

Rigsby selected to be new Shawano County Clerk

Shawano County District 22 Supervisor Raymond Rigsby is slated to become the next Shawano County clerk.

Rigsby was recommended for the post by the county’s executive committee July 2. The final decision is up to the full county board, which will vote when it meets July 23.

“I’m very excited for the opportunity to continue to work in government,” Rigsby said. “After 24 years in the military (U.S. Army), I want to continue to give back.”

Rigsby is currently the District 22 supervisor and will resign that post before accepting the county clerk job.

He is also the town clerk in the Town of Seneca and expects to continue in that role, at least for now.

“I’ve been there for 10 years and have another year left in my current term,” he said. “I know (former Clerk) Kara (Skarlupka) was also town clerk in the Town of Washington, and she handled both. If it gets to be a struggle, I’ll give up the town clerk job.”

Rigsby said accepting the county clerk job is also bittersweet as he will have to resign his job as a special education teacher in the Gresham School District.

“After finally getting my teaching degree and working in the district the past years, it’ll be disappointing to have to quit,” he said. “Before the full-time teaching, I did a lot of subbing in the Bowler, Wittenberg-Birnamwood, Shawano and Gresham districts.”

Rigsby said he will begin his county clerk duties moments after the board votes to appoint him.

Skarlupka announced her retirement effective July 11, with another 3 1/2 years remaining in her four-year term. Rigsby’s appointment will be for the duration of Skarlupka’s term.

At some point, there will most likely be an appointment to fill Rigsby’s unexpired term as supervisor. The district includes all of the Town of Seneca, all of the Town of Grant, all of the city of Marion and Ward 2 in the Town of Morris.

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Dems seek better ways to communicate message

Health care, education emerge as primary issues

A listening session held June 30 by the Shawano-Menominee Counties Democratic Party at the Shawano Civic Center had to switch directions after Andi Rich, a Marinette resident and clean water expert who ran unsuccessfully for the Wisconsin 12th Senate District, did not show up.

Jan Koch, the party's local chairwoman, contacted Rich and relayed to the people in attendance that Rich had "forgot" about the meeting.

With that, the Democrats moved the discussion to health care and education, two issues that are under scrutiny at the state and national levels.

Lisa Henry recognized that the local Democrats have an uphill battle in Shawano County, where 64% of the registered voters are Republican, when it comes to dealing with issues.

"I don't think taking on the global issues is an efficient way to spend time and money, so my thought would probably be the things that are local, like education," Henry said. "Education is going to be important. Schools are going to be important. Health care is going to be important, because we're going to be losing hospitals (and) we're going to be losing nursing homes."

Plans to cut the number of people on Medicaid via the One Big Beautiful Bill has Henry concerned, saying she fears that could force some people off

Medicare, too, as the two are connected.

"The seniors are going to suffer big," she said. "Farmers are going to get killed, and it's going to be worse."

Henry recommended

that Democrats speak to those within their party, independents and moderate Republicans if they hope to facilitate change in Wisconsin.

"The far-right minds aren't going to get

changed; they're not going to change their minds," Henry said. "Stacy Abrams in Georgia was able to do something no one else was able to do. She managed to pull a Republican state for an old Democratic presi-

dent. She managed to pull that state for (Joe) Biden."

Abrams' success was in that she sought out the disenfranchised voters, the ones weary of the state of politics in 2020, and convinced them Biden was the best choice to be president.

"She knew the Democrats were already going to vote for him, and the far-right Republicans were out of reach," Henry said. "She knew the state was majority Republican, so she concentrated on switching minds of the people being directly affected."

Shirley Hinze, who ran unsuccessfully for the 6th Assembly District last November, said it was important to not only spread the Democrats' message, but to refute claims made by Republicans. She noted that she regularly calls the radio station's local morning show when members of the Shawano County Republican Party speak.

"They know my

voice," Hinze said. "We have to be more active with a pushback on their programming."

Hinze pointed out that a lot of state actions hit home with the local community, so it was important to bring up those issues.

"In our communities, we're lacking police officers, (and) we're lacking road repair," Hinze said. "Once again, they're going to pander to the farming group. Now, farmers deserve a lot of credit, but they have, historically, received the lion's share of the subsidies."

Henry, who said she's an independent, agreed with Hinze's assertion that Democrats have to push back on GOP propaganda. However, she recommended the conversation not start with which political party the participants subscribe to.

"The thing that stood out to me ... was that all they're doing is spewing whatever it takes to keep people upset. So that's why I say, anytime there's a discussion where the word 'Democrat' slips into the conversation, they're not going to listen," Henry said. "If you say, 'We are really worried about schools. Kids are not going to get fed. Schools are going to get closed down. There's going to be a big disparity because the rich are going to get a great education and the poor people are going to get nothing,' instead of making it a 'We're Democrats. You need to listen to us,' it should be parents for schools."

When Henry asked if there was a plan in the party to address how to talk to people and persuade them to get involved with issues, Koch said, "It's a work in progress."

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Sheriff's department K-9 golf outing coming up Aug. 2

Both dogs are trained to detect illegal narcotics; track individuals who have fled from law enforcement, as well as lost individuals; detect

discarded evidence; and protect their handlers and other law enforcement personnel.

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Behnke votes for 2025-27 state budget

More ADA positions, slight cut in middle class taxes included

It took a little longer than expected, but the 2025-27 biennial Wisconsin budget is now settled — making some folks happy but disappointing others.

The \$111 billion state budget was officially signed into law in the early hours of July 3 by Gov. Tony Evers following a marathon session by the Wisconsin Assembly the day before to reapprove the budget by a 59-39 vote after changes were made in the Wisconsin Senate. One of the upsides in the region is that the budget paid for two additional assistant district attorney positions for Shawano County and a part-time position for Oconto County.

Rep. Elijah Behnke was one of the yes votes and talked about the timeline with NEW Media prior to going into the marathon session. He noted that Republicans were waiting to see how the spring election went, due to the potential for the Wisconsin Supreme Court turning conservative, but the court remained a 4-3 liberal majority.

“The line item veto, which is so powerful in Wisconsin and kind of scary to us because (Evers) put that 400-year increase in local school funding through property tax by manipulating the numbers in the last budget; we were not only watching the Supreme Court race but also the Supreme Court ruling,” Behnke said. “We just found out last week with the new court that we are allowed to pass a bill with the language of policy and then put the money separately in the budget, and the governor can’t veto the policy so that we can enforce the policy and the funding of the policy to go hand in hand.”

Legislative leaders started to negotiate on the budget in April, but things started to “fizzle” later in May, according to Behnke, which prompted Republicans just to write their own budget, similar to what has been done for years. He said the GOP planned no increase in funding to the Universities of Wisconsin,

while Evers was pushing for \$100 million. The negotiated budget settled on \$25 million. Behnke noted there had to be some accountability for that additional funding, “like professors cannot just get paid just to write a book. They have to be paid to teach a minimum of 12 or 15 hours. We’re bringing in some reforms for the additional funding.”

The question of UW funding on Behnke’s mind is why the system needs more taxpayer dollars when it has an endowment to dive into.

The Assembly also ran into a snag when five GOP senators said they would not vote for the budget for one reason or another. Behnke said that resulted in trying to get support for Senate Democrats.

“Part of the reason it’s so bloated is because Senate Republicans wouldn’t sign on to reasonable negotiations, and now spending has gotten more unreasonable,” Behnke said.

Originally, K-12 schools were not going to get additional funding in the two-year budget, primarily because of Evers’ veto action two years ago that was recently overturned by the Supreme Court. But with the GOP needing Senate Democrats’ support to pass the budget, a compromise was made to increase special education funding by 35-45%, which doesn’t completely compensate for those expenses but was something pushed by school districts.

“I think we need to reform the way we fund K-12 schools,” Behnke said. “I think we spend way too much per student for the quality of student we get back. DPI (Department of Public Instruction), I think we should get rid of them. I think we need to reform the school funding formula so it’s more fair for small, rural schools. You’re getting \$20,000 per student in Milwaukee, but yet \$10,000 for a kid in Suring. It’s not fair.”

Behnke praised the action to add the assistant district attorney positions, saying they’re sorely needed.

“That is a huge win for our backyard,” he said.

Another like for the state budget comes from Community Alternatives in Shawano lobbying for additional funding for homes to take care of disabled adults. As a result, Behnke said, \$200 million was put into the budget to help provide such care facilities.

“There are half a dozen to a dozen homes around the Shawano area that basically have these sweet ladies take care of our most vulnerable population, and I was able to advocate heavily for that,” Behnke said. “My budget motion to help the care facilities statewide to care for the disabled adults was my big ask for the state budget.”

Behnke’s support of the budget was also due to an expected 1% tax cut for the middle class.

“It is something,” Behnke said. “With a Democratic governor, getting a tax cut is significant.”

Sen. Eric Wimberger did not reply to NEW Media’s request for an interview, but his office submitted a written statement after the budget was signed where he criticized Evers’ actions, including vetoing a provision that would have closed the Green Bay Correctional Institution by 2029. This is in spite of the governor’s own calls for the prison to be decommissioned in the next four years.

“Gov. Evers’ veto is a signal he is not interested in very simple facility management to solve the GBCI question,” Wimberger said. “Closing GBCI is doable by 2029 if we convert and expand existing facilities to take more medium-security inmates currently housed in maximum-security prisons because of overcrowding. Evers’ plan for medium-security inmates instead would expand the Earned Release Program and let thousands of dangerous criminals into our neighborhoods in coming years.”

Ingold has counsel again in homicide case

New attorneys ask for 90 days to review material

After months of searching, two attorneys have been hired to represent Shawano resident Michael Ingold in his murder case.

On June 30, attorneys Albert Moustakis and Kelli Thompson appeared remotely before Shawano-Menominee Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. and requested 90 days to review the case file and get discovery evidence. The court scheduled a status conference for 3 p.m. Sept. 30 in Branch II of the Shawano County Courthouse.

Assistant District Attorney Laura Nelson said she planned to file a motion by the end of the week, and then a motion hearing will be scheduled once that happens.

Ingold, 60, will have been in the Shawano County Jail for three years on a \$1 million bond by the time the status conference rolls around. He has repeatedly requested speedy trials, but he has also had attorneys quit

on him. Ingold was due to stand trial in November 2024 when his attorney at the time, Julianne Lennon, withdrew, and the court has been searching for attorneys ever since, a task made more difficult because the charge was a homicide.

Lennon took on the case in April 2023, taking over after Christopher Froehlich withdrew May 9, 2023, after being appointed Oct. 18, 2022.

The criminal complaint against Ingold states that at 4:13 a.m. June 25, 2022, the Shawano County Sheriff’s Department received a 911 call from Ingold, where he stated that he woke up and checked on his girlfriend, only to find her deceased.

An autopsy showed that Sheila A. Laudon, who was 59 at the time, was strangled to death.

Ingold told the deputies that he got home at 6:30 p.m., talked with the victim, turned on the television and fell asleep on the couch, the complaint said. He stated he woke up around 2:30 a.m.

and heard the victim in the kitchen saying that she was getting a beer. He then claimed that he woke up again at 4:01 a.m. and found her deceased in the bedroom.

Detectives received the autopsy report of the victim’s death on July 21, 2022, stating that the cause of death was manual strangulation.

On July 27, 2022, two detectives interviewed Ingold at the sheriff’s department, told Ingold that the victim died from strangulation and that the detectives believed that he caused it. Ingold responded, saying, “No it’s not, no it’s not, I didn’t touch her,” according to the complaint. Ingold acknowledged he and Laudon were the only two people in the house but continued to deny touching her, according to the complaint.

If convicted, Ingold faces life in prison if convicted of first-degree intentional homicide with a domestic abuse modifier.

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2 sales of tobacco to minors in June

juveniles found in Oconto County out of 37 inspections, but Shawano County had two sales out of 38 businesses inspected.

Man struck, killed while walking

A 32-year-old Shawano area man was struck and killed while walking along County Road HH near Parkwood Drive in the Town of Washington in the early morning hours of July 7.

According to a statement from the Shawano County Sheriff’s Department, at about 4:15 a.m., Shawano County Dispatch received a 911 call from a motorist who believed he had struck something with his vehicle. The caller reported seeing shoes

in the roadway but was unsure of the individual’s location.

Deputies responded and, after a brief search, located a man lying in the ditch. He was unresponsive and not breathing. Deputies immediately began CPR, and EMS arrived shortly thereafter. Despite life-saving efforts, the man was pronounced dead at the scene.

The driver of the vehicle, a 38-year-old man from the Keshena area, was cooperative with law

enforcement during the initial investigation. The driver indicated he was returning home from work in Green Bay. Preliminary findings show the impact occurred in the north-bound lane of County Road HH.

The sheriff’s department was assisted at the scene by Shawano Ambulance, Bonduel EMS, Cecil-Washington Fire Department and the Shawano County Coroner’s Office.

The investigation continues.



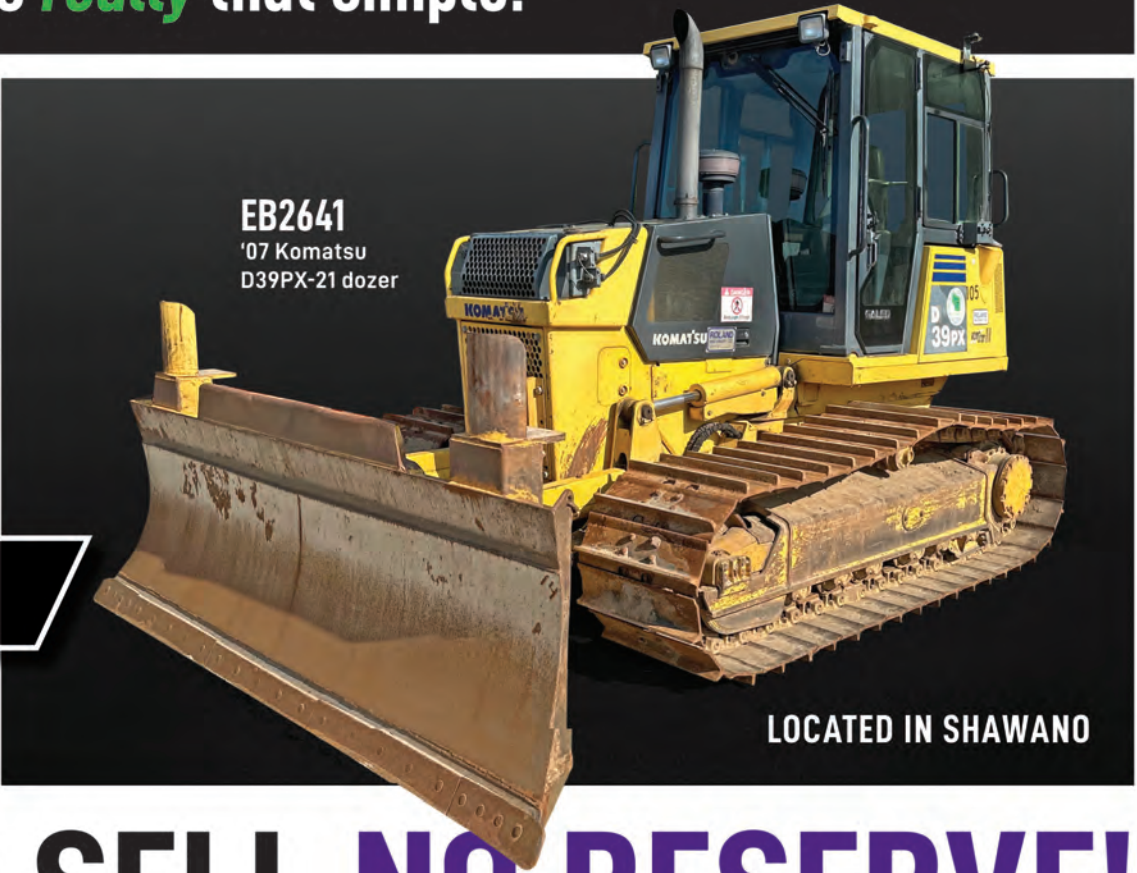
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ThedaCare doc shares sore throat treatment tips

When it's tough to tell if a sore throat is related to a recent case of the sniffles or the result of overly enthusiastic cheering at the kid's sporting event, a visit with a health care provider can help clear things up.

"Most sore throats will resolve on their own with home care measures," said Dr. Glenn Vogelsang, ThedaCare family medicine physician. "At the same time, it's important to watch for the warning signs of strep throat."

Typically, a sore throat feels scratchy, raspy, achy or a combination of these symptoms. Sharp pain, especially with swallow-

ing, is also a sign of sore throat. Sometimes a sore throat can lead to pain in the ears or neck. "Viruses are responsible for a lot of sore throat cases," Vogelsang said. "Other causes often are related to allergies, tonsillitis, acid reflux, strep throat and bacterial infections. A person's throat also can get irritated from yelling, smoke exposure, hot liquids or spicy foods." A viral sore throat can

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention suggests these sore throat relief tips:

- Lozenges, popsicles or ice chips. Don't give lozenges to kids under 4 years old.
- Warm water and honey can help relieve sore throat and cough.
- Gargle warm salt water or half-strength peroxide followed by Cepacol mouthwash.
- Drink warm beverages or plenty of other fluids (not alcohol).
- Use over-the-counter pain relievers as directed.

feel similar to strep throat, a bacterial infection that can make the throat feel sore and scratchy.

"I often tell people to look at the whole picture of their symptoms," Vogel-sang said. "If you also have cold symptoms, a virus is the likely cause of your sore throat."

Streptococcus, the bacteria that causes strep, has many types. The most common is group A strep. Strep throat symptoms can include, but aren't limited to:

- Throat pain that usually comes on quickly
- Painful swallowing
- Red and swollen tonsils, sometimes with gray or white patches or streaks of pus
- Tiny red spots on the

area at the back of the roof of the mouth

- Swollen, tender lymph nodes in your neck

"If you suspect strep throat, it's important to get tested," Vogelsang said. "Untreated, strep can lead to complications, such as kidney inflammation or rheumatic fever."

Diagnosing strep requires a throat swab and lab test.

"We typically will order this depending on your symptoms," Vogelsang said. "During an exam, we'll feel your neck to check for swollen glands. We'll also use a lighted instrument to look at your throat, nose and ears."

If a strep test is positive, the health care provider will likely prescribe antibiotics.

"It's important to finish the full course, even if your symptoms have resolved," Vogelsang said. "Failing to do so can lead to complications."

If the strep test is negative and the throat looks distressed, the health care provider may order a throat culture seeking other forms of strep or bacteria.

"Antibiotics will not treat a viral infection," Vogelsang said. "Instead, comfort measures at home can help ease symptoms."

Vogelsang suggests seeking medical care for

worsening symptoms such as a sore throat that doesn't get better within a few days; rash, joint pain, or swelling; or blood in the phlegm.

"If there's a lot of pain with swallowing or the tonsils are quite large, we may choose to give you a course of steroids to decrease swelling and to make swallowing more comfortable," Vogelsang said. "The important thing is to be examined by a health care provider."

Vogelsang offered steps to prevent and slow the spread of sore throat, such as washing hands frequently. Use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer if no soap and water is available.

If possible, cough or sneeze into a tissue, he said. Throw used tissue into the garbage. If tissue isn't available, cough or sneeze into your elbow.

Don't share cups and utensils when sick, Vogel-sang said. Avoid exposure to people who are ill, and stay home if sick.

"Enduring a sore throat is not fun, but with rest and comfort measures, you should feel better soon and be back to cheering at those youth sporting events," Vogelsang said. "And when you need care, you have options including in-person, virtual and urgent care options."

Classic tale of an orphan boy about to hit Shawano

'Oliver' showcases human ills but warms heart with music

A classic Charles Dickens tale will be coming to the stage and warming people's hearts at the Mielke Arts Center this coming weekend.

"Oliver," based on the 1838 novel "Oliver Twist," has seen West End and Broadway performances, as well as a 1968 film that won six Academy Awards. With all that foundation, the Box in the Wood Theatre Guild hopes to go toe-to-toe with the professionals and warm people's hearts with the tale of an orphan boy who escapes a brutal workhouse only to find himself in another place of ill repute when a 16-year-old known as the Artful Dodger convinces him to join him and other boys as a pickpocket.

Oliver's pickpocket career ends quickly when they try to steal a handkerchief from a rich and elderly man who later turns out to be Oliver's grandfather, and he is left holding the goods as the other boys flee the scene. However, he doesn't end up in jail, but Oliver is forced back into the bad life when it's discovered that his deceased mother gave him a gold locket, and it's believed that he might actually have wealthy relatives that could be fleeced.

Alex Konen, the technical director for the show, said there are some themes in the show that make it such an enduring story.

"It's the classic tale of an orphan boy who is kind of flung out into the world," Konen said. "Some of the things that I sometimes think get lost about this story is that we're in this industrial revolution where he's being raised in this workhouse and nobody's really batting an eye about the fact that there's a workhouse. Because he wants more food than what they're willing to offer, he takes off and he's basically sold into an apprenticeship, which wouldn't be that abnormal, but it's not

until his grandfather, by happenstance, finds him."

Konen noted slavery wasn't as much of an issue in the 1800s for London, where the story takes place, but it's something that should cause discomfort today.

"I feel like, even in modern-day Ameri-

ca, there's an entire class of people that do grunt work that a lot of other people seem to be completely oblivious as to how hard they work or how little they get paid for some of the hard work they do," Konen said. "It seems like a testament to that same conundrum today with how are we funding everything? That's not necessarily our focus (for this show), but it's something I picked up on."

Konen said "Oliver" felt like a good way to bring in more children for the summer musical, something that has been lacking in recent years as the children's

GARDENING WITH MELINDA MYERS

Extreme heat provides challenges to gardeners

The recent heat wave that swept across much of the country is a good reminder to take extra care of our plants and ourselves as temperatures climb. Extreme temperatures can take their toll even on plants

normally suited to the growing conditions. Many plants suffer when short- or long-term

temperatures exceed 86 degrees Fahrenheit. You will see withering, leaf and flower drop, stunting and more on heat stressed plants. The longer the heat wave persists, the greater the risk of damage.

When daytime temperatures rise above 90 degrees and night temperatures remain above 70 degrees, blossoms drop, and poor fruit development may occur on tomatoes.

Temperature extremes also impact pepper productivity. When temperatures climb to 95 degrees or higher, the pollen is sterile and flowers may drop. Small fruit may also fall from the plant during such hot spells.

We can't change the weather, but we can help our plants cope when temperatures soar. Provide some midday and afternoon shade for plants struggling with the heat. Move containers to a shady location and use a patio umbrella or shade cloth suspended on hoops or stakes to provide your permanent plantings with a bit of relief.

Mulch the soil to conserve water, keep plant roots cooler, suppress weeds, and improve the soil as it decomposes. Spread a 1-to-3-inch layer of leaves, evergreen needles, woodchips and other organic matter on the soil surface surrounding plants. The coarser the material, the thicker the layer of mulch needed. Pull mulch away from the trunks of trees and the stems of shrubs and other plants. You obtain multiple benefits from this one task while burning a few calories and strengthening your muscles.

Water plants thoroughly when the top few inches of soil are crumbly and moist. Plants will develop deeper roots able to access water from a larger area, making them more drought tolerant and pest resistant. Avoid frequent light watering that encourages shallow roots more susceptible to drought stress. Make sure new plantings, moisture lovers, and stressed plants are the first to receive a good, long drink.

Don't overlook established trees and shrubs that need a helping hand during

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There’s more behind stories of people’s lives

If asked to share stories about someone you idolize, which would you tell? Some people would speak about a performer who captivates an audience. Others would highlight an athlete who rises to a challenge. Some might discuss a politician who champions legislation that makes life better for their constituents. The most blessed among us will share stories about someone who spent years personally shaping their lives.

This past month, I read Dean Robbins’s latest book “Wisconsin Idols: 100 Heroes who Changed the State, the World, and Me.” Robbins has been collecting stories about his “personal heroes since the second grade,” when he became enamored with the Appleton escape artist Harry Houdini. He categorizes his subjects as “Melody Makers,” “Scene Stealers,” “Champs,” “Boundary Breakers,” and “Thinkers,” packing his personalized odes to greatness



within a few pages.

Robbins is an award-winning journalist who knows how to hook a reader with an opening line, spinning them forward with tales about famous peoples’ connections to the Badger State. While one might expect to read about Waukesha guitar pioneer Les Paul, Madison’s comedic legend Chris Farley, and Appleton’s venerated actor Willem Dafoe, Robbins reveals many rich and potentially unexpected connections in his text.

Readers are treated to tales such as how the Seattle grunge band Nirvana recorded early versions for their zeitgeist-changing “Nevermind” album in Madison’s Smart Studios.

They learn that while the Apollo 13 Commander Jim Lovell may be famous for stating “Houston, we have a problem,” his life was shaped by his childhood in Milwaukee. Local choreography enthusiasts delight in knowing that our “country’s first dance major” degree wasn’t created for New York City’s Julliard School, but rather by Margaret H’Doubler at the University of Wisconsin.

Robbins also shares empowering stories about some of Wisconsin’s most influential Native Americans. His profiles of venerated Oneida comedian Charlie Hill, celebrated Ho-Chunk memoirist Xéhachiwinga (Mountain Wolf Woman), revered Menominee diplomat Ada Deer, and trail-blazing Stockbridge-Munsee educator Electa Quinney offer excellent introductions to these trailblazers.

While I was reading Robbins’ text, the

Menominee community lost a cherished elder who caused me to think about my own heroes. In various remembrances from loved ones, Grace “Bea” Corn was described as a supportive friend and a gifted athlete. She gave of herself long after reaching the status of “elder,” and her selfless generosity certainly enriched my life.

In 2011, Gerald Sanapaw Sr. asked the College of Menominee Nation to help revive the famed Menominee Pageants that were produced most summers beginning in 1937 and ending in the 1970s. The original shows featured recorded dialogue, pantomime, live music, and traditional dancing accented by theatrical technical elements.

In 2016, after untold hours of research and elder interviews, we were able to produce our first revival show in Keshena’s famed Woodland Bowl. On July 30, we will continue what has

become an annual production. Bea Corn is the reason we are able to stage them.

Corn gifted her father James Frechette Sr.’s files to CMN. Frechette had a stint as the pageant’s writer and producer in the 1950s, and his handwritten notes and detailed files helped us bring this traditional art-form back to prominence.

Corn had two requirements for her donation. First, that the files belong to all Menominee people, not just her descendants. Second, that no one could profit from their proliferation and publication. The pageants are meant for the Menominee people to stage on their ancestral land as a gift to the community. With the details of her donation set, Corn proceeded to be the advisory matriarch of our shows.

In April, I was humbled to win the 2024-2025 Wisconsin Indian Education Association’s Ronald Satz-Friend of Indian Educa-

tion Award. I accepted my recognition as a non-Native ally at a banquet at the Menominee Casino Resort surrounded by my family and colleagues.

Although I appreciated all of the kind words and support shared with me that night, I was most honored that Corn agreed to leave the comfort of her home and sit beside me as my name was called. From her wheelchair, she insisted on photographing me herself.

An idol is someone we aspire to be like. As Robbins shows in his text, history proves Wisconsinites don’t have to look far to find some of their own. If we’re lucky, those we idolize are among our biggest supporters. Inspired by Bea Corn, I pray that we each can pay that kindness forward.

Tourism helps economy, but wreaks havoc on nature

If you’ve ever vacationed in northern Oconto County, you know we are blessed with an abundance of pristine natural resources, excellent restaurants, great places to shop and lots of entertaining things to do. That draws thousands of out-of-town guests from Memorial Day to deer season who come to enjoy what we get to experience every day. It’s mostly good as we like sharing, but frankly, there are a few we wish would stay home.

Now I know what it feels like to be an outsider. When Jon and I moved to Townsend in 2002, we were surprised that we weren’t always welcome. We often heard “You aren’t from here; we don’t care what you think,” or “Stop trying to improve things; we like it the way it is.” After two decades, the shoe has found its way to the other foot.

Rant alert. What follows is based on personal experience, so buckle up.

First off, it’s important



to say that most visitors who come up north respect the environment and the people who reside here. Unfortunately, the bulk of the problems stem from those who do neither, mostly short-term renters and UTV enthusiasts who seem to think that spending money here gives them unfettered freedom to do as they please. In fact, we’ve been told several times that “there are no laws north of Highway 64.” Really.

Thanks to the new Oconto County Sheriff’s Department satellite office in Riverview, we have dedicated deputies on regular patrol. However, this is a big geographic area to police and protect, especially from Memorial Day to Thanksgiving when the population

doubles or even triples. No surprise that most of the bad behavior is fueled by excessive consumption of alcohol.

On the plus side, a big factor in facilitating public safety and security is the ubiquitous presence of cameras. They are very effective at deterring property crimes, but unless perpetrators are caught on some kind of recording device, odds are they’ll get away with it. Even with the more robust law enforcement presence, it’s relatively easy for those with bad intentions to operate under a cloak of anonymity.

Some common infractions include throwing litter into roadside ditches, ruining lakebeds and shorelines with wake-producing watercraft, off-trail recklessness tearing up the woods, wasting precious groundwater, or worst of all, ignoring burning rules that could cause a catastrophic wildfire. Clearly, the culprits who conduct themselves

like this don’t care that they can go home, but we are the ones left to deal with the fallout.

Given all that, it’s no wonder there is deep-seated resentment against the powers that be in Oconto pushing for more and more tourism without considering the impact on the high tax paying property owners who must live with it. For example, we had basically no say in allowing UTVs to range freely. Yes, they should stay on the trails and obey speed limits, but far too many drive wherever they please as fast as they can go.

Last Saturday, I headed home on County Road F after spending the day as a tour guide at Holt and Balcom Logging Camp in Lakewood. I was driving the 45 mph limit when four UTVs passed me at high speed, each cutting closely in front of me. The last one in line would have caused a head-on crash with an oncoming pickup if I hadn’t

slammed on the brakes.

I think it’s fair to ask those who make decisions to promote unrestrained tourism up north, would you want strangers racing unmuffled off-road vehicles in front of your house at all hours of the day and night, doing doughnuts on your fragile roads, or trespassing and tearing up your property? How about throwing whatever wherever instead of disposing of it properly? Deafening music bellowing across the lake or 10-decibels-above-sanity booms from fireworks and quarter sticks waking you up in the middle of the night?

What people need to appreciate is that we are a carefully woven mosaic of rural residents living together in harmony. We are not ignorant dweebs who think a painting is what we give our sun-faded decks, a musical score is a steamy ballad that sets the mood for hooking up, sculpting is the latest in plastic surgery and wouldn’t know a plat

from a plate.

Yes, there are some who may not value differences in age, gender, ethnicity, social and economic status, but they are a minority. Most of us mind our own business unless someone needs assistance. Then we cast aside politics and personal feelings, eagerly pitching in to help.

We northern town residents know that tourism is an essential economic activity. When people openly trespass on private property, disrespect hospitality workers, pepper loud conversations with the F-bomb, even steal critical road signs, they spoil it for everyone. We want visitors to feel welcome here. All we ask is a little respect and consideration so we can all enjoy our time in Poor Man’s Paradise.

theater program during the warmer months fell by the wayside.

"The whole idea was, how can we keep getting the community involved on the stage, but also what's going to bring community members in?" Konen said. "I think it's good to pick a lesser-known musical every now and then. However, this is one of those golden age classics where, even though there's some dark twists and turns to the storyline ... this is a tried-and-true musical that people have loved for ages."

Having Cheryl Ritter, a longtime member of the

guild, having the knowhow to make period costumes has been a help, according to Konen. He noted that no matter the time period, "she will make it happen."

To prepare for their roles, one of the first rehearsals involved learning the cockney British accent, which differs from the traditional accent heard today, Konen said.

"Cockney is notorious for being hard to understand," he said. "I've commented to a few different adults and a few different kids: 'Hey, I know what you're trying to say, but you're saying it so fast,' or 'You're dropping the "H"

because that's how the accent works, but you've got to really stretch out that word so we know what you're trying to say."

While there are a lot of moral points in "Oliver," Konen said he hopes that those will be secondary to the overall quality of the performance.

"I hope they can take away just the energy that these kids bring into the performance is pretty phenomenal, and I hope they can take away the joy that they have, even though it's a somewhat serious aspect to this show," Konen said.

extended periods of hot, dry weather. Soak the area under the tree's dripline when the top four to six inches of soil are crumbly and slightly moist. Provide 10 gallons of water per inch diameter of tree trunk measured at 4½ feet high.

Water early in the day, when possible, to reduce moisture loss to evaporation. Use soaker hoses and drip irrigation whenever possible. You'll use less water by applying it right to the soil where it is needed.

Check container gardens daily. Water thoroughly when the top inch

or two of soil is dry.

Take care of yourself when gardening especially during hot weather. Try to work in the garden when temperatures are cooler and in the shady spots in your landscape. Take frequent breaks and drink plenty of water.

Cover up your skin with brightly colored, loose-fitting clothing made of densely woven fabrics. Wear a broad-brimmed hat to protect your skin and UV-blocking sunglasses for the health of your eyes.

Apply a broad-spectrum UVA and UVB sunscreen with an SPF

of 15 or higher every day. Apply it 30 minutes before going outdoors and every two hours. You'll prevent sunburn and skin damage while making it easier to return to the garden each day.

With proper care, you and your plants will be better able to withstand the summer heat.

Menominee tribal member inducted into NAIA Hall of Fame

Askenette honored for 50-plus years in boxing ring

A Menominee tribal member who has dedicated more than 50 years of his life to the sport of boxing was among those inducted into the North American Indigenous Athletics Hall of Fame.

On June 7, former boxer, referee and coach Orin “Lou” Askenette was among 54 Indigenous athletes honored as the 2025 NAIA Hall of Fame inductees at a ceremony at the Oneida Hotel and Confer-

ence Center in Green Bay.

Askenette was a retired Oneida Nation security officer and former boxer, trainer, referee and coach.

“Lou was a legendary boxing coach whose dedication and ability shaped the careers of countless champions. With over 50 years in the sport, he has made an indelible mark on boxing,” according to the NAIA. “Lou’s work in molding and shaping fighters has helped them prepare for life responsibilities while building

careers promoting positive life skills. Lou has played a strong role in many lives, mentoring men and women warriors of Indian Country.” Askenette began his boxing career fighting on his father’s boxing team, the Menominee Indian Boxing Club. In 1959 in Fond du Lac, Askenette won the 135-pound championship. Two years later, in 1961, he won the open division tournament at Fond du Lac at 126 pounds.

At age 18, he joined the military and from 1963-67 he fought on the United States Air Force boxing team.

After his military career, he joined the

Wisconsin Boxing Referee Association, where he was a well-known boxing official. In 1973, he started his coaching career at the Oneida Boxing Club on the Oneida Indian Reservation in Wisconsin and was recruited by Chairman Purcell Powless. In 1977, he co-founded and coached the Soaring Eagles Boxing Club in Green Bay, and he continued recruiting and training amateur and professional boxing careers.

Askenette has coached and trained several fighters including Carlos Molina, Harry “The Hammer” Funmaker, Ernie “Big Cat” Stevens Jr., Roger Ponfil, Chuck Ponfil, Joey Christ-

john, Kelly Stevens, Paul “Bad Horse” Stevens, Matt Denny, DJ Denny, Tim Tomashek, Todd Moon Hill, Rory Hill, Mel Smith, Earl Smith, Paul Danforth, Buggs Danforth, John Maino and others.

The North American Indigenous Athletics Hall of Fame honors and recognizes the Indigenous sport cultures of 27 countries of North America by recognizing outstanding leadership and achievement in individual and team athletics. By honoring and celebrating the empowered journey of the annually inducted individuals and teams, the hope is their stories may inspire future

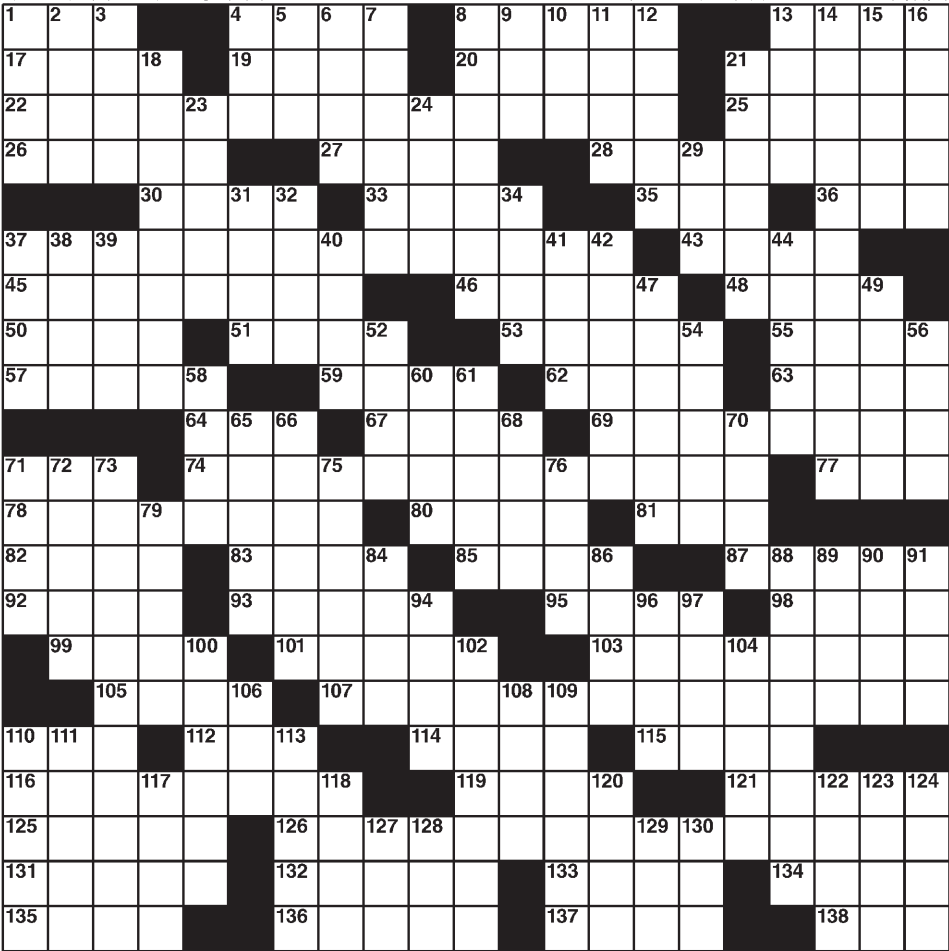

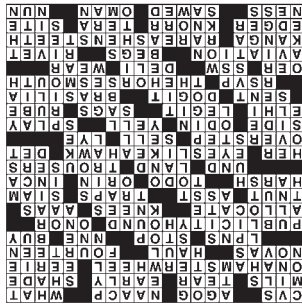

Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the Board of Review Clerk within the first 2 hours of the Board of Review's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the Board of Review may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session, or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. The Board of Review may require objections to the amount or valuation of property to be submitted on forms approved by the Wisconsin Department of Revenue, and the Board of Review shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. Persons who own land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land may object only to the valuation of that land or only to the valuation of improvements to that land. No person may be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the Board of Review in support of the objections and made full disclosure before the Board of Review, under oath, of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.

When appearing before the Board of Review, the objecting person shall specify, in writing, the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information used to arrive at that estimate.

No person may appear before the Board of Review, testify to the Board by telephone or object to a valuation; if that valuation was made by the Assessor or the Objector using the income method of valuation; unless the person supplies the Assessor all the information about income and expenses, as specified in the Assessor's manual under Sec. 73.03(2a) of Wis. Statutes, that the Assessor requests. The Village of Cecil has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the Assessor under this paragraph which provides exceptions for persons using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or the duties of their office or by order of a court. The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under Sec. 19.35(1) of Wis. Statutes.

The Board shall hear upon oath, by telephone, all ill or disabled persons who present to the Board a letter from a physician, physician assistant or advanced practice nurse prescriber certified under Wis. Stat 441.16(2) that confirms their illness or disability. No other persons may testify by telephone unless the Board of Review, in its discretion, has determined to grant a property owner's or their representative's request to testify under oath by telephone or written statement. No person may appear before the Board of Review, testify to the Board by telephone or contest the amount of the assessment unless, at least 48 hours before the first meeting of the Board or at least 48 hours before the objection is heard if the objection is allowed under Wis. Stat. 70.47(3)(a), that person provides notice to the Board of Review Clerk as to whether the person will ask for removal of any Board members and, if so, which member, and provides reasonable estimate of the length of time that the hearing will take. No person shall be allowed to appear before the Board of Review, to testify to the Board by telephone or to contest the amount of any assessment of real or personal property if the person has refused a reasonable written request by certified mail of the Assessor to enter onto property to conduct an exterior view of the real or personal property being assessed.
