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Memorial golf outing celebrates 20 years

Event is a Deau family legacy

SURING — A family and community tradition now in its second generation completes its second decade this weekend.

The 20th annual Della Deau Memorial Golf Outing, formerly the Doze Inn Benefit Golf Outing, will take place Saturday at the Red Maple Golf Course, 501 Golf Course Road, Suring.

The event originated in 1998. The late Larry and Della Deau, original owners of the Doze Inn, hosted a golf outing that took place on the ice, and instead of golf carts, they used snowmobiles to go from hole to hole.

After the second golf outing, when there was leftover money, Larry and Della Deau decided to use the outing as an opportunity to raise money for a community member fighting cancer. The idea came about when one of their employees was diagnosed with cancer.

As a bartender and friend of the Deau family, Mary Lou Genal and her husband, Dick, were also part of the golf outing since day one.

"It was only natural we were going to help out," Genal said.

A recipient of the benefit herself in 2007, Genal contributes her talents to the planning of the annual golf outing.

In 2000, the first benefit golf outing took place at the old Suring golf course clubhouse. After a fire destroyed the clubhouse, reconstruction provided an opportunity for the benefit to host more attendees. The benefit grew from 40 attendees to nearly 200 attendees every year.

The beneficiary each year is a community member from the Suring, Mountain, or Gillett area. In the 20 years since its conception, approximately \$100,000 has been raised.

The community then had the opportunity to support the couple when they, too, were both diagnosed with cancer.

After their passing, there were questions whether the Doze Inn Benefit Golf Outing would still be held.

"Absolutely we are going to continue," said Dawn Urbanek, one of Larry and Della's four daughters. "People wanted us to continue it. I think people feel it is a great thing to do for the community."

"I'm proud to do it because it's carrying on what my mom and dad started," daughter Chris Vollmar said.

In 2017, after Larry died, sisters Chris Vollmar, Michelle VanDriest, and Dawn Urbanek bought the family business of 50 years and turned it into a vacation rental under the name Doze Inn LLC.

When asked about the future of the golf outing, Vollmar said, "We will continue to do it until we find no more recipients that have cancer."

The event is truly a community affair, with all prizes being donations from business and local individuals. There is also strong community support from those who attend the event.

"The golfers have golfed in sleet, snow, lots of rain, very cold, and sometimes very hot, but everyone

still comes out and golfs," Vollmar said.

"It's astonishing how every year how many people come out and support the cause, support the event, support us doing it. It is amazing," said Urbanek.

The golf outing includes a four-man scramble, a dinner, and prizes. The cost is \$65 per person to golf and \$20 per person for the meal. Registration begins at 9 a.m. with tee-off at 10 a.m. Call ahead to attend the dinner only or just come for the prizes. Six arrests, three cases after meth busts

Defendants accused of manufacture and delivery

OCONTO — One of six people arrested for methamphetamine trafficking in Oconto County earlier this month was scheduled to appear for a preliminary hearing of the charges on Tuesday.

Diann Moeller, 54, of rural Oconto Falls was being held in lieu of \$50,000 cash in the Oconto County Jail, charged with five felonies related to the manufacture and delivery of the highly addictive recreational drug.

The charges against Moeller include bail jumping, as she was already being prosecuted for possession of methamphetamine and narcotic drugs from an incident in May. She appeared in Oconto County Circuit Court on Friday morning in the balance of her initial appearance on the new charges.

Moeller and three other defendants – Greylyn M. Gilson,

53, Coleman; Julie A. Harteau, 61, Oconto Falls; and Patrick E. Mocco, 62, Coleman – were arrested Sept. 6 after authorities executed three search warrants and a traffic stop in what appear to be three separate cases.

The criminal complaints for those four suspects indicate that the investigation began earlier this summer when a confidential informant expressed concern that Gilson's 11-year-old son was being exposed to illegal drug use.

The informant said Gilson and Moeller were cooking meth in a camper behind the home where Gilson lives in the town of Spruce. Mocco owns the property, and Harteau and Mocco's adult son also live there, the complaint said.

The investigation tracked purchases by the four defendants of pseudoephedrine, lye, and other products that can be used in meth production. Gilson was being held in lieu of a \$20,000 cash bond, while Mocco and Harteau were released on \$10,000 signature bonds, pending their next court appearances on Oct. 17.

In another case, Jason L. Millikin, 43, of Kingsford, Michigan, is scheduled for a preliminary hearing Sept. 30 on charges of possession with intent to deliver methamphetamine, possession of narcotic drugs, and possession of illegally obtained prescription drugs after his arrest during a traffic stop Sept. 9.

The criminal complaint says Millikin was pulled over after an officer saw his vehicle weaving between lanes on U.S. Highway 141 north of Ligeois Road. A license check revealed that he was wanted in Dickinson County, Michigan.

An Oconto County K-9 unit yielded a positive alert, and a probable-cause search of the vehicle resulted in the confiscation of 97 grams of methamphetamine in two plastic bags, along with a number of pills, the complaint said.

Millikin was being held in lieu of \$50,000 cash in the Oconto County Jail.

In the third case, Curt Porath, 48, was bound over for trial after a preliminary hearing Friday on charges of manufacture and delivery of amphetamine, possession of

methamphetamine precursors, bail jumping, possession of paraphernalia to produce methamphetamine, possession of methamphetamine waste, possession of methamphetamine.

An informant named Porath as involved in making and selling meth at his home on River Road in the town of Oconto, according to the criminal complaint.

Deputies executed a search warrant and arrested Porath on Sept. 6. He was being held on \$30,000 cash bond.

As a member of the Northeast Tri-County Drug Enforcement Group, Oconto County received help during the investigation from the Forest County and Shawano County sheriff's departments and the Marinette Police Department, along with the Wisconsin Department of Justice Division of Criminal Investigation and the State Patrol.

When he announced the arrests last week, Skarban said the investigation is ongoing, with additional arrests expected.

Committee to review 2020 budget plan

Finance and insurance panel to meet for 3 days

OCONTO — The Oconto County Board's Finance and Insurance Committee has allocated three days this week to review the proposed 2020 county budget department by department.

County Administrative Coordinator Kevin Hamann told the board Thursday that the state's report on new construction in the county shows that builders erected \$54.9 million in new structures this year, an increase of 1.4%, and Oconto County's equalized value was set at \$3.92 billion, up 4.4%.

State-imposed revenue limits allow counties to raise property taxes based on the increase in equalized value and new construction, so Hamann said the county's preliminary levy is \$20,069,000, an increase of \$430,000 or 2%.

"But because the equalized value was much higher than the net new construction, our tax rate will go down 11 cents (per \$1,000 of equalized value), or by 2%," Hamann said.

The committee will have work to do, as departmental budget requests to date are \$700,000 over the maximum allowable tax levy. But Hamann said he's accustomed to dealing with requests in the \$1.5 million range.

"We'll need to either cut expenses, raise taxes or use some of the fund balance, probably all three," he said.

Requests for projects and purchases in the county's capital improvement plan are \$231,000 over the available funds, so the committee will need to eliminate, postpone or reduce some of those, Hamann added.

"I fully expect that you're going to see that the 2020 budget is very similar to the 2019 budget," he said.

The committee is scheduled to meet at 9 a.m. Wednesday through Friday, with about 5½ hours set aside for discussion each of the first two days and a little more than three hours Friday.

Wednesday's agenda calls for review of the department budgets for the airport, medical examiner, emergency management, sheriff, courts system offices, veterans service, technology services and human services.

Under the microscope Thursday will be land and water resources, highway, commission on aging, youth fair, historical society, senior citizen center and county libraries.

On Friday, attention turns to the courthouse property and maintenance, the Oconto County Economic Development Corp., register of deeds, county treasurer, county clerk and elections, county board, administrative coordinator and negotiations, safety/risk management and finance. A review of the county's contingency account, general fund, county sales tax, and capital improvement plan will be followed by a final review and approval of a final recommendation.

The committee-approved budget will be subject to a public hearing scheduled for Oct. 31, when the full County Board considers the final budget.

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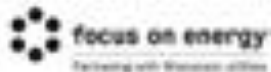

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Storm costs for county still being tallied

192 miles of national forest road closed to motorized vehicles

OCONTO — The total cost incurred by Oconto County government to clean up after the July 19-20 windstorm is \$418,386, County Administrative Coordinator Kevin Hamann told the County Board on Thursday.

"This is the various departments — administration, county clerk, emergency management, damage to a couple of our radio towers, extension office, forest and parks, human services, highway, land information, planning and zoning, sheriff and veterans services — all those departments participated in the storm issues," Hamann said.

The estimate covers the first six weeks after the macroburst — defined as an intense, small-scale downdraft produced by a thunderstorm — that hit Oconto County, part of a series of storms that

included at least 19 tornadoes and led to a federal disaster declaration covering 17 counties and two tribes.

Hamann said the Federal Emergency Management Agency will only reimburse the county for 5% of the project costs for administration, and Hamann estimates that figure will be more than 5% of the total.

"But certainly the damages, any of the regular time and overtime for debris cleanup will be eligible, any of the supplies and equipment used, so we're starting to put that information together," he said. "Any of the damages that are not covered by insurance — at Chute Pond, the trails, etc. — that will be covered by FEMA."

Tim Magnin, the county emergency management director, said FEMA will make an exploratory phone call to each of the entities that will be applying for reimbursement, including the county and affected towns. Lakewood and Little

River opted out of the process because their dollar figures did not meet the threshold for federal help, Magnin said. YMCA Camp U-Nah-Li-Ya and Oconto Electric Cooperative are also applying as nonprofit entities.

Those calls will probably take place in October or November, Magnin said.

"With all the other disasters going on in the United States right now, it might be on hold a little bit, but that's the plan right now," he said. "There's a lot of steps involved going forward."

It will likely be up to a year after the storm before grants for cleanup projects are actually paid, Magnin said.

Supervisor Gregory Sekela said the county lost \$325,000 in expected timber sales just for this year and will have to replant the lost forests.

"The timber contracts for this year, those were contracts that we

had let and now are changed to salvage contracts," Sekela said. "But in the future, going forward, the next 40 years, the loss of those timber sale revenues is going to be a big hit to the county."

Magnin said such mitigation costs will be another piece of the puzzle.

Meanwhile, the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest, with the help of towns, contractors and others, has been able to clear just over 400 miles of road, District Ranger Mike Brown said Friday.

These miles are identified in green on a map at the forest's website, indicating that they are open and the right-of-way has been cleared. In addition, just over 155 miles of road are open (identified in yellow) but with hazards remaining, such as debris along the roadways in the right-of-ways.

Just over 192 miles of road, identified in red, remain closed to motorized vehicles. The map can be found at <http://go.usa.gov/xyA8D>.

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Driver accused of pointing gun in road-rage incident

ABRAMS — A Michigan man is in the Oconto County Jail in lieu of \$5,000 cash bond after he allegedly pointed a gun at another car in a road-rage incident.

Jeffrey C. Stenfors, 47, of Skandia, is charged in Oconto County Circuit Court with three counts of second-degree recklessly endangering safety along with misdemeanor counts of carrying a concealed weapon and resisting or obstructing an officer. The incident allegedly occurred near the U.S. Highway 41-141 scales in Abrams around 4:30 p.m. Sept. 13.

According to the criminal complaint, a couple saw Stenfors' vehicle weaving between the northbound

lanes, and they could see he was texting while driving. As they passed, they rolled down the passenger's window, and the man shouted that Stenfors should stop texting.

The couple reported that the Michigan car then started tailgating and saw the driver point a gun at them through his windshield. An Oconto County deputy made a traffic stop a few minutes later.

Stenfors told the officer he mimicked a gun by pointing his cellphone, but officers found a loaded handgun on the passenger's seat, the complaint said.

After setting bail, Judge Jay N. Conley advised Stenfors of his right to counsel and referred the case to the Public Defender's Office. His initial appearance was adjourned until Oct. 17.

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Rauterkus nominated for national award

Oconto Falls teacher one of six educators named from Wisconsin

MADISON — An Oconto Falls teacher is one of six educators named by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction as finalists for the 2019 Presidential Awards for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching (PAEMST), considered the highest honor bestowed by the U.S. government for mathematics and science teachers.

Constance Rauterkus is a science teacher at Oconto Falls High School. Her fellow nominees teach in Campbellsport, Edgar, Baraboo,

La Crosse and Madison.

Rauterkus and her colleague, Candice Behnke, made a presentation at the June meeting of the Oconto Falls School Board after they spoke at the National Science Teacher Association's national convention in St. Louis. She was invited to write an article about the "pickle people autopsies" she has her students conduct in her Anatomy and Physiology course.

The students play the role of medical examiners and must conduct an autopsy in the case of a "dead pickle." Students dust for fingerprints, use appropriate terminology and dissection techniques, and write a scientific report in which they share their results.

"Wisconsin's finalists for these awards help students every day to engage and excel," State Superintendent Carolyn Stanford-Taylor said. "This requires not only expertise in their content area, but also an understanding of best instruc-

tional practices based on education research. To reach this level as an educator takes true dedication and commitment."

Anyone may nominate a teacher for the award. States establish selection committees who select the finalists based on criteria required by the national PAEMST program. Established by Congress in 1983, the awards recognize teachers for high-quality instructional programs informed by content knowledge to enhance student learning. Applications from Wisconsin's finalists will be judged at the national level by a committee organized by the National Science Foundation, which administers PAEMST on behalf of The White House Office of Science and Technology Policy.

Awardees receive professional development opportunities, \$10,000 from the National Science Foundation, and a trip to be recognized in Washington, D.C.

Nothing quite like the invention of Carbon 500

The statute of limitations has long since run out, so I guess it's safe for me to tell about a little misdemeanor committed by number one son, T.J., when he was in high school in the 1980s.

That's my "grabber" — the sentence that's supposed to pique your interest so you can't possibly resist reading the rest of my story.

In reality, T.J. never committed a crime, but if Wayland chemistry guru Elias Khreish has been missing one of the little black balls he uses to represent carbon atoms, I can explain it.

Let me back up a little bit. A couple of weeks ago, I wrote a column about pick-up baseball games we played when I was kid. One of the games I described was called "500" — I couldn't remember what it was called, but lots of people reminded me.

After that column appeared, two of our sons, T.J. and Mike, told me about a similar game they and their friends played between classes when they were at Wayland — only there was a twist. That's where this story begins.

Remember what I said about "500"? You got points for catching a fly ball, a one-hopper, a grounder. When you reached 500 points, you could become the batter.

So, okay, now we come to T.J.'s

"crime." T.J. was taking chemistry from Wayland's "forever" chemistry maven, Elias Khreish, and they were studying molecules — using little colored marble-sized balls to represent atoms of various elements, for example, white for oxygen, black for carbon, whatever. So, one black and two whites would be carbon dioxide, get it?

After class one day, T.J. inadvertently walked off with a little black carbon "atom." As he was walking across campus from Discovery Hall, the science building, to Linfield Hall, the main academic building in those days, he saw a bunch of his townie friends — Scott Schwefel, Lane Seaholm, Tim Kirsh, Don Kiesling, and brother Mike — on the steps of the chapel.

He called out "Catch!" and fired the carbon atom high in the air — and, thus, "Carbon 500" became a game that lasted for a couple of years at Wayland.

Picture it: a bunch of guys in coats and ties chasing an almost invisible little black ball, yelling and laughing like a bunch of idiots. Those are the kinds of silly things that make for lasting memories, I suppose.

Number two son Mike also recalled neighborhood wiffle ball games with T.J. and Don Kiesling in Don's backyard or ours. Don even kept statistics — ERAs, RBIs, batting averages — that sort of thing. Today's "fantasy baseball" and "fantasy football" crazes had nothing on those kids' games. Hurray for imagination.

Memorial Park ball field gets makeover

School district allocated \$20K; commemorative coin proceeds also help

OCONTO FALLS — The baseball diamond at Memorial Field in Oconto Falls is getting a needed facelift, thanks to a collaboration between the city, the school district and the private booster organization Panther Pride.

Crews from the city and Panther Pride volunteers took down the old outfield fence and built new dugouts

and a storage building. They are in the process of putting down a new surface on the infield.

Yet to be completed as of the end of last week were a new pitcher's mound and the new fence.

The Oconto Falls City Council on July 9 approved the participation of the street department in the project, and the school board on July 15 allocated \$20,000 from its Fund 80 community projects ac-

count toward the work.

Proceeds from the sale of the city's 100th anniversary commemorative coin are also designated toward Memorial Park improvements. The council earlier this year approved a concept prepared by the Point of Beginnings consulting firm for a major makeover of the park where the Panthers football and track and field teams played before construction of ST Paper Stadium.

Alderman Devin Wirtz spearheaded the 100-year coin project. He presented ideas and came up with the design, along with the help of the LaViolette Group of Green Bay, which produced the coins.

The commemorative coins are on sale at Oconto Falls City Hall, 500 N. Chestnut Ave., for \$20 in a plastic sleeve or \$30 in a soft container.

As leaves fall, asters bloom

Dozens of native species bring amazing color

With explosive plumes of gorgeous late summer and fall color, the asters are now beginning to bloom across our area. In shades of pink, purple, lavender, blue and white, our native asters put on a spectacular show to close out the wildflower year.

Dozens of native species of asters can be found in our area, most blooming now in September into October. Some will last up until Halloween or beyond if the weather stays relatively mild. Asters can handle quite a bit of frost, meaning they will continue to bloom even after a few frosty nights.

The most popular asters for native landscaping and gardening are the big purple New England asters. The beautiful, daisy-like flowers with the golden centers are attractive to butterflies, especially migrating monarchs that are moving through about the time the aster season begins.

New England asters are also attractive to hummingbirds, drawn to their brightly colored blossoms. Honeybees, bumblebees and other pollina-

tors also utilize these late blooming perennials for a precious source of pollen and nectar.

Many other species of asters bloom this time of year, also. Smooth aster blooms in a beautiful pale blue and is quite versatile, growing in sun or shade, as well as wet or dry soil.

There are a number of varieties of aster that bloom in shimmering white. Flat topped aster is named for its flattened clusters of yellow and white blossoms that are found mostly in shady locations at the forest edge.

Frost aster and heath aster also bloom in white and are found in open fields and roadside edges. Each plant may produce hundreds of tiny white blossoms that look as though the tips were frosted in delicate white. These are among the latest blooming of the asters and may still be around

on Thanksgiving if weather remains relatively mild.

Asters make wonderful companion plants in the garden to many perennial varieties. Sedum, black eyed Susan, Joe pye weed, purple coneflowers, wild sunflowers of many kinds, as well as elegant ornamental grasses all make wonderful companion plants for blooming asters in September, October and into November.

There are a number of garden-variety hybrid asters that are equally beautiful. Many of these are bred to be dwarf in size, maybe growing 1-2 feet in height rather than the much larger height of native New England aster and others. These hybrid asters bloom in many shades of blue, pink and purple.

Enjoy the magic and beauty of aster season over the next few months.

Panthers gain confidence with fourth quarter touchdowns

OCONTO FALLS — The Oconto Falls High School football team had its homecoming game spoiled by Fox Valley Lutheran on Friday.

Fox Valley Lutheran scored touchdowns on five of its seven possessions in the first half to take a 38-0 lead into halftime of the North Eastern Conference match-up. The Foxes also scored on their

first drive of the second half before Oconto Falls scored twice in the fourth quarter to finish the scoring in a 45-14 final.

Looking for a fast start against one of the conference's top teams, instead Oconto Falls' first offensive possession ended in a three-and-out. A long punt return set FVL up at the Oconto Falls' 20-yard line, and two plays later, the Foxes scored to go up 7-0.

The Panthers' second possession also ended in a punt after just three plays, but this time, Oconto Falls' defense held up. After a passing play looked to have set up FVL in Oconto Falls' territory, the Panthers forced a fumble that senior Mitchell Manns recovered.

The big defensive play gave a bit of a jolt to the hosts, who picked up a first down on a Manns' run on

the ensuing drive. But a sack on the next third down halted the drive.

FVL then put together a five-play, 80-yard drive that included a couple of long passes.

"They are really fast, just super fast on the outside. They got five, six, seven kids that can catch the ball in space and make you miss and it's off to the races for them," said Oconto Falls coach Nick Bohl on what made FVL tough to stop.

The Panthers picked up another first down on their next drive after senior quarterback Joey Walters hit senior Jarod Parsons and junior Owen Huber on passes, but the hosts were eventually forced to punt again.

Another long pass put the Foxes deep in Panthers' territory, but the host's defense held FVL to a field goal. Oconto Falls junior Daylen

Hischke made a tackle for no gain before Manns broke up a pass attempt to force the long field goal.

A sack put the Panthers in a tough situation on the next drive, but a roughing the punter call extended the host's drive. Facing a third-and-four, Oconto Falls couldn't connect on a pass play, having to punt the ball back to FVL.

A couple long FVL pass plays moved the ball down the field quickly before a short rushing touchdown extended the visitor's lead. A fumble by Oconto Falls on the ensuing kickoff gave FVL great field position, and the Foxes scored after just two passing plays to go up 31-0.

"They are more of a passing team and our entire conference does a lot of running. It's a different pace and we have to get up to that.

They're very fast, they just get to the corner and go," said Parsons. "Our open-field tackling wasn't good, we need to get better on that because we were there for the plays, we just didn't finish them."

Oconto Falls' offense picked up another first down on its next drive on a fake punt run, but again had the drive stall and had to put.

FVL got another long return and started its drive at the Oconto Falls' 10, scoring three plays later for the final score of the first half.

With under three minutes to go until the half, Oconto Falls tried to put together a scoring drive. Huber carried the ball three times, picking up a first down on third-and-one. But again, one first down was all Oconto Falls could muster, forcing a punt with under five seconds to go. FVL nearly added to its lead on the punt return, but the Panthers ran the returner down inside the 10.

FVL's starters stayed on the field to start the second half, putting together a six-play, 75-yard drive to extend its lead to 45-0.

Walters hit Hischke on a pass for a first down on the Panthers' first drive of the half, but the drive ended in a punt.

The Panthers forced the first FVL punt on the next drive, and the offense kept the momentum going. On the first play of the drive, Manns broke free for an 80-yard touchdown run.

"It was a good feeling because it gets some good energy going for next week," said Manns. "Good positive plays at the end and kept our heads up."

After stuffing a pair of runs to start the next FVL drive, junior Garrett Vervelde picked off a pass after a deflection to get the offense the

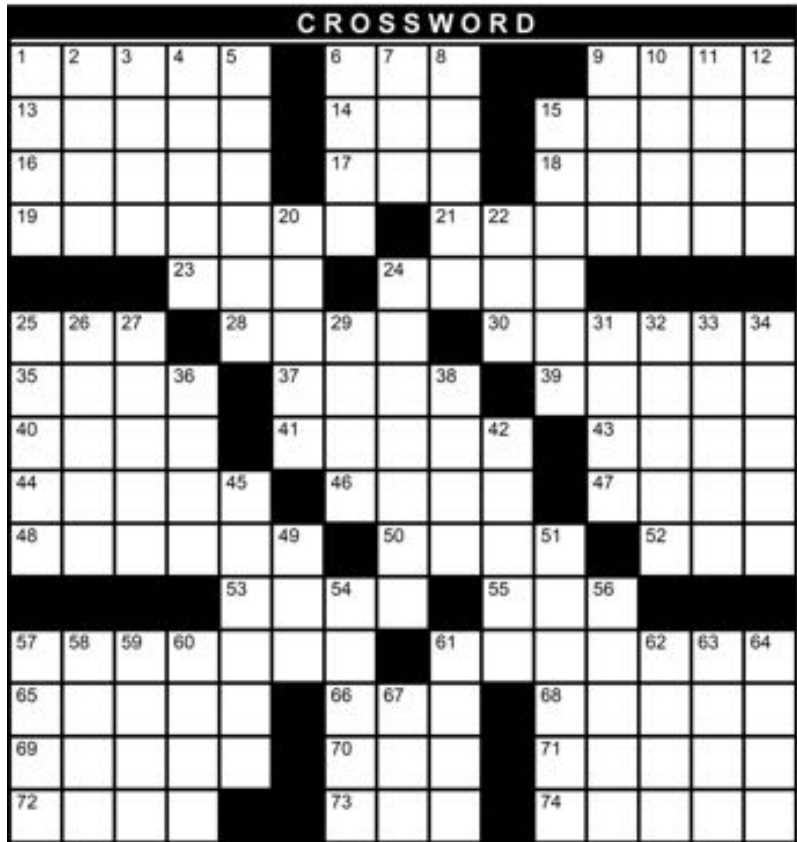
