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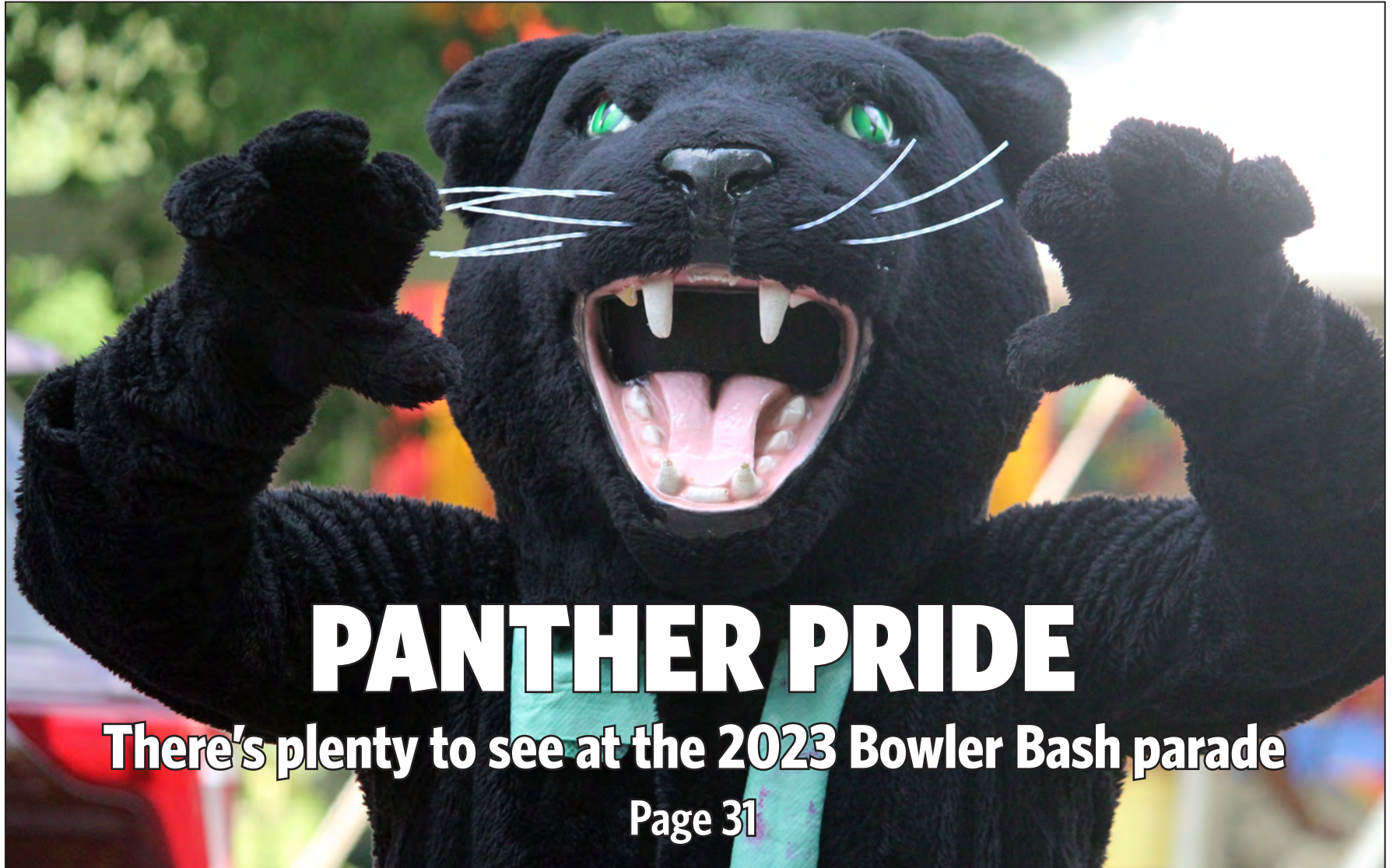

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Noriega-Avila case going to trial this month

Attorneys hash out final issues in hearing before jury case on Aug. 15

The trial of a man accused of raping and committing incest with his former stepdaughter will start Aug. 15 in Branch II of the Shawano County Courthouse, barring any last minute legal deals.

Final pre-trial motions were addressed at a hearing Aug. 3, including concerns that Pedro Noriega-Avila's immigration status might be brought into the case and whether he was fleeing when he went missing for five years. The motions were made at another hearing July 18.

Defense attorney Sara Stertz objected to claims that Noriega-Avila fled the jurisdiction when he was initially charged in 2016 with one count of sexual assault of a child under age 13, two counts of sexual assault of a child and two counts of incest with a child by stepparent. Court records show that Noriega-Avila appeared for his initial hearing in June of that year, paid a \$5,000 cash bond and then did not return for the next hearing.

"It would be unduly prejudicial, especially under the circumstances," Stertz said. "That jury instruction was drafted more for cases where somebody ran from the scene or were stealing evidence intentionally, something

like that. In this case, Mr. Noriega-Avila posted a cash bond, and there's no evidence that he understood what his bond conditions were, what he intended to do, what he was at liberty. We don't know he was trying to evade process."

Stertz expressed concern that the instruction would point to guilt without taking into account the other factors of the case.

Shawano-Menominee County District Attorney Greg Parker did not see how it could not be construed that Noriega-Avila fled, considering he was missing from the court for almost five years until his arrest in Arizona in 2021.

"He posted cash. He was not seen after that until he crossed the border (into Mexico)," Parker said.

Parker noted that law enforcement responded to a U.S. Border Patrol station on March 13, 2021, regarding the warrant issued by the Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court for Noriega-Avila, and the defendant was already in custody when officers arrived. Noriega-Avila was brought back to Shawano County in July 2021.

"The jury certainly has the ability to determine whether or not he left because he had sexual assault charges against him or if he went on vacation for a number of years out of the country," Parker said, noting that the fleeing claims will be part of his opening statement at the trial.

Stertz told the court that she feels that bringing up Noriega-Avila's immigration status is irrelevant to the case and would be prejudicial.

Parker pointed out that the immigration status is also irrelevant to him in regards to the facts of the case.

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"The man took off for the border to avoid prosecution; this is what this is about," he said. "His immigration status is not part of the discussion."

In another motion, Stertz asked to dismiss the case, and Parker was concerned that if the matter was not settled prior to trial, it could impact whether the trial could proceed to completion.

"I'm a little concerned that, if we go forward with the trial, and this motion has been filed, I just don't want to see any of us go through all of this again," Parker said.

Stertz said that she did further research on the matter and found that the case cannot be dismissed with prejudice because there was no misconduct on the part of the state. She had made the motion because it had been two years since Noriega-Avila was incarcerated at the Shawano County Jail, but that's because of systemic issues with the court system, like

finding legal counsel and, in this case, available Spanish-speaking interpreters to translate the proceedings to the defendant. Those issues cannot be laid at the feet of the district attorney's office, she said.

Stertz noted that she did want to continue pursuing the motion because it would continue to delay proceedings, something she feels would not benefit her client.

"I discussed it with my client, and he would rather not wait another year to go to trial, so we will be withdrawing that motion," Stertz said.

Stertz also filed a motion regarding the DA's plans to call for an expert witness, but Parker explained to the court that, upon further review, an expert witness would not be needed for Noriega-Avila's case.

Noriega-Avila remains in jail on a \$500,000 cash bond.

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Wittenberg backs off referendum plans

Borrowing to rehabilitate Prouty Street scrapped after determining sewer would better benefit

The Wittenberg Village Board reversed course Aug. 7 on its plans to look into and consider a \$1.5 million referendum for road rehabilitation on Prouty Street.

With the referendum being the first in the village's history, village officials were looking into what would be required to get a proposal on the April 2024 ballot that would allow, with voter approval, the complete repaving of Prouty Street with the installation of curbs and gutters. After consulting with Ehlers Public Financial Advisors, based in Waukesha, it was clear that asking voters for borrowing money for the first time would be wasted on a single road rehabilitation.

"I talked to them first, and then they sent this to me, and I don't understand it," said Village Clerk Traci Matsche, holding up a memorandum that the company sent her. "I called about getting a simple referendum put together, but they had other ideas and better ideas about how to get the money together. They didn't think a referendum was the way to go, but that's not up to them."

Matsche, who has previously said she has no idea how to put a referendum together, noted that the village has a maximum borrowing capacity of

\$2 million, something it didn't have 10 years ago.

Board member David Timm agreed with Ehlers that a referendum would be an inefficient and expensive venture for the village.

"The referendum is going to cause added expenses, and we don't really have to do that," Timm said.

Matsche pointed out that there's another huge expense on the horizon where borrowing might be necessary, and that involves the village's sewer system.

"We're going to have to put big bucks into the sewer," Matsche said. "We're not going to be able to get a bond if our borrowing power is back at zero, so if we spend a big chunk of what we have on a street ... I wanted to remind you and am just telling you that."

Board President William Switalla pointed out that repaving Prouty Street is not going to be a huge expense. It's the installation of curbs and gutters that would sock Wittenberg in the wallet.

"Somebody brought up that they're parking on the sidewalk near the street," Switalla said. "Do you have any idea how many sidewalks we could replace for what that's going to cost us to put curb and gutter on a street that's been like that for 50 years?"

Switalla added that there is one

house that is negatively impacted by Prouty Street not having curbs and gutters but he didn't think the expense from borrowing should be done to benefit a single property.

"Even with that last horrible rain, holy crap, did the water come down. There was a puddle, but that wasn't from not having curbs and gutters," Switalla said. "It's because the sewer system can only take so much. There was a puddle on every corner, and other streets have curb and gutter."

Switalla noted that there are other things the village could spend the money on besides curbs and gutters, such as the restrooms in Washington Park that have generated complaints from residents.

"Are we going to beat up the people again, not only in taxes but then raise the water bills and the sewer bills again because we have to redo the sewer plant?" Switalla said. "We take care of our streets. Our streets are pretty damn good."

He added that while Prouty Street is not the best street in the village, it's not the worst one, either.

Switalla pointed out that referendum talk first emerged when the village was looking at rehabilitating Vinal Street, which would have involved putting in additional infrastructure, something not required for Prouty Street. The only reason that street didn't go forward for a referendum, he said, was because bids for the work were "outrageous."

Timm pointed out that the Wisconsin League of Municipalities is offering options for small communities like Wittenberg to take care of its streets.

"There is more money for streets," Timm said. "That's something that we can look into."

Switalla agreed and pointed out that the village has money now that could go toward repaving Prouty Street. It's only the addition of curbs and gutters that makes the proposal extremely expensive.

"Is curb and gutter important enough to do a referendum?" Switalla said.

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Renel expected to be sentenced in October

The Cecil man charged in a chase with law enforcement and causing a standoff on state Highway 29 in 2022 is expected to change his plea and be sentenced at 3:30 p.m. Oct. 4.

During a final pre-trial hearing Aug. 2, defense attorney Eric Pangburn was asked about the current status of the case, and a plea and sentencing hearing was scheduled, according to online court records.

Renel faces felony counts of fleeing and eluding an officer in a vehicle and second-degree recklessly endangering safety, along with a misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer.

Renel was arrested after the Shawano County Sheriff's Department responded on the evening of May 8, 2022, to reports of a heavy truck-type military vehicle on state Highway 29 in western Shawano County travel-

ing down the road with a flat tire, thus causing a traffic hazard.

Renel allegedly led deputies on a short chase, coming to a stop in about a half-mile on the eastbound lane median of the highway near County Road G in the Town of Seneca. The eastbound highway was shut down due to the incident.

Because of comments allegedly made by Renel and the conditions of this incident, the Shawano County Special Response Team responded to the scene. Deputies, including trained negotiators, communicated with Renel for about four hours.

About 9:30 p.m., Renel allegedly tried to flee, heading eastbound on Highway 29. Deputies stopped the suspect vehicle, using the snowplows from the Shawano County Highway Department in a moving roadblock.

Renel waived a preliminary hearing in May and pled not guilty to all charges.

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Green Bay teen arrested in bonfire explosion

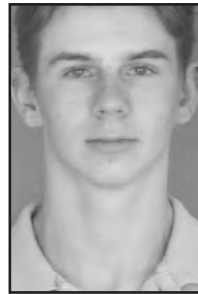
Armstrong charged with 13 felony counts after barrel with gasoline burns Pulaski students

A Green Bay teen has been arrested and charged with injuring at least 13 people during a bonfire incident in the Town of Maple Grove that took place during Pulaski High School's homecoming week in October 2022.

Samuel J. Armstrong, 18, has been charged with 13 felony counts of injury by negligent handling of explosives or fire when a diesel and gasoline mixture came in contact with the bonfire and the fire "began shooting out," according to the criminal complaint. If convicted, Armstrong faces a prison sentence of 3½ years and/or \$10,000 fine for each of the counts.

A Shawano County detective wrote in his report that he responded to a residence on Cedar Drive in Maple Grove on Oct. 15, 2022, after learning that several people between the ages of 16 and 18 were admitted to hospitals in Green Bay for burns and other injuries. The detective

along with a blue plastic 55-gallon barrel with the diesel/gasoline mixture.

The detective spoke with a man at the home, who told him how the fire got out of hand and burned people. The man told the detective that two people, including Armstrong, moved the blue barrel.

The detective interviewed Armstrong, who was 17 at the time, with an attorney present two days later, on Oct. 17, and was told "we decided to throw a barrel" on the fire, according to the detective's report. Armstrong allegedly said he did not think the barrel would do what it did and

reported he could a spot that was "still smoldering" indicating a fire had been burning. The firepit was about 30 feet east of a two-story home, and the detective found empty containers and beer cans,

injure someone.

Armstrong indicated to the detective that he and another person, identified in the report as "TJF," moved the barrel closer to the fire, and at about 10:50 p.m. was told by someone to "just do it," and the pair allegedly threw the barrel into the fire.

Armstrong allegedly tried to help put out the flames on one of the victims when he was punched from behind, according to the criminal complaint. He claimed four or five people went after him, and he ran into a nearby cornfield, where he hid for about five minutes before leaving in his vehicle.

The criminal complaint indicates that Armstrong said he'd consumed six beers.

One of the victims told a detective he was burned on the back of his legs, suffering second- and third-degree burns, according to the criminal complaint. The victim reported seeing several others on fire and tried to assist by smothering the flames with his hooded sweatshirt before realizing he'd been burned, as well.

Another person interviewed by detectives claimed Armstrong made multiple comments about wanting to throw the barrel on the fire, even though a number of people warned him not to.

A victim indicated to a deputy that no one wanted to call 9-1-1 because a number of the underage people at the bonfire had been drinking alcohol.

At least one person had to go to the burn center in Milwaukee after suffering burns to his face, hands, legs and back.

Armstrong made an initial appearance Aug. 3 before Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. and was assessed a \$100,000 signature bond. He waived his right to a preliminary hearing, according to court records. The stipulations include absolute sobriety and no contact with any of the victims.

Armstrong's next hearing is at 1:30 p.m. Sept. 13.

New sidewalks coming in 2024, possibly 2025

Village public hearing addresses concerns about sidewalks going through snowmobile trails

Preliminary plans for new sidewalks in Wittenberg appear to have support from the community as a public hearing on Aug. 7 only generated a couple of questions from someone affiliated with a snowmobile club.

The village received a grant in 2022 from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation's Alternative Transportation Program that will pay for 80% of the cost to install seven new sidewalks, estimated to cost around \$920,000.

New segments are:

- North Genesee Street from north of Grand Avenue to East Wood Avenue, east side.
- East Grand Avenue from North Meisner Street to South Mission Street, south side.
- South Webb Street from School Street to Washington Park, north side.
- East Vinal Street from South Mill Street to Pond Park, south side.
- Pond Park from South Mill Street to East Vinal Street.
- South Ellms Street from north of Walnut Street to Reed Street, east side.
- West Reed Street from Homme Home to South Mill Street, south side, and along South Mill Street to Park Pond, west side.

The project is expected to create about 4,715 feet of new concrete sidewalk in Wittenberg, according to Mary Jo Miller with Martenson and Eisele. She said the majority of the sidewalk will be five feet wide, but for places where there's not a grassy buffer and they're adjacent to a curb,

those sidewalk segments will be six feet wide.

"The intent is to connect some empty segments of sidewalks to make a more continuous system," Miller said.

She noted that the Pond Park sidewalk will be a particular benefit for residents and visitors to get around.

"It'll be a nice connection for somebody who wants to make that shortcut through the park with a stroller or bike or something," Miller said.

Dave Schmidt, a representative with the Wittenberg Trailblazers Snowmobile Club, only expressed concern about the sidewalk going on Reed Street because it intersects with a snowmobile trail. He noted that snow is removed from sidewalks during the winter months, which would

impact the trail if the village plans to treat Reed Street the same.

"There are probably not that many people going from Homme Home to the park in the wintertime, I wouldn't believe," Schmidt said.

Wittenberg Village Board President William Switalla pointed out that concessions could be made for the snowmobile club, suggesting removing a couple of trees so that snowmobilers wouldn't have to connect with the sidewalk.

Board member David Timm pointed out that, even with the trees removed, there might be other places where the snowmobilers might have to cross the sidewalk to continue on the trail.

"There's other places in town where you must cross the sidewalks," Timm said to Schmidt.

Miller pointed out that the sidewalks have a thickness of four to six inches, which shouldn't be impacted by the weight of snowmobiles and riders.

Schmidt said he didn't have any problem with the sidewalks, as long as it didn't cut off snowmobile access.

"I guess we have to play it by ear," Schmidt said. "I just wanted to make you aware. We don't want to have to get shut off completely. That's our main thoroughfare for south to north, people."

Timm assured Schmidt that was not going to happen.

"That's got to keep going," Timm said. "It was never our intention to shut the trail off or restrict it in any way, to try and work around it."

Miller noted that the earliest the project work could begin would be in July 2024, but because of legal red tape, it seems more likely that the sidewalks would be coming in 2025.

"It depends on how quickly DOT reviews all of this stuff," Miller said. "They are extremely slow."

The project will require the village to get one permanent easement from a property owner and temporary 10-foot easements from others, according to Miller. Topsoil will be removed, and there will be some grating, but there is no deep excavation required, she said.

"We've got some minor storm sewer improvements in three areas," Miller said, noting culverts for Pond Park and near the Wiouwash Trail and some work around Wittenberg Sentry Foods will be required to complete the project.

On Tuesday, Aug. 10, 1948, Frederick K. Wolff came into this world as the 10th child of the combined family of Frieda Minnie (Kraft) Wolff and John (Jack) Wolff, of Wittenberg.

He was baptized a child of God on Oct. 3, 1948, at St. Paul Lutheran Church, grew up, went to school and married the best thing that ever happened to him — Jeanette M. Wichman, who said on her first day of kindergarten, “I’m going to marry that Fred.” Although it took 12 years of school to convince him of that, on Oct. 21, 1967, at Holy Family Catholic Church, Wittenberg, they tied the knot with friends and family present. Together, they raised their family of five children — Sheila, Sherri, Greg, Becky and Michael, who also grew up and went to school and raised cain in Wittenberg.

After marriage, we took a short detour to Appleton. Fred was working at Gilbert Paper Mill in Menasha; not enjoying that, Fred took on his passion in life following in the footsteps of his dad and Jeanette’s dad as a bricklayer. He started working for Wergin Construction out of Wausau with his father-in-law, Reuben Wichman. He became a journeyman mason and retired from Miron Construction out of Appleton after 50 dedicated years in the trade.

He left his mark all over the state, as he worked on big buildings all over Wisconsin. We could take a drive, and he would tell stories of how this or that building was built. He also enjoyed showing his sons the art of construction and wanted them to know how to do things for themselves. Together with me, his wife, we built landscape around our home, teaching how, watching and critiquing our projects so it would be perfect. Even if we had to do it over and over again. He would say: “Do it right the first time.”

In his younger years, Fred was in a few leagues. He played softball for Mark’s Bar and had a lot of fun times with the guys, bowling at the Wittenberg Bowling Center. On his off time, you could find him playing a game of pool; he was a bit of a pool shark

in his day. He loved the games of sheephead and cribbage; he could almost read your hand by the cards played and was ready to play the next card before his opponent laid theirs.

We didn’t do a lot of traveling but took a few road trips around Wisconsin. Fred said when you go somewhere, always take a different road going home because you already saw that. Also never make four turns the same way, or you will just go in circles — just a bit of his wit.

Fred and I and his sister, Iris, took a few trips to see some of the beautiful waterfalls around the state. I think he started his love for waterfalls on a family trip to Niagara Falls as a kid with his mom and sisters. He even built a small one in our backyard. We had a lot of fun times working together, even when he would get mad at me for not listening to him on how to do it right.

Fred wasn’t a church-going man, but he knew more about the Bible and God than I did, and I go to church religiously. He would test me on church traditions and would ask me what some of the things were that I considered a part of my beliefs. He always supported my beliefs, even if he didn’t follow them. He was always helping me and members of our church with projects and even gave me ideas on how to do them. He was my rock that I leaned on, and I’m never going to throw it away; we have too many around the house to throw.

Fred always went to all his kids’ sporting events, from T-ball to high school and beyond. Softball, baseball and football were his favorites. He then watched his grandkids and great-granddaughters play. He really enjoyed his family and everyone to come visit him.

Our best times were when all 10 grandkids and six great-grandkids, with their parents, would come to have food and visit for Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter. Fred

always spent too much time hiding Easter eggs for the family hunt every year. Even after writing down where he thought he put the eggs, some were never found.

He wasn’t much for show, just down to earth. Never said it a lot, but you knew what he thought about you, as he always said: “I got that right here,” as he’d point to the back of his head. That was just so you knew he was paying attention. His favorite saying: “Remember, Christmas is coming.”

He watched, and yelled at, the Brewers, loved watching the Badgers games over and over, said you can never watch them too much. Also enjoyed beating his grandson in a hot game of cribbage. He loved taking the grandsons hunting and helping with projects where he could give pointers and supervise. Just ask, and he’ll be sure to let you know how you can do it. Loved doing crossword puzzles and acquired the love of doing Sudokus.

He was one smart man, had a little bit of knowledge about a lot of things. He kept up on what was going on with this world. Didn’t always like it, couldn’t change it, but kept aware of what was happening around him.

After our retirement, we enjoyed going to different lake cabins with our family for a week of fun and water. We were planning our yearly vacation when Fred was diagnosed with cancer only two weeks ago. I said I’ll cancel, but he still wanted to go, even though he wasn’t feeling good. He liked sitting by the lake just watching the birds and surroundings with his coffee in the morning, and he enjoyed seeing everyone having a good time.

Although he passed away the day we were to leave, he still wanted us to go. After a lot of thought, we decided to go and celebrate his life, as it was to be his 75th birthday Thursday during our stay. We’re going to send him off with a bang.

After coming home from the hospital, his family was here for him doing whatever needed to be done, building a ramp, taking him to doctor appointments, support

and love from all. It was a beautiful but sad time — way too sudden. He got to see all those that he cared about, and all that cared about him. He was in God’s hands and with his family around him for love and support during this last two days. He passed away peacefully, Saturday, Aug. 5, at 7:10 p.m. The Brewers won.

I want to thank everyone who was there for us, with love, support and all the prayers, through this difficult time. It was truly a comfort. Even if I didn’t reach out, you were there.

Shawano Pathways will continue its legacy after ending Bike the Barn Quilts with a new event, Make Tracks on the Mountain Bay State Trail. The new fundraiser will be highlighted by a distinctive raffle item, a Bike the Barn Quilts quilt.

Make Tracks is scheduled for Sept. 30. Bike the Barn Quilts ended its 10-year run in 2022.

Cindy Stein, president of Shawano's Crafty Boutique Gift Shop, hand-crafted the quilt. Crafty Boutique donated it to Pathways. The unique quilt is crafted from denim jeans pockets that feature 20 of Shawano County's barn quilts.

"Some of the folks from Pathways' Bike the Barn Quilts were shopping in our store last year," Stein said, explaining how the Barn Quilts quilt came about. "They saw our Shawano display of items and saw the towels with the barn quilts applique on them."

According to Stein, the people said, "What a great idea. It's our 10th anniversary. Everybody who signs up will get a towel."

They asked if it was possible, and Stein agreed. "Thank goodness they did it far enough in advance. They needed 200 towels. I made the barn quilt patches by copying the quilt pictures online from the Chamber of Commerce website."

Stein then copied the images onto printable fabric, made her own patches and appliqued them onto the towels. She completed the 200 towels but had leftover barn quilt patches, and she wondered what to do with them.

"I like the idea of recycling, and I use blue jeans to make quilts, potholders, aprons. You can do a lot with blue jeans," Stein said. "I like to incorporate the pockets. So, I took 20 pockets and applied one of the patches to each of them, then I put the pockets on squares."

With that, the 54-inch-by-64-inch Bike the Barn Quilts quilt was created.

"I gave Pathways the quilt last year to use as a door prize for the Bike the Barn Quilt's last event, the 10th anniversary, last year. They said 'no'

and saved the quilt for this year," Stein said. "And this year, the quilt is a raffle item."

Stein said that she came to Shawano from Green Bay in 2016.

"I discovered this senior gift shop with senior crafters," she said. "There are about 25 of us now that make all of the items in the shop. We rent the space from the civic center (225 S. Main St., Shawano), and we have our little store."

The store is loaded with hand-crafted items, from holiday décor to Barbie doll clothes and everything in between — including many one-of-a-kind items.

"The most popular are the kitchen scrubbies and the bowl holders," said Stein, who then elaborated on how she came to be president. "The previous president had to step down from the position and no one was interested in stepping up for over a year. In the December 2018 crafters' meeting, she said that she absolutely couldn't do it anymore. So, at the February 2019 meeting,

everyone said: 'So, what are we going to do?' and everybody pointed to me."

"I'm one of the youngest crafters," she continued. "The oldest crafter here is, I believe, 92."

"I knew I would need help in the position, so Priscilla King became vice president and Bill Becker is treasurer," she continued. "Our team has done very well."

Stein came to Crafty Boutique with a long history of working with crafts and needlework.

"I can do anything that anybody does in here. I'm very crafty; I can do any craft," she said.

Her vast experience and talent make her a perfect match for crafting the Barn Quilts quilt. She shared that she has been involved in crafting "since I could walk."

"My mom always did any kind of needlework," Stein said. "By the age of 4, all of us could embroider pillow cases. That was our summer activity; we learned how to do this. My mom

had to make all of my clothes, because I was tall and outgrew the children's sizes by third grade. From the age of 12, I was making my own clothes."

Crafty Boutique crafters are able to accommodate special orders. All of the crafters work independently and bring their creations into the shop to be sold.

"If someone comes up to us with an idea, we can usually find somebody to do it," Stein noted.

The Bike the Barn Quilts quilt is on display at Beans and Books Espresso, 215 N. Main St., Shawano. Tickets for the Make Tracks on the Mountain Bay State Trail raffle of the quilt are on sale at the business until Nov. 14. Tickets are \$5 for one, or \$20 for five and are also on sale at All Aboard Nutrition, 620 S. Main St., Shawano. The drawing will be held Nov. 15. Just 500 tickets will be sold. The winner doesn't need to be present to win.

"I still have the daily journal you required us to write. It's a precious slice of my tween life," he said.

I noted he had "grown up good," and then we got on with the appointment. He recommended surgery on both hands, one at a time, requiring months of severely curtailed activities and physical therapy.

I thought long and hard about it. My hands are almost identical to my mother's at this age, though not nearly as wracked by painful

arthritis. If only I had inherited Mom's stoic disposition instead of her two bum thumbs. Like her, I decided to live with it. I massaged my hands, used topical anesthetics, took ibuprofen until my cardiologist ordered me to stop. Then I visited Eric at the Green Banana in Lakewood. He recommended his popular CDB balm. It works wonders, and I'm managing quite nicely.

A younger relative told me some time ago in the sweetest possible way that old folks should quit the whining and witching, because we actually have it pretty good. 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For Morris, 'it is good' to be educator

Jennifer Morris' favorite Menominee word is *wēskewat*. It translates into English as "it is good." A member of College of Menominee Nation's teacher education department, Morris' efforts were deemed *wēskewat* by the school's administrators. At the school's May commencement, she was announced as CMN's Faculty of the Year. I caught up with Morris on her return to campus this August, and she agreed to share her thoughts on the eve of CMN's fall semester.

Morris received her bachelor of arts degree from Alverno College, majoring in history with minors in biology and chemistry. She earned the first of her master's degrees from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee in history with an emphasis in Museum Studies. She returned to Alverno to earn her second in education.

As a graduate student, Morris had stints working as a "pathology lab technician, assistant theater technical director, cafeteria manager and a chemical manufacturing operator." Her diverse resume reveals that prior to taking a position at CMN, Morris also worked as a museum curator, classroom teacher and a vice principal.

Morris began CMN in 2011, seeing her employment at the school as "an opportunity to move back by family and explore a new area of education." Since then, she has served in various roles that include "STEM resource coordinator, adjunct faculty member

and the dean of retention."

In the last dozen years, Morris has worked on various initiatives that include retention efforts such as Project Success and the Carnegie Math Pathways. She also serves on grant and scholarship projects, such as the First Nations Launch Rocket Team, which is a tribal college and university competition that "requires students to conceive, design, fabricate and compete with high powered rockets."

Morris also serves on academic committees at CMN, including the Higher Learning Commission writing and steering teams. In this capacity, Morris contributed to the school's reaccreditation proposal this past academic year. In July, CMN learned their application was approved, thereby ensuring students that the standards set in their coursework is nationally recognized.

I asked Morris what led her to stay at CMN. She responded: "It's the best place I've ever worked. An amazingly kind, talented and accepting community that teaches and inspires me to be a better person every day." She

added: "I want to provide relevant experiences that help students gain the knowledge and skills they feel are meaningful to them, their family and their community."

In the coming year, Morris is excited to "continue celebrating CMN's 30th anniversary and also the 50th anniversary of the Menominee Restoration Act." She explained that "The dedication of the people who led these efforts is awe-inspiring. The opportunity to celebrate them together is inspirational."

Morris' message for new students is to know that "You are brilliant, we love you, and we are honored you are willing to share your time with us." Her advice to new faculty is "the same advice I was given," which is to, "build strong relationships by listening twice as much as you speak."

CMN's fall semester begins Aug. 14. A tribal land grant college, chartered by the Menominee People, the school offers courses in both Keshena and Green Bay.

CMN is open to all, and staffed with instructors such as Morris who said education is "all about you, your community, your organization, your needs and your success."

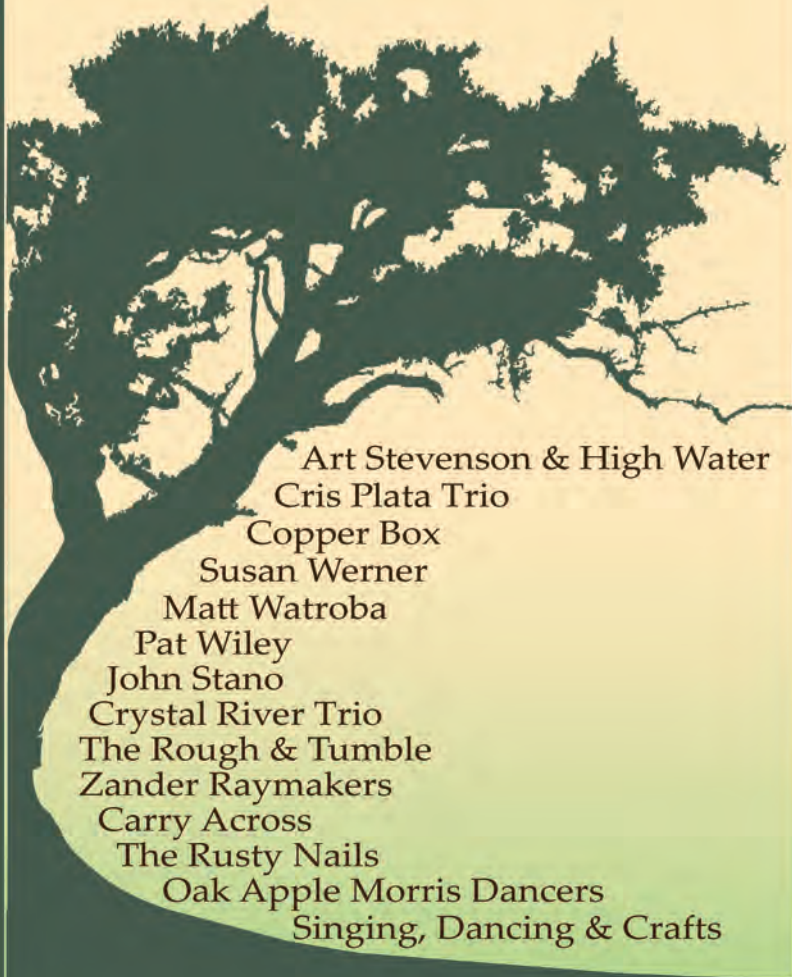
Schwitzer is also working with the College of Menominee Nation's Sustainable Development Institute to develop a video game based on

It is a healing and comforting gesture — a tangible thing recipients can wrap around themselves and know someone thinks about them with love and caring. Nationally, more than 350,000 Quilts of Valor have been presented to veterans since 2003.

Videographer kicked out of Speedway

The disqualification of a driver at the Shawano Speedway on July 22 kicked off a series of events that led to the dismissal of a longtime videographer from the racetrack.

Driver Johnny Whitman was cited for a weight infraction following his win in the IMCA Modified feature race, which caused him to be disqualified. Instead, the prize money went to second-place finisher Mike Wedelstadt.

The disqualification led to videographer Mike Thorne to question the interpretation of the rules during one of his videos.

Thorne operates Mike's Video. He records and uploads the races to social media on a near-volunteer basis, something he has done for more than a dozen years.

"I guess when you have something to say, you should just keep it to yourself," Thorne said later in a social media post. "This is how they fix their drama that they create. It's sad, because

I really thought they might listen and actually want to talk."

A few days after the incident, Thorne received a letter from the Shawano Area Agricultural Society, which operates the Shawano County Fairgrounds and Shawano Speedway.

In addition to rescinding Thorne's lifetime membership, the society's executive board returned his \$300 membership fee.

"Some of your actions lately have been determined to be detrimental to the Shawano Area Agricultural Society," according to the letter. "We are requesting that you cease video taping at the Shawano Speedway. It is very detrimental to the organization when videos are shown that do not have correct information or things are said that are just assumptions.

"Also, due to your current actions, the Shawano Area Agricultural Society has determined that your presence is not welcomed at the Shawano Speedway."

Thorne repeatedly pointed out on social media he did not shoot the video

at the scales and only commented on it. He also said he was never approached by the society or any board member to discuss the matter.

"I was never invited to a meeting with the executive board to discuss anything," he said. "I would have gladly done that and expressed why I said what I did, which in all essence were questions from race fans and drivers. Couldn't even do it face to face."

Social media was full of comments, numbering more than 1,000, about Thorne's banishment from the track. The videographer noted that he had more than 250 phone messages as well.

Several people expressed disappointment and anger with the Speedway. Brad Luepke, marketing and promotions director for the Shawano County Fairgrounds and Shawano Speedway, did not return a phone call seeking comment and clarification. Messages sent through the group's Facebook page also went unanswered.

However, the Shawano Speedway Facebook did include this partial post: "The Shawano Area Agricultural

Society will not tolerate individuals, especially those who are employed by or have media credentials, representing or promoting themselves that do not have the best interest of the organization in mind."

Thorne said he doesn't regret any questions he raised.

"I thought Johnny Whitman got screwed," he said. "I still believe he did, because nobody has given me any information that he didn't."

Thorne said he was OK with being the sacrificial lamb, as long as the issues he raised get addressed.

"Getting rid of me doesn't cover (the problems) up. They're still there," he said. "I never expected that it would come to this point that I would be kicked out of a track that I came to as a kid, grew into as an adult and had one of the best jobs you could ask for.

"But it's OK. If this all opens eyes to some of the issues, then being kicked out was worth it. You can replace me, but you can't replace the track."

It is known that Jordan Love is the new leader of the Green Bay Packers, but what is still uncertain is who will take his role behind the starting quarterback.

Green Bay opens its preseason schedule in Cincinnati this week, as coaches, players and fans will get the first look at what to expect this season.

Obviously, all eyes are going to be on Love, but with the release of backup quarterback Danny Etling earlier this week, the backup quarterback position is a situation to monitor. As of now, the contenders for that spot are fifth-round draft selection Sean Clifford and free agent signing Alex McGough. Both players found success in their previous roles, with Clifford achieving multiple Big Ten Player of the Week awards at Penn State and McGough winning USFL MVP with the minor league Birmingham Stallions.

While there, McGough threw for 2,565 yards and 23 touchdowns with 534 yards rushing and eight rushing touchdowns in two years.

According to Gutekunst, both quarterbacks have an opportunity to win that backup position and reiterated that there are many more opportunities to be had.

"It is very early in camp, but they have done some good things — I think Matt (LaFleur) is very happy with some of the things that they have done," said Gutekunst. "They all have athleticism and the ability to make plays with their feet, which is important. As of right now, my mindset is, 'Let's see who comes out of that group.'"

Given the lack of experience in the quarterback room right now, Green Bay could opt to sign a veteran later this month. Current available free agents at the quarterback who could fill that veteran presence include Joe Flacco, Nick Foles and Chase Daniel.

Gutekunst's comments do seem to suggest that the team will continue to stay young, which is why this first preseason game is so important for every player — but especially Clifford and McGough.

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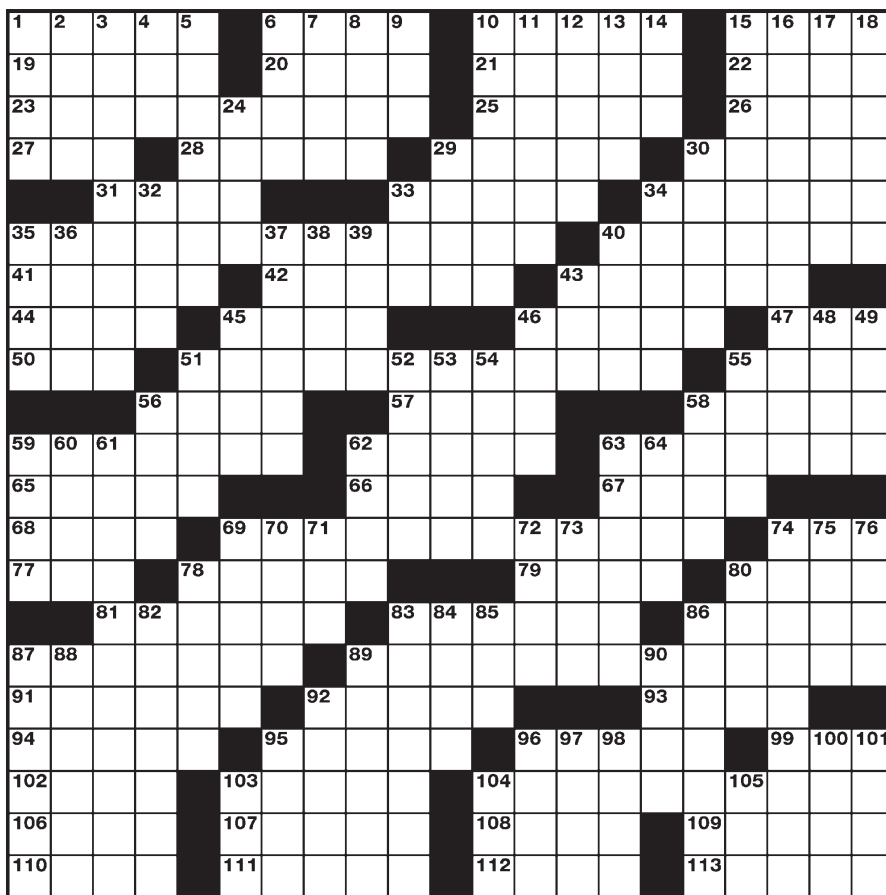

man that Sheila approves of.

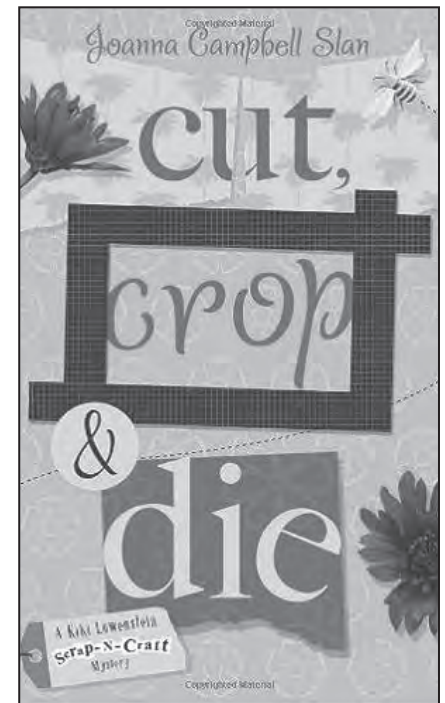
