Witt-Birn district expecting \$941K deficit in 2023-24

School district not looking at eliminating jobs

Wittenberg-Birnamwood Superintendent Garrett Rogowski walked the Witt-Birn School Board through an expected deficit of \$941,096 deficit for the 2023-24 budget during the board's March 27 meeting.

In the expected 2023-24 budget, Rogowski said that the revenues for the district drop from \$14,528,687 in the 2022-23 budget to \$14,201,812 for a difference of \$326,875. In terms of the expenses, it is expected that it increases from \$14,441,051 to \$15,142,908 for a difference of \$701,857. The difference in the 2023-24 budget between the expenses and the revenues equates to the expected deficit.

"This is so preliminary and we don't know the state budget cycle," said Rogowski. "A lot of things are going to be unknown until the summer or maybe even later, like in the fall as we approach the meeting where we set our levy. I just want to make sure that you are aware of the fact that this will change and hopefully will for the better. This is a very conservative budget estimate."

In terms of why there is a difference in the budget estimate for the upcoming school year, Rogowski pointed to a couple of a reasons. The first reason that he stated was \$153,919 difference in the property tax/equalized aid revenue.

"I don't know if that is going to happen, but based on everything that we know right now, that is what we have," said Rogowski.

He noted that the school district has been working under grants from the COVID-19 pandemic.

"What I have done is I funneled a lot of that, because we have to spend it, but it has a sunset — it drops off, because all of that is going to be gone and we are receiv-

ing that in hundreds of thousands of dollars," said Rogowski. "When it is gone, it is gone. So what we have done is that we have managed to pay for a lot of staff salaries and anything that was allowable through the grant money."

Rogowski said that the school district was able to take the money that would have normally been used to pay for staff salaries and put it into fund 46 — the long-term capital improvement fund.

"When you use that account it counts towards your shared cost — it counts towards you receiving as much state aid as allowable," said Rogowski. "So if we don't use it and push it into the fund balance then it is not going to count towards our shared cost, it is going to count towards unexpended dollars that we received. Then we receive less in state aid and tax payers will cover the difference. It will negatively impact all of us that live and own property in the district."

Talking about the major expenses differences, Rogowski said that the district always budgets with the thought of giving staff members raises. Assuming a 3% increase in salaries for 2023-23, the expense increases from \$6,560,304 to \$6,757,113 for an increase of \$196,809.

"Every single year in 14 years that I have been here, I can guarantee that there have been raises given to staff," said Rogowski. "What I can also guarantee you is that when insurance premiums come in higher than we would like, then that offsets the raise — I can't control that."

Rogowski then walked the board through how the school can supplement that \$941,096.

"The number one priority that we had was to keep people's jobs," said Rogowski.

For personnel, Rogowski pointed to eliminating a physical education teacher's responsibility for driver's education and contracting with an outside agency to save \$60,500.

"It eliminates a teaching position, but it does not, because we have a retirement and that teacher will keep their job," said Rogowski. "That teacher is still doing the classroom portion of driver's ed and then we have contracted with an outside agency to provide driver's ed."

To save \$68,000, Rogowski said that the school district does not need two middle school intervention/enrichment positions between Wittenberg and Birnamwood.

"We have to try to figure out a plan that supports the staff that affords them employment, but also affords them the opportunity to get back in the positions they desire and that is goal," said Rogowski.

With personnel shuffling, the district is looking at saving \$198,300. The district is also looking at saving \$230,172 from non-personal savings, like shifting larger maintenance budget costs to fund 46.

In regards to other potential savings, Rogowski pointed to \$200,000 from potential health reimbursement savings (HRA) under budget savings.

"This is me guessing and hoping that staff won't fully utilize their HRA," said Rogowski. "That they will be healthy, they won't get sick and won't go to the doctor. \$200,000 of it, hopefully we don't have to use and it is sitting there unused, so it is not counting against us."

Rogowski concluded the budget savings with potential savings of \$878,472.

"At the end that is \$878,472 and we are looking at \$941,096 and we think we will get there because we can defer a middle school ELA (English Language Arts) purchase," said Rogowski. "That would be \$41,000 that we budgeted, so now you are down to \$21,000 and we are probably close with Medicaid."

ELECTION 2023 —

WITTENBERG-BIRNAMWOOD SCHOOL BOARD DISTRICT 5

In the April 4 general election, voters in the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District Area 5 will be deciding on one spot on the board between two candidates.

Incumbent Bree Krueger-Schmidt will be defending her spot, while Trevor Szutkowski will be trying to get on the board.

NEW Media contacted each candidate with questions regarding various issues that the board has recently discussed or passed, to provide voters with the candidates' opinions on the issues.

What qualifies you to be a member of the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School Board?

Krueger-Schmidt: Having eight years of experience on the school board and residing in the area my entire life, I have a great understanding of our district and strive to represent our community's best interests. I take tremendous pride in being a graduate of WBHS, along with my parents, daughter and my son in the class of 2025.

Szutkowski: Most importantly, I have three children ages five, three and one. I grew up in Eland, WI and have been here for most of my life, between Eland and Wittenberg, so I have been in the school district and was raised in the school district. I have a vested interest with the children and the success of the school district for at least the next 15 years. I think that is the most important part of it. Secondly, my work background I think is very important for my qualifications. I am a Vice President of Commercial Lending at CoVantage Credit Union. In that work, I review and analyze budgets, profit and loss and income statements to make loan recommendations. I think that background is a valuable asset to our school board.

The school board has discussed new purchases and capital projects in the last year, including purchasing two school buses and a hydraulic saw mill for technical education. Are these and other capital projects

and purchases necessary?

Krueger-Schmidt: It is our responsibility to provide resources that are necessary for the safe operation of our schools, as well as provide our students with the best possible, sometimes industry standard equipment, that gives them both realistic and comprehensive experience that prepares them for post-secondary interest. The district tries if possible to budget for one new school bus annually. This keeps our fleet in great shape for all of the transportation needs. There are years where we are able to purchase lightly used buses, sometimes two, within the budget allocation for a new one. When we are able to do this, we take advantage of it, because it does not become available every year. Regarding the hydraulic saw mill, it actually was purchased entirely with grant funds. It gives students in our wood technology classes an amazing opportunity to build something right from the mill to a finished product. I think any parent of a student in tech ed class would value this educational opportunity. Not every school can provide that.

Szutkowski: I think capital purchases are important when they are needed, but our focus needs to be in the people that our teaching our kids. The school board is facing a \$900,000 expected budget deficit for the 2023-24 school year. Obviously there is a lot that can happen, that is just a projection, so any purchases made would have to be absolutely necessary, I believe. I think we also should look back and say, what kind of capital improvements did we do and let's not make that mistake in the future. A good analysis of a costs to potential benefit will have to be done to guide any of this decision making in the future.

In December, the school board discussed various methods of helping students to grow in academics, including face-to-face meetings, data compilation and analysis and support teams.

How do you think the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School Board can continue to help students grow in school?

Krueger-Schmidt: I think that it has become increasingly the responsibility of the school system to support students with their personal and academic growth. The roles of schools has expanded exponentially over the past decade, to include addressing much more than just academics. Unless you are immersed in that school experience, one does not realize the burden that our school staff faces every day. It is one that they welcome and should be commended for. Literacy and math are absolutely critical aspects of a child's education, as well as health and wellness, early childhood programs, technology standards and social and emotional influences on our student's readiness to attend each day. Let's not forget over the past year, the obstacles like dealing with COVID-19 and virtual education. In the end, what matters most is that we provide our students with a safe and enjoyable place that they enjoy coming to every day and where parents feel like their children are valued and provided with a high quality experience that prepares them for success in whatever interests and aspirations that they have.

Szutkowski: I think that the biggest thing we have coming down the road for the school district is that there are a lot of teachers who have been there for 20-plus years that are going to be retiring in the next 10-plus years. The success of the school district is going to start with those teachers. Replacing those teachers with someone equivalent is going to be a monumental task for the administration and school board, but is essential to this district. I think that the ideas that they have brought up is great. I think we are kind of middle-of-the-road as far as academics go, but everything is going to start with hiring the right teachers and having the people in place that help the

school district, like those current teachers do.

What is something that the school board is doing well and how can this trend continue?

Krueger-Schmidt: Our current school board members are a great group of individuals that have the best interests of our school district at heart. We certainly respect our administration, teachers and students and are open to listen and respond to the changing environment. By continuing to grow the relationships with our current school board, we'll be able to best serve our community.

Szutkowski: The current members of the school board really care about the success of the district. I think they are all people who have lived there their whole life. I don't think there is any agendas. Very importantly, I don't think there is any political inter-roads, which there shouldn't be. I believe they handled the pandemic well, when it was very difficult to make a decision that would make everybody happy.

What is something that the school board could improve upon and how can that be achieved?

Krueger-Schmidt: Our board always strives to improve communication and availability to community members. We try to be as approachable as we can to best serve the district to hear about issues as they arise and respond to them in an honest and timely matter. We are strong group that really respects everyone's opinion and can have a conversation and have a disagreement and listen to somebody else's opinion.

Szutkowski: Based on the projected budget deficit, I believe that they can do a better job supervising the execution of the budget. We don't create the budget, but we are the boss and the supervisor of the administration and I think that may be a little bit more involved in that process. I would take a hands on approach to make sure that budget missteps are avoided in the future.

15 students recognized for conservation contest

Shawano County Land Conservation poster contest saw 171 entries this year

Fifteen students were honored at the Shawano County Board of Supervisors meeting on March 22 for their success in the land conservation poster contest.

For the past five years, the Shawano County Land Conservation Department has hosted the contest to introduce students to various topics revolving around conservation. The students then get the opportunity to research and express their interpretation of that topic on a poster. This year, the topic entailed water and the effect it has on our lives.

The poster contest is split into four levels — local, area, state and national. The first-place finishers from the local level were forwarded to the Lake Michigan area contest. Four students placed first in the Lake Michigan Area contest and moved onto the state level contest. Birnamwood third grader Quinn Meverden finished the highest in the county, taking home a third-place finish at state.

The contest is also separated into grade divisions, with kindergarten through first grade representing one division, second through third grade representing a division, fourth through sixth grade, seventh through ninth grade and 10th through 12th grade representing a division.

"This year has been an awesome year for our poster contest," said Youth Education Committee Member and Land Conservation Office Assistant Mary George. "This year has been a year of firsts for Shawano County. It was the first time that we

had at least three submissions for each grade division. It was the first time we had winners for first, second and third places for each division."

This year, George said that a significant amount of students entered the contest, compared to years past.

"It was the most posters Shawano County has ever had submitted — 171 posters," said George. "It was the first time we had four out of five grade divisions win first place at the Wisconsin Land and Water Lake Michigan Area, which means that this is the first time we had four grade divisions go to the state poster contest."

George added that, along with the 171 posters, this year also featured the most schools partaking in the event, including LEADS Primary Charter School, Shawano Community Middle

School, Olga Brener Intermediate School, Sacred Heart Catholic School, St. Paul Lutheran School, Bowler Middle-High School, Marion High School, Wittenberg Elementary-Middle School and Birnamwood Elementary-Middle School.

"For a lot of them, it was hard to pick, because the ideas were just amazing," said George. "What amazed me is the teachers that stepped up to the plate. The art teacher at Sacred Heart (Stephanie Bendscheider) gave this as a class assignment for the whole school, kindergarten through 12th. There was 74 posters from Sacred Heart."

She said that giving these students the opportunity to research and display various conservation topics allows them to understand and learn

about conservation at a young age.

"A lot of conservationists will tell you that you have to teach the young, so that they can be good stewards of the land and water," said George. "It is important to bring these ideas at an early age to kind of give them the opportunity to think and ponder about those ideas. This poster contest gives them an outlet, too. Not all kids are jocks or have different interests, so this is their outlet."

Each student who placed in the local contest was given a certificate, a placement medal and a gift certificate from the Land Conservation Department. Students were also awarded with gifts from Seagrave Fire Apparatus for their efforts in this contest.

Work continues on 29 to remove paved markers

Work continues to progress on state Highway 29, as the Shawano County Highway Department is in the process of removing paved markers.

Single lanes have been closed between Shawano and Bonduel, something that people traveling through the area could see for the next month.

"Those raised pavement markers

are reflectors in the middle of the lane, right on the white center line, and they have reached their service life," said Shawano County Highway Commissioner Grant Bystol. "None of them reflect anymore."

Bystol said that the highway department is working to remove them because of their service life ending as well as reducing the risk for potential damage to vehicles.

"We have been having problems with potential vehicle tires getting punctured," said Bystol. "We are

going through and finding all of the loose ones and just removing them."

He added that when the highway was built in the mid-1990s, those paved markers were part of the design process.

"That was just a reflective marker — I think they are every 100 feet — just to delineate," said Bystol. "Headlights used to reflect off of them; now the current standard is more of a reflective tape that is grooved in."

Bystol called the paved markers

an old standard and a hazard.

"It is an old standard, plus they are all broken and none of them reflect anymore anyways, so they are just a hazard," said Bystol.

Since the project is being fit in between other highway projects, Bystol said work will continue on removing the paved markers, depending upon the weather. He estimated that the process will be off and on for the next month or so.

Shawano man charged with fleeing, fentanyl

Deputies were able to catch Stodall-Wheeler using taser, K-9

A Shawano man was charged March 24 with a multitude of charges, including second degree-recklessly endangering safety and possession of fentanyl after a March 23 arrest in the Town of Wescott.

Alex J. Stodall-Wheeler, 33, was charged with one count of operating a vehicle to flee/elude an officer, one count of possession of narcotic drugs, one count of possession of THC (second or subsequent offense), one count of second-degree recklessly endangering safety, one misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer, one misdemeanor count of possession of drug paraphernalia and one misdemeanor count of operating while

revoked.

If convicted, Stodall-Wheeler faces \$10,000 in fines and 3½ years in prison for each count of fleeing, possession of narcotic drugs, and possession of THC; \$25,000 and 10 years for second-degree recklessly endangering safety; \$10,000 and nine months for resisting or obstructing an officer; \$500 and 30 days for possession of drug paraphernalia; and \$2,500 and one year for operating while revoked.

According to the criminal complaint, a Shawano County sheriff's deputy was made aware of a vehicle leaving a drug house close to their location on County Road A in the Town of Wescott. The vehicle turned onto state Highway 47-55 and allegedly began traveling faster than the posted speed limit of 55 miles per hour, after

the deputy had turned to follow the vehicle. From there, the deputy allegedly turned on his lights and caught on radar that the vehicle was traveling up to 90 mph.

The driver of the vehicle then made a turn onto Balsam Row Road in Wescott and traveled north at a speed of 65 mph. The operator of the vehicle then came to a complete stop, forcing the deputy to perform evasive maneuvers to avoid a collision. The vehicle then began driving north again on Balsam Row Road. From there, the vehicle came to a stop and the operator exited the vehicle and began to flee on foot. With a K-9 unit, the deputy was able to catch up to the driver, due to a muzzle punch from the dog.

The driver continued to disobey law enforcement directions and the deputy allegedly deployed their taser. After initially falling to the ground, the driver attempted to get back up. The K-9 unit caught up with the driver and bit him on the arm. The driver again tried to get up, before the deputy

forced him to the ground. In the struggle the K-9 bit the driver again, this time on the ankle.

The driver was identified as Stodall-Wheeler. In the vehicle Stodall-Wheeler was driving, deputies allegedly found two five-gallon buckets containing a green, plant material, which tested positive for properties of hemp. Included in the five-gallon buckets was a plate with a white residue that tested positive for fentanyl. Deputies also allegedly found a \$20 bill folded up with one gram of white powder, which tested positive for fentanyl. A vial of a green leafy substance that tested positive for THC was also allegedly found on Stodall-Wheeler's person.

The registration of the vehicle had allegedly expired on March 11 and Stodall-Wheeler's driving status is revoked.

During Stodall-Wheeler's initial appearance, Shawano-Menominee Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. set a cash bond of \$10,000 and scheduled a preliminary hearing for March 31.

County looking at more aid for highway system

The Shawano County Board of Supervisors passed a request of additional funding from a Wisconsin budgetary surplus for the Shawano County Highway Department during its March 22 meeting.

"This is a standard resolution that came from the Wisconsin County Highway Association," said Shawano County Highway Commissioner Grant Bystol. "They are trying to get counties to send this in as a request to the state of Wisconsin to use a portion of the 2023 budget surplus to put it towards the rural highway system."

Bystol went on to explain that the Wisconsin County Highway Association is urging the state of Wisconsin to put money into the county highway department, as opposed to putting all of the money into the state roads.

"This resolution will urge to give money back to the county highway department, so we have more money for county road maintenance verses all of the budget surplus going back into state roads construction or maintenance," said Bystol. "We are trying

to get a few extra dollars into our general transportation aids."

According to Bystol, the general transportation aids are what the Shawano County Highway Department uses to maintain the county road system, including County Roads A, M, BE, K and MMM.

"So, we are just asking for a little more money to be pumped into the county system," said Bystol.

Due to rising costs, Bystol said that there is a strong need in the county for the surplus money.

"The cost of everything has drastically increased over the years, and our general transportation aids has been relatively flat and has not really seen much of an increase in well over 10 years," said Bystol. "If you look at the cost of fuel, the cost of materials, labor, everything — that has gone up, but our overall general transportation aids has not increased."

In terms of what the highway department would use the money for, Bystol said that it would go to asphalt resurfacing.

"Basically resurfacing more miles within the county," said Bystol.

Attorney needs time to discuss charges with Bahr

Tracy Bahr, 39, Cecil, was back in court March 24 for a status conference in relation to his Aug. 10 arrest.

On Aug. 10, Bahr was charged with one count of failing to comply with an officer's attempt to take him into custody, two counts of possession of a firearm by a someone convicted of a felony, one count of possession of methamphetamine, one count of possession of THC with intent (greater than 1,000 grams), 22 counts of bail jumping, one misdemeanor count

of resisting or obstructing an officer, three misdemeanor counts of possession of drug paraphernalia and seven misdemeanor counts of bail jumping. Those charges came from Bahr allegedly fleeing police on an ATV with a firearm at a residence in Pulaski, after law enforcement had attempted to arrest him in relation to a previous case.

Bahr appeared in the court room with attorney Christopher Froelich appearing over Zoom. Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. asked Froelich for an update on the status of this case.

"Your honor, I recently got involved in these cases — I know that there are a lot of them here," said Froelich, referring to Bahr's seven open cases in Shawano County. "I need to get all of the discovery materials and meet with my client."

Froelich requested to schedule a future conference, so that he and Bahr

can go over the case and so Froelich can collect all of the discovery items. He added that Bahr is wishing to waive timelines for a preliminary hearing, in order for Froelich and Bahr to meet and discuss their next steps.

"I think that he would agree with where the timelines are at this point," said Froelich.

Bahr agreed to waive his timelines for a preliminary hearing.

Kussel scheduled a scheduling conference for 10 a.m. April 21.

- John G. Shawano, 42, Keshena, was charged March 20 with one count of possession of narcotic drugs, one count of possession of amphetamine/LSD/psilocin (second or subsequent offense) and one misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer. Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. set a cash bond of \$1,000 and scheduled a bail hearing for March 29. He also scheduled a final pre-trial conference for May 5.

- Kent R. Hessing, 47, Stevens Point, pleaded no contest March 20 to four counts of bail jumping, one misdemeanor count of battery and one misdemeanor count of disorderly conduct. Two counts of bail jumping were dismissed but read into the record. Kussel sentenced Hessing to three years of probation.

- Kyle J. Pecore, 39, Shawano, pleaded no contest March 20 to six counts of possession of amphetamine/methamphetamine with intent to deliver (greater than 3-10 grams), one count of operating a vehicle to flee/elude an officer and five counts of bail jumping. Six counts of possession of narcotics with intent and seven counts of bail jumping were dismissed but read into the record. Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge Katherine Sloma sentenced Pecore to five years in prison and five years of extended supervision.

- Michael L. Szafraneck, 42, Shawano, was charged March 21 with one count of bail jumping and one misdemeanor count of issue of worthless checks (less than or equal to \$2,500). Kussel set a cash bond of \$500 and scheduled a status conference for May 2.

Rode, Pulaski, Reimer win awards at WNA contest

State wrestling coverage, Ann Retzlaff saga, sports pages stand out

Three NEW Media journalists were honored March 24 for their reporting excellence at the Wisconsin Newspapers Association's Better Newspapers Contest awards banquet.

Sports editor Morgan Rode led the charge with a first place for best sports story from his coverage in 2022 of the state wrestling tournament. Rode highlighted each of the schools at state in individual stories instead of trying to contain it in one story, and his crown jewel was the story about Oconto Falls' Clayton Whiting winning his fourth consecutive state title.

"A lot of strong, consistent coverage of many facets from an event," the judge for the category wrote. "Great writing and quotes."

The 2022 state wrestling tournament ran Feb. 24-26 and included 14 boys wrestlers from the area. Along with Whiting's state title, several other wrestlers placed in the top six while in Madison, making for roughly 10 pages of content in the 16-page sports section the following week.

Rode was thrilled with the honor and noted how rewarding it is to cover events like state wrestling.

"State wrestling coverage is one of my favorite things to attend during the year, and 2022 was a special year with so many great finishes, highlighted by Clayton's fourth state title," said Rode. "Getting to follow wrestlers all season and learn their stories during their time in high school is fun, and then to get to see their hard work pay off at state with strong finishes is extremely special. It's a joy putting their journeys and accomplishments into words."

City editor Lee Pulaski received a second place nod in the ongoing/extended coverage category for the continuing saga of Ann Retzlaff, a former campground owner who allegedly led law enforcement on a chase and claimed she was trying to rescue one of her employees from human trafficking.

The contest period for articles was from August 2021 through July 2022, which covered Retzlaff's first disappearance out of state, followed by her being arrested again in April 2022 when she resurfaced at a restaurant in Wittenberg. It also covered the civil case where Retzlaff lost her camp-

ground property west of Gresham due to defaulting on a bank loan and owing back taxes.

The judge in the contest were impressed at how the case has not been the standard fare for court cases.

"This continuing coverage of Ann Retzlaff's battle with the courts has got to be one of the most bizarre, interesting, and entertaining series of articles that I have ever read," the judge wrote. "The writer paid great attention to details, easily explaining the numerous legal situations while highlighting Retzlaff's most memorable quotes. This competition was a

tough decision, but this entry was a strong second place."

Pulaski was pleased about the honor, commenting that the court case ranked as one of the strangest things he has written about.

"Most cases have lawyers going back and forth, but Ann Retzlaff has thumbed her nose at every turn, claiming she's a sovereign citizen not subject to the laws of the United States," Pulaski said. "The only unfortunate thing is that the judges didn't get to see where the case has gone since last July, especially with the judge allowing her to leave the state again for a Christmas vacation, and she's hiding once again. Now that she no longer owns her campground, what are the chances she's going to come back to Wisconsin?"

Rode and reporter Luke Reimer shared a third place win for the best sports pages. The division NEW Media competed in focused on weekly publications with a circulation between 2,250 and 4,500, and judges saw the pages that go in the Shawano Leader, Oconto County Times Herald and Wittenberg Enterprise and Birnamwood News were keeping readers informed about the high school sports scene.

Pulaski said that Rode's tireless

efforts to present sports pages that grabbed people's attention week after week are unparalleled.

"Morgan came to us with the idea of making sports a separate section last year, and I think that made all the difference to not only increase the amount of sports covered in Shawano,

Oconto and Menominee counties but make it look interesting enough to grab readers," Pulaski said. "The sports section is one of the most commented in our lineup, and the work that Morgan and Luke put in to keep up on sports shows we're among the elite in athletic coverage."

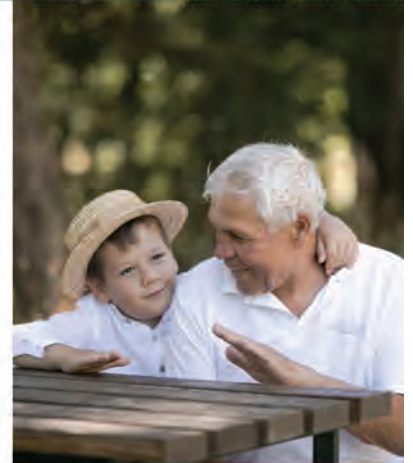

Counties ready to settle opioid lawsuits

Latest round of settlements with two manufacturers and three retailers

The Shawano and Oconto County boards last week approved the latest round of settlements with companies involved with the manufacture and distribution of opioids.

Most Wisconsin counties and several states joined in a lawsuit several years ago in an effort to reclaim some of the costs involved in the treatment of opioid addiction and enforcement of drugs laws.

The latest settlements are with two manufacturers — Teva Pharmaceutical Industries and Allergan Finance — and three retailers — CVS, Walmart and Walgreens — Oconto County Administrator Erik Pritzl told the county board during its March 23 meeting.

The county participated in previous settlements approved in 2021 with the three largest distributors of opiates and manufacturer Janssen Pharmaceuticals Inc., a subsidiary of Johnson and Johnson. Pritzl said Oconto County's share of those settle-

ments amounted to \$754,917.

"Those settlements go for a period of time from 2032 to 2038, we actually have received some of those settlement funds," he said. "Janssen for example elected to pre-pay, a lot of their settlement, just under 75%; so far we've received \$158,759 in those settlements.

"These are now the next round of settlements. There will be additional settlements coming."

Payments from the new settlements will begin in 2023 and go through 2038, Pritzl said.

"The specific amount for our county isn't known until all the participating entities are counted, and this goes for states as well, so if states or local units of government decide not to participate, that will change the settlement amounts," he said.

Pritzl said he was told a very rough estimate would be that the county might expect about 80% of what was received in the first settlements, or in the neighborhood of \$600,000.

There is a lengthy list about approved ways the counties may spend the settlement dollars, most of them related to treatment and prevention, training and research.

"We do have to report how we use these funds in order to be compliant with the settlement," Pritzl said. The counties have until April 18 to join the

settlements.

Shawano County Board Chair Tom Kautza said that, over a period of time, Shawano County believes it can expect a payment of approximately \$500,000-\$750,000.

"They have a list of things that you can use it for and almost all of that money is going to have to be oriented towards projects that the Department of Health and Human Services do, like assistance for those who are getting off the opioids — counseling for them," said Kautza. "Various programs like that."

Kautza added that Shawano County has had discussions if they wanted to take the money in a lump sum.

"There is companies out there that if you have a structured settlement, they will give you money in a lump sum up front," said Kautza. "That was started, but we haven't heard anything more about it."

In the second round of settlement, Kautza explained that all of the major pharmaceutical companies stepped forward and want a settlement.

"I think that as a part of this settlement, they are hoping then that they won't be liable against smaller suits here and there all over the place," said Kautza. "They will be able to say that we settle once and now we are done."

Nationwide, Kautza said that the second round of settlements totals up

to approximately \$20 billion.

"I have not found an exact number yet of what Shawano County's portion would be, but I would imagine it would be a significant amount of money in the end to use towards various programs," said Kautza. "One example is that we use that money is for mental health counseling with people in the jail."

Supervisors received a letter from Erin Dickinson of Crueger Dickinson LLC, the law firm representing the plaintiffs in the lawsuit, advising that any county that decides not to participate in the settlements would place itself in a position where it would have to litigate with the five companies on their own.

"We strongly recommend that you join these settlements," Dickinson wrote. "We firmly believe your county will not receive a better settlement offer than this short of spending additional years, millions of dollars, and significant use of county resources. And, as with any litigation, we cannot guarantee the outcome of such a litigation effort even if the county was to undertake it."

Both the Shawano County Board and Oconto County Board voted unanimously to approve the settlements.

Cecil man faces fentanyl and meth charges

Upton has three separate open cases in Outagamie, Oconto counties

A Cecil man was charged March 20 with possession of fentanyl with intent to deliver and other charges after a March 19 arrest in the Town of Red Springs.

Daryl L. Upton, 44, was charged with one count of possession of fentanyl with intent (less than or equal to 10 grams), one count of possession of amphetamine/methamphetamine/etc. with intent (greater than 10 grams), 16 counts of bail jumping, one misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer and two misdemeanor counts of possession of drug

paraphernalia.

If convicted, Upton faces fines of up to \$50,000 and 15 years in prison for the drug charges, \$10,000 in fines and six years in prison for each count of bail jumping, \$10,000 and nine months for the misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer and \$500 and 30 days for each misdemeanor count of possession of drug paraphernalia.

According to the criminal complaint, an officer with the Stockbridge-Munsee Police Department was stationed on County Road A in the Town of Red Springs, when the license plate of a car that had passed was checked. The registered owner was allegedly suspended and the registration was expired.

After performing a traffic stop, the driver of the vehicle allegedly stated his name was Michael Linzmeier. From there the officer ran the name

through the system and nothing with that name came back on file. The officer eventually identified the driver as Upton.

According to Wisconsin Circuit Court Access, Upton has three open cases, stemming from incidents in Outagamie and Oconto counties.

The officer asked Upton to step outside of the vehicle and attempted to place him under arrest. Upton allegedly refused multiple times, before the officer drew his conducted electrical weapon (CEW). After asking Upton to get on his knees repeatedly, Upton obliged when the officer said the CEW would be used.

The officer placed Upton into the back seat of his car and when they searched Upton's vehicle, they found two dime bags and tubes, next to an open black backpack. In total, officers allegedly found a dime bag with a crystal substance that tested positive

for methamphetamine, a blue glass smoking device that tested positive for methamphetamine, a clear container containing a brown powder that tested positive for fentanyl, a green grinder that tested positive for fentanyl, a black scale, two dime bags containing a crystal substance, a clear straw, a plastic dipping cup and a yellow cocoa butter container.

Other items found include rubber tubes, a syringe with a rubber tube attached, a blue bag, a green bag and a pink torch lighter. Officers also found a numerous amount of North Star Casino playing cards with names of different people on them.

During Upton's initial appearance, Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. set a cash bond of \$25,000 and scheduled a status conference for April 5.

No hard feelings for event cancellation

2023 Shawano Speedway Fan Fest canceled after fire codes not being addressed

An event that has been in the works since October was canceled March 25 after Wisconsin State and local building fire codes were not addressed.

The Shawano Speedway had planned to host its fan fest on March 25 from noon to 6 p.m. at the old Shopko building, 291 S. Main St. in Clintonville.

According to a press release from the city of Clintonville, the District 7 Wisconsin State Commercial Building inspector, in collaboration with the city, allowed the Shawano Speedway to have its 2023 Fan Fest car show at the building, with the caveat that the car show be held outside.

"The 291 S. Main St. business development progress has not met the timelines discussed with the District 7 Wisconsin State Commercial Building Inspector and the city," read the press release. "On Saturday, March 25, 2023, the city reiterated the 291 S. Main St. business expectations with items to be addressed immediately with limitations on occupancy.

"Violations to any of the stipulations found are subject to immediate closure and revocation of open oc-

cupancy until which time the building is brought to current building code and has been approved for occupancy by the State of Wisconsin, City of Clintonville, and the Clintonville Fire Department."

According to Brad Luepke, Shawano Speedway and Fairgrounds marketing and promotions manager, Clintonville told him that if they wanted to host the car show, it would have to be outdoors.

"It was snowing and it was cold, so obviously we weren't having it outside, so I made the decision to cancel it, because there is obviously nothing that we can do at that point," said Luepke.

In terms of the process that it takes to prepare for and set up for the event this year, Luepke said that he has been making calls since October.

"October is when I started talking and had the building secured, so it has been a four- to five-month process to get everything lined up and all of the promotion for it and stuff like that," said Luepke. "In the end, it is what it is. You can't look backwards and we just keep moving forward."

He said that preliminary talks have started about another event in the near future.

"Right now, obviously nothing is final, but I made a call in for the Crawford Center, 251 S. Waukechon St., so they still have to meet and okay it — nothing has been okayed," said Luepke. "I am hoping for April 15, but nothing is set in stone."

This is the first year that the event would have been held in over 15 years. The event used to be held at Bay Park Square Mall in Green Bay.

"A lot of it is just to get race fans together and to get the cars on display. A lot of fans don't get to see the cars close up — especially when they are all brand new like that," said Luepke. "This used to be a big thing 15 years ago or so. For a long time, I wanted to bring it back."

With the event being cancelled, Luepke said that he had no hard feelings towards Clintonville or the building owners.

"I never want to do anything against codes or against violations of the city or ordinances," said Luepke. "In the end, I get it, if we were doing something that wasn't legal to be done in a building, then we should cancel it. I just wish the communication would have been a bit better."

Teller found guilty of domestic battery

Legend Lake man sentenced to 2 years after prior incidents elevated crime to felony

A man from the Legend Lake area of the Menominee Indian Reservation was sentenced March 27 in federal court to two years in prison to be followed by three years on supervised release.

Stephen J. Teller Jr., 41, had been convicted in tribal court in 2018 of domestic violence and again in February 2022, this time with a child present.

The two prior tribal misdemeanor convictions elevated the present offense to a federal felony.

Teller pleaded guilty in December to domestic battery by a habitual offender and faced a prison term of 30 to 37 months under the advisory sentencing guidelines.

Tribal police took Teller into cus-

tody after receiving a call on July 29. The homeowner told police that there had been disturbance between Teller and a woman he lived with and which he had a son.

Given permission to search the premises, the officers found the woman hiding from Teller in a bedroom closet and Teller in a bathtub. The officers learned that Teller had an outstanding tribal warrant and took him into custody.

The woman later told police that the incident began when she asked Teller to take care of their son who was crying. Instead, Teller shoved the woman's head into a wall. When she got up to gather some belongings and leave, Teller put his forearm around her neck "choking" her. He also bit her on the arm when she tried to get Teller to let go.

The woman said Teller also grabbed her by the hair and pulled her back into the home and punched her in the back of the head.

Interviewed in the tribal jail, Teller disputed choking the woman but agreed with the rest of her account of the incident.

On March 27, Thomas Phillip, Teller's attorney, sought a sentence of a year and a day in prison contending that his client already had been sentenced in tribal court to a month in jail after being detained for four months for the same offense.

Phillip wrote the court that a month in jail may have been too lenient but 30-37 months was too severe for an offense that wasn't charged an aggravated assault.

Teller will be on federal supervision for three years, which is more

formal than any prior term of probation he has served, and carries more consequence for him if it is revoked, Phillip wrote.

Teller told a pre-sentence writer that he had hit "rock bottom" in the July incident with his girlfriend and prison and supervised release should allow him to lead the life he wants to, his attorney wrote.

After serving his tribal imposed jail sentence in November, Teller was on pre-trial federal release, which was revoked in December for a violation not available in court records Monday.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Andrew Maier had recommended a 30-month sentence but District Judge William Griesbach departed below the advisory guidelines in imposing the two-year term.

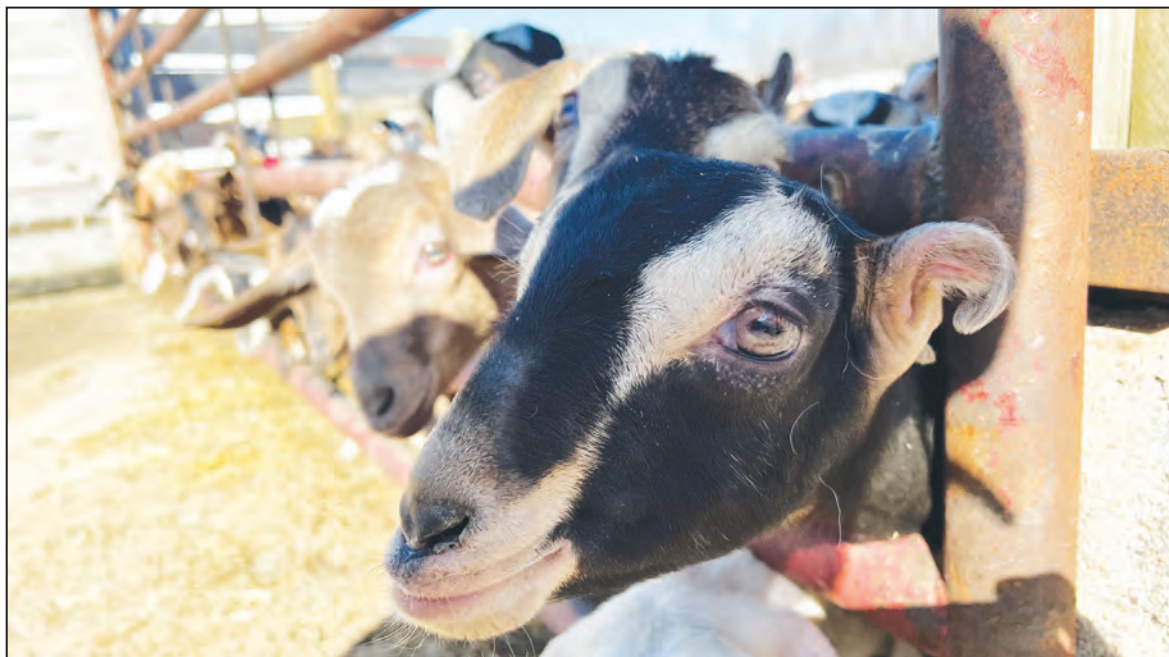

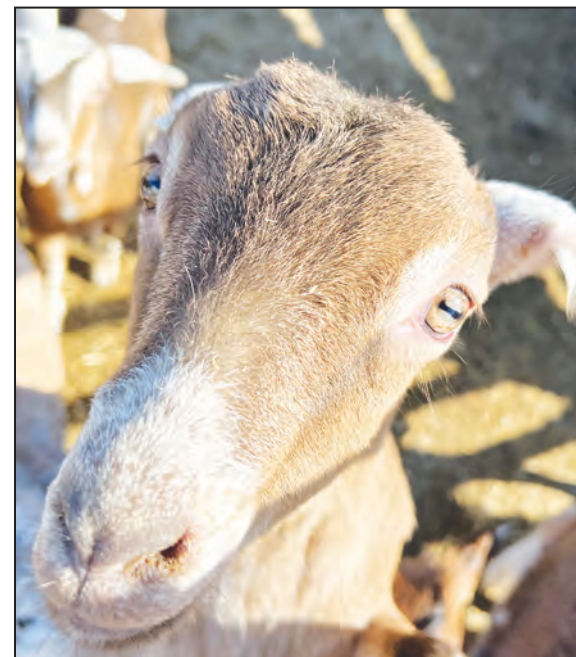

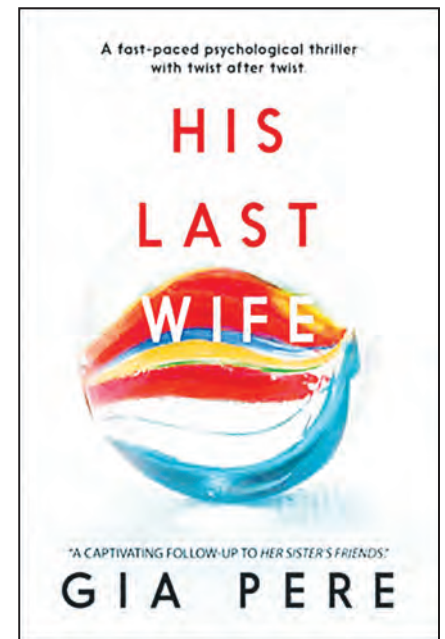

Hoffman hired to plan future referendum

Appleton company gets unanimous board approval

The Shawano School Board started a push for a 2024 referendum on March 27 by hiring Hoffman Planning, Design and Construction, Inc. The company will assess district facilities and determine what sized project will be comfortable enough for residents and taxpayers to pay over the next 15-20 years.

The Appleton-based firm was one of three that made a pitch to the board on what services it will provide. The board unanimously voted for Hoffman over Miron Construction, which worked with the district on referenda in 1995, 2008 and 2015; and Bayland Buildings, which constructed the career and technical education addition at Shawano Community High School in 2013, along with some recent work

with the Bowler School District and the building of Wolf River Lutheran High School.

The timeline for the Shawano School District is to update its facilities assessment, conduct a new community survey with options for capital and operational referenda and potentially ask voters for approval in the April 2024 general election, when municipal, county and school board races will be taking place. Hoffman, according to officials, seemed to fit the bill best after an hour-long closed session.

"We had to look at the total circumstances involved, and that includes the fees," said board president Mike Musolf. "Hoffman will not be charging us until after a referendum which, given our financial situation, my thought was that would be the best option to save on some costs."

Superintendent Kurt Krizan agreed with Musolf's assessment but noted having three nearby firms to choose from and having strong pitches from each of them puts the district in a position where they know they'll get a good deal.

"We would have been great going with any of them, but in the end we really looked at the totality (Hoffman) could bring to the district and how they could support us moving forward," Krizan said.

He added a referendum is not set in stone yet, and the priority is determining what needs are immediate for the district. Krizan said the district will be building upon the work done by a task force last year, but he noted that Hoffman will be a fresh set of eyes to make sure things aren't overlooked.

If a referendum is successful, Hoffman would seek \$12,000 to reimburse the company for its costs to that point.

Curt Peeters, senior project architect with Hoffman, told the board that his company will have a facilities assessment ready for perusal by July 1.

"We already have a team of engineers and architects like myself that are ready to go through your buildings and start looking at the buildings' general condition," Peeters said.

Hoffman senior project manager Matt McGregor acknowledged that the Shawano School District is in a tough spot with the public in the wake of how a previous exploration of referenda went down. The process for this one will be completely transparent, he said, and the community will see everything.

"A great example of that is the school district of Manawa," McGregor said. "Prior to their referendum, they were lacking a lot of trust in the community, from community members trusting the school board to trusting administration. Some of the decisions made in the past even before the current administration was on board."

McGregor said that Hoffman's transparency every step of the way helped the public to see the projects they were approving would be worth

the price. Manawa was able to expand its middle and high schools, renovate all of its schools and build a new fitness center next to the high school. Hoffman is currently working with Manawa on solar energy projects.

"We showed everything. All of the cards are on the table," McGregor said. "That really brought their community together, and the community said: 'We're going to support a \$12 million referendum, and that's it.' Even though they had \$20 million of needs, we went to the drawing board and did as much as possible with the \$12 million."

Board member John Arens noted that transparency was vital to passing a referendum this go-around, because the opportunity to grow can only happen if the district has a healthy school system.

"I sat in a focus group the last time we tried to get a referendum through," Arens said. "All we heard about was transparency, transparency, transparency. You come back to the next meeting and it's like all these things were decided behind the scenes, and nothing was transparent. In fact, it got to the point where the person next to me said: 'Are they going to offer me \$4,000 more for my car than it's actually worth?' The people of Shawano, they got burned. It was not fun."

Hoffman doesn't have experience with the Shawano School District, but the firm worked with Clintonville School District on a \$37 million referendum in 2021, Wittenberg-Birnhamwood School District on its \$13.1 million referendum in 2018 that built a new high school agriculture building and renovated all of its buildings and the Marion School District with current upgrades.

District having trouble finding business manager

Shawano expecting to utilize CESA 8 services in the interim until permanent solution can be found

Finding a business manager has been more of a challenge than expected for the Shawano School District, so it is turning to CESA 8 for help.

Since Josh Swanson stepped down in September 2022, the search has been ongoing for a permanent business manager. Denise Guex is filling the role for a few days per week in an interim capacity, but the district has not been able to find anyone to take the position since, according to Superintendent Kurt Krizan.

"We've been in discussions with CESA 8 for a potential solution," Krizan said to the Shawano School Board at its March 20 meeting.

According to Nick Curran, who works as the director of business operations for CESA 8 but was also a business manager for the district, the search has not been an easy one for his agency, either.

"In January, I got wind of a licensed business manager moving to the area," Curran said. "They moved to the Crivitz area but was interested in working with CESA 8. I spoke with Kurt about what a position would look like."

In those conversations, Krizan and Curran discussed a part-time situation to start to keep Guex but also have someone in authority available daily, according to Curran. That would also have al-

lowed for the business manager to be available to supplement other school districts, too.

Curran said the person in mind has been a licensed business manager for three years, was previously connected with the insurance industry, and was also behind a successful referendum in a school district he had worked at before.

"I know that's potentially appealing to the Shawano School District, since you guys could have a referendum coming up," Curran said. "He has great experience there."

There is a current district employee working to become licensed as a business manager, according to Curran, which might give the district the opportunity to eventually have a manager on site permanently instead of utilizing CESA 8 services.

The proposal, at \$725 per day, is expected to cost the district about \$113,000, which includes travel costs and attendance at board and committee meetings. The new person would start July 1, according to Curran.

Board member Sam Sousek expressed concern about the cost, noting that when Swanson left the district, he was making about \$118,000 on a full-time basis.

Curran noted that the going rate for full-time business managers is between \$170,000 and \$180,000. CESA 8's charge for a full-time manager was expected to be

\$190,000, but with the new person only working up to three days a week, the fee was reduced.

"We try to be as competitive as we possibly can," Curran said.

Krizan said the district had posted a job notice from when Swanson left through January. In that time, there were three applicants, but only one met the qualifications to be invited for a job interview.

"There's a huge shortage across the state of Wisconsin for business managers," Krizan said. "We could do a finance manager, which is a non-licensed person. It's a little more affordable."

The agreement is expected to come back to the board at a future board meeting.

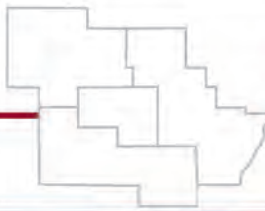

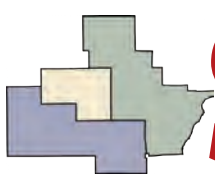

Cheyenne Krueger earned the team's top finish after claiming second in the girls pole vault (7-6). Grace Simpson placed third after clearing 6-6.

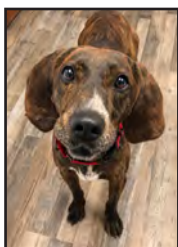

"Those who may have been

interested in track and field this spring are not participating in a spring sport at school," said Marquardt.

Marquardt said Tigerton is in the process of potentially identifying another high school to co-op with for spring 2024.

"We have not identified a co-op

partner at this time and are working with a local district to determine if a co-op is mutually beneficial," said Marquardt. "Once a decision is made, we will complete the co-op application for track by June 1, 2023, for spring 2024. So Tigerton will not be able to participate in WIAA competition until spring 2024."

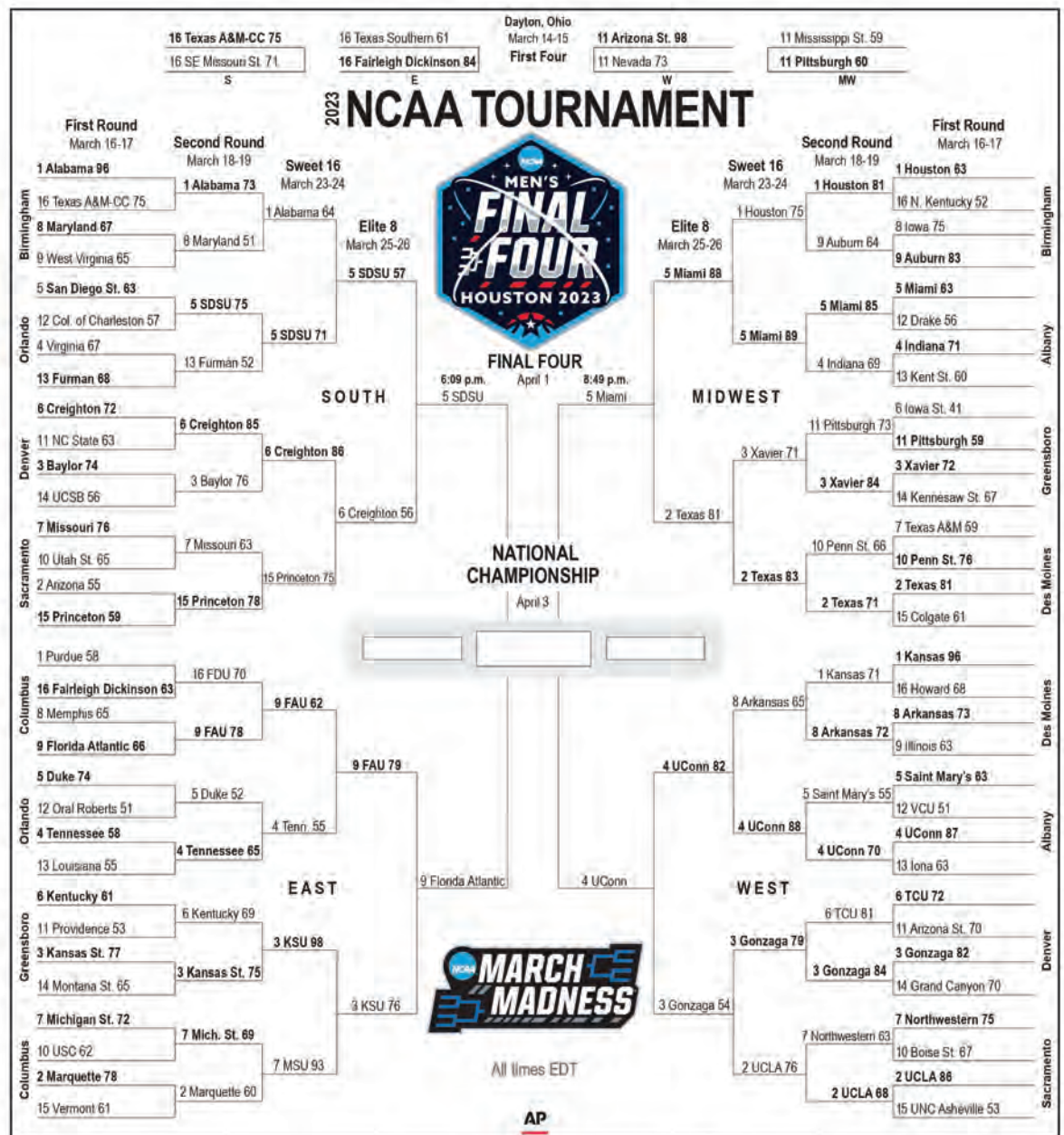

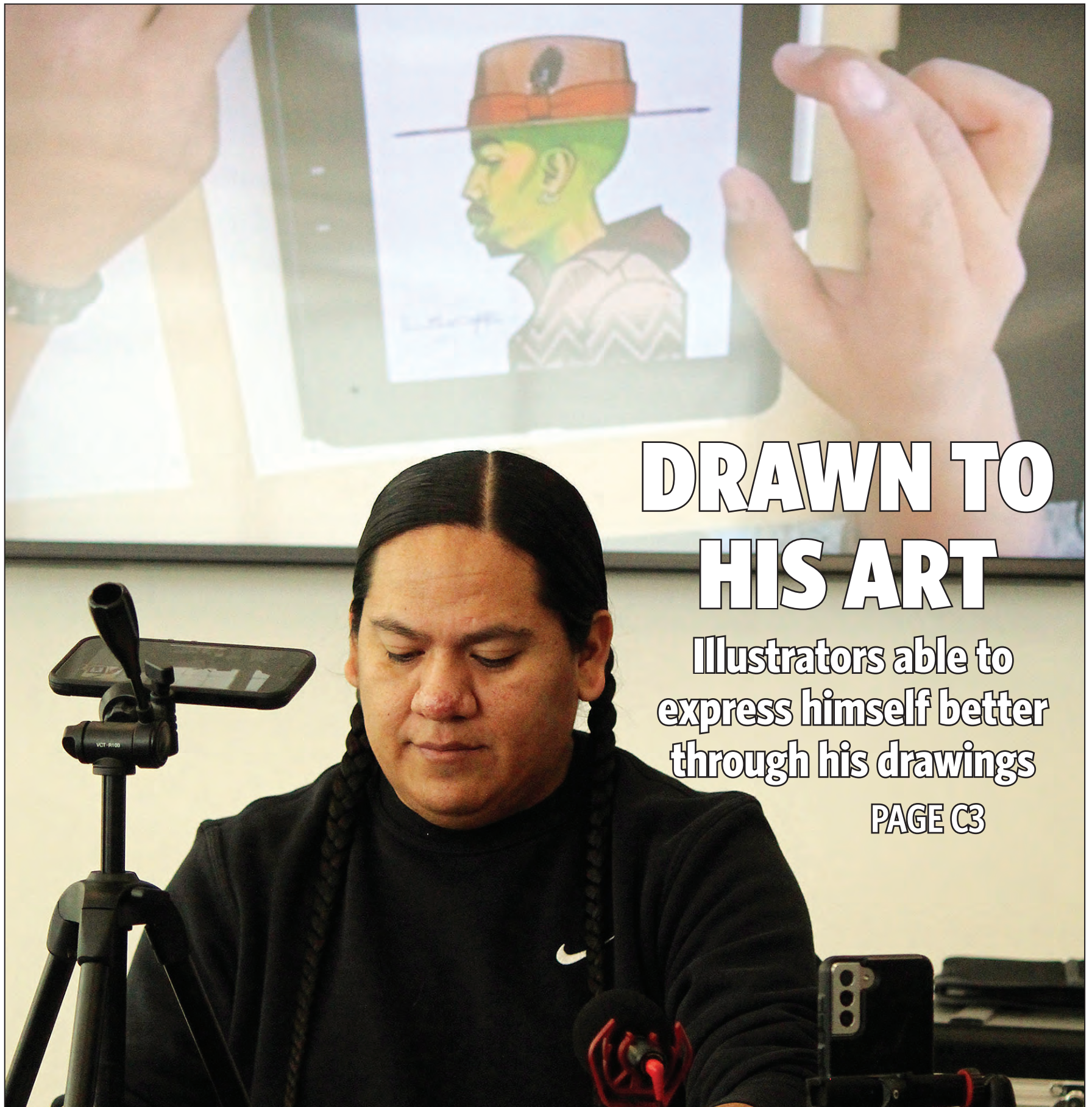

Yellowjohn's voice comes through art

Illustrator able to express his views through what he creates on paper

The smallest details can make all the difference for Chad Yellowjohn, a Shoshone Bannock illustrator who recently imparted his knowledge of drawing on almost two dozen members of the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin.

Yellowjohn made his first foray into Wisconsin on March 15 as part of the College of Menominee Nation's MenomiCon, which allowed Menominee to celebrate fantastic and wonderful characters with workshops and activities.

Yellowjohn has been drawing since he was a child and, for a time, drawing was his primary means of communication as he mainly spoke gibberish for the first years of his life.

"I was considered a mute until the age of 7," Yellowjohn said.

Yellowjohn, who has the nickname "Lil Coyote," grew up in the state of Washington, and his family would take him regularly from the age of 4 to Disneyland. Seeing the various characters inspired him to draw them.

"I would have this old Garfield notepad," Yellowjohn said. "If you look at the drawings (from the early years), they were pretty horrifying. I drew Goofy, Donald Duck, Mickey Mouse, Minnie Mouse, Peter Pan and Dumbo. That was my way to keep me entertained because I was a wild child."

Yellowjohn noted his drawings helped his family to understand his state of mind, whether he was sad, angry, happy or a myriad of other emotions. However, it was when the movie "Space Jam" came out that he started to really take off as an artist.

"It was my favorite basketball player and my favorite characters playing basketball with him," Yellowjohn said. "I would also watch 'Who Framed Roger Rabbit?' and 'The Goofy Movie,'" Yellowjohn said, noting he started out pausing the movies to do his drawings before eventually developing the skills to draw free-

hand. "Goofy is my favorite character because he's a single dad who just wants to be a part of his son's life, and that's something that I strive to be one day."

Soon, Yellowjohn started drawing his own characters. He chuckled as he recalled one of his more interesting illustrations was of himself, Bugs Bunny and Mario from Super Mario Bros. saving "the love of his life — and it was Britney Spears."

The first big art job Yellowjohn had was drawing for the Salish Tribe of Montana, which was reviving its native language. He said he would create illustrations to accompany the stories they told.

"They had a language conference, and they would perform those illustrations, so it was almost like my illustrations on set," Yellowjohn said.

Yellowjohn went on to college at the Institute for American Indian Arts in Santa Fe, New Mexico. At first, he struggled and dropped out, spending some time working at the Spokane International Airport creating Indigenous illustrations and drawing caricature portraits, among other things. He eventually returned to the institute after seeing some of the friends he made there grow as artists. He earned an associate's degree in cinematic arts with a minor in studio arts.

"Today, I don't know how to speak about Native issues verbally," Yellowjohn said. "The only way I can do it is the same way I communicated with my mom, is I communicate with my art on a certain issue. It's also an emotional release. When there's something cooped up inside me, that's my way of releasing it."

For those who seek to become illustrators, Yellowjohn encourages Indigenous artists to do it and sees it as carrying on a tradition, noting a lot of tribes tell stories through art.

"It's not as much of a hobby," Yellowjohn said. "It's like a culture, a way to communicate with other tribes and to communicate with ourselves. Artists have a voice as well, but most do it verbally."

One of Shawano's voices gets love from WBA

Erdman to become Local Broadcasting Legend to commemorate 38 years on the airwaves

Anyone who turns on the radio in the morning has a pretty good chance of hearing Doug Erdman interviewing politicians, representatives of nonprofit organizations or even rangers with the Department of Natural Resources, and that's in between announcing what songs are coming up next on the radio.

Anyone who has lived in the Shawano area for a long time comes to expect Erdman's voice to waft into their homes, vehicles and workplaces, as he has been a key voice for WTCH for 34 years.

His longevity and his dedication to the community where he lives has paid off, as he is one of four broadcasters in Wisconsin to be named Local Broadcast Legends in 2023 by the Wisconsin Broadcasters Association. Erdman and the other award winners will receive their laurels during the keynote luncheon at the 2023 WBA Summer Conference on June 15 at the Osthoff Resort in Elkhart Lake.

The Local Broadcast Legends award was created in 2015 at the behest of Bruce Grassman, who owns WTCH. Erdman said he's been working toward earning the achievement for about five years but did not expect the honor to be bestowed so soon.

"I was down in the basement walking the treadmill when I found out," Erdman said. "I was very surprised. It came as quite a shock."

Erdman's main duties at WTCH, which start at 4 a.m., are to keep the music playing weekday mornings and to be the host of the radio station's Breakfast Club, where he interviews public officials and other interesting people in-depth about the issues of the day. He noted that he doesn't follow the lead of some shock jocks and go "out of line" when he questions guests on the Breakfast Club because he believes it's better to gain the trust of the people he's interviewing, and the truth will come out in its own time.

"The key part is interviewing the schools and community members," Erdman said. "It makes me feel like a part of the community to interview these people. They could be anywhere from Shawano to Pulaski to Clintonville or wherever. It was get-

ting to know people and feeling like a part of them. That's how I've always dealt with my news."

Erdman is also responsible for crafting some of the commercials and making sure that other programming proceeds smoothly.

The roots of the love of radio can be traced back to Erdman's childhood days in Marinette.

"I used to hang around a radio station in downtown Marinette," he said. "My dad, who was a police officer for the city of Marinette, became friends with the station owner, and he let me hang out there to see what it was about. That's what started my love for radio."

Erdman's professional start in radio took place in Richland Center after going to college in Minneapolis. Four years later, he made the move to Shawano.

"I don't like to sweat, so I knew factory work wasn't going to do it," Erdman said as he explained why he wanted a life in broadcasting. "It's my love of music. I love music, and I love talking about community events on the radio. I love being a part of

the community, basically making new friends and finding new faces."

Over the years, Erdman has worn many different hats at WTCH, including more than a decade as its news director. Among some of his favorite activities during that time were covering school board meetings and meeting community members at various events. He also enjoyed interviewing some of the area's many farmers.

"I loved it," Erdman said. "My favorite was covering the court cases. I loved the law angle, and I used to kind of guess what was going to happen to see if I was right. A lot of times, I was, and after a while, you get to know a bit of the law. I enjoyed that part of it."

Radio broadcasting has changed quite a bit in the four decades Erdman has been on the airwaves.

"We used to have to record on tape back in the day. We used to have to splice tape," Erdman said. "Now, it's all in digital, and the signals, to me, seem like they're a lot better."

Erdman's work is not contained

within the walls of Results Broadcasting, which operates a number of radio stations, including WTCH. When he's not working the board, he volunteers as a member of the Shawano Police and Fire Commission, and he's active with the Shawano Optimists.

"I became a member (of the commission) almost 15 years ago," Erdman said. "I was brought on to give my view because my father was a police officer, and I had an interest in law enforcement."

Erdman's backing of the blue extends to the Optimists, as well, as the organization holds a week to commemorate law enforcement.

"I always try to help out with that because of law enforcement respect," he said.

Erdman's eligible for retirement benefits in four years, but he's not looking at walking away from WTCH anytime soon.

"I love what I do," he said. "I look at it and ask, 'Why retire? If I can still do the job, why retire?'"

Bird songs signal the start of spring

We're hearing bird songs that tell us winter's grip is easing and soon spring will be fully underway. I step out the door and hear the northern cardinal's exuberant three, loud and clear whistles, cheer, cheer, cheer, announcing his presence to the world. His bright red plumage, black mask and jaunty crest enliven our neighborhood. The females in their more subdued soft brown

plumage tinged red on the beak, crest, wings and tail seem never far from their mates; look for both when their whistles call.

The excited honking of the Canada geese reach my ear as they fly over in "V" formation announcing their arrival from their summer homes, a long journey for many.

The commitment Canada geese make when migrating north is beautifully expressed in one of my favorite passages from Aldo Leopold's seminal book, "A Sand County Almanac."

In his chapter on March he writes, "One swallow does not make a summer, but one skein of geese, cleaving the murk of a March thaw is spring. A cardinal, whistling spring to a thaw but later finding himself mistaken, can retrieve his error by resuming his winter silence. A chipmunk, emerging for a sunbath but finding a blizzard, has only to go back to bed, but a migrating goose, staking 200 miles of black night on the chance of finding a hole in the lake, has no easy chance for retreat. His arrival carries the conviction of a prophet who has burned his bridges."

The red-winged blackbird is also one of spring's early migrants to return north and take up his residency in the nearby marsh. My ear picks out the "con-la-ree" song of a male. Perched atop a cattail stalk, with outstretched wings, his shoulder patches aflame in red and yellow and on full display, he belts out his tune.

We can also hear the distinctive check call made by both the male and female red-winged blackbirds as described on The Cornell Lab All About Birds (AAB) website. The female's check check call is easily heard as she rustles around in the marsh, but so illusive and camouflaged is she with her mottled brown and white plumage that you can count yourself lucky if you

catch a glimpse of her.

The unison song, an insistent loud clacketty-clack duet, tells me a pair of sandhill cranes have winged their way north. One of my favorite birds is again gracing our skies, fields and marshes and bugling their presence for all to hear.

The black-capped chickadees, small balls of energy, are calling, their chickadee-dee-dee song carrying on the morning breeze. According to Jim Robbins, in his book "The Wonder of Birds," the more dees at the end of its call, the more a threat a predator is. Robbins notes that a pygmy owl, a fierce predator, adds up to 23 extra dees to the chickadee's cry, while the gray owl, which seldom eats them, adds only an extra half a dee. This wonderful alarm system is shared with flock mates, no doubt contributing to their survival.

The American robin greets us these mornings with its musical song, described on the AAB website as cheer-

ily, cheer up, cheer up, cheerily, cheer up. What good advice for welcoming each new day.

Bird songs are most abundant and varied now in the spring when their dawn symphonies can wake us from our slumbers. This is the time that males are setting up territories and communicating their fitness to potential mates. According to Robbins, the still morning air makes birdsong some 20 times more effective at communicating than at any other time of day.

Why do so many of us enjoy bird songs, letting ourselves get lost in their melodies? According to Robbins, it has been shown that a male's bird song increases dopamine, a pleasure chemical, in female birds; maybe it releases "good feeling" neurochemicals in us as well, another reason to tune our ears skyward.

One of the fun tools now available that will listen to bird songs with you and tell you the name of the bird that singing is the Merlin Bird ID App. Us-

ing this app, which you can download free to your phone, is simple. Once downloaded, you can choose the app's "Sound ID" function to record and identify bird songs. Merlin will also help you identify birds based on their size, color and location. To learn more about Merlin, go to <https://merlin.allaboutbirds.org>. Bird field guides and the AAB website are also good sources of information on bird songs.

Tuning our ears to bird songs expands our world in a beautiful way, allowing in music with its uplifting qualities and making our world a happier place. All we need do is stop and listen, and if in an exploratory mood, learn more about these songsters that provide these daily musical gifts.

Talking about weight touchy subject for kids

Can it be harmful for parents to talk to their child about their weight? An international research team investigated these concerns by analyzing the association between parent-child weight-talk and child well-being. The researchers conducted a scientific review that included over 40 published studies.

They found that encouraging children to lose weight and criticizing weight were associated with poorer physical self-perceptions and greater dieting and dysfunctional eating. Conversely, parental encouragement of healthy lifestyles without explicit reference to weight was associated with better well-being.

Here are six specific recommendations from the research. These are for both doctors and parents, and they apply to all teens — not just those with weight problems.

- Never encourage dieting. Dieting packs a double whammy, because it is a risk factor for both obesity and eating disorders. Even just moderate dieting increased a teen's risk of developing an eating disorder five-fold.

- Do not comment on your child's weight, or even your weight. What you say matters; teens who talk about weight with their parents are also more likely to diet, binge eat and have unhealthy weight control behaviors, but this risk lessens if the subject of conversation is healthy eating behaviors.

No matter how well-intentioned or seemingly benign you think your comments are, studies show that comments parents make about either their own weight or their child's weight is linked to a child's risk of being overweight and developing an eating disorder. Interestingly, even girls who grew up to be of normal weight may be dissatisfied with their weight if they remember a parent commenting on their weight as a young girl.

- Never tease teens about their weight. This seems obvious, but bears repeating, because a significant minority of overweight teens say they've experienced weight-related teasing from friends or family members. Cruel taunts about weight increase a child's risk of both being overweight and devel-

oping eating disorders, and the pain can last into adulthood.

- Eat together. While eating meals together as a family has not been shown to reduce obesity rates, it does improve the nutritional content of a child's diet and it allows parents to model healthy eating behaviors in front of their children, the report said.

One study found that families who eat meals together seven or more times per week eat more fruits and vegetables compared to families who never eat together, and for the kids, this increased intake of fruits and veggies persisted into young adulthood. Another study found that eating family dinners most days during the previous years seemed to protect kids from binge eating, dieting and purging behaviors.

- Focus on a balanced diet and exercise — not weight loss. Encourage healthy body image by encouraging kids to eat healthfully and exercise for fitness — not for weight loss. Teens who have these positive influences are more likely to report being happy with their bodies and less likely to say they had weight-related concerns. Kids who are dissatisfied with their bodies, on the other hand, are more likely to develop eating disorders, diet and have lower levels of physical activity.

- Create a healthy home environment. Serve fruits, vegetables, whole grains, beans and water, while keeping artificial sweeteners, sugar-sweetened drinks and refined carbs away. Parents can also encourage physical activity by keeping TVs out of children's bedrooms. Health interventions for both obesity and eating disorders are most effective when the whole family is involved in the treatment — not just the child who needs help.

DATCP: Avian flu still threat in Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) is reminding poultry owners of the ongoing threat of highly pathogenic avian influenza.

The spring migratory period for wild birds brings an increased risk of infection to all flocks, so DATCP recommends that poultry owners continue using the strongest biosecurity measures to protect their birds.

In Wisconsin last year, 29 domestic flocks in 18 counties were confirmed with avian flu. Nationwide, more than 58.5 million birds have died related to avian flu, making it the largest animal disease outbreak in U.S. history, surpassing the 2014-15 bird flu outbreak.

The best way to protect flocks from infection is through strong biosecurity practices that do not allow for virus introduction. All poultry owners, regardless of the size of the operation, must ensure that strict biosecurity practices are in place to prevent avian flu from infecting flocks.

As the spring migration of wild birds begins, DATCP encourages all poultry producers to review

and update their biosecurity plans. Those who do not have a biosecurity plan should work with their flock veterinarian to develop one that clearly addresses the risks for disease introduction specific to their operations. Biosecurity guides and other resources are available from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Defend the Flock Program.

State law requires Wisconsin poultry and other livestock owners to register where their animals are kept. DATCP uses this information to rapidly respond to animal disease outbreaks to protect animal health, the food supply, public safety, and Wisconsin's agriculture economy. Registration is free and can be completed at wiid.org or by calling the Wisconsin Livestock Identification Consortium at 888-808-1910.

Poultry owners who recognize any abnormal increase in mortality or clinical signs of disease, including respiratory distress, drop in food or water intake, decreased egg production, and lethargy are asked to report it to DATCP at 800-572-8981.

Catholic students take part in Jewish seder

Deacon James Lonick from Sacred Heart Parish celebrated a traditional seder meal March 23 with second grade students at Sacred Heart Catholic School.

The seder is a meal that Jews celebrate during the first two days of Passover every spring. The holiday lasts for eight days and nights. At the seder, families and friends sit around the table and read the story of Moses leading the Jewish people from Egypt. Symbolic foods are served at the Seder, and some are featured on a special Seder plate.

One of the most important Passover foods is matzoh, which is a flat, cracker-like bread. According to the Passover story, when the Jews were granted their freedom, they left Egypt in such a hurry there was no time for the bread to rise — this is how matzoh was first made.

Lonick presented the students with the story as well as with the food traditionally seen at a seder — roasted/hard boiled egg, matzoh, shank bone, apple and nut mix, horseradish, green vegetable and parsley. Red wine is traditionally served as well, but Lonick substituted juice for the students.

The seder precedes when the second grade class will receive the first Holy Communion on April 23, to deepen their faith and understanding of the Catholic faith and traditions.

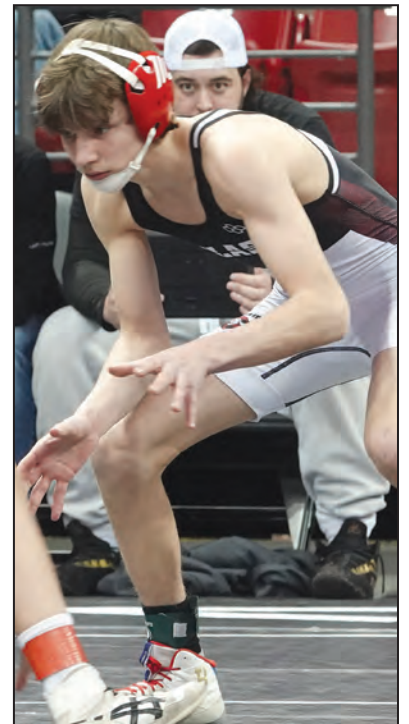


Pulaski sent three boys and one girl to Madison, with two returning with podium finishes.

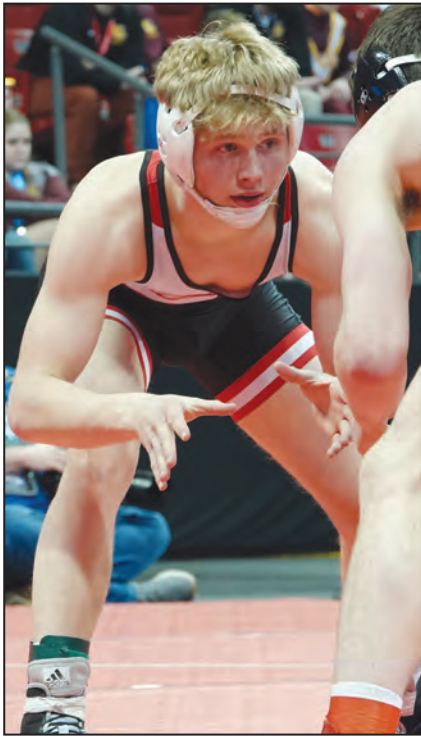

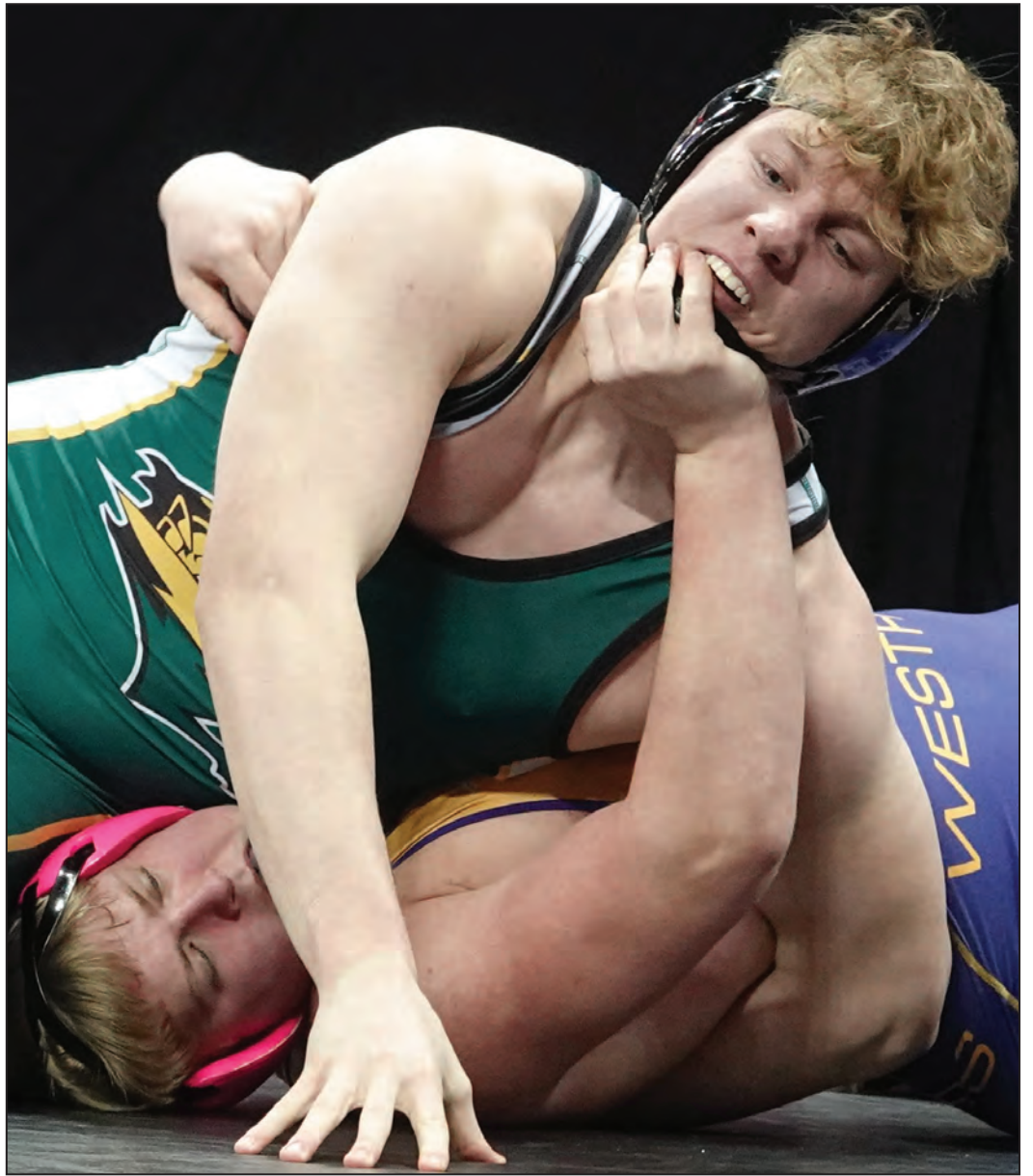
