Progress seen on redevelopment, Oconto Falls housing project

NEWCAP plans affordable housing complex

Progress is being seen toward filling two long-empty businesses at the west city limits of Oconto Falls, and a potential affordable housing complex is also taking shape, the city council learned at its Sept. 10 meeting.

City Administrator Peter Wills said he and Fire Chief Tim Magnin recently gained access to the interior of the former Mobil station and convenience store at 710 County Road B for a fire inspection and found it in “reasonably good condition.”

Magnin said they found some code violations but found the building is in better shape than they expected.

“We did find a small portion of the roof that was leaking but we were very surprised that the building’s pretty clean in the back. It was better than we thought,” Magnin told the council. “They didn’t leave a lot of stuff behind that was junk, but there’s a lot of stuff in the store

part as far as coolers, some counters, tills and safes and all that stuff is all there yet. There’s a lot of stuff in the building, and I think it’s a usable building.”

Wills said he talked to an existing organization still looking at some funding options for the property as well as a firm that would like to it as is.

“I put both in contact with the bank

and the county, and we’ll see if someone comes through with a plan for this,” he said.

Meanwhile, Mike Faucett followed up on an appearance in August regarding a potential buyer for the former Hardee’s building at 782 N. Main St.

Library plan hits county board floor

Local facilities slated for \$6K to \$15K cuts in annual county funding

The Oconto County Board was expected to give final approval Sept. 19 to a five-year library services plan to cover the years 2025 to 2029, which includes a reduction in county support for five of the six local libraries in the county.

The plan is the result of a nearly two-year study with a focus on reducing the property tax burden on the 11 “un-librarianed” municipalities in the county, which otherwise do not support a local library. The library tax is equivalent to 2.1% of the base property tax levy.

The rest of the cities, towns and villages have committed to annual funding of one of the libraries in Oconto, Oconto Falls, Gillett, Lakewood, Suring or Lena.

The board’s administration committee on Sept. 12 passed the plan to the agenda of the Sept. 19 regular monthly meeting of the full board.

“I think it’s the right thing to do,” said County Board Chairman Alan Sleeter. “We explored every avenue of library services in Oconto County, and I think we came up with the right decision.”

The county is required by state statutes to fund 70% of each library’s average cost of circulation, as well as the cost charged by neighboring counties for circulation to residents of the “unlibrarianed” towns. Sleeter said the new plan “levels the playing field” for funding library services.

A review found that Farnsworth Public Library in Oconto has been receiving less than the required 70%, but the other five libraries are slated to take a reduced amount from the county. Local municipalities will have to make up the difference, either by spending more or cutting services.

For 2025, the cuts amount to Gillett \$7,803, Lakes Country \$10,344, Lena \$5,534, Oconto Falls \$15,623, and Suring \$6,261.

County Administrator Richard Heath said the plan “is a lot to digest” and expressed appreciation for the hard work of a special committee that prepared the plan since being appointed by former Ad=

Annexation could solve middle school speed limit woes

The solution to the speed limit issues near the new Oconto Falls Middle School may be for the city to annex the road, City Administrator Peter Wills has told the Oconto Falls

City Council. School officials have experienced frustration in their efforts to have the speed limit reduced along County Road I near the new school, which is scheduled to open in September 2025. The building is on the other side of the

county road from Oconto Falls High School and Oconto Falls Elementary School. Representatives from state said the 45 mph speed limit can't be reduced because there are not enough residential driveways along the road

— and school and municipal driveways don't count toward the total. In his monthly written report to the council, Wills said he and Police Chief Brad Olsen, school district Superintendent Dean Hess, and several Oconto County Board members have been

in discussions with county Highway Commissioner Brandon Hytinen. The commissioner told the group that the state Department of Transportation recommends that the city annex County Road I from state Highway 22 to Main Street.

"I will reach out to the towns of Oconto Falls and Stiles regarding interest in the city taking over County I, and the city would be responsible for all maintenance of the road," Wills said.

"The folks that made the offer have until the end of September to do their due diligence and firm that up," Faucett said.

Electric power has been restored, and electricians and plumber have reviewed the building and made recommendations, he added.

Meanwhile, the council agreed to partner with the community action agency NEWCAP in securing a PRO Housing (Pathways to Removing Obstacles to Housing) grant administered by the federal Department of Housing and

Urban Development. NEWCAP had been looking at the Mobil property but decided the site wasn't optimum for its needs, said Carrie Hill, senior loan officer for the agency. It is considering an affordable housing complex similar to the Trolley Station Terrace apartments recently completed in Marinette, as a result of a housing study developed at the behest of TEDCOR, the Tourism and Economic Development Corporation for the Oconto Region, Hill said.

"They recommended that the city of Oconto Falls start looking at housing because they are predicting about a 24% increase in population by the year 2030. Housing stock is very limited in the city of Oconto Falls," Hill said. "We follow these housing studies, come to communities that have identified needs. Bay-Lake Regional Planning recommended that NEWCAP be contacted to provide affordable housing." The city needs to apply for the competitive HUD

grant and work with a partner with the ability to leverage that by applying for other grants, Wills said. "The city basically becomes a conduit," he said. "We would do a partnership with NEWCAP — they're constructing the building, all the cost will flow through NEWCAP, we just basically become the reporting entity." A public hearing was scheduled for 5 p.m. Sept. 30 at Oconto Falls City Hall, 500 N. Chestnut St., and the deadline for grant applications is Oct. 15, Hill

said. "In the name of transparency, we want to make sure the public understands what we're proposing, why we're proposing it," she said. NEWCAP has not yet settled on a site for the housing project, so Alderperson Ashley Bahrke said she was uncomfortable with holding a hearing already. "I just feel like having a public hearing without telling people where it is, you don't know what public wants to come," Bahrke said. "Is it in your

neighborhood, is it not in your neighborhood?" Wills said the Sept. 30 date was chosen to meet the Oct. 15 application deadline as well as the publishing deadline; the city is required to place a notice in its official newspaper prior to the public hearing. "I would hope that if we're not at that point there, that we would still do another one later in the process and notify people of the site, knowing that can be sensitive," he said.

ministrator Erik Pritzl in February 2023. "From my standpoint, this is a good document moving forward. There's a lot of clarity in it," Heath said, noting the plan includes an annual review to avoid inequities that occurred as "unlibrarianed" municipalities joined joint libraries over the past five years, increasing the burden

on the 11 remaining towns. The Oconto Falls City Council heard a different view Sept. 10 from Rachel Pascoe, director of the Oconto Falls Community Library, who explained that the facility's cut amounts to 8% of its annual budget. County Board Supervisor Bart Schindel, who represents part of the city

of Oconto Falls, told the council the city is paying the price for keeping its cost of circulation down. "Oconto Falls ran very lean, but yet we're taking the brunt," Schindel said. Pascoe said she can partly see where the committee is coming from. "They based the numbers on cutting all the libraries an equal percent-

age, that was their logic, I guess," she said. "They asked the directors to form a work committee and they said give us some options that you can live with ... We worked really hard on it, and they chose one of those options, and we said we know this is not sustainable, but it's meant to be a transition so that no one gets a big cut like this."

The next month, the committee decided to go in a different direction, passing the plan that cuts support for five of the six libraries. "I tried my darnedest to get into a smooth transition, and they came back the next month and said, 'Oh, the county will never approve this; we have to do something more drastic,'"

Pascoe said. "I'm hoping that the funding can be made up somewhere. If it doesn't, that's someone's job, and that means there'll be a lot less programs I'll be able to put on, and a lot less stuff I'll be able to do." She thanked the council "for being in my corner as much as you can."

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Council OKs second Trick or Treat Trail

First event in 2023 got an unexpectedly large response

The Oconto Falls City Council on Sept. 10 approved a community event application for the second annual Trick or Treat Trail, but council members said they hope organizers resolve the parking issues that plagued the first event a year ago.

The free Trick or Treat Trail is scheduled for 10 a.m. to noon Oct. 26 at West Side Beach Trail. The trail adjacent to the beach will be decorated for Halloween, and children can get Halloween treats and get involved in games and activities provided by vendors and sponsors.

Close to 1,000 children came to that first event, far more than organizers expected, resulting in a traffic jam along Flatley Street leading to the beach.

“It was very busy, and people were parked all over the place,” City Administrator Peter Wills said. “It appears that we need more volunteers for parking controls.”

Now that the event’s popularity is clear, Council President Ashley Bahrke said organizer Christine Grzelak is working on a

plan similar to the parking at community events like the Oconto Elks Fly-In or Breakfast on the Farm, where visitors park at one location and are shuttled to the event.

“Last year, I wasn’t there, but I’m told if there would have been an emergency, there’s no way an ambulance would have gotten into the area,” Bahrke said. “But that is not going to happen. (Grzelak has) been really up front about how last year was way more than she ever expected.”

Wills said he would ask Grzelak to give an update at the council’s next regular monthly meeting Oct. 8. Parents need to register their children to participate. Information and links are available at the Oconto Falls Trick or Treat Trail page on Facebook.

The community has been generally supportive of the event, both in the unexpected response and the participation of vendors and sponsors, Grzelak said. The S&S Hometown Barand Restaurant hosted a charity Bingo event Sept. 18 to raise money for the project.

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Nearly 1,000 children took part in the inaugural Trick or Treat Trail at West Side Beach in Oconto Falls in 2023. The second annual event was approved Sept. 10 by the Oconto Falls City Council.

Trial postponed in fatal 2022 UTV accident

The jury trial of a former Waukesha man in connection with a fatal UTV accident in 2022 has been postponed until April.

Scot A. Haas, 55, of The Villages, Florida, is charged with homicide by negligent operation of a motor vehicle and homicide by intoxicated use of a motor vehicle, in connection with the accident that claimed the life of David Weinmann, 56, of West

Chicago, Illinois, on May 29, 2022.

The trial had been scheduled for Sept. 25-27. At a final pre-trial conference Sept. 9 in Oconto County Circuit Judge Michael Judge’s courtroom, District Attorney Hannah Schuchart said that a phlebotomist expected to testify at the trial will be out of state and unavailable during that time.

Defense attorney Sarvan Singh Jr. objected to any further delay in the

trial, but Judge granted Schuchart’s request for an adjournment. Haas has been free since posting a \$5,000 cash bond in 2022.

Originally Judge scheduled the trial for Feb. 19-21, but two days later it was rescheduled again to April 9-11 after it was learned an analyst would be unavailable to testify in February, according to online court records.

A telephone conference was scheduled for March 6 to discuss trial logistics.

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Soda swinging at Twig's fundraiser

Party's proceeds to benefit
Forget Me Not Fund

Twig's Beverage is known for its amazing glass-bottle sodas, including the signature Sun Drop drinks, as well as its museum dedicated to soda. This October, it might get a reputation for its swinging parties, as well.

Twig's is hosting the first Soda Pop Swing Party from 6-8 p.m. Oct. 3 at the Sun Drop Museum, 920 S. Franklin St., Shawano. Besides offering tours of the museum, the party will include dancing to 1950s music and plenty of food to enjoy from local businesses. If Twig's soda alone is not enough to satisfy party-goers, there will be Sun Drop old-fashioned, along with local beer and wine.

Jaime Lee, Twig's Sun Drop Girl, has been making the rounds around the area in a purple dress with a purple ribbon and a straw hat that belonged to her late grandmother to talk about the event and how funding goes to support the Forget Me Not Fund, which tackles Alzheimer's and dementia awareness. The fund hits close to home for Lee, who lost her grandmother to dementia.

"The Hartwig family has the Forget-Me-Not Grape soda," Lee said. "Portions of the sales from the soda go to the Forget Me Not Fund. Since I've been the Sun Drop Girl, I thought a new project to work on would be something for this cause that is dear to my heart with my grandmother, Lois Bartz. She suffered from dementia at the end of her life, and it was very heartbreaking to witness. So I'm doing it in her honor because she always made me feel so golden, and she made me feel so special."

Lee compares dementia to "a hundred little goodbyes at the end there because they start forgetting."

"Usually there's something that they hold onto, like with my grandma, there's a song that we always sang together," Lee said, noting that she and her grandmother always sang "You Are My Sunshine."

Bartz also taught Lee about the Golden Rule, which addresses treating others the way one wants to be treated.

"We're all human, but sweetness and kindness goes a long way," Lee said. "Sometimes the challenges and heartbreak we go through in life, we can ripple that forward and help others."

Lee recalled that Bartz always told her

that when someone looks good, they can feel good, too.

"Anytime I had a Sun Drop job or Shawano News, I'd go over there and show her my outfits. She was just so supportive, and she loved that. She loved to see me dolled up," Lee said.

Lee feels that sharing her story helps to make the issue of dementia a little more real to people who might not have been in direct contact with someone who is slowly losing control of life. She noted that the Forget Me Not Fund lets families know that there is help out there for those suffering from dementia, and that they're not alone.

"Although this is a serious cause, we're doing something fun," Lee said. "That's why we're calling it a 'fun-draiser.'"

Lee noted that Diane Hartwig recently lost her father, Gus VanRemortel, who had Alzheimer's.

"This is a cause dear to all of our hearts,"

Lee said. "He was an avid Sun Drop lover, and he wore all of the Twig's merchandise. Not only are we doing this for the people we love, but we're asking the whole community to come and remember and celebrate those who have loved and lost."

Lee said she wanted to keep the fundraiser simple at two hours instead of having something that lasts for four hours or more and requires other side activities like raffles. A \$50 ticket provides two hours of snacking, drinking and dancing.

Lee, who has enjoyed making the rounds as a pin-up girl, has also invited colleagues to come to the party and pose for pictures with the guests.

"These are the pin-up models from my Symco route," Lee said, referring to the Miss Symco Pin-up Contest held every August in Waupaca County. "I have three of my Symco friends coming, and they're going to be taking pictures with people."

Modern arrow rest makes tuning recurve bow easier

As my traditional bow collection grew, I've had a difficult time using one particular bow and sticking with it. As a longtime hunter and shooter, it's always been my seasoned opinion that to improve accuracy and success, it's easier to buy new or different equipment, rather than practice frequently.

I still have the same Bear Grizzly I started bowhunting with in 1974, and if I had shot that bow even 10 arrows a day, four days a week, Chuck Adams would be angry that I was hogging all the trophy animals.

A few years ago, I acquired a Martin Saber takedown recurve with an



aluminum riser and laminated limbs. This fairly inexpensive bow also had a Whisker Biscuit on it — an ingenious arrow rest that uses a circle of bristles to retain the shaft. This design makes it easy to shoot from a centershot position, meaning the arrow fletchings do not touch the riser and the arrow doesn't flex around the bow nearly as much as one shot from a traditional

carpeted shelf rest.

I was planning to hunt with my most beautiful and expensive bow in my collection, a Bob Lee Signature recurve that is not only a work of art, but a fine shooter, too. This takedown bow came with two sets of limbs and is probably worth at least \$1,500. The Saber might be worth \$300 on a good day.

Shooting the 46-pound-draw, 62-inch Bob Lee with a large, thick riser is a dream. Because of my 29 1/2-inch draw, the 58- to 60-inch bows I've favored over the years cause stacking (the weight suddenly increases and seems to hit a wall). Because I usually

hunt from a ground blind, a shorter bow has advantages but smooth shooting for me isn't one of them.

While shooting the Bob Lee bow, I also dug out the 64-inch Saber. It has a 40-pound draw weight at 28 inches, so I'm approaching 45 pounds at my draw length. Its built-in riser silencers make it quiet and the metal riser shoots surprisingly fast. I feel like I'm drifting back to the compound bow, but I love the simplicity of the recurve.

The Whisker Biscuit further complicates and simplifies things. I realized that I could shoot vanes with it (the long feathers on my traditional carbon arrows

tend to get a bit mangled by the bristles anyway).

Off-the-shelf arrows must have feathers. Feathers get matted when wet while plastic vanes are fine.

Seeing my groups tighten with the Saber has been encouraging. I haven't shot my new Abowyer single-bevel broadheads yet, but that is coming soon (I normally don't bowhunt until October anyway because of the bugs and heat). Fixed-blade broadheads seldom fly the same as a target point, so be sure to practice with the heads you plan to hunt with.

Tuning a bow has always been a bit of a mystery to me. Decades

ago when just starting my bowhunting, my brother Brian and I used to struggle to get our broadheads to fly straight. The biggest issue I had was the arrow suddenly dropping off or porpoising from the weight of the broadhead.

Clay Hayes, a trad archery expert and YouTube celebrity, has a unique way of tuning his arrow to a broadhead (he favors heavy 190-grain heads, while most compound shooters use 100- or 125-grain heads).

He starts with a full-length (32-inch) shaft with broadhead, then cuts the arrow length back by a

quarter-inch. He takes a shot and sees how straight the arrow flies. He continues to do this until he finds the sweet spot (correct length), which has to do with the perfect spine for that bow.

A longer arrow simply flexes more than a shorter one. If your bow has a 50-pound draw, you may need an arrow spine (or stiffness) made for a 60-pound bow, for example.

Recurve shooters can twist a string and restrung their bow to slightly alter the brace height (distance between the grip and the string). Compound bow shooters have many adjustments to make, or just bring it to a pro shop for help. It is crucial that

both the top and bottom cams turn over at the same

time. Drop-away rests, peep sights, lighted front sights and other accessories also need adjustment. This is why I switched to recurves.

Some swear that the fletching (vanes or feathers) has to line up with the broadhead blades. Those who shoot mechanical heads don't have to worry about that, but more traditional hunters stay away from mechanicals. You will have to heat up the arrow insert to move the tightened broadhead in alignment with the fletching if you believe this may help.

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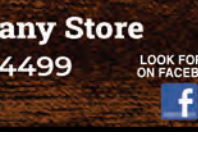
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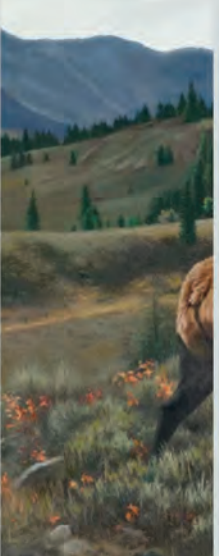

School starting brings back mother’s memories

When my kids were little, I always got schmaltsy just before school started. Summers on the farm were busy, yet the freedom we had without the boundaries of school commitments was liberating. We had waited so long (seven years) for a family, come summer’s end I never wanted to shoo my little ones out the door with those backpacks seemingly bigger than their little shoulders could carry.

Alas, they grow up and out they go, through a much wider door than our local school.

Graduating in 2007, as a high school present to our eldest, we flew him off to Los Angeles for a week to check out a sound engineering school there. Just before boarding the plane, he turned back, smiling as he put two fingers to his forehead in a salute-wave goodbye. Immediate tears sprung up behind my eyes, spilling over their banks. He was ecstatic, his dream on the verge of coming true, which helped ease

Too soon, it was our time to ship yet another, and the final one, off to college. Choosing University of Wisconsin-La Crosse, unfortunately she felt like a round peg in a square hole. There, she had fallen in love with the campus, making lifelong friends.

This back-to-school season as the sun goes to bed earlier and earlier and sleeps in later unsettles me with a nostalgia that still, these many years later, bring to mind the poignancy of sending my kids off to school, be

the Town of Oconto Falls, where they raised their two children, Brenda and Al. They are also grandparents of five grandchildren.

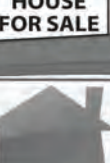
Established in 1996, the Wall of Fame honors Oconto Falls alumni who have demonstrated exceptional civic achievements and professional success following their high school years.
