Seymour man charged with reckless homicide
Town of Seneca crash happened when vehicle was more than 100 mph

A Seymour man could spend up to 60 years in prison after a car traveling at 100 mph crashed and killed a teen.
Collyn Jorgenson, 18, has been charged with first-degree reckless homicide, one count of first-degree reckless injury and one count of obstructing an officer for a crash occurring the evening of July 31.

According to the criminal complaint, Jorgenson and two passengers had been traveling to Antigo to pick up a friend from the Langlade County Jail. Reports showed that the vehicle was traveling at 100 mph when the crash happened, but it had been moving as fast as 120 mph at one time.

When the crash occurred, Jorgenson allegedly was driving a 2000 Toyota Camry along County Road D in the Town of Seneca. Diagrams that officers created indicated Jorgenson lost control when making a right turn near the County Road J intersection, left the roadway and struck a large rock. The vehicle rotated and struck another large rock, according to the complaint, and became airborne. Flying for about 150 feet, the vehicle landed on its roof, and all three people in the vehicle were ejected.

One passenger, a 14-year-old boy from the Seymour area, died from severe injuries as a result of the crash, according to the Shawano County Coroner's Office. The other teen passenger suffered a broken fibula and tibia, along with a gash on the left hand.

Jorgenson allegedly claimed he had a couple of beers that day but did not finish the second one because it became warm, according to the complaint. A blood draw was done four hours after the crash that showed his blood-alcohol level was 0.017% at the time; based on the average alcohol elimination rate, it's esti-

McLaughlin laid to rest 84 years later

A handful of family members were joined by a couple hundred Shawano residents Aug. 9 as they all paid their respects and said goodbye to a soldier killed at the start of World War II.

Shawano's Herbert E. McLaughlin, 31, was killed at Pearl Harbor. His remains were not identified until December 2024.

He was buried with full military honors in the veterans circle near the chapel at Woodlawn Cemetery. Dean Seher, McLaughlin's next of kin, said McLaughlin's mother, Mary, always wanted to be buried next to him. Today, they are just a few hundred feet apart.

Mary McLaughlin wrote countless letters asking officials to identify her son, so he could be brought home. She died in 1957, never getting that final closure.

Prior to the funeral, Seher stood at her grave.

"Look, Mary," he said. "Herbert is go-

ing to be right over there. You'll be with him again."

McLaughlin's body was brought into the cemetery on a horse-drawn cas-

sion, followed by a riderless horse. The horse carried an empty saddle with boots

Rodriguez on library fact-finding mission

Lt. governor concerned about loss of federal funds

Federal funds for libraries are expected to be slashed like many other programs, and that has Lt. Gov. Sara Rodriguez concerned.

Rodriguez went on a fact-finding mission Aug. 11 to the Gillett Public Library, and she spoke with Library Director Shannon Stoner and others about what the local library provides and what it needs to remain a vital community hub.

Rodriguez was amazed to find out how much the small library does for city residents and those living in the surrounding towns.

"They are truly part of the community hub," she said. "They do so much more than books. We were just going through this library, and they do programming for young adults. They do programming for seniors, for kids. They have a free pantry here that people can get food from if they need it. It's so important to make sure we're supporting our libraries."

A lot of the federal funding goes through the states in the form of grants. Stoner noted a lot of the library programming in Gillett is made possible through grants.

"If we do not get that federal funding that we are used to, that is going to curtail our ability on the state level to be able to support libraries like this," Rodriguez said.

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Rodriguez said she's worried about what will happen to libraries in small towns like Gillett. She noted that there's more funding in the 2025-27 state biennial budget to help libraries, but questions if that bump from the state will just be swallowed by the federal cuts.

"We need to talk to our federal representatives about how important it is to have funding and support for our community libraries," Rodriguez said.

The lieutenant governor's visit yielded a lot of information about how libraries make good use of the limited funding they have and how they're keeping up with technology. She noted that the federal government's thought that libraries don't need to be funded is a mistake.

"They were talking

about how individuals are coming in and wanting more large-print books, so they're ordering large-print books," Rodriguez said about her meeting with library representatives. "Kids are needing to learn more about STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) and trying to make sure that they're prepared for what's going to be happening in the future, so they're purchasing books about science and technology, and they're also doing programming about that."

The Gillett library is very responsive to the community, in Rodriguez's view.

"We want to make sure we're supporting them," she said.

Rodriguez noted that, when her children were younger, the family made

regular trips to the neighborhood library, because it was something for the family to do.

"It doesn't cost anything for families," Rodriguez said. "Libraries are the one place where people can congregate where they're not expected to pay, and that is such a unique part of the community. I loved taking my small kids there, and now they're a little bit older, 16 and 18, but I still make sure they realize how many resources are here in a library."

Stoner told Rodriguez about some of the adulting classes she holds for teens getting ready to go out into the world, and how she teaches things like budgeting and more.

"Talking about a resume, how do you apply for a job, how do you make a budget and how do you

balance a checkbook, so to speak?" Rodriguez said. "Those are really important skills for young adults, and the library is preparing them."

Rodriguez said she doesn't know why the federal government is cutting library funding and claimed the governor's office would be reaching out to find out more. However, she felt it was important to hit the road now and get information about what libraries are doing so she and Gov. Tony Evers can push back.

"It is really concerning to me that we are cutting services for everyday Wisconsinites," Rodriguez said. "That's going to hurt people particularly in smaller towns and areas like here. The cuts across the board at the federal government are very con-

cerning to me, and just one of those is for libraries. This is in service of tax cuts for very wealthy people. I would see that money go into the communities to support programs like this."

Stoner said the library provides a lot of outreach, including housing a food pantry and produce stand, hosting National Night Out and even providing an outlet each Halloween for exchanging costumes so they get more use.

The library also provides resources for those who are looking for jobs. Besides searching online via computers, there is a binder at the main desk where Gillett residents can look, not only within the city, but also neighboring Oconto Falls and Shawano County.

"We look for local jobs preferably for those who don't have cars," Stoner said. "Gillett is pretty small, so you can pretty much walk anywhere you want to work."

Stoner said the library grants from the state fund Libby, which provides access to e-books and audiobooks online, as well as the inter-library loan program that allows Gillett patrons to borrow books from other libraries without having to go to those libraries. She said she worries about what would happen if that funding were to go away.

"That's really important to us to provide services and provide materials for people," Stoner said. "Now I'm getting ready for budget for 2026, so if something has to be cut, I will have to cut it from somewhere in the budget. I'm going to do everything I can — fundraising, anything — in order to provide for my community."

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Changes finally coming for ATV/UTV drivers

Law will require driver's license, ban open alcohol containers

Drivers of ATVs and UTVs who use Shawano County roadways will soon have a new set of rules to follow.

After months of work,

the highway and parks committee adopted the changes Aug. 5, and the public safety committee followed Aug. 6, with the county board expected to adopt the new ordinance Aug. 20.

"Persons 16 years of age or older must possess a valid driver's license to operate an ATV or UTV on a county highway," Shawano County Sheriff George Lenzner said.

The driver must also have the license with him

or her while driving on county roads.

"No person under 16 years of age may operate an ATV on a designated county route unless he or she is accompanied by his or her parent or guardian," Lenzner said.

The law already requires UTV drivers to be at least 16 to drive on roads. The minimum age is 12 for ATVs, according to the Department of Natural Resources' laws.

"Open containers of al-

coholic beverages or other intoxicants are prohibited for ATV operators or passengers while operating on any ATV/UTV designated route within Shawano County," Lenzner said.

The changes are being made in response to documented safety concerns and incidents involving ATV/UTV use.

"These are the routes on the roadways," the sheriff said. "They are not going to affect anything on a trail."

The ordinance notes that a golf cart is not an ATV or UTV, and the operation of golf carts on county roads continues to be prohibited.

Existing enforcement and penalty provisions contained in the existing law are also in need of updating.

Fines will vary from \$25 to \$500 plus court costs. Lenzner said that means a \$25 fine will be about \$200, and a \$500 fine will cost nearly \$1,000.

Lenzner said deputies would not immediately begin to cite drivers once the ordinance gets final approval.

"We want to use these first few months to educate the public," he said. "I don't want to go out and start issuing citations the day after it's passed."

The city of Shawano is expected to adopt a similar ordinance for ATV/UTV drivers on city streets.

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Women Who Care give over \$300K to nonprofits

Donations stay local to help groups in Shawano County

Jeannie Otto, who founded the 100+ Women Who Care chapter of Shawano County, was caught on a hot mic proclaiming “We have no money.”

Otto was referring to money to operate the organization itself. Money goes directly from more than 120 women to whichever nonprofit organization moves the group more. On Aug. 6, the Women Who Care surpassed the \$300,000 mark when they gave more than \$12,000 to the Shawano County Humane Society to help with operations and caring for the dogs and cats in their care.

The actual total of giving is \$303,700.

With most of the women wearing various shades of pink, they listened to presentations from the humane society, along with Bridge the Gap and Leadership Shawano County, and then cast secret ballots to determine who should receive the latest pot of money. The Women Who Care have vetted almost 40 nonprofit organizations in the county, and the three who presented were among the last who had not received any funding from the group.

As an added boost, many of the more recent recipients also get an additional \$5,000 from the Richard Schulze Foundation, based in Minnesota. Once the nonprofit is selected for the

women's money, the founders of the local chapter apply to the foundation to get the grant. According to Otto, who started the group

six years ago in Shawano, only one nonprofit has not received the extra funding since Women Who Care started applying.

“Now, it's about a \$17,000 (total) opportunity for our nonprofits,” Otto said. “I basically take about five minutes to apply for

this grant, and they've just about matched every single nonprofit that I submitted.”

Giving to the community is a primary motivator, but Otto noted the meetings give the women a chance to socialize and learn.

“This gives them an opportunity to be a part of something bigger than themselves instead of just giving individually,” she said. “Giving as a group helps to make friends in the community and understanding the needs of our community. It's just a lot of fun. People love coming out and having fun.”

Although it started with each member writing out a check for \$100, modern amenities have made it easier to give. Otto said there is an online app called Grapevine where women can donate with

the click of a button. “They don't even have to bring their checks anymore,” Otto said. “It just comes off of their credit card or their checking account, and it's done before they even get here. It's super easy.”

The giving comes easily to the women who meet on a quarterly basis at Stubborn Brothers Brewing Company. Lois Aumann is one of the women who started with the group and is eager to give up \$100 every three months if it helps people in Shawano County.

“It sounded like a nice thing to do,” Aumann said. “It was a way to make money for our charities in Shawano.”

Elsie Greenhill had previously heard of the Women Who Care program, so it was a no-brainer when she learned that Otto was trying to gather women locally to do the same thing.

“We had heard of 100+ Women in other communities, and we were glad that they were starting one here,” Greenhill said.

Reaching the \$300,000 threshold made it all the sweeter for the women to realize what a group of generous people can do.

“It's awesome, and it's nice that it stays in Shawano County,” Greenhill said. “I've met some lovely ladies in the organization, and I think we're all on the same mission — funding in nice, big chunks instead of little pieces.”

Aumann agreed. “It's just nice to know that we can make that big of a difference with such little effort as far as donating the money and learning about all the things that they do in the area,” she said.

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Tracy Bahr plea on 100 charges delayed once again

Disagreement on time to be served sticking point

A difference of opinion on time to be served and an absent assistant district attorney delayed the plea and sentencing for Tracy Bahr, who currently has 100 charges levied against him in Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court.

Bahr was expected to give a guilty plea Aug. 8, but the specifics of the deal came at the 11th hour, and there was a disagreement for the length of the prison sentence, according to defense attorney Christopher Froehlich. It normally could be resolved between the two sides, but Assistant District Attorney

Brent Debord was present on behalf of Laura Nelson, the ADA in charge of the case, and he told the court he was not comfortable making concessions on her behalf.

Bahr appeared remotely, explaining that he's currently receiving chemotherapy for bone cancer. He indicated he will be appearing remotely for the next plea and sentencing hearing, scheduled for 3:30 p.m. Sept. 16 in Branch II of the Shawano County Courthouse.

Shawano-Menominee Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. said he understands the situation but indicated he wants to see some forward momentum on a case that's been in the system for three years and has been subjected to many delays.

In the latest case, Bahr is facing one count of failure

to comply with an officer's attempt to take a person into custody, nine counts of possessing a firearm by a convicted felon, one count of possession of methamphetamine, one count of possession of THC greater than 1,000 grams with intent, 22 felony counts of bail jumping, one misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer, three misdemeanor counts of possession of drug paraphernalia and seven misdemeanor counts of bail jumping.

According to the criminal complaint, on Aug. 4, 2022, at 7:35 a.m., a Shawano County sheriff's deputy responded to a complaint in the Town of Angelica, where Bahr was allegedly contacted by another deputy, as he was allegedly washing a piece of equipment in the driveway. Eight minutes later, Bahr allegedly

fled from the residence on a three-wheeled ATV. While searching, another deputy allegedly found one firearm in a vehicle at the residence.

When law enforcement asked residents if they have seen Bahr, one neighbor allegedly said that they saw Bahr leaving a field edge on County Road S with a shotgun across his lap, according to the complaint.

Before noon that day, Bahr's mother was leaving to the residence where Bahr was spotted. She allegedly told law enforcement, according to the complaint, that Bahr told her he planned to commit suicide, or was going to “shoot it out with the cops.” She then allegedly gave law enforcement two spots where Bahr could be.

On Aug. 7, Bahr was located and brought into custody at Motel 6 in Green

Bay. When searching Bahr's residence, deputies found seven firearms, one box of meth smoking drug paraphernalia with two digital scales, THC drug paraphernalia, 667.8 grams of THC, four Mason jars with green, leafy substances, a plastic gallon-sized bag with a green, leafy substance, aluminum foil with several cut straws and six shotgun shells that were on a sling.

According to Wisconsin Circuit Court Access, Bahr has six other open cases in Shawano County, with the first coming from October 2020. The first case is a misdemeanor disorderly conduct with a domestic abuse repeater.

Things accelerated from there when, in December 2021, Bahr was charged with intimidating a victim with the threat of force with a domestic abuse repeater, along with another

disorderly conduct charge and two bail jumping charges. A second case in that year involves another charge of intimidation, as well as battery and disorderly conduct charges and four more bail jumping charges. Another disorderly conduct charge and two more bail jumping charges are included in a third case.

In January 2022, Bahr was charged with nine counts of second-degree recklessly endangering safety, three counts of resisting an officer, three counts of hit and run, and 12 counts of bail jumping. In February 2022, Bahr was charged with theft of movable property, criminal damage to property, six counts of felony bail jumping and five counts of misdemeanor bail jumping.

DNR seeking comments for Lake Michigan Coastal master plan

Initial public comment period open through mid-September

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is seeking public comment on the future management of department properties in the Central Lake Michigan Coastal Region.

A regional master plan establishes the levels and types of resource management and public use permitted on DNR-managed properties. Under the regional master planning process, DNR staff will develop a plan for department properties located within the region.

The Central Lake Michigan Coastal Region includes portions of the following 13 counties: Brown, Calumet, Door, Kewaunee, Manitowoc, Milwaukee, Oconto, Outagamie, Ozaukee, Shawano, Sheboygan, Waupaca and Winnebago.

DNR properties in the region include fishery areas, natural areas, parks, wildlife areas and various other types of properties. This regional plan includes properties such as Collins Marsh Wildlife Area, Harrington Beach State Park, Kohler-Andrae State Park, Navarino Wildlife Area and Point Beach State Forest.

DNR-managed properties in this region will have new management plans developed as part of this planning process. The

DNR will evaluate whether any updates need to be made to existing plans and include any necessary updates as part of the overall regional plan.

Karcz farms to unite for common license

Permit seeks OK for up to 2,501 animal units

A pair of Karcz family farms are expected to merge for a common livestock facility license and then double the number of cows raised on the two homesteads.

That was the proposal put forth at a Shawano County Land Conservation Department public informational meeting held Aug. 4 in Pulaski.

Karcz Nation, N3035 Willow Road, and Heifer Nation, W1455 Town Hall Drive, are operated by Dillon and Jacob Karcz. Both farms are in the Town of Angelica.

Karcz Nation currently has about 700 milking and dry cows, or 980 animal units. Heifer Nation has 100 springing heifers and 50 calves, or 120 animal units. This application would place both farms under a single livestock facility license and expand to 2,501 animal units.

The application also includes an odor management plan, a waste and nutrient management plan, a runoff management plan, an employee training plan, and an environmental incident and emergency response plan.

Several comments, concerns and questions from neighbors and others were aired at the meeting.

They included the amount of well water being pumped and utilized by the farm, soil erosion and runoff at the two farm sites, and safety on roads with semi-truck activity by the farms’ hired manure hauler.

There was a positive comment about the farm and their employees respecting their neighbors by their safe use of the roads.

Scott Frank, county conservationist, said the proposal met all the requirements in the livestock facility licensing ordinance.

The number of animals constituting an animal unit varies by species. For example, one milking dairy cow equals 1.4 animal units, while a beef animal more than 600 pounds equals one animal

unit.

Under the proposal, the two farms would house 1,500 milking and dry cows; at 1.4 animal units per cow, that equals 2,100 animal units.

Heifers between 800 and 1,200 pounds each equal 1.1 animal units, so 116 heifers will equal 128 animal units. Heifers that weight 400-800 pounds equal 0.6 animal units, so the 342 heifers equal 205 animal units. Finally, the 342 calves (up to 400 pounds each) are 0.2 animal units each, for a total of 68 animal units.

This brings the total to 2,300 cows.

Currently, Karcz Nation has 980 animal units. Under the new plan, it will be home to 2,100 animal units, all of the milking and dry cows.

Heifer Nation currently has 98 animal units. The proposal will have the farm home to 401 animal units, all of them heifers and calves.

Karcz Nation was originally granted a livestock facility license for 986 animal units Oct. 6, 2021.

The farm conducts livestock activities at the two production sites.

The plan proposes new construction at Karcz Nation, including adding 90 feet to the east end of one freestall barn and adding 200 feet to the east end of a second freestall barn.

New construction at Heifer Nation includes building a new freestall barn and associated waste transfer system. An existing barn and waste transfer facility at the site would be abandoned.

Frank said Shawano County currently has about 20 farms of 500 cows or more. The sizes range from 880 to 14,515 animal units.

Written comments on the application will be accepted by Frank’s office until Aug. 14.

“A decision is required within 90 days after the LCD gives notice that the application is complete, which would be by Oct. 15,” Frank said. “These decisions are typically made within a couple weeks after the comment period, and as of now I am expecting it to be a similar time frame.”

The last request was by Krueger Dairy, west of Shawano, in March. That application was approved April 3.

Dispatch staffing improving for Shawano

Vacancies persist, but strong candidates in wings

There might be a light at the end of the tunnel for the Shawano County Dispatch Center. At least a little light.

While there still remain four vacancies among 16 positions, Kasey Cross, communications supervisor, told the public safety committee Aug. 6 that a new dispatcher will start Aug. 11, training on the night shift.

However, a full-time employee is resigning effective Aug. 24 for a position with the Menominee Tribal Rescue Service.

Interviews were held July 30 with many strong candidates, and another 11 are set to be interviewed soon. Three dispatchers are currently in training.

"Right now, we're kind of at a standstill, because onboarding is being held up for our training to get done, so I have trainers," Cross said.

To help retain employees, Cross is working with Julie Hasser, human resources manager, to add a supervisory layer in the department to mirror what is done with patrol deputies and correctional officers, and to offer some upward mobility within the department.

"I'm hoping to keep them engaged and want to stay here with us for a potential for advancement," Cross said.

Pay raises for supervisors would be paid for through the vacancies at the department, including the 16th position Cross is willing to give up completely.

"We want to give up the 16th position in dispatch and the extra position in the jail," Sheriff George Lenzner said. "We're going to ask for weekend premium with money we're saving from those positions."

"Our biggest hurdle has been to retain employees. They are leaving for other counties."

All county department heads are meeting with the county executive committee to make their case for their 2026 budget requests.

Ty Raddant, chief deputy, echoed the comments about staff.

"In the last five years, we hired 19 people," he said. "Ten have been local, and nine have been from the outside."

Of the 10 local candidates, five were let go when they failed the training. Four of the other five left on their own for various reasons.

"If we haven't got to the point where we pretty

much drained our resources locally, we're getting close to it," he said.

Lenzner said the newest dispatcher was offered a job with Brown County that was willing to pay \$2.50 per hour more, not counting a shift differential or weekend premium pay.

All Oconto County dispatchers and corrections officers are paid an additional \$2 per hour hazard pay, plus night shift differential and weekend premiums.

Some executive committee members have consistently opposed a shift differential or weekend premium for the sheriff's department, because they said all other department heads would want the same, and the county cannot afford that.

Hasser and sheriff's department officials met with all the department heads recently. She said they were all supportive of the extra pay for the sheriff's department, because they understand it's a 24/7 job.

Other department employees are paid overtime if they work weekends.

"The other department heads were really supportive of these changes," she said.

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Highway 29 improvement project now underway

It may be August and some may consider summer to be winding down, but road construction season is still in full swing. The newest project is improvements on state Highway 29 westbound from state Highway 22 east to the Wolf River on the Highway 29 westbound exit ramp to Highway 22 in the towns of Belle Plaine and Waukechon. Silty, sandy soils below the roadway pavement section and the lack of an effective drainage system

to remove surface water from the roadway sub-soils are causing distress to the overlying concrete pavement and to the Wolf River bridge embankment, officials with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation said. Motorists can expect single-lane traffic on the eastbound side of Highway 29 from Rose Brook Road east to just west of the County Road K interchange while work proceeds on the westbound lanes. A temporary speed reduction from 65 mph to 55 mph will take place within the eastbound

two-way traffic area. In addition, the Highway 29 westbound exit ramp to Highway 22 will be closed during the duration of the project to allow an access route to the underside of the Wolf River structure as well as for ramp repairs. Detours for Highway 29 westbound traffic to access Highway 22 will be as follows:

- Traffic on Highway 29 westbound wanting to proceed north on Highway 22 will be detoured on state Highway 55 north to state Highway 55/22.
- Traffic on Highway

29 westbound wanting to proceed south on Highway 22 will be detoured north on Highway 55, west on Highway 55/22, then south on Highway 22. Construction was set to begin Aug. 11 and will wrap up by late October, contingent on weather and construction progress. Relyco Plus, LLC will lead the project, which includes grading, drainage improvements and concrete pavement repairs. Woodland Bowl goes digital for Menominee video game

'Powwow Bound' teaches players about Menominee culture and traditions

Any teacher struggling to find resources that fit Act 31 (American Indian Studies in Wisconsin), there's something new to be added to the list.

PBS Wisconsin and Nebraska Public Media have recently launched "Powwow Bound: A Menominee Homecoming," a 3-D narrative-driven adventure game sponsored by Vision Maker Media, with one of the creators, Jacob Schwitzer, being a Menominee first descendant now working in Lincoln, Nebraska, as a game producer and developer.

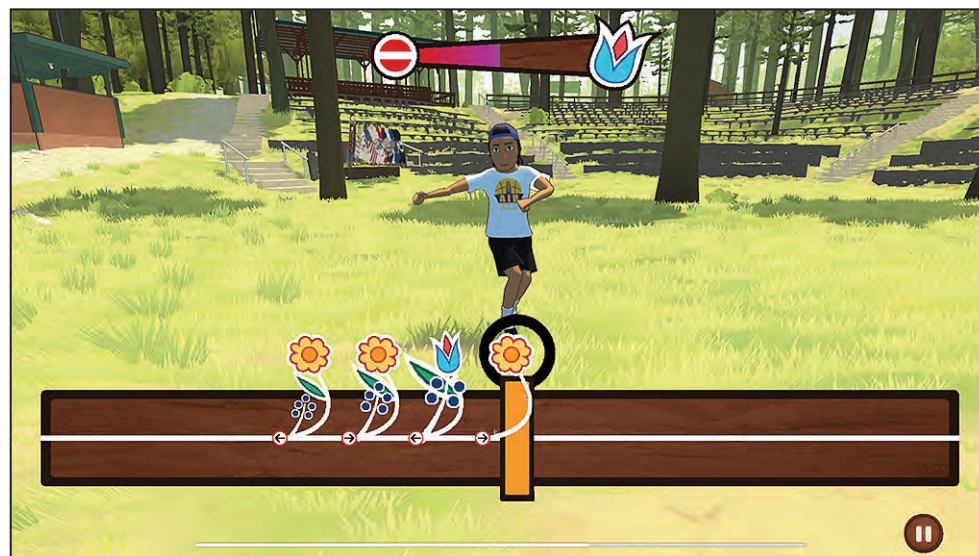
The game is set on the Menominee Reservation, and players get to be Deborah Jo (D.J.), a teen who returns home and is working to reconnect with her Menominee roots. The family is preparing for a special dance for her deceased grandfather, and work is being done to get D.J.'s mother to rejoin the dance circle.

"For the last few years, we have been exploring video games as a new form of media," Schwitzer said. "My mom said, 'Hey, if you ever want to do a video game about your tribe, we can look into doing that.'"

He noted that his mother, Lela Schwitzer, who works for the Bonduel School District, told him that finding resources that fit the requirements of Act 31, which requires schools to teach about the Indigenous tribes of Wisconsin, can be difficult, so Jacob Schwitzer started looking into the possibility of teaching about the Menominee through the lens of a powwow.

"I wanted to create something that taught about the Menominee culture in a modern setting through an interactive media," Schwitzer said. "That was the genesis of it all."

Schwitzer was able to tap into his childhood recollections of going to powwows in Keshena to add a little personal

touch to the game. PBS and NPM also worked with local Menominee to provide voices for the game with the help of the College of Menominee Nation.

"It's like our county fair," Schwitzer said about the tribal powwows. "It's like our homecoming for a lot of folks, so it really has a lot of cultural and familial moments tied to it. The idea of focusing on the powwow came more from the sense of people coming home, and that sense of homecoming that comes with it."

He added that, living in Nebraska, he occasionally feels homesick, so he can relate to D.J.

Schwitzer said it was important to have a Menominee character come from an urban environment to the rural tribal lands, as many who are raised off the reservation do not always have the full grasp of their cultural traditions. D.J. gets to learn with the players.

The game has taken almost three years to be completed, according to Schwitzer. Production of the game started near the end of 2022.

Being an Indigenous voice for "Powwow Bound" is important to Schwitzer. However, he knew other voices had to be included on the project for it to be culturally sensitive and relevant.

"Indigenous games should be told with

Indigenous input," Schwitzer said. "Even though I am a first descendant Menominee and our writer is enrolled, we can't speak for the whole tribe. For this game, we brought on a lot of community advisors and worked with the community to develop this game and make sure that it was a conglomeration of many Indigenous perspectives and attempted to capture the general sense of the tribe and the culture."

Authenticity was something that writer Justin Eagle Gauthier, a Menominee now living in Oregon, also wanted to be sure was part of the game, so that players can learn about Menominee culture and traditions.

"The team has been very intentional in how the story, characters and world are portrayed to a larger gaming public," he said. "At its core, this approach has involved many members of the Menominee community representing an array of experiences and belonging to that community."

The game made its debut Aug. 1-3 in Keshena during the Menominee Nation Contest Powwow. Angelina Shi, an interactive media producer with PBS Wisconsin, was Schwitzer's partner on the project and said she was delighted to see

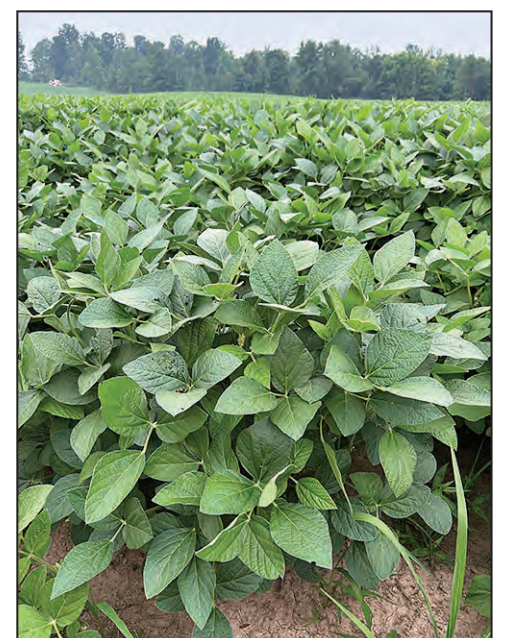
Back to our county road musings.

Switching up waffle recipe gets mixed reviews at home

National Waffle Day is Aug. 24.

There are many different kinds of waffles, different add-ins and different recipes. Waffles are pretty popular in my family; we have them almost every Sunday. However, we usually just use Mom's pancake recipe, in waffle shape. Most of the time, they turn out just fine.

I was curious about trying a real waffle recipe though, so I found one in an old cookbook and gave it a try. I forgot to add the family favorites though, almond and vanilla extract, so I got some flak from the family.

"There is no flavor," said my sister.

I thought the waffles tasted pretty good. In all subsequent attempts, I was careful to add the extracts. I don't really measure the extracts; I just add a splash of each.

Most waffle recipes call for the eggs to be separated, with the yolks mixed into the batter, and the stiffly beaten egg whites to be folded in last. I'm not exactly sure

why this is so, but I still do it. Also, it is not necessary to smooth out the batter in the waffle iron, but I think it cooks better if you do.

My favorite toppings for these waffles are butter, blueberry pie filling and whipped cream. Of course, butter is not nec-

essary, but I like how the salt in the butter cuts the sweetness of the toppings. Any toppings will work with these waffles; experiment with what you like, and you will figure out what you like the best.

I found this coffee cake recipe in the Farm Show magazine my dad gets. The "quick" part of the recipe attracted me, and I decided to give it a shot. I regretted it pretty quick. This recipe was very confusing.

It instructed me to "cream the butter with the dry ingredients." I have never, ever seen this in all of my years of baking. So, I ignored that direction, and creamed the butter and brown sugar before I added the flour and cinnamon. The other confusing thing was the pan size. The recipe simply stated "pan," so I used a square pan, and I think it turned out just fine.

Aside from that, I was pleasantly surprised when the baking time turned out to be nearly spot-on. This recipe is really quick, which is perfect for when you need a quick addition to breakfast.

To make a 1/2 cup of sour milk, add 1/2 tablespoon of lemon juice or white vinegar to 1/2 cup of milk.

QUICK COFFEE CAKE

1/3 cup butter
1 1/4 cups flour
1/2 cup sour milk
3/4 cup brown sugar
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 tsp. baking soda

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Butter and flour a 9-inch square pan. Cream the butter and brown sugar. Add the flour and cinnamon and mix well. The mixture should look like a bowl of crumbs. Add the baking soda to the sour milk; give it a quick stir. Pour into the brown sugar mixture. Stir quickly until almost completely mixed, then finish by folding the batter over a few times with a rubber spatula. Pour into prepared pan; level with a spatula. Sprinkle with a mixture of butter, brown sugar, cinnamon, and flour. Bake for about 25 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.

WAFFLES

1 3/4 cups flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1 cup milk
3 tsp. baking powder
3 tbsp. melted butter
2 eggs, separated

Melt the butter; set aside. Mix and sift the dry ingredients. Mix the egg yolks with the milk; add the slightly cooled butter. Beat the egg whites until stiff peaks form. Add the egg yolk mixture to the dry ingredients and mix well. Fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites. Grease a hot waffle iron. Pour in about a 1/3 cup of batter, spreading slightly if necessary. Bake until golden. Serve with desired toppings.

We also have been known to intensely discuss wildlife.

"See those fawns? Are they ever little. She must have had them late."

"There's some deer way back near that woods, in the field. Must be bad weather coming."

Deer can give us a more accurate forecast than a weatherman. When we spot them out eating during the day, they're filling up so they can hunker down — knowing instinctively there's a storm brewing.

"What's that? Is that a bear?"

Slowly traversing on back county roads with lots of woods, I rubberneck out the window something fierce, trying to spot a bear. Safely tucked in our side-by-side, I'd love to see one in the wild. I notice large uprooted tree roots and many rocks looking suspiciously like a rotund bear, but alas, I've never actually spotted one.

One day while on my daily walk down our lane — which clears my mind and sets my endorphins in proper order — I noticed a pile of scat. The "present" told me in no uncertain terms that a bear had been there and done that.

Walking between two cornfields with stalks towering makes me feel very small and, if you want to know the truth, rather vulnerable. Setting my podcasts on full volume, I also hoot a bit along the way. I don't want to startle one, I want to let him know I'm coming so he runs away.

When I was a little kid I had a recurring nightmare where a bear was chasing me round and round our empty barn. Going in and through the vacant stanchions, I was always just one or two steps ahead of it and would awaken in a cold sweat. My fascination of (or rather, fear of) bear has been with me for years.

Along our county drives,

I do also notice landscaping. Many places have beautifully kept lawns and gardens and flowers galore. Everything is lush and green. A few places, though are unkempt and look forlorn.

My sister brought this thought to my attention, "Maybe the people who live there can't keep up with it."

Very good perspective.

There's been just about perfect weather for growing just about everything — heat and moisture. Years ago, an old-time farmer once told me, "You can hear the corn growing in this weather," referring to hot and humid conditions.

The garden is taking off, and we've been eating and giving surplus of spinach and cucumbers away. I've been vacuum-sealing green beans for a few days. While not quite ready to eat, the garden corn is the tallest I've ever seen it.

Peering at a stalk of corn, I marvel. Each stalk produces about two or three cobs. Tucked inside those cobs are rows and rows of kernels stacked in military precision. Each kernel has the capacity to produce another stalk of corn. It's marvelous when you really ponder it — it truly is. Such a provisional Father.

We've had beautiful weather conducive to growing food and enjoying nature at its finest. I'd like to bottle this stuff and haul it out come mid-January.

so many children giving the game a try.

"I was very happy with the reception at the powwow," Shi said. "We had a fairly continuous stream of mostly kids come by and play the game on those three days. We had kids stop by multiple times during the powwow to play and kids bringing their friends. That was nice to see."

Shi said that it was a natural merging for PBS Wisconsin to work on the Menominee video game, although she noted it was an ambitious project for public media to undertake.

"What we ended doing over here at PBS Wisconsin was we contributed to the art direction as well as a lot of the UI (user interface) design, as well as the play-testing and promotion of the game," Shi said. "In terms of play-testing, that would be essentially putting earlier versions of the game out in front of people, trying it out and telling us what does and doesn't work."

"Powwow Bound" was considered an ambitious project because the video game realm differs from what is produced for television, according to Shi.

"It also involved a lot of folks on both sides together and contributing to what is a fairly accurate 3-D representation of people in the local area," she said. "That took quite a few people. There were a ton of assets created in terms of 3-D models."

Mild winters mean plenty of fall venison

The abundance of deer in our little northeast section of hunting paradise is obvious to those of us who travel daily through Shawano, Waupaca, Oconto and other counties abounding with bounding bucks and does.

As regular readers of my column already know, one of those bouncing brown devils found my front bumper last month in the middle of a four-lane highway and his 100-pound frame demolished my 4,000-pound mini-van. RIP, Honda Odyssey. You were a great machine.

As for the deer, she continued across the road and into a deep, grassy ravine. Although I doubt she survived the crash, she could have run a half-mile. Or maybe she's still alive. But the roadside carcasses tell the story of a habitat with far too many deer. And we deer hunters aim to do something about it starting in September.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has biologists who dedicate their careers to studying deer and other critters. Sure, we sometimes doubt their words when we don't see anything during a brief sit on a deerstand for a few hours opening weekend, but the visible browse line in the woods and pastures teeming with deer from early spring through fall tell another story.

Back-to-back mild winters have helped most does drop two or three fawns and boosted the survival rate of both young and adult deer. Local hunters like Jim Schoenike, of Pella, are also seeing ample deer for hunting, both in person and on trail cameras. Schoenike has produced a calendar for years that uses trail camera photos from dozens of cams he places around his own 400 acres of farmland and woods in Shawano and Waupaca counties.

"The 2025 deer season

is looking up," said Schoenike, president of Clintonville Bow Hunters and an accomplished bowhunter, with about 30 deer under his belt since he shot his first deer in the Pella Swamp at age 13. "Deer populations seem high, and I have seen many fawns and family groups in Waupaca and Shawano counties. The buck-to-doe ratio seems high in this area."

DNR deer specialist Jeff Pritzl compiled a detailed look at the statewide deer population, new deer management units (marking a return to numbered zones within some counties) and regional forecasts. To see the full report, visit <https://widnr.widenet/s/jw98q65tgf/2025->

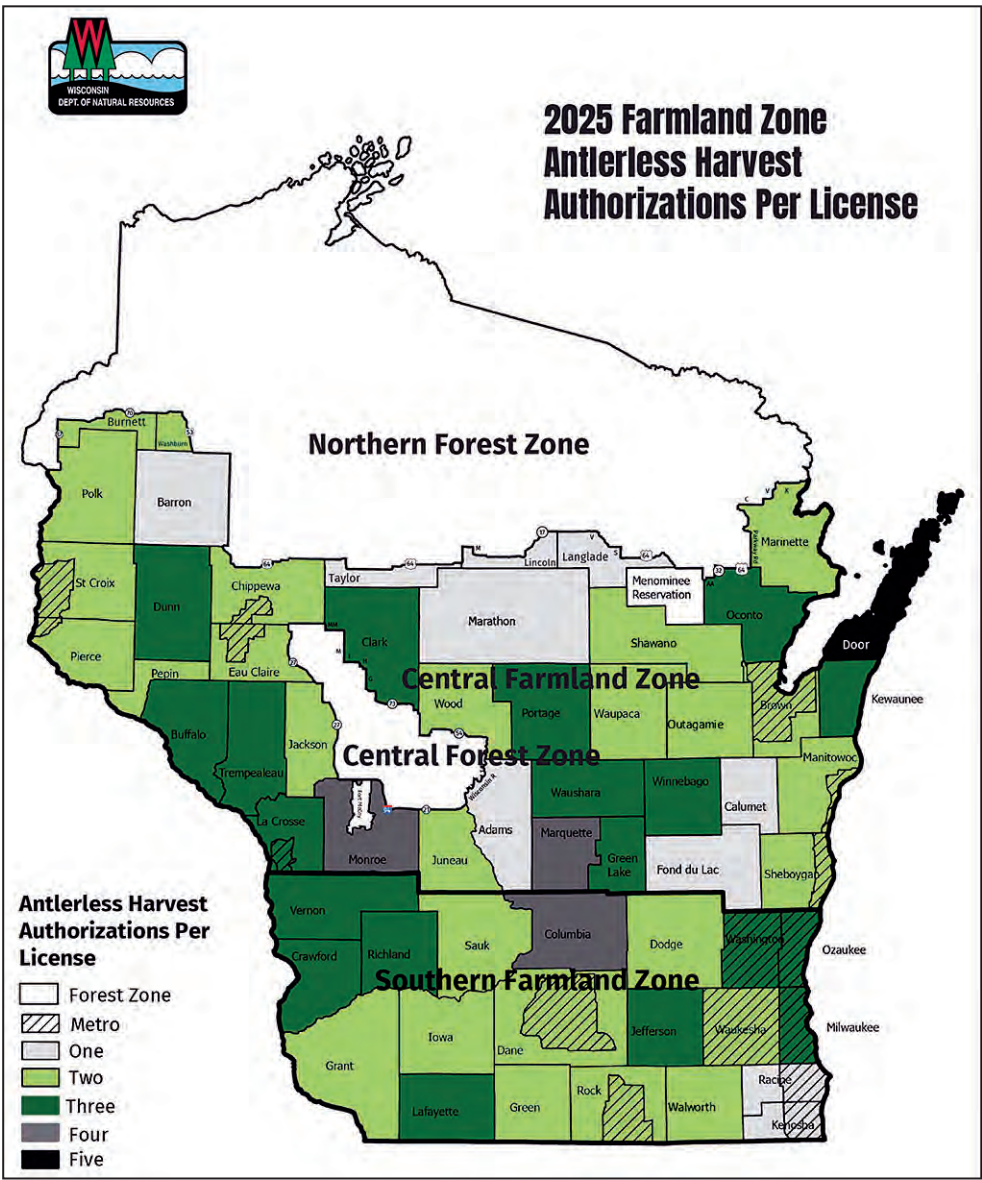

A total of 44 counties will have an antlerless-only Holiday Hunt Dec. 24 through Jan. 1, including Shawano, Oconto and Outagamie counties. Of those 44, 37 counties will also extend the archery deer season from the normal Jan. 4 closure to Jan. 31. Waupaca County's Deer Advisory Council is the only one in our region to reject both. Shawano, Waupaca and Outagamie counties will provide two antlerless deer tags per gun and archery buck tag, while Oconto County will provide three for each gun and archery buck tag.

A portion of Oconto County is now part of the new numbered zones, with bonus antlerless tags available there but not included in the free bonus antlerless tags.

DNR wildlife biologist Steve Burns offered his insights into the hunting prospects for our area.

"Deer hunters through-

out the Northeast District have reason to be optimistic about the 2025 hunting season," he said. "For the second year in a row, the district experienced a mild winter, setting the stage for high winter survival and reproductive rates. Last year, six counties in our district had the highest buck harvest ever since 1980. However, only one county's antlerless harvest ranked in the top 10 over that same period. This likely reflects an abundant huntable population but less willingness to harvest antlerless deer when bucks are so available."

Harvest overall last year was above the five-year average in the Central Farmland zone and

should equal or surpass that this year, depending on the timing of crop harvest, weather and, of course, hunter efforts, he noted.

The archery (bow and crossbow) season opens Sept. 13 and ends on Jan. 4 in counties without the extended bow season. The youth firearm season (bows and crossbows also legal) is Oct. 11-12. The nine-day gun deer season is Nov. 22-30, the muzzle-loader deer season is Dec. 1-10, and the statewide antlerless deer season is Dec. 11-14. The gun deer hunt for the disabled is Oct. 4-12.

If you need bonus antlerless deer tags to hunt does in another county or your current county, they

go on sale beginning Aug. 18 (for Northern and Central Forest zones), Aug. 19 (Central Farmland zone) and Aug. 20 (Southern Farmland zone). Remaining tags will be sold Aug. 21 and after.

Don't forget that you must register your deer online or by phone no later than 5 p.m. the day after you harvest your deer. The online site is gamereg.wi.gov and the phone number is 844-426-3734. You will be given a 10-digit registration number to confirm that your deer has been legally registered.

reversed in the stirrups. This symbolizes that the fallen individual will never ride again and represents a final farewell.

As the gathering stood silent, the riderless horse neighed loudly as it walked into the cemetery — the only sound heard in addition to the veterans’ and Reserve members’ shoes as they marched on the pavement.

Dozens of Shawano veterans were joined by members of the Rolling Thunder, the motorcycle group that provided an escort for McLaughlin from Milwaukee to Shawano. A few veterans also volunteered to stand guard by the casket during the few days it was at Swedberg Funeral Home.

Members of the 432nd Civil Affairs Battalion served as pallbearers. One soldier also provided the eulogy. Capt. Garrett

Johnson and Chief Warrant Officer Kenneth Fabis presented flags to family members.

Seher was accompanied by his wife, Kimberley, and daughter, Veronica. They were also joined by Dan Steckbauer, the significant other of Susan Swinick — Seher’s cousin. It was Swinick’s DNA that was used to identify McLaughlin’s remains.

“In 1947, when they first exhumed the unknowns killed at Pearl Harbor, they thought they had identified Herbert,” Seher said. “The dental records didn’t match. Apparently, he had some work done that wasn’t in the records, so he remained an unknown.”

A 21-gun salute was provided by an honor guard, and taps was played at the end of the graveside service.

McLaughlin brothers motivated by death to WWII service

One signed with the FBI, other with Navy Reserve

The death of Herbert McLaughlin at Pearl Harbor spurred local VFW members to name their post after him — the Herbert E. McLaughlin VFW Post 2723.

Even before that, his death motivated his two older brothers to want to join the fight against the Axis powers of World War II.

Dean Seher, Herbert McLaughlin’s great-nephew, recently told their story to members of the VFW post.

Herbert McLaughlin was the youngest of three brothers.

“My grandfather, William McLaughlin, was the oldest. Horace McLaughlin was the middle brother,” Seher said. “Both of the brothers, upon Herbert being killed at Pearl Harbor, wanted to serve their

country.”

Herbert McLaughlin was 31 when he was killed. His brothers were several years older.

“My grandfather ... tried to enlist in the Army Air Corps, because he was a trained pilot,” Seher said. “They rejected him, because he was over the age of enlistment, and on top of it, he worked in a vital war industry — he worked in the furniture manufacturing business.”

William McLaughlin tried again.

“He went to the Navy, and the Navy turned him down,” Seher said. “He went to the Marines; the Marines turned him down. He finally went to the Naval Reserves, and the Reserves accepted him. That would have been sometime in late 1942.”

So, at the age of 42 or 43, William McLaughlin went through boot camp.

“He ... ended up serv-

ing on a destroyer escort called USS Haverfield during the war,” Seher said. “He ended up serving as the executive officer, and he spent the last 2 1/2 years of the war going back and forth across the Atlantic fighting off U-Boats and helping get munitions and materials to Europe.”

Coincidentally, the USS

Haverfield was named for James W. Haverfield, of Ohio. He had joined the Naval Reserve as an apprentice seaman Sept. 11, 1940.

Haverfield’s first assignment was aboard the battleship USS Arizona, stationed at Pearl Harbor. He was killed aboard the ship during the Dec. 7, 1941, attack by the Japa-

nese, the same attack that killed Herbert McLaughlin.

“The middle brother, Horace, was in law school at the time, and joined the FBI,” Seher said. “He became a spy hunter. He was on part of the team ... that tracked down the Nazi saboteurs that were landed by U-Boats on the East Coast.”

The most well-known instance of U.S. agents apprehending Nazi saboteurs during WWII is Operation Pastorius, a failed German sabotage plan in 1942.

In June 1942, two teams of German saboteurs landed on the coasts of New York and Florida via U-Boat. Their mission was to sabotage U.S. war industries, including power plants, aluminum plants, railways and bridges.

However, two of the saboteurs, George Dasch and Ernest Burger, chose to defect and alerted the FBI to the plan, providing information about the other agents. Based on their information, the FBI apprehended the remaining six saboteurs.

All eight saboteurs were tried by a military tribunal. Six were sentenced to death and executed, while Dasch and Burger received commuted sentences and were later deported to Germany.

mated that Jorgenson’s level was between 0.077% and 0.097% at the time the crash occurred.

Jorgenson initially told officers, according to the complaint, that there was a fourth person in the vehicle who had been driving at the time the Camry crashed and then fled the scene. He later recanted, allegedly, and admitted he was the driver when a search of the area found no additional person. According to the complaint, Jorgenson claimed he’d picked up a man at the Shawano Kwik Trip and let him drive.

An examination of video footage at the Kwik Trip showed the vehicle had never been there. Instead, it

was discovered the vehicle had stopped at the Kwik Trip in Bonduel about 5:28 p.m., about a half-hour before the crash, and that the vehicle traveled along state Highway 29 before turning onto County Road D.

One of the victim’s phones showed a brief video prior to the crash showing the speedometer, which indicated the vehicle was traveling over 100 mph. The phone also had the Life360 app, which investigators used to determine the vehicle’s rate of speed from the Kwik Trip to the crash site. The app indicated the vehicle was traveling at speeds exceeding 120 mph on the highway.

Jorgenson has a history

of reckless behavior with the Outagamie County Sheriff’s Department ranging from last December to the end of May, according to the complaint. Among the charges are disorderly conduct, drinking alcohol on school property, threatening a minor and reckless driving.

Jorgenson is currently being held on an \$80,000 cash bond. If convicted on the homicide charge, Jorgenson faces a maximum 60 years in prison. The reckless injury charge comes with a maximum 25-year sentence and another nine months for the obstruction charge.
