## School board updated on rec center outreach

Meetings to end this month; survey coming in fall

**SHAWANO** — The reaction at community meetings this summer regarding a proposed new joint recreation center between the city of Shawano and the Shawano School District has been about split down the middle.

Jeff Easter, buildings and grounds director for the district, told the Shawano School Board on Monday that it has been about 50-50 from the 17 meetings that have been held in the area whether or not they think a new center housed at Shawano Community High School would be a good thing. He noted Belle Plaine's town meeting had more naysayers, while the town of Wescott seemed the most receptive.

"People had a lot of good questions, a lot of 'aha' moments where they were able to wrap their brains around what this was about and get a feel for it," Easter said.

Board member Michael Sleeper, who attended several of the meetings, said that the most positive aspects of the proposed center were the indoor walking track and the pool.

The meetings will end this month, and after that, the district will send out a survey in early October to get a better gauge of the community's temperature. Easter noted that the average turnout at the meetings was 10-12.

Survey questions and language is expected to go before an ad hoc committee on Sept. 11. Once that is approved, the final survey form will go to the board for approval on Sept. 16.

Easter said the deadline to return the surveys, whether by mail or online, will be the third week in Octo-

ber, but no specific date was named. The results would be presented to be the board in November, he said, and then a decision would be made whether or not to take the issue to a referendum in 2020.

Board member Chuck Dallas recommended that Easter try to reach out to agriculture producers within the district. He noted that it was unlikely many of them would attend the early-evening meetings because that's when they were milking their cows.

"I would definitely consider that because we have some rather large landowners in the district," Dallas said.

Easter said that the ad hoc committee also had a subcommittee working to see if corporate or private donors could help offset the taxpayers cost. Current estimates put a new center at as much as \$28 million.

# Charges filed in town of Richmond drug bust

## Rural Shawano man faces numerous felony counts

**SHAWANO** — A rural Shawano man identified in a criminal complaint as a large-scale supplier of illegal drugs in the Shawano County area was charged Monday with multiple felony drug counts.

Lee E. Lindner, 31, is facing four felony counts of delivering methamphetamine, one felony count of manufacture and delivery of marijuana, one felony count of maintaining a drug trafficking place and a felony count of bail jumping.

Authorities arrested Lindner Wednesday at his residence in the town of Richmond after executing a search warrant.

The Shawano County Sheriff's Department learned in April of Lindner's alleged activities from a confidential informant.

The source had purchased eight-ball quantities (approximately 3.5 grams) of methamphetamine each day from Lindner beginning in February of 2019 for personal use, according to the criminal complaint.

Lindner would charge \$135 for the 3.5 grams of methamphetamine, according to the complaint.

The source also stated Lindner sells ounces of marijuana for \$175 to \$200 and takes in about \$1,000 per day total on drug sales.

The source said Lindner regularly purchased meth and cocaine from a residence in Green Bay.

The source estimated the average amount of drugs that Lindner was supplied with each week as eight to 16 ounces of cocaine and crack cocaine per week, and four to eight ounces of methamphetamine each week.

A second confidential informant also described Lindner as a large-scale dealer of meth and cocaine

and said Lindner kept numerous weapons around the house "in case someone messed with him," according to the complaint.

Authorities conducted three controlled drug buys in July, each time using a confidential informant to purchase \$200 in meth from Lindner, according to the complaint.

During the execution of the search warrant Thursday, authorities seized 10.57 grams of methamphetamine and 1,029.07 grams of marijuana.

Authorities also found numerous drug paraphernalia, baggies, a scale, a ledger tracking drug transactions, \$465 in cash and a .45 caliber semi-automatic pistol.

The sheriff's department was assisted by Shawano and Stockbridge-Munsee police departments, the Waupaca County Emergency Response Unit, state Division of Criminal Investigation and the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency.

Three women at the residence were also taken into custody. Two had outstanding arrest warrants and the third was arrested by Stockbridge-Munsee police in connection with another incident. Two children at the residence were turned over to the Department of Human Services.

Lindner could face a maximum 15 years in prison and \$50,000 fine on each count if convicted of delivery of methamphetamine. One of those counts could have 10 years and \$50,000 added to the penalty because of the use of a dangerous weapon.

He could also face 10 years and a \$25,000 fine for manufacture and delivery of marijuana. That count also carries an additional penalty for use of a dangerous weapon.

At a court appearance Monday, Judge William Kussel Jr. ordered Lindner held on a \$500 cash bond and a \$4,500 signature bond.

Lindner is due back in court for an adjourned initial appearance Aug. 19.

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# Dinah helps the healing begin

## Therapy dog at Homme Youth and Family Programs

**WITTENBERG** — Who can be there for you when you don't have the words to express your emotions?

Dinah, the therapy dog at Homme Youth and Family Programs, Wittenberg, can provide a service not many humans can offer in times of trouble and that is unconditional love.

A 45-pound golden retriever, Dinah meets with the boys three days a week and even participates in group sessions. She can provide a sense of understanding and acceptance which many of the residents have never felt in their young lives.

Therapist Rita Berkley acquired Dinah eight years ago when she was just an eight-week old puppy. Even though she knew the breed was good for hunting and therapy, it was just a dream that Dinah might eventually become a therapy dog. Having joined this profession so late in her life, retrievers live 12-16 years, Dinah has the added benefit of being very calm.

Berkley joined the Homme staff about a year and a half ago, but it wasn't until this year that she put Dinah through the certification process required by Therapeutic Dogs International. She needed to go through a six-week obedience training course offered Monday nights in Antigo.

Dinah then needed to pass a personality test. By doing a personality profile, trainers are able to assess if the dog gets along well with other dogs, humans, buildings and situations.

The dogs can't be hyper or a nuisance. Not every dog who passes obedience training is suitable for being a therapy dog.

Generally, court ordered to be at Homme, about 100% of the boys

have been sexually abused and about 70% have been offenders. A staggering statistic, but one that Berkley likes to point out when she meets with the boys to help let them know they are not facing these issues alone.

Dinah is there to help comfort them when therapy gets too intense or their feelings make it seem safer for them to shut down. Dinah provides that link back to reality.

Most of the boys are at Homme

for nine months to a year to work through their treatment program. According to Berkley the experience requires individual, group and family therapy. Currently Homme is running at almost full capacity, with a waiting list for some treatment programs.

Homme has 12 boys in the Acceptance program. These boys are 14-21 years of age and part of the goal is to prepare them to work and interact in society. The 12 boys in

Nelson Hall are 10-14 years old and the primary focus is getting them integrated back into a safe family environment. The boys in Quest are cognitively delayed, autistic or have a mental illness diagnosis and need more specialized attention so they keep that population at eight boys.

As one of Homme's four therapists, Berkley picks the boys from each unit that can best respond to nonverbal therapy, generally the younger ones who can benefit from more one on one attention. Dinah helps out when there are no words to express the feelings a boy may have because of the trauma he's been through.

Dinah is just present for the boys. She works Mondays, Wednesday and Fridays in the office with Berkley.

"A lot of times the kids while in a therapy session will be reacting to the process and when the kid starts stressing out or shutting down, Dinah senses that and goes to them," Berkley said. "She will put her nose under their hand. They won't reject her the way they would another person."

Berkley will tell the boys when they're angry and start acting out that Dinah can't handle the anger or violence and they calm down. Dinah is never used as a reward for good behavior.

Occasionally Berkley will take Dinah to the units just to play. She is also available to the other therapists.

Berkley is from the suburban Chicago area. She has a master of arts and expressive art therapy and is currently working towards her doctorate in human behavior, counseling. She is a registered art therapist. Berkley has worked off and on in residential programs and in home counseling for over 25 years. Now that she is an empty-nester, she is glad to be back in this type of work.

"I never could have done this kind of therapy when I was working full time and a single mother," Berkley said, "but am glad I am back doing it at this stage in my life."

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# RIDING THE RAILS OF HISTORY

## Eland Day celebration Saturday

**ELAND** — Summer time celebrations define life in Wisconsin and Eland celebrates a nod to the past on Saturday.

The festivities, from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., for family friendly Eland Day include food and retail vendors and access to all things railroad. Sponsored by the village of Eland and the Eland Historical Society this offers a chance to reconnect with the past.

Evidence of this life from the 1880s and beyond can be found in the Eland Depot at N7718 Wheeler Ave., which now serves as the museum for the Eland Historical Society. Thanks to the generous donations from descendants of those who lived in the area and were employed by the railroads, there are railroad tools and railroad artifacts, and historic photos of the Eland railroad, businesses and homes.

In the days of steam locomotives, Eland was a major junction for the train lines. The Wiowash Trail from Oshkosh to Ashland intersected with the Mountain Bay Trail from Ft. Howard to Wausau to Marshfield. Eland was the only place where the trails intersected.

Freight would come up from Milwaukee or over from Green Bay and the Eland yard had 13 different tracks where they could switch out engines and cars for a variety of destinations.

According to society president Mike Ekern, around 80-90 trains a day passed through Eland during the steam engine days. The town thrived on the train business. There were two hotels,

three churches, and a school.

Local historian Rod Best acknowledged the village started to decline when the line from Green Bay was abandoned in April 1993. There's a picture in the museum taken on Jan. 30, 1994, of the last train rolling out of Eland with engineer J.J. Zabransky and James Buss, conductor.

Preserving the history is a passion for some. Ekern said that Dave and Kay Norrbom and Gus and Ann

Weller have made and sought donations and continue to generate interest for the society.

"We've been fortunate to have generous donors over the years," Ekern said. "What we need now is some fresh blood to take over and carry on the history."

Ekern and other members of the historical society hope that Eland Day will bring out people interested in getting involved in preserving the

history of the area.

On Saturday there will be free access to the museum as well as family friendly train rides. Rail equipment on display includes a Plymouth locomotive, two speedsters, an 1880s handcar and an rail express wagon.

Food for sale will be provided by Hula Hut, Pack 447 Cub Scouts and Carol's Kettle Corn. Vendors will have tents set up to sell handcrafted and retail items.

# Shawano hospital gets Level IV trauma designation

**SHAWANO** — Four ThedaCare hospitals have recently been certified as Level IV trauma facilities. ThedaCare Medical Center-Shawano, as well as locations in Berlin, New London and Wild Rose, received the designation by the state of Wisconsin.

“The Level IV trauma designation for Berlin, New London, Shawano and Wild Rose represents the commitment ThedaCare has to improving the health of the communities we serve,” said Mark Thompson, chief financial officer and chief operating officer for ThedaCare. “By offering advanced trauma care close to home, we are able to best serve our patients and their families.”

A Level IV facility is one that provides stabilization and advanced trauma life support prior to patient transfer to a higher-level hospital.

Participation in the classification system is voluntary. According to Wisconsin Department of Health Services, the purpose of the state-wide trauma care system is to reduce

death and disability after a traumatic injury, while providing the best care possible.

“When traumatic injuries happen, seconds matter,” said Thompson. “Rural hospitals with trauma experience ... allow teams to stabilize and care for the patient, and if necessary, transfer that person to a higher level trauma center.”

A significant feature of the ThedaCare trauma program is ThedaStar. The air medical program provides helicopter transports and transfers for trauma patients and critically ill patients, including transport from our rural hospitals.

“We couldn’t do what we do without all of our partners at the rural hospitals,” said Dr. Ray Georgen, the ThedaCare System trauma medical director. “When there is a traumatic injury, that person receives the critical, first level care at rural hospitals. That care can lead to better outcomes if it is necessary to transport them to a higher level trauma center.”

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# USDA has new tool to help farmers, ranchers get loans

A new online tool can help farmers and ranchers find information on U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) farm loans that may best fit their operations.

USDA has launched the new Farm Loan Discovery Tool as the newest feature on farmers.gov, the department's self-service website for farmers.

"Access to credit is critical in the agriculture industry, especially for new farmers," said Bill Northey, undersecretary for farm production and conservation. "This new interactive tool can help farmers find information on USDA farm loans within minutes. We are working to improve our customer service, and part of our solution is through improving how farmers can work with us online."

USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) offers a variety of loan options to help farmers finance their operations. From buying land to financing the purchase of equipment, FSA loans can help. Compared to this time last year, FSA has seen an 18 percent increase in the amount it has obligated for direct farm ownership loans, and through the 2018 Farm Bill, has increased the limits for several loan products.

USDA conducted field research in eight states, gathering input from farmers and FSA farm loan staff to better understand their needs and challenges.

"We received suggestions from both farmers and our staff on how to

improve the farm loan process, and we wanted to harness this opportunity to be more efficient and effective," Northey said. "This feature is one step in our efforts."

Farmers who are looking for financing options to operate a farm or buy land can answer a few simple questions about what they are looking to fund and how much money they need to borrow. After submitting their answers, farmers will be provided information on farm loans that best fit their specific needs. The loan application and additional resources also will be provided.

Farmers can download application quick guides that outline what to expect from preparing an application to receiving a loan decision. There are four guides that cover loans to individuals, entities, and youth, as well as information on microloans. The guides include general eligibility requirements and a list of required forms and documentation for each type of loan. These guides can help farmers prepare before their first USDA service center visit with a loan officer.

Farmers can access the Farm Loan Discovery Tool by visiting farmers.gov/fund and clicking the "Start" button. Follow the prompts and answer five questions to receive loan information. The tool is built to run on any modern browser like Chrome, Edge, Firefox, or Safari, and is fully functional on mobile devices. It does not work in Internet Explorer.

# MONARCHS' REST STOP

## Milkweed perfect spot for butterflies migrating south

The month of August brings the beginning of the spectacular migration of regal monarchs across the state as their long journey south to the mountains of central Mexico is under way.

A frenzy of breeding activity takes place during the first few weeks of the month as the monarch population skyrockets during the heat of summer, building up to a peak as the

migration begins.

Of course, as many people know, milkweed is a vital component in the rise of the monarch, as this is the only plant that the butterfly will host upon. This means that milkweeds are the only plants that monarch caterpillars can feed upon to survive.

Here in our area, there are several species of native milkweeds that help

to increase monarch numbers. Not only is the milkweed plant the only host plant for the monarch butterfly, these are also essential and important nectar sources for monarchs, as well as just about every other pollinator in Wisconsin.

Many gardeners are intimidated by the thought of milkweed in the garden and landscape because of the highly aggressive nature of the most abundant species, the common milkweed. This plant should be given plenty of room to spread as it is quite aggressive and competitive once established. However, for gardeners who do not have the space for the largest species, there are plenty of other smaller, more compact milkweed varieties to utilize in the garden and landscape.

One of the most popular is the beautiful orange milkweed, often sold as butterfly weed, blooming in a rich, vibrant, fiery orange that lasts from early to late summer. Growing just 2 feet high by 2 feet wide, orange milkweed is compact and very attrac-

tive where included in the garden.

A plant of the prairie, orange milkweed prefers dry, sandy soils and full sun to look its finest. Orange milkweed is an excellent companion plant to grow alongside smaller grasses such as little bluestem, prairie dropseed, as well as other smaller native wildflowers such as wild lupine, penstemon, wild petunia and beautiful blazing stars.

Another small, compact variety of native milkweed is the lacy, fern-leaf whorled milkweed. Growing just 12-18 inches high, the thin, needle-like leaves and gorgeous, elegant white flowers set this plant apart.

Swamp milkweed, also known as red milkweed because of the darker coloration, is an excellent choice for damp areas, even in standing water, as well as along stream, lake and pond edges. While it grows quite tall, 3-5 feet in height, swamp milkweed remains relatively compact in size, growing just a few feet wide. This makes swamp milkweed much more desirable in the garden than common

milkweed, which can spread uncontrollably.

Common milkweed, despite its nature, is still, perhaps, the number one host plant for monarchs. This is because the plant features lush, abundant foliage on which the caterpillars can feed until they are ready to transform into the adult stage. The blossoms are also heavenly fragrant, with a sweet, delicious aroma that can be enjoyed throughout early to mid summer.

The large, sometimes tennis ball sized clusters of blossoms of common milkweed are precious not only to monarchs, but other pollinators, as well. Hummingbirds, butterflies of all species, bees and more take advantage of the rich, sweet nectar.

Include a variety of milkweed species in your yard and landscape to help ensure a productive August for monarchs as migration time arrives.

## About 100 vehicles showcased at Bowler Bash car show

**BOWLER** — Every vehicle has a story.

The shiny finishes, the countless hours spent fixing things under the hood, the fuzzy dice hanging from the mirror, and even the owners that have driven the vehicles and been responsible for their care.

At the car show Saturday on the grounds of the Bowler Historical Society, almost 100 of those stories were on display standing side by side with each other, similar to books on a shelf. The owners were on hand to share those stories with

each other, as well as any other visitors eager to check out the vehicles.

Two vehicles once owned by John Brunner, a Bowler resident who passed away last year, were on display, now owned by his children.

Emily Hintt, of Antigo, was cleaning the rear of a shiny, maroon 1936 Ford coupe. She received the vehicle after Brunner's passing and has taken good care of it.

"My father owned this vehicle for about a year and a half before he passed," Hintt said.

Next to the coupe was a 1940 Ford pickup. That vehicle, also owned by Brunner, went to his son, Matt Brunner, who lives in Bowler.

On the other side of the grounds from the Brunner family's vehicles was a red 1957 Chevy Corvette, being tenderly cared for by its owner, Frank Braiske, of Lakewood. Braiske was cleaning gunk off the

windshield using Zep, a product he swears by and claims does a better job at leaving the windshield shiny than Windex or other products.

“When I go to car shows, mine is always the oldest one,” Braiske said, pointing to another Corvette a few paces away from his. That Corvette is white and a convertible, manufactured in 1961 and owned by Carol Huntington from Shawano.

Braiske said he likes to enter the car show in his own hometown and notes it usually comes in first or second.

Another vehicle with a tale to tell was a 1967 Ford F-100. However, the story was not in the parts of the pickup that still remained — it was in what had been replaced.

The mustard-yellow colored Ford is owned by Bernie Meyer, of Tigerton. Meyer eagerly pointed out the rear of the pickup to the wood that made up the bed, all of it

coming from Tigerton.

“When I first got this truck, the back was all rotted out,” Meyer said.

It took six years and a lot of work, but the wood bed is just as attractive and shiny as the rest of the vehicle, which needed other work to run. Meyer noted that he was at the local car show last year, but he had an issue getting it there, noting the battery died, and he couldn’t open the heavy hood by himself.

Meyer noted the Ford was originally titled in Virginia, but he bought it in Wittenberg.

“I was just seven years out of high school when this was built,” Meyer said.

The car show was part of the annual Bowler Bash held last weekend. The village also played host to a parade, a corn roast, musicians and other activities.

the vaccine, we have seen polio cases decrease significantly. So many lifesaving medications, tests and procedures have been discovered/invented over the decades.

Modern technology has allowed us to communicate on social media with our relatives in other countries. I have become Facebook friends with family I have never met, who live in the country of Denmark.

Just last week, I read a social media post about changes Walmart is making inside their store. Although I have not been shopping lately, apparently things are (or were) in disarray during the process. Obviously, the public is not aware of what prompted the changes. Perhaps they are adding a new product line. Maybe it is a marketing decision; a new look, a face lift.

# Several Packers shine during Family Night

## Fans get first look at team on Lambeau Field

**GREEN BAY** — Several Green Bay Packers coaches and players got their

first taste of competing at historic Lambeau Field during Family Night on Friday, with several individual players having nights to remember.

A total of 56,133 fans attended the practice, with many of them getting their first look at those that will be donning the green and gold during the 2019 season.

"What an environment. I've never been a part of anything like that in my life," said Packers new coach

Matt LaFleur following the practice. "I don't know what the final number was, but when you can almost fill up that stadium on a practice, that's pretty unreal. It just shows the passion and loyalty that this fanbase has, which is awesome."

"Yeah, I definitely feed off the crowd. It was just great to see how many fans came out here," said rookie running back Dexter Williams. "I was like, 'Wow, this is unbelievable.'"

So I really can't wait for the first game."

While Williams and other Packer rookies, like first-round picks Rashaan Gary and Darnell Savage, got to step on Lambeau Field in front of a big crowd for the first time, some of the team's offseason acquisitions, like linebackers Za'Darius Smith and Preston Smith and offensive lineman Billy Turner, also made their first appearances at Lambeau wearing the



green and gold.

Safety Adrian Amos has played at Lambeau several times in the past as a member of the Chicago Bears, but got his first taste of having the home crowd behind him on Friday.

“It was great. Getting out there under the lights and seeing the crowd like that just for a practice,” said Amos. “It was just fun to get out in front of everybody.”

Several fans got high-fives from players as they entered and exited the tunnel throughout the night. With just the right amount of cheering, many fans also got some of their favorite players to turn and acknowledge them throughout the night. A few lucky fans even got autographs.

LaFleur wanted the team to treat the practice as a dress rehearsal for its first preseason game, which is Thursday against the Houston Texans. The coach was pleased with what he saw.

Several players used the televised practice as an opportunity to show the organization what they would bring if they made the 53-man roster out of training camp.

Wide receivers Jake Kumerow and Trevor Davis each had strong nights, pulling down several passes during drill work.

Davis made a leaping grab over the middle of the field on a throw from quarterback DeShone Kizer before hauling in another acrobatic catch down the right sideline on a pass from Tim Boyle.

Kumerow pulled in a eye-catching touchdown reception in the 1-on-1 drills before making a great grab in the 11-on-11s. He turned heads with a catch on a throw down the right sideline from Boyle before capping his night with a reception on a pass from Aaron Rodgers in the two-minute drill.

“Yeah, he definitely helped himself,” said LaFleur of Kumerow’s big night. “It just speaks to what we’ve been saying all along. You can always count on Jake. As a matter of fact, I think he dinged his finger in the 1-on-1s when he caught a ball too but he’s a tough guy, played through it. That catch he made down the right sideline was pretty incredible.”

While the practice did not feature live tackling, the defense still made its share of plays against the offense.

The biggest play came in 11-on-11s, when cornerback Tony Brown stepped in front of a Kizer out route throw for an interception that was returned for a score.

Kizer was later picked off by Chandron Sullivan, although the defense may have gotten away with a

Potrykus said he'd worked with many of the wrestlers in the past, whether it be during a youth season or training in the preseason or offseason.

The cost of the camp was \$125, and

# Zachow church shares resources for growth

# Forum focuses on support for trauma victims

**GREEN BAY** — Crisis workers, a panel of experts and victims of trauma themselves presented a half-day forum Tuesday at Northeast Wisconsin Technical College on the topic of trauma-informed care.

The event, titled “Trauma-Informed Action: A Community Perspective,” was also attended by U.S. Rep. Mike Gallagher and Menominee Indian School District Superintendent Wendell Waukau.

“Traumatic experiences have far-reaching effects throughout our communities,” Gallagher said. “Evidence shows that individuals who have experienced trauma face a unique set of challenges, and it’s important that human service professionals are well-versed in trauma-informed care.”

The Menominee Indian School District is acutely aware of the impact of historical trauma, Waukau said, “and we’ve worked diligently with the community, tribal clinic,

teachers and staff to develop trauma-informed care and approaches for our students. As leaders, it’s our responsibility to provide the support and resources necessary so that those impacted get the help they need.”

Waukau was joined by other experts in discussing ways that communities can respond to this health issue. Emphasis was placed on supporting crisis workers, as well as building community intervention as crisis prevention and response. Additionally, the event featured leaders from law enforcement and child welfare systems who shared their experiences on the progress made in northeastern Wisconsin and discussing how services can continue to improve for youth and families.

“An event like this really brings the issue to the forefront, which is a good thing,” Waukau said. “The more we know and share with one another helps all of us.”

## Free grave markers available for veterans

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs reminds veterans that it furnishes upon request, at no charge to the applicant, a government headstone or marker for the unmarked grave of any deceased eligible veteran in any cemetery around the world, regardless of their date of death.

For eligible veterans who died on or after Nov. 1, 1990, and whose grave is marked with a privately purchased headstone, the VA may also furnish a headstone or marker to supplement the graves or a medallion to be affixed to a privately purchased headstone.

Flat markers in granite, marble and bronze and upright headstones in granite and marble are available.

Bronze niche markers are also available to mark columbaria used for inurnment of cremated remains. The style chosen must be permitted by the officials in charge of the private cemetery where it will be placed.

When burial or memorialization is in a national cemetery, state veterans’ cemetery, or military post/base cemetery, a headstone or marker will be ordered by the cemetery officials based on inscription information provided by the next of kin or authorized representative.

We call your attention to this small table, which occupies a place of dignity and honor. It is set for one, symbolizing that members of our armed forces are missing from our ranks. They are referred to as POWs and MIAs.

We call them comrades. They are unable to be with their loved ones and families, so we join together to pay humble tribute to them, and to bear witness to their continued absence.

The table is small, symbolizing the frailty of one prisoner, alone against his or her oppressors.

The tablecloth is white, symbolic of the purity of their intentions to respond to their country's call to arms.

# VINTAGE AFTERNOON

## Bridal fashions and tea party at Heritage Park

**SHAWANO** — “Wagner’s Bridal Chorus” emanating from the pump organ in the Old Tabor Church welcomed about 50 people to “A Vintage Afternoon & Bridal Gown Fashion Show” on July 27. Marcie Rosenow, who spearheaded the restoration of the 128-year-old church, said she had been looking for an opportunity to showcase the church’s interior since it was moved from Belle Plaine to Heritage Park and refurbished in 2013.

Highlighting the Shawano County Historical Society’s collection of vintage wedding dresses provided the perfect marriage.

“This has been a fun event to work on and I hope a great experience for everyone,” Rosenow said.

Merrie Crawford of the Shawano

County Historical Society welcomed guests to the event. To emcee the fashion show, the event chair had reached out to former classmate Marybeth Hertzfeld-Leopold.

Retired and living in Cape Coral, Florida, Hertzfeld-Leopold comes home every summer to visit her mother and help with the quilting program at St. James Lutheran Church, whose members provided many of the dresses.

“I was honored to be invited to be a part of this event,” Hertzfeld-Leopold said.

Twenty-six vintage dresses were brought to the front of the church one-by-one by curator Jesse Borlen as Hertzfeld-Leopold narrated the information about each dress.

The collection included dresses from 1905 to 1961 and diverse fabrics, including green velvet, pistachio green satin, Chantilly lace and rayon. The dresses were chosen to reflect the fashion and innovation of their time periods.

A two-piece black gabardine suit with black velvet trim worn by Mathilda Debban for her wedding on April

18, 1907, was an example of a “Sunday best” outfit that could be worn repeatedly, Hertzfeld-Leopold said.

When Mildred Hartleben married on May 29, 1941, her dress was made of a new fabric, rayon, because silk was needed for parachutes during World War II. As the war went on, many brides wore tailored suits with cuts resembling military uniforms, especially if they were marrying soldiers, Hertzfeld-Leopold said.

Ruth Beversdorf wore a short sleeve jacket with shoulder pads and a knee-length straight skirt at her wedding on Aug. 28, 1948.

Marcie Ewald was married on June 2, 1956, in a gown made of imported Chantilly lace with a large full skirt worn with a hoop with seven tiers of lace and pleated tulle ruffles.

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Every month, library staff compiles between 900 and 1,100 items, including children's books, adult fiction, nonfiction, large print, magazines, young adult fiction, DVDs, CDs, and audiobooks, into curated crates depending on
