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Trial in 1976 murders probable next summer

Judge rebuffs daughter unhappy with slow progress

MARINETTE — It will probably be almost a year after the arrest of a Lakewood man, charged with two 1976 murders in Marinette County, before his trial can be scheduled.

The slow course of justice provoked an outcry from a family member and a stern rebuke from the judge Friday.

Raymand L. Vannieuwenhoven, 82, was arrested March 14. Authorities said a test of his DNA matched evidence found on the body of Ellen Matheys, who was sexually assaulted and killed at the McClintock Park campground in July 1976. Her boyfriend, David Schuldes, was also shot and killed.

During a status conference in Marinette County Circuit Court, District Attorney DeShea Morrow told Judge James Morrison that volumes of evidence have been sent to the defense team with more to come, including investigative reports from the sheriff's office that still need to be scanned in and information about DNA testing that the defense recently requested.

"It is quite voluminous, as the court I'm sure is aware, and so we're diligently working on that. But we'll need additional time to get everything to the defense," Morrow said.

Saying he understands that "with an investigation that spans literally decades, there's undoubtedly a lot of material," Morrison asked Morrow how much more time she needs.

When she answered 60 to 90 days, the defendant's grown daughter gave an audible groan and expletive, then muttered to a companion, "It's been a year already."

Morrison interrupted the proceedings to warn the woman.

"Ma'am, if there's one more sound out of you, I'm going to exclude you

from the courtroom," the judge said. "This is a court, and you're not going to be disrespectful. I understand that you're under stress, like lots of other people in this room are, but you will be respectful to the participants, and most importantly to the court. Do you understand that?"

Appearing with lead defense attorney Travis Crowell via closed-circuit television from the county jail, Vannieuwenhoven did not visibly react to his daughter's outburst and remained silent during the half-hour court hearing.

"I'm a little concerned about a 60- to 90-day time frame, but I do understand there's a lot here," Morrison told the attorneys. Defense attorney Lee Schuchart agreed that 90 days would be appropriate for scheduling the next status conference.

"Do we have any sense yet how long the trial will take?" the judge asked.

"Well, we're talking weeks, not days," Morrow said. Neither attorney was willing to actually schedule a block of time for the trial, but Morrow said they "had ballparked maybe

in the summer of 2020" from the beginning.

Schuchart said the defense wasn't ready to rush into the trial and suggested that scheduling of trial dates be delayed until after a motions hearing early in the new year.

"If you got the impression I was trying to rush you, you got the wrong impression. I'm not. But I'm looking at a man sitting in an orange suit who's presumed to be innocent," Morrison said.

The parties agreed to meet at 1 p.m. Jan. 7 for another status conference, and Morrison reserved Feb. 20 for a motion hearing with room on the schedule to take the entire day if necessary.

"It is my intention based on the motions that when they are concluded on the 20th, we will then actually schedule a trial date," he said. "I'm trying to assemble a realistic schedule recognizing the seriousness of the case and the large amount of evidence that's available, but keeping your feet to the fire at the same time."

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Man accused of firing weapon at officers

He's also charged with fighting during arrest

OCONTO — A Suring man was being held on \$150,000 cash bail after he allegedly shot at sheriff's deputies during an incident at his parents' house Sept. 25.

Joshua B. Steadman, 28, faces

three felony counts of recklessly endangering safety, two counts of battery to a police officer and one count of strangulation-suffocation, along with five related misdemeanors.

According to a criminal complaint, Deputy Cullen Morrissey and Lt. Matt Morrissey responded after receiving a report that Steadman had choked and struck a woman during an argument, which began after she found him at a tavern when he was late coming home.

When the officers came to the home

in the town of Breed to talk to him about the incident, Steadman allegedly shouted at them to go away and, when they tried to approach the house, fired a shot that hit the ground about 24 feet from them, the complaint said.

A few minutes later, he reportedly came out onto the porch unarmed. But when they told him he was under arrest, he tried running back into the house and had to be wrestled to the ground as he kicked and punched the officers, according to the complaint.

During an appearance in Oconto

County Circuit Court the next day, Judge Jay N. Conley set the cash bond and said that if he were to post bail, he must maintain absolute sobriety and enter no taverns; he can have no contact with the woman, and there can be no firearms on the property where he is staying. If he is released, Conley ruled that he must be on a GPS monitor.

Conley adjourned the initial appearance until 2 p.m. Oct. 17.

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Gillett's journey to cityhood

Community invited to Diamond Jubilee Oct. 5

GILLETT — The year was 1944. FDR was president, and World War II was raging.

A loaf of bread cost 10 cents, and a gallon of gas was 15. Locally, 1944 marked a turning point for the village of Gillett; this was the year Gillett incorporated as a city.

The city adopted a mayor/aldermanic form of government with three wards – a governmental structure still in effect today, 75 years later.

The city of Gillett will celebrate its incorporation with a Diamond Jubilee celebration on Saturday at Zippel Park. It's Homecoming week for Gillett High School, and the Diamond Jubilee is just one more way for Gillett residents to show pride in their community.

The celebration begins at 10:30 a.m. with wagon rides through Gillett, kids' activities and a brat and burger fry at the food stand. A corn-hole tournament starts at 1 p.m., with registration for two-person teams at noon.

A pig roast with all the fixings will be served 5-7 p.m. in the Expo Build-

ing. Advance tickets are \$12 and \$5 for ages 4-12. Tickets are available at Gillett Handiworks, Gillett Shell, The Cracked Cup, and Dr. Drake's office. Tickets at the door are \$15 for adults and \$7 for kids.

According to "The History of Gillett," written by Marie Darrow, Native Americans were the first inhabitants in the Gillett area. The first U.S. government deed dates back to 1856 when present-day Gillett was part of a vast area called the Town of Stiles. As more settlers arrived, the town was divided into separate municipalities.

The city is named after Rodney Gillett, one of the earliest white settlers in the community. Gillett held its first election in 1868, and Rodney was elected town chairman. He was also the town's first postmaster and used his home as the first post office.

With a population of 400 residents, Gillett incorporated as a village in 1900. Forty-four years later, Gillett incorporated as a city. In those four decades, Gillett's popula-

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tion skyrocketed, growing over 300 percent, to 1,253 residents.

Louis Zahn, who previously served as village president, became Gillett's first mayor. The city initially rented office space at physician Dr. L.H. Baldwin's office, and the City Council met at the Village Hall. The city built a municipal building in 1953 on land that was part of City Park.

The historic buildings on Gillett's Main Street today provide a glimpse

of Gillett's rich history. The city has changed over time yet remains true to long-standing values of friendliness, prosperity, and community. With a population of 1,303, the city of Gillett offers amenities often found only in larger cities, including garbage and recycling pickup, police and fire departments, community organizations, beautiful parks, a sports complex, churches, a medical clinic, and a K-12 public school.

'Live, Work, Play — Bay to Nicolet'

County Board passes vision statement; mission statement next

OCONTO — After thinking and brainstorming for more than a year, the Oconto County Board last month passed a vision statement for county government, the second-to-last step in a yearlong process designed to define the county's mission.

The process, shepherded by Dale Mohr, economic development educator with the local University of Wisconsin Extension office, yielded a statement that talks about Oconto County as a welcoming destination

with a "commitment to highways, public safety and mix of urban and rural housing (that) makes it a safe and affordable place to begin, raise a family, be an empty-nester or retire."

Mohr said the last step in the process is to generate a mission statement that is more direct than a vision statement and often leads to a tagline, a working slogan or call to action.

"Really, it's a culmination of all the work that's been done before," he said during the board's Sept. 19 meeting.

The purpose of the mission statement is to clarify exactly what the organization's purpose is, who it serves and why.

"A vision is really where you want to go, and it can be lengthy. A mission statement is going to be more direct. It's going to define

who you are as an organization so there's no question to that," Mohr said. "You have multiple aspects to your organization. You have different departments. So we really want to clarify for the public when they hear a mission statement coming from Oconto County, it's the Oconto County supervisors."

The proposed mission for Oconto County: "The mission of the Oconto County Board of Supervisors is to ensure reasonable services while providing oversight to each department and the county's resources so that residents and visitors can have a great place to live, work and play from the shores of Green Bay to the Nicolet National Forest."

The tagline is an echo of the statement: "Live, Work, Play — Bay to Nicolet."

The draft mission statement will be considered by the County Board in October and sent to the Finance Committee for another review before coming to the board for final approval, probably in December.

Mohr said Kevin Hamann, the county administrative coordinator, told him a couple more months of waiting for the mission statement is OK, "because we haven't had one for over a hundred years."

Supervisor Rose Stellmacher thanked Mohr and others who have contributed to the process.

"This has been a team effort. There have been many supervisors as well as staff that put the time and effort into doing this," Mohr said in acknowledgement.

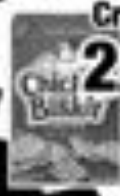

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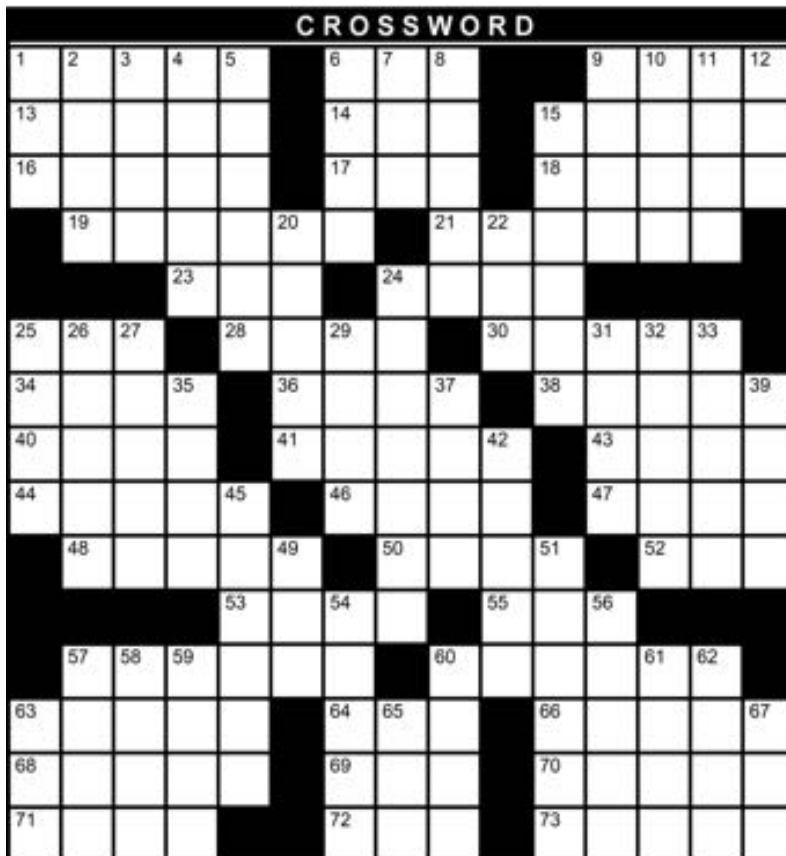

Five years as HSHS St. Clare Memorial Hospital

Oconto Falls facility has benefited from Health Sisters connection

OCONTO FALLS — The life of St. Clare of Assisi mirrors that of her more well-known townsman, St. Francis, according to Chris Brabant, CEO of HSHS St. Clare Memorial Hospital in Oconto Falls.

"They grew up in a privileged family; they had their lives set for them," Brabant said. "They came from noble families, wealthy families,

and St. Clare like St. Francis felt she had more to give to the world. She gave up all of her wealth and the 'good life' to follow the teachings of St. Francis to serve people, especially the poor and underprivileged and the sick."

The Oconto Falls hospital, formerly Community Memorial Hospital, recently celebrated the fifth anniversary of becoming fully integrated into the Hospital Sisters Health System — based in Springfield, Illinois — and taking the name St. Clare.

All of the HSHS hospitals are named after people who followed the teachings of Francis of Assisi, said David Lally, director of business development and advocacy for the

system's Eastern Wisconsin Division, which also includes St. Vincent and St. Mary's in Green Bay, along with St. Nicholas in Sheboygan.

"The board members we had at the time who spent a lot of time down with the Sisters in Springfield, the story of St. Clare really resonated with them," Lally said.

The connection with the larger organization has been a big plus for the community, said Brabant, who was appointed president and CEO in July 2018 to succeed Dan DeGroot, who was chief operating officer for the first four years as part of HSHS.

As part of the larger system, the hospital has had the resources to invest in physical improvements to the

hospital campus and all of St. Clare's rural health clinics.

"We've put in well over \$8 million investment in the last five years in the infrastructure, in the form of technology, information systems, the hospital itself and the new hospital rooms, the rural health clinics and the technology at their fingertips," Brabant said. "It's that technology in conjunction with all of the specialists brought into the area, so instead of people from Oconto County having to travel to a larger city, they can get a lot of that care locally."

A number of the doctors grew up in the area and came back to serve their communities, including Brabant.

"I grew up in Green Bay, but my father and his entire family grew up in Oconto County," he said. "I spent a lot of time here as a kid, especially, so it's wonderful to be back. When you walk through the doors of this hospital, you get the sense of how much people really care about caring for their own."

The turnover rate is exceptionally low, he added.

"Once people start working here, they stay here, which is huge, because then that adds to the expertise," Brabant said. "You're not constantly churning people and continually having to retrain; instead, you could put those resources toward enhancing the knowledge that they have."

Within months of the name change, the Medical Services Building opened on the HSHS St. Clare campus. It houses Prevea Health specialty care, the HSHS St. Vincent Hospital Cancer Center, the HSHS St. Vincent Dialysis Center and Advanced Pain Management.

The dialysis center is a new service that was added as a result of the HSHS affiliation and the Medical Services Building construction. Prior to this, many patients in the Oconto County region had to travel to Green Bay for dialysis care.

"It's a way of bringing that high level of care to those patients who needed it the most right into the area," Lally said.

Other advancements include telemedicine capabilities and Telestroke, which allows a specialist in Green Bay or other hospitals to fully monitor an emergency patient.

When a person having a stroke arrives at St. Clare's emergency room, within moments they can have access to a neurologist who can examine and monitor the patient in partnership with the ER staff, receive immediate care and, if necessary, be transported to a more specialized facility in Green Bay.

Such technology is vital given a growing shortage of doctors, especially in the sub-specialty areas like neurosciences, Brabant said.

"If you have these highly specialized doctors who do these procedures in a place where they can immediately evaluate a patient, you essentially bring their service within range of the entire Oconto County area," he said.

Lally noted that St. Clare was able to fund fully both of its high-tech monitoring units with grants, another example of the value of the HSHS partnership.

"As part of a system, we were

able to tap into the grant writer who serves all the hospitals within our division," Lally said. "Quite honestly,

that would have been quite difficult to do without an actual grant writer, because that's a unique set of skills."

Other changes in the last five years include the additions of a Regional Wound Care and Hyperbaric Center and Regional Surgery Center. A new welcome center and chapel have also been built.

The anniversary is being marked with a variety of internal and external celebrations, including a picnic that featured Brabant in a dunk tank.

"Joy is one of our core values, and it's something we don't just talk about. We see it from the highest level of leadership," Lally said. "We really like to celebrate internally with our colleagues and doing something fun — there's always a meal, which I like, and putting our CEO in the dunk tank."

"Yes, I was in a dunk tank — many, many times," Brabant noted.

Coming up is the third annual Treat and Greet Oct. 29, an open house that gives the community a chance to tour the hospital and Medical Services Building by personnel, many of them in Halloween costumes.

Thomas L. Zeise, 32, Cecil, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and was bound over on a charge of possession with intent to deliver THC, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Feb. 25. Arraignment was scheduled for Oct. 30.

Proceedings of Sept. 20

Diann L. Moeller, 53, Oconto Falls, waived her right to a preliminary hearing and pleaded not guilty to possession of methamphetamine (second and subsequent offense), possession of narcotic drugs (second and subsequent offense), possession of THC (second and subsequent offense), in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred May 23. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for Oct. 18. In another case, an Oct. 7 preliminary hearing was scheduled on bail jumping and four other felony charges that arose after a search warrant was executed at her home Sept. 6, related to the manufacture and delivery of methamphetamine.

After a preliminary hearing Curt Porath, 48, Oconto, was bound over on charges of manufacture and delivery of amphetamine, possession of methamphetamine precursors, bail jumping, possession of paraphernalia to produce methamphetamine, possession of methamphetamine waste, possession of methamphetamine, in connection with incidents that allegedly occurred Jan. 1 and Sept. 6. A Sept. 26 jury trial was removed from the calendar, involving two counts of manufacture or delivery of methamphetamine, in connection with incidents that allegedly occurred March 21 and March 22, 2018. Arraignment on the new charges was scheduled for Oct. 17, along with a status conference on the 2018 charges.

Brennan M. Covert, 33, Gillett, pleaded no contest to misdemeanor charges of possession of THC, criminal damage to property, and disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that occurred Dec. 20. The drug charge was originally filed as a felony. Judge Michael T. Judge placed Covert on probation for two years, during which he must maintain absolute sobriety and full-time employment. He may have contact with the victim only

with the consent of his probation agent, and he must undergo an alcohol and other drug abuse assessment, as well as anger and domestic abuse treatment, following through on any and all recommendations.

Brittney M. Rankel, 30, Green Bay, waived her right to a preliminary hearing and pleaded not guilty to charges of burglary and misappropriating ID information to obtain money, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred June 21. Her next court appearance was scheduled for Nov. 14.

After a preliminary hearing Gary G. Rosek, 65, Mountain, was bound over on a charge of operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated (seventh offense), in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Aug. 24. Arraignment was scheduled for Oct. 17.

Proceedings of Sept. 19

Douglas Lee Kluth, 66, Green Bay, was sentenced to prison for six years and six months, followed by four years of extended supervision, for his 10th conviction of operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated in connection with an incident that occurred Feb. 27. Judge Michael T. Judge ruled that Kluth can be eligible for the Substance Abuse Program, under which inmates can earn reduced time upon completion, but not until after he has served at least five years in prison. Terms of the extended supervision include that he maintain absolute sobriety and that ignition interlock systems be installed in his vehicles.

After a preliminary hearing Aaron Hames Haun, 43, Abrams, was bound over on two counts first-degree sexual assault of a child younger than 13 and one count of false imprisonment, in connection with incidents that allegedly occurred April 1 and July 19. Arraignment was scheduled for Oct. 17. A defense request to reduce bond — currently set at \$100,000 cash — was denied.

After a preliminary hearing Travis K. Smith, 35, Oconomowoc, was bound over on charges of second-degree recklessly endangering safety, operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated (sixth offense) and misdemeanor operating while his driver's license was revoked, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Aug. 30. Arraignment was scheduled for Oct. 17.

Emerson K. Reed III, 33, Green Bay, pleaded not guilty to charges of misappropriating identity information to obtain money and misdemeanor resisting or obstructing an officer and operating a motor vehicle while his license was revoked, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Sept. 24, 2018. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for Oct. 17.

Glen T. Vanlannen, 21, Mountain, pleaded no contest to a misdemeanor charge of taking and driving a motor vehicle without the owner's consent,

in connection with an incident that occurred Sept. 14, 2018. The charge was originally filed as a felony. Judge Jay N. Conley accepted a deferred judgment agreement, withholding a finding of guilt and suspending the case for eight months, during which Vanlannen must abide by the terms of the agreement.

Proceedings of Sept. 18

Christopher M. Hatfield, 50, Wabeno, was sentenced to five years in prison, followed by four years of extended supervision, for repeated first- or second-degree sexual assault of the same child. Judge Michael T. Judge ordered that Hatfield have no contact with the victim or the victim's family, and he may have no contact with anyone under 18 except family members without prior agent approval. Hatfield also must participate in and successfully complete sex offender treatment and follow through with recommendations. He is ordered to comply with the Wisconsin Sex Offender Registry.

After a preliminary hearing Christopher M. Earley, 44, Oconto, was bound over on charges of second-degree sexual assault and misdemeanor disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Dec. 16, 2018. In a separate case, Earley is charged with injury by intoxicated use of a motor vehicle and injury by use of vehicle with a prohibited blood-alcohol content, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Jan. 26. Arraignment on the assault case and a status conference on the intoxication case were scheduled for Oct. 31.

Frank R. Thorpe, 34, Sobieski, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and was bound over on charges of possession of narcotic drugs and misdemeanor resisting an officer and possession of drug paraphernalia, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred July 1. Arraignment was scheduled for Oct. 17.

Proceedings of Sept. 17

Wyatt J. Wheelock, 22, formerly of Keshena, was sentenced to three years in prison followed by three years of extended supervision for burglary to a building or dwelling in connection with an incident that occurred May 29, 2017. Judge Michael T. Judge ordered that the sentence be served consecutive to any prison terms from other counties. Online court records indicate he is serving a 21-month sentence from Brown County for escape and has cases awaiting sentencing in Shawano and Langlade counties.

Earl Stone, 28, Oconto Falls, was sentenced to 18 months in prison followed by two years of extended supervision for possession of narcotics drugs (second or subsequent offense) in connection with an incident that occurred July 28, 2018. Among conditions of the extended supervision, Judge Michael T. Judge ordered that Stone

maintain absolute sobriety and complete an alcohol and other drug abuse assessment, following through with any and all recommendations.

Krystal I. Hardy, 37, Pound, was placed on three years of probation for two counts of possession of methamphetamine, in connection with an incident that occurred April 5. Judge Michael T. Judge ordered the probation after he imposed and stayed an 18-month prison term followed by two years of extended supervision. Conditions of probation include that she serve six months in the county jail, maintain absolute sobriety and complete an alcohol and other drug abuse assessment with follow through.

Bruce J. Carr, 65, Oconto Falls, entered an Alford plea of possession with intent to deliver THC, maintaining his innocence but conceding the state may have enough evidence to convict, and was found guilty in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Feb. 8. A second charge of maintaining a drug trafficking place was dismissed but will be read into the record at sentencing, which Judge Jay N. Conley scheduled for Oct. 31. He also ordered a presentence investigation.

Judge Jay N. Conley accepted a deferred judgment agreement for Laurel Carr, 59, Oconto Falls, after she pleaded no contest to a charge of maintaining a drug trafficking place in connection with an incident that occurred Feb. 8. He suspended the case and placed her in the Oconto County VIP (Volunteers in Probation) program for one year.

Salvatore M. Ortiz, 25, Oconto Falls, pleaded no contest to charges of fleeing an officer and misdemeanor resisting/obstructing an officer, in connection with an incident that occurred March 2. Judge Michael T. Judge scheduled sentencing for Oct. 31 and ordered a presentence investigation.

Travis J. Gagnon, 21, Oconto, pleaded no contest to misdemeanor possession of THC in connection with an incident that occurred April 14 and was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail. The charge was originally a felony count but was amended in a plea agreement.

Francois-Xavier Brandon Marin, 26, Green Bay, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and was bounded over on charges of fleeing or eluding an officer while driving and misdemeanor resisting or obstructing an officer, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Sept. 4. Arraignment was scheduled for Oct. 17.

Proceedings of Sept. 16

Chalone P. VanHulle, 39, Green Bay, was sentenced to 18 months in prison, followed by two years of extended supervision, for possession of methamphetamine, in connection with an incident that occurred Nov. 4. A charge of manufacture/delivery of methamphetamine was dismissed but read into the record. Judge Jay N.

Conley gave VanHulle credit for 275 days already served and ruled that she is eligible for the Substance Abuse Program, which allows for reduced time upon completion. During extended supervision she must obtain and maintain full-time employment and maintain absolute sobriety. A no-contact order with two individuals was also given.

Jason Michael Seckel, 22, River Falls, was placed on two years probation for fleeing an officer in his vehicle (repeat offender) in connection with an incident that occurred Dec. 7. Judge Michael T. Judge imposed and stayed an 18-month prison sentence, followed by two years of extended supervision, before imposing the probation, which includes 212 days in county jail consecutive to a 132-year Brown County jail term. During his probation Seckel must maintain absolute sobriety and undergo an alcohol and other drug abuse assessment, following through with the recommended treatment and counseling.

Nathan M. Kollman-Depner, 17, Oconto, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and was bound over on two counts of criminal damage to property, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred May 4. Arraignment was scheduled for Oct. 17.

Mark A. Katt, 60, Sheboygan, waived his right to a preliminary

hearing and was bound over of charges of operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated (fifth or sixth offense) and three counts of OWI causing injury, in connection with a crash that occurred July 14. Arraignment was scheduled for Oct. 17.

Painted ladies rolling into town

Butterflies begin migration, may stop at garden near you

Chances are, over the past few weeks, you have noticed and observed the amazing migration of painted lady butterflies in your late season garden. An explosion in the painted lady population this year has led to massive numbers of these beautiful, medium sized orange, black and cream colored butterflies.

Like monarchs, painted ladies are migratory and what we are seeing is a huge boom in the population on their journey south.

Late season nectar plants in the garden attract large numbers of painted ladies to their rich and nutritious food source. Especially attractive to painted lady butterflies late in the season are sedum, asters, black eyed Susans, coneflowers, hekenium, marigold, zinnia, cosmos and heliotrope.

In many locations, painted ladies have numbered in the dozens or even hundreds in some gardens where large numbers of plants are available for them to feast upon.

Painted ladies will continue their journey to the southern states, where many will overwinter.

Painted ladies, along with their close relative, the American lady, are especially abundant now in early autumn thanks to a lush and green year, due in part to all of the rainfall we experienced. Plentiful rain means plentiful host plants for the butterflies, and allows large numbers to breed and transform into adults late in the summer and early fall.

One of the painted lady's most important host plants is thistle. There is plenty of thistle in the wild, as many species can be found in our area. Some are native. Some are non-native. All help to feed painted lady caterpillars throughout summer and early fall. Be sure to leave a few thistles standing in your yard and garden to help these amazing butterflies.

On a recent visit to a friend's garden, I noted that one sedum plant alone boasted nearly 50 painted lady butterflies one morning this past week. It was truly a breathtaking sight to see so many beautiful insects fluttering and feeding on one plant.

The painted lady explosion of 2019 is a good example of why it is so important to include annuals, perennials and other flowering plants that bloom and provide nectar and pollen in the garden after Labor Day.

These butterflies will continue to migrate south through the state over the next few weeks until colder weather finally moves in.



Be sure to plant annuals, perennials and shrubs such as butterfly bush that bloom after Labor Day to help fuel the painted lady migration.

Gillett drops home M&O match to Crivitz

Mistakes hold Tigers back

GILLETT — Unforced errors haunted the Gillett High School volleyball team in a Marinette & Oconto Conference home loss to Crivitz on Sept. 24. Crivitz came away with a 25-17, 25-14, 25-20 win.

Whether it was a miscommunication or serving, setting or attacking errors, mistakes held Gillett back when it looked like it might take control on multiple occasions.

"We just had too many unforced errors. If we would have cleaned up the passing just a little bit. We weren't tipping to where we wanted to, we tipped right into them," said Gillett co-coach Brooke Schaal. "Just unforced errors, we have to clean those up and we would have been able to take a set or two from Crivitz because we were there."

After splitting the first eight points in the first set, Crivitz worked itself out to a 10-6 lead, with the last two points coming on a Gillett serving error and then a miscommunication that gifted Crivitz an ace.

Gillett senior Grace Wickman recorded a block kill before a Crivitz attack error and ace from Tiger junior Karissa Schaal brought the hosts

within one.

Crivitz regained momentum after a tip kill, and took the two points that followed to create a four-point cushion again.

The Tigers whittled the deficit back down to three with senior Sophie Horsens serving and help from a kill from sophomore Naomi Anker, but the Wolverines took advantage of another Gillett to flip the momentum again.

Gillett had to call its first timeout trailing 18-13, but wasn't able to turn things around. Crivitz built its lead up to eight and then split the rest of the points to take the first set.

The Wolverines kept the pressure on the Tigers in the second set, jumping out to a 10-4 lead.

Schaal had a handful of kills in the second set, but mistakes in between pushed Gillett further and further behind before eventually dropping the set.

"What allowed them to control and dictate those sets was great communication, and little (amount of) mistakes," said Wickman on Crivitz. "As for our team, we let mistakes tear us down."

"Our problem was, well talking is our biggest thing all the time, but we didn't comprehend quick enough where the ball was going," said Schaal, who led the team with 14 digs and 11 kills. "We don't process that in our mind and we don't look where their hips are when they are ready to hit and tip."

Despite Crivitz working out to another lead in the third set, Gillett didn't give up and found a way to fight back.

Schaal recorded most of the kills during the positive stretch of play that allowed the Tigers to tie the set at 10 and then work out to a 16-13 advantage.

"What changed in the final set was the way we communicated more and kept fighting," said Wickman. "We tried our best to limit our mistakes so we could go toe-to-toe with Crivitz."

But just when it looked Gillett might pull away and force a fourth set, Crivitz went on a 7-2 run to force a Gillett timeout.

The Tigers closed the deficit to one at 21-20, but the Wolverines claimed the next four points to finish off their sweep.

Sophie Horsens finished second on Gillett with five kills, while also contributing five assists and three digs. Junior Emily Umentum provided five assists and four digs, while junior Emelie Horsens and Anker had six and five digs, respectively.

"I feel like the main thing that keeps us from talking is positivity," said Schaal. "There's no positivity

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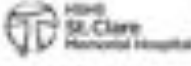
