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Tauchen looks back at the difference he's made

Bonduel Assemblyman stepping back from state politics

Gary Tauchen is stepping down after 16 years in the Wisconsin Legislature, but he's not slowing down.

The Bonduel Republican has represented Assembly District 6 — which covers most of Shawano County and portions of Waupaca, Outagamie and Brown counties — since first running for the seat in 2006. He announced last year that his current term, which is up for reelection in November, will be his last.

Tauchen graduated from Bonduel High School in 1971, attended the University of Wisconsin-Madison from 1971-72 and earned a bachelor's degree in animal science in 1976 from UW-River Falls.

Tauchen, his father, Herb, and Herb's late son, Al, started Tauchen's Harmony Valley Farm near Bonduel in 1976. Gary still has a hand in the farm, along with his brothers, Steve and Greg.

Years of involvement with agriculture-related organizations such as the Wisconsin Farm Bureau, University of Wisconsin Center for Dairy Profitability and the Professional Dairy Producers of Wisconsin led Tauchen to run for the 6th Assembly District seat after John Ainsworth announced he would not run for a ninth two-year term.

Tauchen believed he could make a difference at the state level.

"I was involved on a lot of boards of directors with agricultural things," he said. "I chaired quite a few organizations, and I was appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture to advise him and world trade negotiators under (presidents Bill) Clinton and (George) Bush. I spent a lot of time out in Washington, D.C., from 1999 to 2003. I had quite a bit of experience influencing things on the state, national and international level."

Tauchen said his dairy farming background helped him in the Legislature.

"When you farm, you learn how to

work and you learn responsibility and priorities, all those kinds of things," he said. "I'm sure it impacted a lot of decisions I've made over time."

Tauchen currently chairs the Assembly's Committee on

Agriculture and is also a member of its Committee on Energy and Utilities, Committee on State Affairs and Committee on Tourism.

"I'm chairing the agriculture committee and have been on that committee ever since I got here," Tauchen said. "It's a very influential committee. Agriculture is a \$105 billion business in the state and it's one of the top three economic drivers, with manufacturing and tourism."

"We work really well together in the Assembly," Tauchen said. "We generally work as a group and discuss all the issues, decide which ought to be priorities and work together to make it happen. Whether you author or co-author something or vote on it, I think you have to convince people that whatever you do is going to be beneficial to the state of Wisconsin."

"There are quite a few pieces of legislation that I've been involved in," he said. "To me, there are six big issues for the state: the workforce, or employees; the environment; food safety and animal health; land use; global trade; and energy. Those are my top six. I've tried to impact all of those areas in some way or another because they're all important. Those are not just important to agriculture, but to everybody."

According to the Wisconsin Elections Commission, seven candidates — six Republicans and one Democrat — have filed nomination papers to run for Tauchen's seat: Republicans Matthew Abert of Appleton, Peter Schmidt of Bonduel, Dean Neubert of Hortonville, Nathan Michael of Tigerton, Craig Ar-

rowood of Shawano and David Kohn of Bonduel; and Democrat William Switalla of Wittenberg.

The six Republican candidates are on the ballot in a primary election on Aug. 9, with the general election set for Nov. 8.

"I think 16 years is long enough," Tauchen said. "I was 52 when I ran for office, and I'll be 69 when I retire. If you're going to do a good job, you've got to put the time and effort in. It's a lot easier for a younger person to get to the places they need to get."

"I suppose I could keep doing it, but it's good to get new blood and new ideas in every once in awhile," he added. "The odds of beating a sitting incumbent since 1940 are 8%. That essentially says unless you screw up, you're going to be reelected. If you don't give people an opportunity, you never know what they can do."

Although Tauchen is stepping down from the Assembly, he plans to remain active in agricultural-related matters.

"I have several special projects that I'm going to be working on down here in Madison, at least half a dozen," he said. "The most important one is a digester project, the Wisconsin Agriculture-Carbon/Energy/Water Initiative. It'll provide a new income source for the farm population with carbon, improve water quality and provide energy. We've been working on this project for 1½ years, and we still have about a year left before we'll be ready to make reasonable recommendations to the Legislature."

Tauchen said he will always remember the colleagues he worked with in Madison.

"When you work on big projects and pieces of legislation together, you really develop a strong relationship," he said. "The process can be a little overwhelming, but the system is what it is. If you work within it, you have the ability to make substantial changes."

"I always say it's like a baseball game," he said. "You can't affect it unless you're in it."

Study confirms Wittenberg needs housing

Wittenberg Area Development Corp. working with S.C. Swiderski for housing

A Shawano County housing study concludes that the Wittenberg community needs more housing.

Peter Thillman, Shawano County Economic Progress Inc. chief economic development officer, said that the Wittenberg community does not have enough market-rate housing during a report the Wittenberg Village Board meeting on June 20.

“Our issue statewide has been a workforce affordable housing issue,” said Thillman. “Our affordable housing has been consumed by people who could live in market-rate housing.”

According to Thillman, market rate is \$320,000 for starter homes and \$850 to \$1,400 for rent in apartments.

“Right now, we are at record high levels,” said Thillman. “The reason that the sales have soared, is because

there is no inventory.”

He noted that especially on the western and eastern edges of the county, people who work in those communities are not living in those communities.

“There is no housing for these entry-level employees to live in the county, so they live in Weston, or Howard or Pulaski,” said Thillman. “In three to five years, they are working in Weston, or Howard or Pulaski. The point is that we need to start treating that housing in these communities to retain the employees.”

Wittenberg Area Development Corp. member Jerry Aanonsen said the organization is working with S.C. Swiderski to look at housing in the area.

“We were told that they were looking at starting in the spring of 2024,” said Aanonsen. “They are talking about two 15-unit apartments. We are looking at the industrial park for them.”

Wittenberg Town Board President and WADC member Dick Beversdorf explained that S.C. Swiderski wants 6.8 acres to put up buildings.

“They are going to do a study of their own,” said Beversdorf. “If we do this, we have to take the land out of the industrial park.”

Village board member Dave Timm added that the village should consider taking out 14 acres in case they want more housing later.

Beversdorf added that the village board may want to think about adding another TIF district.

“When they come to meet with us, they are going to ask us if we have anything that we can offer them,” said Beversdorf. “As of right now, the only thing that we have to offer is that seven acres of land. If we have a TIF, we could offer them some other incentives. When they come here and we start talking about 15 units or more, we are talking millions of dollars. When the TIF is paid off, that’s a lot of extra tax dollars that are

going to roll through. It is something that we need to think about if we want to make another TIF.”

Beversdorf added that WADC has been in communication with Ehlers Inc. out of Madison to take land out of the business park that could be used for housing.

Village Board President Bill Switalla showed his support for bringing for housing to Wittenberg.

“I think that this is very necessary,” said Switalla.

Beversdorf echoed what Thillman said, saying that in order to keep the workforce in Wittenberg, there needs to be more housing.

“If we want Wittenberg to grow and do things, we need to have housing available,” said Beversdorf.

The village board unanimously voted in favor of contacting Ehlers Inc. about taking out 14 acres of land in the business park to get housing started.

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Shawano County changes to temporary hours

The Shawano County Board of Supervisors unanimously voted June 22 in favor of approving a temporary work rule regarding the hours of operation for county employees and services.

The normal hours for most of the Shawano County department offices have been 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. The new hours are 7 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday-Thursday and 7 a.m.-11 a.m. Friday.

County Board Chairman Tom Kautza said the county is experimenting with the hours as a “test run.”

“If it doesn’t work out, we will go back to our normal hours,” Kautza said. “If it does work out and everyone is happy, then we leave it.”

Other municipalities have passed similar changes in operating hours, he said.

“This is another way to try and make things a little bit better for our current employees, because I think we have a 20% turnover rate,” Kautza said.

Shawano County Administrative Coordinator Jim Davel said the change could add some flexibility for county employees.

“I talked to the city and these are the same hours that the city runs,” said Davel. “It has been very well received from their employees ... We need to have flexibility with things other than just pay,” said Davel.

Kautza added that these employees who work from home would also adhere to these hours.

“We are looking at trying more things like this,” said Kautza. “When you think about that turnover ratio, that is one in five people. So, we have to go with being flexible with people working from home too.”

Davel said appointments will be available for people coming to court-house for marriage certificates later on Friday, for example for a marriage certificate. Certain essential services will still be provided on a 24-hour basis.

“I am thinking that this will work out,” added Kautza.

Virgil and Denean Hill called the event a success

Twelve fighters put their skills on display for the community in Wittenberg on June 25.

Ho-Chunk Gaming Wittenberg hosted a fight night that involved six contests, with five fights featuring boxing and one featuring Brazilian jiu-jitsu.

Boxing Hall of Famer Virgil Hill and his wife, Denean Hill, who is an Olympic gold medalist in track and field, promoted the fights in Wittenberg, like they did before the

COVID-19 pandemic.

“Most of our fights have been fought on Native American land,”

said Virgil Hill. “These fights were more than just fights, they were a show — entertainment.”

“We did a show here (Wittenberg) pre-COVID,” said Denean Hill. “It went well and we said that we would like to do a show here as a yearly event.”

Ho-Chunk Gaming Wittenberg Marketing Director Tracy Pecore said this year’s event was the fifth show at the casino.

“It is exciting because we are bringing this back after COVID,” said Pecore. “These are always greatly received.”

Virgil Hill said that through all of the factors that go into the show, the June 25 event was a success.

“We look at the fight, we look at the crowd, we look at concessions, and we look at the referees and the commission, among other things,” said Virgil Hill. “We are looking at a number of different things and it went well.”

Virgil Hill said that he and

Denean Hill's major reasoning for promoting fights is to help get lesser-known fighters to showcase their talents in the boxing ring.

"That's our whole thing," said Virgil Hill. "We do four- and six-round fights. For the kids that we are trying to reach, this is a building block. We are trying to get them to that next level."

Both of the promoters stated that they have seen fighters in smaller venues like Wittenberg move up the ranks and appear on ESPN or pay per view.

"You have to nourish the talent," said Virgil Hill. "You have to make sure that you don't overuse or abuse it. You have to help them help themselves."

Denean Hill said that each venue that they go to is different and adds something that they haven't seen before.

"This is probably the smallest casino that we work with," said Denean Hill.

"People love this here, though," said Virgil Hill. "The energy is unbelievable. The energy there was stronger than any other fight that we have had here or anywhere else."

Because Ho-Chunk Gaming Wittenberg does not have a venue to accommodate a ring and crowd, the fights were held in the parking lot under a tent.

"I like the tent, because it brings the crowd together," said Virgil Hill.

"This way it is a little more personable," said Denean Hill.

Pecore added that each event that they host is in the parking lot under a tent.

"Doing this so many years, we have made so many different contacts to make this work," said Pecore. "It is a big plus for bringing people here."

Pecore added that she has noticed more visitors coming to the event and the casino.

"Each time it grows a little bit more," said Pecore. "I think that the word just keeps getting out there that this is a fun event. People are always asking us when is boxing going to be back."

Along with helping these lesser-known boxers, Denean Hill said that another goal of theirs is to get the community to come together to enjoy entertainment. She added that some of the boxers are local to the specific area.

"We are trying to do two things, get the community together and promote local athletes," said Denean Hill. "We want to help build

Finally, Pecore added that she

enjoys working the boxing events.

"This is something that I look forward to," said Pecore. "Everything behind the scenes can be

stressful, but my crew puts on a good show and we get it done."

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Witt-Birn approves capital purchases

Purchases include buses, saw mill, cafeteria tables

New purchases and capital projects are at the forefront for the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District, as the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School Board approved a group of capital purchases during its meeting on June 27.

The first capital purchase that was discussed was two new school buses.

"We have a 2017 International bus from Midstate Truck available for \$45,000," said Superintendent Garrett Rogowski. "The 2017 has 75,000 miles on it. The 2018 bus is for \$49,000 and has 85,000 miles on it. Both are pretty loaded, with luggage racks."

Rogowski added that both busses are ready to be driven.

"It feels like they are definitely worth purchasing," said Rogowski.

"We will recycle two of our old ones out. They strip those out and use the parts for other busses."

He added that the 2018 bus would be one of the newer busses in the school district's fleet.

"Four years ago, we purchased a brand new Bluebird bus that was just your basic, 72-passenger vehicle — that was \$85,000," said Rogowski. "So, when you get an opportunity like this, you'd like to take advantage of it."

Rogowski noted that the budget for this is \$120,000. He added that the \$120,000 will cover the price of the busses, as well as a camera system that will be installed in the vehicles.

Second, the board discussed the purchase of a hydraulic saw mill for their technical education classes.

"This saw mill could really provide a unique experience that most kids in most schools won't get," said Rogowski.

For the total saw mill unit, the cost is \$29,965 plus shipping.

Technology education teacher Caleb McPhail said this is a way to incorporate logging into his lesson plans and classroom.

"If you look around our area, logging is huge," said McPhail. "You don't have to have a huge mill to start producing your own lumber. This is just to help see where lumber comes from, the different characteristics of wood and why you would want to make certain things out of certain kinds of wood. I think that this would really help to bring it all together for our students."

McPhail added that the wood shop class would be working with the forestry class to cut and work with trees.

"I think that when people starting hearing about his, they will get on board with what we need for wood," said McPhail. "I don't want to sit on a \$30,000 saw mill and have it parked in a garage."

He added that a goal of the class is to cut the lumber, dry the wood and eventually build the wood into furniture.

"That is when the students will really see the differences in properties in that wood," said McPhail.

Rogowski added that due to safety, the recommendation is for a hydraulic saw mill.

"We are not going to get any-

thing bigger than what our little trailer can hold," said McPhail.

Next, the Witt-Birn School Board discussed how they are going to spend their Fund 50 balance. A Fund 50 is used to account and report transactions of a school district's food and community service activities.

"We get such a significant reimbursement on free meals that our Fund 50 is exploding," said Rogowski. "It can only be used for items relating to food service. The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction is requiring Wittenberg-Birnamwood to spend out Fund 50."

Rogowski said that the school district intends to replace food services tables with part of that fund.

"Our new tables would have Chargers logos on them and they would have the attached larger-sized stools," said Rogowski. "New tables would also be purchased for the area between the commons and the foyer."

He added that the price for 12 round tables, four rectangular tables and eight smaller tables would be \$59,286 from Marshfield Book and Stationery.

Suring School District saga far from over

This year is not the best one for some local school districts. I've written my fair share about the strife that the Shawano School District is going through, with a mass exodus of staff, a disconnect between the district administration and the community, and the looming possibility that there will be fewer dollars to pay for building needs and provide staff with a paycheck.

However, when I've been out and about in the community, I've mentioned to folks that it could be worse — like with the Suring School District.

While Shawano's superintendent is not very popular with folks in the community, at least Randi Anderson hasn't been charged with any crimes like Kelly Casper was. Suring was shaken to the core earlier this year with the news that several teenage girls had been stripped down to their underwear while a search was conducted for vaping devices. It didn't just cause the community to rage against school officials, it prompted the district attorney to file charges and claim false imprisonment, which could have resulted in a six-year sentence for each of the six counts.

Casper opted to leave the district entirely and, even though there is an interim superintendent in place, eventually new leadership will need to be found. That is going to require some tough questions to be asked.

Despite the fact that it was determined that no crime had been committed, it doesn't diminish the reality that the girls involved in the scandal have been impacted. They were stripped without parents being informed beforehand, so any candidates hoping to be the new head of the district will need to be asked how they view discipline in general and also how such incidents will be handled in the future. Anyone adopting Casper's philosophy for handling students potentially possessing contraband

should be passed over.

Besides hiring someone that won't potentially put the school district in legal turmoil faster than a speeding bullet, the Suring School Board should also adopt rules that show the boundaries of what administrators can do when disciplining students. Just as the popular corporal punishment of yesteryear has faded into history, the ability for administrators to strip students arbitrarily should also be curtailed. Casper obviously saw nothing wrong with her actions at the time, but a written policy would make it clear that such decisions should not be repeated.

The school board might also want to do an audit of how it addresses such incidents in the future. The strip searches took place Jan. 18, but it took almost six weeks for the board to make a statement, instead ducking behind closed doors at least three times to discuss the issue. At the very least, board members should be prepared to face the public after its first closed session, should a severe incident take place again.

Parents and community members should insist on being a part of re-

building efforts. Trust has been shattered for many in Suring, similarly to what's been going on in Shawano, and the only way the school can ever be seen with a modicum of respect is to keep the lines of communication wide open, well beyond what's expected. Districts are already seeing a loss in student enrollment; being seen as a district where adults can potentially make you naked and afraid risks losing students even faster, along with the state aid that comes with their being a part of the school system.

Needless to say, what has happened in Suring is a reminder of the importance for parents to take an active role in their children's education. While the whole community doesn't need to create standing-room only conditions at school board meetings, keeping abreast of what's going on in the school system can help reduce the chance that something like this will happen again.

Everyone has some heavy homework in the next few months. It's time to get at it.

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Annie's Campground in receivership

Receiver has hired manager to run facility this summer

Shawano County Circuit Court Judge Katherine Sloma is scheduled to hear a motion July 11 to auction off the assets of Annie's Campground, LLC in the Town of Seneca.

Seth E. Dizard, who was appointed receiver of the property in May, filed the motion June 27 to "to sell substantially all of the debtor's assets pursuant to auction terms and procedures, free and clear of all liens, claims, leasehold interests and encumbrances."

The campground is owned by Ann Retzlaff, who has filed a number of handwritten documents objecting to the process from the Shawano County Jail. She is being held there pending various charges related to a vehicle chase through Shawano and Menominee counties and her subsequent failure to appear at court hearings.

In one of those documents, filed June 19, Retzlaff asserts the receivership process violates her constitutionally protected rights against unreasonable search and seizure, and that the proceedings have been held without her being able to attend.

"De facto court was held without the clerk of court calling me out of my false imprisonment to make my special appearance and then recorded that Annie's Campground was not there," Retzlaff wrote. "The clerk of courts/Shawano County controls all my movements and knows where I am."

Online court minutes indicate that mortgage holder Bank First filed to have the property placed in receivership and Dizard was appointed May 5. Hearings were held May 25 and June 13; at the first hearing, the minutes say "no attorney appeared for the LLC," and Dizard is listed as representing Annie's Campground at both hearings.

Dizard filed an interim report June 10 stating that as of April 25, Annie's Campground owed Bank First a total of \$1,458,394.73, not including attorney fees and collection costs.

Bank First asked for the receivership arguing that "Annie's Campground is insolvent or in imminent danger of insolvency and was concerned about the operation of the campground due to Ms. Retzlaff's incarceration and hostile encounters with police and government officials," Dizard wrote.

The state departments of Revenue and Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) were days away from ordering the campground closed for lack of a seller's permit and three failed inspections. Also, the Town of Seneca informed Dizard's manager that the campground's alcohol beverage license was in danger of non-renewal for failure to pay property taxes in 2020 and 2021.

Dizard reported that he obtained extensions from the two state agencies to remedy the violations and remain open, and he paid past-due property taxes of more than \$25,000

and applied to renew the liquor license. He also hired a vendor to maintain and treat the ponds at the campground, and he paid past-due invoices to restore phone and internet services that had been disconnected.

"The appointment of a receiver of Annie's Campground came not a moment too soon," Dizard wrote, saying he and his manager "have stabilized operations, remedied numerous violations that affect the health and safety of the campground, and prepared the campground for the summer season of camping. Seasonal campers have been cooperative and excited about the work being performed on the campground."

For her part, Retzlaff maintained that many monetary issues are the result of illegal actions against her by authorities.

"Due to the negative publicity I have received the past two years

and continued law enforcement harassment, my customers have chosen not to pay their invoices," she wrote in a June 3 petition to dismiss the case, blaming the failure to pay "primarily due to the defamation of character from our biased local, state and even national press. Why? All I have done was stand up for my rights and protect myself, my family, my property, my staff, my customers."

Retzlaff said she is being "harassed, stalked, falsely accused, falsely imprisoned" because she went to the aid of one of her employees, whom she said called for a ride to get away from a place where sex trafficking and drug trafficking was reportedly occurring.

Assuming the motion to sell off the campground assets is approved, Sloma has scheduled a hearing for Aug. 23 to confirm the sale.

Homeless man held on \$50K cash bond

Wallace charged with recklessly endangering safety, other crimes relating to incident

A 31-year-old homeless man is facing multiple felony and misdemeanor charges in relation to a June 20 disturbance call in the Town of Washington.

Lanathan Wallace has been charged with one count of second degree recklessly endangering safety, 10 counts of bail jumping, two misdemeanor counts of battery and two misdemeanor counts of disorderly conduct.

He faces up to 10 years in prison along with \$25,000 in fines for second degree recklessly endangering safety, nine months and a \$10,000 fine for each misdemeanor battery charge, 90 days and a \$1,000 fine for each disorderly conduct charge and a \$10,000 fine and six years for each bail jumping count if convicted.

The criminal complaint states that

a Shawano County deputy responded to a possible active disturbance at W4356 Country Lane in the Town of Washington. Wallace was allegedly threatening to kill everyone in the house and was dumping a bunch of fluids down the drain. The complaint stated that Wallace had knives in his hand and made the comment that he would kill everyone if the cops showed up.

Four deputies arrived to the residence to see Wallace standing on the porch, according to the complaint. A deputy attempted to talk to Wallace multiple times about what happened, but he stood silent and would not respond to questions. After deputies spoke with others in the house, there was probable cause for Wallace to be arrested for two counts of battery and two counts of disorderly conduct.

According to the summary of

the victim's statement, Wallace had returned to the residence that he was staying at and began gathering his belongings. From there, it was stated that Wallace began dumping soda and water down the drain. At that point, the victim woke up and became upset with Wallace, putting her hand on his shoulder. Wallace then allegedly yelled an expletive at the victim and struck her in the face. Wallace also allegedly continued to punch the victim when she was on the ground.

Wallace allegedly struck another victim, who was trying to break up the situation. After punching the second person, Wallace allegedly went back to the first victim and continued to punch her. After the victim threatened to call the police, Wallace allegedly grabbed all of the knives from the knife block, held them in his hands and said, "Go ahead and call them and see what hap-

pens. The only way I am leaving is in a blood bath."

The first victim then allegedly grabbed her purse and left the residence. The second victim stayed and according to the complaint, anytime that he tried to talk to Wallace, he would threaten to strike him with a closed fist. Wallace was allegedly using profane language and at one point grabbed one of the knives and put the knife to the victim's throat, saying, "I oughta slit your throat." The victim then said that he left the residence and began walking down the street when a deputy arrived.

Wallace was charged June 20, where Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge Katherine Sloma ordered him to be held on a \$50,000 cash bond.

"Working with different types of people is a big thing," said Curtin. "You are not going to please everybody and you have to learn to be okay with that. I have always said that, but it is a lot different when you actually put it into action."

In her position at the speedway and fairgrounds, Curtin said that she had a lot more time working one-on-one with other people.

"I have never really had a job like that before," said Curtin. "That can be

hard when you are new. Everyone who has been a part of the speedway has been there for 10-20 years."

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Shawano County Courthouse changes to temporary hours

The Shawano County Board of Supervisors unanimously voted June 22 in favor of approving a temporary work rule regarding the hours of operation for county employees and services.

The normal hours for most of the Shawano County department offices have been 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. The new hours are 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through

Thursday and 7 a.m. to 11 a.m. Friday.

County Board Chairman Tom Kautza said the county is experimenting with the hours as a "test run."

"If it doesn't work out, we will go back to our normal hours," Kautza said. "If it does work out and everyone is happy, then we leave it."

Other municipalities have passed similar changes in operating hours, he said.

"This is another way to try and make things a little bit better for our current employees, because I think we

have a 20% turnover rate," Kautza said.

Shawano County Administrative Coordinator Jim Davel said the change could add some flexibility for county employees.

"I talked to the city and these are the same hours that the city runs," said Davel. "It has been very well received from their employees ... We need to have flexibility with things other than just pay," said Davel.

Kautza added that these employees who work from home would also adhere to these hours.

"We are looking at trying more things like this," said Kautza. "When you think about that turnover ratio, that is one in five people. So, we have to go with being flexible with people working from home too."

Davel said appointments will be available for people coming to courthouse for marriage certificates later on Friday, for example for a marriage certificate. Certain essential services will still be provided on a 24-hour basis.

"I am thinking that this will work out," added Kautza.

Sentencing delayed due to new criminal case

Birnamwood woman accused in high-speed chase faces new charges

Theresa Gunderson was about to reach a plea deal with the Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court on charges of fleeing and eluding officers and first-degree recklessly endangering safety, among other things, but that has been quashed in light of new charges being filed against her.

Gunderson, 42, a Birnamwood resident, was due to appear in court June 28 for her final pre-trial, according to court records, and the plea deal would have been addressed then. However, according to Assistant District Attorney Joseph Kaupie, one of the stipulations of the plea deal was to not commit any further crimes.

That was apparently violated as a result, although online court records have not shown any additional charges filed against Gunderson, who is back in the Shawano County Jail and has not been able to post the new bond. Defense Attorney Daniel Mitchell said that he is looking at a plea deal with the district attorney's office on the new charges, as well, but any deal will hinge on what the blood tests show. Those are currently with the state crime lab and are expected to take at least 60 days to receive due to a backlog.

"I certainly can't hold that against (DA Greg Parker)," Mitchell said.

"We'd be looking at getting an offer in 60-75 days. I understand there may be a new global offer forthcoming including the cases she's already pled to."

Gunderson was charged in May with one count of attempting to flee or elude an officer, one count of first-degree recklessly endangering safety, one count of resisting an officer — causing a soft tissue injury to an officer, one count of possession of an electric weapon, nine counts of bail jumping, and one misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer.

She faces up to 12½ years in prison along with \$10,000 in fines for first-degree recklessly endangering safety, six years in prison along with a \$10,000 fine for resisting an officer — causing a soft tissue injury to the officer and six years in prison and a \$10,000 fine for each bail jumping count if convicted.

The new plea deal is expected to include previous charges from 2020. In December of that year, Gunderson was charged of burglary, resisting an officer, escape/criminal arrest and three counts of felony bail jumping. In March 2020, she was arrested and charged with second-offense possession of THC and possession of drug paraphernalia. Gunderson also has open charges from July 2020 involving disorderly conduct, resisting an officer and two counts of felony bail jumping, and one week later, she was charged with four more felony counts of bail jumping.

Gunderson's next court hearing is scheduled for 10 a.m. Sept. 1 in Branch 1 of the Shawano County Courthouse.

sense ways to deal with each one. Married life is full of times when stillness is the only way through a situation.

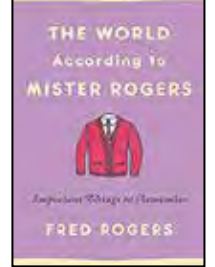
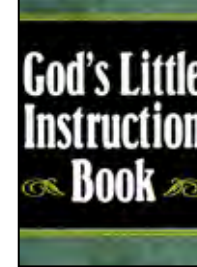

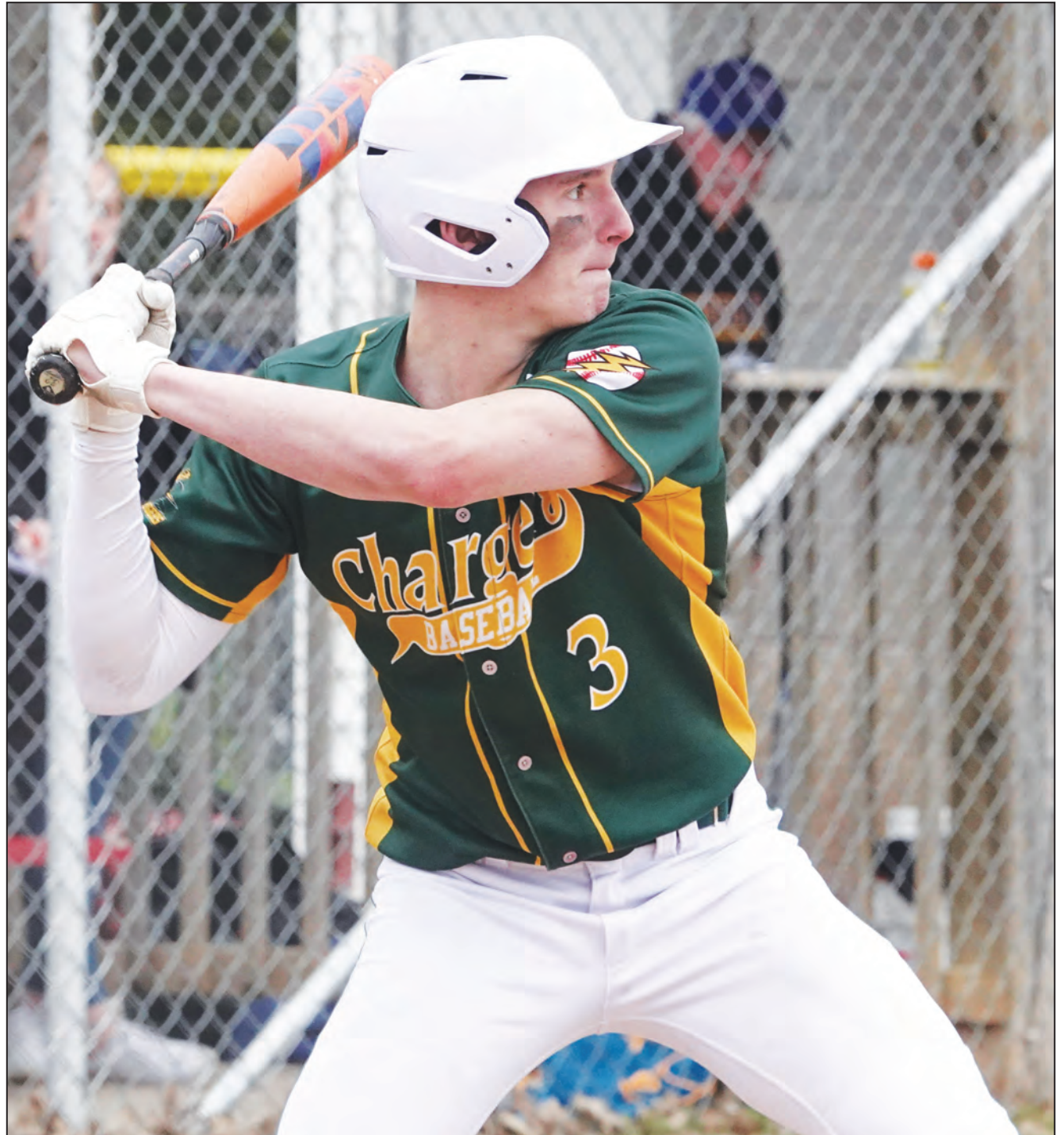
Wesolowski posted a .420 batting average and .494 on-base percentage during the season. The senior doubled seven times and had three triples and three homers. He also stole 11 bases.

Bucks draft G League Ignite wing MarJon Beauchamp with 24th pick

MarJon Beauchamp’s circuitous path to the Milwaukee Bucks included stops at four high schools, a community college and the NBA G League. Bucks assistant general manager Milt Newton said Beauchamp even was homeless at one point. The Bucks believe the hard road he took to the NBA will help the 6-foot-6 wing thrive now that he’s finally made it as the 24th overall pick in the draft. “I love the kind of the grittiness and the adversity that is part of his background and part of who he is, and his happiness and heart and spirit that he has in spite of all of it and kind of working with it,” general manager Jon Horst said. “I think it’s kind of made him who he is today.” As he heard his name get called June 23, Beauchamp couldn’t help but think back to all the obstacles he faced along the way. He fought back tears on

the way to the stage. “A lot was going through my head,” Beauchamp said. “I feel like I was going through all the phases I’ve been through. Going through my head, just everything I had to sacrifice to be here today. And, man, I’m just blessed to be here. I’m just ready to grow and become a great basketball player and just keep working, because that’s all I do. I work.” The hurdles Beauchamp faced on his road to the NBA could help him deal with whatever adversity he encounters in the league. “What it tells us is he’s a fighter,” Newton said. “It doesn’t matter if he gets knocked down, i.e. maybe not playing as much as he thinks he’s going to play, or not doing as well initially. He’s going to continue to get in the gym every day and compete and work hard.” It’s not just Beauchamp’s intangibles that had the Bucks insisting they didn’t expect him to still be around at

No. 24. They also love his athleticism and his ability to defend multiple positions with his 7-foot-1 wingspan. Beauchamp shapes up to be the first opening-round pick the Bucks have kept beyond draft night since taking Donte DiVincenzo 17th overall in 2018. DiVincenzo spent 3½ seasons with the Bucks before getting dealt to Sacramento in February as part of the four-team trade that brought them veteran center Serge Ibaka. Milwaukee hasn’t made much use of the draft lately as it has focused on acquiring veterans to support two-time MVP Giannis Antetokounmpo, the 15th overall selection in 2013. The Bucks’ playoff roster included only two players they drafted: 2020 second-round pick Jordan Nwora and 2021 selection Sandro Mamukelashvili. The Bucks also have limited first-round opportunities in future years because they’ve used much of their draft capital to obtain established players. They traded their 2023 first-round

That makes it important that Beauchamp emerges as a quality player as the Bucks attempt to lengthen their championship window. “I’m so excited,” Beauchamp said. “Playing with one of the greatest to play the game and a great team, to learn from them and to learn from Khris Middleton and all the vets they have, it’s amazing. I feel like God put me in this position to grow and to become one of them. That’s my plan, just to learn and keep growing.”

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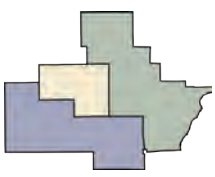

Trees beautify Middle Village neighborhood

Menominee Indian High School students lend hand as they blend science with culture

Fifty new trees will help beautify a neighborhood in Middle Village and continue to add to the lush greenery that makes up the Menominee Reservation.

For Menominee Indian High School's Sustainability Under one Nation (SUN) Squad, though, it was just another day in the outdoors.

The SUN Squad helped Menominee tribal officials to plant the trees in a quiet residential neighborhood at County Road G and Hickory Road, beautifying a park road and adding some green to its northern border facing state Highway 47 as a wind barrier. Among the 50 trees were 18 white pine trees, paid for through a \$5,000 Trees Forever grant from Alliant Energy.

Ryan Fish Sr., project manager for the tribe, said during the planting June 20 that he hopes the grants will be a yearly thing to help continue improving the environment.

"This is the first year this (grant) has been in Wisconsin," Fish said. "It's previously been in Iowa. My plan is to do this again next year and finish off the wind barrier."

High school science teacher Christine Fossen-Rades said providing the trees as a wind break helps out the environment, but the SUN Squad's involvement does something more.

"It continues the cycle of regeneration in this community, but more than that, it's a graduation ritual," Fossen-Rades said. "Everyone who graduates from this high school will have their own dedicated tree. Every tree will have a plaque to represent the graduation class. It's kind of how this whole project started out."

Even with the project being dedicated to students and education, the primary goal is to stave off climate change.

"This provides options for our youth to make a change in the community," Fossen-Rades said. "It empowers our kids. That's the bottom line to allow our youth know that they have an ability to change the route of our community."

According to Fish, the tree planting was supposed to take place in May, but with graduation and other activities dominating the community, it was decided to wait a month.

"It came so quick. We were awarded the grant, but I didn't have time to

alert the school," Fish said.

The trees planted were just under four feet tall. Fish said the tribe had tried planting smaller trees, but they did not take.

"Some of these are more established," Fish said. "We wanted to get a little bit bigger to see if they take better."

Fish noted the tribe had a pretty narrow list of what could be planted. Besides the white pines, spruce trees were also planted.

"We couldn't bring in a cherry tree," he said with a laugh. "Maples were also not allowed, even though I wanted to plant some maples."

Shawano Lawn and Stone provided most of the trees for the project and donated some mulch for the planting, according to Fish.

The SUN Squad has been doing environmental projects on the reservation for the last three years

with several of the tribe's departments, as well as with the College of Menominee Nation's Sustainability Development Institute, according to Fossen-Rades.

"They provide an education and an opportunity for our kids to participate," she said. "I'm very fortunate. I don't think many schools that are Indigenous-based collaborate culture with science, and that has really been embraced in our community. Every science lesson ultimately has a cultural aspect. They don't fight against each other. They're more complementary or advantageous to each other."

Among some of the projects the group has done include providing opposition to the Back Forty Mine project, conducting energy audits at the high school to promote efficiency, measuring fish for surveys, collaring bears, releasing sturgeon and more.

"I actually came out of retirement

to be in this job," Fossen-Rades said, noting she'd been a teacher in De Pere for 35 years before principal Chuck Raasch, who recently retired, asked her to come to Menominee Indian to help with the school's science and culture programs.

Fossen-Rades hopes that the lessons learned in things like planting trees will help her students to discover the importance of caring for the earth, noting that the school's administration has been very supportive of the SUN Squad's efforts.

"Every day, we go out and do something," Fossen-Rades said. "We've harvested wild rice and planted wild rice and seeded it. We're just doing things to improve our relationships and involve our students. Empowerment is something that kids need."

It's easy to enjoy simple pleasures of life

Riding tranquil back country roads alongside my husband in our side-by-side, I inhaled the warm fragrance of the gentle summer day and, slowly exhaling, felt great contentment. "Your horses are beautiful!" I called to her in passing.

On our wanderings around the county, I take a peek at other people's landscaping projects, what looks like it might work for me, what I would not like for me, what I appreciate looks great there. I marvel and gape unashamedly at the ingenuity of folks. Some places look like people love to live there, well-kept. Others, not so much. Those places pull at my heartstrings, for I find myself wondering if they are unable to tend, not so much they wouldn't want to tend.

Coming back home, I kick off my flip flops and walk out to our garden, the soft grass pleasant beneath my bare toes. It's a miracle from God alone that small, planted seeds shift and move deep within, then push face toward the sun to grow, forming green beans, potatoes, peas,

We also have planted a couple of apple trees and a plum tree. The plum tree was not producing well and, asking, we discovered plum trees need to be planted in pairs to encourage pollinating each other.

The gal we asked was very knowledgeable. Using her app "PictureThis Plant Identifier," she scanned her phone to the tree and was informed it was a Chinese plum. The popular cultivar to be compatible with our tree, we found, is a Toka plum. Time will tell if this new tree, already bought and planted, will work out. Patience.

I enjoy the simple pleasure of living off our land, harvesting garden produce and raising beef and pork to eat. A homegrown ribeye or a pork chop grilled to perfection along with

produce from the garden — a meaty potato, and a green salad with spinach, cukes, carrots, tomatoes — can satisfy me like no other meal.

Raising steers and swine for consumption, I have to keep in mind as I feed and care for them, that they are here for a season and a reason. I can't think too much. Detaching is a requirement or at the inevitable time they'd leave, I'd be a basket case.

That being said, I do enjoy their time on the farm. They are simply a pleasure to watch, especially those pigs. I've never been around pigs until these last few years, when my husband and I took to raising a few. Their squat bodies, flat-nosed snouts and perpetual smiles make me giggle. There is a pecking order for those four. I know already who is in charge. I try to help the one snubbed by giving it some extra room to feed. Using a long-handled stick, I poke the kingpin out of the way, shoving on his already sizable rump to encourage making room for his chums out there in the pigpen.

As far as our fruit production

goes, while our apple tree is not quite up to edible apples for humans, the pigs will enjoy a few every now and then. My freezer is stocked each late autumn with a good supply of raspberries for Jello, desserts and smoothies. I'm looking forward to sweet plums in time. When my mother-in-law was still alive, and I'd visit my soon-to-be-husband on this very farm, I'd pop some of her syrupy plums in my mouth, the sweet juice running down my chin.

By raising our own fruit, vegetables and meat, we assure self-sustainable food for our own table and to share with others. This, along with pleasant little jaunts around the county, are the simple pleasures of life.

NEW Media editor publishes 11th book, enjoys writing about freedom and liberty

“We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all Men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness —” So starts Warren Bluhm’s description of “Echoes of Freedom Past: Reopening, Reclaiming and Restoring Liberty,” his most recent book.

Bluhm is a writer of blogs and books. He’s also the editor-in-chief of the Shawano Leader, Oconto County Times Herald and Wittenberg Enterprise and Birnamwood News. Bluhm just published his 11th book on June 21.

Bluhm writes in the book’s introduction, “This is a little book about what used to be, what is, and what could be if we wish to reclaim it.”

The book is a compilation of his essays, blog posts and a short story about freedom and tyranny. Bluhm separated it into three parts: Freedom and the Bill of Rights; what has been happening in the last several years; and, hope for the future.

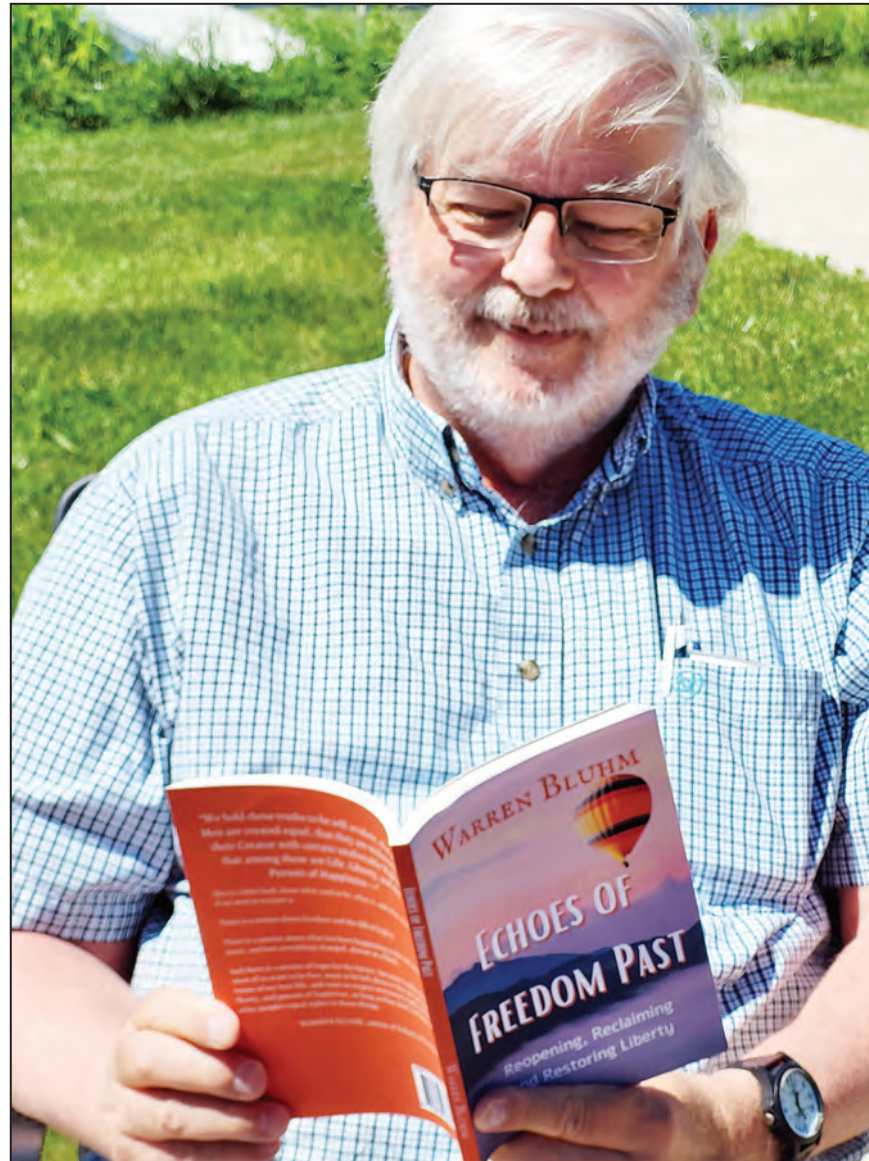
“I’ve always been a kind of live and let live kind of person,” Bluhm said. “That’s probably an outgrowth of my work as a journalist. I guess I trained myself to accept all points of view, walks of life, lifestyles, whatever, and I feel comfortable with that attitude. I think people need to be thinking in terms of the ‘other person’ and accepting diverse opinions. I am a big fan of the Bill of Rights.”

About a year ago, Bluhm wrote “Full,” also written with three sections.

“There’s a section called ‘The creative process.’ One is called ‘Live free or die,’ and the third one is more of encouraging things,” he said.

The concepts from “Full” lead directly into his new book.

“I put ‘Full’ out about a year ago, and I continued writing on those themes,” Bluhm said.

Explaining the “likes” he gets for his writing, Bluhm said: “You can’t really go by ‘likes,’ but when I write on those three themes, I get a lot of ‘likes’ for the creativity. I get a lot of ‘likes’ for the encouragement, and the freedom ones I put out there, sometimes no one likes it at all.

“If you don’t have freedom to express yourself or write what you want, or even gather to be with

friends, the encouragement and the creative process is going to be limited anyway. So that’s why I put out ‘Echoes of Freedom.’”

Bluhm explained that he likes talking about freedom because it’s his favorite thing. As a Libertarian, the man likes to write about liberty.

Bluhm’s long writing career started out in radio news, which he did for 22 years.

“I had to write 30 seconds to a

minute, I had to encapsulate a story that quickly,” Bluhm said. “And then when I got to newspapers, it’s still hard for me to write more than 15 column inches. I was a columnist, and one of my proudest achievements is I was twice named the Wisconsin Newspaper Association Local Columnist of the Year.”

He was a reporter and editor of community newspapers, becoming editor-in-chief for NEW Media about a year ago after the departure of Carol Ryczek. He started creative writing and book publishing a few years back, squeezing that in between his day job.

Keeping it short and sweet, the mantra of radio news, is ingrained in Bluhm.

“I seem to flourish in things that are 500 words, and that’s why I have three novels. I have novels that I never have finished,” Bluhm said. “Of my 11 books, only four of them are fiction. The fourth one is called “24 Flashes.” It’s 24 flash fictions. It’s got 24 stories, yet the paperback is 96 pages. Most of the books are collections from my blog.”

Bluhm noted that the book he’s known for best, “in my small audience,” is “Refuse to Be Afraid,” which saw a 10th anniversary edition published in 2020.

“When I started blogging, I came across this theme of everybody from drug companies to pesticide companies, to politicians, the whole concept of advertising is to get people afraid and produce a solution,” Bluhm said. “So, I just kept writing a series of blog posts about these people and what’s in it for them, who benefits if I’m afraid. The thing about politicians is part of the solution is always taking away a little of your liberty, which actually led to the new book. Refuse to be afraid, free yourself and then go ahead and pursue your dreams. That’s the gist of that book.”

Doctors, moms share experiences, support

ThedaCare providers offer advice for families amid formula shortage concerns

A national baby formula shortage is creating challenges for many families with more than 40-70% of top-selling brands reported to be out of stock in many locations throughout the country.

"It's terrifying to imagine running out of formula to feed your baby," said Dr. Bentley Thomason, a family medicine physician at ThedaCare Medical Center-Shawano. "The first thing I would recommend to parents or caregivers is that if you are having difficulty finding the formula you need for your baby, check several stores in your area — including grocery stores, supermarkets, big box stores, convenience stores and warehouse stores. I would go so far as to ask the store manager when their store typically receives their formula shipments and, if possible, plan to be at the store that day."

Dr. Nicole Ruske, another family medicine physician at ThedaCare-Shawano, agreed and added that asking family and friends to look for formula in their areas is another option.

"This is a time to seek help wherever you can to have a safe supply on hand," said Ruske. "If at all possible, I would recommend having a two-week supply to help give you time to secure additional formula before running out. However, we do understand at times that may not be possible, and our hearts go out to those families who are struggling to find the formula they need."

Ruske noted that many parents also are using social media platforms like Facebook to connect with other parents to learn where formula might be available and sometimes even share formula supplies.

The formula shortage developed because of pandemic-related supply chain issues and the closing of a production facility in February because of contamination. That factory was slated to reopen in early June. U.S. Food and Drug Administration officials recently publicly stated they believe formula supplies will return to normal by the end of July.

Thomason, herself a mom with a baby needing formula, encouraged parents to reach out to their baby's health care provider with any questions.

"We're here to help in any way we can," she said. "Many of our providers are parents and we understand the challenges our patients are facing. While we may not be able to provide the formula

supply, we are here to listen to concerns, and offer support when possible. Sometimes talking about what we are experiencing can help us all navigate the situation."

Thomason and Ruske offered suggestions for coping with the supply shortage, like if possible, be flexible with formula brands.

"If parents are using Enfamil, Similac or any other name brand, it's OK to switch to a store brand from Costco, CVS, Walmart, Target or reputable online sites such as Amazon," said Thomason. "The store brands are regulated by the FDA and are just as safe to use and often less expensive. The important thing is to stay within the type of formula you've been feeding; that is, stick with a milk-based or soy-based formula."

Formula should not be diluted, according to Thomason.

"Under no circumstances should caregivers dilute formula," Thomason said. "Diluting infant formula can be dangerous and even life threatening for babies, leading to a serious nutritional deficit and health issues. If you are having extreme difficulty finding the formula you need, please reach out to your provider. We can come up with a specialized diet for your infant based on local availability. I'm regularly keeping track of supplies in our area," she said.

Parents should also not make their own formula, according to Ruske.

"Commercially available baby formula is heavily regulated by the FDA to be a safe breast milk alternative/supplement to provide babies the nu-

trition they need," Ruske said. "Babies who have been fed homemade infant formula have suffered from hypocalcaemia (low calcium)."

Parents should also avoid substituting with regular whole cow's milk from the store.

"Regular cow's milk does not have the iron and other nutrients that babies need to thrive and grow," Ruske said. "That's why we generally don't recommend cow's milk before the age of 12 months."

Thomason added that families should check with their baby's provider if you are considering substituting with cow's milk.

The formula shortage may be particularly difficult for parents of babies who need specialty formulas. Both doctors stressed that parents should not wait until they are down to their last bottles of formula before making a change in formula brands or seeking help.

"It's always better to make changes to a baby's diet slowly," Thomason said. "If you must switch between formula brands, interchange one brand with the other and gradually introduce the new brand to your baby. That will be easier on his or her digestive system."

The doctors also noted that the U.S. government is now receiving shipments of formula from overseas and said parents should have no concerns about using formulas received from European countries, especially the United Kingdom and Australia. Ruske said that formulas from the U.K. are actually more regulated than those in the United States.
