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# Hoping bar business springs back this summer

## Xena's Village Inn looking to find a new normal

**WITTENBERG** — Memorial Day weekend can be hit or miss, according to Xena's Village Inn owner Amy White.

"For a holiday weekend the turnout was very good," said White, "They're very unpredictable — it's usually all or nothing."

In a couple of weeks White will be celebrating 20 years of bar ownership and if there is one thing she has learned to count on, is to never count on anything.

White had not planned on opening earlier than the May 26 end date for the Safer at Home order, but when the order was knocked down by the Wisconsin Supreme Court, she got on the phone and placed inventory orders with her vendors so that she could be open for the holiday weekend.

What a difference a couple of months can make.

"When the order came on March 17 to shut down non-essential businesses there were cops waiting at the door at 5 p.m. to make sure I was in compliance," said White.

Then, in the past couple of weeks, she heard bars were opening because Shawano County Sheriff Adam Bieber wasn't going to enforce it any longer.

For White, the time being closed was awful from a financial point of view. The mortgage and insurance bills still had to be paid. White was grateful for the emergency money she had been able to save for this purpose, but now that it's gone, she's hoping for a quick recovery. She applied for several grants and loans, but found out she didn't qualify for some and other programs ran out of funding.

Three years ago, White faced similar hard times with the reconstruction of Webb Street which took away parking spaces and sidewalks for the duration of the project.

"It hurt us terribly — very little money coming in," said White.

With the total shut down this time, there was the opportunity to repaint the walls and redo the floor. There was also time for White to take her husband, Tom Smith, to doctor appointments.

"I was free to take him to his treatments — went every day for weeks, didn't have to worry about the bar or rearranging schedules," said White.

Smith had an incident that sent him to the ER twice in one day. Eventually, he was transported to the hospital in Marshfield for four days with no visitors. White spent eight hours waiting in the car during the ER visits and said it was a scary and very trying time with not being allowed to be there to consult with the doctors, due to the coronavirus. It's the not knowing what's going on that makes the waiting time unnerving said White.

Keeping a sense of humor is something that gets White and Smith through the scary times. Smith noted that his hospital room overlooked the cemetery and that made it a little hard to keep positive. He also had to take female hormone injections to help with the treatment. The side effect of hot flashes gave White something she could tease him about.

The biggest obstacle to getting ready for the opening was paying for inventory. Vendors get payment at the time of delivery so there is a lot riding on having a good first weekend said

White.

"I'm the nervous one. I didn't really want to open," said White, knowing that social distancing in a bar is hard to get people to adhere to and you can't drink with a mask on.

She also has a fear of everyone getting sick and worries about being accused of being the place where someone caught the coronavirus. Normal capacity is about 50 and even if she took out all the bar stools, everyone would still congregate closely.

White noted that, even before the pandemic, people would come into the bar while they were sick with colds or the flu; the need to socialize is very basic.

The bar business is very much dependent on people coming through the door said White. Her son, Justin White, handles most of the night shifts, and last summer he hired small bands in an effort to draw in more business.

According to White, there's a lot of competition in the summer time with camping and festivals, but this year might be different. A lot of the events have been canceled and people may be staying closer to home which may result in a better summer than what they've had in years past. This would be the summer when it would be greatly appreciated according to White.

## Essential fear vs. essential business — which one wins?

March 24, Wisconsin Secretary-designee of Health Andrea Palm warned that, on our current path in the next two weeks, Wisconsin would see 440-1,500 dead by April 7.

Their fear was real, so they shared their concern with family members; this sharing of fear that came from trusted family hospital workers validated the computer model predictions and fear communicated by the science experts.

The third level of fear was for our children. Students had to go home. No teacher, parent or grandparent wants their children to become ill. Now we know that those under 30 years old are the least vulnerable among us. Why are we allowing everything to be canceled that a child looks forward to?

Following the April 6 Supreme Court ruling regarding voting at polls, the mainstream media and social media spread fear.

April 7, in-person voting would

result in many deaths and Republicans want to kill us.

April 24, two friends and I were at the Madison protest. We walked around the capitol several times and determined that at the south

entrance there were about 1,500. The sidewalks and the grounds around the capitol were full with a total of 5,000 people to view the convoy. A friend was at the park-and-ride north of Madison, and counted vehicles and passengers estimating 3,000 people making up the convoy, total 8,000. Where is the spike from — the April 24 protest or the April 7 voting?

Government has forced everyone into a few locations — large stores, grocery stores and gas stations. Where is the big spike? Are you getting suspicious? Have you noticed the similarities between the Wuhan China virus predictions and global warming predictions? It does not matter that the number of deaths predicted were way off. You stayed home and gave up your freedom is why the numbers are down, not because science computer models were wrong.

We are told that we must listen to the science experts, but there are confusing statements by the experts.

Feb. 19, in USA Today, Dr. Anthony Fauci said, "The only people who

need masks are those who are already infected to keep from exposing others." Fauci stated that the danger from the coronavirus is "just minuscule." He stated that people should take precautions against the seasonal "influenza outbreak, which is having its second wave." May 12, Fauci told Congress, "There's no guarantee that the vaccine is actually going to be effective."

Dr. Deborah Birx accused Robert Redfield, the director of the Center for Disease Control, "There is nothing from the CDC that I can trust." Birx and others in the task force reportedly believe the CDC methods for tracking the virus inflated the statistics by up to 25%.

April 26, Birx accuses news outlets of being "slicey and dicey" when creating headlines knowing most millennials do not read below the headline where more complete data is located.

Did our elected state leaders help? State Statute 323.10 describes when a governor may declare an emergency. The last sentence reads, "The executive order may be revoked at the discretion of either the governor by executive order or the legislature by joint resolution." ecutive order to be unconstitutional; Bieber would not enforce that order. Does the May 13 Supreme Court decision overturning Gov. Tony Evers' order validate Bieber's decision? If the sheriff had broken the law, the attorney general or state legislature would have acted against the sheriff; I am not aware of any action against Bieber.

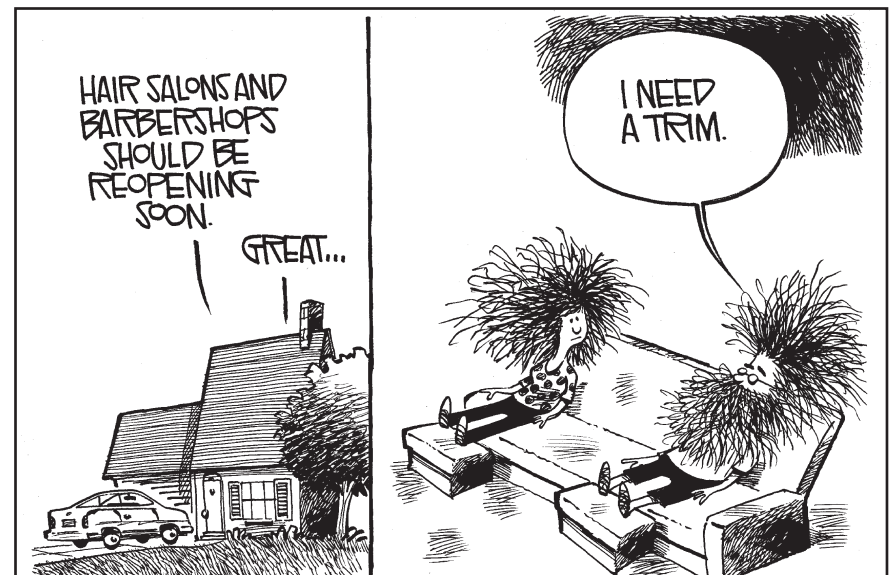
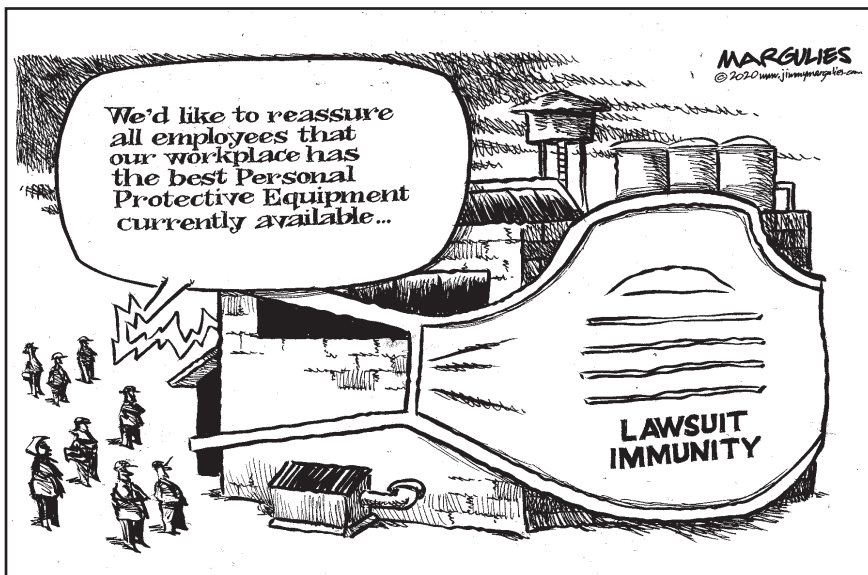

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# How to lower COVID-19 risk while eating out

## Advice for seniors and other diners returning to the table

As restaurants and bars reopen to the public, it's important to realize that eating out increases the risk of exposure to the new coronavirus.

Two of the most important public health measures for keeping illnesses to a minimum are nearly impossible in these situations: First, it's hard to eat or drink while wearing a face mask. Second, social distancing is difficult in tight spaces normally filled with back-to-back seating and servers who weave among the busy tables all evening long.

So, what should you look out for, and how can you and the restaurant reduce the risk? Here are answers to a few common questions.

### How far apart should tables and bar stools be?

There is nothing magical about 6 feet, the number we often hear in formal guidance from government agencies.

The "6-foot" rule is based on old data about the distance droplets can spread respiratory viruses. These droplets tend to settle out of the air within 6 feet, but that isn't always the case.

Aerosols can spread the virus over larger distances, though there remains some uncertainty about how common this spread is. Particles generated by sneezes or someone running can travel up to 30 feet.

Talking alone has been shown to generate respiratory droplets that could be infectious.

If there is a fan or current generated in a closed space such as a restaurant, particles will also travel farther.

This was shown in a paper from China: People in a restaurant downwind of an infected person became infected even though the distance was greater than 6 feet.

The closer the distance and the greater the time someone is exposed to a person who is infectious, the greater the risk.

### If the servers wear masks, is that enough?

If servers wear masks, that will afford a layer of protection, but customers eating and talking could still spread the virus.

One way to mitigate that risk in this imperfect situation, at least from a public health point of view, would

be to have tables surrounded by protective barriers, such as plexiglass or screens, or put tables in separate rooms with doors that can be closed. Some states are encouraging restaurants to limit each table to only one server who delivers everything.

### Should I ask for disposable utensils and wipe everything down?

Regular dishwashing of plates, glasses and utensils, and laundering of napkins and tablecloths, will inactivate the virus. No need for disposables here.

The table should also be cleaned and disinfected between uses and marked as sanitized.

Menus are a bit more problematic, depending on the material. Plastic menus could be disinfected. Disposable menus would be more ideal. Remember, even if someone touches a surface that has infectious virus, as long as they don't touch their mouth, nose or eyes they should be safe. So, when in doubt, wash your hands or use hand sanitizer.

### Can I get the virus from food from the kitchen?

The risk of becoming infected with the new coronavirus from food is very low.

The virus also is not very stable in the environment. Studies have shown it loses half its viral concentration after less than an hour on copper, three and a half hours on cardboard and just under seven hours on plastic. all of the virus.

The use of masks and maintaining good hand hygiene by food preparers should significantly reduce the risk of food contamination.

### Is outdoor seating or a drive-through any safer?

Vulnerable people may want to pass on dine-in options and focus on pickup or perhaps outside dining if the conditions are appropriate.

Drive-up windows or carry-out are probably the safest.

Overall, outside dining is safer than indoor dining with everything else being equal on a nonwindy day due to the larger air volume.

# How to make the most of your telehealth appointment

Dear Savvy Senior,

*I manage a large doctor's clinic that treats hundreds of seniors each month. We are moving to more telehealth visits to help keep our patients safe at home during the coronavirus pandemic, but this new way of seeing a doctor is befuddling to many of our elder patients. Can you write a column educating patients on how to prepare for a telehealth appointment?*

Dear Reader,

To help keep patients safe and at home during the coronavirus crisis more and more doctors and other health care providers are turning to telehealth (a.k.a. telemedicine) appointments, which are remote e-visits using a digital communication device like a smartphone, tablet or computer.

Although telehealth has been around for a few years now, recent updates to regulations and a surge in demand has made it the easiest way to get many different types of medical care.

Most telehealth appointments

today tend to be primary care or follow-up visits that can assess symptoms or check on people who have had a medical procedure. Telehealth also works well for some specialties like dermatology or mental health care (counseling/therapy) services.

So, what can patients expect from a telehealth visit, and how should they prepare?

The first step is to call your doctor's office to find out whether telemedicine visits are available and whether you will need to set up an account or install special software on your computer, phone or tablet.

Until recently, doctors were required to conduct telehealth visits through platforms that were compliant with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act, or HIPAA.

Some of those requirements have been relaxed in the current crisis, so many providers are using popular apps such as FaceTime, Skype and Zoom to conduct visits.

Once you know what technology you will be using, get familiar with it.

You don't want to spend the first 10 minutes of your visit trying to figure out how to unmute the audio.

For older patients who aren't familiar or comfortable with technology, ask a relative or friend with a smartphone, tablet or laptop to assist you.

Take the time to clarify the purpose of the televisit before it begins. Prioritize a written list of three or four issues you want to discuss with your doctor and make a list of the medicines you're taking, along with the dosages.

Also, have relevant medical devices or logs on hand, such as a penlight or smartphone flashlight for viewing a sore throat, a blood-pressure cuff and thermometer (or recent readings), blood-sugar logs if you're diabetic or a food log if you have gastrointestinal problems.

If you've received medical care at different places, such as an urgent care facility or another doctor's office, have your latest medical records with you during the telemedicine visit.

Wear loose clothing that will allow you to show your medical provider what is concerning you.

Before the visit ends, make sure you know the follow-up plan. Do you need to schedule an in-office visit, fill a prescription or get a referral to a specialist?

Right now, Medicare and Medicaid are covering the cost of telehealth visits (see [medicare.gov/coverage/telehealth](https://www.medicare.gov/coverage/telehealth) for details), and most private insurers are following suit.

If, however, you don't have a primary care physician or need urgent care, you can get help through virtual health care service like Doctor on Demand ([doctorondemand.com](https://doctorondemand.com)) or TeleDoc ([teladoc.com](https://teladoc.com)).

These services currently do not accept original Medicare, but they may be covered by private insurers including some Medicare Advantage plans — be sure you check.

# Advance care planning for COVID-19

Dear Savvy Senior,

*All this horrible coronavirus carnage got me thinking about my own end-of-life decisions if I were to get sick. Can you recommend some good resources that can help me create a living will or advance directive, or other pertinent documents? I've put it off long enough.*

Almost 70.

Dear Almost,

To adequately spell out your wishes regarding your end-of-life medical treatment are two key documents: A living will which tells your doctor what kind of care you want to receive if you become incapacitated, and a health care power of attorney (or health care proxy), which names a person you authorize to make medical decisions on your behalf if you become unable to.

These two documents are known as an advance directive, and will only be utilized if you are too ill to make medical decisions yourself. You can also change or update it whenever you please.

It isn't necessary to hire a lawyer to prepare an advance directive.

There are free or low-cost resources available today to help you create one, and it takes only a few minutes from start to finish.

One that I highly recommend that's completely free to use is My Directives (MyDirectives.com). This is an online tool and mobile app that will help you create, store and share a detailed, customized digital advance directive. Their easy-to-use platform combines eight thoughtful questions to guide you through the process. If you're not computer savvy, ask a family member or trusted friend to help you.

The advantage of having a digital advance directive versus a paper document is being able to access it quickly and easily via smartphone, which is crucial in emergency situations when they're most often needed.

Finally, to ensure your final wishes are followed, make sure to tell your family members, health care proxy and doctors.

Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the board of review within the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. The board may require objections to the amount or valuation of property to be submitted on forms approved by the Department of Revenue, and the board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. Persons who own land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land may object only to the valuation of that land or only to the valuation of improvements to that land. No person may be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the board in support of the objections and made full disclosure before the board, under oath, of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.
5. When appearing before the board of review, the objecting person shall specify in writing the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.
6. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board by telephone, or object to a valuation if that valuation was made by the assessor or the objector using the income method of valuation, unless the person supplies the assessor with all the information about income and expenses, as specified in the assessor's manual under s. 73.03 (2a), Wis. stats., that the assessor requests. The Town of Wescott has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph that provides exceptions for persons using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or the duties of their officer or by order of a court.\* The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under s. 19.35 (1), Wis. stats.
7. The board shall hear upon oath, by telephone, all ill or disabled persons who present to the board a letter from a physician, surgeon, or osteopath that confirms their illness or disability. No other persons may testify by telephone unless the Board, in its discretion, has determined to grant a property owner's or their representative's request to testify under oath by telephone or written statement.
8. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board by telephone, or contest the amount of any assessment unless, at least 48 hours before the first meeting of the board, or at least 48 hours before the objection is heard if the objection is allowed under s.70.47 (3) (a), Wis. stats., that person provides to the clerk of the board of review notice as to whether the person will ask for the removal of a member of the board of review and, if so, which member, and provides a reasonable estimate of the length of time the hearing will take.

# Schofield woman killed on County Q

**WITTENBERG** — An 82-year-old Schofield woman died as a result of injuries sustained in a two-vehicle crash in the town of Wittenberg on Tuesday, according to the Shawano County Sheriff's Department.

The crash occurred at about 6 p.m. on County Road Q east of Cardinal Lane.

The preliminary investigation indicates a 48-year-old Wittenberg man was traveling eastbound on County Road Q and crossed the center line into oncoming traffic, striking a westbound vehicle head-on.

The second vehicle was driven by

an 83-year-old Weston woman.

Drivers from both vehicles were taken to a Wausau area hospital. The Weston woman was said to be in stable condition.

The condition of the Wittenberg man was unknown.

The Schofield woman, a passenger in the second vehicle, was airlifted to a Wausau area hospital where she later succumbed to her injuries and was pronounced deceased, the sheriff's department said.

Alcohol does not appear to be a contributing factor in the crash, which is still being investigated.



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
