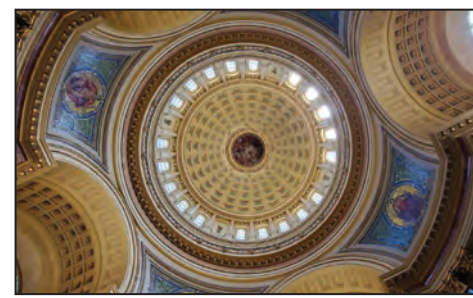

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Sheriff pushes for OT for dispatchers, jail officers

Plan would pay time and a half for coming in off schedule

The Shawano County Sheriff's Department is pushing for overtime pay for correctional officers and dispatchers as efforts to fill its ranks continue to get more difficult, and the county's public safety committee agrees something needs to be done.

The committee voted unanimously June 7 to move forward a resolution permitting overtime for the two non-union divisions of the sheriff's department, which will first go to the executive committee on June 21 and then to the Shawano County Board of Supervisors one week later.

"This is something that we've worked with for two years now," said Sheriff George Lenzner. "We've tried to figure out some way to get overtime for the jail and for dispatch centers."

Lenzner said his department has been told previously to wait for things like the county policy handbook to be approved, and then the excuse that overtime would have to be open to all county departments if it was granted to the sheriff's department, an excuse Lenzner finds ridiculous because most other county functions operate Monday through Friday, while his department is a 24-hour a day operation, seven days a week.

"I believe the highway department gets overtime for anything over their allotted hours, anything over 40," Lenzner said. "We're finally up to staff in the jail, basically, and we're up to staff in dispatch, but other counties are fighting to get up to staff, and they keep putting more and more benefits out there. They all pay better than us, their overtime is better, and now the new thing is every county is paying a shift differential, including weekends. They're giving employees an extra \$1 an hour when you

work a weekend or work nights."

Troy Beyer, jail administrator, said the correctional officers currently work 84 hours in the two-week pay period, and that overtime does not kick in until after 86 hours are worked. Beyer is proposing that anything beyond scheduled shifts be paid overtime, which would be 1½ times the hourly pay.

"They're here on nights, weekends, regardless of if they take a PTO (paid time off) day or not," Beyer said. "If they have to stay over or come in on an off-day to work, they haven't been getting time and a half."

The scheduling differs in the dispatch center, according to Bill McGlynn, communications manager. The center falls under the federal labor laws that require overtime for any hours worked over 40.

McGlynn is also proposing the 1½ times the hourly pay for his dispatchers.

"We talked to HR (human resources) and the finance director about this near the beginning of the year," McGlynn said. "In a year's time frame, that would have calculated all hours worked outside of their normal scheduled hours to be around \$10,000. That would fall within our overtime budget that we currently have."

McGlynn said he wants to see overtime pay for any dispatcher who has to come in on a day off.

Lenzner noted that the sheriff's department had asked for the same compensation when the county agreed to use American Rescue Plan Act funds to increase correctional officer pay by \$3 an hour in 2021. That wasn't granted, but the sheriff's department is continuing to push for fair pay to avoid having staff go to other counties or to private sector jobs where the pay is higher.

Administrative coordinator James Davel suggested that overtime be included in the sheriff's

budget for next year, but he wasn't ready to commit to a new policy on the matter.

"There's a lot of pieces to this that have to be worked out," Davel said. "I think putting it in the budget is the way to go. I just want to make sure that all of the requirements are understood, because when you start talking about overtime, this isn't the organization that does overtime. Maintenance does overtime. Highway does a tremendous amount of overtime. I think it's more than just one department, per se."

McGlynn noted that the highway department gets paid overtime if they have to work longer than their 10-hour daily shift, and there's more pay if they have to work on Sundays.

Lenzner said he's tired of being told that overtime for the sheriff's department would require offering overtime to all departments, considering other departments already have the privilege.

Davel pointed out there are differences between the highway department and the sheriff's department.

"Highway generates their own money, so when they do that work, there's a difference in how the money's coming," Davel said.

Lenzner dismissed Davel's argument, questioning why law enforcement would be required to generate money for the county.

"Since we don't generate money, our guys get punished for that, and it's not right," Lenzner said. "Other counties find a way to do that."

The sheriff added that the pay issue is going to need to be worked out soon anyway, because the ARPA funds run out in 2024, and without a new solution, the \$3 pay increase correctional officers received two years ago could disappear.

Ingold homicide case going to trial

A jury trial has been set for Michael Ingold after attorneys met for a status conference June 9 with Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr.

Ingold's trial is scheduled to begin Sept. 11, with a final pre-trial hearing to take place at 1 p.m. Aug. 14. A motions hearing was also scheduled for 8:30 a.m.

Ingold, 58, faces one count of first-degree intentional homicide, after an

autopsy report showed that a victim died from manual strangulation last summer. He was charged on Aug. 1. If convicted, Ingold faces life in prison.

The criminal complaint states that Ingold was in his home with the victim on June 25. Ingold told Shawano County Sheriff Department deputies that he woke up

around 2:30 a.m. that night and heard the victim in the kitchen getting a beer. From there, Ingold allegedly awoke again at 4:01 a.m. and found the victim deceased in the bedroom. Ingold allegedly acknowledged that he and the victim were the only two people in the house, but he denied touching the victim.

Defense attorney Julianne Lennon, who was brought in after Ingold said he wanted his previous attorney, Christopher Froehlich, said she had received all of the discovery materials from Froehlich shortly after Memorial

Day. Based on that, Ingold wanted to set a jury trial, according to Lennon, which would be in Kussel's courtroom and start at 8:15 a.m. Sept. 11.

Assistant district attorney Laura Nelson said that, based on the nature of the case, she expected it to last five days.

Originally, court officials sought to start the trial in November, but Lennon asked for an earlier date, considering Ingold is still in the Shawano County Jail on a \$1 million bond.

COURT NEWS

- Joseph Lukasik, 59, Pulaski, was found guilty June 6 by a Shawano-Menominee County Court jury of operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated (fourth offense) and misdemeanor resisting or obstructing an officer. The jury acquitted Lukasik of a misdemeanor ignition interlock violation. On June 7, Judge Katherine Sloma placed him on three years probation beginning with one year in the county jail, and revoked his driver's license for 36 months.

- Shelly L. Lynd, 59, Crivitz, pleaded no contest March 8 to operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated (fifth or sixth offense). Sloma sentenced Lynd on May 30 to 18 months in state prison, followed by two years of extended supervision, and revoked her driver's license for 36 months.

- Shandell A. Broadway, 30, pleaded no contest June 1 to two counts of first-degree recklessly endangering safety, substantial battery, intimidating a victim by threat or use of force, possession of heroin with intent to deliver, two counts of felony bail jumping, and possession of a firearm by a person convicted of an out-of-state felony. Sloma sentenced her to three years in prison, followed by seven years of extended supervision.

- Scott A. Tainter, 41, Antigo, pleaded no contest to discharging a firearm in a school zone and misdemeanor counts of disorderly conduct and resisting or obstructing an officer. Sloma sentenced him to nine months in the county jail.

- Ethen C. Pollard, 32, Fayetteville, Georgia, pleaded no contest to two counts of battery or threat to a law officer. Judge Leon D. Stenz sentenced him to six months in the county jail.

- Shawn M. Tilton, 40, Tigerton, pleaded no contest June 2 to possession of a firearm by a person convicted on a felony. Stenz levied a \$1,000 fine and court costs.

- Jade L. Pecore, 32, Gresham, pleaded no contest June 5 to two counts of possession of methamphetamine, possession of narcotic drugs, six counts of felony bail jumping, and misdemeanor counts of theft and disorderly conduct.

Sloma placed her on four years of probation after imposing and staying a prison sentence.

- Travis T. Bernarde, 37, Wittenberg, pleaded no contest June 6 to possession of THC (second or subsequent offense). Sloma sentenced him to 120 days in jail and levied a \$400 fine and costs.

- Charges were dismissed without prejudice May 31 against Tyler J. Thunder, 20, Cecil, who had been charged with two counts of possession with intent to deliver THC.

- Charges were dismissed May 30 against Samantha R. Senoracki, 26, Birnamwood, who had been charged with retail theft, possession of narcotic drugs, and possession of methamphetamine.

- Hilary J. Waukau, 20, Keshena, was charged May 30 with possession of narcotic drugs and misdemeanor counts of possession of drug paraphernalia and resisting or obstructing an officer. Sloma set a \$2,500 signature bond and scheduled a status conference for July 18.

- April M. Westphal, 27, Suring, was charged June 1 with possession of narcotic drugs, six counts of felony bail jumping, and misdemeanor possession of drug

paraphernalia. Sloma set a \$750 cash bond and scheduled a preliminary hearing for Aug. 14.

- Robert J. Vanmeerbeck, 35, Shawano, was charged June 1 with possession of methamphetamine, possession of materials to manufacture or produce methamphetamine, and misdemeanor possession of drug paraphernalia. Sloma set a \$2,500 signature bond and scheduled a July 12 status conference.

- Danny S. Wedde, 38, Clintonville, was charged June 2 with two counts of felony bail jumping. Kussel set a \$750 cash bond and scheduled a June 14 preliminary hearing.

- Meiah H. Frausto, 21, Shawano, was charged June 9 with strangulation and suffocation and misdemeanor disorderly conduct. Kussel set a \$500 cash bond and scheduled a June 23 preliminary hearing.

- Ronald E. Lee, 28, listed as homeless in court records, was charged June 9 with possession of methamphetamine and misdemeanor possession of drug paraphernalia. Kussel set a \$2,500 signature bond and scheduled a June 27 preliminary hearing.

Fight with officers lands Seymour man in jail

Degroot threatened to slit officer's throat, complaint says

A Seymour man is in custody after allegedly grappling with Shawano County sheriff's deputies who came to his home to stand by while a woman removed her property.

Kevin R. Degroot, 42, was charged June 5 with three counts of battery to a law enforcement officer, two counts of threatening a law officer, and one count each of resisting an officer causing a soft-tissue injury to the officer, first-degree recklessly endangering safety, second-degree recklessly endangering safety, and misdemeanor criminal damage to property.

Shawano-Menominee County Judge William Kussel Jr. set a \$65,000 cash bond and adjourned DeGroot's initial appearance until June 27.

According to the criminal complaint, a 35-year-old woman asked for a deputy to be on scene while she removed her pickup truck and other belongings from Degroot's property. When they arrived the rear tires of the truck had been removed, and the vehicle was resting on its rear differential and axle.

Degroot had allegedly loosened the rear tire lug nuts and then driven the truck back and forth until the tires fell off, the complaint said.

As Deputy Joshua Heider walked up, Degroot allegedly said, "Get off my property, you're trespassing," and "I'm going to slit your throat." When Heider said the woman wanted to gather some of her belongings and the truck, Degroot started to walk into the home, and Heider tried to detain him because he was concerned the man might go inside and arm himself with a weapon, the complaint said.

At that point a struggle ensued. When Heider was unable to get Degroot's arms behind his back, the deputy disengaged, stood up and unholstered his Taser. Degroot swung

a metal ladder at Heider, striking him in the back, and then threw the ladder, which caught the deputy at the end of his left thumb, according to the complaint.

The altercation proceeded into the living room of the house, where Degroot allegedly grabbed a short oscillating fan and struck Heider twice in the side of the head. He also allegedly shouted "get him" at his three dogs in an apparent effort to get the animals to attack Heider. Eventually, another man came in the house and asked Degroot what he was doing and why he would assault a police officer, according to the complaint.

The man helped the deputy put Degroot in handcuffs, but as other officers arrived, he continued to kick and pull away, according to the complaint. One

officer was kicked in the shoulder and neck as he struggled to put Degroot in the back of a squad car, the complaint said. Officers used the Taser twice to try to subdue Degroot.

Hospital staff said Heider had no broken bones, but they placed his bruised hand in a brace and told him to follow up with a hand specialist.

If convicted, Degroot faces a maximum sentence of six years in prison for each of the battery or threat to a law officer charges and the charge of injuring the officer, up to 12 years for first-degree reckless endangerment and 10 years for second-degree reckless endangerment, and nine months for the misdemeanor property damage count.

Charges refiled in child sex assault case

Bond has been set at \$50,000 cash for a Keshena man accused of sexually assaulting a 10-year-old girl in 2019.

Robert L. Brown, 36, is charged in Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court with two counts of first-degree sexual assault of a child younger than 12 and two counts of exposing himself to a child.

The charges are a refile of a case that was originally filed Sept. 9 and had been heading to trial. Judge Katherine Sloma dismissed the charges without prejudice June 5 but ordered Brown to be held for 72 hours pending the refile. The new complaint was filed June 7.

During a brief court appearance June 13, Brown said he had talked with his attorney from the earlier case, who apparently was unsure whether he would continue to represent Brown. Sloma told Brown he is eligible to be represented by a public defender, and she scheduled a status conference for 1:30 p.m. July 18.

According to the criminal complaint, the girl told her mother about the alleged assaults in April 2022, saying they had occurred during the same night in 2018 or 2019 when she was in fifth grade. Brown and his girlfriend had been staying at their home for a few nights.

One night Brown came into the room where the girl was sleeping three times and forced her to perform a sexual act each time, the complaint said. She "kept pretending to be asleep to block

out what was happening."

The girl told an investigator she came forward in 2022 after a conversation between her mother and an aunt sparked her memory, and she told them what had happened.

Another incident allegedly happened on the Menominee reservation that was being handled by tribal police. According to the complaint, an FBI agent conducted a polygraph examination during which Brown allegedly denied having contact with the girl but eventually said he had assaulted the girl after smoking meth.

"This won't happen if I wasn't on meth," he allegedly wrote in an apology to the girl that is attached to the criminal complaint.

If convicted of all charges, Brown faces a maximum prison sentence of 60 years for each of the child sex assault charges and three years for each of the exposure counts.

Merrill man waiting for public defender

Kropf facing charge of incest, currently in jail on \$50K bond

A Merrill man will be waiting a little longer to move forward on charges against him after a status conference June 6 in Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court showed that he has not been appointed a public defender yet.

Another status conference was scheduled for July 5 at 1:30 p.m. to see if counsel has been desig-

nated by then for James Kropf. Many cases like Kropf's have been delayed in courts across the country due to a lack of attorneys available to take on criminal cases.

"This is not unusual," said Judge William Kussel Jr. "This is a situation affecting our area, the state and the nation. There's a shortage of attorneys taking cases right now."

Once an attorney is in place, the court will schedule a preliminary hearing to determine if there is enough evidence to proceed with a trial.

Kropf was charged May 5 with a felony charge involving the sexual assault of a child in relation to two incidents between September 2021 and April 2022 in Bowler.

If convicted, Kropf faces \$100,000 in fines and 40 years in prison. He is currently in the Shawano County Jail on a \$50,000 bond.

According to the criminal complaint, a Shawano County deputy received a call from Child Protective Services regarding a girl in Kropf's care, aged 10. CPS reported that the girl told them that Kropf touched her in the swimsuit area. The daughter lives with her mother and has visitation with Kropf on weekends.

In an interview with the daughter's mother, the mother was alleg-

edly surprised and unaware of the circumstances. She told law enforcement that visits with the child's father are from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. and are supervised by Kropf's mother.

In an interview with the child, the child described two instances where Kropf touched her chest in an inappropriate manner. She stated that both of the instances took place at Kropf's mother's home. When wrestling on the ground, the child said that Kropf touched her chest over her clothes and she told him to stop, which she also said Kropf mimicked. The child also described a similar situation for the second time it happened.

Bahr to get preliminary hearing in September

Cecil man faces multiple charges including ones involving drugs and firearms

A Cecil man's case involving drugs, firearms and more than two dozen bail jumping charges moved forward as a preliminary hearing was scheduled.

The preliminary hearing for Tracy A. Bahr, 39, is expected to take place at 2 p.m. Sept. 22, but it could be pushed back as jury trials are scheduled for that week.

Bahr was charged Aug. 10, 2022, with one count of failing to comply with an officer's attempt to take him into custody, two counts of possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, one count of possession of

methamphetamine, one count of possession of THC (greater than 1,000 grams), 22 counts of bail jumping, one misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer,

three misdemeanor counts of possession of drug paraphernalia and seven misdemeanor counts of bail jumping.

Those charges came after Bahr allegedly fled police on an ATV with a firearm at a residence in

Pulaski. Law enforcement was allegedly trying to bring him into custody on a previous case.

Bahr is currently out of jail on a \$25,000 cash bond and \$100,000 signature bond.

There was some initial confusion at a June 9 status conference about whether or not a preliminary hearing had taken place, but when it was determined one had not occurred, defense attorney Christopher Froehlich requested the court move forward with one.

"He has advised me that he would like a preliminary hearing," Froehlich said of Bahr after noting that he'd met with his client and gone over the complaint.

Normally, preliminary hearings are scheduled within 10 days, but Bahr waived the timeline to allow Froehlich time to go through all the discovery.

Bahr faces up to 3½ years in prison and \$10,000 in fines for failure to comply with an officer's attempt to take a person into custody, 10 years and \$25,000 for each count of possessing a firearm by a convicted felon, 3½ years and \$10,000 for possession of methamphetamine, six years and \$10,000 for possession of THC (greater than 200-1,000 grams) with intent, and six years and \$10,000 for each bail jumping count.

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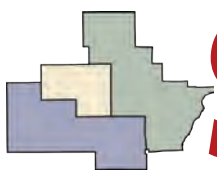

a bigger stride in the conference as a team and make a further push in the playoffs with my guys one last time," said Olson.

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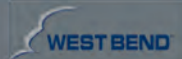

The Lena High School boys golf team placed fifth in Division 3 at the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association State Boys Tournament on June 5-6 at Blackwolf Run - Meadows Course in Kohler.

Lena had a team score of 370, which is 82 shots over par, on the first day of competition. Lena posted a team score of 373 on the second day, giving the team a two-day total score of 743.

Braden McVane led the Wildcats over the two-day competition and ended up placing seventh as an individual with a total score of 165.

McVane was tied for 14th after a day of action after posting a round of 86. His second day round of 79 was tied for the second-best individual mark of the day.

"The first round I struggled around the greens and wasn't too happy with my score, but the second day I came around and played some good golf," said McVane. "It definitely feels good to have placed seventh out of the many guys."

Mason Belongia was Lena's next finisher, taking 26th overall after a total score of 185.

His round of 92 had him tied for 25th after the first day. Belongia then carded a 93 on day two.

"I was a little disappointed with my rounds as I shot a 92 and a 93," said Belongia. "I've never played in a tournament with this much intensity so it was definitely a learning experience for me. My rounds make me want to grind harder for next year and hopefully do better."

Mason Spice turned in a two-day total of 194 to finish tied for 36th place as an individual.

After a round of 93 on day one, Spice carded a 101 the second day.

"My two rounds were not great," said Spice. "The first round my tee shots were excellent but I struggled

"I did not golf good at all but that is all right because we made it to state. That's all that matters," said VanderZanden. "I learned that if you don't putt good there, your score is not going to look good."

While most of the Wildcats weren't thrilled with the rounds they produced, the fifth-place finish as a team was an accomplishment, especially for making the school's first-ever state appearance.

"We had no expectations coming into the tournament so a fifth is pretty cool in all our eyes, but I know we all have a lot more to show for ourselves and I think we can improve for next

year," said Dionne.

Four baseball players from Lena and three from the Gillett/Suring co-op earned spots on Marinette & Oconto Conference teams this spring.

Lessons learned for taught and teaching

As educators, we are taught to be reflective practitioners, always looking at how a lesson went to learn how to teach it better next time. When I taught middle and high school social studies, it was an hour-by-hour, sometimes minute-by-minute, experience in reaction to how a lesson was being learned (or not) by my students. Sure, I was the one teaching the lesson, but we were all learning from it.

I often think about this — lessons taught and lessons learned — at this time of year as we approach final school bells, graduations, and the first days of summer break. While I may not be leading a classroom's lessons anymore, as the leader of public education in Wisconsin, I have the privilege to continue learning from the students in our classrooms, and to continue reflecting about how we can be better next time.

As this school year comes to an end, I'd like to share some of my learning and reflect back to you, the residents and leaders of this state, a few of the lessons I've had to honor of learning from Wisconsin's students so we can listen, learn, and grow as a state.

Our students want us to know that their lives, their childhoods, their ex-

periences, are different than ours were. They're right. None of us who are in state leadership today sat through active shooter drills as students, or scrolled on social media as a teenager, or tried

to navigate a global pandemic and puberty at the same time.

Our children are asking us for more support for their mental health and emotional well-being. Let's give them that support, let's reach out and ask if they're OK, and let's fund our schools enough to make sure they have the resources they need if the answer is "No, I need help." We can make a huge difference by listening.

Our students are teaching us lessons every day in civic engagement. As I said at the beginning of this school year in my State of Education address, public education is the foundation of a strong democracy because our students need to know how to think critically and make informed decisions about their, and our, future.

In that speech, I talked about how

our students were going to be "future active participants in our democracy," and I think I would change that phrase today. Because so many of them are already current active participants in our communities.

I see it everywhere I go in Wisconsin: students advocating for composting programs in their school cafeterias, or working with staff and community leaders to make their schools greener and more environmentally conscious, or collaborating on letter writing campaigns like the ones we receive about mental health funding and LGBTQ+ inclusion and the importance of civics being taught in schools. I am perpetually impressed by their engagement and advocacy. I cannot wait to see what they do next.

Our students have an important lesson to teach us in finding joy, because there is so much joy in their classrooms and our communities. I saw it in the first-day-of-school excitement last fall, and it was on full display as we announced the 2024 Wisconsin Teachers of the Year in May.

Children leapt to their feet, gave each other high fives, and screamed (a lot) in celebration of their teachers. It filled my heart to see them show their love and appreciation for their teach-

ers, and out of the five award-winning teachers, all five showed that love right back and thanked their students for making their jobs joyful and meaningful.

We have so much to learn in that exchange about gratitude and celebration, and about telling the people in your life that you care for them. Let's take the hint and celebrate each other more. We don't have to (probably shouldn't) show our appreciation by screaming, but we can spread the joy just the same.

This isn't an exhaustive list, of course, and neither are these lessons new, which is all the more reason we need to reflect, learn, and grow joyfully. So, let me take this opportunity to reflect back to our Wisconsin students, and especially to our 2023 graduates, a moment of gratitude and of celebration. You teach us valuable lessons every day, and we are grateful to you for the inspiration you bring to our communities and for the joy you bring to our lives. I cannot wait to see what you do next, and I know that whatever it is, Wisconsin will be better for it. We already are.

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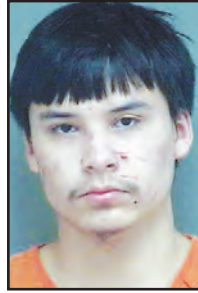
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Larock gets attorneys; preliminary hearing set

Royce Larock has been able to obtain defense counsel to help him deal with charges of attempted first-degree intentional homicide, which will start with a preliminary hearing June 16.

Larock appeared in Shawano-Menominee Circuit Court on June 6 with attorney Carly Jo Foor, who is working with Richard Jones Sr. on Larock's defense. Foor's request for the preliminary hearing, which

will begin at 2:30 p.m., was granted. She explained that the reason for having the hearing so soon, in spite of the defendant's approval of having it later, was because Jones is expected to take on a two-week trial later in June.

"Next week is best for both of us," Foor said.

In addition to the attempted homicide charge, Larock, was charged with one count of aggravated battery, one misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer and one misdemeanor count of disorderly conduct.

If convicted, Larock faces 60 years in prison for the attempted homicide, \$50,000 in fines and 15 years for aggravated battery, \$10,000 and nine months for resisting or obstructing an officer and \$1,000 and 90 days for disorderly conduct.

According to the criminal complaint, Shawano police officers were dispatched to Acorn Street in Shawano for a reported stabbing. When officers arrived a victim was allegedly laying at a neighbor's front step with a stab wound to the stomach area, with intestinal protrusion from a stab wound. The victim allegedly stated that Larock was the person who had stabbed him.

Larock is currently in the Shawano County Jail on a \$500,000 bond.

'Al Clark' offers otherworldly adventure

I stumbled across "Al Clark" by Jonathon G. Meyer last week. It is listed as book one in a long series of science fiction stories featuring this unique individual so I decided to give it a try.

Our protagonist wakes from a deep sleep with no idea who he is or where he is. It doesn't take him long to realize that he has been in hibernation on some sort of spacecraft. The key card and keys he finds don't reveal his identity, but the severely faded name plate beside his cubicle door offers a few letters, causing him to assume his name must be Al Clark or something similar.

As he explores the ship, he meets a teenaged boy named Chris Morris. Chris explains that they are aboard the spaceship Excalibur bound for an Earth-like planet they've named Avalon. When humans had nearly destroyed Earth the powers that be built spaceships capable of making the 40-year journey to a habitable planet.

The crews were handpicked for their expertise in many areas. Colonists were chosen by lottery, but Chris knew that a few, like himself, slipped aboard at the last minute. Al assumes they must be orbiting Avalon but has no idea how long they've been in orbit or why the other people hadn't been awakened.

With some ingenuity they find a manual on how to wake others from "hiber-sleep." Chris insists that the first should be his mother, Liz, as she has skills they desperately need. Soon they revive a doctor, two techs

After a small injury Al sees wires beneath his skin and convinces a robotic tech to do a scan. That's when he hears the truth. Long ago he had an accident that destroyed his body, but left his brain intact. Scientists offered him a new life by combining his brain with a robotic body.

In "enhanced mode" Al is capable of extraordinary feats. But will the colonists accept a robotic/human? The first landing party finds a small tribe of primitive humanoids who treat them like long-awaited gods. Before they can get far in establishing the village they are attacked by large, raptor-like creatures. It is obvious that they have been preying on the small humanoids for a long time and they are eager for the "gods" to destroy them.

As they colonize the planet the ship experiences several acts of sabotage that cause a death. When caught, the young saboteur explains that she was raised to believe that the colonists would slaughter the natives in order to take their land. While awaiting trial she sees that she was very wrong and pleads for mercy.

Al is determined that their new

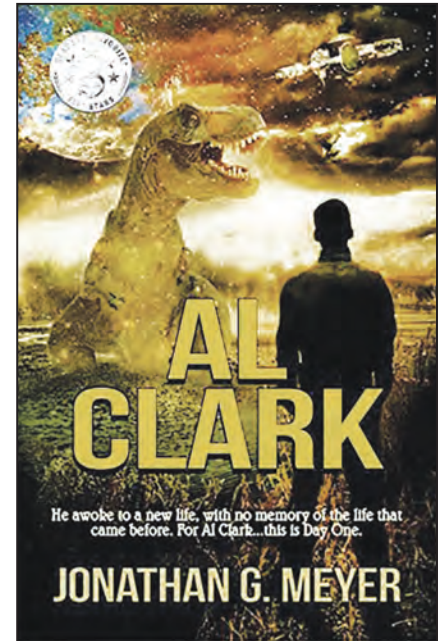

When the melee is over, Al has used his robotic enhancements to save the colony, thus revealing his secret to everyone. Will the colonists accept him or shun him as a despised cyborg?

The book doesn't go deep enough into how the colonists interact with the natives, how they learn about all the new animals, birds, and plants, and how they plan to prevent the pollution and wholesale destruction that had been done to the earth, but the basic story is good enough to make me ready to continue with the next book in the series.

Let's hope we can undo some of the damage we have already done

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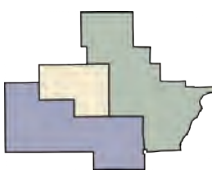

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Book exposes all of Wisconsin's whimsy

Author of '100 Things to Do in Wisconsin Before You Die' coming to Shawano

Everything you wanted to know about the dairy state but were afraid to ask can be found in Dannelle Gay's new book, "100 Things to Do in Wisconsin Before You Die."

Although the title implies the Grim Reaper might be stalking you and it'd be good to get some things off the bucket list, Gay pointed out that the book is just a list of some of the amazing things that make Wisconsin unique. She's coming to Shawano from 1-4 p.m. June 24 to sign books at the Moonlight Drive-In, 1494 E. Green Bay St.

The local drive-in theater is mentioned as a potential place for people around the state to visit, along with others throughout Wisconsin that area residents can check out.

"There are states that do not have drive-in movie theaters," Gay said. "That's just one of the many reasons we are so lucky in Wisconsin. It's like stepping back in time when you hit that concession stand, and you get treats for a movie. It's a fun family experience now where people put their cars in backwards and they pull lawn chairs and blankets and picnic baskets. It's kind of a fun retro experience, and it's budget friendly, too."

Even though the number in the title is 100, Gay said she actually crammed in almost double the destinations, 191, into the book.

"There's so many amazing things about Wisconsin," she said. "We've got nature. We have history. It's like a mecca for your mouth, and there are experiences that you can do that you can't find in other states. There are supper clubs, still, as well as drive-in movie theaters. We have 49 amazing state parks."

The plethora of things to do in the book range from old standbys like the supper clubs and drive-ins that help the older generation stay active to more modern activities that excite and entice the future business owners and leaders of Wisconsin, according to Gay.

The impetus for "100 Things to Do in Wisconsin Before You Die" came during the COVID-19 pandemic, when Gay was helping to write a travel book on road trips "when the world was shut down and about 45% of travel writers quit." Gay recalled being locked in Wisconsin, and as

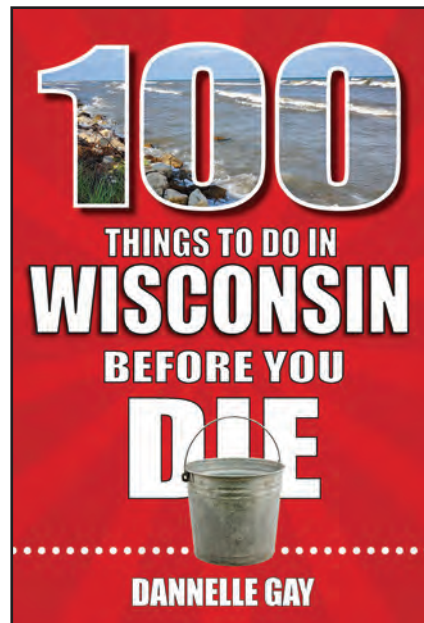
about the state's highways, she realized that there was a lot of uniqueness to the state that begged to be advertised.

"I kind of became a Wisconsin destination expert then," Gay said. "Everybody started paying attention."

Gay sees the book as a "passport to fun in the Badger State." She likes being able to highlight communities and the neighbors that make up those communities. She also enjoys the idea of the book going to people outside of the state and providing them with a detailed guide about Wisconsin.

"We have so many things you can do in Wisconsin that you can't do anywhere else," Gay said. "There are so many supper clubs that are like post-Prohibition, easy, fast and fair to the luxury experiences that you see nowadays. There are a huge variety across the state, almost 200 of them."

Gay also highlights the Farm to Fork phenomenon, where restaurants get much of their food supply from



area farms, providing fresher food at lower prices. She felt it was important to highlight that aspect, considering Wisconsin is losing family farms on an almost daily basis.

"We are so lucky to have an incredible collection of different kinds of farms that restaurateurs locally supply food," Gay said. "Not only do you have these easy meals that are incredibly fresh, they're able to counter the effect of inflation and supply chain issues. If you eat at one restaurant, you're supplying 10 different businesses with your efforts because of all the different farmers — the one that supplies the cheese or some of the produce or some of the ground beef or pork."

That's the agriculture side, but Gay also highlights Wisconsin's rich history with the Great Lakes. One of the things she features in her book is how the Wisconsin Maritime Museum in Manitowoc offers the S.S. Colby, a retired submarine as an AirBnB that people can rent and stay in for the night.

"It's a really fun experience," Gay said, noting that she field tested all of the places that she features in "100 Things to Do in Wisconsin Before

You Die."

Another fun feature in the book pays tribute to the existence of 10 shovel-nosed steamer trains, which were three cars plus the engine, according to Gay.

"They were pretty fancy at the time with art deco and being able to go 110 miles per hour," she said. "Seven of them have been lost to history, two are in museums, and then Spooner, Wisconsin, has the last one and it's the only one you can ride in the world."

Nature in the state parks, fish boils in Door County, mining history near Platteville and more await folks who read "100 Things to Do in Wisconsin Before You Die."

"We have everything," Gay said. "Yet, sometimes it's like the carpenter whose house never has the front-door cupboards. It's easy to oversee what you have in your own backyard that you already have."

Lions and tigers and bears, oh my

It's like a trek through the woods with Dorothy and her crew as they skip down the yellow brick road. While there are no lions or tigers, along with deer in varying shapes and sizes and horn developments (which may or may not elicit a heart-pumping adrenaline rush), we've spotted raccoon, opossum, fox, turkeys, chipmunks, squirrels, a bobcat, coyote, wolves and a peculiar looking feral cat that seems to be frequenting the area. A lumbering bear, too.

One night after supper he was scanning his photos and with a flat tinge to his voice muttered, "Oh, boy." With a half-grin he glanced at me, waiting for my reaction.

Immediately, I perked up because he doesn't use that tone when looking at his phone pics. It's normally a silent scroll until he spots a buck that's mentionable.

Suspiciously, I asked him, "What-cha got there?"

"A pretty big bear."

When I was a young girl, I had a reoccurring dream that I got chased by a black bear through our empty barn, in and out between the stanchions. Why the animal was in our barn and what did he want with a 10-year old farm girl, who knows, but ever since I've had a perverse fascination/aversion to any type of bear. In this dream, I was always just one step ahead and could feel his hot breath on my neck. It was terrifying.

"We'll be going there to cut wood tomorrow," my husband had pronounced. Previously he had pulled

some logs down to the clearing close to where the cam is set up and had already designated this particular day for our "making wood day."

Getting down there we got ourselves organized. I'd be using our wood splitter as he cut logs with his chain saw into bite-sized pieces for me.

I told him, emphatically told him, "You watch my back and I'll watch yours." Like the bear was going to

come out of his hiding spot with all of this noise, to chase us down. Well. I was gonna have a plan.

While we were collecting sap this year I'd scan the ridge, back and forth, back and forth, for bear activity. It was late spring, the days warmish, and any bear coming out of hibernation would be ready for a quick meal. I figured I'd see him coming and not go down without a fight.

Out of curiosity I Googled: "Are

bears more aggressive after hibernation?" and came up with, "Spring is also one of the most dangerous seasons for bear attacks as bears are coming out of hibernation and they are hungry and can be grumpy (Oh. Hungry — Hungry and mad. I can relate) as well as with new cubs. While this sounds like a lethal situation, bear attacks are relatively rare. Bears do not emerge from their dens with the intent of attacking people." Hang on, how do these people know this, truly? Doubts linger.

Just lately, we randomly planted 10 American chestnut trees on the hill. These trees are allegedly supposed to attract deer, given they flourish and produce chestnuts anywhere from three to five years. We ventured out one day early spring when the ground was pliable and receptive and along with the saplings, bought tubes and stakes. Our neighbor had planted trees and being a tree-farmer we picked his brain about why he covered the tops of his tubes. "So birds don't build nests in there!" He had wrapped netting around the top, securing it with a rubber band.

Working side-by-side, my husband dug the hole, I'd drop the tree in, holding it upright while he filled in. (All the while scanning the landscape for, you know ...) I'd have the tube in hand and sliding it down over the sapling, he tapped the stake in place with a hammer. After almost 44 years of marriage we have chores down to a science: He directs, I follow.

Our multipurpose woods — we both just love it. While there are no lions and tigers residing there, we realize a few bears make it their home. As long as they don't have me for supper, I'm OK with that.

("But ask the animals and they will teach you, or the birds in the sky and they will tell you; or speak to the earth and it will teach you or let the fish in the sea inform you. Which of all these does not know the hand of the Lord has done this? In His hand is the life of every creature and the breath of all mankind." Job 12:7-10)

Invasive species wreak havoc on gardens

June is Invasive Species Awareness Month and a great time to become familiar with invasive species that may be found in your yard and garden, as well as our area woodlands, parks and wild places.

Learning to identify invasive species, as well as ways to help control their spread is important for property owners and gardeners. Once an invasive species takes hold, it becomes more and more difficult to remove

or eradicate.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has an excellent resource library online that profiles all of the invasive plants found in Wisconsin with detailed fact sheets that help with identification, as well as control methods.

Invasive species are classified as those that are not indigenous to our area. Many of these were brought here from Europe and Asia with the first settlers and immigrants. Some were brought here for food. Some were brought here for ornamental purposes.

Many invasive species have been introduced to our area in modern times, mainly as ornamental plants for our yards and gardens. Once they take hold and escape cultivation in our yards and gardens, they are difficult to control because they have no natural enemies.

Some invasive plants are spread voraciously by hungry birds that eat the berries or seeds and spread them far and wide.

While not all invasive species are aggressive, some of the worst can take over large areas of native wild space in just a short period of time.

Buckthorn, including two exotic species, is one of the worst. Spread by its berries, buckthorn has taken over large tracts of woodland and forest edge. Once established, buckthorn colonies grow fast and spread outward, smothering large sections of the forest floor that should be home to native plants and wildflowers.

Dame's rocket was once a popular erosion control plant installed along highways and roadways where it quickly spread. Though beautiful in shades of pink, purple and

white, dame's rocket spreads quickly, smothering out native species along the forest edge, in ditches and along road sides.

Phragmites is the huge "pampas grass," we see along area highways and in wetlands and marshes. This plant becomes increasingly difficult

to control as its root systems spread and intertwine, creating a thick mass of peat and roots that is nearly impossible to remove.

Garlic mustard is another aggressive plant that has quickly spread into many local woodlands, parks and gardens. The plant spreads by seed, as each plant is capable of producing almost half a million seeds each year. The good news is, it is highly nutritious and delicious, so try using garlic mustard in recipes you can find online.

Over 150 plants have been identified as invasive species in Wisconsin. You can view the full list on the DNR website and learn much more about them and ways you can help prevent the spread.

Dedicate some time this month to learning more about invasive species and how efforts you make in your own backyard and garden can help.

Striving to remain close to her community and embracing tribal values, Firgens makes it a priority to care for elders in the community who need assistance. Firgens serves multiple elders on or near the Menominee reservation by volunteering with the Senior Companion Program through the Great Lakes Inter-Tribal Council. Firgens gives her time to make a difference for multiple people in the community, providing those she serves with companionship, rides to medical appointments, help in their homes, and assistance with whatever else they need.

One of her clients is very elderly and can no longer drive. Firgens assists this elder with trips to and from her doctor and with whatever other errands she needs help completing, making it possible for the elder to remain in her home. Beyond just helping with these tasks that help her live independently, Firgens also takes this elder on outings to keep her feeling connected to the community and makes sure the client knows she can depend on her for assistance.

Firgens does not let obstacles get in the way of helping others, always finding ways to maintain connections with those she serves. When a bridge in the community was closed, requiring lengthy detours and significantly more time to reach her clients and to run errands with them, Firgens was not deterred. During the COVID-19 pandemic, if Firgens could not see her clients in person, she helped reduce the isolation her elders were experiencing, calling them frequently on the phone and dropping groceries and other needed items off at their homes.

Wendy Rozhon from the Senior Companion Program said Firgens "is a willing volunteer who goes above and beyond for people. Her upbeat, positive attitude and willingness to get involved make her a great example of what true volunteerism is all about."
