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Middle school girls' softball gets the go-ahead

Next spring, Wittenberg-Birnamwood middle school girls will have the opportunity to participate in softball. The sport will be based on an eight-week season, two games per week and several practices prior to the start of the season.

Superintendent Garrett Rogowski shared his research with the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School Board regarding beginning expenses and estimated annual costs.

An initial \$2,000 for the first year would be an investment in uniforms which, according to Rogowski, is on a 10-year rotation. He noted that with fundraising, other sports have reduced uniform replacement to a five-year rotation.

For the annual cost per year,

Rogowski included officials' fees at \$55 per game for six home games for a total of \$660, and transportation costs for games in and out of town at \$408. The estimated cost for a coach would be about \$1,000 and would bring the annual total to roughly \$2,000, said Rogowski. He added that most of the equipment needed can be borrowed from the youth summer programs or the high school.

In his estimate, Rogowski did not include transportation costs for practices, saying that students can walk from the school to the village ball diamond. Birnamwood students will be transported by bus to the Wittenberg Elementary Middle School building.

Only seventh and eighth grade girls will be allowed to participate due to the physical differences that can exist between sixth and eighth graders, said Rogowski, noting that safety

for the players is a high priority.

Title IX, a law that provides for equal participation for boys and girls in school athletics, among other things, is based on how many participants are included in a sport rather than the number of sports offered. Boys' football programs traditionally have the highest numbers of athletes, and adding a girls' middle school softball program could help balance out those numbers.

Board member Dan Stewart made the motion to proceed with the softball program because it offers girls another option, and it provides the opportunity to offer another sports program for a younger age group.

The board voted in favor of adding the sport at the school board meeting June 22.

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WBSD transfers operations money saved to capital projects fund

The Wittenberg-Birnamwood School Board transferred funds at its June 22 board meeting.

The Aquatic Center had a budget projection of \$302,421 but ceased operations in mid-March due to COVID-19. Currently, the department is an estimated \$5,400 short. The board voted to cover the deficit with a transfer of \$6,000 from the endowment fund, which supports the Aquatic Center. According to Superintendent Garrett Rogowski, the Aquatic Center would have been in the black had the school been able to remain open.

Transfers of unused funds in Fund 10, which covers the operational expenses of the school district, were placed into Fund 46 to be used for later capital projects.

Five years ago, the state of Wisconsin passed a law allowing

school districts to establish a fund where any remaining revenue after each fiscal year can be deposited in a separate fund that can only be allocated toward capital project expenses. Another stipulation was that the fund could not be accessed for five years. Now that the five-year hold has been met, WBSD will be able to add to and withdraw from Fund 46 as needed. To access the money, a plan needs to be turned in to the Department of Public Instruction indicating how the funds will be used. It is audited and reported every year.

According to Rogowski, the district does not budget significant amounts for money which fluctuates, such as the dividends from the property insurance company, which was \$23,000, or the E-Rate, a federal program which assists schools and libraries in rural areas, which was \$12,000, or the money received from the insurance company due to the

bus accident last fall, which was \$30,000.

Due to COVID-19, some expenses for WBSD were less than expected. Savings in transportation expenses was estimated to be \$38,000. There was a savings of \$78,000 in utilities. Rogowski noted that savings came mostly from not having to heat the pool with the closure of the school and Aquatic Center.

The board had also budgeted \$100,000 for construction of a maintenance shed, but it elected not to build it at this time. With the resignation of high school Principal Jill Sharp and the transfer of Randy Berndt to the Birnamwood Elementary/Middle School principal position, the board chose not to fill the Dean of Students position, which Berndt had previously held which was a savings of approximately \$90,000 in wages and benefits.

Aspirus health center reopens in Antigo

The Aspirus Health & Performance Center, located at 112 E. Fifth Ave. in Antigo, opened to members Monday, July 6. The center is taking a phased reopening approach for the safety of members and staff.

Hours of operation during phase one will be Monday through Friday, 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. This will allow staff to frequently clean equipment and common areas. Locker rooms, towel service and drinking fountains are currently not available. Aspirus Langlade Hospital is providing current members with the month of July at no cost. As billing resumes

in August, the members will only be charged for half of their August membership to offset the closure time in March.

Before entry to the center, members will be screened for COVID-19 symptoms and have their temperature taken at the main entrance of the hospital from 6 a.m. to 5 p.m. and at the Health & Performance Center entrance from 5 p.m. to 6 p.m. Masks are required upon entering and exiting the building but may be removed during exercise. The Aspirus team has implemented other safety measures, such as distanced exer-

cise equipment, increased sanitizing stations and limited occupancy of certain areas to ensure social distancing is being followed. Members are asked to wipe down equipment with sanitizing wipes after use.

"The Aspirus Health & Performance Center staff and myself have put together a reopening strategy with the primary focus being the safe return of our members. The facility has transformed somewhat in order to meet the safety guidelines of the CDC and the Medical Fitness Association," said Greg Renfro, center manager. "We are all looking forward to

working with our members toward their fitness and wellness goals."

The Aspirus Health & Performance Center is a medically based fitness center. Members are able to monitor their blood pressure during exercise and communicate results back to their doctors. "We have purchased more blood pressure cuffs to ensure proper sanitization between uses," said Renfro.

Local Aspirus clinics reopen

As these clinics reopen, they will do so using the same precautions as

all other Aspirus locations to protect the health of patients and staff. Masks are required of all patients and visitors, who also will receive a temperature check and be asked if they have any symptoms commonly associated with COVID-19.

Patients can schedule appoint-

ments by calling their local clinic and will be directed as appropriate.

All Aspirus locations also continue to seek cloth mask donations. These donations help preserve PPE supplies for health care workers and are welcomed by anyone willing to donate.

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may submit a request to vote an absentee ballot to their municipal clerk. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least 10 consecutive days before the election. The elector must also be registered in order to receive an absentee ballot. Proof of identification must be provided before an absentee ballot may be issued.

You must make a request for an absentee ballot in writing or online at MyVote.wi.gov.

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the primary or election or both. You may also submit a written request in the form of a letter or you may apply for an absentee ballot online at myVote.wi.gov. Your written request must list your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote, the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different, and your signature. You may make application for an absentee ballot in person, by mail, by fax, by email or at MyVote.wi.gov.

Making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail

The deadline for making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail is: 5 pm on the fifth day before the election, Thursday, August 06, 2020

Note: Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined to home or a care facility, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk regarding deadlines for requesting and submitting an absentee ballot.

Voting an absentee ballot in person

You may also request and vote an absentee ballot in the clerk's office or other specified location during the days and hours specified for casting an absentee ballot in person.

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT FOR THE AUGUST 11, 2020 ELECTION

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may request to vote an absentee ballot. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least 28 consecutive days before the election. The elector must also be registered in order to receive an absentee ballot. Proof of identification must be provided before an absentee ballot may be issued.

You must make a request for an absentee ballot in writing.

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the primary or election or both. You may also submit a written request in the form of a letter. Your written request must list your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote, the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different, and your signature. You may make application for an absentee ballot by mail or in person.

Making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail

The deadline for making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail is: **5:00 p.m. on Thursday, August 6, 2020.**

Note: Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined to home or a care facility, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk regarding deadlines for requesting and submitting an absentee ballot.

Voting an absentee ballot in person

You may also request and vote an absentee ballot in the clerk's office or other specified location during the days and hours specified below for casting an absentee ballot in person.

No in-person absentee voting may occur on the day before the election.
