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Spring break can still be a healthy time off

For many students, spring break is right around the corner.

Whether it's a trip abroad, staying home or exploring local spots, there are several ways to keep children's health and safety a top priority. For parents planning a trip with children, there are a few recommendations to consider so everyone returns home safely and is ready to head back to the classroom.

Dr. Abby Smolcich, a Theda-Care pediatrician in Darboy, noted that families who are traveling out of the area should understand the COVID-19 community level for their destination, which can help them decide which prevention steps are most important to keep them safe.

"Many areas have recently updated health and safety guidelines for COVID-19," she said. "At this time, masking is still required on public transportation, but that could change. We would recommend to travelers be patient, adaptable and prepared."

The CDC released new guidelines based on low, medium and high-risk areas. It also states the importance of knowing one's own risk to severe illness.

"If you're immunocompromised or at high-risk for severe illness, the CDC is recommending you wear a mask if out in areas of higher COVID-19 rates," she said. "Before traveling, it might be a good idea to chat with your primary care provider to discuss additional precautions that you might need to take to protect yourself and others."

People should not travel if they are sick, have tested positive for COVID-19, are waiting for results of a COVID-19 test, or had close contact with a person with COVID-19 and are recommended to quarantine.

Smolcich noted that if children are staying closer to home for spring break, it might be a good time to think about sun safety as well. With the unpredictability of Wisconsin weather in the spring time, sunscreen might be needed.

Babies under 6 months of age should be kept out of direct sunlight and dressed in light-colored,

thin clothing to keep cool and use hats to protect their eyes from sunlight. When it comes to kids using sunscreen, use a waterproof one and reapply often. If a child develops a rash or skin irritation,

he or she may be allergic to a certain type of sunscreen, and parents will want to talk with a pediatrician for a recommendation.

"When choosing a sunscreen, be sure to look for the words "broad-spectrum" on the label," said Smolcich. "That means the sunscreen will screen out both ultraviolet B (UVB) and ultraviolet A (UVA) rays."

Wearing sunscreen and reapplying often is the best way to prevent sunburn while out in the sun. Sunburn can appear within a few hours after sun exposure and will take time to heal.

"Your body may start to heal itself before you even return from vacation by peeling the top layer of skin which has the sun damage," Smolcich said. "But a bad sunburn can take several days to heal, so wear your sunscreen for prevention."

It's important to see a doctor if a severe or concerning sunburn develops. Symptoms include blistering and covers a large portion of the body; developing blisters on face, hands or other areas of the body; severe swelling; showing signs of infection, such as pain, pus or red streaks leading away from an open blister; a fever more than 103 degrees; confusion; fainting; and dehydration.

To help prevent dehydration while on spring break, pack along a reusable water bottle to fill at the airport once through security and while out at the beach. Keep in mind that alcoholic beverages can actually dehydrate, so make sure to drink lots of water, even if not thirsty.

Many families might be traveling to areas near water, and Smolcich reminds parents to keep safety top of

mind.

"Parents should always be mindful around bodies of water," she said. "The best protection against drowning or water-related injuries is supervision by an adult at all times."

Parents should eliminate distractions and always watch their children around pools, lakes and ponds. Those who own pools should ensure proper barriers and enclosures are in place to prevent unsupervised swimming or falls in the water. Young children who know how to swim can use water wings, floaties or floating toys with supervision. Parents should be aware that these toys are not a substitute for proper life jackets.

Additionally, parents who boat with their children should always ensure their kids are wearing life jackets — and adults should, too, especially if they want to set a good example. When choosing a life jacket for a child, parents should ensure it is designed to turn an unconscious child upright, which works for children who can't swim as well.

For those who might be enjoying spring break at home and find themselves with nice weather where kids will be spending more time outside, possibly doing activities such as biking, there are safety guidelines to follow.

"Everyone should always wear bike helmets," said Smolcich. "Newer riders also can benefit from knee pads or elbow pads. We also want to ensure kids know the rules of the road to help prevent serious injury."

Smolcich reflected on the importance of spring break, especially for kids.

"Spring break is typically scheduled so students can get a bit of reprieve from hectic school responsibilities," she said. "Often, students do not receive enough credit when it comes to all of their various responsibilities — managing classes and homework, extracurricular activities, social lives, and more. Spring break can be great for mental health and can benefit a person's physical health as well, so we hope everyone can enjoy the time safely."

Mattoon Choice School to host public meeting

Shepherd's Watch looking for interest from community

Another step is on the horizon for the proposed choice school in Mattoon.

Members of Shepherd's Watch are hosting a public meeting to distribute information about the choice school on March 29 at 6 p.m. at the Shepherd's Watch Community Center, 507 Stone Ave., Mattoon.

"There will be an introduction for all of our school board members that we currently have," said Wade Reimer, president of Shepherd's Watch. "We will lay out a little outline where they will hear a little about Shepherd's Watch."

Reimer said that he and the other members of Shepherd's Watch will also revisit the process of how the organization came to introduce the idea of a choice school in Mattoon. The elementary school there went out of service after the Antigo School District centralized schooling and began busing in kids from surrounding villages. The Mattoon school is currently being used as a community center.

"The public will also hear our vision and our journey for moving forward, while focusing on that August 2023 school start-up date," said Reimer. "As we tell them about what our plans are, we are also looking for feedback from the public. We are looking to see what would be the best fit for the community."

He also noted that the meeting will cover specifics to the school as well.

"We will talk about where we are at in regards to the curriculum," said Reimer. "We will talk about who we are currently dealing with as far as people that are helping us along with the process. We will talk about potential funders and who is kind of interested in helping us fund our school."

Reimer noted that there will also be representatives from the Wisconsin Choice Schools program, who will explain the state's school voucher program.

"Nobody should leave this meeting not understanding that program and how that works and fits their families," said Reimer.

In terms of public input, Reimer

said that all feedback is welcome.

"When they come in, they will get a four-question survey to fill out that night," said Reimer. "They will leave that survey with us when they leave. We want to take some of the feedback from the area and surrounding areas and implement that into a larger survey that we will mail out."

By holding this meeting, Reimer said the organization hopes to gauge how much interest exists locally in the type of grassroots school system they are establishing.

"We are looking to get back to the basics," said Reimer, of the proposed curriculum. "Let's get families involved with their schools; let's get parents involved with their teachers."

He added that this meeting will help to identify people who want to get involved with the school as well.

"We are going to need community members on our various committees," said Reimer. He reiterated that the group is still making plans and needs to learn how many people in the area have an interest in their idea.

"We are still somewhat in our feasibility study here," said Reimer. "The big takeaway for us (at this meeting) is (seeing) how much interest there is in the community."

He also outlined what the public can expect to take away from this meeting.

"For the public, they are going to see another place close to home where they can send their children to an atmosphere of a choice Christian school," said Reimer.

He added that he and Shepherd's Watch are hoping for a large turnout.

"I am hoping that there is 100 to 200 people, if not more," said Reimer. "We will be set up for 200-plus

people."

Reimer summed up why the public should attend this meeting.

"They should come to hear about the opportunity for alternate education to our public school system," said Reimer. "They have an opportunity to see another school come into a small community who wants to hang on to a school."

As the date of the public meeting draws near, Reimer said that he and the other Shepherd's Watch members are extremely excited to see this plan taking shape.

"The hurdles keep getting knocked down here," said Reimer. "We are excited to contribute to the community and identify families who want to get their children in the school."

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ELECTION 2022 — WITTENBERG VILLAGE BOARD

In the April 5 general election, voters in the Village of Wittenberg will be deciding on three spots on the village board from among four candidates.

Incumbents Paul Yaeger, Renee Switalla and Barb Buchholz will be defending their spots. Devin Krueger is the challenger.

NEW Media contacted each candidate with questions regarding various issues that the board has recently discussed, to provide voters with the candidates' opinions on the issues.

What qualifies you to be a member of the Wittenberg Village Board?

Krueger: I was born and raised in Wittenberg and have lived here my whole life. I live in the village. I am just taking the jump. I want to get some new blood on the village board, with new ideas. This would be the first government board that I would be a part of. I have always wanted to do, but was never able to.

Buchholz: I have had this spot for seven or eight years. Before I ran for this position, I started going to the meetings regularly. There was an opening in the middle of the year, and I was appointed. I get involved in the board. One thing that I have is the parks. I keep an eye on things, like the parks and sewer and water. I talk to village employees to find out what is going on. I try to be involved.

Yaeger: I was born and raised in Wittenberg and have lived here my whole life. My parents lived about four houses down the street from where I live now. It has always been my home, and I have always been interested in making it a better place. I have served on the board since about 2002. I was the president for two terms. I have probably served for about 18 years.

Switalla: I have been on the board for 15 years, so I have some experience. I don't think that I am any more qualified than anyone else in the village. I think that I have a strong feeling of civic duty that I need to be helping my community. I would love to continue doing my best for the community.

Recently the Wittenberg Village Board has discussed and approved various sidewalk and street projects. Is regularly maintaining streets and sidewalks important to you?

Krueger: Regularly updating streets and sidewalks is important to me. I think that we could use a lot more work on our roads. I feel that we have let them go for far too long. It is time to catch up. I live over by

the school, so I see all of these little kids daily run to school and it is just something to worry about.

Buchholz: It is important to me. One of the things that we are doing is the sidewalks between Grand Avenue and state Highway 29 — a lot of kids walk around through there. Taco John's seems to be the place to go now. So we want to make sure there is a sidewalk there. I know that there is a sidewalk on the other side of the street, but kids are kids and they are not going to across the street to walk on the sidewalk. They are going to walk in the street. Getting sidewalks by the schools are important, too. In terms of the basketball court that we put up, some of the residents were not in favor of it. I know that the kids don't have a lot to do here, so there was no way I was letting anyone take that basketball court out.

Yaeger: Absolutely. As a village official, for residents and taxpayers, we can only really do a couple of things ultimately for the community. One of them is streets and sidewalks and parks. Those are two areas that we can improve for people looking to live here. It makes a difference for the safety of people using them. The streets and sidewalks by the schools are important, for one, safety and because they are so highly traveled. With people driving down these roads, if they hit a pot hole or a bump — it seems more important to keep those roads maintained due to the high travel, more so than a road that only has two residents living on it. Everyone that comes to school from all over, they drive those roads.

Switalla: It is important to me. I think it is important to our safety in the village. I think, as long as we continue to search for grants that either come from the state or the federal level that will help us pay for new roads, it will make our streets and sidewalks safer for our community. I think it is a great idea, as long as we can do it using as little taxpayer money as possible.

The Wittenberg Village Board recently increased their sewer rates by \$2 for 1,000 gallons used. Do you feel that that is necessary?

Krueger: I know that they did not raise pricing for the longest time and then the state got involved. I feel like our water is very high for the quality that we have. The water is another concern of mine. There should more time spent looking into it. I feel like our water is higher than it should or could be. When I would take a shower, it would smell like

an aquatic center — there is a lot of chlorine in it. It is just not good.

Buchholz: Absolutely. I don't think the \$2 was enough. I wanted to double it. Everything is going up. Our sewer system is old. The life expectancy of it was only 20 years when we put it in. It is 16 years old. We are trying to expand the life of it. To do that, we need to buy chemicals and enzymes to help eat up the crud in there. The water has to be safe before we put it back into the environment. We can't put dirty water out there. We have to make sure it is clean. We run tons of tests to make sure that happens. You are not going to get away from everything going up.

Yaeger: This was necessary. We have been way behind in this. Our rates have been lower than our neighboring communities. That is not really a basis to change, but the problem that we had is there are so many rules. We borrowed money against the rebuild of the sewer plant. There are things that we are required to do, like put money aside for depreciation. The sewer rates themselves are supposed to cover the maintenance of the plant, and they weren't doing that. We were falling short, so we were subsidizing sewer costs with taxpayer dollars, which is really not right to do. Anyone who uses the system should be paying for the system, more so than just tax dollars. The tax dollars are what should be going towards streets and parks.

Switalla: I was definitely against it. I am a taxpayer too. Right now, money is tight for everybody. I understand that. I hated doing it. On the other hand, we definitely needed it to keep our sewer and water plant up to speed as it needs to be. As everyone knows, costs are going up for everybody and unfortunately that is the same for the village to run our utilities. I voted against it. It is necessary, I understand that we needed to do that.

What is something that the village is doing well and how can that trend continue?

Krueger: I think that little things like planting more fish into the Wittenberg pond and keeping the edges of that clean is something the village is doing well. It was awesome to see all of the little kids and families down at the park fishing together. The village is growing; we are getting some businesses here. That is a good sign. We are attracting slowly — at least we aren't not attracting. I think with new members on the board, their

focus of getting things around here is helping, even if it is a little at a time.

Buchholz: The board does talk things out — we don't always agree, but we try not to bicker. You are not going to get away from it completely, but we try to compromise. We try to keep it simple. That is a good thing. I think things are running pretty well.

Yaeger: It seems like it took a while, but we have a really good group in terms of backgrounds with different professions and point of views. I think at this point, we can all sit in a room and get along fairly well. That doesn't mean that we don't always have to agree. It seems like to me, there is respect for each board member, regardless of everyone's opinion on an issue. In the last couple of years, I haven't seen it this good. I think we have a good time at meetings.

Switalla: I think what we are doing well is our focus on keeping the streets and sidewalks safe for our community and doing as many road and sidewalk projects as we can afford. Everyone on our board is just so wonderful with looking out for everyone in our community. We have also been working with our softball, baseball and little leagues — trying to get our fields up to speed. Last year, we had more kids come to our village to use those fields than any other community. We want to keep those up and keep attracting people to our village that way.

What is something that the village is not doing well and how can that be changed in the future?

Krueger: I feel that everything is hush-hush when it comes to meetings. I feel like they don't get the village involved enough. In today's world, everything is social media, whether it be Zoom or Facebook Live — why not do Facebook Lives when they have meetings and get people's questions that way? People have busy lives; they cannot make every meeting. They could send out pamphlets throughout the whole village and see what the top three concerns are in the village.

Buchholz: We have got areas where we can improve. There are still a lot of streets that need to be fixed. In order to improve what we have, we need to have better communication with village residents. We can't improve things if we don't know. We can't always guess what people are thinking. We try to talk to residents and get their opinion. It would be better if we could understand what improvements they

would like to see. It seems like we are working with the community well.

Yaeger: I believe we can improve on getting on some of the streets and sidewalks and maybe some parks. We can improve on getting some-

thing for our kids to do and keep them off of just wandering on the streets. I think we have been doing it as well as we can. Some of these things hinge on us getting grants. I think sometimes, we can be a little bit better at fixing something fully.

Some things we just kind of put a Band-Aid on. Kind of like the sewer rates. That sewer rate needed to be raised. Sometimes you have to make tough decisions.

Switalla: I would love to get more community involvement. I would

love to see more people at our board meetings and more involved in our day to day activities. I love everyone knowing what is going on with the board and not wondering what we are up to, what we are spending their money on or what our focus is.

Pandemic impacting people's mental health

The COVID-19 pandemic has significantly impacted our personal and professional lives. One area in which we now have increased awareness is mental health and how the pandemic might affect it moving forward.

A study published in the journal BMJ on Feb. 17 found that within a year of being infected with COVID-19, people were significantly more likely to be diagnosed with new psychiatric disorders than people who did not get infected.

"I would say everyone is experiencing adjustment disorder to a degree," said Rachael Frederick, Aspirus Health clinical therapist. "On top of that we've seen more anxiety, depression and even forms of PTSD (post-traumatic stress disorder) from those who have recovered or lost a loved one to COVID-19."

People have different ways of dealing with stress. In areas like Wisconsin and Michigan's Upper Peninsula, many turn to alcohol. Revenue from state excise taxes on alcohol during the year that ended June 30, 2021, increased almost 17% from the prior year.

Experts say that it is important to maintain a good balance and focus on productive habits such as eating a healthy diet, exercising and taking breaks from screen time.

"That is really pivotal in main-

taining overall health," Frederick said. "Anything done in excess can end up being problematic. Our bodies need balance."

Children and teens often mimic what they see from the adults around them. Parents can be more reassuring to others around them, especially children, if they are better prepared.

One key way to support your chil-

dren is to find methods to effectively communicate.

"Kids can convey their feelings and thoughts more accurately in a visual context rather than a verbal context," Frederick said. "Maybe you can write down a question and have your child write or draw their feelings."

It is important to learn self-care strategies and get the care you need

to help you cope so your stress doesn't lead to more harmful outcomes.

"One of the silver linings of the pandemic has been the increase of mental health awareness and resources," Frederick said. "I've had a lot more people just touching base with me since COVID to look into their options. As a counselor, I find that very fulfilling."

An explanation of Wittenberg-Birnamwood school taxes

Dear Wittenberg-Birnamwood District Residents,

For this month, I would like to explain our tax levy and mill rate data and how that works for the local taxpayer.

Tax Levy

School district property taxes include levies for general operations, debt service, capital expansion, and community services. Levy rates are shown in "mills" or property tax dollars levied per \$1,000 of equalized property value (which reflects market value rather than local as-

assessed value). For 2021-22, the mill rate for Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District is \$8.22 versus the statewide average for K-12 Districts of \$8.67. What does this mean for the local property owner? That on average, a property owner of a house valued at \$100,000 would have a school tax of \$822 for this year. This is based on equalized valuation as

compared to assessed valuation, so it is important to know that this varies between the 18 municipalities in our local district.

Mill Rate

Breakdown of Wittenberg-Birnamwood's 2021-22 Mill Rate of \$8.22:

General Fund – \$5.77
Referendum Debt Service – \$2.08
Aquatic Center (Community Services Fund) – \$0.37

The 2021-22 budgeted expenses for the Aquatic Center are \$320,000. The revenue sources used to pay

these expenses are property taxes (\$225,000 for 2021-22), membership fees, and an endowment principal transfer if necessary.

\$35 million sought for new high school

Menominee Indian would move middle school to Keshena to centralize students, teachers

The Menominee Indian School District held its first in-person forum March 17 to inform residents about the \$35 million referendum that would build a new high school in Keshena.

If voters approve the referendum April 5, then property owners could see an increase of \$2.99 per \$1,000 of equalized valuation over the next five years and then decrease to \$2.87 after that. That means the owner of a \$100,000 piece of property will see school taxes go up \$299.

The district plans to build the new school on a 40-acre wooded lot behind the Save-A-Lot grocery store. The new school would utilize Menominee preservation principles, with over 20 acres remaining as forest to provide outdoor learning. The school would also utilize geothermal and solar power to be energy efficient, and the school would be designed to include as much natural and healthy lighting as possible.

Kate Mikel, assistant principal for Menominee Indian High School, noted that the image included with promotional materials does not show forest land but assured people at the meeting that there will be plenty of trees on the property.

"It's hard to put a heavily wooded area on a computer model," Mikel said.

Mikel noted that the new school will also house the district office. Currently, the offices are located at Keshena Primary School, but with the school district continuing to increase its population, the office space will be needed for other things with the elementary school.

The district has 973 students this year. In the 2017-18 school year, the total student population was 887. That includes 88 students that come to the district from Shawano through the state's open enrollment system, although officials noted that more than 100 students living in the Menominee Indian school boundaries attend schools off the reservation. Mikel noted that the high school is seeing each graduating class increase by 20, noting that this year's freshman class has 110 students.

The land on which the district hopes to build the high school is

owned by the tribe, but the two entities have agreed to a land swap. In exchange, the tribe is getting the land and structure where Menominee Indian Middle School currently sits in Neopit, which could be used to house Menominee Tribal School currently in Neopit or for some other purpose.

"To keep that enrollment in our school buildings, we know we're going to have to need more space to keep the classroom sizes a good size for our students, as well as keeping the teacher-to-student ratio low," Mikel said. "Research shows us that with a teacher with less pupils, students are more likely to succeed."

According to Kyla Jones, the district's technology director, the existing middle school was built in 1980, and the current high school is even older. The problem with adding on to the middle school is that it's land-locked, so there is nowhere to put an expanded wing.

As a result of the land trade, the middle school would be moved to the existing high school facility. That school would also include fifth-grade students to give Keshena Primary some breathing room. Mikel noted that would ease district operations and cut out the costs of

transportation, sending food and other necessities to Neopit more than 15 minutes away.

"If we move the middle school to the current high schools, all three of the schools will be near the same campus," Mikel said. "Once that move takes place, then we're able to share a lot of resources that we're not able to share right now."

Mikel noted that the middle and high schools would be able to share teachers, and there could be expanded programs, especially with career and technical education. College and dual-enrollment classes could also be expanded, as the district has partnerships with the College of Menominee Nation, Northeast Wisconsin Technical College and Northcentral Technical College.

"A teacher might be able to teach a wood shop class at the high school in the morning and then be able to go to the middle school and offer that same class in the afternoon. Right now, we're not able to easily share teachers," Mikel said. "If our schools were all located in the same area, we would also be able to share substitutes. That would take a great burden off of all our buildings."

The district started looking at its

future needs in 2020 and first examined what it would cost to renovate the existing schools, according to Jones. The total cost was estimated to be \$29.5 million with high school renovations accounting for \$14.5 million, almost half.

Safety-wise, the new high school would more easily be able to go into lockdown mode, according to Mikel.

"That's one of our challenges right now with our older buildings," Mikel said. "They were not created when we thought about school safety, and there are a lot of improvements that need to be done to them to be safe for our students and staff."

For the most part, athletic facilities like football and baseball fields are not planned for the new high school, as the district plans to utilize the existing outdoor facilities. Jones noted there would be a new field house planned for basketball, wrestling and other indoor sports that could house up to 1,500 spectators.

"This would allow for more sporting events and more community events to happen within the school," Jones said.

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Pulaski man charged in Jan. 6 Capitol riot

Kasper allegedly sent messages on Facebook that day bragging about his involvement

A Pulaski man has been charged with assaulting police officers with tear gas and forcibly entering the U.S. Capitol during the Jan. 6, 2021, riot in the nation's capitol.

Riley D. Kasper, 23, was arrested in Ashland on March 16 and ap-

peared March 17 in federal court in Madison on felony charges including assaulting, resisting, or impeding officers with a deadly or dangerous weapon; engaging in violence in a restricted building; entering a restricted building with a deadly weapon; disorderly conduct involving a deadly weapon; and engaging in physical violence with a deadly weapon.

Convictions on some of the charges have a maximum statutory punishment of 20 years in prison.

U.S. Magistrate Stephen Crocker released Kasper on conditions Thursday including submitting to GPS monitoring. Kasper's next court appearance was set for March 22 in Washington, D.C.

Authorities gathered evidence against Kasper by obtaining a search warrant of his Facebook account on Nov. 12.

According to an affidavit by an FBI agent filed in court, Kasper sprayed a canister believed to contain pepper spray toward Capitol Police and Metropolitan Police Department officers outside the Capitol while members of Congress were inside certifying the electoral votes cast in the 2020 presidential election.

Capitol Police were trying to secure the Capitol on Jan. 6, 2021, while a large crowd gathered outside before pressing their way into the building.

Kasper used his Facebook account that same day to state, "I pepper sprayed 3 cops so bad they got undressed and went home," and "As you can see in that video, it was my group that busted the first gate and kept chasing the cops down and pushing them back at the capitol."

On Jan. 6, Kasper used social media to send a private message to "N.L." saying, "You charge that line and start spraying they start running for cover like you're coming at them with an ak" and "there is definitely something satisfying about pepper spraying cops in riot gear."

N.L. replied (edited for profanity), "That's nuts you were right there when they pushed that fence back lol," Kasper responded, "F—k yeah bro! I didn't (sic) drive 14 hours for nothing."

Other private messages Kasper sent on Jan. 6 included:

"We got inside the capital then they started shooting rubber bullets at peoples heads, even when me and another guy were carrying a barely conciliatory dude with blood dripping off his knees from his head to the ambulance they kept shooting at the back of the 3 of us."

"I basically organized my own little militia and we f—king took over Congress"

Kasper messaged S.B. on Jan. 7, "I woke up at 3am on Tuesday packed up and s—t, drove 18 hours and got to the train station at 5am yesterday and went straight to dressing and on the trump train.

"Then fought cops all day got pepper sprayed more times than I can count, maced, hit with batons, and f—king shot and then kept going until now my only sleep in all of that 48 hours of craziness was I parked at a truck stop from 2am to 4am just now."

Kasper sent other messages to S.B. about participating in a riot planned for President Joe Biden's Jan. 20 inauguration.

"Idk you just gotta come next time. It's pretty exciting. It's like the most real version of paintball ever. But with pepper spray, flash bangs, and tear gas grenades to throw back at those bitches. And a huge team of people who all got your back. And will beat the cops off of you if they ever get ahold of you."

The investigation of Kasper began on Jan. 18, 2021, with a tip to the FBI from a confidential source. The FBI obtained screenshots on a Jan. 7 Facebook post by Kasper of the Trump rally in Washington D.C.

A YouTube video shows a man in gray jacket, camouflage face-mask and head covering wearing a camouflage backpack at the Capitol. The man is spraying an orange-col-

ored substance from a can marketed as bear repellent.

A second YouTube video showed a person wearing the same clothing which the FBI checked against booking photos from Kasper's 2015 and 2019 arrests.

The confidential tipster confirmed that the person in the screenshots and YouTube videos was Kasper. The person knew Kasper from high school and were friends on Facebook.

A Kasper family member also confirmed that the person on the YouTube videos was Kasper. Also, financial records obtained during the investigation show fuel purchases on a route from Wisconsin and Washington, D.C. between Jan. 5 and Jan. 7, 2021.

Since the Jan. 6 riot, more than 775 persons have been arrested in nearly all 50 states, including more than 245 persons charged with assaulting or impeding law enforcement at the U.S. Capitol.

The investigation is ongoing, according to the U.S. Attorney's office for the District of Columbia. Anyone with tips can call 800-225-5324 or visit tips.fbi.gov.

Evers gives \$14M to Native financial groups

Governor helping tribes to bounce back, thrive after pandemic shut down businesses

Gov. Tony Evers touted a big comeback for Wisconsin's economy during a March 21 visit to Keshena, and he handed out almost \$14 million to Native American business organizations to back it up.

The checks are part of \$86 million that Evers has allocated statewide recently for diverse business recovery to community development financial institutions, chambers of commerce and other areas that were hardest hit by the coronavirus pandemic. He noted during his visit to the Menominee Youth Center that his administration has previously doled out \$680 million to help small businesses.

"Small businesses make up the lifeblood of any community," Evers said. "It employs half of the Wisconsin employees and bolsters local economies. Local businesses have shown incredible resilience and innovation and good old Wisconsin ingenuity over the last couple of years, but it is no secret

that the pandemic has had a disproportionate effect on many communities and small business owners."

The funds will help organizations to provide coaching, mentoring, technical services, internet support, online

marketing, social media training and other services to the mom-and-pop shops that have started recently or are making a comeback from the pandemic, Evers said. The funds going to the community development financial institutions will provide support to small businesses in the form of lending and providing access to capital credit, as well as credit counseling.

"All of the organizations, from chambers of commerce to the CDFIs, know exactly what the communities they serve need, what needs are the greatest, and they have the know-how to make critical investments that will be felt on main streets serving hundreds of communities across the state," Evers said.

The governor noted that the funding was made possible through the Biden Administration to "build a future for us that is equitable, just and works for everyone." He noted that Wisconsin ranks first in the United States for providing pandemic aid to businesses and second for pandemic aid going toward economic development.

“We’ve supported more than 100,000 small businesses since this pandemic began, 3,000 of those right on main streets filling vacant store fronts,” Evers said. “With these funds, we’re sending the message that right here in Wisconsin, on this reservation, if you have a great business idea and the willingness to work hard to make it happen, we’re here to support you.”

Kathy Blumenfeld, secretary-designee for the Wisconsin Department of Administration, said that the dollars being administered to help small businesses are making a difference statewide.

“When it comes to our main street businesses, our communities and our hard-working Wisconsin families, these investments are working,” Blumenfeld said. “We’re in the strongest financial position we’ve ever seen in the state of Wisconsin with a strong economy, strong workforce and that can-do Wisconsin attitude.”

Despite the positive outlook by Evers and his administration, there’s still much work to be done, according to Blumenfeld.

“I’ve seen firsthand the impact they make in investing in our community, businesses, job growth and economic development across the state,” Blumenfeld said. “CDFIs and other organizations provide a valuable network that support entrepreneurs to help grow and overcome obstacles that get in the way.”

Menominee Tribal Legislator Joey Awonohopay praised Evers for sup-

porting his tribe and the other ones that call Wisconsin home.

“The support to Native American communities throughout the state of Wisconsin has been unprecedented under his administration,” Awonohopay said.

Pamela Boivin, executive director for Nijjii Capital Partners, a Menominee organization and one of the institutions receiving funding from Evers, said the money will help to support tribes that are working to develop their communities and thrive.

“Native CDFIs are the boots on the ground organizations, and we recognize the tremendous impact on our tribal communities,” Boivin said. “Native CDFIs inject critical and affordable capital to expend economic development by building the financial sovereignty of Native individuals, families, Native-owned businesses and communities. This unprecedented opportunity will significantly build the capacity of our organizations and our work to expand access to loans, training and counseling to best serve enrolled-

member businesses and enterprises.”

Economic prosperity does serve as a single movement, Boivin said, and can only succeed when all businesses work together. She noted that the funds from the governor provide only the beginning for the work that will take place to build up tribal business sectors.

“It must work as an ecosystem where we leverage what we bring to the table to build up our communities,” she said. “These awards are evidence that, when we collaborate, we can maximize resources to provide an effective model for small business support to address the economic and racial inequalities ripped open by the

COVID-19 pandemic.”

Becky Albert-Breed, a Ho-Chunk tribal member and executive director for First Nations Community Financial, which received \$1.5 million from Evers, said her organization was proud to be part of the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation collaboration that has been helping communities recover from the pandemic, and she noted that tribes have particularly suffered in the last two years.

“We look to try to even the playing field,” Albert-Breed said. “We appreciate the funding support and look forward to being the conduit, now and into the future, to build our communities and build that capacity.”

Scoreboard proposal presented to board

Officials propose getting business sponsorships to pay for SCHS football field item

A proposal to replace the scoreboard at Shawano Community High School's football field comes with a price tag of around \$235,000, but officials are looking at business sponsorships to swallow up the costs so no tax levy dollars need to be used.

The proposal was presented March 16 to the Shawano School Board. The board had previously approved initiating fundraising efforts for the scoreboard and several other items, with officials noting that the existing scoreboard is malfunctioning and cannot be fixed.

The school would get the new scoreboard from Daktronics, based in Brookings, South Dakota, as the company has also provided the other scoreboards the district has, according to Joel Wondra, SCHS athletics director. The board would be larger than the existing scoreboard on the field, as it would also incorporate a video display on top and a decorative truss with the district's logo and hawk mascot.

The board itself and installation will cost about \$209,000, and then the remainder comes from prepping the site for installation, according to Wondra. Besides the video display,

the board can be programmed to list the specific opponent that Shawano is playing instead of just saying "Home" and "Visitor." Wondra noted that the district could opt for a cheaper board that did not have the digital programming.

"You can have a choice on the color of the bulbs — they're all LED bulbs," Wondra said.

The scoreboard would be moved to a different location near the field that allows for easy spectator viewing, as Wondra pointed out that it can be hard for many sitting on the bleachers or in the press box to see what the score is or how much time is remaining on the existing scoreboard because it is adjacent to the parking lot.

"You literally have to lean out from the person seated to your left so that you can actually see the board," Wondra said. "If you're in the press box, you have to stick your head out of the window to see the scoreboard."

Daktronics provided school officials with a potential model for funding the scoreboard, according to Wondra. With advertising spots on the board and through the video displays, it is estimated that the board's cost could be paid off within five years, he said.

Wondra said there are slots for four anchor sponsors that would each be asked to contribute \$6,000 annually for five years, four founding sponsor slots that could each bring in \$3,500 per year for the same time period, and then 12 premiere sponsors via the video board that could each add \$750 annually.

"We can customize this however we want," Wondra said. "In year six and beyond, any revenue that is generated would be at the discretion and the use of the district."

Not all of the board members seemed optimistic that the scoreboard could be paid through sponsorships. Board member Chris Gull, who has sponsored scoreboards in the past for both Shawano and Bon-duel, commented that some of the prices are steep.

"I weigh out two different things — what's the good it's going to do for the community and then how many views is it going to get?" Gull said. "I look at that cost, and it seems kind of expensive for the number of views that you're going to get."

Board member Mart Grams said that the money that could be generated could go toward other things. He noted that \$250,000 in revenue could help the district get four or

five teachers, and that the scoreboard should not be a priority until the board fixes "its own house."

"Yes, I understand the business these days, but this is pretty prostitutional to put ads up for a football game," Grams said. "When did education become buyable? I find that pretty distasteful. Education should be education. Do we start selling books with sponsors on the back next? We've bought these five computers from Luigi's."

Superintendent Randi Anderson pointed out that the soonest the scoreboard could go in would be 2023, assuming the order goes in around May. She also said the scoreboard would not happen if there were not enough sponsors willing to pay the costs.

"We're going to hit the fundraising really hard in April," Anderson said. "We've got a person identified that will be partnering with Daktronics (to find sponsors)."

Board member Jamie Beyer was in favor of using naming rights as an additional resource to pay for the scoreboard.

"I think you see that at a lot of area schools being done," Beyer said. "It's not a new idea, but it's smart."

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Verbenas are excellent for fillers and trailing plants in containers and hanging baskets.

This year, the National Garden Bureau has chosen verbena as its annual plant of the year. And what a great choice it is! For those who grow verbena — either on its own or as a trailing or centerpiece plant in patio and porch pots or hanging baskets — verbena is a bright and colorful, cheerful summer bloom.

One great thing about verbena is that it blooms in just about every color of the rainbow. There are verbenas that are near black and there are verbenas that are pure white — plus just about every color in between. There are also verbenas that are bi-colored, meaning their bloom contains two different colors.

While everyone is familiar with the classic trailing verbena that is often incorporated into hanging baskets and containers, there is also tall verbena to consider. Quite different in form and in flower, tall verbena grows upright, with narrow, wiry stems and pom-pom like clusters of purple and lavender blooms at the tip. This gives an amazing effect, especially when planted in large masses.

Tall verbena may grow 3 to 5 feet high. Its unusual growth form and tall, statuesque presence make it a must-have annual in the garden. As an added benefit, hummingbirds adore this plant, as do monarch butterflies.

Speaking of hummingbirds and monarchs, both of these, as well as many other butterfly species, are drawn to the colorful, vibrant blooms of trailing verbena. This makes it a favorite of gardeners to grow and plant specifically to attract pollinators and hummingbirds to their gardens.

Verbena does not need to be solely regulated to containers and hanging baskets. Plant it directly in the ground for a beautiful, mounding, sprawling mass of color all season long. Mix-and-match various colors, either complementing or contrasting, for a stunning display.

Whatever your color theme, there is a verbena for you. Pure white is one of my favorites, since it glows in the garden, day and night, as well as several that bloom in shades of salmon and apricot — hard to find colors in annual blooms.

Several new series of bi-colored verbenas are even more stunning. Many of these beauties bloom in rich, vibrant colors like scarlet, purple, pink and blue with a bright white center. Others bloom in softer pastel shades. This creates an amazing effect when masses of blooms trail over the side of a hanging basket or outdoor container.

While verbena does not require a lot of care, it should be placed in full sun and may need periodic deadheading of spent blooms. Simply pinch off flower heads when they begin to dry to encourage new flower clusters to appear within just a few weeks.

Because of its beautiful, trailing or cascading habit, bold and beautiful coloration, and habit of attracting hummingbirds and butterflies, verbena earns its place as the annual plant of the year.

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Spring weather also brings allergy season

After a long, cold Wisconsin winter, nothing feels better than warmer weather.

The first signs of spring can be an exciting time to make plans to enjoy the outdoors. Unfortunately, for the millions of people who suffer from seasonal allergies, the sneezing, runny nose, and itchy, watery eyes, among many other symptoms, might take away some of the enjoyment of changing seasons.

"After a long winter we really look forward to those warmer days, more sun and seeing green grass instead of snow," said Dr. Bentley Thomason, who practices family medicine at ThedaCare Physicians-Shawano. "But when someone has allergies, the sunshine can come with a cost. If people prepare and have a plan to manage allergies, most of us can still enjoy the season."

In the spring, plants begin to bloom and they produce pollen. Pollen can cause allergy symptoms to flare if someone is allergic to this

type of pollen. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, nearly 20 million American adults and more than 6 million children experience seasonal allergic rhinitis, commonly known as seasonal allergies or hay fever.

For those allergic to pollen, the immune system will react and can cause sneezing, runny nose, congestion, watery eyes and itchiness in nose, eyes and/or mouth.

According to the American College of Allergy, Asthma and Immunology, allergies tend to run in families, so genetics can play a role in whether a person has spring allergies or not. The environment someone grows up in matters as well. Plants that produce higher amounts

ThedaCare offers these suggestions about ways to help limit your exposure to allergy causes:

- Keep windows closed.
- Use central air conditioning and change the filter often.
- Remove your shoes before entering your home.
- Take a shower and shampoo your hair before bed.
- Change and wash your clothes after being outdoors.
- Dry laundry in a clothes dryer or on an indoor rack, not on an outdoor line.
- Clean pollen off pets with a towel before they come into your home.
- Wash bedding in hot, soapy water once a week.
- Use a nasal rinse to flush out inhaled pollen out of your nose.

of pollen that can be a contributing factor.

For many people, avoiding allergens and taking over-the-counter medications, such as an antihistamine, is enough to ease the symptoms. Thomason noted that nasal treatments, such as saline and intranasal steroids, have been shown to work quite well. If your seasonal allergies are still bothersome, there are some other treatments to discuss with a doctor or provider.

Thomason said that when beginning treatment for allergies, a conver-

sation with a primary care provider to talk about more specific treatment options that can be helpful.

"Even implementing some of these tips can be helpful in controlling the amount of pollen that gets into your home," Thomason said. "Another recommendation I have would be to know the pollen count numbers, and use that to decide which days to spend more time outside. With a bit of planning, we can minimize our allergies and enjoy all of the wonderful things springtime in Wisconsin can offer."

ThedaCare physician provides tips for better sleep

A third of American adults say they're not getting the recommended number of sleep hours each night, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Generally, healthy adults need a minimum seven to nine hours per night up to age 65. Older adults benefit from at least seven to eight hours of sleep per night.

"When we don't get enough sleep, we can experience a number of health effects," said Dr. Cynthia Fisher, family medicine physician at ThedaCare Physicians-Oshkosh. "We may feel tired or fatigued, and we also can become more forgetful, more irritable, have difficulty concentrating or feel less motivated."

In the long term, lack of proper sleep can contribute to serious health problems, including obesity, lowered immunity, heart problems, diabetes, depression and anxiety, Fisher said.

"The lack of sleep can also affect our hunger hormones and therefore what we choose to eat, causing us to reach for more carbs that contribute to weight gain," she said. "And that weight gain can lead to these serious illnesses."

Proper sleep is important be-

cause it gives minds and bodies time to recharge and recover from the day. Brains have a chance to sort information during rapid-eye movement sleep, helping store long-term memories and allowing the body to enter a restorative process. The benefits of sleep include repairing tissue and muscle, improving memory function and the immune system, improving emotional processing and exercise performance, and decreasing stress. Better sleep also can help improve a person's sex drive and fertility.

While disorders such as insomnia, sleep apnea, narcolepsy, restless legs syndrome and other issues cause about 70 million people a year to experience trouble sleeping, many people are not getting enough sleep because of lifestyle factors, according to Fisher.

"As a whole, we're spending too much time in front of screens," she said. "We're using our phones, tablets and computers too late into the

evening, which activates our brains. Electronic devices also emit 'blue light,' which interferes with the sleep hormone melatonin."

Fisher noted that children need more sleep than adults, with babies needing the most sleep.

"Children can experience the same health problems as adults when they're not getting enough sleep," Fisher said. "Irritability or a lack of concentration can be early indicators that your children are not getting the recommended number of hours."

Limiting screen time and modeling good sleep behavior can help your children establish good habits early on, she said. Fisher added that it's also important to establish good bedtime routines.

"Kids should start to wind down about an hour before their bedtime," she said. "For younger children, a consistent routine helps them understand it's time for bed. That might include a bath or shower, brushing teeth and cuddling/reading with a parent."

All children, regardless of age, should be off their electronic devices for 30-60 minutes before bedtime.

FYI

Some tips for getting better sleep include:

- Turning off electronic devices at least an hour before bed.
- Participating in activities that can relax you, such as reading, folding laundry or taking a warm bath.
- Keeping a consistent bedtime each night. If you're in the habit of staying up late, move back your bedtime in small increments, such as 15 or 20 minutes, to a time that will allow you to get at least 7 hours of consistent sleep.
- Changing your device settings in the evening. Most electronic devices allow you to automatically change the screen lighting to a "night" mode, altering the light emitted from the screen to a softer color.

For children, the CDC provides these sleep recommendations:

- 14-17 hours for infants up to age 3 months
- 12-16 hours for babies up to 1 year old
- 11-14 hours for toddlers to age 2
- 10-13 hours up to age 5
- 9-12 hours up to age 12
- 8-10 hours per night for teens to age 18

"Our health and wellness will benefit if we make good sleep a priority," said Fisher. "As we start a new year, I hope families can support each other through positive sleep habits, helping encourage well-being for the whole person."

County's 387th barn quilt is running free

Shawano County's 387th barn quilt, called "Running Free," is on display at the home of Tim and Stacy Zimdars at N3899 Comet Road, Tigerton.

The quilt was a gift to the Zimdars from Stacy's cousin, Jay Selle, who lives near Wittenberg with his wife, Trisha.

"I've wanted a barn quilt for a long time," Stacy Zimdars said, "and I am so thankful that Jay gave us such a wonderful gift. We just love it."

Her great-grandparents, Albert and Elise Spitzer, purchased the farm from Henry Leitzke in 1904. The land was cleared for farming with horse and manpower working together. The original log barn was replaced in 1924 with the existing barn, which still has two cement horse stalls.

In 1938, on land they named Springbrook Valley Farm, a two-room log house was built. The Spitzers' son Elmer and his family joined the farming operation. In 1943, Elmer and his wife, Lillian, purchased the farm and moved to the "big" house with their four daughters. Later, they had a fifth daughter.

The farm was eventually passed down to the four living daughters — Darlene (Jay Selle's mom), Marilyn (Stacy's mom), Kathy and Sharon. Their sister, Charmagne, is deceased.

In 2015, the buildings and 10 acres were sold to Stacy Zimdars. She and her husband are in the process of restoring the buildings, which include the woodshed/cellar and the house. The roof on the original barn has already been replaced.

The couple raises some chickens and several head of miniature Hereford beef cattle. They also have a miniature donkey and plan to get some goats as well.

Stacy's parents, Marilyn and Howard Sivertson, live just a quarter-mile down the road from Tim and Stacy Zimdars. In their home, they display a photo of the farm taken in the 1950s which has the following quote from John Howard Payne: "The soil that gave us birth, we cling to it because it is our first love; we cling to it because it will be our last love."

Zimdars and her family are proud that the buildings and the land remain in the Spitzer family after 118 years, and it all began with teamwork between horses and man.

The quilt was painted by the Shawano County barn quilt committee and was put on display by LeRoy and Keenan Raddant, both of whom work for Raddant Electric in Shawano. The quilt was put up on Feb. 11, the day before Stacy's dad Howard Sivertson celebrated his 80th birthday.

Myths surrounding multiple sclerosis debunked

Statistics indicate that, each week, more than 200 people are diagnosed with multiple sclerosis — approximately one person every hour of the day, according to the Multiple Sclerosis Foundation.

Yet, unless someone is personally affected, people may know little about it or hold common misconceptions about the illness.

March is National Multiple Sclerosis Awareness Month. MS is a disease of the central nervous system. The substance that protects and insulates nerve fibers, called myelin, helps messages travel quickly and smoothly from the brain to the rest of the body. In MS, the immune system which normally fights off infection, attacks the myelin. With-

out myelin, the brain has a hard time communicating or sending electrical impulses out to the rest of the body. This can result in an array of symptoms and make the disease hard to diagnose.

MS symptoms vary widely and include blurred vision, weak limbs, tingling sensations, unsteadiness, coordination trouble and fatigue. For some people, MS is characterized by periods of relapse and remission while, for others, it has a progressive pattern. No one knows for sure what causes MS, but factors such as immune system, genetics, environment and infection can play a part. For everyone with MS, life can be pretty unpredictable.

"For those living with the condi-

tion, education is the key to a better quality of life. Learning about available treatments, symptom management, and coping techniques gives those with MS the tools to live at their best," said Dr. Naomi Arenson, Aspirus neurologist.

Some people with MS don't show visible symptoms, so there can be falsehoods surrounding people with MS and the illness itself. Here are five myths and truths about MS, provided by the MS International Federation:

- "There's no cure for MS, so scientists clearly aren't making much progress." Research has brought many life-changing treatments that can control or slow down MS and help manage symptoms for lots of people.

- "People with MS can't work." Many people, especially those with less severe MS, can continue to work. Support from employers and colleagues helps make it easier.

- "MS is the same for everyone." Everyone's MS is unique. People may experience different symptoms at different times and the impact of these symptoms can vary.

- "A person with MS shouldn't exercise." Regular, moderate exercise can help with many MS symptoms and benefit overall health and well-being.

- "Everyone with MS will end up in a wheelchair." Most people with MS don't need to use a wheelchair on a regular basis especially with early diagnosis and treatment.

Leeway on removing snow not acceptable

To the editor:

The removal of snow from city sidewalks continues to be a concern as referenced in the article "Mowing, snow removal penalties could go up," written by Lee Pulaski, city editor, published in the Shawano Leader on Feb. 18.

Many years ago, 1996, I suggested that the word "entire," before "sidewalk," be added to the snow removal ordinance so there would be no question about what property owners and/or residents are responsible for. "5.05 Snow and ice removal. (1) The

owner or lessee of every lot or parcel of land in the city in front of or abutting upon a sidewalk shall clear the entire sidewalk of snow within 24 hours after any given snowfall and shall cause the entire sidewalk to be kept clear of snow and ice."

Now, the recommendation by Eddie Sheppard, city administrator, is that snow does not need to be removed if it's 2 inches or less. This would defeat the purpose of the ordinance. Repeated light snowfalls, if not removed, pack down, thaw and can refreeze, becoming ice. Subsequent snowfalls could continue to build up making it almost impossible to be removed. This is the issue you're trying to prevent by encourag-

ing people not to shovel.

The city plows have nothing to do with the removal of snow from city sidewalks. Most streets are at least 30 feet or more wide. When plowed, several passes are necessary to maintain this width. City sidewalks are 5 feet wide to facilitate people walking, strollers, walkers, wheelchairs, pets, etc., and need the entire width clear.

By state municipal law, 66.0907 sidewalks and 66.0909, the city may impose a penalty for neglect of snow and ice removal. It's the responsibility of the public works department to see that this is done by them or another service. "The amount charged to each lot or parcel of land shall be

entered by the clerk in the tax roll as a special tax against the lot or parcel of land and collected like other taxes upon real estate."

Property owners or residents should be given one warning, a copy of the ordinance and penalty rates, whatever the costs will be. These should be sufficient. No exceptions.

People want to and need to get outside, weather permitting, and with warmer temperatures on the way, sidewalks should safely facilitate this purpose.

These ordinances, as written, just need to be enforced. If the city needs to hire providers, that's what they have to do.

Lee Pulaski, vice president, called the Feb. 17 meeting of the Shawano Area Writers to order in the Elsie Engel Room at the Shawano Public Library. Members attending were Lee Pulaski, Wendy Goerl, Irma Brunner, Marilyn Kroenke, John Mutter, Barb King, Twilla Beyer, Nick Wudtke, Trudy Bosman, Tom Thorstenson and Lana Allen.

The minutes were approved. John Mutter presented the treasurer's report, which was approved.

Mutter gave an update on the Student Writing Contest. A few entries have come in. There was a question about what was expected in nonfiction essays. Mutter has developed a sheet for students with examples of fiction and nonfiction writing. It will be posted on the Shawano Area Writers website.

A short discussion was held about whether to contribute to Bridge the Gap. It was decided we wouldn't because it did not strictly apply to writing.

Questions were brought up about writing and ideas given by all members.

Q: How does someone start writing?

A: Some writers make an outline and write a summary of each chapter.

Other writers basically know how the story will start, the climax and the

ending. Once they start writing the story, it naturally fills in by what you want to come next.

Still others start in the middle or the end and work to the beginning.

To start writing, start with an idea you are interested in and sit down and write your thoughts on the topic. Write until you feel you have expressed yourself. Don't worry about spelling, punctuation, etc., because that is editing. Right now, you just want to get your thoughts down. When you are finished, walk away. Read the entire piece from top to bottom the next day. Now you edit. Straighten out all the mistakes and you may want to describe something in more detail or add more ideas, or sometimes start over.

Q: What do you write?

A: Write what you know. Write what you're interested in. When you feel more comfortable with the writing procedure, then let your imagination go wild.

Some writers like to use prompts or take a writing course on the web, such as Great Courses.

Q: Do you stick with one genre?

A: Some writers do because they might be good in one area like mystery, fantasy or romance. Others try different genres to find what they feel most comfortable writing.

Q: How do you know how long a chapter should be? Some chap-

ters are 26 pages long, some three.

A: A chapter is a scene. The chapter ends when you have told what you wanted to tell in that scene.

Irma Brunner started the readings with her story, "The Black Iris," which she plans on sending to Green Prints, a magazine that focuses on the joys of gardening, not just what to plant.

Marilyn Kroenke shared a haiku about flowers and two limericks. One entitled "The Recipe" and the other "Talented Lady." She also read a short piece entitled "NIMBY," where people want to help their community until the rehab building, or the lower income housing, is near their property and then they say "Not In My Back Yard."

Trudy Bosman wrote a poem entitled "Lost and Found." A diamond came out of her wedding set, and the family looked everywhere. A lot to absorb in latest Ray Elkins thriller

I've really enjoyed Aaron Standers' series of books featuring Sheriff Ray Elkins, but I admit that "The Center Cannot Hold" was a challenge.

Cedar County, Michigan, sits on the shores of Lake Michigan. Ray has been in a blue mood ever since his lady love, Hanna, went to California to check out a potential job. His unwillingness to share his feelings is making the situation worse. His right hand, Detective Sue Lawrence, keeps urging him to commit, but he simply can't.

Then someone burns down the abandoned house that once belonged to the corrupt and cruel former sheriff, Orville Hentzler. Hentzler and his deputies used coercion, extreme force to rule the county for many years. Ray soon learns that one particular target was a "hippie" commune just outside of town.

The property belonged to young Marian Patozak with Rob Habbers acting as de facto leader and spokesperson. Residents kept a low profile and made money by selling produce, crafts and artwork, but Hentzler's goon found excuses to raid the place.

After Rob was arrested and disappeared and Marian left, the entire compound burned to the ground. Everyone "knew" it was Hentzler's bunch, but no one dared speak up.

Later that day they are called to the cemetery. Hentzler's gravestone has been vandalized. Is someone seeking revenge on Hentzler now?

Ray has only begun digging into Hentzler's history when they are called to Fox Cove. The lakeside area is mostly summer cottages, except

but the Petersons refuse to speculate on who her guest might have been.

Peeling back 40-year-old layers of information and speculation reveals a tenuous connection between the old commune, Orville Hentzler and Becca Sterling. At one time, local artist Stu Baker lived and worked at the commune. When questioned by Ray, he explains that Rob treated the commune like Sherwood Forest. The owner was Maid Marian, and his constant companion was a boy he called Little John. Things became shaky after Rob started a relationship with a local girl. Then the deputies came in, took Rob and everyone slowly drifted away.

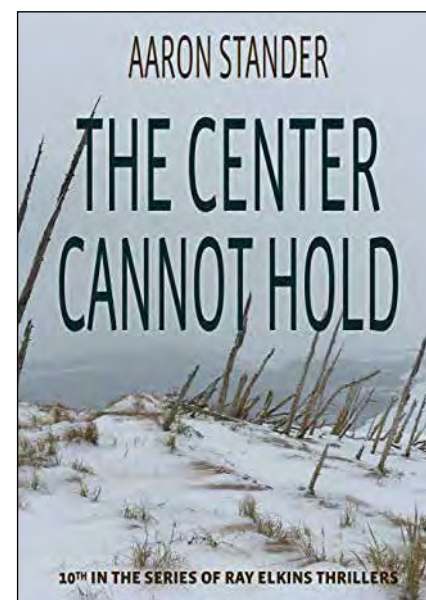
By following every thread, they learn that the DNA belongs to a local doctor. He finally admits to the rela-

tionship but swears he wouldn't hurt Becca. Later the doctor's wife admits that she went to Becca's house but turned back when she found a truck in the driveway. Now they must find the owner of that truck.

While they painstakingly sift through the information, they are forced to deal with the insidious problem of meth in the community. That problem drives Ray deeper into depression.

The cases suddenly come together when the Justice Center comes under attack. Someone in an old van is spraying the buildings with automatic rifle fire. Sue rams the van. As she approaches the van, she sees Ray go down. Later she learns that Ray has survive a chest wound, the female assailant is Marian Patozak, and the male is "Little John." Both live in a mental neverland and thought they were attacking Hentzler and his men.

As the story ends, Hanna takes Ray somewhere warm to recuperate and Sue is left to unravel all the facts behind this case while handling the county's policing needs.

Educational Information

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally- occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which shall provide the same protection for public health.

Through these initiatives, DFW directors have the opportunity to represent Wisconsin dairy producers and products as well as be involved in activities that inform consumers about the dairy

industry and its economic impact.

Eligible nominees must be an active dairy producer who sells milk into commercial channels and lives in Shawano or Waupaca counties. Producers must sign, notarize, and postmark completed nomination forms by March 31 and include signatures from at least five eligible producers other than the nominee.

Nitrate in drinkingwater at levels above 10ppm is a health risk for infants of less than 6 months of age. High nitrate levels in drinking water can cause blue baby syndrome. Nitrate levels may rise quickly for short periods of time because of rain fall or agricultural activity. If you are caring for an infant you should ask advice from your health care provider. Females who are or may become pregnant should not consume water with nitrate concentrations that exceed 10ppm. There is some evidence of an association between exposure to high nitrate levels in drinking water during the first weeks of pregnancy and certain birth defects. The Wisconsin Department of Health Services recommends people of all ages avoid long-term consumption of water that has nitrate level greater than 10 milligrams per liter (mg/L).

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Wittenberg Waterworks is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. 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Monitor kids' stomach problems

One common illness experienced in children nearly every year is viral gastroenteritis, otherwise known as the stomach flu.

Dr. Sneha Subbarayan, a pediatrician at ThedaCare Physicians Pediatrics-Neenah, said she sees children experience a variety of different symptoms. Many of them are normal and should not cause any alarm. She also noted that some specific symptoms should get a little more attention.

"It's really important when children are showing symptoms of the stomach flu that parents are watching for dehydration," said Subbarayan. "Some of the normal symptoms to expect with stomach flu are cramping, nausea or vomiting, watery diarrhea and sometimes fever. Keeping your child hydrated and getting plenty of rest will help them through it."

Children can easily become dehydrated after just a few hours of vomiting and diarrhea, said Subbarayan. One way to know if a child is dehydrated is by monitoring how much they're using the bathroom or if he or she has fewer wet diapers.

"The best way to improve hydration without upsetting the stomach is by taking a sip or two of water or something like Pedialyte every 5-10 minutes," said Subbarayan. "This can help get electrolytes back into the body. We ask that caregivers monitor excess sugar in drinks because that can actually worsen diarrhea symptoms in some cases."

If a child's abdominal pain lasts for more than a few days, parents should make an appointment with their child's provider.

Another common reason for tummy trouble is indigestion. One way to help a child find comfort if they are dealing with indigestion is to prepare smaller meals. Indigestion will often go away on its own and is not serious, according to Subbarayan.

Another possibility is constipation.

Children experiencing constipation may complain of stomach pain, bloating or discomfort. Subbarayan said parents should encourage children to drink plenty of water.

It's important to talk with primary care providers, she said, if children don't want to eat, are losing weight, have bloody stools or are having repeated symptoms of constipation.

Subbarayan said that more serious conditions could be linked to appendicitis or intestinal obstruction. Appendicitis is an inflammation of the appendix and can be very painful.

"This can cause sudden pain around the navel and then moves to the lower right abdomen," she said. "The pain worsens if children cough, walk or make quick movements."

Appendicitis is an emergency, and children should get immediate medical attention. The pain from appendicitis typically increases and becomes severe.

Intestinal obstruction is when there is a blockage that prevents food or liquid from passing through children's small intestine or colon.

"This can be caused by scar tissue or if they swallow something," said Subbarayan. "Symptoms for intestinal obstruction includes severe abdominal pain around the navel."

Intestinal obstruction is another example of an emergency, and there should be immediate medical attention.

"Parents never like to see their children feeling bad because of a tummy ache," said Subbarayan. "In most cases, we ask families monitor symptoms and do what they can to make little ones comfortable until the tummy troubles pass. Keeping them hydrated and some extra hugs can be great remedies."

Packers trade Adams to Raiders

Green Bay gets draft picks in return

The Green Bay Packers have traded wide receiver Davante Adams to the Las Vegas Raiders for a first-round pick (No. 22 overall) and a second-round pick (No. 53 overall) in the 2022 NFL Draft.

General Manager Brian Gutekunst announced the transaction March 18. “It’s never easy moving on from a player and person the caliber of Davante Adams. We have so much respect for all that Davante gave on and off the field during his eight seasons in Green Bay as he was integral to all that we’ve accomplished,” said Gutekunst. “He is undoubtedly one of the greatest players in the storied history of the Packers, and we look forward to him being enshrined into the Packers Hall of Fame one day. We wish nothing but the best for Davante, his wife Devanne and the rest of their family moving forward.”

Adams, originally a second-round pick by the Packers (No. 53 overall) in the 2014 NFL Draft, played in 116 games with 109 starts in eight seasons (2014-21) with Green Bay. In 2021, he set new single-season team records for receptions (123) and receiving yards (1,553) and became the first player in team history with three 100-catch sea-

sons (2018, 2020-21). Adams is the only player in league history with 115-plus catches, 1,350-plus receiving yards and 11-plus receiving TDs in back-to-back seasons (2020-21). Despite missing a game last season, Adams finished No. 3 in the league in receiving yards, No. 2 in receptions and No. 5 in receiving TDs (11). He has 31 career 100-yard receiving games,

No. 2 in team history behind only WR James Lofton (32). Adams, who recorded seven 100-yard receiving games in 2020, set a single-season career high with eight 100-yard receiving games in 2021, becoming the first player in team history to have seven-plus 100-yard games twice in his career. Adams was named first-team All-

Pro by The Associated Press in 2021 as one of five unanimous first-team selections. He became the first Green Bay receiver to be selected All-Pro in back-to-back seasons since Sterling Sharpe in 1992-93. Adams also earned his fifth straight selection to the Pro Bowl last season (2017-21), making him only the second Packers WR to make five-plus consecutive Pro Bowls (Lofton, six in a row from 1980-85). Adams’ five career selections are tied with Sharpe for the second most by a WR in franchise history, trailing only Lofton (seven). Adams ranks in the top five in franchise history in receptions (No. 2 with 743), receiving TDs (No. 2 with 73) and receiving yards (No. 4 with 8,121). He joined WRs Marvin Harrison and Larry Fitzgerald as the only players in NFL history with 650-plus catches, 8,000-plus receiving yards and 70-plus receiving TDs in their first eight seasons in the NFL.

Adams has eight career games with 10-plus catches, 100-plus receiving yards and multiple TD catches, the most in NFL history. He is tied with WR Antonio Brown for the most career games with 10-plus receptions/100-plus receiving yards/receiving TD with 12. Adams and quarterback Aaron Rodgers connected for 68 TDs, passing Rodgers and WR Jordy Nelson (65) in 2021 for the most productive TD combo in franchise history.

Lena High School senior Max Beyer was tabbed the Most Outstanding Player in the Marinette & Oconto Conference after his big boys basketball season this winter.

Gillett's Aydin Franti and Ben Matczak and Lena's Logan Shallow all made the second team, while Gillett's Jesse DeBauch and Austin Vande Corput and Suring's Jeremy Hensel and Ethan Lally were honorable mentions.

Beyer led the conference in scoring with 23.4 points per game in 15 contests. He also was the top rebounder with 7.2 boards a game.

Beyer shot about 52% from the floor, 82% from the free-throw line and 46% from behind the 3-point line.

"It's very special to know that all the hard work paid off," said Beyer of earning the conference's top honor.

Shallow earned a spot on the second team after putting up averages of 12.8 points, 5.2 rebounds, 3.2 assists and 2.9 steals. He led the team in assists and steals.

"It meant a lot to make all-conference as a senior," said Shallow. "I've worked for it for all of my high school career and to make it really meant a lot. I couldn't have done it without my teammates. How well they played this year definitely helped me get it. It was a really fun year with the guys and it is definitely an honor to be an all-conference member!"

Matczak averaged 9.5 points, 3.7 rebounds, 2.4 assists and 1.4 steals in 16 conference games.

The sophomore led the team with 30 3-point makes in M&O action, and shot about 45% from the floor.

"Making all-conference second team this year just shows that we are all improving from year to year," said Matczak. "My freshmen year, I just got honorable mention, so to one up that this year was a huge accomplishment. I feel that as the years progress we'll only get stronger and more determined. This

will only motivate me more to get first team all-conference next year, and by my senior year I'll be MVP."

Seniors Ryan Frewerd and Ashton Kapla joined sophomore Conner Nooyen on the all-conference second team.

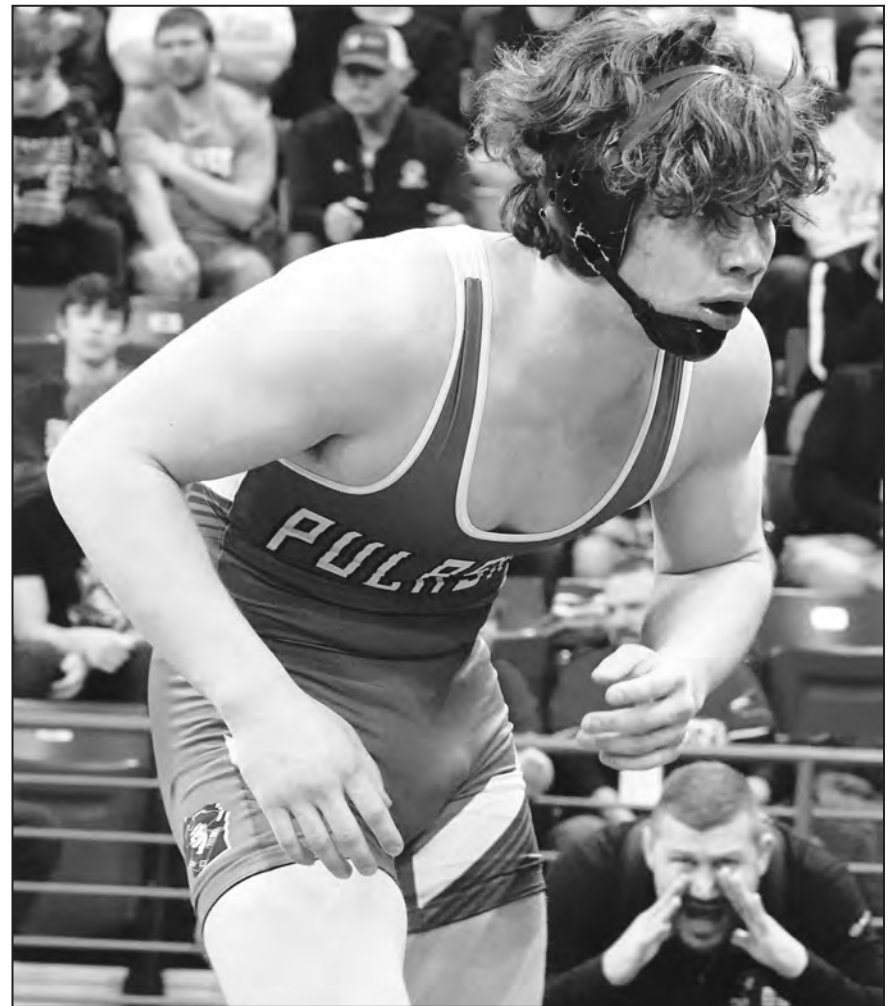
Frewerd posted a 6-1 mark in conference duals. He qualified for sectionals and had a 23-11 record for the winter.

Councils work with local DNR staff to schedule meetings, provide community outreach and an opportunity for public input, review population data and deer impacts on forests and agriculture, develop recommendations on county population objectives and create annual antlerless harvest quotas.

In early May, each CDAC will make recommendations to the department for the 2022 season based on deer herd metrics, county deer population goals and public feedback. This summer, the DNR will bring its recommendations for the

Olivier-Maxence Prosper led Marquette with 16 points, while Darryl Morsell had 11. No other player had over six points.

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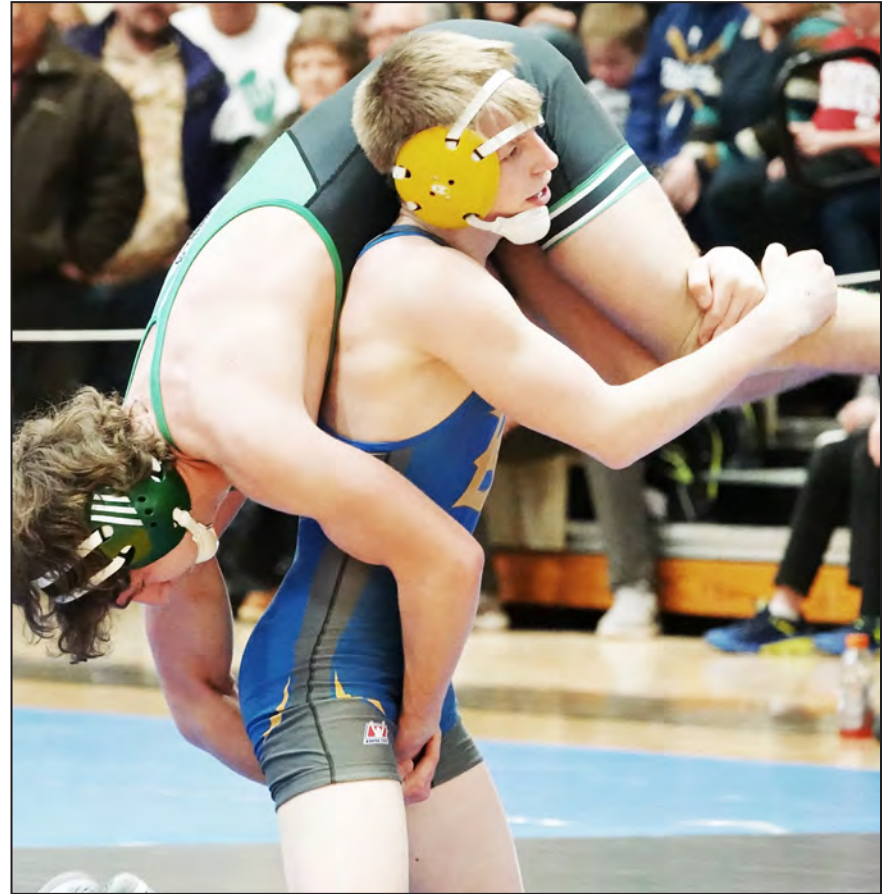

Panthers' Whiting takes top honor

Oconto Falls, Shawano, Pulaski share team honor

The area continued to produce strong individual wrestlers and teams this winter, but at the end of it all, it was a familiar name that stole the headlines.

After earning a 50-1 record and capping the year with his fourth career state title, Oconto Falls senior Clayton Whiting was named the NEW Media Inc. Wrestler of the Year.

Along the way to becoming one of just 22 wrestlers to ever win four state titles, Whiting was also named the North Eastern Conference Wrestler of the Year, along with becoming the No. 1 wrestler in the country at the 182-pound weight class, according to FloWrestling.

"I think just positive mentality helped me get through the season with a lot of drive to show the state why I am No. 1," said Whiting, who won the Division 2 182-pound title this year.

The senior capped his high school career with a 163-5 record.

To achieve that eye-popping record, Whiting was fully dedicated to the sport.

"Well, I did a lot of cardio every day, ran 2-3 miles every day during the summer," said Whiting. "I also focused on increasing the size and strength in my legs by working legs twice a day. I also did a lot of shadow wrestling on my own to hold my wrestling cardio strong so I never get tired as well, and lifted every day to become the strongest 182 in the country."

Despite racking up all those wins, and then 50 more this winter, he never

got complacent.

"Every time I won someone was always training to beat me and take my title away so that kept me on my toes and kept me motivated to work even harder and longer than everyone else," said Whiting.

The Oconto Falls senior noted how his teammates helped him "become a better person and a wrestler" through their support in practices and matches. "They always have my back and helped me want me to keep getting better."

Honorable mentions

There was no shortage of talented individual wrestlers in the area, with 16

other state qualifiers proving that.

Pulaski sent five wrestlers — Trenton Gibbons, Mason Wells, Ethan Eggert, Chase Woosencraft and Brady Gille — to state in Division 1.

Gibbons placed second at 182 pounds, finishing the year with a 37-6 overall record. Wells came in third at 220 pounds and finished 36-3 overall, while Eggert claimed fifth at 113 pounds and went 39-9. Gille finished the winter 30-12, and Woosencraft was 27-15.

Wittenberg-Birnamwood's David Gauderman and Pierson Potrykus each qualified for the D3 state tournament. Gauderman placed third at 220 pounds and was 47-4 on the season. Potrykus

posted a 44-8 record in his senior season.

Dylan Comins represented Lena at D3 state, placing sixth at 106 pounds. He broke the school record with 50 wins this winter.

Whiting's teammates Graeson Pankratz and Cole Bozile each wrestled at state. Bozile capped his freshman year with a sixth-place finish at 126 pounds and a 24-9 overall record. Pankratz finished 37-12.

Bonduel and Shawano each sent three wrestlers to state this winter.

Bonduel's Tyson Bogacz placed sixth in the D3 160 weight class, and had a 43-11 record for the year. Hailey Berg and Maddy Sokolski ended their seasons at the first-ever state girls tournament, placing second at 120 and 132 pounds, respectively.

Shawano's Caden Young and Jackson Smits made the D1 boys state tournament, finishing the year with 28-4 and 32-9 records, respectively. Piper Novitski also competed at girls state, taking fifth place at 126 pounds.

Teams of the year

Pulaski, Shawano and Oconto Falls are the area teams of the year after serving as some of the best teams in the entire state.

Pulaski won the Fox River Classic Conference title with a perfect record and then went on to win a Division 1 regional title to qualify for team sectionals.

Shawano went undefeated in Bay Conference duals to claim its fourth consecutive conference title, and then sent nine individual boys wrestlers to sectionals.

Oconto Falls fared well in the tough North Eastern Conference before winning a Division 2 regional title. The Panthers finished just one dual win shy of team state.

Bears' Robaidek earns Player of Year honor

The 2021-22 winter girls basketball season in the area was full of talented individual players and strong teams.

The Bonduel girls were the last team standing, and senior Allaina Robaidek earned the NEW Media Inc. Girls Player of the Year honor for guiding the team.

Robaidek ended the season with averages of 17 points, 1.9 rebounds, 2 steals and 1.9 assists per game. She connected on 70 free throws and 58 3-pointers.

In the regular season, she scored in double figures in all but two games, with eight points in the other two games.

"My teammates, coaches and family all pushed me to become the best player I could be this season by motivating me to accomplish my goals," said Robaidek on what helped her have a big season.

She added that playing basketball year round for several years helped her improve as a player and have a higher IQ on the court. "Lifting became a love of mine before and early in the season which helped me compete stronger on the court."

shot away, it was as simple as becoming a passer," said Robaidek. "With the rest of the team being so talented, they couldn't completely take away my scoring without another team-

mate taking over the responsibility of scoring."

She credited her team as a whole for the success the Bears enjoyed this winter. The team went 23-5 overall

and tied Amherst with an 11-1 mark in the CWC-East.

"Coming into this season not even being predicted to win conference or regionals really made each and every one of us push each other and give everything that we had the whole year," said Robaidek.

Honorable mentions

Gresham enjoyed a strong winter season, guided by seniors Valarie Cerveney and Hannah Cerveney. Valarie Cerveney averaged 16.2 points, 10.6 rebounds, 4.5 assists, 3.6 steals and 2 blocks, while Hannah Cerveney added 15.7 points, 3.6 boards, 2.2 assists and 3.5 steals.

Wittenberg-Birnamwood's Reese Rogowski led her team in her junior season, averaging 18.6 points, 4.6 rebounds, 5.3 assists, 3.4 steals and 1.6 blocks.

Suring's Christine Sleeter turned in averages of 17.3 points, 11.5 rebounds, 2.4 blocks, 4.3 steals and 1.6 assists in her junior year.

Lena junior Natalie McNurlen averaged 12.1 points, 4.5 boards, 2.5 assists, 3.2 steals and 1 block.

Continuing the trend of strong area junior players in the Marinette & Oconto Conference, Gillett's Carleigh Kaczmarek knocked down 53 3-pointers and averaged 12.2 points, 3.5 rebounds, 1.9 assists and 1.9 steals.

Oconto Falls was led by the senior duo of Alexis Euclide and Hailey Peitersen. Both were named to all-conference teams after scoring over 10 points a game in North Eastern Conference play. Peitersen also was named one of the top defensive players in the conference.

Menominee Indian junior Mariah Fish was the third leading scorer in the CWC-East with 16 points a game.

Shawano senior Brooke Theis capped her career by averaging 12.1 points, 8 rebounds, 1.8 blocks and 1.4 steals a game to earn a Bay Conference honor.

Teams of the Year

Bonduel and Gresham shared the Team of the Year honor after their strong winter seasons.

Gresham enjoyed a similar fate to Bonduel, tying for the CWC-North crown. The Wildcats finished 19-5 overall and 11-1 in conference action to tie Manawa.

Shawano's Metcalf-Grassman, Lena's Beyer share Player of the Year honor

Gillett tabbed the top team after strong showing with young roster

There was no shortage of talented boys basketball players in the area this winter season, with just about every area team having a guy or two who could go for 20-plus points in any game.

At the end of the year, it was Lena senior Max Beyer and Shawano junior Michael Metcalf-Grassman that separated themselves and earned the NEW Media Inc. Co-Player of the Year honor.

For the season, Beyer put up averages of 23.8 points, 6.4 rebounds, 1.7 steals, 1.4 assists and 1 block a game. He led the Marinette & Oconto Conference in several statistics and was named the conference's top player.

Beyer scored in double figures in 22 of the 23 games he played in.

"Thanks to God first and also to my dad for helping me every day to get better," said Beyer on what helped him have a big season.

Despite the massive individual numbers, Beyer's favorite moment was one that Lena accomplished as a team.

"Getting a home playoff game and winning was definitely exciting and a big accomplishment," said Beyer.

Beyer continued to heap praise on the team and gave them a big shutout. "They were great teammates and always had my back. Couldn't have done anything without them or my coaches."

Beyer capped his high school career as the school's second-highest scorer all-time, tallying 1,628 points. He also set several school records, including: most 3-pointers in a game (10); most 40-point games (2); most 3-pointers in a season (83); and most triples in a career (236).

"My dad and I spent countless hours in the gym getting shots up and working on all aspects of the game to prepare myself and I give all the credit to him for never giving up through thick and thin to

help me become the best version of myself," said Beyer.

After playing in just six games as a sophomore because of a broken

hip, Metcalf-Grassman became Shawano's go-to player as a junior.

Metcalf-Grassman averaged 19.7 points this season, shooting 47%

from the floor and making 102 free throws across 25 games. He also knocked down 61 3-pointers, shooting the 3 ball at a 35% clip.

He scored in double figures in all but two games, tallying nine points in the other two.

The junior also led his team in rebounding with 6.5 boards a game. Metcalf-Grassman also averaged 1.8 assists and 1.6 steals.

“Hard work and offseason training definitely helped me a lot, including AAU this summer,” said Metcalf-Grassman of what contributed to his big season. “My coaches also helped me to improve in the offseason.”

Metcalf-Grassman’s top moment of the winter was also a team accomplishment — beating Seymour twice, a team Shawano has struggled against in recent years.

The junior said his teammates did a good job of looking to him in the right spots on the court and

always pushing him in practice.

“My teammates did a good job of finding ways to get me open,” said Metcalf-Grassman. “Really they were the main contributors to getting the ball into my hands.”

Honorable mentions

As already mentioned, the number of really talented individual players was off the charts this winter.

Pulaski’s Derek Shaw was a big threat from the 3-point line, hitting 77 triples on his way to averaging 18.8 points a game. He tacked on 3.6 rebounds, 3 assists and 1.2 steals a game.

The Wittenberg-Birnamwood duo of Simon Schairer and Ben Wesolowski put up big senior seasons. Schairer averaged 17.2 points,

9 rebounds, 2 steals, 1.4 assists and 1 block a game, while Wesolowski averaged 14.4 points, 5.2 boards, 3.8 assists and 3.5 steals.

Bowler’s Emmitt Kietlinski nearly averaged a double-double with 16.6 points and 9.8 rebounds a game. He added 1.9 assists and 1.6 steals a game.

Bonduel had a strong duo in Reece Stoltenow and Noah Weier. Stoltenow made 87 3-pointers and averaged 16.7 points, 4.3 rebounds, 2.5 assists and 1.5 steals. Weier averaged 13.3 points, 3.6 boards, 4.2 assists and 1.8 steals per game.

Belasaire Vele and Lukas Pecore guided Gresham. Vele averaged 14 points, 10 rebounds, 4.6 assists and 1.8 steals a game, while Pecore had 15.6 points, 5.1 boards, 1.8 assists and 1.2 steals per game.

Isaiah Moss and Lloyd Reeves were a solid duo for Menominee Indian. Moss averaged 14.4 points, 6.9 rebounds, 3.2 assists and 2 steals, while Reeves was at 13.9 points, 6.8 boards, 2 assists and 2 steals.

Ethan Scheef led Marion with averages of 13.6 points, 6.9 rebounds, 3.6 assists and 2.2 steals per contest.

Despite Tigerton’s tough season overall, senior Zeke Griepentrog averaged 13.7 points, 3.3 rebounds and 1.3 steals.

McKai Davis capped an impressive three-year career at Wolf River Lutheran by exceeding the 1,000-point plateau this winter. He accomplished the feat in just 48 games.

Team of the Year

While there were plenty of talented players, no area teams secured conference titles. Gillett was the only team that made it to a regional title game, and the Tigers picked up the Team of the Year honor for their efforts.

Gillett won just three games during the 2020-21 season, with just one M&O Conference win. This year, the Tigers jumped up to nine conference wins and 12 overall. To end the season, Gillett pulled off back-to-back road playoff wins to get to the regional title game.

It was truly a team effort all season, with just one player, Ben Matczak, scoring in double figures, and he averaged 10 points a game.

The late-season push and improved play looks even more promising when taking a look at the team’s roster, which had just three seniors and was primarily led by freshmen and sophomores.

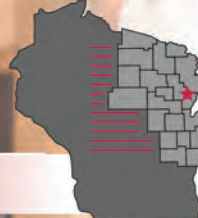
