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Marion man who strangled deputy gets 6 years in prison

Kohel found guilty after jury trial in June

SHAWANO — A Marion man convicted of strangling a sheriff's deputy was sentenced to six years in prison Wednesday in a Shawano County courtroom packed with his family and friends on one side and a standing-room only crowd of law enforcement on the other.

Chad R. Kohel, 46, was convicted after a jury trial in June of felony counts of strangulation and suffocation and battery to a law enforcement officer. The jury acquitted him of attempted homicide and criminal escape.

He was accused of strangling Shawano County Sheriff's Deputy Sandra Finger after a drunken driving arrest on July 27, 2018.

The court received numerous letters of support for Kohel attesting to his character, something the state conceded.

"He has a good character," District Attorney Greg Parker said.

However, Parker said, noting the findings of a pre-sentence investigation, Kohel has an alcohol abuse problem that made him irrational, violent and life-threatening.

"Mr. Kohel could have permanently taken the life away from a law enforcement officer and her family," he said.

Parker also cited statistics showing the dangers law enforcement officers face while trying to serve the community.

"Law enforcement officers put their lives on the line every single day," he said. "No law enforcement officer deserves to have what happened to Deputy Finger."

Defense counsel Jeff Haase acknowledged the severity of Kohel's actions and said Kohel takes responsibility for them.

However, he argued the stiff sentence recommended by the state was excessive compared to sentences

handed down in similar cases.

"We don't punish defendants more harshly because the victims are law enforcement officers," he said.

Kohel told the court he had made "a series of very bad choices," and that he blames himself.

"Both God and myself know that I have a deep and painful regret for having reacted the way that I did," he said. "I am sorry and I beg for your forgiveness."

In his testimony at the jury trial, Kohel maintained the altercation began when Finger grabbed his private parts while seat-belted him into the back of her squad car, even though the alleged grabbing could not be seen in Finger's bodycam video.

A struggle ensued with Finger either backing out or being pushed out of the back of the squad, followed by Kohel.

Kohel's arms were stretched out above the bodycam. The state maintained Kohel was choking Finger, while Kohel maintained he was pushing Finger away.

The bodycam recorded the sound of Finger gasping for air and finally gurgling before apparently falling to the ground.

Finger testified she had passed out as a result of Kohel choking her.

Kohel maintained he was pushing Finger away because she was attacking him and that the injuries could have been caused when his hands

slipped upward from her shoulders, where he claimed he was pushing, and inadvertently hit her throat.

In her victim impact statement filed with the court, Finger said she and her family have experienced ongoing psychological trauma as a result of the attack.

She also said Kohel does not seem to have any remorse over the incident.

"The defendant takes no accountability for his actions," she said in her statement. "I kept thinking, 'Is he remorseful?' I kept thinking about his children and how they would be affected. I did not want to send someone to prison to be away from their children, but since he is not remorseful, I do want him to go to prison."

Video showing the attack was replayed at Wednesday's sentencing hearing.

Judge William Kussel Jr. called the video "shocking" and called Kohel's actions "despicable."

He said the attack on a law enforcement officer has broader implications.

"The impact is not only on the victim, but on society," he said.

Kussel also noted that Kohel's blood-alcohol level was determined to have been about 0.39 percent at the time of the incident. The legal limit for driving is 0.08 percent.

Kussel agreed with the pre-sentence investigation conclusion that Kohel needed to be in an alcohol treatment program that could best be provided in a confined setting.

Kussel followed the state's recommendation for three years in prison and three years extended supervision on each of the two felony counts of strangulation and battery, with those sentences running consecutively.

Kohel was also sentenced to an additional 220 days for third-offense operating while intoxicated. However, he was given credit for the 433 days he has spent in jail since his arrest.

Prior to the jury trial, Kohel had pleaded no contest to misdemeanor charges of third-offense operating while intoxicated, operating after revocation and operating with a prohibited alcohol count.

City to take ownership of downtown SIST building Nov. 1

Long list of creditors complicated sale process for Shawano

SHAWANO — The city's acquisition of two blighted downtown properties from the Samanta Roy Institute of Science and Technology should be finalized by the first of next month now that the city's legal counsel has sorted through the problem of multiple third-party debtors that were complicating the sale.

The Shawano Redevelopment Authority reached an agreement with SIST in April to purchase the buildings at 214-216 S. Main St. for \$36,000, a price considered fair market value.

The RDA, a semi-independent panel tasked with addressing vacant and blighted buildings in the city, filed a condemnation petition in March against the long-vacant SIST properties at 214-216 S. Main St. and 143-145 S. Main St., citing building inspections that raised health and safety concerns.

The matter had been slated for a condemnation hearing in court, but an agreement was ultimately reached that called for the city to purchase the buildings at 214-216 S. Main St. and let SIST keep the properties at 143-145 S. Main St. for the time being in hopes of eventually rehabilitating them.

That agreement was complicated, however, by a host of other entities that held liens on the property, either through loans or mortgages or some other financial investment, or were owed money by SIST.

That includes the Shawano County Treasurer's Office, which is

owed \$905.74 in taxes.

Some creditors also changed over time. A debt owed to one of the banks was transferred to another bank and eventually to an investment fund.

Other debtors include Integrity Bank of Wausau, Southwest Guaranty LTD of Houston, Draeger Oil Co. of Antigo and MMG Financial Corp. of Ontario.

Also listed as creditors are two SIST subsidiaries and SIST itself in the person of Dr. Samanta Roy.

The total amount owed those entities was not available, but it will not change what the city is paying for the property.

It will be up a circuit court to decide how the proceeds are divvied up should the debtors decide to pursue legal action to reclaim a portion of the money.

Most of the hangup in closing the sale with SIST has been a matter of identifying creditors and notifying them, which has now been completed, according to City Administrator Eddie Sheppard.

"We think we've reached out to everyone," he said.

The city this week filed an award of compensation in circuit court that provides \$34,000 for the property at 214 S. Main St. and \$2,000 for the property at 216 S. Main St. and lists those entities certified as having any financial interest in the properties.

"We intend to cut this check and give it to the clerk of court to hang on to," Sheppard said. "We don't really get involved in how they distribute the funds. That's for the judge to decide."

Sheppard said the city expects to take possession of the property on Nov. 1.

He said it hasn't yet been determined what will happen to the property after that, though the building itself will come down.

Shawano looking at room tax hike

Increased revenue would go to community, park events

SHAWANO — City officials are contemplating an increase in the hotel and motel room tax aimed at generating more revenue to finance community events, particularly the Thursday night events at Franklin Park that were inaugurated this year.

Letters went out this week to hotel and motel operators informing them that the city was considering the idea, though it won't be taken up by the Common Council until next month's meeting.

City staff is recommending that room taxes be increased from the current 4.5% to 6% starting the first of the year.

That would mean an estimated increase in revenue for the city of about \$10,000 per year and a \$20,000 increase for the Shawano Country Chamber of Commerce, according to

City Administrator Eddie Sheppard.

State statutes require those revenues to be used for tourism-related events and event promotion.

The city and the chamber earlier this year agreed on a new split of room tax revenue, with the city retaining 30% and the chamber keeping 68%.

Hotels and motels collecting the tax get the remaining 2%.

The new room tax split generated about \$20,000 for the city this year.

"We're hoping to grow that to about \$30,000," Sheppard said.

Sheppard said the Thursday night events at Franklin Park have been very successful.

"The want to do even more is based on how positive the response was," he said. "It's something that caught on so quickly and we did so well, we want to continue the momentum."

The expected revenue increase

is currently being worked into the city's proposed 2020 budget, though that would change if the council doesn't give its approval.

"We're moving forward as we build our budget on the basis that this will be approved," Sheppard said. "If for some reason it doesn't move forward, then we'll have to make up for that through the general fund, through the levy."

Whether it comes from an increase in room taxes or the general fund, the city is already committing money to booking entertainment for Franklin Park events.

"We have to move forward to book our acts," Sheppard said.

"We've got to do that now. One way or the other, it's got to be paid for."

Sheppard said the city also wants to bring in consistent high quality entertainment for the park.

"We've had some ebbs and flows on quality," he said. "We'd like to

keep that kind of higher."

Sheppard said the city also wants to ensure a consistent lineup of vendors.

"That was one thing we heard," he said. "They'd have events where they had vendors and it was great, and then they'd have events where we didn't pay for vendors to come and provide food or anything and people would want that."

The additional revenue is also intended to help bolster other community events, such as ShawanoFest and the Holiday Stroll.

The maximum accommodation tax that can be collected under state law is 8%.

Chamber Tourism Manager Patti Peterson said the current 4.5% is much lower than what's charged in surrounding areas.

"A lot of areas are much higher than we are in this region," she said. "We're not nearly as high as a lot of areas are."

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Bonduel High School gets sizable donation of tools

Milwaukee Tools donates \$10K to \$15K of equipment

BONDUEL — Students in the technology education program at Bonduel High School will have a shorter wait time to use tools for their work after a donation from Milwaukee Tools.

"They're all power tools from skill saws to grinders, drills. The wide variety of tools Milwaukee Tools makes, they sent us," said Travis Schindel, who teaches middle school and high school technology and engineering.

Schindel said he'd heard about Milwaukee sending a donation of tools to another school, so he inquired as to whether Bonduel could also benefit. The answer was a big yes, as Schindel learned two weeks later when a pallet of tools was rolled into the shop.

The total value of the tools is somewhere between \$10,000 and \$15,000, Schindel said, so getting them for free is quite generous. The tools can be used for assembling wood projects, construction, metal fabrication, welding and engineering research and design.

When the students saw the boxes of tools in the shop, it was like Christmas had come early, ac-

cording to Schindel.

"The students were jacked right up, and they started tearing stuff apart to see what we got there," he said. "They were excited, and it just fires them up."

Schindel added that technology in some of the tools allows students to control them through apps on their cellphones. "We're teaching these students the latest technology with

these tools."

Milwaukee Tools have been a staple at Bonduel for many years, Schindel said, but most of the existing tools were basic items. What came on the pallet will help move the technology education program up a notch or two.

"We've always used Milwaukee Tools here, and they've always been great," Schindel said. "When I heard about the opportunity, I thought it would be good for us since we already use Milwaukee Tools."

News of the tool donation quickly swept through the community after the school district and the Shawano County Sheriff's Department posted pictures of students with the tools on social media.

"The community is like, 'Hey, this is awesome. This is what all businesses should be doing — partnering with schools, getting kids excited about the trades careers,'" Schindel said. "There's such a huge demand for the trades and technical skills. Companies stepping up are going to help drive that interest further."

Impeachment will be battle for Republican Party's soul

The grim demeanor of Washington has turned even grimmer in the last couple of weeks as questions abound as to whether President Donald Trump withheld money from the Ukraine government in order to obtain a political favor.

Impeachment talk is pretty much all that is coming out of the nation's capital. Democrats are at a fever pitch when it comes to demanding Trump be removed from office. The president himself has changed descrip-

tive phrases, calling it a "coup" now instead of a "witch hunt," which was his common refrain during Robert Mueller's investigation.

The latest Trump scandal involves a phone call to Ukraine's president and \$250 million in military aid from the United States. A whistleblower complaint claims Trump called Volodymyr Zelenskyy in July and solicited help in gathering potentially damaging information about Joe Biden, who is leading the field of Democrats running for president in 2020.

On Sept. 11, the White House informed government officials it was releasing the \$250 million to Ukraine after reviewing the best way to utilize the funding. The connection between the two events indicates the money was promised in exchange for dirt on Biden, say Trump's foes.

From all the chatter in Washington, it seems more likely than not that a vote to impeach will be inevitable.

However, I think the bigger question is, if the House of Representatives does vote to impeach the president, will there be enough senators willing to convict him? There's a Democratic majority in the House, so an impeachment vote is likely. But Republicans still control the Senate, and if Majority Leader Mitch McConnell stays true to form, getting the Senate to proceed with a trial and possible conviction seems like a harder sell.

First of all, let's look back at attempts to impeach U.S. presidents. So far, no impeachment attempts against

the leader of the free world have succeeded. Three have been made out of the 45 presidents who have been elected.

When it came to Bill Clinton, the Senate could only get 45 senators to convict on the perjury charge, and only 50 voted to convict for obstruction. The senators couldn't even get a majority vote, much less the two-thirds supermajority required to convict the president.

The only other impeachment that went to trial was Andrew Johnson in 1868. There were 11 charges against Johnson, but only three went to a vote. When the Senate could not reach that supermajority, the trial was adjourned, and Johnson stayed in power.

Of course, everybody knows about Richard Nixon's impeachment in the 1970s, but he resigned rather than go through a trial. I highly doubt that Trump will do the same.

Only 20 government officers faced impeachment proceedings, and of those, only eight were convicted and removed from office. All of those were federal judges. To succeed in ousting a sitting U.S. president would

be an interesting day in history. It's also a tremendous undertaking that not only requires all the ducks to be in a row, but also tagged, bagged and free of any blemishes.

To convict in this case will also require Republicans to shift their allegiance from the Grand Old Party to looking with an impartial eye. Right now, Democrats hold 45 seats in the Senate, so to reach a two-thirds supermajority will require getting both Independents to come aboard, as well as a minimum of 18 Republicans to stop looking at Trump as their patron saint and take him out to the woodshed.

Can that happen? It seems like an uphill climb when we look at how many times Republicans en masse have shrugged off Trump's previous statements, actions and shenanigans over the last few years, claiming it's nothing to lose our heads over.

Occasionally, a couple of Republicans have gone against the grain, but impeaching Trump will require more than the token freethinkers finding him guilty.

The thing to remember with impeachment trials is that they're not

like standard criminal trials. We're not dealing with 12 jurors who have little to no knowledge of what happened. We're dealing with 100 senators with most having an opinion about Trump and what he's done. The term "fair and impartial" will go right out the window if the House impeaches Trump.

To get a conviction, there will need to be more than guilt beyond a reasonable doubt.

There will need to be evidence so damning that anyone who would still think of Trump as a good and decent man would be laughed right out of office. Considering the political climate of today, I have my doubts as to whether there are enough Republicans who will step out of line and vote to convict the man they helped elect.

When it comes right down to it, impeachment will not simply be an indictment of Trump; it will be the blowing of the horn that signals the start of a battle for the soul of the Republican Party. Can that soul be saved? I doubt even the highest clergy knows the answer to that question.

PraiseFest donates \$2,560 to 2 groups

Honor flight, SAM's House receive funds

SHAWANO — PraiseFest, a one-day event sponsored by several area churches, has donated \$5,210 to two area charities, according to an announcement for Ann Wasmund, PraiseFest chairwoman.

The event, held Aug. 3 at the Memorial Park in Shawano, has given \$2,560 each to the Old Glory Honor Flight program and SAM's House, Shawano's homeless shelter.

Funds were raised with contributions from St. James Lutheran Church and other churches, business sponsorships, individual donations and Thrivent. A 50/50 raffle contributed \$506 when the winner donated the prize to the charities, she said.

"We thank the sponsor, donors, attendees and performers for their support they've given us," Wasmund said.

PraiseFest is a nondenominational gathering that includes music, prayer, games and food. Music ranged from traditional hymns to bluegrass, she said.

The purpose of PraiseFest is to "provide a Christian-based atmosphere for the community to come together and praise as one," Wasmund said. It is also a way for area

churches to give back to the community, she said.

The event is free and there is no count of the number of attendees, but she estimated at at one time there were at least 240 people on the grounds, with families coming and going throughout the day.

A bounce house and dunk tank were popular features, Wasmund said.

PraiseFest is held every two years, and Wasmund said she hopes more churches will become involved. St. James Lutheran Church, Shawano offers its space in case of rain, but the event is held in a public venue to encourage broad participation by other churches and the public, she said.

"We picked a neutral spot so everyone can partake," she said.

"As a planning group, we're going to look at the dates and location," Wasmund said, adding that the planners are considering holding the event earlier in the year. "The city is encouraging us to look at Franklin Park."

Anyone with an interest in planning PraiseFest 2021 can call St. James at 715-524-4185 and indicate an interest in the work group. Wasmund said the planners are open to suggestions and new ideas for coming years.

Evers visits devastated north woods

All sides agree
there's much work
left to be done

RIVERVIEW — A team of volunteers cleared more than 12½ miles of roads and trails during their first three days of a 10-day project in the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest, putting a bit of a dent into the daunting task still ahead as the forest recovers from a devastating July storm.

Hundreds of miles of roadway and trails were blocked, and campgrounds had to be closed for weeks, after a macroburst leveled huge swaths of forest in the north woods, part of a storm system that led to a federal disaster proclamation affecting 18 counties and two tribes.

More than 125 members of Team Rubicon — a coalition of military veterans, first responders and others who send volunteers into disaster areas to help with cleanup — arrived in the area Sept. 28 and were planning to work non-stop through Saturday to join the effort being coordinated by the U.S. Forest Service and the Oconto and Langlade County Forestry Departments.

When Gov. Tony Evers dropped by the Riverview Fire Department for a briefing Tuesday afternoon, Team Rubicon incident commander Maggi Thomas was able to report that by noon Tuesday, they had cleared 12.65 miles of roadway and removed 10,465 cubic yards of debris.

“That’s an extremely large amount to date, and it’ll only continue from here, we still have four days to work,” incident commander Maggi Thomas told Evers. “Our main goal is to at least get the main arteries open ... If we can get all of the trails that are technically ‘closed’ open, that’s a successful operation for us.”

A team of Americorps volunteers has also descended on the area and was working in collaboration with Team Rubicon.

“Americorps’ mission is to serve community needs and by working in a partnership, Team Rubicon does all the operations work and provides equipment, and we can work on our strength which is people,” Jeanne Duffy of Americorps told the governor.

“It’s really empowering both of our organizations to make our volunteer hours that much more effective,” said Adam Lemons of Team Rubicon.

Evers said “the really cool part” was seeing the cooperation and collaboration of the various groups.

“It just shows you how important volunteerism is to the state of Wisconsin,” he said.

Lemons said his organizations met with snowmobile clubs to determine their priorities before sending their crews to the north woods.

“We had about 150 hours of planning work before we had anyone here to make sure it was the most effective use of resources when we were here,” Lemons said. “It’s a donor-driven organization, so we wanted to be sure those donor dollars were being spent wisely.”

Gary Wagner, president of the Red Arrow Snowmobile and ATV Club, told Evers that the area lost five weeks of ATV season. State, county and utility crews worked with the clubs to get the ATV trails cleared of debris, but it still was the end of August before they could reopen.

Even so, the Forest Service is warning visitors that hazards remain

on much of the forest including trees laying on the ground in a multitude of directions, leaning trees, hanging branches and broken off trees and stumps.

“We kept hearing from our Facebook page and phone calls, ‘Gee whiz, why don’t you have it open yet, it’s been a couple weeks, etc.’,” Wagner said. “But now these same people are commenting after they get an opportunity to get up here and go for a ride in the back country and the woods and they’re saying ‘Oh my God, I guess I do

understand now. You have to get out in the woods to see the devastation.”

All of the speakers agreed that more than two months after the storm, there’s still plenty of work left.

“Nature won’t let us make any promises, but I don’t think that we’re done here,” Lemons said. “With the amount of devastation, this is unprecedented, and we’re already in the early phases of planning for some ongoing programs here in the area.”

Where there's smoke, there's training

Area firefighters learn to recognize and survive 'flashover'

SHAWANO — Area firefighters learned to recognize and survive flashover at a training exercise at the Shawano Fire Department building Sept. 28.

They experienced flashover, the sudden and simultaneous ignition of combustible materials, in a simulator from the Northeast Wisconsin Technical College's Fire Science Department.

Del Zuleger, an NWTC adjunct faculty member, explained that the two-tiered trailer "simulates the environment that gets firefighters killed. We want them to see what's going on before that happens and what to do about it."

Zuleger explained flashover is particularly dangerous as all of the combustible materials in and around the fire, such as hot gases and additional fuel usually near a ceiling, ignite at once without being touched by a flame.

The upper tier of the trailer hosts the fire — a burn barrel of wood and particle board "walls." The

trainees, in groups of about 10, sit in the lower level where they can see the four stages of the fire but remain below the flashover zone.

The height of the safety zone is very clear. Mark McClone, another NWTC adjunct faculty member, pointed out a distinct line on the trailer side. Above the line was creosote or unburned residue from the fire.

The trainees also observed different techniques in streaming water such as "pencil" for controlling the temperature of a fire, Zuleger said. McClone added that during a fire, control of airflow is another critical component. Ventilation and airflow control was another topic covered at the fire training.

Shawn Borlace, Shawano fire chief, said this was the third joint training for the three departments this year. Not only does the sharing reduce costs, Borlace said, "it builds trust and cooperation among the departments."

Pat Roberts, Keshena fire chief, agreed. "When we train together, everyone works a lot better together."

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Marcks reflects on carving career

Local artist exhibits at Miles of Art

GRESHAM — After 36 years, the carved wood duck had lost a little of its shine.

After being ushered into Larry and Annie Marcks' rural Gresham home with Annie's exclamation: "Oh, you brought one of the children home," Larry Marcks asked about the carved bird.

"Do you want me to make that look as good as new?" he asked.

The offer to renew the wood duck carving was quickly followed up with, "Want to see what I did 50 years ago?" and a search for the first carving he sold. He recently reacquired the duck when its owner

passed away.

Marcks applied furniture paste wax to the wood duck as he spoke about the evolution of his artwork. The creation, featuring his signature woodburning to reveal the woodgrain as feathers, had graced a living room display case since 1983. That put its creation roughly in the middle of his career.

Marcks, who specializes in hand-carved birds, has been a fixture of the Shawano County art community for decades and will again exhibit at the Old Feed Mill in Gresham during this weekend's annual Miles of Art event. Loons remain the most popular of his carvings, and he lamented that he won't have any for sale for the weekend exhibit because "I can't keep up with the demand." Swans are also very popular and are likewise currently unavailable.

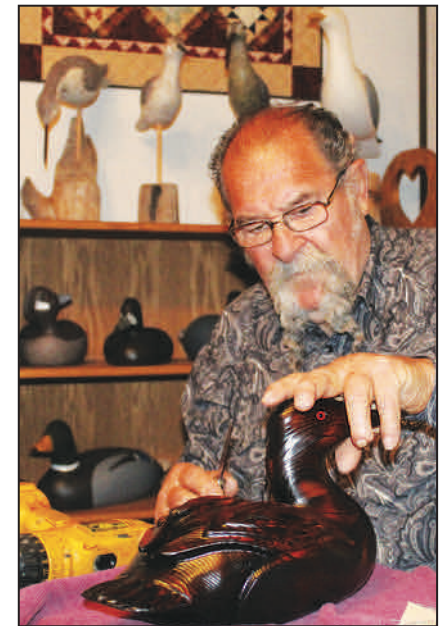
He maintained his approach of woodburning is still unique among

carvers and, "It's kept me carving all these years."

As he worked on the wood duck, he offered that reapplying wax or oil is the extent of his restoration efforts nowadays. "People used to bring me ducks to fix. But that takes longer than carving a new one," he said.

Marcks said his carvings have developed over the years. "I think I get things more exact," the carver said, adding he does many more species of birds than he did years ago. He also does drake and hen pairs for those species where the differences between the sexes are pronounced.

But he can still be challenged as he was with a recent commission from an "old fella in Alaska" to carve a brant, a type of goose. "I'd never done one before," he confessed. Fortunately, he found out from a woman who boards her horse with the Marckses that she had a mounted brant. He used the mount as a reference, and

the completed work now competes for space with other carvings on a sideboard in the Marcks' home.

The brant, a fairly large bird compared to a wood duck or a mallard, also posed a challenge in finding the right piece of cedar because Marcks has always carved his birds from a single block.

Finding those clear pieces of cedar is harder than it used to be, "especially if you're going to work with the wood like I do," he said. He added, "It's not just harder to find good cedar. What's harder is the seeing," in a play on words that acknowledges how his sight is not what it used to be.

Typically, he cuts blocks from freshly cut cedar logs, avoiding the heartwood. He then paints the ends with perhaps as many as 20 coats to

prevent cracking. He held his hands over the mid-section of a carving nearing completion. "You want the water to come out here, not on the ends," he said.

He then waits two to three years for the correct level of moisture. "I'm still very interested in seeing what that block of wood will look like" when it's carved, he said. He relies on a jackknife as his primary tool and said he's worn out more than a few over the years.

The septuagenarian said he's also learned how to do things more efficiently.

Although he says he's constantly asked, Marcks turns down requests to carve other species, like a moose or a deer. "I don't want to carve anything else," he said.

And the wood duck, indeed, does look like new.

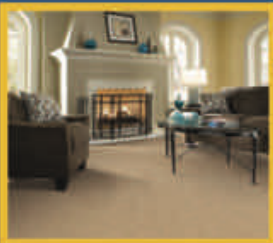


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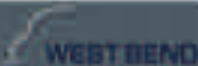

CULTURAL EXCHANGE

Clintonville High School gets visitors from sister school in Hankensbüttel

CLINTONVILLE — A group of high school students from Germany is about to wrap up a two-week stay with its sister school, Clintonville High School, carrying on a tradition that started 30 years ago.

"It initially started off as a class project where students wrote letters to Germany wanting to know if anybody would want to set up a sister school program, and they got a connection," said Steve Emslander, a social studies teacher at CHS that has coordinated the program for the last 20 years.

Arriving on Sept. 21, a group of 20 students and their chaperones have immersed themselves into local and Wisconsin culture, visiting Walker Forge and Seagrave in Clintonville, participating in the high school's homecoming activities this week, journeying to Madison and visiting the state capitol, learning about Native American ways with the Oneida Nation and, of course, finding out about the Green Bay Packers with a visit to Lambeau Field.

The students stayed with individual families to learn about American life outside school, as well. Once the students leave Sunday, they will spend almost three days visiting Washington, D.C., before

returning home to Hankensbüttel in Lower Saxony (Niedersachsen in the German language).

The German students said they took part in this year's visit for a variety of reasons. Bjarne Asmus said the trip was an opportunity to improve his English, and the improvement showed when he was interviewed Wednesday by the Shawano Leader.

"For me, I like to travel and to see a new part of

the world," Asmus said. "I'd never been to America, and it was good to be an exchange student."

Maximilian Haber, another one of the students, found it interesting traveling so far from where he was born.

"It was an adventure," he said. "I wanted to improve my English, too."

Jan Wasserscheidt's family is very familiar with American culture. He said his father's family had hosted an exchange student from the United States, and his father also got the chance to come to this side of the world.

Knowing that, Wasserscheidt was interested in seeing America for himself.

"We have stayed in contact with (the exchange student), and it was a great experience for (my father), so I wanted to do this, too," Wasserscheidt said.

Asmus said there are some differences to the way of life between the United States and Germany, "but it's not too different." He was interested in seeing Americans' interest in sports, noting that soccer clubs are a main attraction for his people, while football and baseball tend to grab Americans' interest.

"Here, sports is part of the school," Asmus said, explaining that sports in Germany are handled

through club programs.

Haber said he got to taste cheese curds for the first time here in Clintonville.

“At first, I thought it wouldn’t taste so good because it was hot cheese, and it wasn’t my thing,” Haber said. “but it ended up tasting delicious.”

The students were impressed with how there were many different places to eat in Clintonville. They pointed out that a community of Clintonville’s size in Germany would not have as many eating establishments — or businesses, for that matter.

“In our town, we only have maybe three grocery stores and three restaurants,” Wasserscheidt said. “Here, you have every fast food chain. We have to drive half an hour to find the next fast food chain (in Hankensbüttel).”

The differences in how the school system is structured in the United States was interesting to the students, too.

“Every teacher has his own room (here), and in Germany, every class has its own room,” Wasserscheidt said, pointing out that the teachers were the ones moving from class to class in between periods. “We also have big breaks, two of them. A 10 and a 12. You can relax and play maybe some soccer, something like that.”

The students were able to see a lot in their time here, but Asmus didn’t get to accomplish one wish.

“I would like to see a football game in a sta-

dium,” he said. “I often watch it on television in Germany, but the stadiums are big, and it would be fun to see one in a stadium.”

The sister school program has been beneficial to both sides, according to Emslander.

“It’s been an exchange of cultures and our ways of life, learning the language and developing friendships,” Emslander said. “A lot of them are still maintained from years ago. A student went over last time, and last summer, she was invited back. They traveled extensively in Europe.”

He added there was also an instance where a German student visited through the sister school program and later returned to Clintonville and stayed for a year.

After this year’s visit from their counterparts, Clintonville High School students will make the journey to Lower Saxony in 2020. Emslander said the students selected to participate will learn first-hand about how their German counterparts get their education, as well as visit places like Hamburg and Berlin.

For Asmus, one of the visiting students, he hopes his visit will encourage the people that he meets to one day visit his homeland.

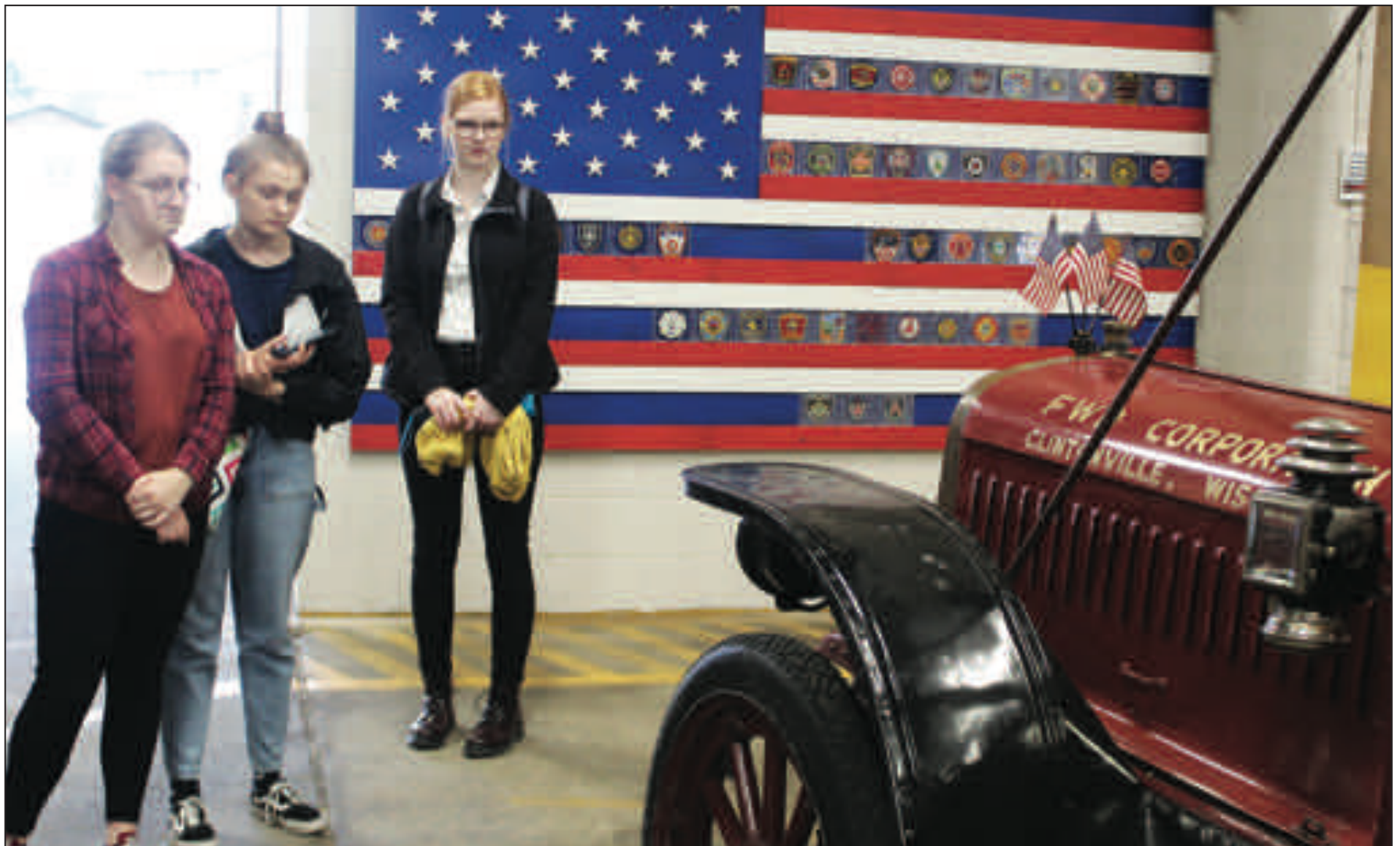
“We look forward to seeing some Americans come to us in the next year,” Asmus said.

BOWLER — The Gresham Community School volleyball team escaped with a five-set Central Wisconsin Conference-North Division victory over Bowler on Tuesday.

The Wildcats won by scores of 25-13, 25-18, 21-25, 21-25, 20-18.

A tip from senior Ireland DeRoos brought the hosts within one point of a big comeback win, but Gresham took the next three points on a kill from senior Karisa Nietzer and a pair of Bowler errors to go up 15-14.

After a timeout, a kill by Bowler senior Kayla Pecore tied the match before another Nietzer kill put Gresham ahead again. A Gresham attack error followed by an ace from senior Alyssa Strassburg gave Bowler a 17-16 lead and forced a Gresham timeout.

Strassburg nearly served another ace to end it, but nice defensive play by Gresham eventually led to the visitors taking the point. Another Bowler error gave Gresham the lead, but the Panthers tied it back up on a Wildcat error.

It was a pair of Bowler attack errors that gave Gresham the thrilling win and kept its perfect conference record alive.

“Even though we had our backs against the wall in the fifth set, we found a way and I can’t say enough about the way they just kept fighting until the end,” said Gresham coach Tim Wild.

“It was kind of frustrating, but you couldn’t show it. You had to be mentally tough and just push through it,” said Nietzer on the back-and-forth match.

Nietzer, who said mental tough-

ness and playing smarter helped the visitors take the fifth set, led the charge for the Wildcats all night, finishing with 34 total kills (28 attacks, 6 blocks), 13 service points and 11 digs.

Nietzer served a couple of aces to help the visitors grab a commanding lead in the first set. She capped the dominant first set with a kill and then added several more kills to give the Wildcats a lead in the second set.

A roller coaster of a hunt

Hunts can go down in several different fashions. Some end with you seeing tons of wildlife, while other times you're lucky to have a chipmunk run by.

My first two days of hunting my home property in Chippewa County were about as eventful as I could have asked for, with plenty of ups and downs across the many hours spent out in the woods.

After hunger foiled my doe encounter on Sept. 28, the following day was full of action.

The deer encounters started the minute I turned into our property, seeing a big doe standing under an oak tree that had littered the ground with acorns. My plan was to hunt down the path from where the doe stood, so I had to bump the deer walking in.

The dreary and overcast morning did not produce any other deer sightings, that is until I walked back to my truck.

I was prepared to run into another deer munching on acorns, but the doe, which I suspect was the same one I'd scared off, was further down the hill and presented no shot before bounding off.

For the next few hours, I pondered where to sit for the afternoon. I'd still not made a decision as I pulled back into the property around 4:30 p.m., but with a doe at the top of the hill eating acorns again, my decision was quickly made.

Seeing which direction the doe took off toward, I snuck into position, tucking my ground blind a bit into the woods on a large deer trail. As I always do when I'm comfortable in the blind, I drew my bow back to make sure I could maneuver around.

To my surprise, the arrow went flying into some thick brush in front of me. I looked down at my bow to see the D loop had snapped. Not being able to fit the release around the string otherwise, I rushed back to the truck and then back to my parent's place to get some new equipment.

After taking a few practice shots with the bow my dad typically uses and then grabbing two arrows, I

zipped back out to the property at about 5:45 p.m.

I brought a bucket with me because I wasn't thrilled with my blind setup, instead tucking under a dead tree on the other side of a UTV trail, about 15 yards from the blind.

I found an opening in the brush to my right, clipped my release through the D loop and patiently awaited the doe's return.

Sure enough, the doe came back at about 6:10 p.m., but instead of walking the UTV trail, she took the deer trail my blind was placed on. I was at full draw twice on her, but never had a clear shot.

I tried doe bleating with my mouth, but the doe was having none of it, eventually scurrying back where she came from.

Thinking my disastrous night was over, I debated heading home early, but forced myself to sit it out.

The fierce wind finally died around 6:30 p.m., and about five minutes later, I heard a loud pop behind me. I slowly turned to see a deer had snuck in behind me and was eating acorns.

The deer picked up its head, and with foliage in the background, I saw it was a buck. I didn't get a great glimpse at how big it was, but it sure got my heart pumping.

The buck slowly worked to the right, toward my blind, and when he was fully blocked out by thick brush, I decided to make a move with light fading.

I slowly stood up from the bucket before crouching down and inching forward (imagine a catcher moving ever so slightly before the pitcher throws the ball).

I got to the UTV trail before seeing the buck again. Still behind too much brush for a shot, I knelt down and slowly started crawling forward (I was on my knees, using my right hand to scoot forward and left hand to grip the bow).

I saw the buck nearing a wide oak tree, and I decided when he stepped behind it would be the perfect time to make my last move.

As the deer's head moved behind the tree, I moved a couple more feet and drew the bow back. The deer emerged from behind the tree, and seeing me, stopped broadside.

As I lined up on his vitals, I glanced up at his head to see how big a buck this really was, only to be deflated when I saw it was small.

My heart sank, and at that moment, I determined I was going to pass on the chip shot. Going into the season, I told myself any buck that got my heart pumping was big

enough for me, and this buck didn't fall into that category.

Almost like it was taunting me, the deer stood broadside for another minute before going back to eating. Wanting to head home, I tried rustling leaves to shoo the buck off, but he was only focused on stocking up on acorns, so he stuck around.

After nearly five minutes of me trying to scare the buck, which was less than 10 yards from me, another deer that was also inside the chunk of timber took off running.

I made a last ditch effort to try and cut off that deer, and instead scared off a doe that I believe was the one I'd already seen four times that day.

Some might call my Sunday full of close but failed deer encounters a nightmare, but it was an absolute blast and ranks among my favorite hunts ever.

The hunts taught me several lessons, with the biggest being to not be afraid to get aggressive if the right situation arises.

With a new D loop on my bow and a week of planning having running its course in my mind, I'll be trying to harvest my first-ever bow deer under the oak trees this weekend.

John Reinke Sr. Memorial Golf Outing sets new record

Nearly \$16,000 raised to benefit northeast Wisconsin athletic endeavors

BONDUEL — As 108 golfers filed into the clubhouse at Golden Sands Golf Course in Cecil on Aug. 17, J.C. Reinke knew it was going to be a memorable day. Not only were people there to help Reinke and his extended family honor the memory of his grandfather John Reinke Sr., but they were doing so by raising funds for athletic endeavors in northeastern Wisconsin.

The corporate, in-kind and individual donors, as well as the golfers, came together to rise above any initial fundraising expectations. When the final tally was made, the amount was \$15,840.

"We were really overwhelmed by the generosity showed by the communities we live in and around," said J.C. Reinke. "This amount will not only allow us to continue giving to the projects and supporting the annual needs from various athletic clubs and teams like we have for the last 27 years, but it will give us the boost we needed to explore other possible donations, like establishing annual scholarships for local athletes."

Since 1991, the fund has donated about \$150,000 to a variety of athletic endeavors, including: one-time athletic scholarships; equipment needs; facility upgrades, like new dugouts, press boxes, and basketball courts; and infield and lighting projects.

"Grandpa Reinke believed athletics should be a community-wide offering," added Stef Reinke, secretary of the memorial fund. "He was known for reaching out to other communities to work together on rec programs. He saw tremendous value in school and community-based teams for the sense of unity they built. This golf outing is just one way we can carry on the traditions he started, and we're so thankful to the many donors who make it possible each year. I can just picture how elated he would be, to know how much positivity and camaraderie comes out of something in his honor."

Reinke Sr. enjoyed a 40-year career as a teacher, principal, coach, athletic director and friend to the community. In addition to his commitment to the Bonduel School District, he served on the village board, in the Lions' Club,

the Civic Association and other groups while developing the recreation program for the village in his early years as a resident.

Reinke passed away in October 1991 from cancer, but his energy and generous spirit live on. Initially started by his children in 1991 to honor and continue Reinke's commitment to philanthropy, the golf outing has continued under the leadership of Reinke's grandchildren and family friends.

As in years past, funds will be distributed where needed throughout Bonduel and the surrounding communities.

The board of directors thanked the golfers, sponsors, donors and volunteers who make this event possible each year.
