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Nelson asks delay, will spend holidays in jail

Hearing on Diemel murder charges delayed to January

KINGSTON, MO. — Garland “Joey” Nelson will spend the holidays in jail after he was granted a delay to Jan. 20, 2020, for his preliminary hearing on first-degree murder charges in the deaths of Nick and Justin Diemel, both of the Bonduel area.

Nelson, 25, appeared via electronic access on Nov. 14 before Judge Jason Kanoy in Caldwell County Circuit Court. The charges resulted from an investigation started July 22 when the two brothers disappeared after last being seen at Nelson’s farm in Braymer, Missouri. He could face the death penalty if convicted of the charges.

Nelson has been held without bond in the Caldwell County Detention Center since his arrest July 29 for tampering with a motor vehicle, a state felony. Court documents show Nelson admitted to driving a white Ford F250 pickup truck, rented by the brothers on their arrival in Missouri on July 20, from his farm in Braymer to a commuter parking lot near Holt, where it was abandoned.

The affidavit added Nelson admitted he acted alone in driving the truck to the commuter lot, according to Associated Press reports.

A news report on kmbc.com, a Kansas City, Missouri, television station, cited court documents as saying the Diemels were expecting a \$250,000 check from Nelson as part of a cattle deal. Nick, 35, and Justin, 24, were owners of Diemel Livestock in Bonduel and had livestock dealings in multiple states.

“It is believed Nick and Justin Diemel never left the property after they arrived and were intentionally killed,” the charges said per the AP.

Nelson also faces two counts of abandonment of a corpse, two counts of tampering with physical evidence, two counts of armed criminal action and one count of unlawful possession of a firearm.

The firearm charge stems from Nelson’s felony conviction in federal court for “Fraud Using Property Mortgaged or Pledged to Farm Credit Agencies.” Under state law, felons are forbidden to have or use firearms.

The camp is a minimum-security satellite facility of the more-famous Leavenworth Penitentiary in Kansas. Nelson was released in March 2018 and farmed with his mother.

During the course of the investigation, Nelson reportedly admitted to having access to and using a .30-30 caliber rifle to kill two small animals July 20. Investigators think Nelson used the same .30-30 rifle to shoot the brothers.

The KMBC website cites an affidavit filed with the charges that Nelson gave many misleading explanations of events in his attempts to mislead law enforcement in locating the Diemel brothers.

Documents show he told police he removed the cell phones belonging to the brothers and disposed of them along the roadway while walking back to Holt, Missouri, where he arranged for someone to give him a ride to another location. That person has not been identified and no additional persons have been charged in the investigation.

Documents cited by the television station state Nelson eventually told authorities when he arrived back at the farm, he found two bodies believed to be the Diemel brothers, each dead and stuffed inside of a 55 gallon metal barrel in a pole barn just south of the residence.

The affidavit states the bodies were moved through a pasture one at a time in a skid loader bucket to an adjacent pasture where they were covered with diesel fuel and burned. After they were burned, Nelson said one or both of the bodies were placed in a manure pile by a metal barn. He said a skid loader was used to crush the barrels and placed elsewhere on the property.

Documents show Nelson said he returned to the pole barn at one point

and used a shovel to remove what he believed to be blood from the floor where it is believed the brothers were killed.

Authorities said a .30-30 cartridge was located in the bloodstained clothing reportedly belonging to Nelson. They also confirmed DNA tests of blood stains found on the clothing belonged to Nick Diemel.

In the area of the affidavit relating to evidence, authorities state burned human remains were found in a manure pile on the property in Braymer, and based on DNA comparisons, it is believed the remains are those of Nick and Justin Diemel.

The affidavit states two crushed barrels were also located on the Braymer property, and a neighbor reported hearing multiple gunshots coming from the farm between 11:15-11:30 a.m. on July 21, according to the charging documents. He allegedly drove away in the truck about 11:45 a.m.

Judge Kevin Walden has been assigned to the case. Kanoy continues to preside over early proceedings against Nelson. Nelson’s attorney, Ryan Williams, filed for a change in judges Oct. 7. The reason for the request could be that Kanoy issued an ex-parte order of protection against Nelson in January 2015, barring him from having contact with a woman he was residing with at the time. On March 4, 2015, a final order was issued that meant Nelson could no longer reside at an address in Hamilton, Missouri.

Nelson will also face charges from Bourbon County, Kansas, for “endangering the food supply.” According to the statute listed on the state legislature’s website, endangering the food supply means “bringing into this state any domestic animal which is infected with any contagious or infectious disease or any animal which has been exposed to any contagious or infectious disease.”

Prosecutors say Nelson didn’t have proper health papers when he delivered 35 calves from his family’s farm to a farm in Fort Scott, Kansas, in May. Tomme Feil, Nelson’s mother, said her son returned the calves to a Kansas farmer when his partner’s bank claimed them as collateral.

Students share empowering history

History project winners bring research home

CLINTONVILLE — Those attending the Clintonville Historical Society annual meeting Thursday night saw three students from Clintonville High School preset their winning entry into National History Day (NHD).

The students, Carolyn Sasse, Rilie Schertz, and Theresa Murphy, joined more than 16,000 students across Wisconsin in conducting research and presenting National History Day projects to their classmates, teachers and judges. The projects are a combination of scholarship, hard work, imaginative problem solving and fun.

They presented an exhibit titled “Theodora Winton Youmans: All of This I Saw, Part of it I Was — Women’s Suffrage in Wisconsin.” They entered their regional contest at Stevens Point in March, and advanced to the statecontest in Madison in April, where they competed with 615 Wisconsin students and won.

In June, they represented Wisconsin at the national contest at the University of Maryland. The students were accompanied by their advisor, Dan Scherschel, and their parents as they flew to Maryland.

“One of the problems we had were the plane delays. We stayed overnight in Michigan. There were lots of delays,” said Sasse.

“We spent a week in Maryland, so we got to see a lot of the memorials in

Washington D.C.,” said Murphy.

“Going into my research I knew nothing about Theodora, so I knew that I had a lot to learn and I knew it would be a fun process. I also choose my topic because I love women empowerment and strength. Throughout my investigation on Mrs. Youmans, I found out that she was a huge empowerer, and a wonderful leader. Theodora really inspired me,” said Sasse.

“I decided to participate in NHD because I have a love for certain topics in history. I have always enjoyed being able to display my work through class projects. I thought that doing an exhibit for NHD would be a great way to have fun, and improve my planning and organizational skills,” said Murphy.

All three of the students said they learned a lot about managing their time, as the project took a lot of their time and they had to keep up with their homework.

“We were all freshman and getting used to high school at the time,” said Murphy.

“I have always been interested in history and wanted to showcase the journey of how woman gained their rights, and the obstacles they faced,” said Schertz.

NHD is a nonprofit education organization to promote teaching and learning history in middle schools and high schools around the world. It was established in 1974.

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What's a different kind of fundraiser?

CECIL — The Shawano Area Young Professionals Organization (SAYPRO) was looking for a different kind of fundraiser.

They found it — in the form of a trivia contest. Now, five years, hundreds of answers and hundreds of contestants later, the annual SAYPRO trivia contest is continuing to grow.

“We’ve grown a bunch in the last five years,” event chairwoman Karissa Kunschke said.

This year, the event filled the space at the Golden Sands Golf Club on Saturday as 184 contestants in 23 teams, and a dozen or so SAYPRO volunteers filled out answer sheets and entered them into the competition.

This year’s winner, Kunschke said, was a team sponsored by CoVantage Credit Union. A Krueger Electric team was second and a team of individuals came in third.

SAYPRO is an organization for people ages 18-39. It provides networking opportunities, speakers, and education, not only for its members but for the community, Kunschke said. It is open to anyone who meets the age requirement and who is engaged in a career, exemplifies strong morals and ethics, or is striving for personal and career growth. SAYPRO connects young professionals while contributing to the community. Members do not have to live in the Shawano area.

“We’ve been in contact with a lot of businesses, NWTC (Northeast Wisconsin Technical College), the chamber. When new businesses come into town, they get our info, so we can welcome new members to the community,” Kunschke said.

Students and people looking for jobs are welcome, and may benefit from the programs that SAYPRO provides, she said.

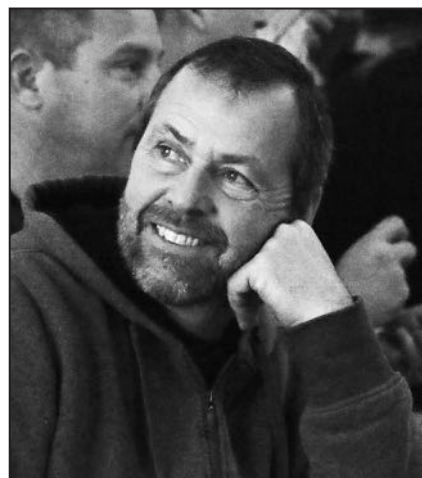
The money from fundraisers helps support the speakers and other programs, she said.

Five years ago, the SAYPRO board began looking for a fundraiser that would resonate with the SAYPRO members and the community.

The board looked at several ways to run a trivia contest, including hiring a contest company to run the event, but decided that a do-it-yourself approach

would be best.

That means that beginning in February, board members begin the search for trivia questions. They have a list of 50 topics, and the planning committee votes on the top 10 topics, then there is a second round of voting, and eventually the questions are narrowed down to the 100 used in the competition.

The topics range from history to the arts to one of the tougher categories, “Fact or Fiction.” The hands-on

approach means that the questions and answers are not the same ones a veteran trivia player will see at other competitions.

That’s only step one. The next step is making sure the answers are correct.

“There is a lot of fact-checking to make sure everything is accurate,” Kunschke said. In five years of competition, that’s 500 fact-checked questions and answers.

The approach has paid off, with the

trivia contest expected to raise from \$3,000 to nearly \$5,000 each year.

The group’s current project is Toys for Tots. SAYPRO members distribute and pick up all the boxes for the Shawano County program. The toys are being collected through Dec. 10.

Art items celebrate area cultures

Event at museum features native artists

KESHENA — Working on art is not something that can be rushed, and creating something that is reflective of culture and heritage can take a long time to perfect.

That was the consensus of a number of artists that set up tables Friday at a Native American craft fair inside the Menominee Cultural Museum.

Take Crystal Caldwell, a Keshena resident. She used to make homemade Christmas orbs to go on trees and other places in the house. Now, she makes large orbs that contain four items to be considered sacred medicine to the Menominee, cedar, sage, sweet grass and tobacco.

Caldwell grows her own tobacco, which is the kind used in tribal cer-

emonies and medicine pouches and not to create cigarettes and other smoking items.

“I’m almost out,” Caldwell said as she pointed to several items. “It can take several hours (to make an orb), sometimes longer depending on how much detail I have to put into it.”

Working on the orbs sometimes needs to be done under fire, as she is often sitting for grandchildren.

“I watch TV and answer phones and referee fights,” Caldwell said. “One day, I said, ‘Quit! Grandma is on the verge of losing it!’ because

they were having a Nerf gun war. I babysit for my son, and he’s got five little boys with ages ranging from 3 to 12.”

For Toni Waubanasum, mixing traditional with contemporary proves to be fun. The Keshena resident created dreamcatchers with Green Bay Packers helmets nestled in the center as part of her display of work, but she also had a number of items carefully decorated with tiny, colored beads.

“This one took me about four weeks to get done,” Waubanasum said. “As you get older, it gets harder.”

It's not only age that slows down the process. Waubanasum has two jobs, one full-time and one part-time, that do not always allow time for her to work on her projects, plus she's also a regular performing in pow wows.

"Today's my day off. Normally, I would be home beading," Waubanasum said. "When I get home, I'll start beading again."

Marguerite Bowan, another Keshena resident, had a lengthy table full of everything from dishtowels to infant blankets potholders to other sewing creations, all nestled under the museum's giant sculpture of a sturgeon hanging from the ceiling.

"It's a good spot," Bowan said, noting that she has sold her wares at the museum's art fair for as long as she can remember.

Bowan has spent 34 years sewing and creating things. Some of her work bears the colors of the Menominee medicine wheel —

white, yellow, red and black. She noted that it's a lot of work to figure out what patterns to use and cut-

ting things out to be sewn together, but it's something she enjoys.

"It's something to do," Bowan

said. "I'm not getting any younger, so it's something to keep busy, and I enjoy it. That's the main thing."

Jeff Heath, an artist residing in Shawano, classifies some of what he does as "commercial art." For Heath, that's taking traditional Menominee beadwork and applying it to something like a Bingo marker.

"It has traditional overtones but when you look at a lot of the beadwork I have, it doesn't use traditional colors," Heath said. "It's more bright and commercialized. I use neon colors and things like that."

Heath has been doing his beadwork for 45 years, and it was something that he started doing when he was very young.

"Now I do it just because I enjoy seeing the people buying the stuff I make and wearing the stuff I make," Heath said. "I don't even have to concentrate. That's how relaxing it is."

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Late fall and winter are the ideal time to enjoy the beauty and interesting forms of native wildflowers and grasses in a whole new way, the grace and texture of their seed heads. Not only are they a joy to look at, these plants also provide a whole new purpose in the garden throughout the winter season.

Our native wildflowers and grasses are an excellent source of food for winter birds. Some are migrating through, while others will remain all winter long, enjoying the natural feast provided by the seed heads of our native wildflowers and grasses.

In addition to the beauty they provide and the stunning winter interest, this is also a great time to collect and harvest the seed of these native

plants and either sow immediately or prepare for planting in the future. Many native wildflower growers simply collect the seed heads and scatter over the snow during the winter, planting the seed just as Mother Nature does. This is a very successful way of sowing many native wildflowers.

Another option with wildflower seeds is to collect them and store in a paper bag or dry, air proof container in a cool place for planting in the

spring or to begin indoors later in the winter.

Some of the easiest native wildflower seeds to collect are purple coneflower, cup plant, blazing star, aster, milkweed, prairie coneflower, black eyed Susan and others.

Native wildflower seed heads provide wonderful interest in the garden throughout the winter season. The wonderful textures, different shades of brown and silver, feathery forms, and the vertical interest they provide are valuable in the winter garden.

Light snowfalls, such as those we have enjoyed the past week or two, really showcase the beauty and texture of winter wildflowers.

Of course, you can't enjoy all of this beauty and practical importance

of native wildflowers in late fall and winter if you routinely chop them back every fall after Labor Day. More and more research has been published in recent years highlighting the importance of leaving your perennials and wildflowers standing throughout the winter season.

For all of their beauty, texture, interest, importance as food plants for native wildlife, as well as shelter for overwintering insects and other animals, consider allowing your native wildflowers to remain standing all winter long.

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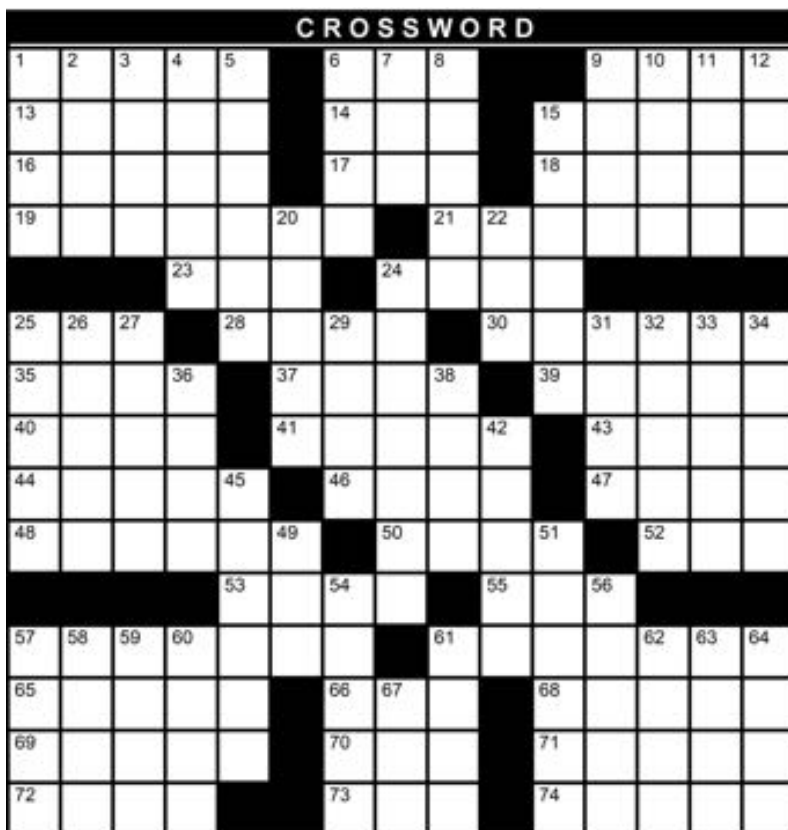

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County field day program earns Cellcom Green Gift

The Shawano County Land Conservation Department has been selected as a 2019 Cellcom Green Gift recipient. The organization received a \$1000 Green Gift from Cellcom for its youth conservation field day.

The field day is hosted each September at Navarino Nature Center, with more than 200 fifth grade students from schools in Shawano County attending. Local natural resource professionals cover topics including wetlands and soils, conservation officers, forestry and forest fire

control, wildlife, fisheries, agriculture and alternative energy.

The Green Gift from Cellcom will support the 2020 youth conservation field day. The Shawano County Land Conservation Department launched its annual youth field day in 2013 after a group of local environmental professionals determined there was an environmental programming gap for fifth grade students in the area.

"Our goal is to help students understand different conservation and preservation practices. They

are also simultaneously learning about careers in natural resources and developing an appreciation for the outdoors, making it a very well-rounded experience for our youth," said Scott Frank, Shawano County conservationist.

The program is expanding in 2020 to include a spring field day for the school districts of Bowler, Marion, Menominee, Tigerton, Wittenberg and Birnamwood at Wilson Creek Orchard.

The Shawano County Land Conservation Department was among 32 green organizations that received a share of the \$37,398 in Green Gifts from Cellcom this year. 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Doctors promoted as men's health coaches

'Movember' means medical awareness for men

BERLIN, Wis. — In the month of November there's a movement called Movember, an effort to "cure" a men's health crisis.

According to Movember organizers, they want to help men live happier, healthier, longer lives, by stopping death from preventable disease.

The global organization notes:

Unchecked, prostate cancer rates will double over the next 15 years.

Testicular cancer rates have already doubled in the last 50.

And across the world, one man dies by suicide every minute of every day, with males accounting for 75% of all suicides.

"In recent years, we've seen a slight improvement in the number of men who see a doctor for preventive care, and that's primarily due to more insurance companies covering the cost of annual checkups," said Dr. Andrew Maes, urologist at ThedaCare Physicians-Berlin.

"For the most part, men don't see a provider until disease has progressed, and sometimes, it's too late to slow or reverse any damage done," he added.

Maes said men need to look at doctors as their coaches.

"Physicians understand what it takes to be healthy," Maes said. "We're the experts on diet, exercise and helping men understand their numbers, such as blood pressure and glucose levels, which are important to overall health. Men respect sports coaches and the advice they give. If men see doctors in the same way, they would be more likely to visit with them regularly to prevent

disease and maintain good health."

A physical exam is recommended every year or so throughout a man's lifetime.

In addition to getting blood work done to check for

cholesterol and diabetes, physicians will ask about depression, diet and exercise habits as well as alcohol and tobacco use — all important to gauge healthy living.

Annual exams also include updates on immunizations like the tetanus-diphtheria booster (needed every 10 years) and the flu shot.

Once a man reaches age 45, Maes emphasizes important additional screenings men should consider, even if they feel fine.

Colorectal cancer screening — men should be tested between the ages of 45 and 75, especially if they have a strong family history of colon cancer or polyps or risk factors such as inflammatory bowel disease.

Options range from a stool-based test, which should be done every year, to a colonoscopy, to be done every 10 years.

Lung cancer screening — men between the ages of 55 to 80 years who currently smoke, have a history of heavy smoking or quit within the past 15 years are encouraged to be tested through a low-dose computed tomography (LDCT).

Osteoporosis screening — men

between the ages 50 and 70 at-risk, who have history of long-term steroid use, low body weight, smoking, heavy alcohol use, having a fracture after age 50, or a family history of osteoporosis.

Prostate/Testicular cancer screenings — men age 50 or older should speak with their provider about these screenings, including routine prostate-specific antigen (PSA) blood testing and digital rectal exam (DRE), especially African American men and those with a family history or other high-risk factors for prostate cancer.

The National Institute of Health has a detailed list of the screening guidelines for men ages 18 to 39 and then ages 40 to 64.

Maes says men should talk through these screening options with their primary care physician to see which ones are necessary for them.

For many men over age 50, an enlarged prostate might be an issue causing urine issues such as frequent

or urgent episodes.

ThedaCare Medical Center-Berlin has been named a Center of Excellence by Urolift, a technology that treats the condition, helping men avoid traditional surgery and end ongoing benign prostatic hyperplasia (BPH) medications, many that come with side effects.

"We're excited to offer this treatment option to our patients," Maes noted. "It works best when we can intervene early. Our men prefer it and they recommend it to others faced with an enlarged prostate, so it's good these men are addressing their urination concerns sooner rather than later."

"It's good that healthcare is demystifying mental health disorders and more people are talking about them," he said.
