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Lenzner, Olsen campaign at village board

Sheriff candidates pointed to meth, fentanyl, heroin as major problems in the county

Two candidates for Shawano County sheriff, George Lenzner and Brad Olsen, were in town during the Wittenberg Village Board meeting on June 20.

Both candidates were there to campaign for the upcoming Aug. 9 election. Lenzner currently serves as the chief deputy in Shawano County, while Olsen serves as the Oconto Falls City Police Chief.

Lenzner said that he has been with the Shawano County Sheriff's Department for just over 34 years.

"I started out in the jail and worked my way up to chief deputy," said Lenzner. "I have been chief deputy for six years now."

Lenzner pointed to getting involved with smaller villages if he is elected as sheriff.

"I am looking forward to working close with the village if I win," said Lenzner. "We want to get the same officer in these rural communities. We want you to know the officer patrolling the village."

He added that a major point for the sheriff's department lately has been drug enforcement.

"We do have a drug task force that we started the first of the year that involves the sheriff's department, the city police department, the Tigerton Police Department and the Stockbridge-Munsee Police Department," said Lenzner. "This year we are up to 14 search warrants, which is twice the amount of search warrants that we have done in a normal year."

Lenzner claimed that with the search warrants, they are up to 40 arrests.

"The reason that we started doing this at the beginning of the year is because overdoses have skyrocketed," said Lenzner. "Last year

we had nine overdose deaths in Shawano County and that pretty much doubled and tripled from the years past. Most of those overdoses involved fentanyl."

He added that there are already four overdose deaths in the county this year.

"We go after fentanyl, methamphetamine and heroin — we are going after the big time dealers," said Lenzner. "We can't have that in our communities, because with drug abuse comes violent crimes and so on."

Finally, Lenzner praised the Shawano County Drug Court.

"Drug court works because it gives users consequences if they don't succeed," said Lenzner. "If they do use, they go to jail. It gives them motivation to get clean. It has been going on for five years, has been a big success and we will continue that."

Olsen followed Lenzner and spoke to the village board about his experience and goals for if he gets elected.

"I started at Shawano City PD and then went to the Oconto County Sheriff's Department, where I was a canine handler there," said Lenzner. "I have been chief of police in Oconto Falls for the last eight years."

Olsen said that due to two of his officers being injured on the job, he has taken time patrolling.

"Since August, I have been working the patrolling rotation to pick up the ends," said Olsen.

"Every other weekend, I am on patrol yet."

He pointed to getting additional resources to schools in the county if elected.

"Where I work now, I created a school resource officer position," said Olsen. "It is hard to come up with funding for

an extra officer. All I hear is that people want to cut public safety."

He added that the school was more than willing to pay for half of that position.

"That would be my solution to funding — to approach the schools in the area and see if they would be willing to pitch in to get another resource officer," said Olsen.

Olsen echoed Lenzner's words saying that fentanyl and methamphetamine has exploded everywhere.

"This is our first awards banquet that we decided not to give out life saving awards for NARCAN saves, because we would have had 30 or 40 officers come up to get awards," said Olsen. "Additional canine units are needed to get that meth and fentanyl out of vehicles, because there is almost no odor to humans."

He added that the drug task force will have to stay.

"I don't see meth or fentanyl going away from the area," said Olsen. "The drug court is great to try and get those people with addiction on the path to recovery. It is really hard to kick meth and fentanyl."

Storms wreak havoc in Shawano County

Possible tornadoes in Navarino, Almon suspected as trees fall, power fails

Storms that swept through northeast Wisconsin on June 15 left damage and debris in their wake, and two tornadoes have been confirmed in Shawano County.

The storms arrived in Shawano County around 5 p.m., impacting the whole county, but more severe damage was reported on the east and west sides.

According to a press release from the county's emergency management office, severe damage was found in the towns of Almon, Angelica, Lessor and Navarino. In Navarino, especially around the Navarino Wildlife Area, large trees fell near roads and landed on power lines.

There was a report of a tornado touching down in Navarino, according to Chris Madle, the county's emergency management coordinator, which was later confirmed by the National Weather Service as an EF-1.

"I've been in touch with the National Weather Service out of Green Bay, and they had mentioned they believed one had touched down there," Madle said. "I know they were heading out there to do some damage assessment on their own, but I haven't heard any further details such as wind speeds or anything like that."

Madle said there was also a report that a tornado touched down in the Shepley area between Wittenberg and Bowler, confirmed as an EF-1 by the weather service.

"We had multiple houses out there where there were trees on top of their roofs that had blown over, but no injuries," he said.

Some trees had also knocked down power lines on County Road D near Kolpack Road in Bowler, according to Madle, and that was one of the last roads to be opened in the county on the morning of June 16.

The Pulaski and Menominee Indian school districts reported their summer school classes and other operations were cancelled for June 16 due to power outages. Madle did not know how many people in the area were without power.

Only a few buildings were impacted by the high winds and possible tornadoes, according to Madle.

"It was like a couple houses here

and there," Madle said. "Really, the damage wasn't terrible to any houses. The structures that had the most damage were pole-type buildings or barns. We had a couple of silos blow over, but residences were OK."

The Stockbridge-Munsee Band of Mohicans declared an emergency, announcing that power lines and some buildings were impacted by the storms.

"We have accessed significant damage from the storm," Tribal President Shannon Holsey said in a statement on the tribe's website. "Our emergency teams are working diligently to aide people and get live wires and trees removed from roads and homes as quickly as possible, we also have some areas without power. EMS response may be delayed as a result."

Power was also out in Neopit and Zoar on the Menominee Reservation. One of the tribe's Facebook pages reported that community centers and Menominee Tribal School were opening to provide food and allow residents to fill up water jugs.

Shawano County has not declared a state of emergency, according to Madle, even though neighboring Brown County did. Madle said he saw some of the damage in Brown County and saw that the eastern neighbor saw significantly more damage than Shawano County did.

"We're still under an emergency declaration from the state, I believe, until Aug. 1," Madle said. "We don't have to declare emergency declarations. We can, but it's not something we're planning on doing right now."

Madle encouraged private property owners to work with their insurance companies if their property was damaged but said there wasn't much the county could do. His office has mainly been in contact with power companies to get updates on when electricity can be restored and ensuring roads are open and cleaned up.

He noted that work was still being done at the power substations near Wittenberg, Tigerton and the Town of Almon. The state Highway 160 corridor near Pulaski was also impacted by power outages and that it was going to take a couple of days to rebuild the grid there, impacting the village as well as the Town of Angelica.

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Birnamwood to add memorial to baseball diamond

The Birnamwood Village Board passed a request from one resident to memorialize his father at the baseball diamond on Maple Street during its June 13 meeting.

Birnamwood resident Rich Resch came to the board meeting to discuss a possible memorial for his father, Dave Resch, at the baseball diamond. Resch said that his father passed away four years ago, and that he wanted to do something to honor his dad's memory.

"At his funeral, in lieu of flowers,

we took donations to do something at the ballpark to memorialize him," said Resch. "We played a game up in Antigo, and they had a green privacy screen on the outfield fence. They had a memorial for someone who had passed away written on the fence. I thought that was really neat."

Resch noted his father played baseball for 20 years and managed for another 10 years.

"He was really fond of the ballpark," said Resch. "That was one of his favorite places to be."

Due to Milwaukee Braves Third Baseman Eddie Mathews

being his father's favorite player and Mathews wearing number 41, Resch said that he wants to put "In memory of David Resch #41" on the outfield fence.

"We would put the green privacy screen all over the outfield fence, but since Birnamwood has a gate in the middle of the field, we would probably put the memorial on the left field fence," said Resch.

He said that all of the money for the screen has been raised, and that the village would not need to help in terms of finances.

Village Board President Mike Sprague said that he did not have a

problem with Resch family putting the screen up.

"I really think that it would really dress up the ballpark," said Sprague.

Birnamwood Public Works Director Chris Jensen suggested that baseball players can help to move and store the screen if needed.

Sprague and Jensen both added that it should not be a problem, and they can store the screen in the concession stand or at the village's storage building.

Resch added that, if interested, they could add more names to the fence for memorialization in the future.

Noriega-Avila still without counsel after 10 months

Kussel denies latest request to reduce \$500K bond

Pedro Noriega-Avila, a man accused in the rape of his stepdaughter, has been in the Shawano County Jail for almost a year but still is without an attorney.

At a June 16 status conference, Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. said that Noriega-Avila is still eligible for services from the public defender's office, but after inquiring with over 1,600 attorneys, one still has not been found to provide a defense for the man who was on the county's wanted list for five years and was apprehended in Arizona while trying to cross the border into Mexico.

"It's not unusual," Kussel said prior to a Spanish translator relaying his words to Noriega-Avila. "I find the public defender's office is very diligent in trying to get attorneys for their clients. Due to a lack of attorneys in this area that are willing to take cases, delays are somewhat unfortunate."

Noriega-Avila had initially waived his right to have a preliminary hearing within 10 days of his initial appearance in court back in August 2021, but Kussel offered him the opportunity to have another preliminary hearing in short order, even though he was without counsel. Noriega-Avila declined.

Noriega-Avila made another request to have his \$500,000 cash bond reduced, but it was denied once again after the defendant offered no words as to why the court should lower it. Assistant District Attorney Laura Nelson issued a reminder that the

case is from 2016 and, after posting a \$5,000 cash bond in June of that year, he disappeared from sight until April 2021. She added that the only reason he is back in Wisconsin facing trial is because the state had to request extradition from Arizona.

"If Mr. Noriega is, in any way, shape or form, released from custody, we're not going to see him again," Nelson said. "It is the state's belief that he is a high flight risk, and the bond that has been set is appropriate given the nature of the charges."

Noriega-Avila faces one count of first-degree child sexual assault of a child under age 13, two counts of sexual assault with someone under age 16 and two counts of incest with a child by a stepparent. Noriega-Avila faces a maximum of 40 years in prison and \$100,000 fine for each of the incest and the latter two sexual assault counts. For the child sexual assault in 2010, he faces up to 60 years in prison.

Kussel agreed with Nelson's assessment that Noriega-Avila would likely flee the jurisdiction if the bond was reduced.

"The court is unaware of anything that has changed," Kussel said. "The criteria for which the bond was set was based on a number of factors, including a very high risk for flight based on the prior behavior of the defendant. Additionally, there remains the very high risk of long-term incarceration if convicted, and therefore, that is a risk for an individual not appearing for court."

Noriega-Avila's next hearing is scheduled for 8:30 a.m. July 7 in Branch 2 of the Shawano County Courthouse.

Electric trikes provide older riders fun, fitness

Dear Savvy Senior,

What can you tell me about electric trikes for semi-seniors? I used to cycle a lot in my younger years but have some balance problems and don't trust myself on a two-wheeler anymore. I've read that electric powered trikes are a good option for older riders but could use some help choosing one.

Unsteady Eddie

Dear Eddie,

Electric powered adult tricycles — also known as e-trikes — are a great cycling option for older adults with balance or stamina issues because they're safe and super fun to ride, and easy on an aging body. Here's what you should know, along with some tips to help you shop for one.

If you're interested in cycling, but worry about falling or injuring yourself, e-trikes are a great choice because of the three-wheeled stability they provide. With a trike you can ride as slow as you want without ever losing your balance, which is very reassuring for most older riders.

E-trikes also come with a small electric powered motor to enhance

the riding experience, so when you saddle up and apply the throttle the motor will give you a boost when pedaling, or it will do all the work for you. This makes it much easier to whiz up hills and ride into headwinds without gassing yourself or taxing your knee joints.

In addition, most adult e-trikes are also made with a low "step through" design making mounting and dismounting easier; they typically come with big tires that ensure a smooth ride; have ergonomic handlebars that are easy to reach and grip; and offer oversize seats (some even have backrests) for comfort and support.

There are many different types of adult e-trikes to choose from with prices ranging anywhere from around \$2,000 up to \$7,000. To shop for one, contact some bike shops in your area to see what they offer, or you may need to order one online.

When shopping for an e-trike, pay special attention to the motor, which determines how fast it will go, and the battery, which determines how far it will go between charges.

Most e-trikes can reach speeds of anywhere between 15 and 28 miles per hour, and typically go somewhere between 20 and 55 miles on a single charge, depending on how much pedaling you do. Battery charge times will vary too, ranging anywhere from three to eight hours.

To help you figure out the right kind of e-trike for you, ask yourself how and where you plan to ride it. If you're primarily interested in a leisurely ride around the neighborhood for pleasure, fitness or running errands, an upright cruiser e-trike that has a rear cargo basket would be a nice choice.

Some popular options in this category include: Addmotor's M-340 Electric Fat Trike and M-360 Semi-Recumbent Trike (both \$3,000, addmotor.com); Emojo Caddy Pro (\$2,900, emojobike.com); Sixthreezero EVERYjourney 250W Tricycle (\$2,200,

sixthreezero.com); EWheels EW-29 (\$2,000, ewheelsdealers.com); and Buzz Cerana T (\$1,700, buzzbicycles.com).

If you're looking to take longer road rides, a recumbent e-trike may be a better option. These are aerodynamic, low-to-the-ground stretched-out frame trikes that allow you to recline with your legs positioned in front of you. CatTrike (cattrike.com) and TerraTrikes (terratrike.com) are two of the biggest U.S. companies that make recumbent tadpole-style trikes (the two wheels are in front) and they both offer electric assist options at prices ranging from \$5,000 to \$7,000.

There are also folding e-trikes, which are practical if you have limited home storage space or would like to take your trike with you when traveling. Some good options here include the Liberty Trike (\$1,600, libertytrike.com) and Eunorau New-Trike (\$2,500, eunorau-ebike.com).

Without fixing image, there's no fixing schools

Many folks who have lived in Shawano for a considerable period know Terry Hilgenberg. He might have gotten folks a house or debated wildlife issues. He also has pushed for voters to approve referenda in the Shawano School District and is usually the first to argue against a naysayer who says Shawano's public schools are bad.

That's why it threw me for a loop recently when Hilgenberg, who sits on the district's task force looking at possible capital and operations referenda, struck a sour note when the recent community survey results showed that support for those efforts was tepid, at best.

"Is anybody really surprised with the survey results?" Hilgenberg said. "Let's face the facts, guys. The community has lost confidence in our school system. This community does not trust our school system. Until that is remedied, school board, you're peeing in the wind."

Plenty of folks in the community have been singing that tune in recent months after news broke that the district was looking at closing one of its schools at the same time it was exploring the option of asking voters to shell out money for school improvements. When you have one

of Shawano's big-wigs doing a solo in the high school library, though, that's a clear indication we should be heading for the lifeboats.

Now the question before the Shawano School Board is whether to call for one or both of the referenda in November, a decision that needs to be made by the end of August in order to make the ballot. The alternative would be to wait until next April or further down the line.

Given the current tension between the schools and the community, the latter option would seem to be the most prudent. Normally, I would advocate for a November judgment day, as more voters tend to come out for an election that has state and federal races in the mix than they do when it's just the local races, and that would give a far better indication of whether the district is moving in the right direction. However, there are a number of reasons — all leadership related — that pushing for more money for the schools in 2022 is pure suicide.

First, you've got recall petitions circulating against two school board members, Michael Sleeper and Chuck Dallas. While the jury is still out on whether therecall will happen, having a referenda on the same ballot with the question of whether the district's elected leaders will retain their power indicates a low possibility for success.

There's also the administration factor. Many in the community have called into question the leadership ability of Randi Anderson, the district superintendent, in the wake of a mass exodus of teachers and other staff this year, along with the fact that the suggested school closure was not made public until March, with a potential decision on whether to do it or not scheduled for the next month. To say that there's a failure to communicate would be an understatement, and it's doubtful that folks who don't trust her because of this would trust her and her colleagues with millions of dollars more.

Anderson is also one of the last standing members of the administration now that all four school principals, the pupil services director and other school leaders are leaving for Marion, Gresham, Wittenberg and Oconto, to name a few places. When

most of the leadership jumps ship in the course of just a few months, that's another doubt in people's minds on whether to trust the district with money. There will be new leadership coming in, but they'll need time to show they can care for the children's education.

Hilgenberg was dead right when he said that trust needs to be rebuilt. Trust is not something that reignites with the flipping of a switch. Anderson, the school board and whatever few administrators remain are going to have to do some major damage control if they ever hope to get the public to say yes to more money. Mike Musolff, the new board president, seems to be attempting a mea culpa, but unless he gets more support from within the schools, the lack of trust will remain a choking cloud of hanging smoke over the district.

Now is not the time to suggest a referendum, or two, for that matter. Next April would be a better opportunity to ask to give the schools a facelift, but only if the leaders can execute their own makeover and cover up their blemishes. The way things stand right now, that's going to take a lot of spackle.

This Western has elements of fantasy and science fiction

I'd never read anything by William W. Johnstone, but I knew my husband had. So, when I came across "A Time for Vultures" in the InfoSoup catalog, I decided to give it a try. This book was part of his "Flintlock" series and co-written with his nephew, J.A. Johnstone.

It doesn't take long to establish that Sam Flintlock is a frontiersman with a lot of rough edges but a decent heart. His most notable feature is a huge thunderbird tattoo on his throat and upper chest.

When he and his half-Cherokee friend O'Hara notice what appears to be four women and a disabled wagon, O'Hara warns that they'll be trouble, but Sam insists they stop to help. The women turn out to be whores on their way to Happyville, and there is immediate trouble.

When it's over, the strident women convince the men to get them to Happyville. As they approach the town, they note that it appears to be deserted. It doesn't take them long to see that Happyville has been struck by smallpox. They turn the local saloon into their headquarters, put their horses in the livery and plan to leave early the next morning.

Another thing unique about Sam Flintlock is that he talks to his dead grandfather, Barnabas. Sam was raised by the old mountain man and his

friends. He got little in the way of book learning but plenty of lessons in survival. No one knows why, but the old man often appears to harangue and sometimes warn Sam. He also offers advice from Satan on how Sam

should handle many situations — advice Sam studiously ignores.

This time, Barnabas tells Sam that King Fisher has other plans for him. When they begin hearing a strange huffing sound in the distance, Sam goes to investigate. First, he encounters a strange dwarf controlling a massive wolf who takes him to the camp of King Fisher. Sam had heard that the King Fisher he knew was dead, but it turns out that King Fisher had been rescued by an engineer named Dr. le Strange who used cutting-edge technology to rebuild Fisher's damaged parts. Now he difficult to look at but is 10 times faster on the draw.

Several of the people in Fisher's cadre have benefited from the doctor's inventions, too. Using a land locomotive called Hellrun, Fisher plans to take over the country and maybe the world.

Sam knows Fisher is mad and refuses to work with him. Sam doesn't

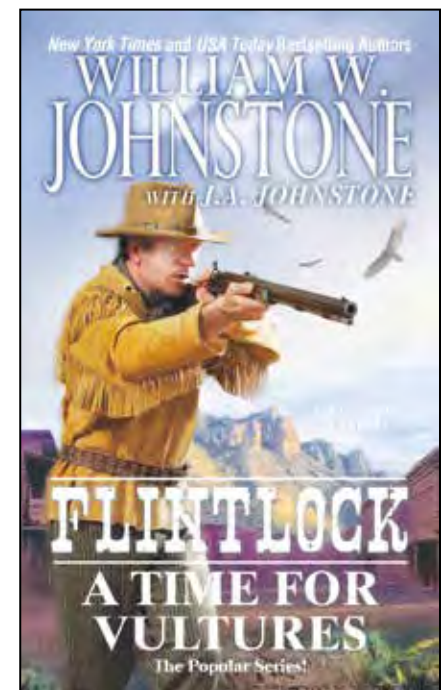

know that Fisher has stolen the Army payroll so now every poor Texan is hoping to get their hands on it.

After a nasty fight with one group, Fisher grudgingly allows Sam and O'Hara to return to Happyville. Fisher plans to cleanse the town and use it as his headquarters. He sends a troop to find the people of Happyville and bring them back, but all they find is bodies.

Only Dr. le Strange and Fisher know that Fisher needs regular blood transfusions to survive and planned to get them from the townspeople. Since the science is new, Dr. le Strange isn't aware of the incompatibility of some blood types, thus spelling the end for Fisher as well as the others like him.

Sam and O'Hara burn Hellrun, the town and all the evidence of Fisher's plans, then head south. They have the Army payroll but no idea what to do with it or how to keep bandits from killing them to get it. The book ends with several improbable battles, near-death events, the Army reclaiming the



money and a final visit from Barnabas. It all sets the scene for the next "Flintlock" adventure.

I never expected a Western to include a bit of science fiction coupled with mysticism, but that's what I got. Your public library can supply all kinds of books that will offer you surprises. There is always a little time to read, so make plans to stop by soon and check it out.

After Meverden put up another zero in the second, Zorowski singled in Carter Herb to make it a 5-0 lead after two frames.

Omro finally pushed a run across in the third, but the hosts responded with two more in their half. Nathan Waupekenay delivered a two-out, two-RBI single that scored Worzalla and Chase Krull.

Witt-Birn looked to be in cruise control, but Omro quickly got back within a run with a pair of bloop hits to right field in the fifth. The first hit produced two runs before a triple scored two more, and an error on the play made it a little league homer and a one-run contest.

The hosts regained control with two huge insurance runs in the fifth. Krull doubled in Worzalla for the first run before Herb drew a bases-loaded walk to force in Potrykus. Meverden was replaced by

Spring turkey season a wild one

The 2022 spring turkey hunting season was a memorable but odd one for me and my family, and apparently it was a successful one for the state as a whole.

On June 10, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources put out a press release that announced “preliminary totals show Wisconsin turkey hunters registered 39,007 birds during the 2022 spring turkey hunting season, a 5% increase from the 37,266 birds registered in the spring 2021 season.”

While the youth season (April 16-17) saw nearly a 25% decrease in birds harvested, with some winter-like weather serving as a reason why, the weather steadily improved as the six one-week time periods carried on.

My first time period was the third week, but I planned on making the trip up to Chippewa County to tag along with my brother Sawyer, who was able to obtain a harvest authorization for the first period for our family land.

My trip was planned for Friday, but those plans were dashed when my brother tagged a tom during an afternoon hunt on the first day of the season. It wasn't the typical turkey hunt, with no gobbling and on an overcast day right before rain came through, but Sawyer was more than thrilled to harvest his first-ever bird.

After having his season end after just a couple hours, Sawyer was eager to get back in the woods again shortly after, so he decided to come visit me and tag along as I hunted in Shawano County and attempted to tag another public land gobbler.

We drove to what I consider my No. 1 spot before daylight, only to have a vehicle already in the parking lot. We made our way to option two and made our way back to the heart of the chunk of land.

For some backstory, I had some turkey encounters at this place two springs ago, but struggled to even hear one there in 2021. So going into the hunt that day, I wasn't exactly optimistic, especially because I had been battling an illness and couldn't do my usual scouting.

To my surprise, there were some gobblers as we walked in. After hearing a hen close by, we briefly

set up off the main trail going through the woods.

After about 15 minutes and hearing no more gobblers, we decided to make a loop around the public land to try and see if there were any other gobblers nearby.

After striking out on that plan, we started walking down the main

trail that goes through the woods — toward the direction of the gobblers early on.

We both hit our slate calls at the same time and were cutoff by a gobbler. We quickly made a setup and began using mouth calls to try and lure the birds in.

It took maybe three minutes for

me to catch movement in the woods ahead of us, and a minute or so later, a whole flock of turkeys was walking right down the path toward us.

Knowing how difficult public land hunting can be, I picked out the first bearded bird I could find and settled in for a shot. After yelping to get the tom to break strut, I successfully took him down at just under 30 yards!

And just like that, my first turkey season was over. Again, it wasn't the picture-perfect hunt, with the birds barely making a peep on their way in, but it worked in our favor again.

My brother's day turned out to just be getting started. After taking some great photos of me and the tom and helping me get it taken care of, he made the trek back to Chippewa County, where my dad Paul also had the third season.

Sawyer convinced my dad to go hunting in the middle of the day, and they were out for a matter of minutes before taking down another gobbler. So that made it three toms on our first days of hunting, something that likely won't ever happen again.

At this point, my imagination was running wild on just how great the turkey season could be. I still had five tags left — the final three seasons on public land and two tags for our private land. My goal coming into the season was to get two turkeys for the first time ever, but it quickly changed to trying to get six birds.

Looking back on the season now, it definitely didn't go as planned, but it was by far the most productive our family has ever been in a single spring. The hunts that were successful lasted a matter of minutes, while the ones that ended eating tag soup were the ones with better action and ones I'll recall easier in the years to come.

Just when you think you have turkeys figured out, you have a season like my family and I did. I'm thankful we were able to contribute to the 39,007 birds harvested and am already counting down the days to the 2023 season.

Bonduel High School junior Macy Niles and sophomores Hailee Thompson and Hailey Zernicke each earned spots on the Central Wisconsin Conference-East Division first team after strong spring softball seasons.

Bonduel sophomore Lila Pleshek and junior Nakiyah Henning made the second team, while senior Claire Gehm and freshmen Audrey Weier and Tatum Sporisky all were honorable mentions.

Junior Ashlee Corn was Menominee Indian's lone player recognized, making the second team. Wittenberg-Birnamwood senior Kaylee Schram and junior Jami Wendler made the second team, while senior Jadalynn Davids was an honorable mention.

In conference play, Thompson led the Bears with a .424 batting average and .568 on-base percentage. She legged out seven extra-base hits among her 14 total hits, drove in 15 runs and scored 15 times. The sophomore shortstop also swiped nine bases.

"Earning a spot on first team is something I work for year-round. 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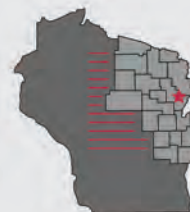
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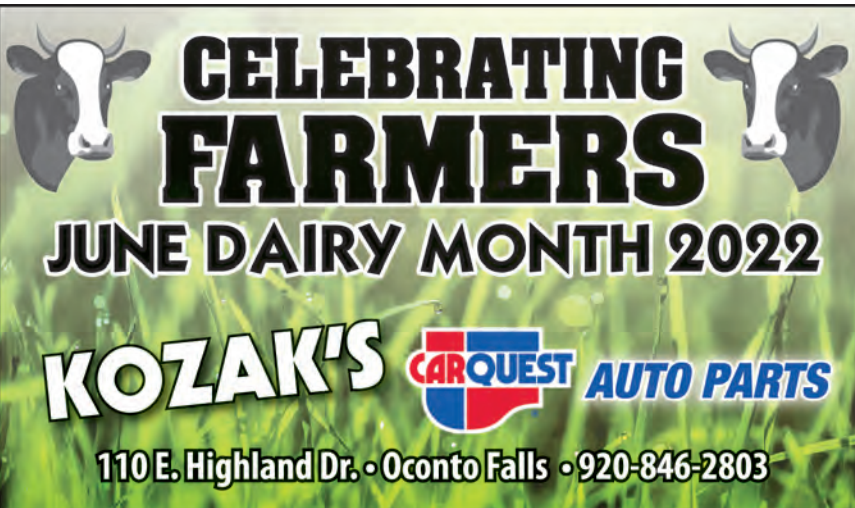


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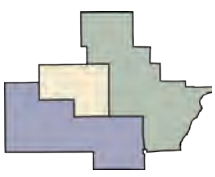

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'Much Ado About Nothing' hits state park

Copper Culture hosts Shakespearean theater troupe

Wisconsin's state parks are known for their beauty and history, but this summer will give visitors and residents alike a chance to sit back and watch Shakespearean theater come to life.

The Summit Players Theatre, based in Milwaukee, will be performing "Much Ado About Nothing" in 23 state parks — including Copper Culture State Park in Oconto. The free performance takes place June 25, starting with a workshop on William Shakespeare and his work, followed by a 75-minute scaled-down version of one of Shakespeare's more famous comedies.

"Much Ado About Nothing," believed to be written by the bard in 1598 or 1599, revolves around two romantic pairings that come together when a group of soldiers arrives in Messina, Italy. Benedick and Beatrice are tricked into confessing their love for one another, while Claudio is tricked into believing that Hero is not a maiden (what is referred to as a virgin today).

Summit Players first started in 2015 as a senior project of sorts for a group of students at Marquette University, according to executive director A.J. Magoon. However, the group's popularity meant that the thespians needed to do something with it once college had ended for them.

"When we saw how successful and how appreciated it was, we made it into a full-fledged company," Magoon said. "We're an honest-to-God nonprofit, and we're a little more above board than we were back then."

One of the founding members of Summit Players, Hannah Klapperich-Miller, had taken a camping trip with her family prior to her senior year, according to Magoon, which is what prompted the idea of taking theater on the road to the state parks instead of performing it in a building. Besides highlighting the theater group, it draws attention to those hidden attractions in parks that some take for granted.

"There was this little amphitheater in Potawatomi (State Park in Door County), and it kind of made her think, 'You know, there are a lot of these little amphitheaters and stage venues with benches,'" Magoon said. "You see them in all these state parks, but you don't see them used a whole lot."

The Summit Players selected "Much Ado About Nothing" for this summer's show because of its lightheartedness and mirth, given the seriousness being felt in the world as communities are moving past the coronavirus pandemic.

"It's a great comedy. It's a hilarious comedy," Magoon said. "I think it's fun to do. A lot of the shows we do are comedies because they tend to be the ones that are really fun for kids and families. This is not so serious — you're not doing 'Hamlet.'"

There are some messages in "Much Ado" that resonate today. Magoon noted that many of the characters lie to and deceive one another, and there are some mistaken identities that lead to wrong conclusions.

"I think there are applicable themes to the modern world," Magoon said. "Even though it's funny

and it's enjoyable, it's a play that says something about an environment that people will really recognize as similar to the one they live in."

Magoon said that the play was whittled down from its original

five acts to a show that's just over an hour by taking out some of the outdated references. He pointed out some of the metaphors and flowery language have not withstood the test of time, even though the overall theme and plots are still relevant.

"We like to say it's Shakespeare's work, but there's a lot less of it," Magoon said. "This is the kind of adaptation that's meant to be understandable to everyone."

The workshops, titled "Inside Shakespeare's Story," help to provide a little more understanding to the language used in the 16th and 17th centuries, allowing children and others who have not been exposed to Shakespeare's work to translate what the playwright was trying to say in his shows, according to Magoon.

"The purpose is to give folks an interactive sort of access point to the show," he said. "We start off playing some games, getting to know you, getting everyone to loosen up a little bit, and then we have a series of interactive exercises."

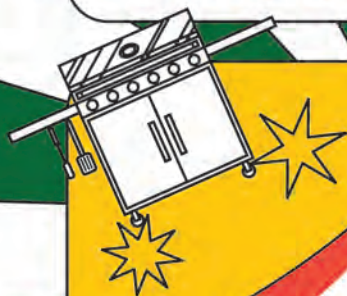

Wildlife trappers move nature's pests back outdoors

Since first moving to Wisconsin in 2000, I've lived in the country and loved every minute of it.

As more city dwellers move to the country, they are drawn to the natural

beauty and critters — until those critters move into their homes. That's where nuisance wildlife trappers come in.

When we had bats in the wall of our house, we knew who to call.

One of my best friends, Tom Walters of Bettendorf, Iowa, is not only a long-time fur trapper, but makes a nice part-time income as a nuisance trapper, too. Fur prices have plummeted from their highs in the 1970s, but when a homeowner has a few bats flying through the living room or a snake under the kitchen sink, the urgency in their voices is crystal clear in the calls to Walters' American Bat Management.

I grew up in Illinois as an avid hunter under the tutelage of my father and older brother. When fur prices shot up in my high school years, my pal Eric Borgman and I ordered a dozen No. 2 double-coil traps from Herter's mail-order catalog and started reading a few trapping magazines and books. To say we were "slob trappers" was an understatement. We didn't know what we were doing, but we did check our traps every day as the law required.

When I met Walters in the 1990s, I decided to take an Iowa Department of Natural Resources trapper ed class that he and his buddy, Ed Grillot, led. They explained trap placement, various sets, proper trap size, fur handling and much more. I'm sure Eric and I would have earned enough to keep two high schoolers happy had I had the class back then.

Walters used his vast trapping background to get rid of the "small colony" of bats in our house, using an exclusion technique. Something as simple as a short piece of plastic eve spout with a one-way swinging door is placed in the bats' tiny entranceway (found by locating tiny bat droppings) with duct tape until the bats leave at night. We only counted 44 — a small colony. After a few days, the holes are sealed and the bats can't get back inside.

Removing critters from a house is not only a relief, but has health benefits, too. Bat droppings carry many diseases and can make residents sick. The same is true of rodents like squir-

rels, mice, rats and chipmunks, all of which keep Walters and other critter getters busy.

Most farmers and other country residents learn to use a .22 rifle or pellet gun to get rid of the occasional startling, garden-raiding ground squirrel or other small vermin. When a skunk wanders up to the campfire during a cookout or crawls under your deck, you'll probably want to call a nuisance wildlife trapper with the expertise and specialized equipment to handle it without a stinky mishap.

Walters, 68, began his trapping career catching pocket gophers on the farm as a boy. He switched over to the more lucrative fur trapping, starting with muskrats, mink and raccoons.

What's most interesting is how the once-profitable fur business has dropped off (Asian markets for fur remain strong, but American demand has fallen) and the nuisance trapping business continues to grow as more people move to the country and encounter more critters.

Walters began a part-time nuisance

trapping business while he was still a meat cutter at a chain grocery store in the Quad-Cities. He expanded to trapping bats after a fellow trapper suggested the idea.

Bat removal involves a technique called exclusion. After the trapper locates the entrance and exit holes (bats can crawl through a hole the size of a dime), he seals off all but one or two with expanding foam, then tapes a small piece of plastic drain pipe with a one-way hinged door at the remaining holes. After 10 days or so, when all the bats have left the dwelling, he then removes the devices and seals the remaining holes.

Trappers are clever folks, often coming up with simple critter catchers. Walters said he uses a pizza box with glue traps inside to catch snakes. He makes a couple holes in the sides of the closed box and sets it near the wall. After the snakes get stuck on the glue traps, he uses Pam cooking spray to get the glue to release. Then he releases the snakes to a distant woods.

In Wisconsin, a nuisance trapper

doesn't need any special license, other than a standard trapping license, said Mike Wilhite, a 10-year, full-time nuisance trapper and owner/publisher of The Trapper's Post trapping magazine in Scandinavia.

Wilhite has trapped bats, snakes, rodents and many other home invaders. He even helped remove four coyotes that were preying on people's pets in the city of Waupaca.

Wilhite's advice to people who want to try the business is to "trap stuff that people are scared of." Bat calls are the most profitable, but "you'd better not be afraid of heights," he added.

When it all goes wrong and a skunk sprays you, the answer is this: 1 quart of hydrogen peroxide, ¼ cup of baking soda and 1 tablespoon of dishwashing soap mixed together and applied to skin or pet fur.

Take it from a pro trapper: It works better than tomato juice.

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Common loon a symbol of the wilderness

Of all the joys I experience while spending time in the Wisconsin Northwoods, hearing the haunting cry of the common loon is one of my favorites. Whether a lone wail welcoming the first morning light or an evening chorus echoing through the star-filled sky, the call of the loon is unmistakable and ever-so hypnotic.

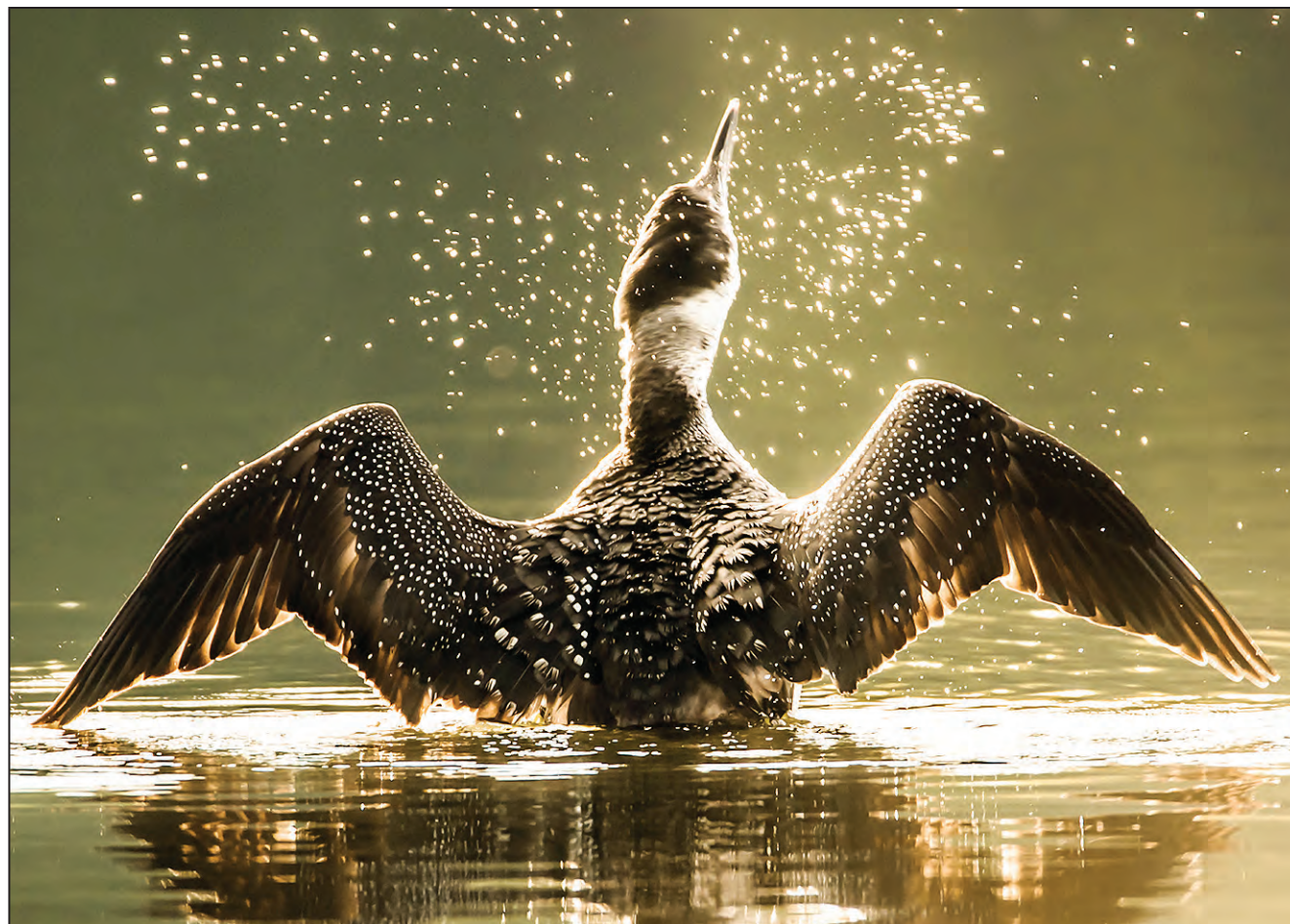
All About Birds describes four distinct loon calls. The “Tremolo” is a wavering call given when a loon is alarmed or to announce its presence. The “Yodel” is the male loon’s territorial claim. Each male has his own signature yodel. The “Wail” is the haunting call that loons give back and forth to figure out each other’s location, much like a game of “Marco Polo.” Lastly, “Hoots” are soft, short calls given to each other and can symbolize curiosity and/or happiness.

Our symbol of the wilderness, the common loon makes Wisconsin’s northern lakes its summer home. Every spring they arrive from their long flight off the Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico coasts. Males migrate here first followed by the females days to weeks later, often returning to the same lake.

Loons do not mate for life but some stay together a long time. One famous pair named ABJ and Fe have been together for 25 years. According to Audubon Magazine, Seney National Wildlife Refuge started a Common Loon banding program in 1987. They have been following ABJ and Fe’s quarter-century-old affair and are able to confirm that ABJ, Fe, and multiple generations of their family reunite at Seney every summer.

Once fall arrives, loon families separate. The female migrates south first followed by the male, leaving the juveniles on their own. A few weeks later, the juveniles somehow know to flock together to make their first migration journey. Isn’t it fascinating how nature instinctively knows what to do? I get a little melancholy when it is time for them to leave, because the juveniles remain south for three years before returning back north.

Have you ever seen a loon dive and then worry because it is not coming back up? According to the Adirondack Council, the common loon’s legs are situated far back on their bodies.

This helps propel them rapidly and move great distances while swimming underwater. Most birds have air-filled bones but loons have dense bones allowing them to dive up to 200 feet deep and to stay underwater for up to five minutes.

The loon’s leg position makes it difficult for them to maneuver on land. They only go ashore to mate and

incubate eggs. Because of their heavy bodies, loons need a long “runway,” at least 30 yards, to run across the top of the water to get enough speed to lift off. Once airborne, they are strong flyers. They have been tracked at 70 miles per hour and are able to go hundreds of miles without stopping. The U.S. Geological Survey found that a loon traveled 670 miles within a 24-hour period.

Common loons eat invertebrates like crayfish and aquatic insects like dragonflies. The environmental organization called Nature Canada shares that loons have no teeth and have to swallow their food whole or in big chunks. Small prey is swallowed underwater but larger ones are brought to the surface and eaten there. They also eat small rocks to help them break down the food in their stomach.

While scooping up small rocks to aid in digestion, loons can also ingest small lead fishing tackle such as sinkers and jig heads. According to Northland College LoonWatch, a single lead sinker will kill a loon. Twenty percent of loons necropsied (autopsied) died in Wisconsin because of lead-poisoning.

Along with not using small lead tackle, other ways to help loons

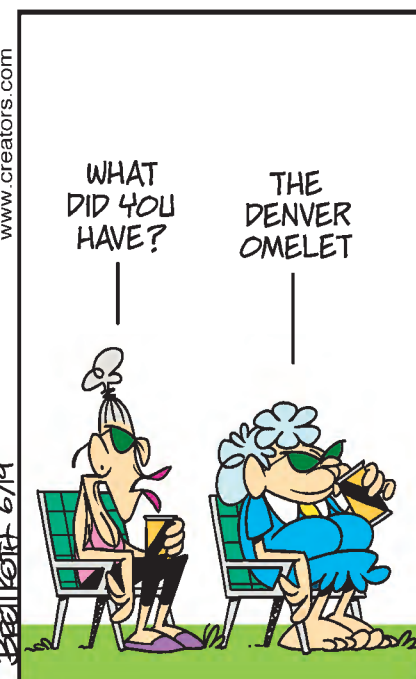
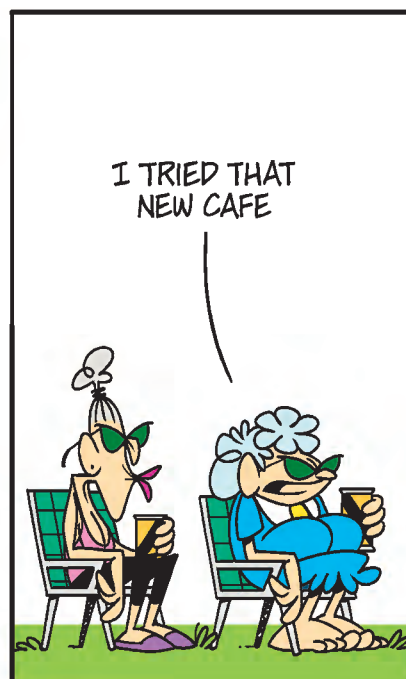
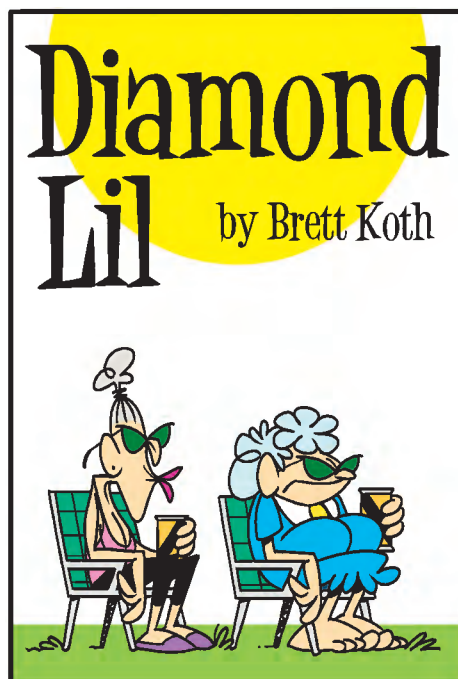
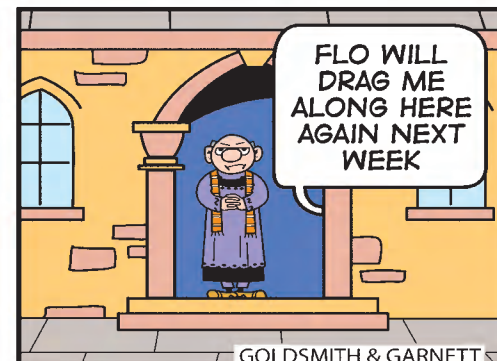
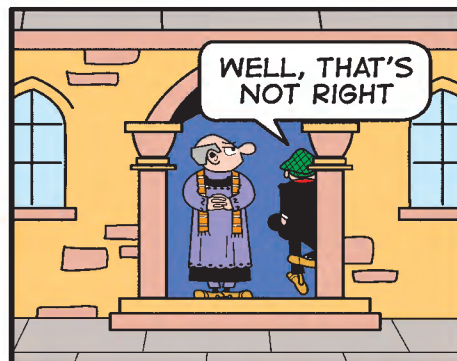
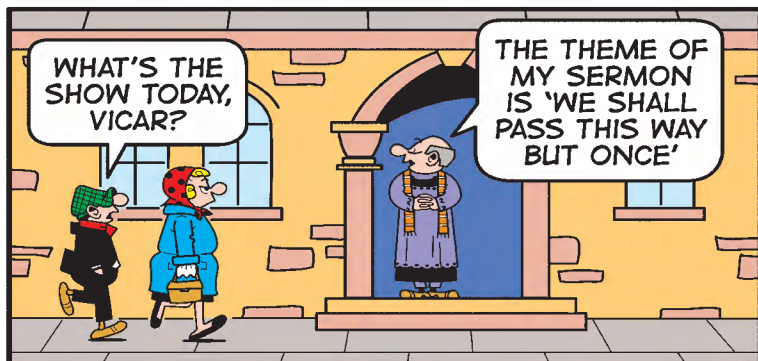
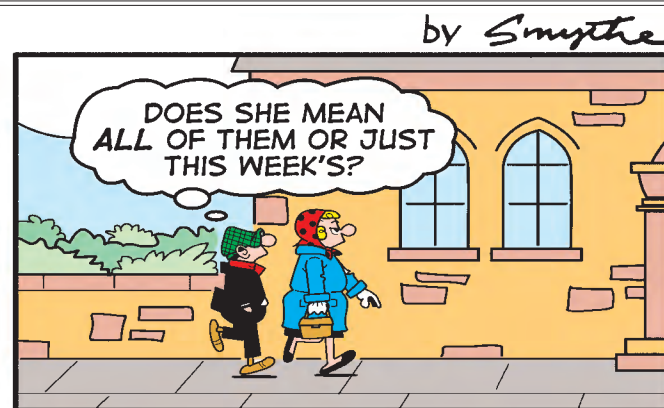
include: keeping a respectful distance of at least 200 feet, respect slow/no-wake zones and rules, don’t fish next to a loon, leave native vegetation and woody debris on the shore and in the water, use four-stroke motors or no motors at all, and consider getting involved in loon conservation by contacting the Wisconsin LoonWatch at the Sigurd Olson Environmental Institute at Northland College in Ashland.

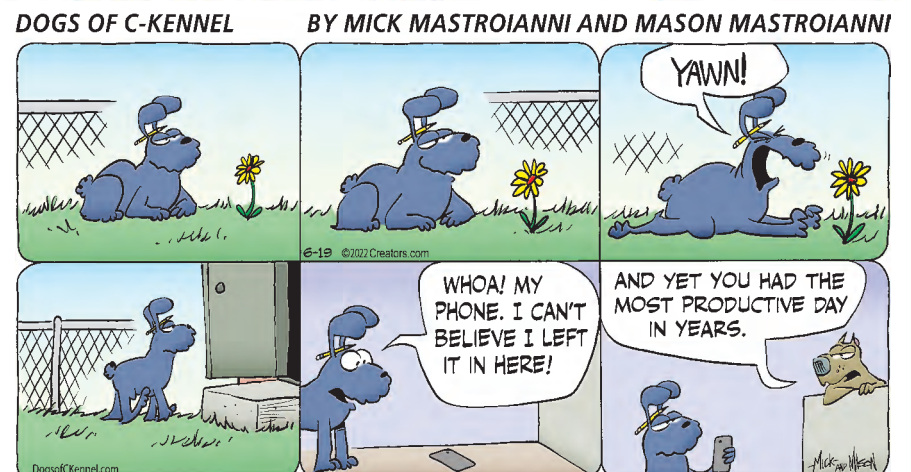
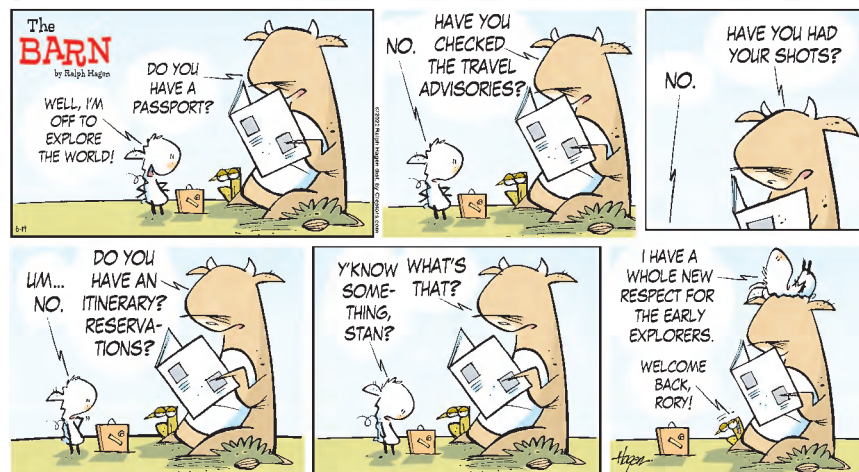
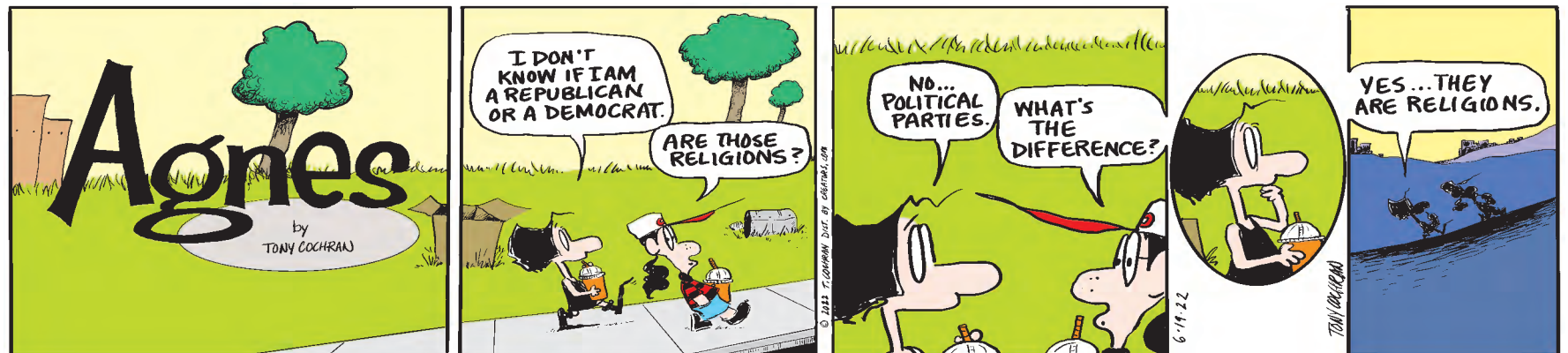
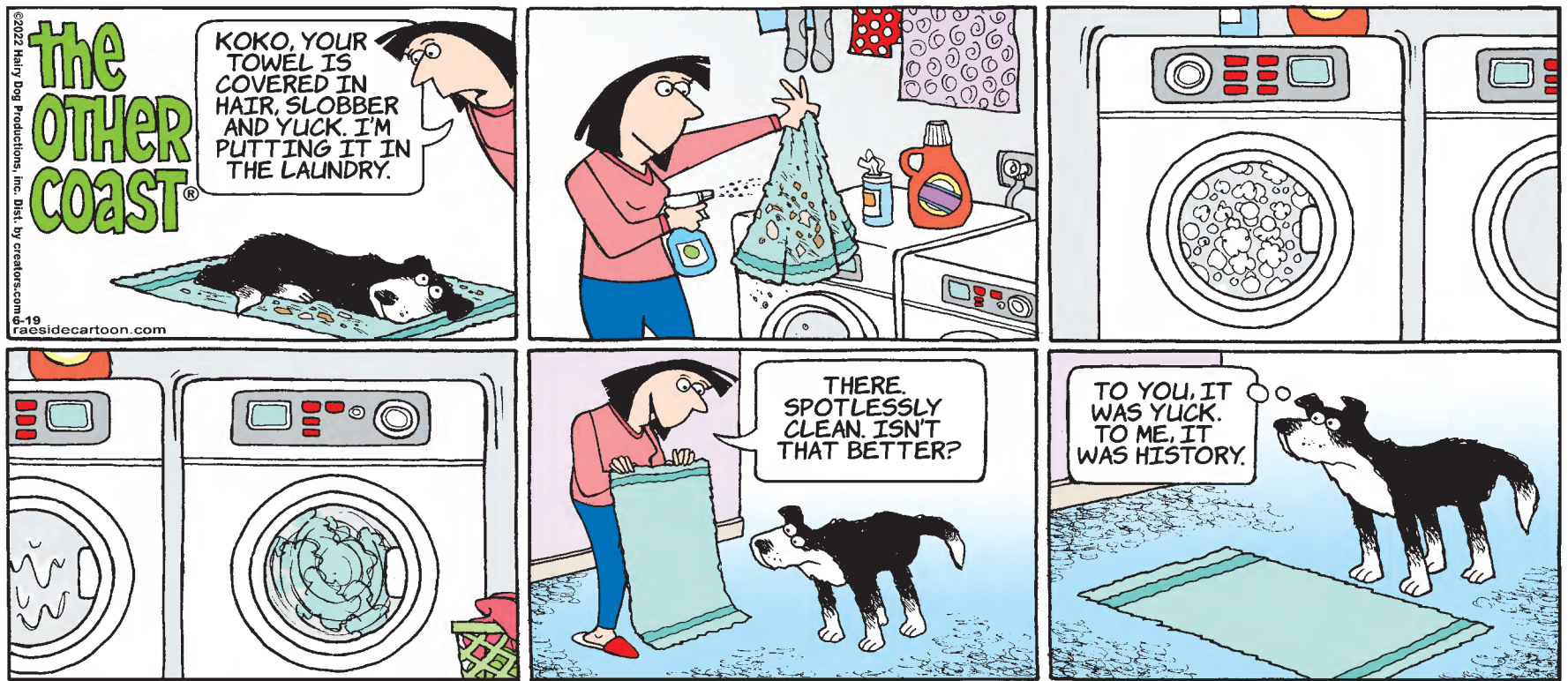
If you want to see the common loon in action, The Loon Preservation Committee has a web site, <https://loon.org/looncam>, where you can watch a live camera set up on a loon nest along with videos and highly entertaining written accounts of the nest activities.

National Geographic claims the loon got its name because of how clumsily they walk on land, perhaps because of the Old English word *luume* for awkward, or the Scandinavian word *lum* meaning clumsy. Whatever the reason, I, for one, will call them a sign of wonder as I yearn to hear their enchanting call welcoming me to the wilderness once again.

No taking a knee for many older patients

Knee pain is one of the most common complaints of older patients that I see. More than 20 million Americans suffer from osteoarthritis of the knee, and this number is expected to double over the next two decades.

If you are among those afflicted with this disease, you know how painful every day can be. For most people with osteoarthritis of the knee, the pain worsens with activity and gets better with rest. You may feel like you are on a roller coaster with bad spells followed by periods of relative relief, and as the disease advances, the pain may become constant.

Osteoarthritis of the knee is a major cause of disability in the United States, and treatment costs billions of dollars every year. Osteoarthritis is also called degenerative arthritis or wear-and-tear arthritis. Arthritis is what hap-

pens when the cartilage tissue that protects the bones wears away. Over a period of years, the joint slowly changes. In severe cases, when the cartilage is gone, the thickened bone ends rub against each other and wear away.

Currently, numerous therapies are used to treat osteoarthritis knee pain. The foundations of these treatments are weight loss and strengthening of the knee muscles. Evidence confirms that exercise and weight loss reduce pain and improve physical function in patients with osteoarthritis of the knee.

Being overweight can contribute to the symptoms and to the degeneration of the knee. Therefore,

low-impact aerobic exercise and weight loss are recommended. Also, exercises to strengthen the quadriceps (e.g., strengthening by flexing or extending the knee against resistance) are important for long-term improvement.

Enhanced knee stability results in better functional performance of the lower extremity. Therefore, increasing both extensor and flexor muscle strength should be an essential aim of exercise therapy in patients with knee osteoarthritis.

Researchers have found that topical non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) reduce pain. These analgesics provide considerable pain relief for those with osteoarthritis of the knee. Topical NSAIDs not only appear to provide relief from pain and joint stiffness, but also improve levels of functional disability in patients with knee osteoarthritis.

Evidence also shows that manual mobilization, acupuncture and low-level laser therapy also reduce pain from knee arthritis. However, magnets and foot orthotics do not offer pain relief compared to placebo. Additionally, injections with hyaluronic acid, steroids and platelet-rich plasma haven't shown any long-term benefit.

For those who are considering surgery for an osteoarthritic knee, the news is not good. Three high-quality randomized clinical trials have found no benefit from arthroscopic surgery compared with sham/placebo surgery. As always, ask your doctor for advice regarding your specific diagnosis and treatment.
