the program will be available later this month with businesses able to apply for grant assistance in June.

- Ethnic Minority Emergency Grants, which provide \$2 million in grants for ethnically diverse Wisconsin micro-businesses who suffered losses due to the pandemic. The grants are aimed at sole proprietorships or businesses with five or fewer employees that have not received assistance under either SB 20/20 program or SBA's Paycheck Protection Program.

One thousand grants of \$2,000 each will be administered in partnership with Wisconsin's 19 ethnic and minority chambers of commerce. More details are available at <https://wedc.org/programs-and-resources/>

minority-business-development.

- A series of guides for businesses looking to implement best practices to keep employees, customers, and communities safe throughout the COVID-19 crisis.

These guides are an essential part of the We're All In program and were developed in consultation with the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, Department of Tourism, Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection, Department of Safety and Professional Services, as well as industry leaders and public health experts throughout the state.

"Wisconsinites have done an incredible job of banding together throughout this crisis and it's more important than ever for us to continue respecting each other, supporting each other, holding each other accountable and protecting those who are vulnerable," Evers said. "We are still encouraging people to stay home as much as possible, practice physical distancing and good hygiene, and take protective measures like wearing a mask in public, but as more businesses continue to reopen around the state, we need to go all in on doing this together."

Grant recipients will become We're All In businesses by committing to safety protocols and using them in their shops, cafes and places of work to protect their customers, employees, and communities.

This network of Main Street businesses will form the backbone of the We're All In initiative, along with support from major Wisconsin businesses, communities and other associations.

"These grants will help businesses in the short term, and we need Wisconsinites to join our long-term economic recovery by supporting those small businesses as patrons and customers," Evers said. "We know that folks need to feel safe and confident as employees and consumers for this to work, so that is why we need to be all in together."

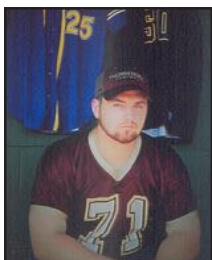
