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Bonduel students pay tribute to veterans

5 honor, define veterans in essays

BONDUEL — Students in the Bonduel School District gave a variety of interpretations of what makes a veteran — the very people they gathered Monday to honor.

As part of the district's annual tribute to area veterans, an essay contest was held to see who could write the best essay about the men and women who give up so much to fight for freedom. For some of the winning students, they know about veterans because family members, both close and distant, have gone into the military to protect the United States.

IzaBella Kuhn, a third grade student at Bonduel Elementary School, said there is an empty place at the dinner table in her home because her stepfather enlisted in the U.S. Army. She described the difficulty in saying goodbye over the summer as he went off to serve and the realization that her family would not be whole for some time.

"A veteran could be someone's mom, dad, son or daughter or any other family member," Kuhn said. "Many of their sacrifices are much bigger, and our veterans must be very brave to make these sacrifices."

Kuhn concluded by saying, "I'm very proud to say that I have an empty seat at my table."

Aliya Cynor, a sixth grade elementary student, noted that she has many veterans in her family, and they cover every branch of the Armed Forces except for the Navy.

"Veterans Day means a lot to me because I have so many family members in the different branches of the Armed Forces," Cynor said.

Veterans Day is about remembering the living soldiers, she noted, as they still have sacrificed much of themselves in order for people like her to enjoy the freedoms of today. Whether injured or healthy, the "ordinary people who made extraordi-

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nary sacrifices" should be recognized for the risk they put on their lives by putting on a military uniform and fighting America's enemies, she said.

"Just imagine the things we'd have to give up doing what these people did," Cynor said, noting military sacrifices were nothing compared with her having to go to school and obey her parents. "They gave up their personal safety, their mental safety, their friends, their home and the overall routine of their daily lives."

Adrian Ford, an eighth grade student from Bonduel Middle School, attempted to define what a veteran is, but noted it's not always easy to put someone in that definition. In her mind, all veterans are heroes, regardless of the role they play in the military.

Anyone can be a veteran, according to Ford, as long as they have courage, integrity, patriotism, citizenship, commitment and self-sacrifice.

"A veteran can be a mom helping her kids with homework, a fellow co-worker or even a neighbor down the street," Ford said. "Most people don't see the veterans in the crowds, just normal people. Veterans don't go waltzing around with their medals, bragging about their experiences.

They are everyday heroes you may not recognize."

Kaitlin Brooks, a Bonduel High School sophomore, said the definition of "veteran" in the dictionary doesn't seem to do justice for those who have served in the military.

"A veteran is a hero, someone who puts their life on the line for others," Brooks said. "A veteran is noble, brave and courageous. It is impossible to remain the same person when confronting death daily, and when they come back into their loving family's arms, they must try to leave what they experienced on the battlefield behind."

If it wasn't for the military, the United States would not have been born, said Joseph Renner, a Bonduel junior. Since that time, the military has fought to keep the country in existence.

"Because of this, the United States is able to be a place of strength and prosperity," Renner said. "Protecting the United States from harm has allowed all of its citizens to have the opportunity to flourish in the relative safety of the country. Every day, soldiers fight to keep us safe from threats unimaginable to many."

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City mulls future of former downtown SIST property

Grant money being sought for downtown plaza concept

SHAWANO — It's official. The city of Shawano now owns two blighted and dilapidated buildings formerly owned by the Samanta Roy Institute of Science and Technology.

The question now is, what will the city do with that property?

One option being explored would revive the pedestrian plaza concept previously floated in the downtown strategic plan and finding a way to link it to nearby Franklin Park.

The Shawano Redevelopment Authority reached an agreement with SIST in April to purchase the buildings at 214-216 S. Main St. for \$36,000, a price considered fair market value.

The RDA, a semi-independent panel tasked with addressing vacant and blighted buildings in the city, filed a condemnation petition in March against the long-vacant SIST properties at 214-216 S. Main St. and 143-145 S. Main St., citing building inspections that raised health and safety concerns.

The matter had been slated for a

condemnation hearing in court, but an agreement was ultimately reached that called for the city to purchase the buildings at 214-216 S. Main St. and let SIST keep the properties at 143-145 S. Main St. for the time being in hopes of eventually rehabilitating them.

Under the agreement, SIST has two years to do that.

An award of compensation documenting the city's ownership of 214-216 S. Main St. was filed Oct. 31 in the Shawano County Register of Deeds office.

The buildings on that site will eventually be torn down, according to City Administrator Eddie Sheppard.

"We believe the buildings are way beyond saving," he said.

The possibility of a developer putting a new building on the property is unlikely.

"The issue is, people just don't build those downtown-type buildings anymore," Sheppard said. "Once you've lost those older buildings, they're not going to redevelop."

The city is looking into possible grant funding for the plaza concept through the state Department of Administration's Public Facilities Program, which is aimed at improving community buildings and infrastructure in areas that meet low to moderate income requirements.

The program provides a match-

ing grant that would be double the money the city would put up for it, if it's approved.

The city is also exploring whether it can use existing Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds previously awarded to the city as its share of the matching grant.

The city has about \$497,000 in available CDBG funds, which have to be used before the state phases out the CDBG program in February 2021.

If the grant is approved using that money as the city's share, the Public Facilities Program could award more than \$994,000 toward the plaza concept.

It's not yet certain the city can use its CDBG funds that way, but, according to Sheppard, initial research into the idea suggests it's a possibility.

"We don't know," he said. "It's still too early to tell if that's something that's conceivable, or if we're even going to have the application approved."

That process will take through roughly February, Sheppard said.

There are no plans to demolish the buildings before then.

"Having the two dilapidated buildings there strengthens our grant application," Sheppard said. "If approved, it could also pay for their demolition. Early next spring, we'll deal with the buildings one way or another."

If the grant is rejected, the city would look at other options and could

use its existing CDBG fund balance for that purpose.

"Or if the (plaza) project becomes just not feasible, we can still use those funds for local infrastructure," Sheppard said.

The money would likely go to local road projects in the city's 2021 capital improvements program.

The preferred option is still creating a downtown plaza or some kind of public space that would be tied into Franklin Park.

"I think utilizing that space as a downtown center to support Franklin Park would be something that would be pretty neat for Shawano," Sheppard said. "We feel that could be a nice bridge to downtown and make that our kind of downtown center area."

There would be some hurdles to work out, however. Chief among them would be figuring out how to physically connect the plaza to Franklin Park.

Any pedestrian pathway would have to cross Main Street, which is also a state highway.

"Crossing Main Street would be a problem," Sheppard said, adding that everything right now is still at the conceptual stage.

"Certainly we would have to do something to improve the safety factor there or the awareness there," he said. "That is a hurdle for sure ... if the grant isn't approved."

“As a role model, I show students how you’re supposed to be respectful, be safe and everything,” Onesti said. “I show them by standing in line, by standing in a straight line. When someone falls down, you help them back up.”

Spates noted that being helpful is a common tradition at the school.

“I know that, when I was younger, there were older students who helped me,” Spates said. “I think it feels really cool to help.”

The visit to Kwik Trip was a sur-

Roloff earns Reserve Champion with lamb at Kansas City show

SHAWANO — The lambs are gone, the stall walls folded up. The barn is clean, equipment stacked in preparation for next year's campaign of showing market lambs at the Roloff family's Rockin' R ranch north of Shawano.

Prominent among the ribbons and awards neatly displayed on the walls is the Reserve Champion honor won by Lindsey Roloff with her crossbred lamb at the American Royal Association livestock show Oct. 19 in Kansas City, Missouri. She was the only contender from the Midwest to win with the other champions coming from Texas, Oklahoma, Ohio, Colorado and California.

Roloff, 18, said she's definitely looking forward to her 10th year of showing lambs and building on this year's successes. "I feel like it's been fun with my family. It's always a new day," Roloff, a Shawano Community High School graduate and current St. Norbert College student, said. "It's always a new judge and finding out what he thinks is important. There's a lot of motivation to see what's going to happen."

For 2019, Lindsey admitted she had really high hopes and expectations when she selected her lamb. He was very well put together, she said. The lamb had many of the characteristics that win in the show ring, such as a "big top, a big leg and tall-fronted," she said. "I didn't realize at first just how good he was," she added. "It was eye-opening."

Successful showing "evolves from making them comfortable with you and knowing the lamb and knowing what makes them look best," Lindsey said. Even though

they work together frequently, each sister has her own style in the show ring. Isabel, Lindsey's younger sister, said they couldn't switch lambs, for instance, and still be successful.

According to Lindsey, winning in the show ring is "90% the lamb and 10% me." Her father Jeff disagreed, asserting the importance of good showmanship. The Roloff sisters have also won showmanship recognition.

Crossbreds are shown most frequently, Lindsey explained, although they can also be classified and shown with purebreds, such as Hampshires and Suffolks. At the Wisconsin State Fair, for example, it's at the discretion of show officials on how a lamb is classified, she said.

Lindsey and Isabel found the right equation this year, sweeping

the top two places at more than one competition.

Lindsey showed the Grand Champion and Isabel had Reserve Champion at a show at Western Illinois University. "It was very exciting to know we were that competitive," Lindsey said.

"It's impressive to think about where we are now," Lindsey added. "Everywhere we went, we seemed to win something," she observed about their showing this year.

Her attraction to lambs started when she was a young girl and her father took her to the Shawano County Fair. Lindsey recalled how soft they are, telling her dad they "felt like a carpet." When she was 9 years old, she was eligible to participate in 4-H, Jeff Roloff said, and she chose a lamb to show that year.

Her excitement and enthusiasm grew after that first year, thanks in

part to the help and encouragement from other farm families in the area, as well as breeders around the state and region, Jeff Roloff said. As a family that didn't live on a farm and didn't have any farming or livestock background, he called his family's lamb showing experience a

4-H success story.

Isabel agreed, saying, "4-H gave us the building blocks."

Over the next few years, the Roloffs said they pursued better genetics to be more competitive in the show ring. "We were getting there but just not quite winning," Lindsey said. They began attending shows around the state and continued to pursue better animals. By the time she reached age 12 and could show at the Wisconsin State Fair, the entire family was involved including eldest sister Lauren and mother, Jenny Roloff. They also acquired their Rockin' R facility.

The family kept its own flock of ewes for breeding show candidates for several years. Last fall, however, with Lindsey off to college in DePere and Lauren attending the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, the Roloffs sold those sheep.

Leave the leaves for the winter

The leaves are still coming down. With our early season snowfalls over the past few weeks and below-normal temperatures that have dipped into the single digits, many trees in our area still have not let go of their fall leaves.

I have seen and heard over the past few weeks from many area residents who are convinced that they “need to rake.”

Let’s help relieve some of your stress over this perceived gardening myth. You do not “need” to rake. You may choose to rake. You may “want” to rake, but it’s not an absolute necessity.

Does Mother Nature rake her landscapes during the fall season? No. Every one of those fallen leaves serves a valuable purpose in nature and in your own yard and garden.

Leaves are the ideal natural insulation for garden plants. Leaves are also a wonderful and rich natural soil amendment as they break down over the winter season. They provide a natural fertilizer in the garden bed and border. Leaves make a rich, organic natural compost, providing a wealth of nutrients so much better for your plants and soil than any manufactured chemical product.

In addition to these practical and useful garden benefits, fallen leaves and standing garden perennials provide shelter for wildlife, overwintering luna moths, cecropia moths, mourning cloaks, tortoiseshells, black swallowtails, native bees and so much more.

Tree frogs, American toads, wood frogs, salamanders and other forest creatures overwinter beneath the protective layer of leaves and debris.

The “I need to rake” myth is as outdated as the “I need to have a perfectly manicured, green lawn” myth.

At some point, many decades ago, a genius marketing ploy brainwashed the general masses into believing these things were necessary, and it worked. For decades, these traditions of manicured lawns and raking away nature’s treasures have been passed down from one generation to the next as simply “that’s what we have always done.”

Bravo to all the individuals or or-

ganizations out there trying to reverse these old ways of thinking. There are entire books, even businesses passionately dedicated to spreading the knowledge and importance of leaving

the leaves and allowing perennials to remain standing all winter for the benefits they provide.

There has been volumes of research released the past two years by many of the largest and most important environmental and wildlife organizations from many sources about the importance of “leaving the leaves” and allowing your garden plants to remain standing throughout the winter.

Do some quick online research. Discover the benefits. Read the articles and social media posts. You’ll discover a whole new way of thinking and gardening.

There are many great uses for leaves and ways to take care of leaves other than raking. Some are as simple as mulching repeatedly for a wonderful and easy natural fertilizer and compost. Search out other options online.

Start exploring those options and take all of that unnecessary pressure and stress off yourself. So many people I’ve listened to and read comments from over the past few weeks are unnecessarily stressing themselves

out because the snow and cold will not allow them to rake.

Of course, as with anything, there are exceptions to this. There are things that should always be completely removed from the garden. That includes any diseased leaves such as maple tar spot, powdery and downy mildew, as well as any and all types of nightshade waste in your garden, including every part of all tomatoes, potatoes, peppers and eggplants. Nightshades must always be removed in order to prevent diseases from spreading the following season.

If you find that you truly must rake, do yourself a favor and think of it as a gardening pleasure, not as “work.” Once you make it work, the joy disappears. I, personally find peace and joy in raking. I love the sound and the feel of the leaves and the crunch beneath my feet and, of course, the crisp autumn air.

Pat Gunderson retires from bowling after 70 years

Resch dedicates 'Pat's Lane' for local man

WITTENBERG — It all began 70 years ago with an invitation to take turns bowling and setting up pins.

The Wittenberg Bowling Center was a new building at the time and a new business, offering a sport that would last a lifetime.

In 1948, Pat Gunderson had just gotten out of the U.S. Army at the age of 20 and started playing a sport that he thought would be a great social and physical outlet. With a quick calculation of three games a week, 30 weeks in a bowling season for 70 years, he figures he's bowled a minimum of 6,300 games. That figure doesn't factor in the numerous tournaments — some local, many at the state competition level.

"I covered a lot of ground in the state with bowling," said Gunderson. "Appleton, Green Bay, Madison — always on a men's league."

The bowling alley has changed ownership over the years, and he's played for several sponsors, including Cappel's department store, Bushman's, Liberty Potatoes and Hanke's Red Owl/Super Valu/Sentry Foods.

His most memorable moment of winning was during a Thursday Night Men's league in 1993 when he was bowling for Liberty Packaging. They were going for the league championship, and he shot a 278. He remembers being nervous because his team members were all hoping he'd do great. His teammates included Ernie Bushman, Joe Bushman, Dave Bardo, Rich Foerster and 20-year-old Jason Resch.

Resch eventually bought the bowling alley. On Oct. 16, he dedicated a lane to Gunderson, who is giving up the sport at the age of 91.

"As long as I've got the bowling alley, it will remain Pat's Lane," Resch said to the crowd of bowlers and watchers who came that night to help Gunderson officially retire from bowling.

Resch designated lane seven to be "Pat's Lane" and changed the number to 70 in honor of Gunderson's 70 years of dedication to the sport.

"He was one of my first teammates when I was a teen," said Resch. "I've never heard him say

a bad word about anyone, and I've never heard anyone say a bad word about him."

The admiration was mutual, as Gunderson noted Resch was probably the reason he kept bowling as long as he did. He acknowledged that Resch is a master at knowing his job. He could watch you, tell you what you're doing wrong and how to correct it.

"I was surprised with Jason. He was like a son and a good friend, too," said Gunderson. "We became very close."

Gunderson and his wife, Jean, raised seven children. Two of them — son Ray and daughter Shelley Boda — shared the love of bowling with him.

His son recalled that back in the day, his dad was a 160-170 average bowler.

When Boda noted that her dad needed to switch to a lighter ball when he got old, Gunderson quipped, "Speak for yourself. I never got old!"

He also joked that "the more beer I drank, the better I got, and later switched to Fuzzy Navels."

Boda noted that in smaller towns, bowling is more friendly because you know everyone. She felt it is an honor for a young man like Resch to have the respect that he has for her dad.

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"As I got older, the more important it became to me," said Gunderson, who enjoyed the camaraderie of the people who shared the love of the sport.

There were many people on hand to help Gunderson celebrate the lane dedication. It just happened that his old team, Hanke's, was bowling that night on his lane. Gary Hanke, spon-

sor of the team, was the first guy to get a strike on Pat's Lane.

For Resch, the night was a great way for him to honor a 26-year relationship, and he thought it would be nice for Gunderson to have that.

"I like seeing nice things happen to nice people," Resch said, "and he's one of the nicest people I know."

Down eight, Carolina put together a 18-play, 83-yard drive to try and tie up the game. Faced with a second-and-goal from the 2, the Panthers tried to run the ball with MVP candidate Christian McCaffrey, but the Packers kept the running back out of the end zone to improve to 8-2 overall.

The game-ending run by McCaffrey was just the second rushing play called on the drive.

"I knew that anything was possible. There were four seconds left. It's the last play of the game," said Packers coach Matt LaFleur. "I said something to (Mike Pettine, the defensive coordinator): 'They are going to pick their best football play.' So, that did not surprise me."

On a cold and snowy afternoon, it was running back Aaron Jones who stole the show for the Packers' offense, rushing for 93 yards and all three of the team's touchdowns.

Jones averaged 7.2 yards per carry and helped the Packers rush for 163 yards as a team.

Jones' big day made him the first Packer since Jim Taylor in 1962 to have multiple three-plus touchdown games in the same season.

"I know that Christian (McCaffrey) is a very talented player, and he's been mentioned in the MVP race, so maybe it's time to start talking about Aaron Jones," said Packers quarterback Aaron Rodgers, who threw for 233 yards.

While Rodgers connected on just 17 of his 29 pass attempts, he hit on a number of big plays to help the Packers' offense tally 388 total yards.

After Carolina scored the game's first touchdown, Rodgers and the offense answered with a quick touchdown drive.

The drive started with a 20-yard pass interference call on the Panthers. Rodgers then hit Jake Kumerow, Allen Lazard and Davante Adams on first-down passes before Jones scored from five yards out to tie the game.

Carolina looked to take control of the game after tacking on a field goal and then forcing a Green Bay punt, but Panthers rookie quarterback Kyle Allen mishandled a snap near midfield and Packers defensive lineman Montravius Adams recovered.

Rodgers hit Davante Adams on a beautiful 37-yard pass down the right sideline to kickstart the ensuing drive before Jones scored from a yard out to give the Packers their first lead.

After forcing the Panthers to punt, Green Bay put together a 13-play, 70-yard drive to get inside the Carolina 10-yard line, but they couldn't punch the ball into the end zone.

LaFleur rolled the dice and tried to score a touchdown instead of taking an easy field goal try with two seconds left and the ball at the 1, but a run play to Jamaal Williams was stuffed in the backfield, keeping Green Bay off the scoreboard.

The rookie coach didn't regret the decision.

"If I had to do it again, I'd go for it again. It's just, probably pick a different play. I would pick a different play. There's no probably about it," said LaFleur. "But, live and learn."

The Packers offense continued to

move the ball to open the second half. After a sack and penalty had Green Bay facing a second-and-26 from its own 9, Rodgers hit Adams for 38 yards, Jones busted off a 28-yard run and Rodgers hit Kumerow for another 12 yards.

Jones scored on a 13-yard run on the next play.

Carolina looked to be on its way to putting up a touchdown on the next drive, but cornerback Tramont Williams intercepted a pass in the end zone after the ball slipped through safety Adrian Amos' hands.

Green Bay drove 51 yards in 11 plays, and Mason Crosby connected on a 47-yard field goal to make it 24-10.

Crosby had missed from 52 yards, but the Panthers were called for illegal formation, which gave Crosby another kick.

Carolina scored on its next drive, but failed a two-point conversion try, to make it 24-16.

Green Bay had a couple of possessions to try and seal the win, but was unable to pick up enough first downs, giving the Panthers one final chance to win it in the waning minutes.

GRESHAM — The Gresham Community High School volleyball team posted a perfect record to win the Central Wisconsin Conference-North Division this fall. The team was honored in a big way, with senior Karisa Nietzer being named the conference's Player of the Year and Tim Wild being tabbed the Coach of the Year.

"It means a lot to me. I've worked so hard and long for that achievement," said Nietzer. "I went into every game thinking that I need to play hard no matter what, because in the end it would pay off."

"Winning Coach of the Year just shows how well this team worked on the court each night," said Wild. "They deserve the credit because if they don't go out and execute the gameplan each night, the coach doesn't get recognition like this. 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Bill aims to aid rural businesses

Tauchen sponsors bill headed to Evers' desk

MADISON — Rural business owners, including dairy manufacturers and processors, will have expanded access to loan money with the Nov. 7 state Assembly's unanimous approval of Senate Bill 219. The bill, with Rep. Gary Tauchen as primary Assembly sponsor, advances to Gov. Tony Evers for signature.

Evers' approval is mandatory for the bill to become law. Tauchen said he was hopeful the signing will be soon. Efforts to confirm the governor's intentions were unsuccessful as of the Leader's press deadline.

The Wisconsin State Senate approved SB 219 in June with Sen. Rob Cowles voting "aye."

Tauchen expressed satisfaction with the bill's passage that increases state loan guarantees to make lending easier. "If farmers and processors do well, the rest of the economy does well," he said. He added rural businesses will have more opportunities to expand and modernize.

The Legislative Reference Bureau stated in its analysis the bill launches a pilot program under Wisconsin Housing and Economic Development Authority administration. The bureau, a nonpartisan legislative resource, drafts all legislation for the legislature and writes analyses of legislation.

Using existing funds available through the Agribusiness Guarantee Program, \$3 million in loan guarantee authority would support rural development projects — includ-

ing brick-and-mortar investments, equipment and machinery, marketing and working capital.

The pilot would guarantee up to 25% of a loan or \$750,000, whichever is less. The borrower is required to pay back the entirety of the loan, with a state commitment only made in the event of a default.

The Legislative Reference Bureau noted the term of a loan guarantee is revised to not exceed: 10 years for land and buildings; five years for inventory, equipment and machinery; and two years for permanent working capital and marketing expenses.

The bill established a closing fee that may not exceed 1.5% for a loan guarantee. Current law does not address closing fees.

The pilot program sunsets as of July 1, 2024, according to the bureau.

The bill had its origins with the Wisconsin Dairy Task Force 2.0, a joint effort of the state Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection and the University of

Wisconsin. Tauchen said the task force, like its predecessor in the 1980s, was a response to a prolonged downturn in agriculture.

The task force's goal was to suggest actions needed to maintain a viable and profitable dairy industry in Wisconsin, according to its website.

The Bonduel-area representative's bill was based on one of the 51 recommendations made.

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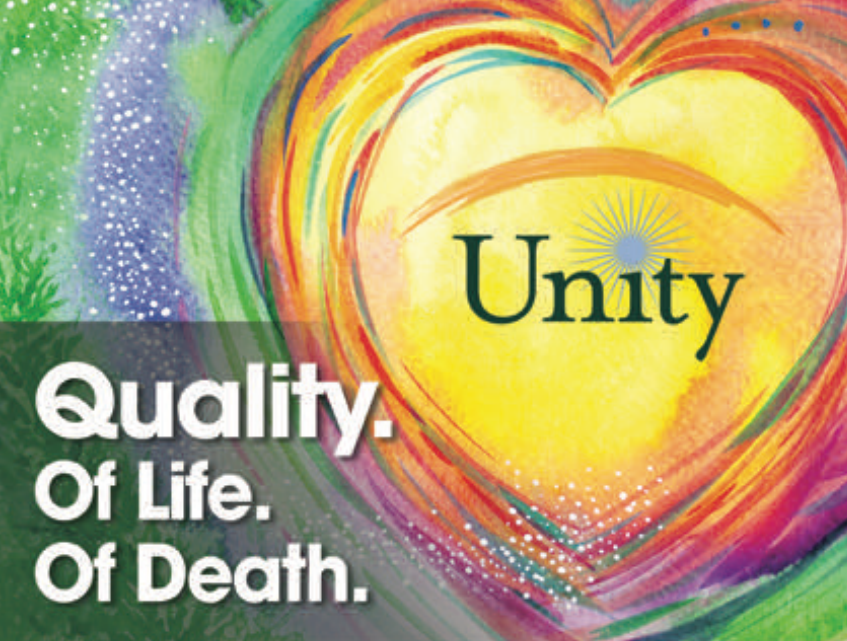
