Corn roast raises funds for scholarships

It's a tradition that has taken place for nearly 50 years, and if the turnout from this year's event is any indication, support for the Wittenberg-Birnamwood FFA Alumni's annual corn roast is stronger than ever.

Hundreds of people headed to Wittenberg Community Park on July 18 for the 46th annual roast, which raises money for scholarships given to Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School students.

Dave Schmidt, one of the organizers of the event, said it takes several volunteers to help make the event a success each July.

"We plan six months prior to dot all our I's and cross all our T's," he said. "We go through 350 dozen ears of corn from Spring Green, west of Madison. We have 800 burgers and 300 brats for sale, and our local FFA (chapter) has cheese curds for sale."

"The money that we raise here goes to scholarships for graduating seniors at Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School,"

Schmidt said. "The alumni is an auxiliary of the FFA. We also get involved with the selection committee for the officers for the next year."

Weather can often affect attendance at outdoor events, but that wasn't the case this year.

"It's super this year, ideal, probably one of our better times," Schmidt said as a long line began forming for corn. "In 2019, we got evacuated to the grade school across the street. That's when a tornado was up in Elcho. We were cleaning up the next day and they got

hit in Amherst."

The event hasn't changed much over the years, according to Schmidt.

"We're always looking for new members," he said. "Fortunately, our FFA chapter comes to help us with the corn and the clean-up."

The corn roast typically draws 1,000 to 1,200 people.

"We get a lot from the outlying areas," Schmidt said. "We're always on the third Friday in July. The reason we do it on a Friday is people are able to go do their family things on Saturday and Sunday."

Village board approves curbs, gutters in business park

The Wittenberg Village Board on July 16 approved having curbs and gutters installed in the village's business park.

Trustee David Timm said consultant Mary Jo Miller with Martenson and Eisele recommended the board make a decision on whether there should be curb and

gutter throughout the whole park or just in the residential area, like the planned new apartment complex to be built by S.C. Swiderski.

"Once we get into the industrial area, my opinion is we don't need curb and gutter," Timm said. "They would just have the slopes in that area for the water to run, which would save us, Mary Jo said, in excess of \$100,000."

There's no timetable for when the work would be done, according to Timm, but Martenson and Eisele needed to know the curb and gutter locations before completing the design plan for the business park.

Board member Paul Yeager recommended installing curb and gutter, noting there have been some instances where it wasn't installed, and segments of the asphalt split as a result.

"I'm not saying we have to have it, but it'd be nice to have," Yeager said. "We're liking the idea of curb and gutter on our residential streets."

Timm pointed out that such a thing was necessary for the full board to approve.

"Instead of me making this decision — I didn't think it was my decision to make — so I wanted the whole board to see if you were on the same page," Timm said.

Shift differential proposal DOA at committee

County will consider adding 2 positions for jail, dispatch

A shift differential request for Shawano County Sheriff's Department dispatchers and jail corrections officers was pretty much declared dead on arrival when the county's Executive Committee met July 17.

While an option to hire one additional person for each area was approved, there is no guarantee those jobs will survive the budget-making process this fall.

That leaves Sheriff George Lenzner and other staff to find alternate ways to entice new recruits and retain the current staff.

"I think us as managers ... we wanted to present this to our committee and to this committee," Lenzner said of the 50 cents per hour proposal. "We wanted to let you know the public sector's been doing this for years. Law enforcement has been doing this for years, usually in patrol. The last few years, dispatch and jail have been doing it to retain people and to attract people."

The shift differential would add \$30,825 to the annual jail budget and \$12,592 to the annual sheriff's department budget for dispatchers.

Lenzner said he understands the county does not have a lot of discretionary funds in the budget.

"We understand the costs," said Julie Hasser, human resources director. "We understand that maybe it won't fix everything."

Supervisor Tess Serrano pointed to a recent

news article about dispatchers in Langlade County. Dispatchers there get a \$5,000 sign-on bonus, a \$5,000 retention bonus and a \$5 per hour stipend for overtime. Also, the county regularly uses Marathon County dispatchers.

"The gist of the whole article also was that close to the \$250,000 Langlade County spent didn't solve the problem," County Board Chairman Tom Kautza said. "But you still have people showing up for second shift, third shift. All this is going to do is give people more incentive to work second shift or third shift. The problem is you need more bodies."

Supervisor Kathy Luebke noted the nearly \$159,000 spent on overtime for dispatch.

"Why aren't we hiring an extra person or two?" she asked.

Communications Supervisor Kasey Cross said they are trying but have

not been successful in keeping a full staff, much less adding staff.

"It's hard to fill weekends and holidays," Lenzner said.

He cited the jail's cook position that has been open for about a month. The job requires starting at 3:30 a.m. and working a 10-hour shift with a starting wage of \$16.47 per hour. He said people can work at McDonald's for more pay and better hours.

"It's not easy to find employees," he said.

Supervisor Randy Young said he believed if a shift differential is paid, it needs to be more.

"Definitely, a shift differential is necessary," Supervisor Ken Capelle said.

Others expressed concern that if jailers and dispatchers get paid more for night and weekend work, employees from other departments will

demand the same.

"Put one more person in your budget, and we'll see what happens," Kautza said.

Serrano said her concern is that adding costs for two new employees to the budget will be the first thing supervisors cut when balancing the numbers.

"It isn't fair to them," she said. "We do all this, and all of a sudden at budget time: 'We don't have the money. You can't have it now.'"

"Well, everybody else has to do that if they want another employee," Kautza responded.

Jim Davel, administrative coordinator, said the costs for each additional position would be brought before the committee at its next meeting.

"As long as the suggestion is to add a person for jail, add a person for dispatch, that's not the first thing that gets cut with the

budget then," Serrano said.

"We'll have to see how much money we got," Kautza said.

"I'm just saying, we come with a shift differential request, and your suggestion is to add a person in jail and dispatch, which we would love to do, but don't make that the first thing that gets cut when the budget's over budget for this department," Serrano said.

"That's what this committee is supposed to do," Kautza said, as the level of supervisors' voices raised noticeably.

Kautza said the committee needs to balance the budget, and to add to one department, something must be taken from others.

"We assign the priorities with the money," he said. "You take from somewhere else to fill where there's a need."

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Negative culture, management causing exodus

Exit interviews from employee resignations open eyes

Fifty percent of those who recently quit their jobs with Shawano County did so without having something else lined up, according to exit interviews with former employees over the past few months.

Julie Hasser, human resources director, shared that information and more with the Shawano County Executive Committee on July 17.

"The scary thing here, 50% of the people who have left don't even have another job," she said. "They're that unhappy that they're willing to leave without another job."

Interviews were conducted with former employees with the sheriff's department and dispatch, human services, University of Wisconsin-Extension, library, finance, planning and zoning and public health. They were not conducted with those who quit without notice or were terminated by the county.

Hasser said the interviews shows 60% of former employees were stressed by management, another 20% by a negative culture and the remaining 20% by their

work schedule.

"Eighty percent are leaving because of the people part of it," she said.

On the flip side, the former employees said they liked the community, helping the community, their co-workers and the job they were hired to do.

However, 50% considered leaving four months to eight months before they finally quit.

"This is also scary," Hasser said. "What that says to me as a manager and a leader, if I'm a supervisor, I had four to eight months to realize that that employee was thinking about leaving, and nothing was done to try and save them. As a leader, are we oblivious to it? Do we not recog-

nize it, or did we not care?"

Forty-five percent of those interviewed said a growing negative culture soured them on working for the county during their tenure — from the initial excitement about starting a new job to the point where they decided they wanted to quit. They said they did not feel valued or appreciated.

Again, 60% said a more positive environment, a change in manager or a schedule adjustment could keep them. Only 10% said a higher salary would make a difference.

"How do you solve that?" asked Supervisor Randy Young. "Training?"

Carrie Buntjer, county finance director, said yes, managers need more development and training.

Even occasional webinars would help, she said. Hasser said it's imperative the county strengthens the people side of its managers.

"It's really training our directors, supervisors, managers how to work with the employees," she said. "They're really good at knowing how to do their job, the tasks. The people skills, which is why you get the negative culture, because if you're not good at it, it stresses you out and you don't do a good job at it."

Jim Davel, administrative coordinator, recounted his 30 years in the Army before working for Shawano County.

"Their focus is on recognizing your people with positive leadership," he said. "We spent a tre-

mendous amount of time rewarding our people, whether it's a simple ribbon or if it's a simple medal or whatever, but everything we did was to recognize your people. That's a cultural shift that would have to happen in this organization."

He said the new management style needs to be learned; it's not an epiphany. Some are better at it than others, he added.

Hasser said department heads are open to change and to become better leaders.

"They're almost like sponges right now," she said. "They're really open. They want it. They realize that it'll make their jobs easier."

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Bowler School District gets CWEC grant

The Bowler School District received a \$400 STEAM grant from Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative (CWEC) to purchase 10 electronic balance scales.

The scales will be used by students in middle school and high school science classes but could also be used by other classes, such as agriculture.

“I will be using them for specific measurements in chemistry and physical science classes, because we need to get more precise with our measurements,” said Kathleen Hansen, high school science teacher in the Bowler School District. “If we’re just looking at diagnostic testing, if we don’t do more precision (measuring), then students lag back. If they’re getting fertilizer, they need to know precisely how much they need to put on their field. That’s really the basis for what we’re teaching in chemistry and ecology.”

When the district applied for the STEAM grant, it had two electronic balance scales. With the addition of 10 more scales, students will be able to work on projects

in smaller groups, thus enhancing their learning experience.

“Rather than 10 students per scale, we’re going to be able to lower that number,” Hansen

said. “They’re going to get more hands-on with more scales available, rather than having to share (a scale) with 10 people.”

“The more hands-on we can be, the better,”

added Tracy Laude, Bowler middle school and high school science teacher. “We can demonstrate, but it will create more of a meaning if they can actually work with

the tools themselves. This will definitely enable us to be in groups of two or three. That way we can go around to see where everybody is at.”

Another benefit will be

lab work will be able to be completed faster.

The goal is to have all students in classes that use electronic balance scales to experience using the scales.

“It’s just the fact of using the tool and being able to pay attention to measurements,” Laude said.

Hansen said she is “thrilled” that students in her classes will have the opportunity for hands-on experience with the scales.

“We are very excited about it because we are always working together with each other anyway, when it comes to our classes,” Laude said. “It’s especially nice, because a lot of students don’t get a chance to work with tools and equipment like this. It’s different than it was years ago.”

Hansen and Laude said they are thankful for the STEAM grant, because without it, it would not have been possible for the district to purchase that many scales.

The STEAM grants, to be used for projects and initiatives related to science, technology, engineering, art and math, were introduced by CWEC in 2022.

Aubrey Wierzba, 12, achieved a state qualifying time at the 25th Bird Bath Invitational in Appleton.

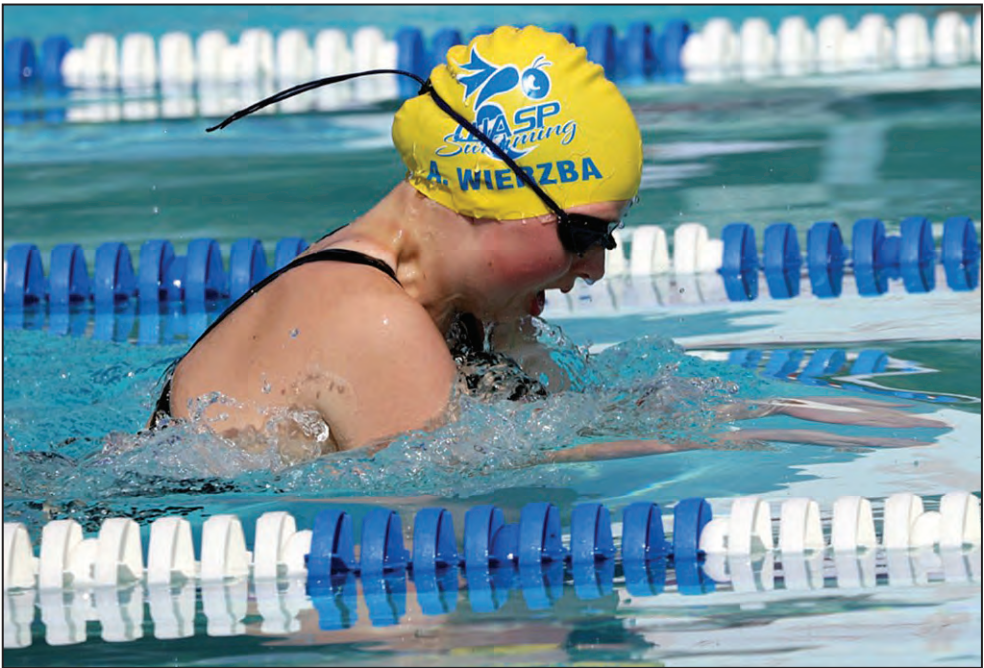

Wierzba’s state qualifying times came in the girls 11-12 division. She placed second in the 200-meter breaststroke in 3:22.52 and seventh in the 100-meter breaststroke in 1:34.50.

In other events, she finished 29th in the 50-meter backstroke in 42.91, 20th in the 50-meter butterfly in 38.67 and 20th in the 50-meter freestyle in 34.50.

Aislyn Sauter, 12, captured 34th in the 50-meter backstroke in 43.83, 19th in the 50-meter breaststroke in 46.35, 22nd in the 100-meter breaststroke in 1:39.87, 48th in the 100-meter freestyle

For Natalie Bessette, 11, her finishes were 103rd in the 100-meter breaststroke in 2:44.70, 127th in the 100-meter freestyle in 1:44.37 and 109th in the 50-meter butterfly in 1:06.00.

Five WASP swimmers competed in the girls 13 and over division with Rylee Crick, 14, earning a pair of top 10 finishes.

She placed sixth in the 100-meter butterfly in 1:29.39 and eighth in the 50-meter butterfly in 34.49. Crick was also 41st in the 50-meter freestyle in 32.69, 17th in the 200-meter individual medley in 3:01.29 and

42nd in the 100-meter freestyle in 1:13.90.

Fourteen-year-old Elizabeth Behnke placed 50th in the 100-meter breaststroke in 1:57.96, 62nd in the 50-meter butterfly in 51.84 and 85th in the 100-meter freestyle in 1:25.15.

Olivia Bessette, 17, finished 52nd in the 100-meter backstroke in 1:27.78, 14th in the 200-meter breaststroke in 3:37.18 and 51st in the 50-meter freestyle in 32.55.

Megan Gilmeister, 16, was 63rd in the 100-meter backstroke in 1:36.27 and 72nd in the 50-meter freestyle in 34.53.

Kenzie Stark, 14, placed 43rd in the 100-meter backstroke in 1:29.83, 23rd in the 200-meter breaststroke in 3:37.63 and 63rd in the 50-meter freestyle in 34.14.

A pair of relay team also competed, with one placing 12th and the other 27th.

The girls 11-12 team of Kaydence Crick, Aislyn Sauter, Peyton Crick and Aubrey Wierzba finished 12th in the 200-meter medley relay in 2:52.31. The girls 13 and over group of Olivia Bessette, Kenzie Stark, Rylee Crick and Megan Gilmeister were 27th in the 400-meter medley relay in 5:47.19.

Ballo challenges Parker for district attorney

Shawano and Menominee counties' longtime district attorney is facing a primary challenge on Aug. 13 as the incumbent's record is facing scrutiny from the Republican challenger.

Greg Parker, 64, lives

in Shawano and has been involved in law enforcement most of his adult life, starting with enlisting in the U.S. Army and serving three years with the military police, being honorably discharged. He continued his law enforcement outside the military as a deputy for

Outagamie County for seven years before being seriously injured in the aftermath of a high-speed chase. Parker went to law school at age 34 to become a prosecutor. He has served as distinct attorney for over 17 years. Alec Ballo, 32, lives in Hammond and brings

six years as an assistant district attorney, including two with Shawano and Menominee counties. Prior to becoming an ADA in 2018, Ballo studied at the University of Wisconsin-Madison Law School and worked as a practicing law clerk in Brown County through UW-Madison's Prosecution Project. He also interned in the Brown County Child Support Agency in 2015. Unless a write-in candidate prevails in the November general election, the winner in the primary race will take over in January.

What makes you the best choice for district attorney?

Ballo: Hunger, diverse experience and a mind toward justice and fairness. I'm young(er); I've practiced prosecution with a wide range of experienced and talented attorneys, many of whom I regard as friends for life. Their wisdom, which they kindly share with me day and night, gives me an edge on anyone, and it's important to have a prosecutor who is thoughtful, and who is willing to consider the perspective of others like that. I do that.

Parker: Your safety is my number one priority. I will continue to be tough on crime. As your DA, I will continue to hold

criminals accountable who victimize anyone in our community. For example, in the last 11 years, 62 sexual predators came to Shawano expecting to sexually assault teenage boys and girls. All of them were arrested when they arrived to commit crimes by the Shawano County Sheriff's Department. I personally prosecuted all 62 of these predators. Every one of them was convicted.

What is your assessment on how the district attorney's office has performed in recent years?

Parker: Six years ago I worked with DHS, AODA providers and Judge Kusel to create the Shawano County Drug Court Program. The program focuses on "high risk, high need" offenders. The court is at full capacity now. Many participants have graduated. Currently I am pursuing a program for low/medium risk offenders - Post-Charge Diversion/Deferred Prosecution program. This DPA program is for low and medium risk offenders. My office is now working with DHS, AODA providers to develop this program. This program is anticipated to begin in late 2024. At the same time, my office has experienced a shortage of prosecutors.

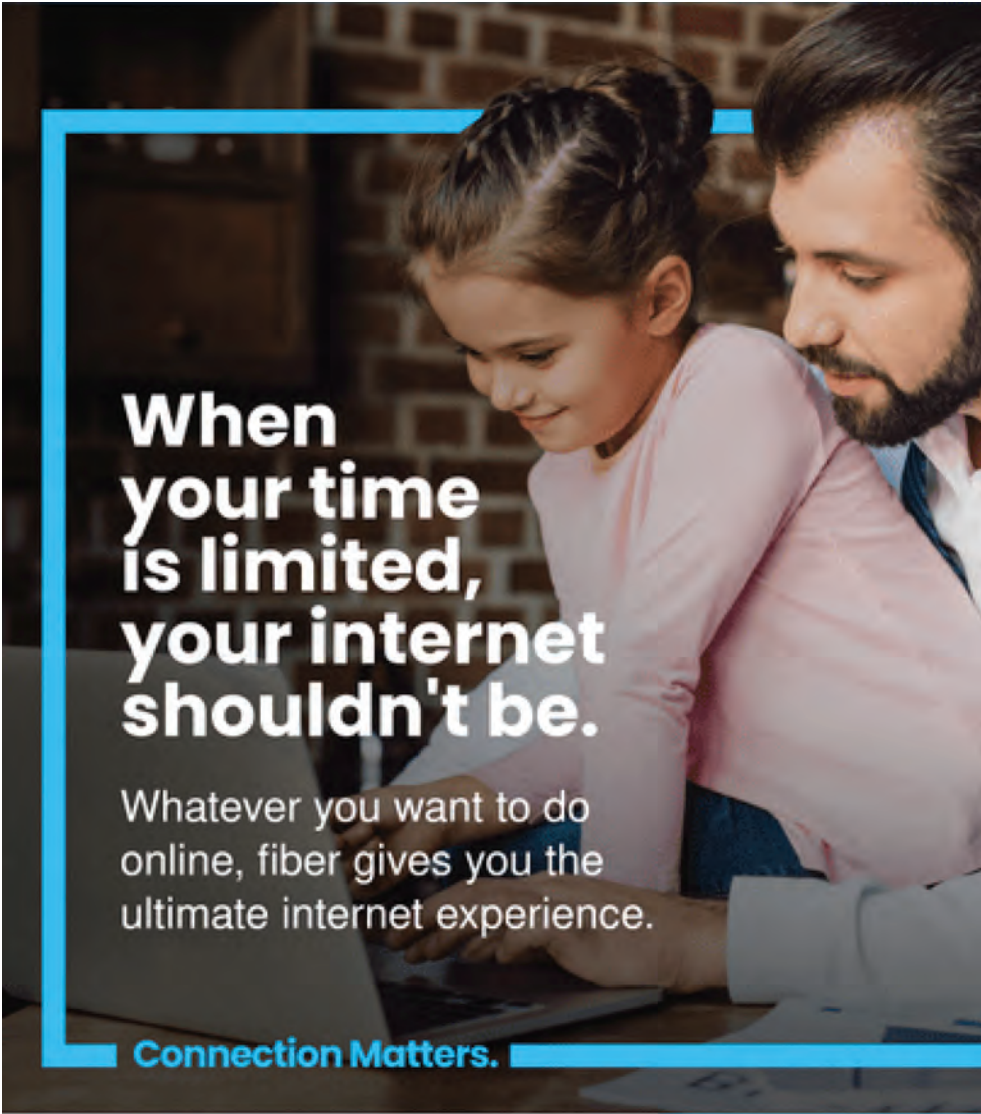
Ballo: Not well,

but you don't want to hear that from a biased source like me. Ask your friend who works in the courthouse; ask why we process a case half as fast as Waupaca County. Ask your friend on the county board; ask him or her if the DA is receptive to solutions. Ask your friends in law enforcement; ask them about how they feel their criminal cases are handled.

What do you think can be done to improve the office and the ability to get criminal cases processed?

Ballo: It really is not that hard. We will need to change the way we prioritize cases. Listen to victims. When they ask us not to prosecute, consider taking them up on that once in a while. We do not need a pound of flesh in every case. Street drugs are getting harder. We need someone who actually uses evidence-based practices to help people keep off the stuff that people OD on daily.

Parker: My office needs more full-time prosecutors. We have been short prosecutors since December 2020. In most cases, defendants want an attorney, which they are entitled to have. However, there is a shortage of attorneys taking public defender cases. This problem is plaguing the system statewide, which in turn significantly delays the process for cases in the court system overall in Shawano-Menominee Counties and counties across the state. On the "bright side," the county board recently approved an office manager-paralegal position for my office. Since there is now a paralegal, that person can review misdemeanor cases for charging.

• Johnny L. Kinney, 30, a Neopit man serving time at Green Bay Correctional Institution, pleaded no contest July 15 to felony bail jumping and misdemeanor possession of drug paraphernalia. Judge Katherine Sloma levied court fees and assessments of \$1,222 and sentenced him to 180 days in jail, concurrent with his current sentence.

• Jerry L. Waukau, 42, Keshena, had his probation revoked May 2 on charges of strangulation and suffocation, two counts of felony bail jumping and misdemeanor charges of battery, bail jumping, and two counts of operating while revoked. Sloma sentenced him July 15 to two years in prison followed by three years of extended supervision.

• Brandon P. Sackatook, 41, Tigerton, pleaded no contest July 17 to substantial battery intending bodily harm and a misdemeanor charge of criminal damage to property. Sloma withheld sentencing and placed him on three years of probation.

• Lindsay R. Holstrom, 27, Shawano, was charged July 15 with two counts of felony bail jumping and a misdemeanor count of disorderly conduct. Sloma set a \$1,000 cash bond. In a second filing, Holstrom was charged with eight counts of felony bail jumping and misdemeanor counts of disorderly conduct and resisting

or obstructing an officer, and Sloma set a \$1,500 cash bond. In a third case, Holstrom was charged with four counts of felony bail jumping and a misdemeanor of retail theft, and Sloma set a \$250 cash bond. For all three cases, the judge scheduled a status conference for Aug. 13.

• Derrick L. Thunder, 40, Neopit, was charged July 15 with 10 counts of felony bail jumping. Sloma set a \$5,000 signature bond, and a status conference was scheduled for July 30.

• Rodney T. Graham, 27, Bonduel, was charged July 16 in a request for extradition to another jurisdiction. Sloma scheduled a review hearing for July 26.

• Christopher L. Achterberg, 44, Neopit, was charged July 17 with possession of methamphetamine, possession of THC (second or subsequent offense) and two misdemeanor counts of possession of drug paraphernalia. Sloma set a \$2,500 signature bond and scheduled a status conference for Sept. 10.

Kelley, 21, Neopit, was charged July 18 with possession of narcotic drugs and misdemeanor counts of possession of drug paraphernalia, resisting or obstructing an officer and possessing an illegally obtained prescription. Sloma set a \$500 signature bond and scheduled a status conference for Sept. 3.

• Brett J. Faust, 30, Birnamwood, was charged July 18 with false imprisonment, three counts of felony bail jumping and misdemeanor counts of battery and disorderly conduct. Sloma set a \$1,500 cash bond and scheduled a preliminary hearing for July 26.

Man dies in ATV crash in Tigerton

A 29-year-old man died in an ATV accident July 20 at the Tigerton OHV Park & Campground, according to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR), the primary agency investigating the crash.

According to a press release from Tigerton Police Chief Michael Weatherwax, at 8:34 a.m., a village employee located two individuals who had struck a tree in the park. One person was unresponsive, and another was in serious condition.

The police chief said

one man was taken to Thedacare Medical Center in Shawano, and another was airlifted by Aspirus Medivac to a trauma center. One of the two men died.

Neither individual were believed to be wearing helmets during the crash, Weatherwax said. Both were riding an ATV designed for one passenger. The ATV was not registered. At this time, it is believed alcohol was a factor in the crash.

At press time, the names of the individuals will not be released.

Due to the crash being ATV-related, the DNR

was called to assist.

“We would like to encourage everyone and their families to keep ATV and UTV safety in mind,” Weatherwax said. “Wear a helmet, buckle up, complete ATV/UTV safety courses and please drive safely and cautiously.”

Assisting at the scene were the Shawano County Sheriff’s Department, DNR, Tigerton Area Ambulance, Tigerton Fire Department, Tigerton Police Department, Shawano Ambulance Service and Aspirus Medivac.

This is the 20th ATV-related fatality in Wisconsin this year.

When outdoor temperatures climb, so do the risks for people with heart disease.

For those affected, the summer heat is not just uncomfortable; it can be dangerous.

A recent study published in American Heart Association’s Circulation journal reveals a significant link between extreme heat and cardiovascular disease (CVD) mortality. For every Celsius degree rise in temperature, CVD-related mortality increases by 2.1%, with heat waves causing an approximately 11.7% rise in mortality.

As summer temperatures soar, individuals with heart disease face heightened health risks.

“Heat affects people with heart disease in various ways, primarily through dehydration,”

said Daniel Krause, DO, a cardiologist with Aspirus Cardiology.

He warns that medications like diuretics, which increase urination, can exacerbate dehydration symptoms such as lightheadedness and dizziness. Staying hydrated by drinking plenty of fluids, avoiding alcohol and caffeine, is crucial.

Krause also advises caution for those taking medications that may cause fatigue.

“Beta blockers or other medications that slow the heart rate down can worsen symptoms during extreme heat,” he said.

In hot weather, the body works harder to regulate temperature, leading to increased heart rate and blood flow to the skin. This added strain can exacerbate symptoms for those with heart disease, causing electrolyte imbalances,

dehydration, and blood pressure fluctuations.

Krause recommends close monitoring of these factors and adjusting medications if necessary.

“If you experience lightheadedness, dizziness, fatigue or shortness of breath, seek shade, drink water and rest,” he said.

Finding a cool, preferably air-conditioned environment can provide relief from symptoms.

“Listen to your body,” Krause said. “During these hot summer days, it’s not the time to push yourself. If you’re not feeling well, don’t be afraid to take a break. You can always come back to activities later after becoming hydrated and feeling better.”

Following these guidelines can help individuals with heart disease effectively manage their condition during challenging summer conditions.

Noriega-Avila guilty of assaulting stepdaughter

Jury back in less than three hours for child sex assault case

Pedro Noriega-Avila was found guilty July 19 on all charges in a case that has taken over eight years to prosecute. It took a jury less

than three hours to find Noriega-Avila guilty on one county of first-degree sexual assault of a child under 13, two counts of second-degree child sex assault and two counts of incest with a child by a stepparent. The jury confirmed that Noriega-Avila went into the victim's room between September 2009 and June 2010 and assaulted her. Noriega-Avila married the victim's mother on July 9, 2010. Additional incidents oc-

curred in 2014 and 2015. Noriega-Avila initially appeared before Judge William Kussel on June 10, 2016, and subsequently posted a \$5,000 cash bond. Noriega-Avila was then ordered to appear on June 20, 2016, but he did not show up. A warrant was issued for his arrest. Noriega-Avila was missing from the court for almost five years until his arrest in Arizona in 2021. Law enforcement responded to a U.S. Border Patrol station on March 13, 2021, regarding the warrant issued by the Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court for Noriega-Avila, and the defendant was already in custody when officers arrived. In April 2021, extradition documents were issued by the county for Noriega-Avila, who was brought back to Shawano County in July 2021. Noriega-Avila was originally scheduled to stand trial in August 2023 on one count of sexual as-

sault of a child under age 13, two counts of sexual assault of a child and two counts of incest with a child by stepparent. The trial was halted after his attorney at the time, Sara Stertz, stepped down due to being in the late stages of pregnancy and disagreement with her client on defense strategies. According to online court records, Noriega-Avila's attorneys made multiple attempts to have the case dismissed over the three-day trial, but Kussel denied all requests. Noriega-Avila faces a maximum of 40 years in prison and a \$100,000 fine for each of the incest counts and the latter two sexual assault counts. For the child sexual assault in 2010, he faces up to 60 years in prison. Sentencing for Noriega-Avila has not yet been scheduled. His \$500,000 cash bond has been revoked.

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Schmidt fondly remembered by court staff

Guitar-playing judge served as DA, state representative

Earl Schmidt, who served as district attorney, state representative and judge for Shawano and Menominee counties died July 14. He was 88. When staff at the Shawano County Sheriff's Department and Shawano County Clerk of Courts office recalled working with Schmidt over the years, his guitar playing was brought up most often. "He'd walk around the courthouse, and just all of a sudden, he'd play guitar," said Ty Raddant, chief deputy at the sheriff's department. "He'd always come in and sing sometimes, too, added Cindy Bucher, office specialist in the clerk of courts office.

In his retirement, Schmidt wrote several songs and shared them with his family, friends, neighbors and community. "I know people loved requesting, when they had a judge do their wedding, a lot of times they would request Judge Schmidt," Sheriff George Lenzner said. "They knew that he'd play guitar for their wedding. After he'd marry them, he would play a song." Lenzner and Jennifer Hoffman, deputy clerk of courts, also recalled Schmidt's glasses, which were often perched on the end of his nose and he looked at you over the top of them. "When I first started here, I was afraid of him," Hoffman said. "He didn't seem to smile much, and he'd put his glasses down and look at you. He would say things that we probably wouldn't consider politically correct, but they

needed to be said." Any fear Hoffman had quickly disappeared. "When I first started here, I was the fiscal clerk, so I issued warrants for failure to pay fines," she said. "I'd always have to take the stack down to him for his signature. When we started with our software system ... because I was responsible, he gave me the title of NAG, which was for network administrative guru." Schmidt was also known for his logging. In his obituary, he is said to have referred to himself as a tree farmer and a hobby judge. Hoffman said Schmidt used to take his wood to a sawmill in Tilleda. He discovered the sawmill was operated by Hoffman's father and his brothers. "Then we were best buddies," she said. Once at the sawmill, a worker who unloaded Schmidt's logs said he had to decide if he was judge or logger. "He told him to be quiet, because this was his therapy," Hoffman said. Schmidt's personality made him likable to everyone. "I remember one time he called over here (the sheriff's department), because he had a prescription that he needed, and he didn't have a way to get to the drugstore to get it," Raddant said. "So, I went and picked up his prescription and took it him. About two weeks later, he said, 'You paid for that?' I said, 'Yeah.' He said, 'Why didn't you tell me?' And he reached in his wallet and gave me the money." The pharmacy was not just down the street, either; it was in Wittenberg. Hoffman also helped Schmidt with his annual Christmas card. She would take home his rough draft, create it and print it for him. "His stories and Christmas cards were interesting, especially about his pet grouse," she said. And then there was the more serious side of Schmidt. "I don't know of anybody that he didn't get along with over here (clerk

of courts office)," Lenzner said. "Everybody liked him. He got along with everybody. Joking around a lot, but when in court, when it was time to be serious, he was very serious. "He was a very, very fair judge. I just liked how he was old school. He would take to people after they were done. It wasn't just, 'You're sentenced.' He would try to give them advice and stuff." Whether those people would follow his advice or not was up to them. "It was nice when judges would do that years ago," Lenzner said. "The older judges used to do that. They've give them a lesson or tell a story of somebody similar to them and what happened if they kept going down this path. They care about these people, too. They don't want to see them every week." Schmidt was a Birnamwood resident most of his life. He was valedictorian of the Birnamwood Orioles' class of 1953. He received multiple degrees from UW-Madison in agriculture, economics and public administration. From June 1964 through July 1969, he was employed in Venezuela, the Dominican Republic and Brazil, principally with ACCION International, which specialized in the urban development of South America. Upon returning home, he was back at the UW-Madison campus to earn his law degree. His legal career included district attorney for Shawano and Menominee counties from 1972-74, state representative to the Wisconsin Assembly from 1974-82 and circuit judge for Menominee and Shawano counties from 1983 to his retirement in 2002. He and the former Judy Eckardt raised four children. A lifelong member of St. John's Lutheran Church in Birnamwood, he was also a member of the State Bar of Wisconsin, Rotary Club of Shawano, the Farm Bureau and the Elks Club of Antigo Lodge 662. A funeral service was held July 20.

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Evaluation, interpreter costs hamper court budget

Salaries, health insurance also part of proposed \$93K budget hike

Increased costs for psychological evaluations and interpreters in the court system are among the reasons the clerk of courts proposed a significant hike in the department's 2025 budget. Ethan Schmidt told the Shawano County Public Safety Committee on July 10 most of the \$93,000 is from salaries and health insurance, as well as evaluations and interpreters needed for Branch I,

Branch II and the register in probate. "If defense counsel enters a plea of not guilty by mental disease or insanity, we then have to do an eval, and per state statute, we have to pay for those," he said. If an evaluation is complete, the defendant is found to have a mental disease and is then sentenced to a mental health institution, he or she can request a reevaluation each year. "They can every year petition the court for reevaluation, and then the court has to follow through with an eval," Schmidt said. "So, some of these costs are recurring every year, because we have individuals that ask for the eval. Some of it is the very early stages of the pro-

ceedings for that case." Schmidt is asking for \$50,000 for evaluation fees for 2025, a 20% hike from the \$40,000 budgeted for 2024. He noted the county has already spent \$26,000 through May 31. The other, and bigger expense, is interpreter fees. "We have a huge Spanish-speaking population here in Shawano County," Schmidt said. "The amount of Spanish-speaking cases that we have every year is going up." He said most interpreters charge a two-hour minimum. To help keep costs down, officials have started scheduling cases needing an interpreter back to back. That way, when the hearings only last 15 minutes or so, they

can get through several cases for the two-hour minimum charge. Schmidt said interpreters are private contractors, but the prices must be approved by the state. "One of the things that we'll have to watch — the interpreters that we use right now aren't doing it, but other counties have mentioned — because these counties are going to this time-block system, they're (the interpreters) are charging a two-hour minimum per case, not per time coming to the county," he said. Wisconsin is one of few states with court interpreters but no guidelines for charging. "It's kind of a free-for-all," Schmidt said. Also, there is a lack

of interpreters, and it is difficult to become state-certified for interpreting in the court system, he noted. Schmidt said costs are also saved if they can have interpreters appear via Zoom, as the county then doesn't have to pay travel costs. He said the state clerks association is lobbying lawmakers for an increase in the state reimbursement for interpreters, a figure that has not changed in 20 years. Committee members questioned why Menominee County wasn't charged more for the services provided by Shawano County. Schmidt first said the district attorney's office (separate from the clerk of courts budget) is required by the state to provide services to both counties, and the DA's office uses a percentage of expenses to be reimbursed for its costs. The clerk of courts office is not required to provide services to Menominee County and has chosen to be reimbursed at a flat dollar amount that totals \$28,000. Schmidt said the counties have a two-year agreement for the shared services, and an escalation clause is built into the agreement. "What we provide for Menominee County, other than the jury services on the court system side, they could have an employee do on their own," Schmidt said.

Police said it was an isolated incident, and the community was not in danger.



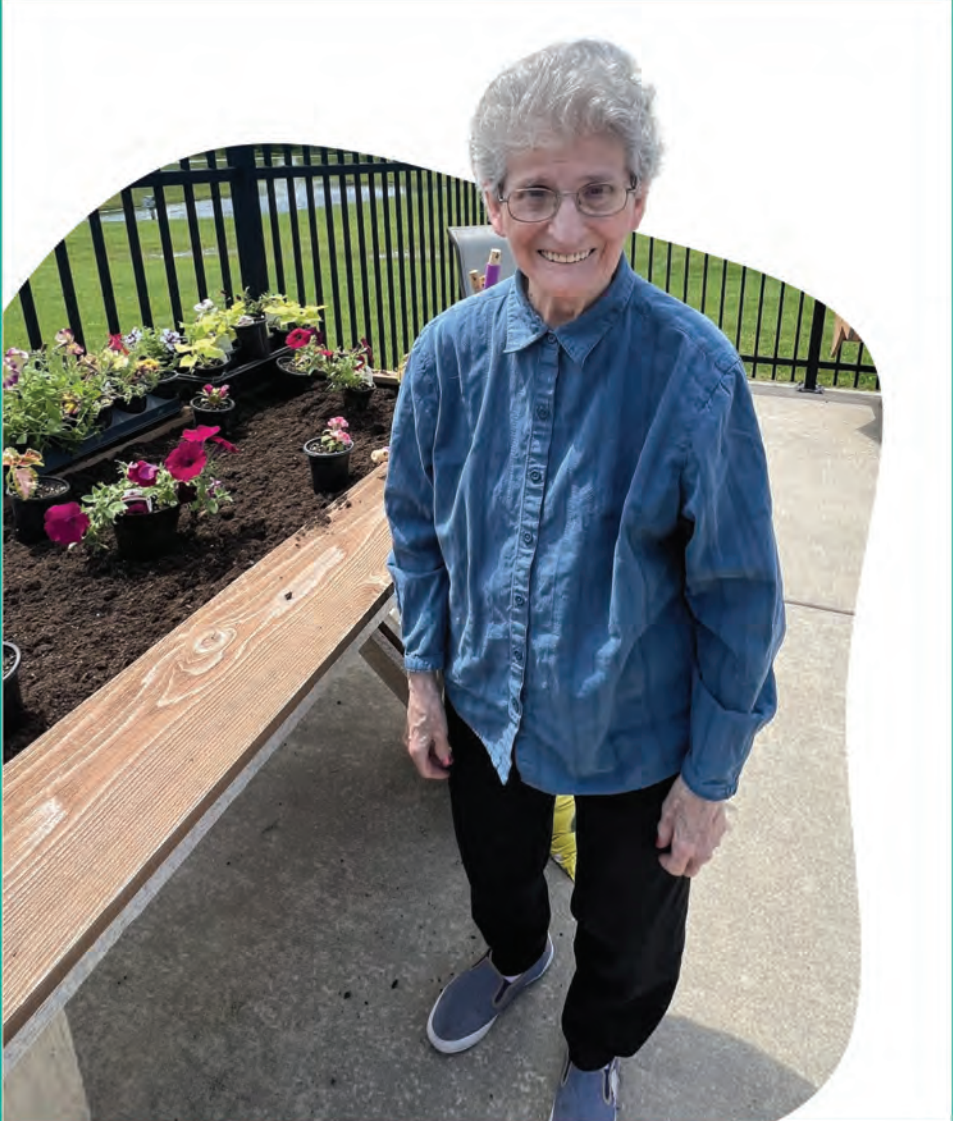

‘Gems of Yesteryear’ back for another pageant run

Menominee show to include intermission original of ‘How Muak Got Their Necklace’

The Menominee Pageant Players will be going back to their beginnings as they perform their latest pageant July 31 at the Woodland Bowl in Keshena, but with some surprises.

“Gems of Yesteryear,” originally produced in 1961 and chosen as the first revival production in 2016, will this year include a mixture of new recordings and restored audio from the College of Menominee Nation’s archives. Some of the scenes in the show written by James Frechette Sr. will be partially performed in Menominee, giving the audience a chance to hear how the language was spoken over 60 years ago.

“It was a community favorite, just as it was in 1961 when it was originally staged,” said director Ryan Winn. “The same favorite scenes will be the same favorite scenes this time around, but we’re hoping to write new shows going forward.”

During the intermission, another mini-pageant will take place, telling a story written by James Frechette Jr. titled “How Muak Got Their Necklace.” Frechette Jr., besides being James Frechette’s son, is also known for being one of the creators of the Menominee Clans Story featured on CMN’s website.

Karen Ann Hoffman provided the draft of the story with which the Pageant Players developed a script.

“I was really interested in the Pageant Players’ idea of trying to create new work in this long-standing vein,” Hoffman said. “Even though I’m not a writer, Jim Frechette has been on my mind in this past year. So I offered to the group the story that Jim had given to me. I figured that would help get our toes wet in developing a piece.”

Hoffman said the group came together and made a fundamental script from the story.

“In the end, we’ve got a really good representation of what it was that Jim

Frechette had told me some decades ago,” Hoffman said. “It’s really exciting to me to be able to be in this group of players and bring that to life in the Woodland Bowl. I think that’s going to be a wonderful way to remember Jim and the gifts that he has given over the years.”

Muak in the story symbolizes the loon and the sound it makes, and the story examines how the animal got its colors. Swede Corn, one of the younger Pageant Players, is being tasked to play Muak.

CWEC linemen help with Navajo Nation work

Eland man among crew bringing electricity to tribe

For the second year in a row, two linemen from Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative (CWEC) traveled to the Navajo Nation in Arizona to take part in the Light Up Navajo Project. Linemen Mack Yarbrough and Josh Wick spent a week in May working to bring electricity to residents of the Navajo Nation.

Wick, who lives in Eland, said he decided to participate in the Light Up Navajo Project because he thought it would be a cool experience.

“Everyone around here has power who wants it,” Wick said. “It was weird to hear that people in America, who want power, still don’t have power.”

Yarbrough, who lives in Stevens Point, said it was a good opportunity to use his skills to help people.

During the week, Yarbrough and Wick worked with a lineman from Massachusetts and six linemen from two electric utilities in Utah, as well as linemen from the Navajo Tribal Utility Authority.

They completed one project from start to finish during the first part of the week.

The project that was completed from start to finish was a 1.75-mile stretch in which a new power line was installed to bring electricity to a single residence. In all, 29 primary poles were set, along with one secondary pole.

“We dug all the holes, set the poles, strung in the wire, and did their service wire, too,” Wick said. “I think they said most of the time they just have crews come in and set poles, and then they’ll have another crew, in another week, string the wire, but because this first one was so long, that’s why they had so many people out there, too. That way we could have a bunch of different people working on different things and do that from start to finish.”

Yarbrough and Wick said the homeowners were grateful for the work the crews did to bring electricity to their home.

Shawano, Waupaca, Marathon, Langlade and northern Oconto counties will not have an antlerless deer holiday hunt or bonus archery deer season this year, but Portage, Outagamie and the southern portion of Oconto counties will have both, according to finalized state hunting regulations.

Hunters in Shawano County and most surrounding counties, including Waupaca, Portage and Outagamie, will receive two free antlerless deer tags (harvest authorizations) per gun or archery license. Hunters in Oconto County will receive three free antlerless tags, while Marathon County hunters will receive one free tag per gun or archery license.

For a state map showing the number of free antlerless tags per gun or archery license, visit <https://gowildagent.wi.gov/Documents/Deer%20Farmland%20Map.pdf>.

The archery (bow and crossbow) season is Sept. 14 through Jan. 5, with some counties having an extended archery season Jan. 8-31. The youth deer season is Oct. 5-6 (wear blaze orange or blaze pink clothing during this season, even for bowhunters; only waterfowl hunters are exempt), and a deer season for hunters with disabilities is Oct. 5-13 (not



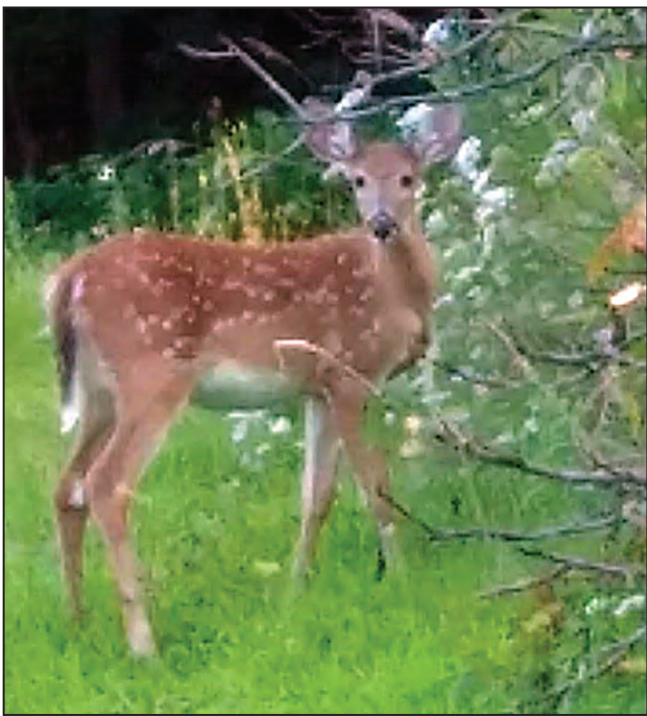
a statewide season, check regulations for details).

The sacred and time-honored gun deer season is Nov. 23 through Dec. 1, with a statewide antlerless season Dec. 12-15. The muzzleloader deer season follows the regular gun season, Dec. 2-11.

If you have not tried a traditional or modern muzzleloading rifle, now is the time to try. I or other members of our Fox Valley Muzzle Loaders Club in New London would be happy to show you how. Why not add more time afield and increase your odds of some fresh venison?

The final gun deer season (in selected counties) is the holiday hunt, Dec. 24 through Jan. 1.

Shawano, Marathon and Waupaca counties will not have a holiday hunt or an extended archery season this year. Portage, Outagamie and Oconto counties will have both. County deer advisory councils, made up of a cross-section of deer conservation shareholders, help make the decision on whether to increase, decrease or

maintain their individual deer herds by recommending the number of antlerless tags, holiday hunts and extended archery seasons.

Only Iron and Ashland counties will be bucks only this fall, with no antlerless tags issued.

It looks like a promising deer season to come, with most does dropping at

least two fawns this spring (and a few having three). I base my highly unscientific opinion on what I see on my 30-mile commute through deer-infested Waupaca, Outagamie and Winnebago counties. Waupaca County is typically among the top counties for deer harvest each year..

Road kill is another good indicator of the area population, and the shoulders are currently littered with carcasses.

There are a number of

new laws or rule changes that you should be aware of.

My favorite one is legalization of high-powered air guns for big game and game birds. As an avid airgunner and owner of one PCP (pre-charged pneumatic) airgun, I can attest to the power of these efficient, powder-free hunting tools. They use compressed air held in a cylinder (either manually pumped up like the old Crosman or Daisy) or filled with a scuba tank.

These guns in calibers up to .50 can easily kill deer and bigger game, including Cape buffalo. This is not your grandpa's old Benjamin pump pellet gun. If you plan to hunt deer or even bear with one of these PCP guns, please contact me and let's do a story.

Here are a few other new rules:

- The limit for the April 12-13, 2025, youth turkey season is one bird per hunter. Any turkey license for any of the spring dates may be used by the youth hunter age 15 or younger during this season (see the regulations booklet or link below for details).

- Youth hunters no longer need a goose permit during the Sept. 14-15 youth waterfowl hunt.

- Junior antlerless deer permits are now valid on

both public and private lands.

- Size F shot is now legal for waterfowl hunting. Size F is larger than T but smaller than No. 4 buckshot (5.59 mm, if you want to be exact).

- Crow season has a new starting date: Nov. 23. It ends March 26, 2025.

Good hunting this fall. Think safety first and if you haven't taken a hunter safety class yet, now is the time to sign up or take an online course (I strongly recommend the associated field course if you do take an online course.). Hands-on training is the only way to learn it right.

Don't forget the Aug. 1 application deadline for bobcat, fisher and sturgeon upriver lakes tags.

Book continues story of ancestor's iron pot

The story my father told me about my great-great grandmother's cast iron pot was in large part corroborated by a distant cousin, Donna Holschuh Haanen. Her book, "The Holzschuh Families of Geisfeld, Germany," was published in 2007. It took Donna (whose name is spelled without the z) 10 years to compile the book, but it's absolutely priceless. I'm so glad I have it, but in truth, it sat undisturbed on my bookshelf until I began writing about my favorite soup kettle.

Now where were we? Oh, yes. We left my great-great grandfather John George Holzschuh, his sister Margarethe and fiancé Anna Maria on board a ship headed for America. They set sail in March 1856, destination Wisconsin, on what would be a minimum six-week voyage across the Atlantic. Everything about it was dangerous, but most terrifying were the storms and disease.

Vessels often encountered vicious squalls. A sudden heave of the ship could dislodge passengers from their berths and send them hurtling headlong onto shipmates on the other side. Deadly illnesses were common; cholera accounted for 25% of fatalities among emigrants from some ports of demarcation.

Even if the weather co-operated, the lack of fresh food on board made menus monotonous. Breakfast and supper consisted of coffee or tea and bread and butter, if it didn't turn rancid. A typical dinner (noon meal) included a salted or pickled entrée such as bacon, fatback, salt pork, or herring, pea soup, sauerkraut and stewed prunes. For the first weeks, they might have had potatoes, carrots, rutabagas, and onions, but even root vegetables could spoil rather quickly. It was a grueling experience, but they made it, even managing to acquire a rudimentary grasp of English during the voyage.

It's easy to imagine the Holzschuh Party of Three's ecstatic reaction when they first saw dry land. That euphoria was likely accompanied by more than a little trepidation as they docked in Manhattan Battery at Castle Garden, the national gateway opened in 1855 that operated until Ellis Island replaced it in 1890. They were greeted by travel specialists who assisted with maps, train tickets, food purchases, temporary lodging, employment opportunities, and stern warnings against fraudsters who specialized in fleeing naïve newcomers.

After the necessary

paperwork and mandatory health checks were completed, the Holzschuhs collected their baggage, which had been thrown in a heap on the dock. The pile surely contained the cast iron pot that I treasure. As eager as the three must have been to get to their final destination, the Town of Lima, it would be two more weeks until they reached their new home. They must first travel to Albany by boat, a three-day trip. Then it was on to Buffalo, a two-day train ride, followed by a 10-day sail in a small schooner across the Great Lakes to Sheboygan.

The last leg of the journey was made via horse-drawn wagon, with Anna Maria carrying on her lap a few special items which have become Donna's family heirlooms: her Sunday best white bonnet, Bible and prayer card, and an 18-inch square napkin she had embroidered during the passage, later cross-stitched with her initials.

As Dad continued sharing this precious piece of family history with me, I just had to ask. Why had John George chosen the Town of Lima as their final destination? Dad said he wasn't sure, but he had been told John George was the first immigrant from Geisfeld to do so. Maybe it had something to do with Margarethe? I offered.

Maybe. All I know, he said, is that 14 weeks after leaving Germany, John George finally claimed Anna Maria as his bride. They were both 24 years old.

Then Dad surprised me by adding that it was a double wedding. Really? I asked. Yup. That same day Margarethe married Johann Walter, the "eligible bachelor" who had paid for her passage to America. Never known as a gambler, Johann made his substantial wager with no guarantee Margarethe would have him. Fortunately, it turned out to be an excellent arrangement for all as John George and Anna Maria lived with the Walters until they were settled.

As Dad finished this part of the story, I cradled my newfound treasure affectionately. Now it all made sense. I couldn't resist. Oh, so then Margarethe actually was a mail order bride. That's so romantic. How wonderful.

His reply was swift and sharp. Wonderful? Not hardly.

I couldn't help getting a bit defensive for my great-great aunt. Well, so she married a total stranger because he'd paid for her trip to America. You said she had a choice, and so the story does have a happy ending. Dad looked at me and scowled. Happy ending? Who said anything about a happy ending?

of Yesteryear.”

“Chief Tomow is kind of troubled, and as his wife, she wants to help him and support him through that struggle,” Fernandez said. “He’s trying to be a good leader in difficult times, and she steps into a larger role.”

Meanwhile, Avari Fernandez is diving into the pageant culture for the first time. She will be playing Minnehaha, the lover of Hiawatha who later becomes his wife.

“I’m the newcomer. This is my first time here,” Avari Fernandez said. “I’m very nervous. I don’t know what to expect, but I know I’m with good people, and they’ll have my back if I have trouble. I’ve always wanted to try a play or a musical, but I haven’t had the guts to try it or get out there myself. Ryan just put me on there as Minnehaha, and it’s like, ‘OK, we’re doing it.’”

The pageants have been rediscovered through Winn’s research at the behest of many tribal members. A lot of help has come from Jeremiah Moses Jr., one of the Pageant Players who is also Winn’s longtime research assistant. The second scene of “Gems of Yesteryear” will feature the original 1959 tape recording done for the 1961 show, which Moses discovered in the archives

“They were out there while we were working on it, so they’d come by and talk to us,” Wick said.

The couple invited the crews into their home and cooked them a meal that included Navajo tacos. They also shared the history of their family and the property.

“She said her parents built the house in the 1960s,” Wick said of one woman.

He added that the homeowners said they had wanted to be part of the Light Up Navajo Project, but they were usually told that the 1.75-mile distance was too far.

“Normally, they were keeping them (projects) to less than a mile,” Wick said. “I think they kept getting pushed back, because it was so long.”

After completing that project, Yarbrough and Wick worked on a project that, when completed, will have 5.5 miles of power lines installed to bring electricity to one person. That will be the longest line extension that is part of the Light Up Navajo Project.

“A crew had already been there before us setting poles. Then we came in and set more,” Yarbrough said.

He said he was surprised that only one person would benefit from that line extension.

“It provoked a lot of thought on that, and that’s kind of the point as to why

at the S. Verna Fowler Academic Library.

“It was amazing. I was down in the archives working on a different project, and I was just looking for the cassette tapes, and there was a shelf with some cassettes and some microfilm and some of that stuff,” Moses said. “I opened up one of the drawers, and I saw a couple of the pageant names.”

The cassette tape with the original recording was recorded from the reel-to-reel recording for the original pageant. Moses noted that Winn told him that he’d been through the archives and hadn’t found anything new.

“When I opened the drawer and saw those names, I thought, ‘This can’t be real,’” Moses said, noting that he’s considered cool for being born after 2000 and knowing what a cassette player is. “I threw it in the cassette player. I’m reading the script and sure enough, this was the original recording for (the scene) ‘Song of Hiawatha.’”

Drums will be provided by the Wolf River Singers, and all Native dancers are welcome to join the production. The pageant is funded through a Wisconsin Arts Board grant, CMN and the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin.

we were there, because nobody else was going to do this,” Yarbrough said.

Wick said he is glad that he helped on the project.

“It’s something I’ll remember forever,” Wick said. “It’s good to know I helped out, even though we only turned electricity on for one family. Without the small amount of time we spent there, they would have been waiting for more years to actually get electricity.”

Yarbrough, who traveled to Guatemala in 2019 to help bring electricity to residents there, said it’s “the right thing to do” to help people.

“If we can make it work around home and we can make the slight sacrifice and slight inconvenience, and actually help people with something, that’s cool,” Yarbrough said.

Mewing call sign catbirds around

We put out our Baltimore oriole feeder this spring, festooning it with half an orange and a small dish of grape jelly to hopefully attract those beautiful orioles. We’ve seen no orioles; instead the gray catbirds are here daily enjoying the jelly. Their loud insistent calls let us know when the feeder is empty and more jelly is called for. Fortunately, we are well stocked.

Gray catbirds (*dumetella carolinensis*) are sleek looking birds with their soft gray coloring and black rectangular cap that tops their head. They have a rusty red patch under their tail feathers and a narrow straight black bill that serves them well in securing their favored foods, insects and fruit.

The Cornell Lab All About Birds website (AAB) reports that the songs of male catbirds, like other birds in the mimidae family (e.g., mockingbirds and brown thrashers) are made up of short notes, collected into “phrases” and that these songs can last up to 10 minutes. The songs are a menagerie of sounds. They include whistles, squeaks, gurgles, whines, and nasal tones, some of which imitate other birds as well as frogs and mechanical noises. Females also sing, but infrequently and more quietly.

It is this bird’s call that mimics the mewing of a cat

that distinguishing it, and for which it is named. The first time we heard a gray catbird we were sure it was a neighbor’s cat, but no. As the calls continued and we eventually got a look at the source of the mewing, we were pleased to realize we had learned the signature call of the gray catbird.

According to Alan Haney in his book, “Jewels of Nature,” the catbird’s genus name, *Dumetella*, means “small thicket.” This reflects the preferred nesting habitat of the bird. They build their nests within a few feet of the ground in shrubby thickets. They also build nests within the thick cover of vines or tree branches.

Our yard has some nice woody edges due to our planting of native shrubs over the years such as dogwoods, juneberry, highbush cranberry, and elderberry. We also have a variety of trees and a healthy growth of Virginia creeper, a vine that likes to escape into all the shady edges of our yard draping them in a cascade of greenery. Because we see the catbird almost daily, we think it is nesting somewhere in our yard. We hope

this is the case, as we like seeing it at our feeder and hearing its various songs during the day.

According to Haney, catbird nests are rather large and bulky, made up of small sticks, grass, bark and mud and lined with fibrous materials such as woven grass, small roots and string. As the birds are secretive about leaving and entering their nests, it is hard to locate them. Rightfully so, because if we can find them, so can predators like foxes, skunks, opossums and cats who may rob the nest of eggs and young.

Gray Catbirds lay a clutch of one to six eggs, and the young are able to leave the nest after 10 days, says Haney. The adults will feed them for another two weeks or so before they are on their own.

According to AAB, the birds overwinter along the

Atlantic and Gulf coasts and in Central America and the Caribbean Islands. Their populations are stable and they are one of our commonly occurring summer birds.

Listen for the gray catbird in your neighborhood; it’s easy to recognize its mewing call. Add fruit and/or jelly to your feeders, and you will likely be able to see this elusive bird close up. Planting native shrubs that produce fruits and berries in your yard will attract them as well, giving you even more opportunity to enjoy this bird and its many varied and interesting songs.

Help stop the spread of
aquatic invasive species

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) reminds boaters to help stop the spread of invasive plants and animals in the state's waters.

Simple clean-up steps and draining water from the boat and live wells can help prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species (AIS).

"It only takes a minute to remove plants, animals, mud or debris from boats, trailers and equipment and to drain all water from bilges, livewells and bait buckets," said Erin McFarlane, the statewide Clean Boats Clean Waters educator with Extension Lakes. "These simple steps help

keep invasive species from hitching a ride from one lake or river to another."

Every boater and angler has a role to play in protecting Wisconsin's lakes and rivers. Everyone should follow these prevention steps, required by Wisconsin state law, to help prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species.

- Inspect boats, trailers and equipment before and after use.

- Remove all mud and attached aquatic plants and animals.

- Drain all water from boats, vehicles and equipment, including livewells and fish buckets.

- Never move plants

or live fish away from a waterbody.

- Dispose of unwanted bait in the trash.

- Buy minnows from a Wisconsin bait dealer.

Additionally, only use leftover minnows when fishing with them on the same body of water. They can be used on other waters only if no lake or river water or other fish have been added to their container.

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Survey shows an increase in drumming grouse

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Roadside Ruffed Grouse Drumming Survey showed a 57% increase in statewide drumming activity compared to 2023.

Survey results were recently announced by the DNR.

The survey measured ruffed grouse drumming activity heard along road-sides throughout Wisconsin in the spring.

Several agencies and groups — including the DNR, U.S. Forest Service, tribal partners and volunteers — collected the data via roadside surveys of breeding grouse.

“The late spring and summer of 2023 were

abnormally dry, which resulted in prime nesting and brooding conditions for ruffed grouse. This is likely the most influential factor explaining the increase in the number of drumming grouse this year,” said Alaina Roth, DNR ruffed grouse specialist. “We are also likely entering the ‘up’ phase of our 10-year population cycle, which may be an influencing factor, too.”

Ruffed grouse typically follow a 10-year population cycle, with peaks occurring in years that end in 0, 1 or 9. The surveys indicate ruffed grouse in Wisconsin are starting to enter the more populous phase of the abundance cycle. The next peak is anticipated to

occur in 2029, 2030 or 2031.

Data is not available for 2020, so it is unknown whether 2019 or 2020 was the high point in the cycle, but drumming numbers appeared to wane in the years immediately following 2020.

Since 2021, survey data has been organized and analyzed by ruffed grouse priority areas to help monitor key populations across the state, as defined in the Wisconsin Ruffed Grouse Management Plan 2020-2030.

The 2024 survey results for priority areas compared to 2023 showed:

- A 41% increase in drumming in the central priority area.

- A 60% increase in drumming in the northern priority area.

- A 56% decrease in drumming in the Driftless priority area.

DNR sets 2024 deer season framework and harvest goals

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) recently announced the deer harvest quotas and framework for the 2024 Wisconsin deer hunting season.

The statewide antlerless quota for the 2024 season is 272,837 deer, with 245,245 total bonus antlerless harvest authorizations available for purchase across the state. These authorizations are in addition to the free antlerless harvest authorizations issued in farmland zones, which are not reflected in this total.

These recommendations were formed in partnership with County Deer Advisory Councils and based on public feedback and deer population objectives.

The approved quotas and season frameworks for each county match the recommendations of its respective County Deer Advisory Council, with three exceptions.

In Iowa County, the January archery and cross-

bow season was extended to match surrounding counties, as recommended by the DNR. Additionally, the Natural Resources Board, via amendment, provided 400 antlerless permits for public land hunters in Bayfield and Oneida counties.

Antlerless harvest opportunities will vary between deer management units based on local deer population levels

and management goals. This approach allows for greater harvest opportunities in zones where deer are abundant and more conservative harvests where deer are fewer in number.

For the 2024 season, bonus antlerless harvest authorizations will be available for purchase in all deer management units except Ashland and Iron counties, as recommended by their County Deer Advisory Councils.

Hunters may purchase additional bonus antlerless harvest authorizations online through the Go Wild license portal and at license sales locations starting at 10 a.m. Aug. 12. The first three days of bonus sales are management zone-specific, with all remaining permits becoming available Aug. 15.

ARPA funds to be spent on jail project

Work will replace controls, building automation system at jail, HVAC units in sheriff's office

Shawano County's remaining \$1.5 million in federal COVID funds have been earmarked with five months to spare.

County officials had until Dec. 31 to declare where the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds would be spent.

A project at the jail that has expanded and seen estimated costs skyrocket more than 350% from the original will be the recipient of the funds, as agreed to by the Shawano County Executive Committee on July 17.

"We did get the majority of the estimates in for the controllers," said Jim Davel, the county's administrative coordinator. "Quite frankly, if we decided not to use the remaining ARPA money for the controllers, our options are to borrow the money or to go into the general fund, both of which would have significant impacts on the 2025 budget."

He recommended using all of the remaining ARPA funds for the project.

This project is to replace the controls and building automation system of the jail and sheriff's department heating, ventilation and air conditioning units.

Carrie Buntjer, county finance director, said the initial quote for the controller project was \$851,685. Since then, additional items are recommended to be completed in conjunction with the controls. This includes replacing the indoor air handling systems.

"The initial funding through CIP (Capital Improvement Projects) was \$415,000 for the project," she said. "And then, if we move over the remaining ARPA funds of \$1.5 (million), we've got \$1.9 (million) in funds for the project. The \$1.8 (million in estimates) has a contingency, but there could also be additional things that come up as they get into it as well, so we want to make sure we have enough money."

The estimate is currently at \$1,855,000, which includes a contingency amount.

"These are estimates," said Tom Kautza, county

board chairman. "These are not actual bids."

Buntjer said ARPA funds will be used first and then the \$415,000 set aside as the CIP funds. CIP funds would be reduced if the bids are lower than the estimates.

When deciding to use the remaining ARPA funds for the jail project, other projects requested to be funded with that money were also discussed.

Davel said proposed new court equipment would be added to the clerk of courts budget request for 2025. A new dive team trailer for the sheriff's department is part of that department's 2025 budget request.

Installation of antennas at the Leopold communication tower was completed with funds pulled from the 2024 budget.

"We didn't get the estimate for the parks remodeling," Davel said. "That was to move Keith (Marquardt, parks director) out of the house and to build some office space above the pavilion. The overall intent was to use the house as a Vrbo (an online marketplace for

vacation rentals)."

A new metal roof at the library will cost \$81,000. The library board has a fund balance of about \$85,000. Davel said the board will meet to discuss using part of all of the balance to pay for the roof, although they initially favored a new asphalt roof at about \$60,000.

The cost to retain the wood log siding at Lakeland Industries is about \$60,000, while the estimates to replace the logs with a different siding would be about \$300,000, Davel said.

Davel suggested this be discussed in 2025 as part of a CIP project to give officials time to devise alternatives to help reduce the estimated costs.

Kautza reminded committee members the new roof at the Crawford Center will see a savings of \$100,000 due to not going with the alternate bid for additional insulation. Part of all of this could be used for the library roof or siding at Lakeland Industries, he said.

Menominee Reservation survey to assess economic conditions

An economic assessment of the Menominee Indian Reservation is the subject of an online survey that will continue to seek input through Sept. 30.

The assessment is based on ongoing progress from the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin strategic plan, specifically the economic chapter.

This survey will collect community input to previous studies and strategic directions as well as assess the current economic conditions.

The survey includes 12 questions, which will include qualitative responses as well as quantitative scores and values. This will take about 10-15 minutes to complete.

The goal is for the

Menominee community to have an overall sense of stability and well-being in alignment with the Menominee culture and needs.

The targeted service area for the project is the Menominee Indian Reservation. The reservation and Menominee County, a designated Persistent Poverty County, share nearly coterminous external boundaries. It measures about 365 square miles. The reservation size is 235,523 acres and is heavily forested, representing the largest single tract of sustained yield managed timberland in Wisconsin.

Heavy rain, flooding can contaminate private wells

Don't let the recent spell of hot weather fool you – heavy rains and flooding remain a distinct possibility this summer.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) encourages private well owners to consider testing their drinking water after significant rainfall and flooding. Heavy rains, such as those that swept through much of northern Wisconsin in July, can impact drinking water quality.

Flood waters and runoff contain bacteria and other contaminants that can affect private water supplies and cause the spread of waterborne illness. Wells located in pits, basements and low-lying areas are especially susceptible to contamination.

Well owners who experience flooding or observe changes to the taste, color

or sediment levels in their water following heavy rainfall should assume their well is contaminated and take the following steps:

- Stop drinking the water and find an alternate source of safe water.
- Disinfect your well.

This procedure is best done by a licensed well driller or pump installer with the expertise and equipment.

- Before resuming water consumption, sample the well after pumping and disinfection to ensure safety.

Even without obvious signs of flooding, a well can become contaminated. The DNR website provides information on how to test and disinfect a private well after a flood event.

Private well owners are encouraged to test their wells annually for bacteria and nitrates to ensure the water is safe to drink. The

DNR's wells webpage provides more information on bacteriological contamination of drinking water wells

and lists of licensed well drillers, pump installers and labs certified to analyze water samples.
