Zastawniak gets 25 years for child sex

Peshtigo man facing additional charges

A Peshtigo man was sentenced Sept. 20 in federal court to 25 years in prison for sexually exploiting numerous minor girls in Oconto County and Northeast Wisconsin, coercing them in sex acts, some of which he recorded.

Zachary A. Zastawniak, 24, pleaded guilty this summer to one count of child sex exploitation but District Judge William Griesbach could consider allegations of many other minors as relevant conduct.

The count to which Zastawniak pleaded to involved a 14-year-old girl in Oconto County whom he persuaded to send him a sexually explicit video of herself.

The defendant received the video via a Snapchat application on his cellphone, which he recorded for subsequent viewing, according to the plea agreement.

Zastawniak faced a 15-year mandatory minimum sentence and a maximum of 30 years.

District Judge William Griesbach imposed the 25-year term describing the case as “horribly aggravated,” and that the defendant repeatedly made “evil decisions” and engaged in “monstrous behavior,” according to the U.S. Attorney’s Office.

Griesbach also praised the victims, many of whom spoke at sentencing, for cooperating with law enforcement and ending Zastawniak’s sex crime spree.

Griesbach added a 25-year term of supervised release to follow Zastawniak’s prison sentence and required him to register as a sex offender.

In Oconto County Circuit Court, Zastawniak faces 26 counts of child sex offenses including soliciting a child for prostitution, second-degree sexual assault of a child, possessing child pornography, child enticement and trafficking a child.

The majority of the state and federal offenses approximately occurred in 2023 between June and August.

District Attorney Hannah Schuchart said that state and federal prosecutors charged Zastawniak for similar conduct and possibly involving some of the same victims.

According to Schuchart, an Oconto County juvenile is credited with helping catch Zastawniak by reporting to authorities that she met him online and was

Gillett schools face a budget deficit

Exact size won’t be known until mid-October

The Gillett School Board expects to be dealing with a deficit in its 2024-25 annual budget.

During the board’s Sept. 19 meeting, Superintendent Nathan Hanson said the deficit will probably be six figures or more, depending on how much state aid the district receives.

Board Treasurer Cliff Gerbers said the situation is not unexpected.

“We knew we had to replace \$380,000 worth of ESSER funds,” said Gerbers, referring to the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund, a one-time federal allocation intended to lessen the financial impact of the lockdowns related to the COVID-19 pandemic. “Last year when we budgeted, we did anticipate that. We actually had a surplus balance, and we’ve done that for a number of years. So we knew this was coming.”

Finance manager Nancy Van Elzen said the size of the deficit won’t be known until the state aid figures are released Oct. 15.

“We’re trying to fine-tune to make sure that we have accurate information on that deficit prior to bringing it to the board,” Van Elzen said. “It’s going to be a line-by-line detail review, and we do have to have to have it by next week.”

The budget has to be published twice in the district’s official newspaper — the Oconto County Times Herald — no more than eight days before and no less than one day before the district’s annual meeting, which is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Oct. 17 in the Gillett Secondary School cafeteria.

To meet those parameters, the district needed to submit the information to the Times Herald by noon Sept. 27 to be published in the Oct. 4 and Oct. 11 papers, Van Elzen said. The board scheduled a special meeting for 5:15 p.m. Sept. 24 to finalize the preliminary budget.

Van Elzen said projected expenses are up in a number of places.

“We’ve seen an increase in our health insurance. We’ve seen an increase in our property insurance. We’ve had an increase in busing. We know most of the

revenue numbers for our grants,” she said.

“We have a decrease in Title I funding. I’ve talked with DPI (the state Department of Public Instruction) and that is across school districts in the state; everyone is seeing a reduction.”

It’s hard projecting a bottom line without the state aid numbers, Van Elzen said.

“They have given us a number that is an \$800,000 increase over 2023-24, but until Oct. 15 we don’t know what that’s going to be,” she said. “It could be \$200,000, it could be \$600,000, it could be \$100,000.”

Preliminary property values for the year show an increase at 16.6%, or close to \$1 million increase in districtwide values, she said.

“There’s a number of moving pieces. Until that Oct. 15 date, it’s going to be a best guess on the budget,” Van Elzen said. “We had some big expenses in 2023-24, and we’re just trying to figure out where we can land in 2024-25. Not knowing our aid is pretty tough.”

County Board gives final OK to 5-year library plan

Joint library systems encouraged

The Oconto County Board passed a five-year library services plan Sept. 19 covering the years 2025 through 2029, with supervisors from the Oconto Falls area objecting to the size of the revenue cut slated for the Oconto Falls Community Library in 2025.

The plan revises the formula for allocating the county-administered library tax levy in a way that reduces the funds

distributed to five of the six local libraries in Oconto County. Oconto Falls' \$15,623 reduction is roughly one-third of the total cut of \$45,564.

The 2025 decreases for the other libraries amount to Lakes Country (Lakewood) \$10,344, Gillett \$7,803, Suring \$6,261 and Lena \$5,534. Farnsworth Public Library in Oconto is allocated a \$9,857 increase because otherwise the 2025 funding would be lower than the minimum required by state statute. The municipalities that fund the local libraries must decide how to make up the differences.

County Board Chairman Alan Sleeter said all six libraries will still be funded at levels higher

than the state minimum. He was part of an ad hoc committee that spent more than a year studying the way Oconto County funds its local libraries.

"A lot of it was understanding the why's," County Administrator Richard Heath said.

There was general agreement that the old formula placed an unfair burden on the 11 municipalities that are not currently part of a local library system and must split the six-figure bill submitted by Brown County for services provided to Oconto County residents who use the out-of-county library.

"It was a monster," Sleeter said. "It all started when some municipalities came forward and said,

'You know, we're being overtaxed for libraries.'"

The plan passed on a vote of 25-2-1, with Oconto Falls area Supervisors Bart Schindel and Jolene Barkhaus voting no and Supervisor Elizabeth Holman abstaining.

"That \$15,000 is equivalent to having to cut an employee and will result in programming to be cut big time," Holman said. "I think it's a shame that any of them could get any cuts, because we could potentially close some doors because of it."

"I feel that Oconto Falls took a big hit compared to the other four," added Schindel, who asked if Oconto Falls could form a joint library system like Lakewood, Suring and Lena, which are supported

by surrounding towns as well as the central municipality.

Currently Oconto Falls, Gillett and Oconto libraries are funded only by their city governments in addition to the library tax administered by the county.

Barkhaus asked why the library services plan doesn't specifically address the Brown County bill, and Sleeter said Brown County does serve a large area especially in the more populated southeast towns of Little Suamico and Chase, resulting in an annual bill of \$150,000 or more.

"We couldn't build and fund a library for that amount of money," Sleeter said.

Supervisor Don Bartels

Jr. of Lakewood said no community is exempt from paying for libraries.

"It's just a matter of who you write the check to," Bartels said. "This is probably the least bad plan we could come up with. Nobody is going to be 100% happy, and I appreciate that. If everybody's unhappy, it's a pretty good plan."

Supervisor Pat Scanlan said the only way to make the annual Brown County invoice go away is for the remaining 11 municipalities to enter into joint library systems, but they would have to do it all at once.

"Otherwise whoever's left will foot the whole bill," Scanlan said.

Chad Angus named new chief deputy

20-year veteran of the sheriff's department

Oconto County Sheriff's Patrol Lt. Chad Angus has been promoted to chief deputy of the department, Sheriff Todd Skarban announced at the Sept. 19 meeting of the Oconto County Board.

"I've known Chad my entire law enforcement career. We became fast friends when we were road patrol deputies together," Skarban said. "He's steady, he's trusted, he'll always tell the truth even if you don't want to hear it. It's important for this position to be able to have that kind of feedback."

Skarban said he had a similar relationship with former Chief Deputy Darren Laskowski, who retired

earlier this summer.

For his part, Angus said he is "honored and excited" about taking on the new position.

"I'd like to start out by thanking the sheriff for this opportunity and I'm grateful for the opportunity and will work very hard to fulfill all the obligations that the position requires," he said.

A lifelong resident of Oconto County, Angus said he started his career as an Oconto Falls police officer in 1998, then moved to the Lena Police Department before being hired by the sheriff's department in

2004.

In 2010, he was assigned to be the handler for the first of his three K-9 officers.

"I learned a lot about trust, respect, obligation and teamwork, which helped me develop leadership skills," Angus said.

He was promoted to what was his current position in 2022, which included supervision of the dispatch center and coordinator of the K-9 program.

"Throughout my career, I've been blessed to work alongside so many great co-workers, and I've learned so much from them, and that's really what has prepared me for this role today," Angus said.

offered money, drugs and cigarettes in exchange for sex and nude photographs of juveniles, among other things.

After she was allegedly sexually assaulted by Zastawniak at an area hotel, he sought other juvenile females and made them the same offers.

The girl was prompted to report Zastawniak after he threatened to post nude

photos and/or videos to the internet of the sexual assault he allegedly committed at the hotel.

Law enforcement obtained records from the hotel that listed the vehicle's plate numbers and the victim described the date of the assault, and the type and color of the vehicle associated with the suspect.

The registration came back to Zastawniak, and

the victim identified him from a photo lineup as her assailant.

By email, Schuchart described Zastawniak's modus operandi as luring minors to secluded areas where he allegedly sexually assaulted them and recorded the alleged assault. He then allegedly used the recordings in an attempt to extort his victims for more benefits.

The main difference between the federal and state cases against Zastawniak are that the federal prosecutor charged the defendant with crimes related to the recordings while the state charged him with the sexual conduct which he allegedly committed.

The alleged sexual assaults cannot be charged in federal court and instead fall under the state's

jurisdiction.

"It is important that we resolve this case in a way that would signify and memorialize the fact that physical acts were perpetrated against minor victims," Schuchart wrote a reporter by email.

The state will continue its prosecution of Zastawniak, said Schuchart, and there's a Sept. 30 pre-trial conference set by Oconto

County Circuit Court Judge Jay Conley.

Law enforcement agencies involved in Zastawniak's federal case included the Oconto Falls Police, Oconto Police, Oconto County Sheriff's Office, the North Fond du Lac Police, the Wisconsin Division of Criminal Investigations and the Kingsford, Michigan, Department of Public Safety.

Child sex assault retrial to proceed

Three charges dismissed but two counts remain on the docket

An Oconto County judge Sept. 20 denied a defense motion to dismiss charges against an Oconto man accused of child sex assault, but the judge did confirm dismissal of three charges that he had dismissed before an April 2022 trial ended in a mistrial.

David SanRoman, 48, Oconto, is scheduled to stand trial Oct. 30-31 on charges of first-degree sexual assault of a child under age 13, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Jan. 31, 2018, and first-degree sexual assault of a child under age 12, for an incident that allegedly occurred Feb. 1, 2018. He is charged as a consistent repeater, which carries a life sentence if he is convicted.

Judge Michael Judge said the other three related charges were not specific

enough as to when the alleged assaults happened. "There were no set dates. It was over a period of years or 'sometime before a certain month of a certain year,'" Judge said. "And I think that was not fair to the defendant and to the defense to try to tie that down. How does Mr. SanRoman address where he was, where the alleged victim was, what time of year — was it winter, fall? I mean there was nothing. It was just 'sometime between the years of 2016 and 2017. That is too vague for this court, quite frankly, and I haven't changed my mind."

Defense attorney Michael Scholke argued that the case should be dismissed for lack of a speedy

trial. SanRoman has been in custody since February 2020, and by the time the trial begins he will have been held for 1,518 days.

District Attorney Hannah Schuchart argued that SanRoman had the power to ask for the mistrial or take his chances with the jury.

"It would have been SanRoman's call to ask for a mistrial," she said. "He had all of the control to make that request. The state shouldn't be punished for his decision."

The mistrial hinged on whether the state had provided documents in its discovery package, one of which it later determined that the defense did have the document but misfiled it.

One of SanRoman's former attorneys, Brad Hansen, testified for the defense that during the April 2022 trial, he realized that a child support worker had begun to

testify about a report he had not received, and when he was given a copy of the report he saw a reference to a report about a medical examination that he believe had also not been shared by the prosecution.

The two discovery issues led to declaration of a mistrial. Hansen admitted he later found the medical exam report in his files. It had been accidentally misplaced among the files for a previous iteration of the case.

"I have no concept of how it got to that location," Hansen said. "I cannot criticize anyone in my office, because I'm the attorney of record and it's my responsibility."

In denying the speedy trial motion, Judge said Oconto County held no trials at all for 14 months during the lockdowns the state imposed because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"I have done everything

I can to speed this case along," Judge said. "I find no fault with the state of Wisconsin or the court in that regard."

As for the mistrial, the judge said the child support worker had only testified as to her credentials before Hansen raised the objection was raised about the report.

"The court agreed with the counsel — the state and the defense — that I would instruct the jury to disregard the testimony," Judge said. "I never got that chance."

Hansen then asked about the second report regarding the medical exam.

"I think attorney Hansen's specific words were, number one, 'The information in that report may be,' the magic word is, 'exculpatory for my client,'" Judge said. "And number two, 'Judge, I should've a chance to get my own medical expert to

review that report to see if it's something that I should be aware of for the defense of my client.' When I heard that, I knew I was stuck in trying to continue with this trial."

The mistrial probably did not have to occur because Hansen realized later he had misfiled the second report, Judge said, but it was the proper call at the time based on available information.

"I find no fault here, because I realize how complex and voluminous files can be, not only for the court but for the attorneys," he said. "It is what it is, but I found that at the time the request by attorney Hansen to request a mistrial was based on reasonable grounds."

The Oct. 30-31 retrial is set to proceed, with a pre-trial conference and motion hearing planned at 2:30 p.m. Oct. 28.

Not guilty pleas entered in fatal crash

Defense attorney suggests other driver was using excessive speed

Not guilty pleas were entered Sept. 18 for an Oconto man charged in connection with the 2023 car-motorcycle crash that claimed the life of his girlfriend.

Austin Scott Laakonen, 22, is charged with homicide by operating a motor vehicle under the influence of a controlled substance, homicide by negligent operation of a vehicle and a misdemeanor count of possession of THC, for the June 30, 2023, accident that killed Aubrey Williams, 19, also of Oconto. He also was ticketed for carrying a passenger in violation of his probationary motorcycle permit.

After a preliminary hearing, during which Oconto County Judge Michael Judge bound Laakonen over for trial, defense attorney Jonas Bednarek said his client was standing mute. Judge entered not guilty pleas on his behalf and scheduled a pre-trial conference for Dec. 10.

According to the Oconto County Sheriff's Department traffic report, the crash occurred at 7:11 p.m. on U.S. Highway 41 just south of the intersection with County Road W in the Town of Little River. Wil-

liams died just after 8 p.m. at Bellin Health Oconto Hospital, the report said.

Investigator Troy Sherman testified that Laakonen was northbound, merging into the left lane to negotiate a left turn onto County Road W, when the left side of the motorcycle struck the right side of the Kia Sportage driven by Luis A. Soto of Volo, Illinois.

"(Soto) stated that he was northbound to Marquette to go see his girlfriend, had his cruise control set at 75 mph," Sherman said. "At the point just prior to the impact, he, on the passenger side window, observed the motorcycle start coming over merging into his lane. As he did, he stated he applied the brakes and tried to slow down, but the motorcycle clipped the front of his Kia."

As is standard in fatal crashes, blood draws were taken from both drivers, and both showed no alcohol in their systems. However, Laakonen's results detected the presence of Delta-9-THC, Sherman said.

An Oconto police officer found a black bag with Williams' license inside, along with a small container he believed to be dab wax, a THC product. Sherman said Laakonen told the officer the THC was his.

On cross-examination, Bednarek indicated there is evidence that Soto was coming up from behind at a faster clip that he admitted.

"Are you aware that the SUV that was following the motorcycle — not the Kia, but another SUV — attempted to merge into the left-hand lane but had to swerve back because the Kia was coming at such a high rate of speed?" Bednarek said.

"That is correct," said Sherman.

Bednarek had previously filed an affidavit from a defense investigator with statements said to be from four witnesses who suggested Soto was speeding at closer to 80-85 mph.

Sherman acknowledged under cross-examination that Laakonen originally was not very forthcoming at the scene.

"He gave a one-sentence written statement — provided a version but not a great-detail version, I would say — and said, 'That's all you're going to get from me,'" he said.

In advance of the pre-trial conference scheduled for 1 p.m. Dec. 10, Judge ordered prosecutors to submit discovery by Nov. 1 and defense by Dec. 1, with any pre-trial motions filed by Dec. 3.

Driver in fatal crash ticketed for OWI

Authorities say the driver who crossed the center line in a fatal head-on crash Sept. 8 was driving under the influence and after his license had been revoked.

Zackery Dale Wimber, 30, of Fond du Lac, was ticketed for operating under the influence and causing injury for at least the second time, operating while revoked and

three other traffic violations, according to an Oconto County Sheriff's Department traffic report released Sept. 18.

Lisa Marie Neitzel, 52, of Lake Tomahawk, a passenger in the other vehicle, died in the crash, which occurred about 5:30 p.m. on state Highway 32-64 near Sparkys Road in the Town of Mountain.

According to the report, Wimber's southbound vehicle "was

swerving all over the southbound lane," crossed the center line and crashed head-on into the other vehicle driven by Kaley Violet Neitzel, 15, killing her mother and injuring Kaley and Ronald Neitzel, 54. Wimber and the two surviving Neitzels were all transported to hospitals with what the report describes as suspected serious injuries; Ronald Neitzel was airlifted.

The report indicates

that Wimber was operating his vehicle in an "inattentive, careless or erratic manner," exceeded the speed limit and failed to keep the vehicle under control. He was also ticketed for violating an ignition interlock device order.

Alcohol is not considered a factor, but the report indicates suspected drug use and a blood draw was taken, with results pending.

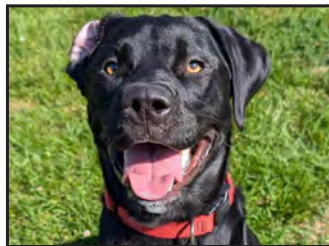

Wisconsin wild rice crops below average this year

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has announced that northern Wisconsin's wild rice crop production is generally below average this year across lakes, flowages and rivers.

"A mild winter in 2023-2024, coupled with heavy storms in mid-June, appears to have set back wild rice production this year throughout much of the northern region of the state," said Brandon Byrne, wild rice biologist with the Great Lakes Indian Fish and Wildlife Commission. "However, most of the lakes that have been reliable for harvesting in recent years should still provide adequate harvest opportunities this year."

The Great Lakes Indian Fish and Wildlife Commission maintains the off-reservation wild rice harvest regulations webpage, which includes helpful information for harvesters and wild rice production conditions for some wild rice waters. With a little research and exploration, harvesters can find good opportunities to harvest wild rice this year.

Wild rice harvesting is open to all Wisconsin residents and provides the opportunity to forage a highly nutritious, natural food source that is unique to the upper Midwest. Wild rice maturity typically ranges from late August through mid-September across the state and varies by waterbody and rice bed.

The DNR stresses the importance of waiting to harvest wild rice until it falls with relatively gentle strokes while flailing or knocking using ricing sticks. If little to no rice is falling, it is best to try harvesting a few days later. Kernels toward the top of the seed head tend to mature and fall first. Harvest efforts on immature beds inhibit the maturation of the rice kernels, which negatively impacts the harvest experience for others and the long-term sustainability of wild rice production.

The decline in wild rice production has been a notable trend over recent decades. Scientists cite the impacts of climate change as a widespread stressor on the wild rice population. Additional human-induced and natural stressors may be compounding problems at local levels.

"The DNR takes these issues seriously and, in cooperation with tribal nations and other partners, is working on research initiatives to better understand threats to wild rice and develop better strategies for restoring Wisconsin's wild rice populations," said Jason Fleener, DNR wetland habitat specialist.

One such initiative is an active partnership between the DNR, the Menominee, Lac Courte Oreilles and the Great Lakes Indian Fish and Wildlife Commission, funded through an America the Beautiful Challenge grant, to develop and implement an effective management plan for Wisconsin's wild rice resources.

As a reminder to boaters, one of the main threats to wild rice production is improper watercraft use throughout the growing season. Wave activity caused by boats and boating directly through wild rice beds often harm production in wild rice beds. The DNR encourages all watercraft users to educate themselves on how to identify wild rice and modify their boating activities to reduce damage to this treasured Wisconsin resource.

State's egg numbers dip in July

Wisconsin egg production during July was 201 million eggs, down 8% from the previous July, according to the latest Chickens and Eggs report from the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service.

The average number of all layers on hand during July was 7.59 million, down 8% from last year. Eggs per 100 layers for July was 2,646, down slightly from a year ago.

United States egg production totaled 9.06 billion during July, down 2% from last year. Production included 7.76 billion table eggs, and 1.3 billion hatching eggs, of which 1.2 billion were broiler-type and 99 million

were egg-type. The average number of layers during July totaled 370 million, down 3% from last year. July egg production per 100 layers was 2,451 eggs, up slightly from July 2023.

Total layers in the United States on Aug. 1 totaled 369 million, down 3% from last year. The 369 million layers consisted of 304 million layers producing table or market type eggs, 61.5 million layers producing broiler-type hatching eggs, and 3.76 million layers producing egg-type hatching eggs.

Rate of lay per day on Aug. 1 averaged 79 eggs per 100 layers, up slightly from Aug. 1, 2023.

Egg-type chicks hatched during July totaled 57.3 million, up 12% from July 2023. Eggs in incubators totaled 53.9 million on Aug. 1, up 10% from a year ago.

Domestic placements of egg-type pullet chicks for future hatchery supply flocks by leading breeders totaled 200,000 during July, up 2% from July 2023.

Broiler-type chicks hatched during July totaled 863 million, up 2% from July 2023. Eggs in incubators totaled 746 million on Aug. 1, up 3% from a year ago.

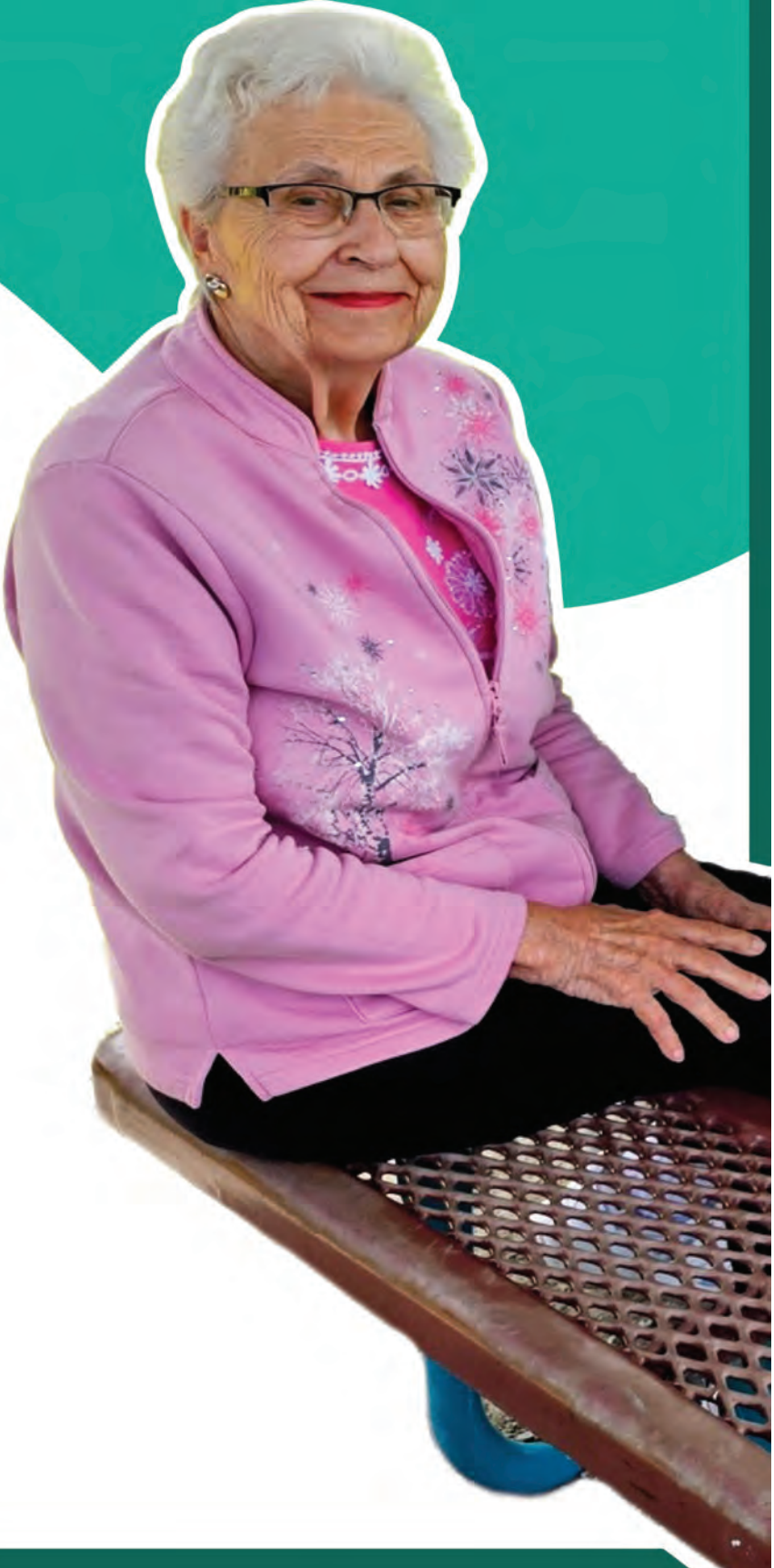

Yes, fresh cut roses are an extravagance, but I always loved getting flowers, especially at work. So I sent the bouquet to the school district office where she spends an incredible amount of time and energy helping lead a team whose mission is educating the next generation. That was easy. What proved difficult was composing the right message to mark this special occasion.

Now you'd think that someone who has been



called a wordsmith, a writer who holds in high regard anyone who can construct beauty and meaning with words, could sit down and quickly write a paragraph or two expressing love, respect, appreciation and admiration. Kinematic kinship emanates from your very core. Your emotions are always in motion, consciously and subconsciously growing and developing. You are surprised and delighted to find that mother love is

limitless and increases even when you think there can't possibly be any more room for expansion.

I hope all the mothers reading this are fortunate to have kinematic kinship with their daughters because it brings so much happiness. Just thinking of your daughter makes you smile. Seeing her in photographs produces a lovely feeling of well-being. Hearing her cheery voice on the phone means all is well in the cosmos. Hugging her makes you feel complete. Even missing her has its rewards because you really cherish the moments when you are together.

So happy birthday month to my beautiful, bright, charming, amazing daughter. Jina, the world is a far better place with you in it. Hundreds of sandhill cranes staging at marsh

Fall is a great time to enjoy watching those magnificent sandhill cranes. This is the time when they flock together in large numbers. One of the places you can easily see them is at the Oconto Marsh, one of their staging areas; they stop here and similar places around Wisconsin to rest and replenish energy reserves before starting or continuing their migration south. You can find the Oconto Marsh one mile northeast of Oconto. Park along County Road Y or in the parking lot at the marsh about a half-hour before sunset or sunrise, and you will have a front row seat to their comings and goings.

In the evenings, as dusk settles, they come into the safety of the marsh where they roost for the night. Watching the cranes land in the marsh is like watching a good sky dance; they wheel around, dropping low over the marsh, then with wings wide, down come their long legs, outstretched like landing gears guiding them into a smooth touchdown.

The cranes are not silent; they arrive trumpeting their presence and calling down other cranes passing over, likely some of their Canadian cousins migrating south for the winter. As the evening deepens, the numbers of cranes increases, into the hundreds, creating a cacophony of raucous bugling as the swirling flocks

drift down into the marsh. With a crimson sunset backdrop, this is a spectacular sight, a phenomenon of nature, right here in our "backyard."

According to The Cornell Lab All About Birds (AAB) website, the unique tone of the sandhill crane's loud, rolling, trumpeting call is a product of its anatomy. The cranes' long tracheas (windpipes) coil into the sternum which helps develop a lower pitched sound with harmonics that add to its richness. You

can't help but be impressed by their loud, rattling calls.

For a large bird, sandhill cranes are graceful, their flight full of slow steady wingbeats, their landings rather acrobatic. When on the ground, they cut a tall, stately figure. Adults with their long necks and legs stand about 5 feet tall and have a wingspan of up to 7 feet. A distinguishing feature is the red spot on the top of the head and very long black beak.

Sandhill cranes range in color from gray to rusty brown. Interesting, they "paint" their normally gray feathers in the summer with mud in order to blend in more with their surroundings; this camouflage helps protect them and their young.

We are lucky here in Wisconsin to be able to see sandhill cranes from their arrival in March through to their departure south in early November. In the spring, look for them in wetlands where they breed, feed and raise their young, and in nearby fields. Cranes spend their time in these habitats feeding on tubers, seeds, insects, frogs, clams, crabs, fish and small rodents such as mice.

If you are fortunate, you may get to see the sandhills' graceful courtship dances. These tall birds are impressive dancers, stretching their wings wide, pumping their heads and leaping into the air. Their enthusiasm is captivating; we find it enchanting that such a large bird is so expressive.

These birds have survived the eons; according to AAB, the earliest sandhill crane fossil, found in Florida, is about 2.5 million years old. Aldo Leopold in his "Sand County Almanac" recognized this. In his essay entitled "Marshland Elegy" he writes, "When we hear his (sandhill crane) call we hear no mere bird. He is the symbol of our untamable past, of that incredible sweep of millennia which underlies and conditions the daily affairs of birds and men."

Leopold, an early American ecologist, forester, environmentalist and professor at UW-Madison, mourned the potential loss of the sandhill cranes, writing, "Some day ... the last crane will trumpet his

farewell and spiral skyward from the great marsh ... and then a silence never to be broken, unless perchance in some far pasture of the Milky Way."

Leopold knew that sandhills experienced a significant population decline in the 1800s and early 1900s due to habitat loss, hunting, and egg and feather collecting and that their numbers were low even during his lifetime (1887-1948).

Fortunately, passing of the Federal Migratory Bird Treaty Act in 1918 along with habitat protection, especially protection of wetlands where the birds roost and feed, has helped recover a viable population of sandhill cranes that now number in the tens of thousands. We must keep these great birds with us. They exude history, geological time, and add beauty, grace and a sense of wonder and delight to our world.

Visit the Oconto Marsh this fall, especially from mid-October to early November, to view for yourself the astounding sight of seeing hundreds of sandhill cranes staging for their migration south. You will be amazed and delighted.

Every hunter needs huntress — even if she stays home

As I grow old (I'm not sure about the wise part), I do more reflection on the important things in life, particularly my family and friends.

I hit the big 65 milestone on Sept. 3 and another epic one on Sept. 19: 26 years of marriage. To the same person. Call me crazy, but I still haven't upgraded like Tom Cruise (How could he leave Nicole Kidman?) or half of the pretentious Hollywood geezers "dating" women a third their age.

When you find the right one, you stick it out and share the good and rough times. When I see some of my married friends on Facebook sharing constant smiles and their seemingly perfect lives together, I know that they are not sharing the angry squabbles over who left the milk out overnight or why there's a scuff mark on the new Escalade bumper. Living with someone for decades isn't perfect, but it's always better than living alone.

"In sickness and in health." When I signed on to this marriage thing, little did I know what that meant.

I was pretty healthy, other than high blood pressure, obese and with a benign pituitary tumor. My gorgeous wife Michelle Nitschke Bielema (Why did I marry her in Iowa and then make her change her maiden name when we

were moving to Wisconsin? D'oh.) was a tad heavy, too, but in all the right places. Her 6-foot height made her perfect for my 6-1 stature.

On Easter Sunday 2004, an aortic dissection struck me – the same condition that killed actor John Ritter. Unlike him, my emergency room staff at ThedaCare in Neenah triaged me properly, and I was soon in surgery.

Follow-up surgery in December 2013 by Dr. Charles Acher of the University of Wisconsin-Madison Hospital, the nation's foremost aortic dissection authority, installed a Dacron stent in my damaged aorta during a nine-hour procedure that one nurse described as "more complicated than organ transplant surgery." During my 18-day hospital stay, Michelle was there almost every day. I can't imagine such a stay if I had been single.

Although she has been mostly healthy, other than a touch of arthritis, (Did I mention she is nine years younger than me?) she underwent back surgery on Sept. 11 to shave a vertebra that relieved pressure on her nerve. The surgery so

far has been a complete success, with her constant pain totally gone. She went home the next day.

I've handled most of the household chores since then, because she can't bend over for a few weeks. I'm probably more of a whiner when it comes to chores, but then I remember how she stood by me during those two life-threatening situations.

Some people are born to hunt. I grew up hunting with my dad, brothers, uncle and grandpa. One of my brothers got me into bowhunting in the 1970s. I will hunt until I can no longer draw a breath.

My wife has no interest in hunting. She loves venison, but hates the cold, bugs, sitting still and doing what I tell her, so taking her hunting is out. I ask her almost every year to come along, and then she gives me that vacant, lips-pursed glare (patent pending) that she uses when I tell her about the time I had a flaming gas can in my hand.

She always offers moral support from the warmth of the living room when I leave: "Shoot a small one." She loves tender, young deer, the kind I am more likely to bring home anyway.

She also helps by trying to organize my mountains of hunting clothes, gloves and gear. She once neatly inserted the wrong caliber

of cartridges into a couple magazines that were lying around to tidy up. She shakes her head and laughs at the crazy things deer hunters will buy to up their game (breath-covering gum, ozone machines, charcoal-lined clothing, laundry soap that reportedly kills the ultraviolet glow of ordinary soap), and when I'm not buying them, so do I.

My mother used to sit quietly at the dinner table, listening to our family stories about recent rabbit hunts.

"I don't know what's

more fun: hunting or telling hunting stories." Mom was a sharp cookie, and I still can't answer her question. She never hunted, either, but always made the best fried rabbit (cloves and allspice) and pheasant.

Michelle will cook my game, sew my torn hunting clothes and use scent-free laundry soap to wash them, but she will never, ever go hunting with me. I probably love her even more because of it. Time apart is probably the secret to our long, mostly happy marriage.

Here's to all the spouses,

moms and grandmas who support their civilian hunting armies by keeping us well-fed and well-supplied as we "storm the castle," in Michelle's words.

One thing's for sure: Hunting would not be as much fun without an understanding spouse waiting at home for her deer-hunting soldier to return from the front lines before another skirmish with the enemy — right after lunch.

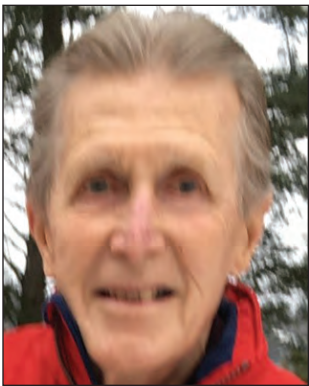


OBITUARIES

DEFENSE STAKING CLAIM AS ONE OF BEST IN NFL

Green Bay leads league in turnovers through three weeks

Through three weeks of the 2024 NFL season, the Green Bay Packers’ defense has seven interceptions.

While the number alone sounds great, take into consideration that the defense forced a total of seven throughout the entire season last season. That speaks to the instant impact that new Packers defensive coordinator Jeff Hafley has on the team. Add Hafley to the offseason signing Xavier McKinney, who leads the NFL with three interceptions, and this defense is not the same defense that Packers have become accustomed to over the past decade.

“I expected to do this,” said McKinney, on his performance so far. “I know where I want to get and what I want to accomplish. I am going to keep working hard and keep preparing the right way every week, and I am going to keep trying to create these opportunities for myself and for this team to go out there and be successful.”

More than just McKinney, a collection of young talent on this Packers’ defense has helped willed the team to a 2-1 record,

with both wins coming in the absence of quarterback Jordan Love. Players like Kenny Clark, Preston Smith, Lukas Van Ness, Jaire Alexander, Devonte Wyatt and Javon Bullard, along with others, have built a strong core that seems like it could succeed for years to come.

With Hafley continuing to send pressure and stack the box, the Packers sit at 11 sacks so far this season. That number ranks tied for fifth in the NFL.

In Green Bay’s two victories, it has taken down an Anthony Richardson-led Indianapolis Colts and a Will Levis-led Tennessee Titans. What those two quarterbacks share in common is their age.

With Hafley’s scheme revolving around sending pressure, it has become obvious that making young quarterbacks feel uncomfortable has equated to turnovers.

“The way that we were flying around, getting after

the quarterback, putting pressure on him, hitting him – that is tough on a quarterback,” said Packers head coach Matt LaFleur. “We have guys in the back end that have great ball skills, and I think that was pretty evident.”

Continuing to put pressure on the opposing quarterback is going to continue to keep Green Bay in games. When it is all said and done, games are won in the trenches; if Green Bay can continue

for the early season MVP. Through three weeks, the Vikings have scored 28 points, 23 points and 34 points, as it currently sits at No. 2 in touchdowns this season with 10.

To help limit the Vikings’ strong offensive attack, Clark, Wyatt, Van Ness and Smith are going to have to be relied upon to make Darnold uncomfortable. Alexander has a noted history of battles with Vikings star receiver Justin Jefferson, so if that defensive front can make any sort of noise, Green Bay can probably pull out another victory in this game.

Aaron Jones comes in as the newcomer in Minnesota who will look to have a big game against his former employer. If Green Bay can limit Minnesota in rushing, like it did against Tennessee (33 yards on 11 carries), then the offense should be able to handle business against a below average Vikings defense.

Either way, the game is going to be won in the trenches, just like it was against Tennessee. Continuing the theme of sending pressure, the upcoming game against Minnesota will be Hafley’s biggest game of his short Green Bay tenure.

Aaron Jones back for revenge against Packers

Packers' Offense vs. Vikings' Defense

Green Bay's offense looked drastically different in their home opener than most people likely thought they would coming into the year.

They ran the ball 53 times for more than 200 yards in a 16-10 victory over the Indianapolis Colts.

They had to adapt with Malik Willis getting a second consecutive start against the Tennessee Titans.

Willis wasn't asked to run the air raid and throw it all over the field, but he did have to make more plays with his arm.

He did, eclipsing 200 yards passing for the first time in his career.

Christian Watson, Romeo Doubs and Jayden Reed were all able to make chunk plays down the field against a Titans defense that was the best in football against the pass coming into the game.

That, of course, had largely to do with the fact that Jordan Love was sidelined with a knee injury.

It's unclear if Love will return this week against the Vikings, but he did go through a pregame workout, leading to some optimism that this week is the one the Packers have targeted to get Love back under center.

If Love is back, it feels like the Packers have some plays out there in the passing game that they're missing out on because Love has been on the bench.

That's to be expected. Love is a potential MVP candidate, and Willis is a backup.

They'll face a challenge this week regardless of who is under center, with Brian Flores' complex scheme.

Love struggled with Flores and Minnesota's defense in the first matchup last year but torched the Vikings the second time around.

If Love returns, it'll be interesting to see what wrinkles Flores has for Love and vice versa.

The run game was not as dominant as it was a week ago but still did enough against a Titans' defense that is stingy

against the run.

Emanuel Wilson and Josh Jacobs combined for 93 yards on 26 carries.

It's not gaudy, but it was enough.

Willis added 73 yards on six carries, giving a different dimension to the offense as well.

That probably won't be part of the game plan if Love is under center, but it was a nice dynamic that Willis can provide if he gets the nod.

If they're going to win this week, they'll need to be better than they were each of the last two weeks.

Minnesota's defense has been dominant in the early portion of the season.

They slowed down San Francisco's offense, which is always efficient. They followed that up with a dominant performance over CJ Stroud and the Houston Texans, a team that many think could be a

challenger for the AFC.

As most games do, this one starts up front.

Jordan Morgan missed the last game and a half with an injury, so the combination of Rasheed Walker, Elgton Jenkins, Josh Myers, Sean Rhyan and Zach Tom played the entire game against Tennessee.

Minnesota's pass rush replaced Danielle Hunter with Jonathan Greenard and Andrew Van Ginkel.

So far, the early returns have been solid.

Joshua Metellus is also one of the better nickel backs in all of football. He victimized the Packers last year at Lambeau Field when he stole an interception from the hands of Jayden Reed.

Packers' Defense vs. Vikings' Offense

Green Bay's defense is certainly good at forcing turnovers early in the

season.

They got three more on Sunday against Will Levis and the Titans' offense.

Last year, the Packers had seven total interceptions. Rasul Douglas was tied for second on the team, and he did not play for the team for more than half of the season.

Through three games, Xavier McKinney has already picked off enough passes to have the team lead for 2023. The Packers have seven interceptions through three games.

That also equals last year's total.

Jeff Hafley has emphasized taking the ball away, and they have certainly done that early in the season.

They could have some opportunities against Sam Darnold, who has been prone to the turnover through the course of his career.

In fact, it cannot get much worse.

Christian Darrisaw is a standout at left tackle, and he should match up well with any of the Packers' defensive ends.

The Packers failed their first two tests in run defense, after Saquon Barkley tore them apart for three touchdowns.

Jonathan Taylor ran for more than 100 yards on just 12 carries.

Whether it was due to the two-score lead the team was staked to early or not, the Packers were much better in the run game against the Titans.

They finished the day with 11 carries for 33 yards. That's three yards per carry. That will get the job done 10 times out of 10.

This week is different.

Aaron Jones is coming back to town. He likely has his mind on revenge, after the Packers unceremoniously released him in the offseason.

The Packers know better than anyone what he's capable of doing. They'll need to slow him down to make the Vikings one-dimensional.

Special Teams

The Packers have not benefited from the new kickoff rules as of yet. Keisean Nixon has one chance at a return this season, and it was one that was ill-advised.

There's little reason to think that will change anytime soon.

Green Bay's kicking situation remains a work in progress. Brayden Narveson missed another kick, this one from 48, but it was wiped out by a seldom-called defensive holding penalty on a defensive tackle.

He has missed one in each of his first three games of his young career.

Narveson will probably have some leash as the season progresses. Brian Gutekunst said he needed to be more patient with specialists. Matt LaFleur insists his confidence has not shaken.

Daniel Whelan has been excellent in the early part of the year.

The Vikings are breaking in a new kicker with Greg Joseph moving on in the offseason.

The special teams matchup appears to be about even for this contest.

Packers pitch defensive masterclass in win over Titans

Green Bay records eight sacks

While Malik Willis again looked the part at quarterback this week, it was the defense that willed Green Bay to a victory over the Tennessee Titans in Nashville on Sept. 22.

After trading touchdowns to open the first two drives of the game, Green Bay outscored the Titans 23-7, to leave Nashville, Tennessee, with a 30-14 victory.

That point differential came as Green Bay's defense had its way with the Titans' offensive line. The Packers recorded eight sacks, which stands as Green Bay's most sacks in a game since 2005. Linebackers Preston Smith and Kingsley Enagbare led the team with two and 1½ sacks, respectively, while Lukas Van Ness recorded one and Isaiah McDuffie, Quay Walker and Edgerrin Cooper each recorded half of a sack.

"We knew what we were capable of," Enagbare said. "The last two weeks, we were following the game plan, and this was pretty much showing how dominant we can be."

On top of all of the sacks, the Packers were also able to turn over the Titans three times. With two interceptions and one

fumble recovery, the Packers currently lead the NFL in turnovers forced with nine. On one of Enagbare's sacks, he forced Titans' quarterback Will Levis into a fumble, which was recovered by Van Ness.

Safety Xavier McKinney recorded an interception to mark three in three games, which also leads in the league. Finally, defensive back Jaire Alexander intercepted Levis at the end of the first quarter and returned it for a touchdown.

After three interceptions in his first three

games with Green Bay, McKinney becomes the first player to accomplish that feat since John Anderson did so in 1978.

"We have a whole bunch of guys that are hungry," said McKinney. "We expect to play hard; we expect to execute. ... Our main objective is to win these games, that is what we are trying to do and obviously getting turnovers. Getting all of these sacks helps us as a defense and as a team, so we are going to keep doing that (and) keep playing hard."

Now sitting at 2-1 on

the season, it appears that Willis has done his job to keep the Packers afloat in Jordan Love's absence. Although it appeared Love could start this week after spraining his MCL in Week 1, he was officially ruled out of the week three contest 90 minutes before kickoff.

Starting against the team that drafted him, Willis registered yet another great performance, as the University of Liberty alum completed 13-of-19 passes for 202 passing yards and one passing touchdown. On the ground, Willis recorded 73 rushing yards and one rushing touchdown on six carries.

Coming against his former employer, these numbers and this game are undoubtedly the best of Willis' young career.

"I got three starts here as a rookie, and like I said before, I wasn't ready at that time, and I have had a lot of time to work hard," said Willis, on playing against his former team. "Three starts, that is what I was judged off, and that is what it is. You don't really have a say-so in that, and it is a results-based league, so it is a business. I can't really be mad at that - I got my opportunity, whether it was one of the better opportunities or not, it was an opportunity and I am grateful for that. I learned from it and will try to continue to work hard until my next one comes."

Aiding Willis on offense, running back Josh Jacobs recorded 43 rushing yards on 14 carries and

running back Emanuel Wilson recorded 50 yards on 12 carries. Wilson also added 35 yards through the air, with 30 of the yards coming on a touchdown reception.

Seven Packers receivers caught passes from Willis in the game, with Christian Watson leading the team catching two balls for 67 yards. Jayden Reed recorded 50 yards on four catches, and tight end Tucker Kraft added another 24 yards on two receptions.

"(I saw) open guys and gave them a chance to let them do what they are blessed to do," said Willis, on what he saw in the passing game. "Those guys are great players, and as you see, if you get the ball to them, they will do some great things. It is my job to get it to them the best that I can."

It is expected that Love will continue to progress in his rehab and may play in the Week 4 matchup that could have major playoff implications.

The Packers got an immobile quarterback in Will

Levis and teed off.

Darnold's offensive line, however, is much better than the group that was asked to protect Levis.

With the weapons the Vikings have in the passing game, getting pressure on Darnold and disrupting his rhythm is a massive component in this game.

Running back Chris Brooks signed with the Miami Dolphins as an undrafted free agent in 2023. Brooks made the Dolphins final roster.

He was placed on injured reserve on Oct. 20, 2023, then activated on Dec. 19.

Brooks was released by the Dolphins on Sept. 2, with an injury settlement. He was signed by the Packers to the practice squad the next day and to the active roster Sept. 17.

How excited are you?
It's very exciting. Blessed to be here. I'm excited.

What was getting the call like that you were coming to Green Bay?
I just got a call in my hotel. They said come in the facility. When I got here, that's when they told me.

Similarities between offense here and Miami?
Yes, sir. Yes, sir. It is very similar.

Learning on the fly?
Really just constant studying. Going over reviewing notes. Making sure to be diligent in the details.

What's your playing style?
Relentless effort, doing what I can to be a team player and help this team the best that I can.

Thoughts on Green

Bay?
I love this team. I love the environment. As soon as I get here, in Green Bay, Wisconsin, you can immediately feel the family environment and the town.

Talked to Packers at all in 2023 during the predraft process?
I don't think so.

Thought process coming here?
My thought process was whatever I do, attack it to the best of my ability whether it'd be practice squad, active. Just attack whatever I'm given.

How did you make the team in Miami?
I think the key is being decisive, taking coaching and being able to learn and

grow every single day.

More on your run style?
You know, I'd like to think I run hard.

Running back room, what are they like?
These guys are great. These guys are great. From top down, this running back is really talented.

Special teams?
Yes, sir, they do. Special teams is in my background with Miami as well. I envision being a special teams player to the best of my ability.

Did you have options after you got injury settled?
Honestly, I'm not sure. I think my agent has that information. But hon-

estly, I just told my agent, whatever opps come my way, let me know and this opportunity came, and I took it.

Did you See 53-man opportunity here?
Honestly, I was gonna take what I was given and control what I could control as soon as I got here. That was my work ethic. As soon as I got here, I said: "I'm going to go 100% each rep."

You didn't get many carries last year but you broke tackles?
I think the key to making that happen, I would say, is being decisive. I'd like to say picking the knees up and running hard.

Difficult setbacks?

It was a moment of adversity for me. But I definitely saw that as an opportunity to grow as a player, as a man, and lean on my faith and the Lord to trust in my ability.

Adjusting to Green Bay?
It's been great. It's been a smooth adjustment. Everything's been going very smooth.

Getting up to speed?
I think there's a lot of carryover in the offenses, and being diligent in reviewing what I'm coached to do also helps a lot.

Know anyone on the team?
No. Honestly, I knew of a few guys but never really got to meet them personally.
