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Clintonville cancels homecoming after stunt mocking Native Americans

Tribes, social media offended by four students imitating dance

CLINTONVILLE — Homecoming was abruptly canceled at Clintonville High School after a video showing student mocking a Native American dance during a lunchtime activity went viral on social media.

The 45-second clip, posted numerous times on various Facebook sites, showed four male students dancing around in a circle as a recording of Native American drumbeats played in the background during a lunchtime activity on Thursday.

Shortly after area media outlets started inquiring about the video, the Clintonville School District website showed that all homecoming events on Friday, including the football game, had been canceled.

Reaction to the video from the online community was immediate, and some on social media were less than civil, which prompted the school to put a hold on students for the day for their safety, according to Clintonville Police Chief Craig Freitag.

"That was essentially not allowing any outside activities on school grounds," Freitag said. "They were keeping the kids inside. There were some comments made on social media — no credible threats — to Clintonville School District, so they decided for the safety of students and staff that a hold should be put in place."

Freitag noted the school was not locked down, despite the chatter on social media claiming it was.

Representatives of local tribes were dismayed at what the students did.

Shannon Holsey, president of the Stockbridge-Munsee Band of Mohican Indians, said cultural appropriation is never acceptable, and what the students did negatively impacts the school and the community it serves.

"Quite honestly, the actions of these few students in the Clintonville School District demonstrated there is much more work to be done

on this issue in order to make sure there is an environment that is created and sustained in which students can reach their full potential and be one of acceptance and inclusion," Holsey said.

Native American tribes derive their cultural identity and spirituality from various rituals and practices like the drum circle and dances.

"The drum is an indicative practice and are religious and ceremonial and traditional things," Holsey said. "We are obviously highly offended in its misuse and its depiction inappropriately."

Holsey said she believes the students were "unaware" that their actions were racially offensive and would have caused such outrage. However, she wants school officials and community leaders in Clintonville to address the issue to try to avoid such a situation again.

Richie Plass, an enrolled member of the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin, agrees that much more needs to be done to educate schools, not just in Clintonville but across the state, about Native Americans and the values they hold dear.

He noted that Wisconsin Act 31 requires schools to educate all students about the state's 11 tribes, but Friday's action in Clintonville indicated to him that the school district is not adhering to the law.

"I've been dealing with this stuff for so long, and just when I think I've seen everything, you think, 'Oh, here we go again,'" Plass said.

Plass said he and his wife watched the Clintonville video several times, and they collectively had one question: Where were the parents in terms of explaining to their children that mocking other cultures is wrong?

"Where did these kids get the idea that it's OK to do this?" Plass said. "I would really like to know how them guys chose that song and chose to do what they did. How did they learn that, and who did they learn that from?"

He was surprised that the actions took place, considering Clintonville's

homecoming opponent was Fox Valley Lutheran and not one of the tribal high school teams.

"Why didn't they have a cross and play an opera or a song or a hymn from church and have a bunch of people dressed as the Apostles dancing around that cross to be funny?" Plass said. "That's basically what they did to us."

Plass has created a traveling exhibit that shows people the concern over having Native American mascots and culturally appropriating other Native American symbols and actions. He said he hoped to work with the Menominee Indian School District and contact Clintonville school officials and look at bringing the exhibit to the community.

Holsey was also interested in reaching out to the school district and providing some kind of educational forum to make people understand why the actions of the four students were viewed as racist and reprehensible. She noted that other school districts have come to her tribe requesting cultural education on Native Americans.

"We thought about taking a collective approach and having a community roundtable with tribal leaders, school officials, parents and students and educate them around who we are," Holsey said. "We want to take it a step further and look at eradicating these sorts of things because they've become deeply divisive and hostile."

A statement from the Clintonville Public School District was published on the district's website. In the statement, it says that "Non-American Indian students wrongfully created a disrespectful mockery of American Indian culture by imitating and misrepresenting an American Indian dance. The specific dance was not school approved nor sanctioned by the school or any District employee. Immediate initial action steps have been taken, including the cancellation of all Friday homecoming events."

Joshua Johnson loses bid for early release

Man who killed father was ruled insane in 2012

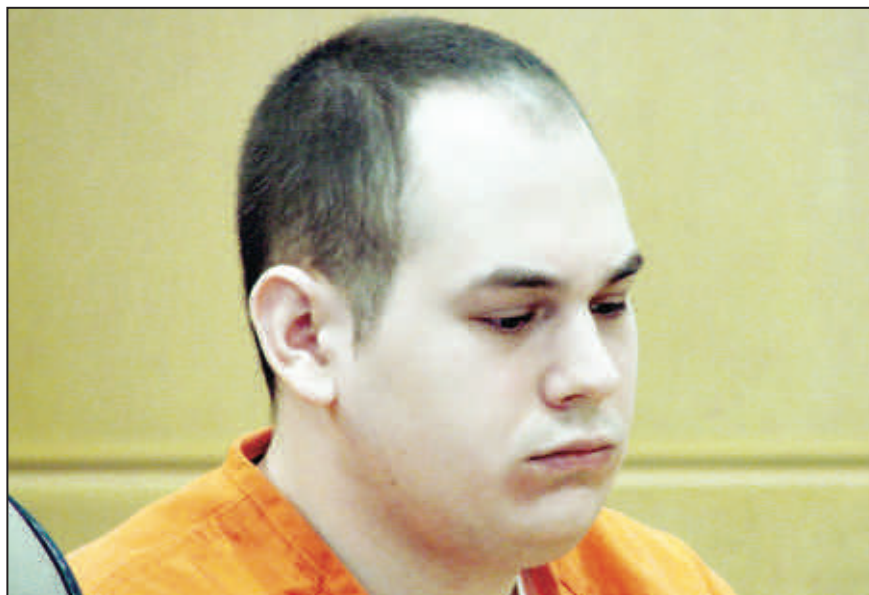

SHAWANO — A Wittenberg man committed to a mental institution seven years ago for murdering his father failed Monday to secure a conditional release after a hearing in Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court.

Joshua P. Johnson, 28, was committed after being ruled legally insane and not responsible for his actions in the Feb. 21, 2012 murder of Donald P. Johnson at their home in Wittenberg.

The elder Johnson was shot in the face and hand with a shotgun, then beaten with the butt of the shotgun until the gun broke in two. He was then attacked with a metal stove handle and a fillet knife and stomped on repeatedly, according to the criminal complaint.

The forensic pathologist who conducted the autopsy told investigators

that the elder Johnson bled to death.

Johnson claimed voices told him to kill his father.

Though committed for life, Johnson has the right to appeal for early release. He has petitioned several times but Monday was the first time any of

those petitions got as far as a court hearing.

Dr. Leslie Taylor, a psychiatrist who examined Johnson, said Johnson has improved since he was first incarcerated, but was still not ready for conditional release into a group home,

which is what Johnson was requesting.

She said Johnson had not fully availed himself of treatment opportunities and lacks the life skills for coping or dealing with stress.

Taylor said Johnson, who has been diagnosed as a paranoid schizophrenic, remains a threat to others if released.

Johnson, who participated in the hearing by phone from the Sand Ridge Secure Treatment Center in Mauston, said he is being helped by medication. He said he still hears voices on occasion but that they were non-violent.

"In the bottom of my heart, I hope nobody holds anything against me," Johnson said. "I am really trying to be a better person and learn from my mistakes and really, truly get better."

Judge James Habeck said it's clear that Johnson has made progress, but there has been no evaluation to determine how well he would be able to function outside of a controlled setting.

Habeck said he hopes Johnson continues to make progress, but denied the petition for conditional release.

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Woman who handed out drug-laced cookies sentenced

Krause arrested after handing out marijuana cookies at St. Patrick's Day parade

SHAWANO — A Shawano woman accused of handing out marijuana-laced cookies during the St. Patrick's Day festivities in the town of Wescott was sentenced Thursday on two felony counts.

Cathleen K. Krause, 58, pleaded no contest to charges of manufacture and delivery of marijuana and second or subsequent possession of marijuana.

She was sentenced to 80 days in jail with work release privileges.

Krause was arrested in March

According to the criminal complaint, a sheriff's deputy was told that a woman wearing a green St. Patrick's Day hat and wearing a leather coat had handed out a

after Shawano County authorities received a call reporting that a woman was handing out drug-laced cookies during the annual holiday parade in Wescott's

cookie that she said had marijuana in it.

The reporting party had taken a picture of the woman, later identified as Krause, and showed it to the deputy, who located and questioned Krause.

The complaint states Krause was visibly intoxicated, and her breath smelled of alcohol and marijuana.

After being asked about the cookies, Krause pulled out a large gallon-sized bag of cookie crumbs and consented to a search, according to the complaint.

During the search, a number of prescription pills were found along

with a package of gummy candy, the complaint states.

According to the complaint, the cookie that Krause allegedly gave to the person who reported it to authorities and the gummy candy tested positive for marijuana.

It's unknown how many marijuana cookies Krause might have handed out before she was arrested.

According to court records, Krause was previously convicted of a misdemeanor count of possessing marijuana in Shawano County in 2015.

WOW on Wheels

Mural pictures are on display at Homme Home

WITTENBERG — Walls of Wittenberg has come full circle. In 2005, WOW founder Lois Smith approached Homme Home's executive director Steve Seybold about installing a mural on the outside of the building. It was the first and the biggest mural, covering four walls and two stories.

Now you can go inside Homme, take a walk through the halls and see pictures of the rest of the murals.

Part of the deal that WOW makes with each muralist is that he or she donates a rendering of the mural for the permanent art collection to hang in the WOWSPACE between shows. To date, there are 28 muralettes in the collection.

The only problem is that few get to see the collection, unless they request a private tour of the building. According to Elaine Diffor, event coordinator for WOW, there is also the added time and energy of putting up and taking down the art work when preparing for the four art shows and two theatrical productions held each year in the WOWSPACE.

"We wanted to explore the idea of loaning out these pictures so that more people would have the opportunity to see and enjoy them," said WOW President Elaine Knab.

Tara Hoppe-Schmidt, the administrator of the community-based residential facility area at Homme, said she was looking for a way to help the residents feel connected to the community and reached out to Knab for ideas. Hanging the mural renderings at Homme was a perfect fit.

"The residents in CBRF don't have the opportunity to do as much as they used to in the community, and having the murals indoors for them to see makes them feel a part of it all," said Hoppe-Schmidt.

Agnes Medo has made her home at Homme for the past 10 years. In 2012, she and four others were interviewed for a WOW video project called "5 Lives: Wittenberg Wisdom."

"Being part of the video project was fun for me, and now it's so nice to have the WOW murals inside to see every day," said Medo.

Even the staff enjoy seeing the pic-

tures. Hoppe-Schmidt noted that not everyone who works there is from Wittenberg, so it's a way of helping them feel more connected to the community.

Personal care assistant Pam Meidl is from Antigo and enjoys them as much as the residents do. She said she used to take the same route driving to and from work every day; now she takes time to drive around town to see the larger murals.

"I think it's amazing," Meidl said. "The train and the cow are my favorites."

Volunteers also enjoy seeing the display; it gives them something to share and visit about with the residents.

"I volunteer every Friday, and it's great to see how much the pictures mean to the residents," said Karen Hendrikson, Wittenberg.

The staff at Homme enjoy the "Foundations of Faith" mural, which was completed in 2006. This fall, they sponsored a run/walk fundraiser for Alzheimer's and used the mural as the starting and ending point for the event. The mural provided a great backdrop, and the staff served food in the gathering area in front of the mural.

When Smith first approached Seybold about the mural, he was intrigued by the theme of focusing on the faith aspect of the community, though he admits to being a bit apprehensive when she explained the size of her vision. He notes that it's exciting to have the mural for residents, staff and visitors to enjoy.

"We were the first location she approached to start the murals, and I think Lois would have been pleased to see that WOW has chosen to loan us the pictures," said Seybold.

Smith passed away in October 2018 and the WOW organization is continuing her vision.

"We hope to loan out this display to other organizations and businesses to help generate more awareness about WOW and its murals," said Knab.

The mural pictures will be on display indefinitely at Homme Home for the Aging, 604 S. Webb St., Wittenberg.

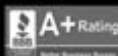

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Clintonville native receives highest French military honor

Schulz's book documents heroic World War II service

CLINTONVILLE — A Clintonville native, author and U.S. Army hero from World War II has been given a medal and the award of Knight in the Legion of Honor by French Army officials.

"This is France's highest military award, which they sometimes give to American soldiers who took part in the liberation of their country from Nazi tyranny," said Eugene Schulz, 96, who served in France from 1944-45. "I am overwhelmed and totally humbled about this event but also very honored. It is difficult to grasp the significance of this award."

Schulz, who now resides in Milwaukee, traveled with his family to Chartres, France, to receive the honor. He and his wife, Eleanore, four sons, three daughters-in-law and four grandchildren departed Milwaukee on Sept. 9. Schulz said the trip has been seven-plus decades in the making, "it being the 75th year since France was liberated from Hitler's grip," he said. "But the letter telling me about the award came just weeks ago."

The award was established by Napoleon Bonaparte in 1802. Since World War II, approximately 93,000 of these medals have been presented to American servicemen who risked their lives fighting on French soil. The award Schulz received is the highest military commendation the French government gives an individual, bestowed upon men and women who fought to defend France.

Formerly a U.S. Army sergeant in XX Corps, Schulz was honored by American Friends of Chartres and Chartres, Sanctuaire du Monde, with a dinner Sept. 13. Also honored at the banquet was Schulz's former Col. Welborn B. Griffith, who was killed in combat near Chartres. Griffith's family attended the dinner. "It will be a truly emotional and exciting weekend," said Schulz before departing for France.

Schulz attended St. Martin Lutheran School and graduated from Clintonville High School with the Class of 1941. After graduation, he worked as his dad's hired man on the farm. He applied for a factory job at the Four Wheel Drive Auto Company, which was building four-wheel-drive trucks that were being used by highway departments or off-highway in the fields to carry drilling derricks, as well as fire and utility trucks.

FWD didn't have a job for him right away. But after a few months, he was hired in the office of the export department. A month later, in December 1941, Pearl Harbor was attacked, and America entered the war.

Since many of Schulz's classmates were enlisting, he decided he would, too. He reported to the Clintonville Armory to register for selective service. On Jan. 4, 1943, Schulz was told to report to the local draft board at the courthouse in Waupaca. They boarded the Soo Line train for the ride to Milwaukee. Army trucks took them to Fort Sheridan, and they were assigned to their barracks.

Later in January, he was shipped to Camp Young, California, for basic training. He reported for

new duties in G-3, the department that makes the plans for training and battle under its command. He was greeted by his new boss, Col. Griffith — a Texan who graduated from West Point. Schulz was later moved to Camp Campbell, Kentucky, where his duties included typing the battle orders developed by Griffith for the XX Corps.

When the XX Corps sailed to England in February 1944 on the Queen Mary, Schulz and his fellow soldiers completed the voyage in five days. After final training in England, the XX Corps landed on Utah Beach in Normandy. His unit was attached to Gen. Patton's Third Army and spearheaded the drive across France, through Germany and into Austria where they met the Russian Army.

It was for his service during this time in the war that Schulz was awarded the Bronze Star medal. Schulz later wrote about his war-time experiences in his book, "The Ghost in General Patton's Third Army." He was an eyewitness to the first Nazi concentration camp that was discovered in Germany by American troops.

A notable time in his service came when his corps settled into 7th Command Post in the woods

outside the town of Courville sur Eure, about 13 miles from Chartres, France. The American 7th Armored Division arrived at the outskirts of the city. Cavalry units formed an arc about the city to prevent an escape by the German soldiers.

Schulz said he heard reports of heavy fighting and pockets of resistance. The corps artillery had an order to shell and destroy the old and famous medieval Chartres Cathedral, which stood at the center of the city. In 1939, just before the German army invaded France, all the stained glass windows were removed and placed in safe storage.

"The order to destroy the cathedral was given because it was suspected that the Germans were using the twin towers as observation posts," Schulz said. "When Col. Griffith heard about the plan, he decided to challenge this strategy, and he took it upon himself to investigate. After a staff meeting ended, Griffith said he was going into the city of Chartres on a personal mission. Griffith arrived at the cathedral without incident and entered the building. There were no German snipers."

Schulz said that once Griffith realized the cathedral was not occupied by enemy snipers, he reported the information to his superiors, and the cathedral was spared from destruction.

"Griffith left the cathedral and drove to the village of Leves on the outskirts of Chartres. He met a tank and asked for a ride. He climbed into the tank and stood up to get a better view. They drove through the neighborhoods and as they came into an intersection of streets, a crew of German soldiers in a hidden machine gun nest opened up with a sudden burst of fire," Schulz recalled. "The tank was stopped, and the colonel's body was shattered with bullets. He died instantly."

According to Schulz, Griffith is still a hero in Chartres for his part in saving the cathedral. A special Mass was held, along with receptions, luncheons, dinners, a military parade, tours of the cathedral and special honor ceremonies for his former boss.

Schulz was discharged from the Army in December 1945. After college, he worked as an investment research officer. He is now retired.

Type of zinnia long-lasting bloomer that peaks in fall

Now in October, fewer and fewer of our garden staples from the summer season are still showing their beauty and bloom. Among the most prolific and profuse bloomers are the zinnias, especially members of the profusion zinnia series.

When massed together in large beds or swaths of color, these plants truly are a sight to see. Literally thousands of blossoms may be in full bloom at one time in large mass plantings of these zinnias.

Like most varieties of zinnias, these dwarf bloomers are especially important now in fall for migrating butterflies such as monarchs and painted ladies, as well as bees, hummingbirds and other pollinators. Because they bloom right up until the first hard frost, they provide a valuable source of nutrition and food for these creatures.

Profusion zinnias can be grown from seed indoors, but like many zinnias, they tend to be a bit fussy when transplanted. If starting from seed, it is best to direct sow right in the garden bed.

Most gardeners prefer to buy profusion zin-

nias as potted annuals in the spring for a head start and for instant impact that continues to be a showstopper throughout summer and fall. Planting out potted annuals also makes it easier to create designs, patterns and perfect spacing between these mounding plants.

Because of their compact size, these zinnias make excellent container plants when used in a variety of container styles. Be sure to place in full sun as these plants do best when given plenty of bright summer sunshine.

With an incredible range of color selections to choose from — including many tropical shades of melon, coral, orange, yellow, pink and gorgeous bi-colored blossoms — your choices are plentiful.

As the fall season heats up, enjoy the profuse blooms of profusion zinnias as they provide a breathtaking climax to the gardening season.

The takeaway helped the defense settle in before another takeaway on a fumbled punt return set up the Hawks' second touchdown.

Timm connected on passes with junior Kaleb Lowney and sophomore Elliott Lowney during the drive before strong runs from Timm and Dickelman put the hosts inside the Oconto Falls' 5. The next play, Dickelman powered into the end zone to make it 14-7.

"It's great when we can get some great defensive games. I think against Seymour and Waupaca were also games like this," said Dickelman on how the defense carried the team. "It really helps our offense out, especially when we are struggling (offensively)."

Oconto Falls wasn't done yet though, scoring on its second possession of the second half to tie the game again.

Dickelman helped the Hawks answer in a hurry, returning the kickoff to the Oconto Falls' 45 before taking the handoff and breaking free for the game-winning score a play later.

From there, Shawano's defense sealed up the victory. The Panthers were on three promising drives be-

fore the Hawks forced turnovers.

Packers rule at home of Cowboys again

Jones scores 4 touchdowns for Green Bay

ARLINGTON, TEXAS — Aaron Rodgers looked quite comfortable at the home of the Dallas Cowboys — again.

Green Bay's star quarterback kept his team moving to a big early lead with more dazzling plays at AT&T Stadium, Aaron Jones scored a career-high four touchdowns and the Packers bounced back from their first loss by hanging on for a 34-24 victory over the Cowboys on Sunday.

Rodgers zipped a sidearm throw to Robert Tonyan to fix one broken play, flipped a left-hander to

Tra Carson to rescue another, and helped Green Bay improve to 5-0 inside the retractable-roof stadium where the two-time MVP's first win was the 2011 Super Bowl.

The first three Green Bay wins over the Cowboys at their 10-year-old stadium were all dramatic, highlighted by Rodgers' improbable 35-yard completion to Jared Cook to set up a winning field goal on the final play of a 34-31 divisional-round playoff win three years ago.

Not quite the same drama this time after the Packers (4-1) built a 31-3 lead, although Dak Prescott (463 yards passing) and Amari Cooper (226 yards receiving) set career highs trying to keep things interesting in the fourth quarter.

The last hope for Dallas ended with 1:41 left when Brett Maher missed his second field goal — a 33-yarder that would have given the Cowboys a shot at an onside kick down seven.

Missing his biggest threat in Davante Adams because of a toe injury, Rodgers threw for 238 yards without an interception — to the delight of a large contingent of Green Bay fans that pulled off several "Go Pack Go" chants without much resistance from the home crowd.

Prescott, on the other hand, matched a career high with three interceptions, although the first was a drop by Cooper on what should have been a big play early.

The Cowboys (3-2) lost their second straight game after winning their first three, just as the Packers had done. Green Bay took sole possession of first in the NFC North, while Dallas dropped into a tie for the NFC East lead with Philadelphia.

Jones had a career-high 182 scrimmage yards — 107 rushing and 75 receiving — and opened the scoring with an 18-yard run after being held to 19 and 21 yards rushing the previous two weeks.

On a punctuating touchdown for a 24-0 lead early in the second half, Jones waved "bye-bye" to cornerback Byron Jones while beating him to the pylon on a 5-yard run. The fourth TD was a 1-yard plunge.

Cooper had a 53-yard touchdown among his 11 catches and Michael Gallup had 113 yards receiving with a 40-yard score. Prescott, who had never lost when throwing for more than 275 yards, was 27 of 44.

Emphatic challenge

Cowboys coach Jason Garrett was penalized for unsportsmanlike conduct when he slammed the challenge flag in front of side judge Scott Edwards after Edwards ruled Cooper out of bounds when the receiver got both feet in on a catch.

The call was reversed on replay, but the Cowboys started first-and-25 because of the penalty. Elliott, who had 62 yards rushing, caught a 26-yard pass on the next play.

Disaster assistance offered through USDA

MADISON — Agricultural producers affected by natural disasters in 2018 and 2019 can apply for help through the Wildfire and Hurricane Indemnity Program Plus. Sign-up for this U.S. Department of Agriculture program began Sept. 11.

“There is no doubt that extreme weather has greatly impacted Wisconsin’s agricultural producers over the last several years, and 2019 is no exception,” said Sandra Chalmers, executive director for Farm Service Agency in Wisconsin. “With record amounts of crops prevented from planting nationwide and other devastation, more than \$3 billion is available through this disaster relief package.”

WHIP+ will be available for eligible producers who have suffered losses of certain crops, trees, bushes or vines in counties with a Presidential Emergency Disaster Declaration or a Secretarial Disaster Designation. Disaster losses must have been a result of hurricanes, floods, tornadoes, typhoons, volcanic activity, snowstorms or wildfires that occurred in 2018 or 2019.

Producers in counties that did not receive a disaster declaration or designation may still apply for WHIP+ but must provide supporting documentation to establish that the crops were directly affected by a qualifying disaster loss.

A list of counties that received qualifying disaster declarations and designations is available at farmers.gov/recover/whip-plus. Because grazing and livestock losses, other than milk losses, are covered by other disaster recovery programs, those losses are not eligible for WHIP+.

Eligible crops include those for which federal crop insurance or Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program coverage is available, excluding crops intended for grazing. A list of crops covered by crop insurance is available through USDA’s Risk Management Agency at webapp.rma.usda.gov/apps/actuarialinformationbrowser.

The WHIP+ payment factor ranges from 75-95%, depending on the level of crop insurance coverage or NAP coverage that a producer

obtained for the crop. Producers who did not insure their crops in 2018 or 2019 will receive 70% of the expected value of the crop. Insured crops (either crop insurance or NAP coverage) will receive between 75% and 95% of expected value; those who purchased the highest levels of coverage will receive 95% of the expected value.

Both insured and uninsured producers are eligible to apply for WHIP+. But all producers receiving WHIP+ payments will be required to purchase crop insurance or NAP, at the 60% coverage level or higher, for the next two available, consecutive crop years after the crop year for which WHIP+ payments were paid. Producers who fail to purchase crop insurance for the next two applicable, consecutive years will be required to pay back the WHIP+ payment.

Agricultural producers faced significant challenges planting crops in 2019 in many parts of the country. All producers with flooding or excess moisture-related prevented planting insurance claims

in calendar year 2019 will receive a prevented planting supplemental disaster (“bonus”) payment equal to 10% of their prevented planting indemnity, plus an additional 5% will be provided to those who purchased harvest price option coverage.
