Men's recovery residence opens doors in Shawano

Home operates similarly to women's center that opened earlier in spring

A new men's recovery residence opened last month in Shawano, and Charley Estep is truly grateful for it.

"There is no place better for an addict in early recovery," he said. "The house and the people that run this program (are) nothing short of amazing."

Estep, 39, is originally from Virginia but has been in Wisconsin the better part of the past 13 years. He is one of five residents at the house, 822 W. Picnic St.

Like the women's recovery home that opened earlier in spring, this home is operated by the Shawano Menominee Resiliency Coalition.

Melanie Imhoff is the manager of both houses.

Up to six men can live at the house at a time. There are single rooms and shared rooms.

Living in the transitional house is about learning and developing positive habits for a better lifestyle once the men move out on their own.

There is someone from the resiliency coalition at the house every day.

"We're here to guide them, not babysit them," Imhoff said.

There is application process for men to reside there.

"They are specifically picked for certain reasons," said Maggie Boyd, of the Shawano Menominee Resiliency Coalition.

Reasons include the level of care needed, where they are in the treatment process and how they fit in with the other men at the house.

Shawano County residents are preferred as it's easier to tie them into the available county services. However, Menominee County residents are also eligible.

"When they're in the home, we help them build their daily living skills," Boyd said. "We help them make sure they secure their foundation by securing their natural support, their professional support, getting them into services, help them with their job resumes, help them find a

Shawano taxi rates increase 50 cents

The four members of the Shawano Common Council present July 10 voted to increase the ride fares for City Cab by 50 cents following a public hearing that drew no interest.

This is the first time in more than 10 years that the city has upped its fares for in-city service. Regular fares will increase from \$4 to \$4.50, while senior citizens and disabled residents will pay \$3.50 instead of \$3. The new rates take effect Aug. 1.

"The way this functions is we're reimbursed for the majority of the service that we provide," City Administrator Eddie Sheppard said. "However, due to increasing costs and things of that nature, in order for the city to maintain this service without it impacting our bottom line and potential levy, we did want to take a review of the rates to see if it wasn't prudent to move them up."

Sheppard noted that Shawano County provides a service to the elderly that compensates half of their fares.

"It is a strong point for the city to want to provide this service to our community," Sheppard said.

Alderman Jim Hauer questioned if the city shouldn't be looking at ride fares more often to ensure the tax levy is not impacted by the taxi service.

"Is there a way we could look at the rates every year to make sure we don't get to the point where it's 10, 15 years before there's any rate adjustment?" Hauer said.

Sheppard noted that city officials do review rates annually, even though the council is not usually involved in the review.

"That's why we're bringing it to you now," Sheppard said. "We've done some calculations, and we're realizing that we're getting really close to the money we're being provided won't cover the cost unless we do an incremental increase. I would expect we'd be looking at this annually to make sure that we're staying in line."

Two injured in truck, motorcycles crash

Manitowoc woman loses both limbs on left side of body

A Manitowoc couple well-known in their community for their efforts to make a positive impact were critically injured when the motorcycles they were riding were struck head on the afternoon of July 6.

A Cecil woman faces five felony charges for her

alleged role in the crash.

Shawano County sheriff's deputies, Shawano Ambulance and the Cecil-Washington Fire Department responded to County Road R and Lily Pond Road in the Town of Washington at about 3:18 p.m.

Jason and Tina Prigge were transported by helicopter to local hospitals. Tina Prigge, 52, lost her left leg from the knee on down as well as her left arm. Jason Prigge, 50, suffered a shattered leg.

Lt. Chris Madle said Tina Prigge is in critical but stable condition, while Jason Prigge is in stable condition.

The driver of the pickup

truck, Kaitlynn F. Cress, Cecil, was uninjured. According to the sheriff's department, Cress, who has since turned 29, was northbound on County Road R when she reportedly crossed the center line and struck the Prigges' southbound motorcycles. A 22-year-old man driving behind the Prigges said was almost struck by Cress after she struck the motorcycles.

On July 9, Cress was charged with two counts of reckless driving causing great bodily harm, two counts of first degree recklessly endangering safety and one count of second degree recklessly endan-

gering safety. Combined, the charges carry maximum penalties of \$95,000, 47 years in prison or both.

A cash bond of \$12,000 was set by Judge William Kussel Jr.

A preliminary hearing was set for 8:15 a.m. July 15 in front of Judge Katherine Sloma in Shawano County Circuit Court Branch 1.

Amber Daus, a friend of Jason and Tina Prigge, has set up a GoFundMe page to help pay for the couple's medical expenses.

As of July 10, \$121,443 of a \$100,000 goal was raised.

According to Daus, Tina Prigge serves as president of the Manitowoc International Relations

Association and is a board member of the Manitowoc Symphony Orchestra. Jason Prigge is the board president of Grow It Forward Inc., an accomplished artist, and a member of the NOAA Shipwreck Coast National Marine Sanctuary Advisory Council.

Daus wrote in a July 9 update on the GoFundMe page that Jason Prigge successfully underwent corrective surgery with placement of a rod to repair his crushed left leg.

"Tina underwent an additional surgery on the loss of her limbs," Daus wrote. "The doctors are likely to perform additional surgeries down the road. Today

Tina's breathing tube was removed, and she is now breathing on her own. They had to give her another blood transfusion today. In addition to all that she has undergone, she is also dealing with a fractured pelvis and broken vertebrae."

County Road R was closed for about three hours during the investigation of the crash.

Also assisting at the scene were the Wisconsin State Patrol, Shawano County Highway Department, Oconto County Highway Department, The-dastar Air Transport and Eagle III Air Transport.

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Menominee forest story focus of conference

Keshena to host annual event of Forest History Association of Wisconsin

"The Beginning of Change: Tribal History, Tribal Treaties and the Menominee Forest Story" is the theme of the 2024 Forest History Association Of Wisconsin (FHAW) Fall Conference, slated to be held in Keshena in October.

Registration is underway and will end in September for the Oct. 11-12 conference, which will be held at the Menominee Casino Resort and Convention Center.

"We want to bring attention to and tell the story of the Menominee Forest, which is so large it can actually be seen from the space station," said John Grossman, FHAW board president.

The Oct. 11 activities will include tours of the Menominee Logging Museum, the largest and most complete logging museum in the United States, and the Menominee Cultural Museum, the focal point of

Menominee culture, history and language.

In the afternoon, there will be a forest tour followed by a visit to the College of Menominee Nation for a tour of the Applications in Sustainable Development Institute Program, Forest Gardening and Phenology Trail.

"The Friday tour will be limited to one busload of attendees, about 50 people," Grossman said.

Jennifer Gauthier, director of the Sustainable Development Institute at the College of Menominee Nation, will be the Oct. 11 evening speaker. She will talk about "Building Connections and Relationships through the Menominee Theoretical Model of Sustainability."

Multiple lectures are scheduled for the morning of Oct. 12.

These will include "Menominee Before European Contact" presented by David Overstreet, "Ancient Gardening" by Jeff Grignon and "Termination and Res-

toration of the Menominee Tribe" by Doug Cox.

The final lecture, planned for after lunch, will be "Applying Chief Oshkosh's Vision to Modern Forest Management Practice" by Ron Waukau.

Then, a panel of speakers will provide a closing discussion about "The Beginning of Change-Tribal History, Tribal Treaties and the Menominee Forest Story."

"We are planning to limit overall attendance to an announced 125," Grossman said.

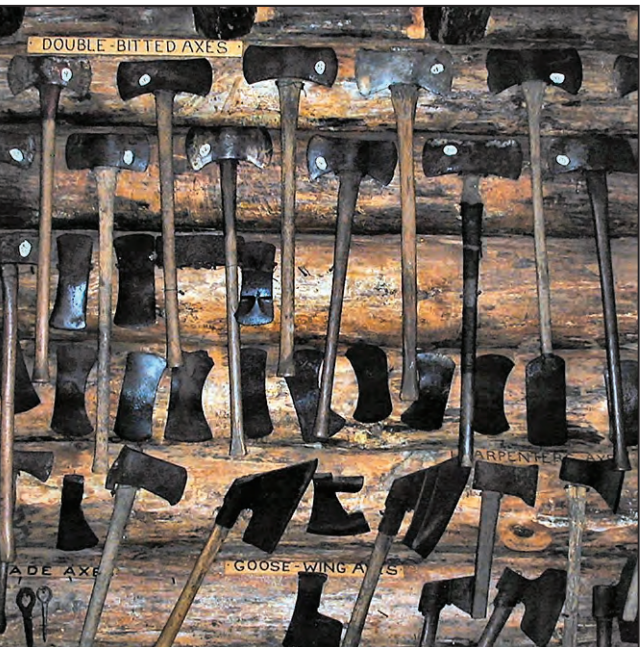
The goal of the FHAW is to educate residents on the history and importance of Wisconsin forests in the continued growth of the state. In that vein, the association's website (<https://www.foresthistoryassociationwi.com>) has archived material about the Menominee story (click on Publications tab, then the Finding Aids link).

"Part of our mission to archive involves developing a collection of materials

that K-12 kids can access for National History Day projects, and for now, we've picked up a few documents on the Menominee story," Grossman said. "One is a 125-page report generated from a meeting in Neopit in 1951, prior to termination, that involves leaders from the Indian Service at the time, some USFS researchers, and MTE leadership. There's another report generated by a nonprofit in 1958, post-termination, that poses questions about the merit of what is being proposed."

Leading up to the conference will be a pair of webinars, one by Carol Cornelius, a professor at University of Wisconsin-Green Bay, and the other by Grignon.

Cornelius' webinar is set for Sept. 11. She will address the removal of New York Indians to today's lands of the Menominee. She will also discuss her book "A History in Indigenous Voices — Menominee, Ho-Chunk, Oneida, Stockbridge

and Brothertown Interactions in the Removal Era."

On Sept. 18, Grignon, the tribal historic preservation officer, will offer a review of Menominee treaty discussions with the New York tribes and the federal government.

Further details have yet to be announced.

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Hillcrest gets grant for after-school programming

The Shawano School District and the Boys and Girls Clubs of the Bay and Lakes Region have announced the award of a 21st Century Community Learning Center (21st CCLC) grant to support and establish after-school programming at Hillcrest Primary School.

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Room tax revenue increases 7.6% in 2023

Tourism manager tells how chamber has increased interest in area

The room tax received from the city of Shawano and six other municipalities in Shawano County surpassed the \$200,000 mark in 2023 and shows a marked increase from the year before.

Shawano County Tourism, part of the Shawano Country Chamber of Commerce, received \$214,208.82 from the city, the villages of Pulaski and Cecil, and the towns of Belle Plaine, Washington, Wescott and Wittenberg. The additional \$16,940.42 is a 7.6% increase.

Along with its visitor's guide and sales of brand items, the money from the room tax helps the chamber to market the area throughout the state and nation. Direct visitor spending that could be attributed to advertising and

promotional efforts went up 1.3% from \$75.5 million in 2022 to \$76.5 million last year.

Visitors to the county generated \$7 million in state and local taxes last year, which was an increase of 3.1% from the \$6.7 million that came in for 2022.

“According to the Wisconsin Department of Tourism, 2023 was another record-breaking year at \$114 million for Shawano County,” said Michelle Eron, tourism manager, as she presented the room tax information July 10 to the Shawano Common Council. “Shawano County Tourism is the official destination marketing organization that promotes this area as a recreational destination to increase travel with overnight stays and expenditures to both Shawano and Menominee counties.”

The \$114 million does not include all the information on tribal tourism, as that information is private. It does, however, include \$24.6 million in total labor income that supported almost 800 full- and part-time jobs, a 2.2% jump from the previous year.

“Lodging, including short-term rentals and second homes, account for the largest visitor spending in Wisconsin,” Eron said. “The second was spent on food and beverages followed by transportation and recreation and entertainment.”

The increase in the room tax and other tourism benchmarks show that there is growing interest in the Shawano area, according to Eron. She attributes some of the interest coming from the distribution of the chamber's visitor guide in 2023, with 50,000 copies getting to visitors through local businesses and events.

“Advertising space was purchased in various publications to expand our readership and interest in the area,” Eron said. “We acquired numerous publicity opportunities in

regard to media coverage, from the TV crews coming to watch the sturgeon from Fox 11 to my live interviews with WFRV-TV about the barn quilts or Spectrum News to find out why recreation is so important to this area. It was a very busy year, and we want to continue to grow tourism for the Shawano Country area in 2024.”

In October 2023, the chamber put up a new billboard on state Highway 29, which receives 37,343 weekly impressions, according to Eron. The billboard helps point to the visitor center at the southwest corner of Shawano, which she described as the “front door” for the area.

“We provide resources for travelers and our local community in our 24-hour vestibule and our reception area,” Eron said. “As you can see by this report, Shawano County continues to grow and prosper, and we plan to continue this trend to build an awareness that we have interest that tourists want to plan, to vacation at and to enjoy.”

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Parham sentenced for reservation fentanyl deal

Former Keshena resident gets 12 years for selling to undercover officer

An ex-Keshena man who sold fentanyl to an undercover officer at the Menominee Casino Resort was sentenced Monday in federal court to 12 years in prison to be followed by eight years supervised release.

According to court documents, Charles A. Parham, also known as “Red” or “Cuzzo,” met with an

undercover police office on Sept. 29, 2023, when Parham sold the officer about 5 grams of heroin.

On Oct. 11, 2023, Parham, 42, arranged by text message to sell 20 grams of fentanyl to the officer for \$2,000.

Authorities were able to electronically monitor the location of Parham's phone after obtaining a search warrant. They tracked his phone from Chicago to the pre-agreed location at the casino.

Parham's vehicle was

intercepted in the casino parking lot and Parham was removed from the car. The driver and a rear-seat passenger were also detained and interviewed. The driver said that she just met Parham and knew she was driving to Chicago to pick up drugs to return to the Wausau area. The passenger claimed not to know what was going on. Officers arrested Parham on a probation hold for violating terms of his extended supervision stemming from a prior drug conviction.

Officers found at plastic bag with a “rock and powder substance” inside Parham's vehicle. The substance weighed about 40 grams or 1.4 ounces and

later tested positive for fentanyl.

Parham was indicted in November on one count for selling heroin and one count of possessing fentanyl with the intent to distribute.

He pled guilty in April to the fentanyl charge and faced a five-year mandatory minimum sentence and a guideline sentence of up to 15½ years in prison.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Andrew Maier asked District Judge William Griesbach for a 12-year sentence. Parham's prior and pending drug cases made him eligible as a career offender and longer sentence.

However, Griesbach agreed with the federal

prosecutor that 12 years behind bars was a sufficient punishment and provide deterrence to prevent Parham returning to drug dealing soon.

Parham was previously convicted in Marathon County Circuit Court on a 2014 heroin charge and sentenced to 8 years in prison and five years extended supervision.

His federal fentanyl charge was a violation of his state probation, and he was sentenced in November to 150 days in prison for misdemeanor bail jumping.

Parham's case was investigated by multiple agencies as part of the Safe Trails Task Force and

Native American Drug and Gang Initiative.

NADGI and STTF allow federal, tribal, state, and local law enforcement to partner in an effort to combat drug trafficking and violent crime on the Menominee Reservation.

STTF members are deputized federal officers who identify and target for prosecution individuals who are involved in distribution of dangerous drug on the reservation. Coordination of state resources through NADGI permits efficient communication and evidence processing, which are essential to swift but fair prosecution of offenders, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office.

Dembski PR firm gets 2nd year with Shawano schools

The Shawano School District will continue to enlist the public relations help from Dorreen Dembski Communication Services for a second year and plans to lean in especially heavy as it prepares to ask voters a second time to approve a capital referendum.

The Shawano School Board voted 6-1 on July 8 to continue the partnership between the district and the Fond du Lac-based company. Board member Frank Kugel voted against the deal, while board members

Al Pyatskowitz and Christine McKinnies were absent.

Dembski's proposal suggested utilizing her to lead the charge in marketing for the November referendum, curating information to be published on the district's website, providing social media support about information regarding the referendum, assisting with contents for three videos, creating and sending out press releases and mailings, developing signs to be placed in the community and developing presentations for community and staff meetings.

Outside of the refer-

endum work, Dembski plans to help develop the district's key messages about what it wants people to know and understand about Shawano's public schools. The scope of work also includes writing up to eight press releases to go out to local media, developing three newsletters to be mailed out to district residents, creating social media content and consulting on emergency and crisis communications, among other things.

Superintendent Kurt Krizan reported that Dembski invoiced for 271 hours in the 2023-24 school year, but

he noted her services were especially needed in the spring as she worked with Hoffman Planning and Design in the aftermath of the failed April referendum.

Krizan noted that some of the items proposed were originally to be completed in the previous school year but were pushed back when other priorities arose.

“I think the three newsletters turned out really, really well,” Krizan said. “They took our existing things and tweaked them a little bit.”

Dembski would be paid \$145 per hour, and the number of hours available to the

district is 386 hours for an estimated total of \$56,000. However, that estimate does not include travel costs, the cost of printing, postage, video production and other production costs, according to written information Dembski provided. Dembski was not at the meeting to speak to the board.

Kugel questioned why Dembski was limiting the number of press releases to go out, suggesting that more information would be preferable to less.

“Being a newspaper kind of a person, I'm looking at things like, I need an information sheet in the

printed press about, let's say, synthetic turf vs. grass, or tech ed facility expansion, or performing arts, etc.” Kugel said. “I've come up with nine things already, so when it says up to eight press releases, and I've got nine things I'd love to see so people who like to read the newspaper and make a decision, how bound are we to this outline?”

Krizan noted that the district has been looking at hiring an in-house marketer, and he said Dembski believes the district needs another year of her foundational work to make that happen.

School district to continue Apple lease

\$2M paid over four years will continue district's 1-on-1 student tech program

Shawano School District officials are hoping their continued partnership with Apple will go smoother than when the initial project started.

In a presentation to the Shawano School Board on July 8, technology director Eric Brunner recommended the district enter into a new four-year lease. Under the agreement, students in kindergarten through seventh grade each get an iPad tablet to work with in school, and students in the eighth grade and high school receive a MacBook laptop computer for their schoolwork. According to Brunner, the lease would be \$512,906 each year, totaling a little more than \$2 million with no interest payments.

That payment will be offset by Total Technology, a company that works with K-12 schools, businesses, state and local governments, buying the old equipment. According to Brunner, the company will pay \$350,000 cash up front, and then examine the condition of the equipment. If it's in good condition, the district could receive up to another \$750,000 once the review is complete.

Brunner noted that teachers will have a choice to utilize MacBooks for themselves in the classroom or go with a Windows laptop. When the district made the switch to all Apple products in 2020, the learning curve proved much more difficult than expected, with teachers complaining that they had problems connecting the equipment. Some even abandoned their equipment altogether when it slowed down a learning process already hindered by the pandemic.

"There's been some major changes, including the way we manage them, how we manage them," Brunner said. "The team and I have been very meticulous about how they will be managed this time around. We've gotten staff feedback and addressed all of those concerns and problems. I'm not going to say it's 100% (fixed), but it's going to be very close to that."

Board member Bobbi Lemerond questioned why eighth grade is getting

laptops, while the sixth and seventh grades will have tablets like the younger children.

Superintendent Kurt Krizan said the initial plan was for the eighth grade to get tablets as well, but officials felt it was necessary to introduce laptops to prepare them for high school, when that equipment is the primary source for completing classwork.

Board member John Ayers expressed concern about online access for students outside of school. He pointed out there have been student complaints that their devices have been unable to reach needed research sites or portals when they've been doing homework, which has made it frustrating for them — especially high-achieving students — to complete their assignments.

"If they're using a school device, a lot of times for no really good reason at all, sometimes the kids can't access what they need to access," Ayers said.

Brunner said that the procedure has been that, whenever access is blocked on a device, teachers will send requests to the technology department, and then staff will test the device and make fixes, if necessary.

Ayers noted that was good for during the week, but if there are problems on the weekends, teachers and technology staff aren't available then to get things fixed.

This was a surprise to Brunner.

"I guess I haven't heard of this," he said. "Does this happen often?"

Two board members said it has happened with their children, and teachers have been accommodating when technology makes it difficult for students to do the work. Ayers noted that doesn't diminish the frustration of the brighter students who are trying to be responsible in getting their work done as requested.

"You get the high-achieving kids, and when they can't do that, they go nuts," Ayers said. "In their eyes, they're failing. They can't get done what they need to do."

The lease is expected to be approved by the school board in August.

Pay change sought for corrections, dispatch

Staffing of corrections officers at the Shawano County Jail and dispatchers with the sheriff's department continue to be a struggle for county officials, but some are hoping a pay differential for night and weekend work will help them clear the hurdle.

"The surrounding counties all pay a differential, and it's up to you if you want to keep up with these other counties or if we want to fall back behind like we've done in the past," Sheriff George Lenzner told members of the Shawano County Public Safety Committee on July 10.

Officials are proposing a 50 cents per hour differential for jail corrections officers and dispatchers who work nights and weekends. This would add \$30,825 to the annual jail budget and \$12,592 to the annual sheriff's department budget for dispatchers.

Lenzner said he understands the county can't pay the rates of some other counties, but a small increase can play a role in retaining current employees and attracting new ones.

"Oconto (County) is \$2. Another comparable,

close county is Langlade. Langlade is at \$1 an hour," said Julie Hasser, human resources director. "The short story is, money needs to be spent."

"On the shift differential, I don't know that there is any research on the direct correlation that employees will stay because they get it. Employees can leave because nobody else pays it."

Lenzner said most factories in the area pay a differential.

The shift differential costs are not part of the proposed budgets for the departments, as Troy Beyer, jail administrator, and Lenzner opted to keep it as a separate amendment for discussion by the Executive Committee when they consider all department budgets.

Hasser said she and Jim Davel, administrative coordinator, discussed it and acknowledged a shift differential for corrections and dispatchers could cause a stampede from other departments wanting to include a differential for their staff members, as well.

"If you would decide to go against the shift differential, we still have a turnover issue," she said. "We still have not enough bodies. You still have a problem

that needs to be fixed.

"We have some really great people, and it's really, really easy for Shawano County employees to jump to a different county."

Supervisor Randy Young asked whether 50 cents will address the problem.

Communications Supervisor Kasey Cross said one dispatch trainee was released to work on her own July 1 with another in training. There is one open position that saw 32 original applicants but only three who want to continue in the process.

"It is tough to find people that want to give up what we ask them to give up," she said. "You're going to work holidays. You're going to work weekends. You're going to work overnight. We're trying to find something to make it a little bit better to work here."

Lenzner said one great benefit for county employees is the amount of paid time off (PTO) offered, but for the sheriff's department, that is also a double-edged sword.

"We have minimum staffing," he said. "We have minimum people in here, so these people have all of these hours of paid time off, and either we can't let them use it, or when they do

use it, we kill our overtime budget because we have to fill their spot when they're not here."

He said hiring someone for the sake of filling a position doesn't work. Hiring an unqualified person results in money spent on training him or her only to have that person quit soon after starting.

Davel suggested the committee look at whether 50 cents an hour is enough to solve the overall staffing problem.

"If you're going to ask for something from the county board, you ask for what you need to solve your problem," he said. "I'm not saying this is easy ... but we ought to ask for two more positions for the dispatch and two more positions for corrections. Yes, that would be incredibly difficult to fill, but let's ask for the right thing."

Lenzner told Davel that department heads were told at the beginning of the year to not ask for any new positions.

"But what I would say is, just like we didn't expect we were going to be asking for a 50-cent increase after the largest pay raise in Shawano County history ... so, we should ask for what's going to fix the problem."

Putz national champion in Skills USA event

4 SCHS students represent Wisconsin in competition

The Shawano Community High School Skills USA Chapter sent four contestants to the National Skills USA Leadership Conference in Atlanta last month, and one came home a national champion.

Baeylan Putz took first place out of 34 competitors in automotive maintenance and light repair. He had a live contest in which contestants rotated through 10 workstations that followed Automotive Service Excellence (ASE) standards in vehicle maintenance and light repair. Nathan Eiden took 28th in automotive service and repair. He had a live contest in which contestants rotated through 13 workstations representing all the different areas of automotive repair using ASE standards.

Bradley Miller finished 30th in T-shirt design, creating a Wisconsin-themed shirt that represents the Skilled Trades of Skills

USA. By winning the state contest, Miller's design was used on T-shirts that all Wisconsin representatives wore in Atlanta during social activities. His design was on display, but he also had to present his design process and portfolio to the judges. Miller is currently a junior and looking forward to earning another trip to Atlanta next year with an opportunity to improve his skills.

To reach the national conference, contestants must win their contests in

the state they represent. There were contestants representing and competing in 115 leadership and skilled trades contests from 50 states and two territories. These contestants from around the country are the best in their trade at this level of training, according to a Skills USA press release.

"More than 6,000 students from every state in the nation participated in

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Woodworking a family affair for Golies

Quillwork, beadwork also keep dad, mom and three sons busy

Golie's Woodworking is a true family business, involving Matt Golie; his wife, Terri Golie; and their three sons, Josiah, 12, Quinn, 9, and Micah, 5.

In fact, the most commonly-used word heard in the Golie household is "we." According to Matt Golie, "we" means all of his choices and decisions involve the whole family. He said that their sons are brought up with a sense of responsibility and a joy of learning by being involved with wood-working projects.

Matt Golie is the pastor of the Assembly of God Church in Keshena. He previously served with the Assembly of God locations in Shawano and Gillett.

"We've been connected to our community for quite some time," he said. "Before the reservation, I had a business where we did cell phone, computer and tablet repair, Gadget Gurus. When we transferred to Keshena, the workload got to where I didn't have the flexibility to fix devices on a tight timeframe."

Matt Golie decided that woodworking would be a better fit for the family.

"The Menominee tribe is known for

lumber, and we figured that that would be a business format that would actually speak the language of our community," he said. "So, we started playing around with lumber and began with small signs and cutting boards and have been adding and developing as we go."

"It started by word of mouth," Terri Golie added. "People would request family signs for their houses."

They also started crafting one-of-a-kind cutting boards that they showed at a craft fair at Menominee Casino Resort in Keshena.

"The 'I love you more than fry bread' boards were a big hit," Matt Golie said, smiling at the memory.

The variety of wood items the family crafts is extensive. They are currently creating a pulpit for an Ojibwe church in Milwaukee. Matt explained that they are incorporating the Ojibwe greeting term "bozhoo" into the pulpit. The design includes animals that represent the different clans of that tribe.

The family carefully includes language from indigenous tribes into some of their other creations.

They also make plaques for the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin's human resources department to honor employee longevity milestones.

Other items that they craft are tic tac toe boards, wooden coffee mugs and wood-wrapped insulated mugs. One of their items is a business card holder, crafted to look like a canoe. Josiah helps to paint the holders to look like birch bark. They also do quillwork and beadwork.

"We really love and appreciate our community, and we've learned a lot from our community," Matt Golie said.

He said the family received a lot of help from Paula Waukau, a Menominee elder who taught the Golies how to do quillwork.

"With the quillwork and the beadwork stuff, we've intentionally taken time to learn from people in the tribe," he said. "Especially with the quillwork, I really feel like that was a really important piece to learn from someone within the tribe."

Describing how they start new projects, Matt Golie said, "We learn as we go, look at things and kind of make it up as we go. For example, I have a friend who has a catering business, and he asked me if I could make a

tortilla press. I've never made one. But since I work with wood, we just played around with it and came up with one."

Matt Golie said there are a couple of different methods when it comes to quillwork.

"There's birchbark quillwork, where you're actually going through a piece of real birch bark," he said. You lay out your design before you start and then you work your quill through it. I know of one person on the reservation that can do it. The other method is a wrap, that's more common. An example is dangling earrings or circle earrings, with the quills wrapped around."

The Golies harvest the quills from dead porcupines.

"We have friends who'll call us to say they've found a dead porcupine on the

Beltran is a black belt under the lineage of Carlson Gracie Jiu Jitsu.

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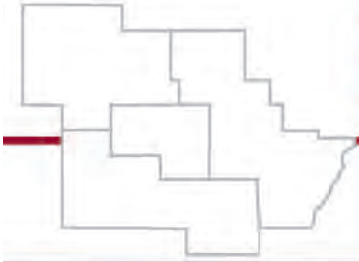

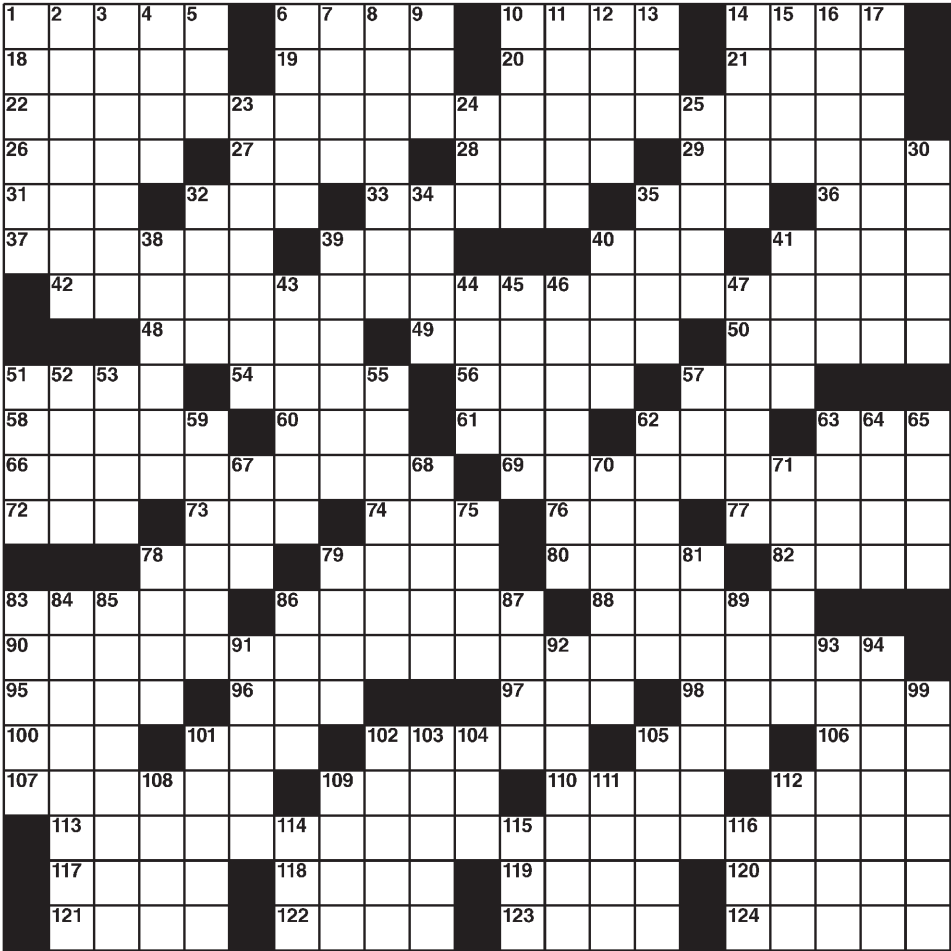

State witness not available for Noriega-Avila hearing

The July 10 Daubert hearing in which a witness for the state's case against Pedro Noriega-Avila was to be present was hastily rescheduled after Shawano-Menominee County District Attorney Greg Parker reported that witness couldn't fit the court hearing into her busy schedule.

With the trial a week away, the hearing was rescheduled for 2 p.m. July 15 in Branch II of the Shawano County Courthouse. However, it will depend on the witness being available to testify, and with Noriega-Avila due to stand trial on child sexual assault and incest charges two days later, there can be no further delays. It will also be dependent on whether a Spanish-speaking interpreter is available that day, something that is not always easy for the courts to schedule.

Parker said he was unable to "secure that witness" for July 10, but he spoke with defense coun-

sel on the issue and was recommending the hearing be rescheduled. He claimed that the witness works for the Child Advocacy Center and did not expect the hearing to take more than an hour.

"Her calendar was completely full," Parker said. During a search for available times, 2 p.m. was the only open spot on Shawano-Menominee Circuit Court Judge William Kussel's calendar, and even

at that, there was only 45 minutes available. Defense attorney James Schoenecker questioned Parker's effort to get the witness to court. "For the record, I just wanted to see if the state

did actually send subpoenas for this witness," Schoenike said.

Parker said he did not send out a subpoena to compel the witness to attend the hearing.

"I communicated with her but did not put out a subpoena for that purpose," he said.

Schoenecker replied that, instead of trying to schedule another hearing to determine the value of the witness's testimony to his client's case, the witness should be excluded entirely.

Kussel expressed frustration and pointed out that he was due to leave for drug court training after the end of the hearing and would not be back in the court until July 15. He pointed out the difficulty of getting a court interpreter scheduled, as the ones who do work in Wisconsin have to bounce from court to court, sometimes via Zoom but many times having to attend court hearings in person.

"One of the problems that I have is not only finding dates on the calendar,"

Kussel said. "Recently, a report from the state shows that, in Shawano County, we judges have the highest caseload in the state. Getting an interpreter here on short notice can be very, very difficult."

Parker noted that, if necessary, the state's case could go forward without the witness.

"If we can't get her, it's not a lynchpin," Parker said. "We have everything else in place."

Kussel ruled the state's witness would be excluded if an interpreter could not be found for July 15.

The Daubert hearing was set one week before a three-day trial scheduled to begin for Noriega-Avila on July 17.

Noriega-Avila remains in the Shawano County Jail on a \$500,000 cash bond. He has been incarcerated for almost three years, mainly because of the difficulty in finding an attorney the first time around. It took until late 2022 before Stertz was found to handle the case.

Reduced speed proposed for segment of County Road D near Tilleda

The Shawano County Board of Supervisors is expected to approve a new speed zone for part of County Road D in Tilleda at a meeting July 24.

Officials with the Town of Seneca had originally requested a speed reduction from 55 mph to 25 mph on County Road D between Nursery Lane and Hatchery Road. Instead, the county's highway and parks committee and public safety committee recommended a reduction to 45 mph.

A speed study of the area in question determined it warranted a transitional zone before the 25 mph zone in Tilleda.

The reduced speed zone will be established on County Road D from a point 250 feet east of Nursery Lane, proceeding west and northwest for 1,600 feet to a point 50 feet southeast of Hatchery Road.

The highway and parks committee approved the change at its July 2 meeting, while the public safety committee gave its OK at a July 10 meeting.

job, write them a letter of recommendation if they're doing well."

Imhoff said coalition staff also help the men with their medications.

Justin Krysheski, also with the Shawano Menominee Resiliency Coalition, and Adam Voight, a part-time staffer, join Imhoff and Boyd in staffing the home.

"They provide everything to get you started and help you find the resources you need for transitioning back into the community," Estep said. "They truly care about the healing and growth process of you becoming a better person. I can't express my gratitude enough and look forward to managing my own life and finding happiness."

Boyd said the expected length of stay for each man will be somewhere between six and 18 months, depending on the individuals, their problems and their progress.

The resiliency coalition owns the home for the women's center, but the men's home is rented.

This location became known to the group through Justin Shields. His aunt, Barbara Shepard, owns the home and agreed to lease it to the coalition to use as a recovery center for men.

"He was the tie that brought it all together,"

Boyd said of Shields.

Shields also helped remodel the house to fit the needs of the recovery coalition and the men living there.

David Corn, 24, is from Keshena and is approaching six months of being clean from drugs and alcohol.

"I'm here because I want to change my life around and be a positive influence on the younger generation. Also, I want to be a productive member of society, while tackling my goals one by one," he said. "I'm very grateful for everyone involved in the Shawano Recovery and to be one of the first in the new sober living. It's life-changing here, and I couldn't have done it without everyone's love and support from the team."

Krysheski said the coalition is now working to solidify its foundation before taking on any new projects. But, there are projects on the horizon.

"We're also looking to partner with Menominee to hopefully in the future open up two homes for them, men and women, so that they would have more Native American culture," he said.

For now, like the men and women in the recovery homes, it's one day at a time.
