Is the Shawano library too small?

Consultants doing space analysis to see if larger facility needed

SHAWANO — The main branch of the Shawano County Library is constantly abuzz with activity, whether its hosting children's story hours, having teens work on crafts, allowing community groups to meet or ushering in adults wanting to meet their favorite authors.

Some events tend to be more popular than others, and there are occasions when the staff needs to shoehorn patrons in to accommodate everyone. To that end, the Shawano County Library Board is looking into whether the existing building can continue to host community events or if it might be time to build a new library.

The existing library building on Sawyer Street in Shawano has been in continuous operation since 1960, according to library director Kristie Hauer. It is the longest running library building still in operation in the county, she said, noting that it was around 1899 when the county received its first library services.

The library board hired Library Strategies, a consulting firm based in St. Paul, Minnesota, in 2018 to do a needs assessment for the main library and its five branch opera-

tions, according to Hauer. She said the assessment at the time looked at the libraries' collections, programs and services and how they compared nationally.

"A component that came out of that was the idea that our current library is really stressed for space in terms of the size and depth of the collection that we're offering and then the other services we provide," Hauer said.

With that information, the library board is moving forward with a space analysis to be conducted by Library Planning Associates, Inc., a consulting firm based in Normal, Illinois.

"We're looking to see if the size of our building is suitable for the next couple of decades moving forward in library services," Hauer said. "If it's not suitable, what would a suitable size and setup be?"

One area the library staff believes it could use bigger spaces is in its meeting rooms. There is one for small groups of six or less to meet and then two larger rooms for bigger community groups and special library events.

"We definitely have programs that exceed our meeting room space, so we end up moving furniture and bookshelves around on the main floor of the library to provide a

larger meeting space," Hauer said. "We have groups that we turn away because we can't find a space big enough to use or our three meeting rooms are booked up. It takes a lot of time management to make sure we're utilizing those spaces as best we can."

Hauer said her employees and patrons have a lot of ideas about a library of the future, but it's too early in the process to put together some kind of plan. The space analysis is expected to be finished by the end of the year, she said, so the library board will have an idea of how to proceed after seeing that report.

"We're still just collecting information," Hauer said. "We're still researching what other libraries are doing with services and programs that are working and seeing if they can be replicated here."

Although the 2018 assessment involved all of the libraries in the county, the space assessment is only looking at the main library. Hauer said the branch libraries in most other communities are owned by the villages, except for Birnamwood, whose library is housed in a building owned by the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District.

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month

Domestic violence and sexual assault are two of the most destructive forces in our society. Every nine seconds in the US a woman is beaten by an intimate partner and 1 in 4 women are likely to experience domestic violence at some point in their life. Only half of all domestic violence incidents are reported to law enforcement and it's even less for sexual assaults. Violence and abuse knows no boundaries and affects every socio economic category, race, religion and age. At Safe Haven our youngest participant was born to her mother while in shelter and our oldest resident was 83.

Demand for shelter services in 2018 was the highest it has been since 2008. The shelter was occupied at optimal capacity (5 families – one to each room) or over capacity (families shared rooms) 89% of the time or 269 days and had two or more families in shelter 100% of the time. Safe Haven completed an expansion and opened up 3 additional rooms (totaling 8) in November. The shelter was at or over capacity 18% of the time in November/December. The shelter provided safe housing for 76 women, 1 man and 80 children with an average length of stay of 30 days, 5,360 bed nights. Advocates answered 1,943 crisis calls and met individually with 538 victims (390 women, 44 men, 1 transgender and 103 children). The average age of a child in shelter was 7. 2019 is also proving to be a busy year. During the first half of the year, 45 women, 2 men and 53 children were provided with emergency shelter; 210 women, 25 men and 64 children met with an advocate and 43 women and 36 children attended support group.

These statistics are a stark reminder that many people face life or death situations in their own homes. A place they should feel most safe.

Land near Clintonville High School purchased

School's FFA program has expressed interest in utilizing acreage for crops or an orchard

CLINTONVILLE — The Clintonville School Board voted Monday to purchase 62.5 acres of property surrounding the north side of the Clintonville High School at a cost of \$437,500 (or \$7,000 per acre) from the Timothy Schultz Trust.

Ben Huber, Mark Zachow, Larry Czarnecki, Lori Poppe, Kris Strauman and Jim Schultz voted in favor of the land purchase, while Laurie Vollrath voted against.

Superintendent David Dyb reported that an assessment and inspection of the land regarding geological information, document historical use, environmental conditions and a review of any related state documents and interviews with WDNR-Wetland Delineation Environmental Phase I assessment of property had been done.

Dyb noted that the land could be used in a variety of ways as it includes a pond, crop fields and a forest. Twenty-five of the acres include a few areas of wetland. The remaining 37.5 acres can be developed.

"When land adjoining school district property becomes available, school boards will often consider purchasing it for future

development. Land has great potential for many educational uses," said Dyb. "Even though the Clintonville School District is currently involved in a facilities concept planning process, no specific use of the property has been decided."

"Do we need all that land?" Vollrath asked.

Huber, the board president, replied that opportunities like that do not come along often.

It was noted that there are several types of wetlands on the property.

Middle School Principal Troy Kuhn said his father always told him that there will never be more land made, and it will never decrease in value.

Dyb said there has already been interest in the land from the FFA and the FFA Alumni. There have been some volunteers who have shown an interest in making the land a revenue source. There could be crops, a seed plot and an orchard.

Greg Rose, a science teacher with Clintonville Middle School, said many of the district staff and others did not know that the school district already has land in the town of Larrabee, and it could be put to better use.

The land purchase is expected to be completed in January.

Marcie Leitzke: A life of words

Shawano Area Writers founder published poetry, essays throughout her life

SHAWANO — A lifelong writer, a poet, who loved words.

That's how John Mutter, vice president of the Shawano Area Writers, described Marcie Leitzke, one of the founding members of the writers group. Leitzke died Monday at the age of 92.

Marcie was a lifetime member of Wisconsin Fellowship of Poets (WFOP), secretary of WFOP and National Federation of State Poetry Societies, (NFSPS). She published four books of poetry, one book, "According to Matthew" (life according to her Down Syndrome son), and one cookbook, "Early 1900s Pantry Recipes."

She will have a poem included in

the 2020 calendar published by the Wisconsin Fellowship of Poets.

Marcie was a charter member of Shawano Area Writers beginning in 1966, and when she lived in Lake Placid, Florida, for several years, she chartered The Ridge Area Writers in nearby Sebring, Florida. Both organizations are still active today.

"She was a great promoter of writers," Mutter said. "She was the most aggressive writer in our group." He said she wrote columns, essays, poetry, newsletters, and worked hard to get them into print.

Helping new writers get their materials printed was one of the goals of the early SAW group, Mutter said. Leitzke was a champion of writing for all kinds of outlets. Newsletters, letters to the editor, columns — such as a column she wrote for an antique tractor magazine — all "counted" when it came to being published, he said.

Because she and her husband owned a farm and then an antique business, she also had keen business

sense, Mutter said. When he asked her advice on rights to a story he was selling, she counseled him to sell only first-time rights. That was a good decision, he said, based on experiences he heard from other writers.

Leitzke's love of writing was lifelong, he said.

"She never lost her desire to learn, to meet other people and talk about writing," Mutter said.

Within Leitzke's long portfolio are columns that she wrote for the Shawano Leader. One of them, originally published on Oct. 26, 2016, talked about how difficult it was to get published. After 65 rejections, it was finally published, and reprised in the Leader.

In the column, she wrote: "Life isn't a bowl of cherries — it's a tube of toothpaste!"

She writes about how different individuals approach life with different styles, squeezing life's contents from the middle or from the end, with patience or, as she described her life, "squeezing the tube lavishly and

generously."

"Now is the time to contemplate on God's grace through the years," she wrote. "It's a time of reminiscing to see what we've accomplished. It's expedient that we squeeze everything we can out of what's left. I, for one, can never throw away an empty tube. It seems I can always get a little more out of it. It is a time for savoring life to the fullest, much like our childhood, when there was time to play and dream and invent things to fill our days.

"The toothpaste tube can last a long time and usually does in later years. The longer an old oak tree stands, the tougher it gets. Do you put the cap back on the tube even when it's empty? Think of the cap as the crown to your life. Put it on and wear it proudly. You've lived a full life. Awards and rewards have all been yours no matter how you squeezed the tube."

The HCE received the award at the 2019 WAHCE State Conference held in September in Manitowoc.

Jerry Qualheim remembered as kind, helpful, funny

Longtime hardware store owner supported veterans, community groups

SHAWANO — “Kind” is the word heard over and over again as Jerry Qualheim was remembered this week.

Qualheim, long a fixture in Shawano’s retail community as owner of the True Value store, died Oct. 24 following a two-month illness at age 86.

Phil Nelson, a fellow American Legion Post 117 member, pointed out Jerry belonged to the Legion for over 50 years. “More importantly, he was a staunch supporter of veterans’ activities,” Phil Nelson said.

“As just one example, he donated all of the American flags for the veterans in Woodlawn Cemetery,” Phil Nelson continued, adding there are over 1,000 veterans’ graves.

Cindy Nelson, Phil’s wife, added

that she knew Jerry through singing with his wife, June, in the Sweet Adelines.

“He was always ready to help,” she said.

“At his funeral today (Oct. 31), they tried to describe his characteristics. He was kind, generous, thoughtful, caring. Some of the best superlatives you could imagine,” Phil Nelson said.

Qualheim and his wife bought the Coast to Coast Hardware Store on Main Street in 1979. Following a couple of location moves and a franchise switch, they moved into their new location on Green Bay Street in 1995. Their son, Willis Qualheim, now manages the business.

John Stapleton is among many who remember not just Jerry Qualheim’s helpfulness but also his sense of humor.

Stapleton recalled that, years ago, he had a plumbing problem at his home. Adding to the urgency of solving the problem was having three children in diapers.

He went the store when it was still on Main Street and asked Qualheim for some help. With his trademark glasses pushed down his nose, Qualheim pulled out what he thought were the right parts, at which time Stapleton asked, “Is this a big job?”

Apparently having sized up Stapleton’s plumbing capabilities, Qualheim replied, “It could be.”

Phil Nelson agreed that, “If he (Jerry) knew what project you were doing, he’d know all of the materials you’d need and the instructions you needed.”

Phil and Cindy Nelson agreed his customer service standard was very high.

Stapleton’s wife, Georgia, said: “Jerry was one of the most non-judgmental people I’ve ever met. Everyone was the same to him. He helped everyone and anyone he could, and he did it with a remarkable smile and sincerity.”

“His family meant the world to him; so did the community needs. He

was a very kind man and helped make the way for us ‘city’ young people, John and I, moving to a small community with our little family and hardly any money. We knew we could depend on him to help us with our little house and any repairs. He was fair. He never let us down. His kindness will never be forgotten.”

Speaking from the perspective of being the former Citizens State Bank president, Phil Nelson said Jerry “was very good for the Shawano business community.”

Qualheim was born Dec. 1, 1932, in Stanley, attended school in Jump River and later went to Hannibal High School, graduating in 1950. He served in the U.S. Army from 1951 until 1954.

Qualheim met June Brassard, his future wife, at a dance in Hannibal. They were married on Oct. 22, 1955. The family moved to Shawano in 1967.

Qualheim’s community commitments included being a member of Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Shawano and the Masonic Lodge.

Dems push impeachment rules through House

Local leaders eager to hear testimony in an open forum

WASHINGTON — Local party leaders echoed the majority of their party's representatives Thursday after Democrats pushed a package of ground rules for their impeachment inquiry of President Donald Trump through a sharply divided House.

The action was the chamber's first formal vote in a fight that could stretch into the 2020 election year.

Thursday's measure defined the procedures lawmakers will follow as they transition from weeks of closed-door interviews with witnesses to public hearings and ultimately to possible votes on whether to recommend Trump's impeachment.

The tally was 232-196, with all Republicans who voted opposing the

resolution. Two Democrats joined them: freshman Rep. Jeff Van Drew of New Jersey and 15-term veteran Rep. Collin Peterson of Minnesota, one of his party's most conservative members. Both represent GOP-leaning districts.

Shawano County Democratic Party chair Jan Koch said she feels the House is doing the right thing, and is concerned that the Republicans will attempt to "villify" the proceedings.

"We need to get to the bottom of what happened," Koch said. "The American public needs to hear what happened. I'm glad it's moving forward." Koch said she feels the public wants to see more discussion in an open forum.

The latter sentiment was shared by Shawano County Republican Party leader Richard Kucksdorf. He said the effort for actual impeachment won't get enough House votes to move it to the Senate for trial. A full public hearing will help insure equal justice, and right now, "there is no equal justice," Kucksdorf said.

"The people who have been hop-

ing for the Russian connection, for Stormy Daniels, collusion ... they aren't going to be able to handle the reality when it hits them," Kucksdorf said.

That reality is that there has been no crime, he said.

Though the vote was technically over the rules that will govern the process, each side used it to accuse the other of having already decided whether Congress should wrench Trump from office.

It also underscored how — for now — lawmakers on each side are comfortable with their approaches to next year's presidential and congressional elections. Democrats have been buoyed by polls showing growing public sentiment toward investigating and even removing Trump from office, while the same surveys have shown GOP voters standing fast by him.

The vote, which occurred on Halloween, drew a familiar Twitter retort from Trump: "The greatest Witch Hunt in American History!"

White House press secretary Stephanie Grisham accused House

Speaker Nancy Pelosi and the Democrats of an "unhinged obsession with this illegitimate impeachment proceeding."

During the debate, Democrats spoke of lawmakers' duty to defend the Constitution, while Republicans cast the process as a skewed attempt to railroad a president whom Democrats have detested since before he took office.

"What is at stake in all this is nothing less than our democracy," said Pelosi, D-Calif. Underscoring her point, she addressed the House with a poster of the American flag beside her and began her remarks by reading the opening lines of the preamble to the Constitution.

She also said the procedures would let lawmakers decide whether to impeach Trump "based on the truth. I don't know why the Republicans are afraid of the truth."

House Minority Leader Kevin McCarthy, R-Calif., contended the Democrats are trying to remove Trump simply "because they are scared they cannot defeat him at the ballot box."

Vape cartridges with THC found in bust

19-year-old Clintonville woman arrested

CLINTONVILLE — Discovery of vape cartridges in a marijuana grow bust on East 12th Street has

the Clintonville Police Department concerned.

The police found a marijuana grow in the early morning hours Wednesday as a search warrant was executed. Officers also found an area set up to manufacture marijuana wax. Officers also located numerous unused vape cartridges and vape cartridges that appeared to be manufactured in the residence by filling them with liquid THC concentrate.

The police seized those items,

along with numerous pieces of drug paraphernalia.

A 19-year-old Clintonville woman was arrested and booked in the Waupaca County Jail. The charges include possession of THC with the intent to distribute within 1,000 feet of a park, maintaining a drug trafficking place, possession of THC within 1,000 feet of a park, possession of drug paraphernalia, and manufacture or delivery of paraphernalia.

According to Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, there have been 1,604 cases of e-cigarette or vaping product use associated with lung injury that have been reported to the CDC from individual states and territories as of Oct. 22. There have been 34 deaths confirmed as of that date.

The matter is still under investigation, according to the release, and more arrests are expected.

COURT NEWS

- Katie Lewandowski, 20, Surging, signed a \$1,000 signature bond set by Judge William Kussel Jr. on one count of felony possession of methamphetamine. She also faces two misdemeanor counts of possession of drug paraphernalia. If convicted of the felony, she could face up to 3½ years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

- Payton Pagel, 18, was charged with felony bail jumping, a charge carrying a maximum sentence of six years in jail and a \$10,000 fine. A signature bond for \$1,500 set by Judge James Habeck was signed.

- Justin Busch, 31, Shawano, was charged with felony possession of amphetamine (more than 10-50 grams) with intent to deliver; felony possession of methamphetamines and a misdemeanor count of possession of drug paraphernalia. Maximum penalty for the possession with intent to deliver felony is 25 years in prison and a \$100,000 fine and 3½ years in prison and a \$10,000 fine for the possession charge. A \$2,000 signature bond set by Judge William Kussel Jr. was signed. His adjourned initial appearance is set for Nov. 18.

- Frank Sackatook, 38, was scheduled to appear in court Nov. 18 on one felony count of driving a vehicle without the owner's consent and misdemeanor disorderly conduct. Maximum penalty for the felony is 3½ years in prison and \$10,000. Judge James Habeck set a cash bond of \$500.

- Victoria Dixon, 29, Shawano, was charged with possession with intent to deliver amphetamine (more than 10-50 grams) and possession of methamphetamines; two

misdemeanor counts of possession of drug paraphernalia. A \$500 was bond was set by Judge William Kussel Jr. An adjourned initial appearance was set for Nov. 25. Maximum penalty for the felony possession/intent to deliver charge is 25 years in prison and a fine of \$100,000, and 3½ years in prison and a \$10,000 fine on each of the possession charges.

- Rebecca Lusiak, 30, Tigerton, was charged with one felony count of possession of methamphetamine, four felony counts of bail jumping and misdemeanor charges for operating while revoked and possession of drug paraphernalia. A cash bond set on Oct. 25 remained in place. She faces a maximum penalty of six years in prison and a fine of \$10,000 for each bail jumping charge; maximum of 3½ years in prison and \$10,000 for the methamphetamine charge and 3½ years in prison and a \$10,000 fine for the possession charge. Her preliminary hearing is Nov. 5.

- Ga-Ma-Bne White, 33, Green Bay, was charged with felony bail jumping and misdemeanor operating while revoked. A cash bond of \$1,000 was set by Judge James Habeck. The felony charge carries a maximum penalty of six years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

- Marquita House, 30, Keshena, was charged with felony possession of methamphetamine and misdemeanor counts of operating while impaired (OWI) and operating while revoked. A \$750 cash bond was set by Judge James Habeck. The maximum penalty for the felony is 3½ years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

- Ryin McGhee, 24, Mattoon, was charged with felony second degree recklessly endangering safety/use of a dangerous weapon and misdemeanor counts of battery, disorderly conduct (dangerous weapon), use of a dangerous weapon while intoxicated; intentionally pointing a firearm at a person and possession of drug paraphernalia. The felony charge carries a maximum penalty of six years in prison and a \$10,000 fine. Adjourned initial appearance is set for Nov. 4.

- A cash bond for \$500 set by Judge William Kussel Jr. was posted for Richard Schreiber, 50, Gresham, for felony bail jumping. If convicted, the maximum sentence is six years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

- Casandra K. McCracken, 30, Plover, was charged with forgery-uttering as a party to a crime, five counts of felony bail jumping, theft by misrepresentation of an amount equal to or less than \$2,500, and three counts of misdemeanor bail jumping. - An initial appearance for Justina L. Ritchie, 28, Escanaba, Michigan, was adjourned until Nov. 4 on a felony charge of possession of methamphetamine as a party to a crime and two drug-related misdemeanor counts as a party to a crime. Judge William Kussel Jr. set a \$500 cash bond. If convicted of the felony, she faces a maximum penalty of 3½ years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

Law addressing suicide coercion way overdue

I could not imagine what it was like to be Alexander Urtula, a student at Boston College seeking a degree in biology who had his whole life ahead of him, only to have someone tearing him down at every opportunity and actively encouraging him to “go die.”

The 22-year-old man was just hours away from graduating with his degree when he took his own life by leaping off the top floor of a parking garage. It's another life cut too short, and it's a story that brings some disturbing things to light.

Urtula had been dating Inyoung You for 18 months prior to his death, according to a story from the Washington Post. Suffolk County District Attorney Rachael Rollins is charging You with involuntary manslaughter because of what happened in the months prior.

Urtula received over 47,000 text messages from You in the two months before his death in May, with hundreds of those messages, if not thousands, encouraging him to take his life, saying that she, his family and the world would be better off if he was dead.

Sending 47,000 text messages in a two-month period is definitely bizarre, and you have to wonder what it was doing to Urtula's psyche having his phone blow up all day, every day, with messages telling him to die. Other people would have changed their number, filed a restraining order or thrown the phone down a sewer drain, but You apparently had Urtula completely under her power, according to the Post story.

Of course, the abuse isn't limited to psychological and emotional. Rollins claimed You was physically abusive, too. The abuse was witnessed by classmates and family members and documented in Urtula's journal.

A grand jury that issued the indictment described You's behavior as “wanton and reckless.” For some reason the adjectives that sprang up when I read about her behavior were “psychotic” and “sinister.”

Those adjectives stuck when I read that You was actually in the parking garage when Urtula jumped. She had apparently used her cell phone to track his location. How dominating and twisted do you have to be to follow your boyfriend around everywhere, especially when you're getting him to kill himself? Was she afraid she was going to miss the big moment or something?

This case brings up questions of how far the First Amendment should protect free speech. Most of what we say is protected as expressing ourselves however we see fit, but You's barrage of texts encouraging Urtula to die seems to fall under the same boundaries as crying “Fire!” in a crowded theater.

You's texts are essentially death threats. While she's not vowing to do the killing herself, it's similar to when someone calls in a threat or sends threatening messages. If someone says they're going to shoot up a school or detonate a bomb at a marathon, they are arrested and convicted of crimes, even if they don't carry out those threats. You's case should be treated no differently.

This case also brings up the standard image of domestic violence and turns it on its head. In most cases shown in the media, domestic violence is painted as something where women are victims and men are perpetrators. Not so with the You case. Women can be scorpions just as easily as men can, and men can be just as susceptible to the stings.

Proof positive is another Massachusetts case, Michelle Carter, who was convicted of involuntary manslaughter for also encouraging her boyfriend via

text messages to kill himself in 2014. She is now serving a 15-month prison sentence.

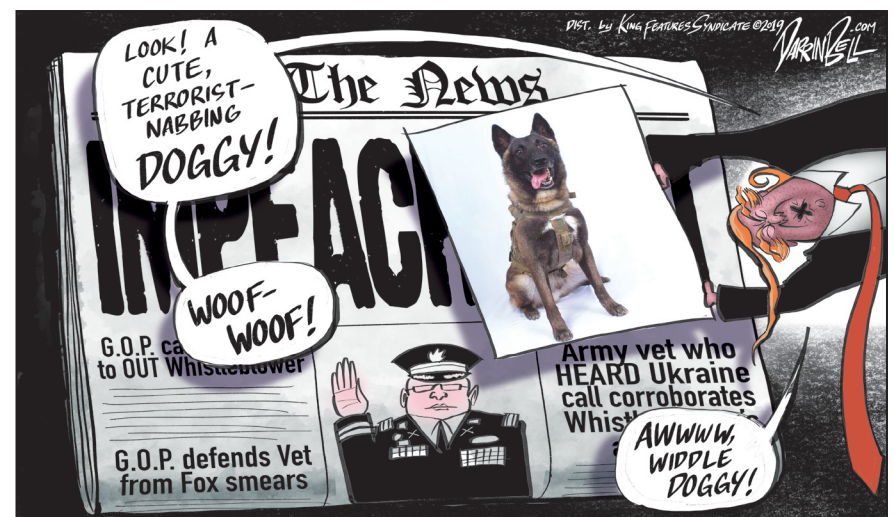
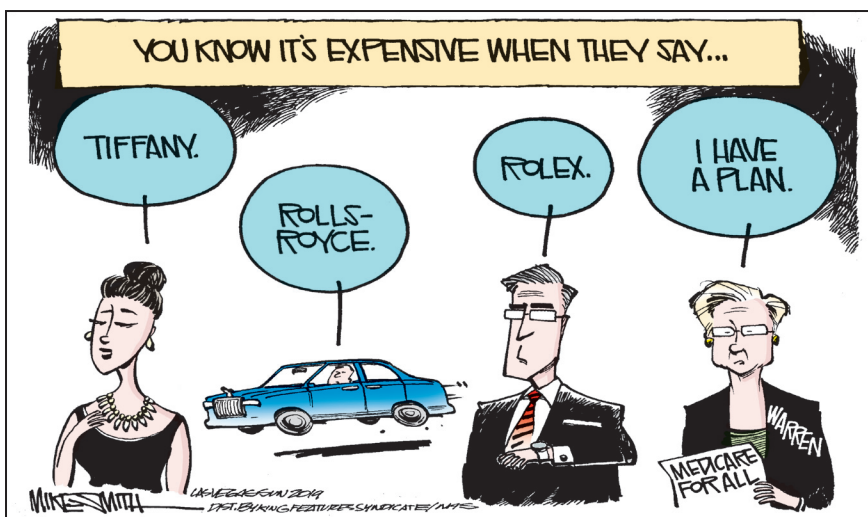
I think Rollins said it best when she said: “Domestic violence is not perpetrated by one type of abuser. A perpetrator is not limited by their gender or the gender of their partner. Domestic violence may not always look the same, but it is always about power and control.”

Unfortunately, it looks like there might be some snags in bringing You to justice. She made it back home to South Korea before the district attorney could indict her, although authorities are cautiously optimistic she will return voluntarily to face the charges. Perhaps America's special operation forces could swing by South Korea on the way back from Syria and pick her up.

Massachusetts is considering a law, named for the young man who died from Carter's texts, Conrad Roy III, that would make suicide coercion punishable by up to five years in prison.

Judging from the fact that another man has already died as a result of vicious texts from his girlfriend, I'd say the law is overdue. Way overdue.

Son's birth inspires children's book

Author and illustrator celebrate release of 'Moonless Night'

BOWLER — Brock Schreiber's latest children's book captivated the audience Wednesday at the Arvid E. Miller Memorial Library and Museum — right up until the author's 3-year-old son, Eli, asked if he brought any water.

Schreiber, who was born and raised on the Stockbridge-Munsee Reservation, just smiled and continued reading the story, noting later that it was his son's birthday.

For the crowd, "Once Upon a Moonless Night" was a charming

tale. For the author, the story holds a much deeper meaning for him, as it is a story about how his son came into the world.

The illustrations created by Bowler artist Judy Gosz show little Eli coming in like a comet on that moonless night. The child's birth was definitely fast, as Schreiber recalled.

"My wife delivered him at home, and that wasn't planned," Schreiber said. "We just didn't make it out of the house in time."

Schreiber said his wife woke him up at 2 a.m. on Oct. 30, 2016, when she went into labor and said they needed to go to the hospital. Sch-

reiber had gone out to warm up and pack the car to make the journey, but once he stepped back inside his home, he quickly saw that Eli wasn't going to wait for the doctors and nurses.

"I called 911, and I got Ethan Schmidt, the dispatcher," Schreiber said. "He helped us along, and about five minutes into the call, Eli was born."

The title for the book came to Schreiber months later as he thought back on the night Eli was born. He remembered it being very dark when he went out to start his car.

"It was just a very starry night

with no moon out," Schreiber said.

Schreiber's book went through three different versions before he decided on the rhyming style folks would read in the book, he said. Earlier iterations attempted over the course of a year were more descriptive of what happened that night without the rhymes.

"I'm glad I wound up with this book," Schreiber said.

Schreiber's words only make up a portion of the book. Gosz's illustrations let readers see the journey, from a starry silhouette of Schreiber holding Eli close to him, to images of the North Star, Little Dipper, the

Swan Nebula and other constellations.

Although Gosz has been an artist for many years, it was the first time she'd illustrated a children's book.

She had never thought about it until Schreiber approached her about it after seeing some of her work hanging at the dental clinic on the reservation.

"I met with him, and I heard the 911 call that he sent in the night Eli was born," Gosz said. "That was my introduction to his story."

Gosz said her love of the night sky inspired her to create illustrations that were as close to the real night sky as possible.

She noted that her research has helped her to name more star constellations than she could before.

"I was studying star charts and seeing how the planets really are formed," Gosz said. "If you've seen my work before, you know that I either go real abstract or else I make it as close to reality as I can get."

For the page with the silhouette, Gosz had originally planned to have a traditional black silhouette with a star-covered background.

When she saw the part she cut out, however, she decided to flip it.

"That was just a gift from the Creator," Gosz said. "You kind of

just go with the flow, and you don't always know where it will end up."

The hardest page for Gosz to illustrate was a page where she

showcased the Northern Lights.

"They have a lot of yellow and a lot of green, but (Schreiber) wanted all the colors in there, so I put in a little rose," Gosz said. "That one I probably did over four times."

Schreiber said his book would not be complete without the illustrations.

"The illustrations in this book are just wonderful," Schreiber said, praising Gosz for her work. "They really bring the book to life."

"Once Upon a Moonless Night" is not the first book Schreiber has written based on his children.

He wrote "Cookies Full of Love" in 2017 as a tribute to his 5-year-old daughter, Brynn.

"It started out as a letter to my wife on Mother's Day, and she really liked it a lot, so we thought we should get it published," Schreiber said.

Schreiber has also written three

books teaching Mohican language, all translated by Christopher Harvey, that also help children learn about animals, counting and the seasons.

He has another children's book in the works. As yet untitled, Schreiber didn't divulge the title, but the new book, which will be about powwows, will be available in May 2020.

Sheena Waupoose, a Menominee artist living in Keshena, will be illustrating the new book.

Schreiber's inspiration for writing came out of reading stories to his children.

When his wife was first pregnant five years ago, he would read stories to her belly.

"It was fun to watch it grow, and then Brynn would start moving inside my wife's belly," Schreiber said. "That's when I thought it would really be awesome to write a story that I could say, 'This is Dad's story. Dad wrote this story.'"

Schreiber's children have heard his published works countless times, but there are also dozens of stories he has written that have not been published.

"Maybe they'll be turned into books," he said.

'Bittersweet' learning opportunity

Clintonville gets lesson in Native American imagery from exhibit

Editor's note: This story contains language that some may find offensive. The words and phrases are included because they are fundamental to a clear description of the subject matter.

CLINTONVILLE — Imagery used to depict American Indians throughout the decades was on full display at Clintonville High School this week through the exhibit "Bittersweet Winds: Honor and Prejudice — Perspectives of the Native American World."

Richie Plass, who is Menominee and Stockbridge-Munsee, brought

more than 300 items to the school showing various images of natives through marketing and media. Among the artifacts were a Washington Redskins jersey, cartoon characters like the Smurfs dressed in tribal regalia and an ashtray from Shawano National Bank celebrating its 20th anniversary with a Native American image on it.

There were also political cartoons and other art showcasing Native Americans in various lights, including a "Family Circus" comic strip where Billy, dressed in a tuxedo, says

he's dressed as an Indian for Halloween — with a casino. A political cartoon from 1975 hits close to home regarding the Menominee takeover of the Novitiate near Gresham, with a meeting chairman recognizing the "John Wayne Fan Club" after cries of "Let them freeze!" and "String them up!"

Some of the items in the exhibit were also personal to Plass. One of the items was a photo from 1968 when he was the Shawano High School Indians mascot, and copies of his essay about the experience were

available for people to take away with them. There was also an article from the Peninsula Pulse about how Plass left Wisconsin Public Radio after being told by management that he was “too Indian” for a radio show about Native Americans.

Plass told the stories behind some of the items he’s collected for the exhibit to community visitors on Monday and Tuesday evenings. He also presented to the high school students during the day Tuesday.

“There were a lot of good questions, a lot of stuff back and forth,” Plass said. “We hope we’ve set up a good base.”

Plass offered his exhibit to Clintonville School District officials early in October following an incident where four male high school students engaged in a mocking Native American dance that was recorded on video and put out on social media. The immediate backlash, which included anger from local tribes, prompted the school to cancel its homecoming parade and football game out of concern there would be protests.

“I realized that this was a teachable moment,” Plass said to a small group listening to his stories Tuesday at the school. “That’s what they need.”

Plass took time Tuesday to meet with the four students who performed the infamous dance. He told the students that he wasn’t there to bash them or call them names.

“I shook each one of their hands, asked them a couple of questions and then I said, ‘Are you ever going to do that again?’ and they all at the same time went, ‘No,’” Plass said.



Some of the exhibit pieces on display turned discrimination on its head, like the black T-shirt saying “Caucasians” with a whitewashed version of the Cleveland Indians mascot and the gray shirt next to it saying “Fighting Whites” to echo the similarities of Notre Dame University’s Fighting Irish.

In his classroom discussions, Plass explained to the mostly-white student population that many of them don’t understand why some of the images are so offensive to Native Americans because they’ve never been on the receiving end of such shame and degradation.

“For over 60 years, I’ve been on the receiving end of this,” Plass said, recounting his story about being the mascot and being abused when Shawano’s basketball team visited Kaukauna for a game. “That stuff is still happening. I have grandsons in the school district in Green Bay who are going through the same stuff.”

Plass said he turned the tables on the students and pointed out the slurs used to describe other people. He noted that there are a lot of

people of German descent in the area and asked who the Nazis were in the class.

“I wonder who the polack is. I wonder where the faggot is sitting,” Plass said. “Ain’t very nice, is it? Welcome to our world.”

Menominee Indian School District Superintendent Wendell Waukau, who attended the exhibit Tuesday, said that his district is working on plans to invite Clintonville High School students to its annual powwow for a continued education on Native American rituals and beliefs. Waukau said the gesture was to help promote healing on both sides of the issue.

Education is needed, according to Plass. He said that 60-70% of the students he spoke to did not even know where the Menominee

Reservation was, even though it’s only about a half-hour drive from Clintonville.

“And there were only two students the whole day who raised their hands and said they’d ever been there,” Plass said.

David Dyb, superintendent for the Clintonville School District, said there were a lot of things on display that flew “under the radar” for even the adults viewing the exhibit, noting the Calumet Baking Powder cans with a red-faced Indian silhouette and a blue head-dress.

“It opens your eyes, if you will, to a sense of how Native American imagery over the last century has been portrayed through media and advertising and marketing,” Dyb said.

Dyb said the artifacts laid out in “Bittersweet Winds” help to give the community a new perspective and start a discussion on something that hadn’t been fully addressed before.

The homecoming incident does not represent the high schoolers in general, Dyb said.

“As a whole, I think the majority of the students already know that,” he said. “They’re having a more difficult time being grouped in with the larger, outside perceptions toward Clintonville. In general, if you pulled kids aside and asked them, ‘Hey, what are your thoughts on this?’ they would spend less time on the incident ... and more on, ‘We don’t want to be seen as being characterized this negative, prejudiced group of people.’”

Pine tree barn quilt favorite of farm family

Shawano County's 352nd barn quilt, featuring a large pine tree, is now on display on a farm owned by David and Brenda Krueger, W9633 Apple Road, Clintonville.

The quilt was a birthday and Father's Day gift to David Krueger from the couple's children.

"I was really surprised and excited to get such a cool gift," he said.

His wife added: "The quilt really adds to the charm we were looking for on our farm. It's nice to finally be part of the Shawano County barn quilt project."

The pine tree quilt pattern fits the farm well, as pine trees border the farm and numerous pine trees grace their backyard and apple orchard.

The quilt pattern has been named "Pine Tree Favorite."

David's great-grandfather, William Krueger, was born in 1870. He bought two farms on River Bank Road in 1906.

The original Krueger homestead, where he lived and died, became the home and farm of two of his sons, Bert and Ervin Krueger. The farm is now owned by Marty Krueger.

The other farm to the east and just down the road was purchased from William by two other sons, William and Edwin, in 1926.

Edwin's son Norman, David's dad, born in 1940, bought the farm in 1962. When Edwin could no longer farm because of his health, he and wife, Melda, moved to another home on River Bank Road.

This farm is a century farm and a four-generation farm since 2006. In

1982, after several previous owners, Norman and Jane Krueger purchased the farm on Apple Road.

David Krueger purchased the farm from his dad, Norman, in 2006. The barn quilt is on the origi-

nal barn.

A new wing was added to the barn in 1989. A machine shed had been built in 1988, followed by a corn crib and two silos a couple of years later.

In 2005, they finished building a new house on the property, built from logs out of the woods on the farm on River Bank Road and sawed in the sawmill set up at that farm.

The couple lives on the Apple Road farm where they have lived for the past 30 years, and they have four children.

Their oldest daughter, Kayla, is married to Jason Behnke.

They have two children, Josie and Callie, and reside in Clintonville. Their second daughter, Jalissa, is married to Rohan Mckenzie, and they live in New London with Nevaeh, Kya and Elijah. David and Brenda's third daughter, Mariah, is married to Jake White.

Their two children, Marilyn and Jackson, reside with them in Brillion. The Kruegers' son, Collin, lives in Clintonville.

David and Brenda Krueger milk about 75 Holstein cows and have about 200 head, including the young stock.

They own DB Krueger Farm and have a partnership with Krueger Brothers, LLC.

Together they farm about 400 acres and raise oats, corn and alfalfa.

The Krueger quilt was painted by the Shawano County barn quilt committee and was put on display by LeRoy and Keith Raddant of Raddant Electric in Shawano.



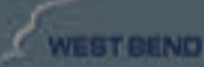

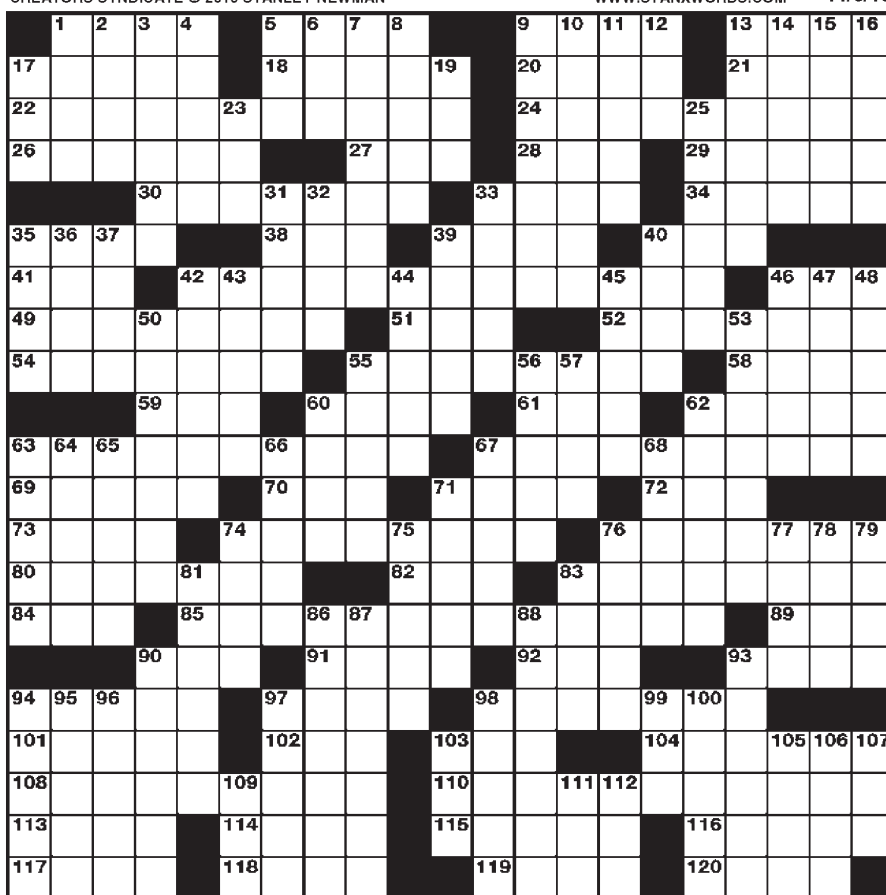

BONDUEL TEAMS READY FOR ANOTHER STATE RUN

Three local individuals hoping to finish off late season surges with strong finishes

SHAWANO — Two local teams and three individual runners will put on their uniforms and lace up their shoes one last time this season to compete in the 2019 State Cross-Country Championships at Ridges Golf Course on Saturday.

Bonduel will send its boys and girls teams into the Division 3 races, while Shawano's Demetrius Kaquatosh, Wittenberg-Birnamwood's Wyatt Dickman and Clintonville's Jesse Wilson all run as individuals in the Division 2 boys race.

It will mark the third straight year the Bonduel girls have participated in the state meet. The team took seventh in 2017 and 11th last fall.

Junior Kara Troxel led the team at state in both years, placing ninth last year after a fifth-place finish as a freshman.

"Making it to state as a team is very exciting," said Troxel, who placed fifth at the Westfield Sectional on Saturday. "It means another week to be together and being able to compare ourselves to the rest of the state. It also shows us what we need to improve on for the next year.

"It's been an exciting year making school history (being on a girls team that won its first-ever Central Wisconsin Conference title and will be making a third straight state appearance) and our team is ready to take on state and show everyone else what we can do."

Despite being in just her first year of high school cross-country, junior Kalleigh Schroeder has become one of the most consistent runners for the girls team. She took 15th at sectionals.

"As a first-time state competitor, I have learned that I need to give it my all and set a good, strong pace," said

Schroeder. "I just need to leave it all out there and run my best race."

Kendra Troxel will also get her first taste of the state competition on

Saturday. She has enjoyed a strong freshman season, most recently taking 23rd at sectionals.

Alexia Folkman will get the op-

portunity to finish her high school career competing amongst the best in the state. It will be the senior's first time running at state.

Like Kara Troxel, juniors Madison Kurey and Breanna Schnell and sophomore Jessica Ewing have ended all of their cross-country seasons at state.

Kurey has been the team's second best runner at state the past two years. She placed 21st at sectionals.

Ewing and Schnell served as Bonduel's third and fourth top runners at state in 2018. Schnell finished 24th at sectionals, while Ewing was 28th.

After a second-place finish as a team at sectionals, the girls team is hoping to finish in the upper half of the 16 total teams competing in D3.

The Bonduel boys team will also be making a third straight trip to state. The team took 15th in 2017 and 13th last fall.

Like the girls team, there will be three runners — sophomore Cooper Uelmen and freshmen Karter Schroeder and Ayden Dunst — competing at state for the first time.

Seniors Carter Kurey and William Beaumier have run at state twice, while senior Colen Klosterman and junior Jack Johnson were part of the state team in 2018.

Kurey has served as the boys top runner all season and led the team at sectionals with an eighth-place finish.

"It is really special to make it back down to state for the third time. We ran hard as a team and I am hoping we do the same at state," he said. "The main goal for the team is to have fun. We are all hoping to run our best while still having fun."

Uelmen and Johnson have served among among the team's top runners all season, and finished 14th and 17th, respectively, at sectionals.

It was the two freshmen that capped the boys team score in Westfield, with Schroeder coming in 20th and Dunst 24th.

"To end my senior season by going to state is very rewarding for me, because of how hard us seniors have worked," said Beaumier, who took 27th at sectionals. "We started our summer training this year with one goal in mind, and that was to make it back to state one more time. It truly is a humbling experience."

Shawano's Kaquatosh heads into the state meet fresh off several top finishes.

The senior earned a fourth-place finish in the small division of a loaded Seymour Invitational on Oct. 10.

Kaquatosh then went on to take first at the Bay Conference Meet on Oct. 17 before a second-place finish at the Tomahawk Sectional this past Saturday.

Kaquatosh credited his strong runs to goals he set for himself and credited coach Steve Stomberg and senior

teammate Karsten Anderson for helping him prepare for state this week.

"I just need to be mentally prepared," said Kaquatosh, who hopes to top his uncle Jim's second-place state finish in 1960. "I know what I have to do and where I need to finish, just really allowing myself to run my race rather than running to beat others. Just allow myself to get lost in the course and hope that I come out on top."

Witt-Birn's Dickman has also found a groove over the past month or so.

The junior was his team's top finisher at the CWC meet with a third-place finish on Oct. 17.

Dickman earned his state spot with a fifth-place finish at the Tomahawk Sectional.

"I'm really just going to go there and run. I don't make plans on how I'm going to do, I just see how I'm feeling and go from there," said Dickman, who noted senior teammate Cole Schairer has helped him out this week.

Since overcoming an injury early in the season, Wilson has piled up several top finishes.

Since the start of October, Wilson took third at the Rosholt Invite (Oct. 3), won the Marion Invitational (Oct. 7) and finished second at the Don Chase Relays (Oct. 10).

Wilson then took first at the North

Eastern Conference Championships on Oct. 19 before his sixth-place finish at the Tomahawk Sectional.

Wilson said he is hoping to improve upon his state finish as a freshman, when he took 121st place in 18 minutes: 18.3 seconds.

"I believe last year's experience will help out on Saturday because I will be better prepared for the course and the energy that the race brings

to the table," said Wilson. "In order for me to pull out a successful run at state, I need to keep a calm head and focus on my race."

The D3 girls race is scheduled for a 1:20 p.m. start. The D2 boys race is set for 2 p.m. while the D3 boys race will end the day of competition, starting at 3:10 p.m.

DNR hosting meeting regarding Wolf River management plan

Those with a love for the Wolf River, considered one of America's most pristine and natural waterways, will have a chance to learn more about its future Tuesday at an informational meeting in Shawano.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources meeting on the recently completed draft of the Wolf River Water Resources Management Plan will be held from 6:30-8:30 p.m. at Shawano Community High

School.

At the upcoming meeting, department staff will give an overview of the significant survey findings and water resource management goals and objectives for the section of the river stretching from Shawano Dam to Keshena Falls. Topics that will be discussed include fisheries and fish populations, aquatic plant management, aquatic invasive species, water quality and freshwa-

ter mussel populations.

The Wolf River is a major breeding area for the largest population of lake sturgeon in the world. Although construction of the Shawano Dam and Balsam Row Dam blocked upstream migration of sturgeon to some of their historic breeding grounds, cooperative efforts between the DNR and the Menominee Indian tribe in the 1990s eventually proved successful, and transplanted lake sturgeon have been seen spawning below Keshena Falls each spring since 2012.

The lake sturgeon is an important species in Menominee Indian culture.

The 224-page report identified one state-threatened fish species (river herring), a special concern fish species (lake sturgeon, mainly because it takes many years to reach sexual maturity), the state-threatened wood turtle and special concern Blanding's turtle, four mussel species, the smoky ruby spot damselfly and the bald eagle as species either of special concern, threatened or endangered — all found or believed living within this section of the Wolf.

The report also discusses the history of fish stocking on the river,

and several electroshocking and netting studies to look at the variety and numbers of fish. The Wolf River Pond and Balsam Row Pond have Northern pike, largemouth bass and smallmouth bass as the dominant predatory game fish, all of which are sustained entirely through natural reproduction. Walleyes and muskellunge there are in low density, although these waters and Shawano Lake have been stocked periodically since the 1940s.

Shawano Lake has been stocked with large fingerling walleye recently as part of the Wisconsin Walleye initiative, along with fry stockings from private sources, the report notes.

"We encourage citizens and stakeholders to come and learn more from these meetings and to provide feedback on this draft plan," said Justine Hasz, DNR Bureau of Fisheries Management director. "This public meeting provides an overview of our planning efforts, and DNR staff will answer any questions our stakeholders may have regarding the management of the aquatic resources in this study section."

The 225-mile Wolf River is one

of only two National Scenic Rivers in the state. Its watershed covers 12 northern and northeastern counties, starting at Pine Lake in Forest County and emptying into the Lake Winnebago system.

The final plan will be presented to the DNR Natural Resources Board and used as a master plan for future management of the river.

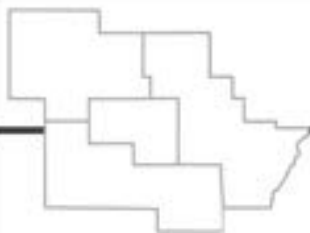

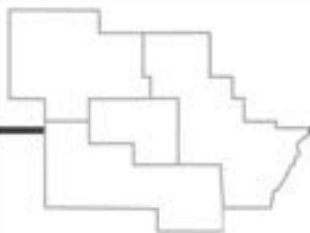

CLUB NOTES

Delta Kappa Gamma

Leah Luke was the guest speaker during Delta Kappa Gamma Nu Chapter's Oct. 26 meeting held at the Matteson Town Hall near Clintonville. A 2010 Wisconsin Teacher of the Year, Luke teaches Spanish at Mauston High School. Luke is on the board to create national standards for Educators Rising and is a member of the Wisconsin Rural School Alliance. She talked about Educators Rising and building a high school-to-teacher prep program pipeline.

There is a growing teacher shortage, not only in Wisconsin, but nationwide. Wisconsin emergency licenses and emergency permits almost doubled from 1,126 in 2012-2013 to 2,248 in 2017-2018. There has been a 35% drop in enrollment in Wisconsin teacher prep programs from 2010 to 2016.

Only 5% of ACT test takers in 2015 indicated an interest in going into teaching. That's just 87,563 nationwide. About 1.5 million new teachers are needed in the U.S. by 2020. In fall 2018, there were 3,426 new teachers statewide and 5,031 who left the profession. Wisconsin lost 1,605 teachers in one year.

Luke decided to take action and started the Educators Rising club in Mauston. Educators Rising is a national organization dedicated to supporting high school students interested in becoming teachers. There are currently 73 clubs across the state.

Mauston's club meets monthly and is free to all interested students. Students participate in discussions with educators and visit classrooms in urban, suburban and rural areas. They also visit universities throughout the state and attend the yearly summit where they meet future teachers, enter competitions and participate in professional development.

What skills can be generated on the high school level to create teachers? Mauston offers course recommendations such as psychology, statistics, Spanish and dual credit courses; child development, college writing, overview of special education and individual, school and society. Dual credit courses allow students to earn credits not only in high school, but also on the post-secondary level.

Students also have the opportunity to become classroom assistants and earn credit during the school year and summer school. Paid

internships are also available to future teachers.

Graduates enrolled in a school of education are invited back to talk with students about their college experiences. An Educator Milestones Breakfast is also sponsored by the club, where new retirees and first-year teachers speak to prospective teachers, legislators and educators about their experiences.

Shawano County Historical Society

Members, elected leaders, volunteers and friends of the Shawano County Historical Society met for the guild's annual meeting Oct. 21 at Shawano City Hall. President Mike Eidahl reviewed the activities of the

past year including Rhubarb Fest, Vintage Afternoon, school tours, concert series in Tabor Church and growth of the archives, proclaiming a successful year.

Highlighting the meeting was a presentation by Tom Aumann, SCHS vice president and self-described history buff, about the cause and effect of the Peshtigo Fire of Oct. 8, 1871. He observed that the fire was preceded by an extended drought in much of the Upper Midwest.

While hundreds of thousands of acres of forest and cropland in Northeast Wisconsin, the Upper Peninsula and Door County were consumed, the largest community affected was Peshtigo. An estimated 2,000 people perished. Some of the survivors resettled in the Shawano area. (This was the same day as the more infamous "Mrs. O'Leary's cow fire" in Chicago.)

During the business meeting, Executive Director Ben Dudzik provided an overview of the society's strategic planning process directed toward assuring long-term finan-

cial growth and viability, volunteer recruitment and development and expanding the community experience. He stressed that SCHS's remarkable array of buildings, collections, archives and core activities is an outstanding community asset, which needs enhanced visibility.

Eidahl presented two annual awards, the Melba Bayer Award for volunteer commitment to Betty Medo and the Ila Moede Award for keeping history alive to Ron Schumacher. Medo assists with archiving materials. Schumacher is active in fundraising and building maintenance. He's also a principal of the Bowler Historical Society.

SCHS, chartered in 1941, oversees the Heritage Park buildings and grounds on the site of the establishment of Shawano in 1843, described as "a mill surrounded by a few houses" in 1871, at the end of Franklin Street adjacent to Sunset (Monkey) Island. It conducts programs for the community to advance knowledge and appreciation

of the area's history and culture.
