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Estimated school budget is proposed at annual meeting

Superintendent Garrett Rogowski updated district residents and the school board about upcoming budget numbers at the district's Aug. 24 annual meeting.

The formal budget will not be approved until October after all the various resources are factored in. Property valuation and enrollment numbers will be provided in September, and numbers for general aid and computer aid will be finalized in October said Rogowski.

The school population is estimated to be 1,097 for the 2020-21 school year, which is down from the 1,123 total for last year. The actual total isn't counted until the third Friday in September. Rogowski anticipates a higher number of students.

The school population is based on a three year rolling average so that one bad year doesn't severely impact the school budget said Rogowski.

"Open enrollment is extremely volatile," said Rogowski.

Rates per students can range between \$8,000 per student to \$13,000 for a student with special needs and can represent a lot of money going into or out of a school district noted Rogowski.

The district uses equalized values, which are calculated annually by the Department of Revenue and used to insure statewide fairness and equity in property tax distribution.

Equalized value represents an estimate of a taxation district's total taxable value. This provides for the fair apportionment of school

districts and county levy for each of the municipalities, explained Rogowski.

Changes in equalized value don't necessarily translate to changes in property value, which is based on assessed value. They are two separate issues.

Rogowski pointed out that even with the referendum, the mill rate was less last year at \$9.13 per \$1,000 than what it was in 2015-16 when it was \$9.27 per \$1,000. Last year the state average was \$9.34. The estimate for the mill rate for 2021 is estimated at \$8.63 per \$1,000 which would mean that someone who owns a home valued at \$100,000 would pay \$863 per year.

The budget for 2020-21 is \$13,762,262.

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Loving your job on Labor Day

It was Labor Day, 1946, when Dad started a temporary job that grew into a lifelong career. Farm boss at the orphan's home was not a title that drew my father from rural Cadott to Homme Children's Home in Wittenberg. In a casual meeting in a parking lot in Stanley, Dad met with Homme's director F.B. Anderson who was on his way to the northshore for relief from his allergies.

Dad wasn't looking to continue his life as a farmer. He had missed out on World War II and was eager to join the Merchant Marines for his first great adventure. There's the old adage "If you want to make God laugh, tell him your plans" and I think that sums up my father's experience.

With a lot of encouragement from his dad and the earnest plea from Mr. Anderson, Dad headed off to Homme to milk the cows and leave once he brought in the harvest. I'm sure it seemed to Dad as just a little bump in the road. Little did he know that bump changed the trajectory of his life in a way he never could have imagined.

What he found when he got here was not just the daily busy work that is farming, but the children who need-

ed a home. By the time Dad arrived, the vision of Rev. Homme to provide a home for orphans had adapted to help all children. Many of the kids who were there were siblings who only had one parent and that parent had to make the very hard choice to leave the children at Homme so they could go and earn a living.

For Dad it was an eye-opening experience. Although he had grown up during the depression, his family farm provided enough food and income to survive. He told me of a family that would come once a week to visit, always around suppertime, and his mom would graciously make room for them at the dinner table. Times were hard, but there was always enough to share. To now be at a job where families were separated to survive was a new concept for him.

Over the years Dad met many children and parents and became life long friends with several people

sharing their joys and sorrows. For Dad the job was all about the experience. He enjoyed knowing every day would be different than the day before. He took six months off one year to see if higher paying wages at a factory would provide for him a better life. Happiness for Dad was found in taking care of others.

Labor Day for Dad was a celebration of meaningful work and he was truly grateful for his. Even the bad days where problems seemed insurmountable couldn't steer him to find a different profession. Without even knowing it he was guided to be in the right place at the right time and he appreciated the satisfaction it brought him.

I often wonder if people use Labor Day to reflect on their good fortune to find meaningful work or if it's just a time to forget about what they do for a long weekend. I've had my feet planted firmly in either camp from time to time and I know it was always inspirational to see the world as Dad saw it.

The Badger Amateur Baseball Association says good bye to two of its local legends

The Badger Amateur Baseball Association, as well as all local area baseball, lost two of its greatest ambassadors within a couple of days of one another. Don Jirschele passed away on July 27 at the age of 87 and Bert Thiel passed a couple days later on July 31 at the age of 94. Both men have left unforgettable legacies.

Jirschele's name was synonymous in the baseball community in Clintonville for over half a century. He played, managed, and organized the Clintonville A's for most of his life. He was, in some aspect, part of a dozen of their BABA Grand Championships. Jirschele organized the A's sponsored fireworks show that is held around the 4th of July every year. He also was the main organizer for the Doug Jirschele Banquet that raised funds for the American Legion baseball team in Clintonville, along with other sports related groups in the area.

Thiel hit the baseball scene in the late 1930's and never stopped. As a teen in an area that had numerous baseball leagues going on at the same time, he became kind of a hired gun. He could get \$5 for pitching a game and would actually pitch double headers for the \$10 payday saying it beat hauling milk cans at 50 cents a day.

His talent was soon discovered and eventually he found himself signed by the Boston Braves. His career continued for years as a player, manager, and scout for major league baseball teams. Over this time, when it would fit his career, Thiel

would get a chance to play in the BABA. Later in his career he managed the Leopold team in the 70's and 80's and took a small local team and turned them into a force in the BABA.

These two men had slightly different agendas in the way they approached the game. Jirschele was a person that knew the rules and the by-laws. If he went on to the field to discuss a rule, he would come back to the dugout knowing the umpire now knew the correct ruling on the play. At the BABA meetings he would sit and listen to the other managers listing players, discussing the by-laws and the rule book. If he picked up on something that was not done by the rules or if someone was falsifying a player listing, he would wait to the end of the meeting when everyone was done, and in a calm voice would question and correct everything the league had just spent the whole meeting discussing. With his wisdom and knowledge of the league, he was an integral part in many of the BABA rule changes.

Thiel's approach to the game was one of, know the game, and execute what you know. The workings of the league were something that a manager just had to deal with, and an umpire's bad call was something you had to overcome. He had a passion for the game and a passion for discovering and developing players.

As a scout he touched hundreds of young ball players lives. Not just in this area but all over the country, giving them a chance to live a dream. When the BABA decided to start hosting a free youth baseball camp for young area players, Thiel,

then 80, was brought on board. Thiel felt that no kid should ever have to give money to an adult for advice on playing baseball, a motto the BABA adapted for helping promote and develop local young ball players.

Thiel making it to the pros with the Braves and Jirschele playing college football for legendary Bear

Bryant at the University of Kentucky and then being drafted by the Green Bay Packers could have made either one arrogant, but these two guys both had a great sense of humor and both were very approachable.

Their legacy will continue in the hearts of the people they impacted for years to come.



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Diemel brothers' service set for Navarino diamond

The Bonduel community will have a chance to say goodbye to the Diemel brothers, more than a year after they were murdered on a Missouri business trip.

A visitation and service for Nick, 34 and Justin, 24, have been set for September 27 at the Navarino ball diamond, W5173 State Highway 156, from noon until 3 p.m. Pastor Ty Stoneburner will then preside over a memorial service, according to Muehl-Boettcher Funeral Home's web site.

The Diemel brothers were killed July 21, 2019, at a farm northeast of Kansas City.

The brothers' obituaries note they were living their dream with their Diemel's Livestock business. Brandon, another brother, was also involved with the business.

The two Diemels worked in their family's concrete business before setting up their own venture.

Garland "Joey" Nelson, the

Braymer, Missouri, farm's operator, is charged with the deaths including a variety of other felonies.

Nelson has been held since July 2019 in the Caldwell County Detention Center in Missouri without bail. Nelson's last court appearance was in May and no trial date has been set.

Nelson also faces two counts of abandonment of a corpse, two counts of tampering with physical evidence, two counts of "armed criminal action" and one count of unlawful possession of a firearm.

The defendant has sought to have some of the charges dropped as well has asked for a change of venue.

The firearm charge stems from Nelson's felony conviction in federal court for "Fraud Using Property Mortgaged or Pledged to Farm Credit Agencies." Under state law, felons are forbidden to have or use firearms.

Nelson, 25, was first arrested July 29 for tampering with a motor vehicle, a state felony. Court documents show Nelson admitted to driving a white Ford F250 pickup

truck, rented by the brothers on July 20, from the Braymer farm on July 21, 2019, about 11:45 a.m. to a commuter parking lot near Holt, where it was abandoned.

A Kansas City, Missouri, television station cited court documents as saying the Diemels were expecting a \$250,000 check from Nelson as part of a cattle deal. Nick, 35 and Justin, 24, were owners of Diemel Livestock in Bonduel and had livestock dealings in multiple states. Lisa Diemel, Nick Diemel's wife, has taken over operation of the family business after filing a petition in Shawano County probate court asserting the brothers were dead.

A neighbor reported hearing multiple gunshots coming from the farm between 11:15-11:30 a.m. on July 21, according to the charging documents.

"It is believed Nick and Justin Diemel never left the property after they arrived and were intentionally killed," the charges said.

No additional persons have been charged in the murder investigation.

The affidavit states the bodies were moved to an adjacent pasture in barrels where they were covered with diesel fuel, burned and then placed in a manure pile by a metal barn. Authorities have reported a skid loader was used to crush the barrels and place them elsewhere on the property.

Missouri authorities relied on DNA comparisons to make the first identification of the Diemels.

Authorities said a .30-30 cartridge was located in the bloodstained clothing reportedly belonging to Nelson. They also confirmed DNA tests of blood stains found on the clothing belonged to Nick Diemel.

Additional remains were recovered in November 2019 from a stock trailer purchased in Missouri by a rancher from Hershey, Nebraska in Lincoln County. Local sheriff's deputies confirmed the remains as human and found personal items. Investigators and Missouri State Police flew into Lincoln County and picked up the remains.

Tigerton Main Street suffered a blow when it had to cancel its annual Independence Day festivities, and it was due to take another hit later this month when officials decided to cancel Applefest, a favorite in the community for years.

However, officials came up with an event to help with the financial loss, and on Sunday, five food trucks lined up for Tigerton Main Street's first food truck rally.

Among the more unusual items were Rolleaz, a food truck that served up a variety of tastes inside a spring roll, including buffalo chicken, pepperoni pizza and macaroni and cheese. There was also a food truck dedicated entirely to cookie dough that had the first space in the row as visitors slowly came over from the Embarrass River Campground.

Tigerton residents John and Amanda Hunholz brought their 11-month-old daughter, Hannah, out to enjoy the nice outdoor weather and sample some of the cuisine. Amanda Hunholz got the pork nachos from Aftershock, a barbecue-themed food truck from Manawa that was once a bus, while John Hunholz enjoyed a pulled pork sandwich.

"This was something different to try," Amanda Hunholz said. "It's a nice day to get outside. We're planning to get cookie dough afterward."

She added that it was nice to see such an aromatic event come to Tigerton.

"Usually you see something like this in the big cities," Amanda Hunholz said. "It's cool that they got them all together to come out to little Tigerton. It was definitely creative."

While there were plenty of smiles at the food truck rally, there were a few frowns as folks had to wait for the beer from Stubborn Brothers Brewery, which was delayed coming from Shawano. The beer was Tigerton Main Street's source of revenue for the rally,

according to Trisha Hoffman, the organization's treasurer.

Having a food truck rally brought about an event that could easily be held outside and maintain social distancing, according to Hoffman, even though some lines started getting long quickly. She knew the campground would be busy on Labor Day weekend, and the event was far enough away from the Shawano County Fair to allow both events to flourish.

"We knew we'd at least have the campers to come check it out," Hoffman said, "but it looks like we've got quite a few locals here, too."

With all the participation, Hoffman anticipates bringing the food trucks back next year, where hopefully they will add to the existing events that had to be called off in 2020.

"We might do a different weekend. We might do a fall and spring type of thing," Hoffman said.

Nick "The Bear" Kinziger, 76, was unexpectedly called to his heavenly home in the early morning hours of March 20, 2020, with his wife, Peg, by his side. After his retirement, Bear had ample opportunity to take advantage of

coach Jim Douglas learned of Nick's adventure and nicknamed him Nick "The Bear." The media picked up on Kinziger's exploit and nickname and ran with it when reporting

the many things he enjoyed to doing. A passion for the outdoors, he was an avid fisherman, hunter and snowmobiler, and in his earlier days Nick enjoyed golfing and riding his motorcycle. Currently his love was watching his judge shows, telling Alexa to play something, morning breakfasts with the boys club at the restaurant and most of all spending time with his buddies, brothers, and nephews at the cabin. Any day on the water/ice was a good day to him. He loved going to his daughters home to play with her puppies.

One wouldn't know it, but Nick was a great cook, and he had an amazing singing voice. Bear was an avid Packers and Brewers fan, but wrestling never left his blood. He was very happy to see his great-nephew John win third place in his state title bout just a couple of weeks ago.

On Nov. 2, 2002, Nick married the love of his life, Margaret (Peg) Winters from Phelps, where she owned Sand Lake Pub and Wintersland Storage. Upon marrying Nick, they lived in Crivitz on Left Foot Lake with his loving dogs Lacey and Gidget (and Moose, Liza Dootlitttle and Budman who have previously passed). There he was able to just walk across the lake to fish.

He took great enjoyment out of watching the deer and birds come into his yard where he could watch them closely from his man cave. In that man cave, Nick ran several side businesses in his spare time. He wasn't happy if he wasn't talking to someone on

the phone. His beautiful smile would brighten any room.

For as much as Nick was a conversationalist, he was a journalist. He has kept a daily diary for over 41 years. National Guard will be at fairgrounds Sept. 15-16; cases rising in county

Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Department has announced that will be a free COVID-19 testing event Sept. 15-16 for any Wisconsin resident with symptoms or concerns about COVID-19.

The event will be held at the Shawano County Fairgrounds, 990 East Green Bay Street, Shawano, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Testing will be available for those ages 5 and older and done within a vehicle by members of the Wisconsin National Guard.

Participants should wear a mask at the testing site and follow instructions for digital registration, or ask for help from an attendant.

"We encourage anyone who is concerned about COVID-19, especially anyone who is experiencing symptoms of COVID-19, to seek a test at this event.

Symptoms of COVID-19 may include new or worsening: fever, cough, shortness of breath, fatigue, sore throat, headache, chills, muscle aches, diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, or new loss of taste or smell," Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Officer Vicki Dantoin said.

COVID-19 cases in Shawano and Menominee counties have continued to increase, she said in a press release. The counties currently have high COVID-19 activity levels.

As of last week, Shawano County was experiencing a growing trend of COVID-19 activity.

The month of August showed the highest number of new cases

for each county to date. Shawano County experienced about 128 cases in August while Menominee County experienced 11 cases.

Eight days into September, Shawano County already has almost half of the number of August cases, Dantoin said.

"With a return to school and changes in weather, we anticipate these numbers to continue to increase," she said.

As of Sept. 4, Shawano County had 322 confirm COVID-19 cases with 17 hospitalizations; Menominee County had 29 with two hospitalizations. No COVID-19 deaths have been reported in the two counties

The activity level is considered high in both counties.

"We know following measures to help prevent the spread of COVID-19 is not easy, but we need everyone's help to slow the spread of this virus and prevent as many serious cases of illness as possible," said Dantoin.

Prevention measures include social distancing, hand washing, wearing a mask, avoiding gatherings and staying home if sick.

"Please stay home while you are awaiting the results of your COVID-19 test," she said.

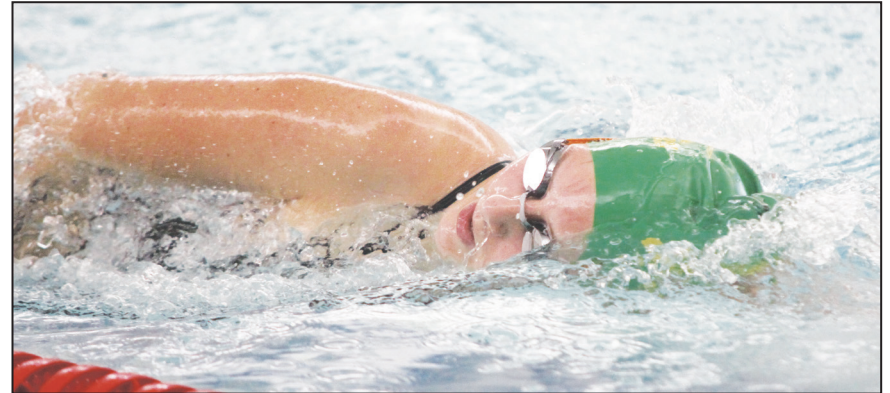

WOW fall art show opens Sept. 19

It's been an interesting year for Walls of Wittenberg as they've navigated through the pandemic deciding which events should be held and which should be cancelled. With seven artists involved with the annual fall art show the decision to proceed was an easy one.

"Our artists are excited to be part of the show this fall," said event coordinator Elaine Diffor who noted that there is plenty of room to social distance in the WOWSPACE.

The room capacity is 133 people and the free event is open from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays from Sept. 19 through Oct. 4 so according to Diffor there are plenty of opportunities to safely view the show. Masks will be required.

As in years past, the show ends on the same weekend as the county-wide Miles of Art event. This is the first year that WOW has not participated in the event. Due to the uncertainty of whether or not the show would

take place and not having a sponsor to cover the cost of being a MoA event, WOW made the decision to put on an independent art show. Diffor noted she hopes WOW will be a part of the MoA event next year.

Shawano photographer Jim Leuenberger has been a frequent exhibitor at WOW art shows. This year his collection will focus on photos of owls and other birds among his nature-themed collection.

"I look forward to being at the show again this year," said Leuenberger.

Carol Strand, Wausau, is a retired art teacher from the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District and specializes in stained glass and ceramics. Her work is influenced by the time she spends outdoors and working in her garden.

Another popular returning artist is Carmen Duran of Stratford who says that she found painting later in life. She says her focus is generally floral subjects painted with vivid color combinations, bold brush strokes and rich texture.

choice. The artist, from Shawano, creates a variety of art pieces using yarns, fabrics and silks generally constructed by hand or with the help of her sewing machine.

"I create unique materials by deconstructing, dying, spinning or re-purposing," said Sredl. "It's the texture of life and the practice of my art."

Greenway Homescapes is the name of the artwork produced by the husband and wife team, Tim and Maureen Baumhardt of Campbellsport. For the past 15 years they have been creating metal art for indoor/outdoor living.

Walking sticks were an inspiration that came to Kirk Stark, Rothschild, during his time spent outdoors bird hunting and trout fishing. All of the sticks are made from fallen branches including maple, aspen, oak and alder and no two are the same. Sticks also have brass tips, leather and or paracord, grips, and all have a compass.

DMV expands services throughout Wisconsin

Wisconsin Department of Transportation Division of Motor Vehicles will temporarily expand its driver licenses and identification card services this fall in Madison, Milwaukee and other locations throughout Wisconsin which were closed in March due to COVID-19.

On Oct. 13, from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m., the DMV services will be available at the Community Center, 208 W. Vinal St., Wittenberg.

DMV has at least one location in each of Wisconsin's 72 counties. All DMV customer service centers follow

the same safety protocols. Employees wear face coverings. Customers are encouraged to follow floor decals for social distancing and to stay behind plastic panels at service windows. To ensure safe social distancing is available inside, customers may be required to wait outside the DMV center.

To further ensure that social distancing is maintained, all Wisconsin DMVs limit in-person customer service to driver license and identification related products. All vehicle-related services can be done online, by mail or through a third-party agent.

Being chosen as king of Carnival is a great

honor bestowed only on those in the highest level of New Orleans society. Consequently, Chauncy's family was gathered at the prestigious Boston Club where they would stand on the balcony and wave as the float carrying the king and queen passed by.

Those attending were Chauncy's wife, Bitty, son Henry, daughter Marcelle, longtime family friend, Tolliver Albert, Bitty's influential father Haygood Mayhew and an array of the city's high society crowd. Most are either drunk or high on something — after all, it is Mardi Gras.

Down on the street, rookie cop Skip Langdon is standing with her back to the street as she works crowd control. She's on loan from her regular precinct and is actually enjoying watching the people gathered all the route.

Skip is very familiar with Carnival. She grew up here, but she's never fit in. She may be the daughter of a high society doctor and social climbing mother, but Skip's 6-foot height,

broad body and rebellious nature didn't fit the image they wanted to project. After flunking out of a couple of colleges and leaving several nowhere jobs, Skip discovered she liked police work. It fit her size and really upset her parents. What could be better?

As the king's float neared, Skip turned to take a peek. To her horror, she saw someone dressed as Dolly Parton fire a pistol at the king. As she battles her way forward, she is jostled by a man with a camera. Chauncy St. Amant is dead, and Skip saw it happen.

Since she was a witness and friends with the St. Amant family, she is assigned to assist two experienced detectives. One seems to accept her; the other is openly hostile.

She learns that the man with camera is Steve Steinman, and he offers to give her the film he'd shot at the scene. But before he can deliver it, he is knocked cold and the film is taken.

Strangely, he and Skip hit it off, and she finds his bulk and wits very helpful in the investigation. Chauncy had made his share of enemies on his climb to the top, but all seem to have alibis. Something about this convinces Skip that the killer was someone close to Chauncy.

When she figures out what happened and why, she takes the information and recovered film to the detectives. They watch it but miss important details, so Skip shows them what convinced her of who the killer really was. Feeling triumphant, they call in Lt. Duby and share the incriminating film with him.

To Skip's astonishment and anger, Lt. Duby "accidentally" destroys the evidence, saying it appears they have no case. The detectives are stoic, but



Skip is livid. Once again, the rich and powerful — quite literally — get away with murder.

This book ends with Skip impulsively destroying her uniform and everything connected with the

case. I'll have to read the next book to find out what happens with Skip and her career as a cop.

We may not have the wild celebrations of Mardi Gras, but we can share in all kinds of merriment through the books available at your public library. Make this the week you go in and check it out.
