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Snow snarls holiday traffic, subdues events

Utility official: 'Mother Nature wins'

SHAWANO — Utility crews re-stored the last of electrical outages on Monday, homeowners and business owners continued to shovel out and area businesses and organizations assessed the impact from this past weekend's storms.

The National Weather Service Green Bay office reported Shawano received 8.6 inches of snow in a storm that brought over 12 inches in north-western Shawano County.

George Lenzner, Shawano County chief deputy, reported that a power outage on Monday morning at the sheriff's department disrupted phone communications and operations. The jail remained secure and the 911 call center remained functional. Lenzner said there was a lot of the usual for a winter snowstorm such as vehicles sliding into ditches.

One personal injury accident was reported Monday morning on Wittenberg-Birnamwood Line Road from a single car going off the road, he said but didn't have any further details.

Downed trees and limbs were a concern, especially in the western part of the county, the chief deputy said.

The weather had an impact on downtown Shawano activities.

"We had a lot of people out earlier in the afternoon" to participate in activities such as taking horse and wagon rides, roasting marshmallows and other family activities, Lindsey Johnson, coordinator of the Business Improvement District in Shawano, said of the holiday stroll and tree lighting event on Nov. 30.

When rain and sleet started to be an issue around 4:15-4:20 p.m., organizers decided to turn on the tree lights in Franklin Park ahead of the scheduled 5 p.m. time.

Johnson said businesses that she's contacted had a good Saturday due to the national Small Businesses Saturday event and local stroll and tree lighting.

"It worked really well despite the weather," she said.

She was satisfied with the event, now in its second year. She noted that area businesses and organizations sponsored 50 trees, up from 40 in 2018.

"It seem like people like to have the trees lighted," she said and encouraged people to check out the trees that will stay lit through New Year's Eve. She hopes to add even more next year.

The Rev. Mark Drengler, senior pastor at St. James Lutheran Church in Shawano, said services were held over the weekend as scheduled but attendance was significantly lower although he had heard of other churches cancelling services. Redeemer Lutheran and St. Paul's Lutheran churches in the Wittenberg area cancelled Sunday services.

Brian Carroll, Gresham utility operations manager, reported multiple outages over the weekend but everyone in the village service area had power by Monday morning.

"The outages were caused by ice that accumulated on the wires and then we got the snow," Carroll said.

The weight of the snow caused branches to drop down on wires and there's not much you can do at that point, he said.

Carroll pointed out that a three-foot long pine branch can weigh 200 pounds when laden with snow and that is hard on utility wires.

"Mother Nature wins," he said.

Rob Koepp, Shawano Municipal Utility (SMU) electrical supervisor, reported the city had only a few sporadic outages over the weekend but there was what he called "a major circuit trip" about 6:30 a.m. Monday.

The outage affected the area from Shawano Community High School on the south, north along Lincoln Street and continuing north of the city, affecting about 1,000 customers. All customers had their power restored by 8 a.m. with 75 percent of customers restored in 35 minutes, Koepp said.

The Alliant Energy web site showed seven outages Monday morning in the NEW Media circulation area. The utility covers northern and eastern Shawano County and sections of Menominee, Waupaca, Langlade, and Outagamie counties. Three outages affecting 670 customers was reported on the eastern edge of the Menominee Reservation along County Road M and state Highway 55 and the Legend Lake area.

Alliant also reported three outages affecting 28 customers in an area bounded by Leopolis on the northwest, Belle Plaine on the east and Buckbee on the south. The utility projected all power restored by early Monday afternoon.

As of Monday morning, the Central Wisconsin Electrical Cooperative reported two outages in the Stockbridge-Munsee Community area affecting 395 people and an outage in the town of Germania northwest of Tigerton affecting 229 people. No estimate on the time of

restoring power was given on the site. The utility service area takes in western Shawano County from the Menominee County line south into

Waupaca and Portage counties.

Hanke's Sentry Foods in Wittenberg was closed all of Sunday.

WE Energies, serving eastern and

southern Shawano County, reported a crew was on its way late Monday morning for an outage on the west shore of Shawano Lake.

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Area logger supports allowing log trucks on interstate

Gallagher bill still in subcommittee

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Logging trucks would be able to make greater use of interstate highways under the Safe Routes Act of 2019, introduced earlier this year by Mike Gallagher, Republican representative of the 8th Congressional District.

Currently, logging trucks are restricted from using interstates due to the weight of their loads.

Typically, the weight of a truck and its load is limited to 80,000 pounds on the interstate system.

Empty logging trucks meeting the weight requirement can use interstates.

Jim Young, co-owner of Briarton Logging near Black Creek, knows the problem well.

"Here's an example: I was logging down by Plover, and I had to haul the wood to Coloma. It would have been 26 miles if I could have

used (Interstate) 39.

"Instead, it took 54 miles because I had to loop around to catch state Highway 22."

The longer route also involved more time due to going through several small towns, involving more stops and more turns, Young added.

It's just not profitable to haul only 30,000 pounds of payload after you consider the 42,000 to 43,000 pounds that the truck and trailer weighs, the Briarton area logger said.

That's why his company has invested in equipment weighing 98,000 pounds that's capable of hauling larger payloads.

Young agreed with Gallagher that the current prohibition forces logging trucks to encounter nursing homes, school zones, cross walks, intersections and sharp curves — all of which heighten the risk these trucks pose getting to their destinations.

The necessity of avoiding inter-

states means more wear and tear on local roads, more emissions into the environment and more accidents, Gallagher said in a press release.

According to the House website, the Safe Routes Act of 2019 waives vehicle weight restrictions and permits logging trucks that meet specific state requirements to travel up to 150 miles on interstates.

The bill currently has 14 co-sponsors from both parties, including

James Sensenbrenner, Republican representative from the 5th Congressional District in south central Wisconsin and Ron Kind, Democratic representative from the 3rd Congressional District in western Wisconsin.

It has been assigned to a House subcommittee on transportation.

"It's a big deal, and it's costing us. The bill will definitely help us out," Young added, "I hope it passes."

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Popp builds greenhouse from Hempcrete

The future of hemp in Wittenberg

WITTENBERG — Ten years ago, Zach Popp's newborn daughter developed respiratory problems. Eventually, they were linked to black mold caused by an ice dam in her bedroom window. This got him thinking about the need for a better construction product, which led him to the bio-composite material, Hempcrete.

"I found out about Hempcrete and how it dries out and prevents mold from forming and is very breathable," said Popp. "I started to dive into the research being done in Europe for this kind of product."

Popp, who lives just east of Wittenberg with his wife and seven children, works full time as the director of recruitment for Northcentral Technical College in Wausau. He admits he doesn't have

any other hobbies to interfere with his pursuit of developing better construction materials.

About three years ago, he started working with materials and came up with a proprietary blend of

hydrated lime with a special additive — hemp and water. He experimented with different sized panels and developed two-foot blocks to fit within the traditional framing used in building houses.

Having worked seven summers with his father in the construction business, Popp has the practical background needed to understand industry standards. He's been perfecting his own green building products in his garage.

In January, he built a prototype in his backyard to prove that construction with the product can be done in winter. The greenhouse he constructed was a manageable size and something his family could use.

"I set up a mini factory in my garage and spent a solid month creating the blocks for the greenhouse," said Popp.

His next phase is to build an entire house as proof of concept. He would like his test home to be his family home.

"I believe in it, and it's safe," he said. "I'll be open to let other people come in to see it."

Building with Hempcrete is a fairly new industry in the United States according to Popp, who noted the first home in the United States was built for the mayor of Asheville, North Carolina, in 2010-11. Popp

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believes there is a growing need for construction products that are sustainable, breathable, mold resistant and cost effective. Popp said that building with Hempcrete can eliminate three of the six materials currently need for traditional building; there is no need for insulation, sheet rock or the vapor barrier.

His vision is to have a manufacturing plant in the area, using hemp grown by local farmers. He notes that even though it's only the second year that hemp growing has been legal in Wisconsin, the number of permits issued this year over last was huge. According to his website, the hardy crop is simple to grow and doesn't need pesticides. The part of the plant that is used is the woody part that normally gets thrown away because its totally biodegradable.

Popp has run the numbers and said he would need a 4,000-square-foot manufacturing facility to make 40 blocks a day. That would produce enough blocks for one house every two weeks.

"I have some pretty big steps

ahead of me," said Popp, noting that there is still a lot of independent certification that needs to be done, and a strength test alone can cost up to \$10,000.

His business plan estimates about \$200,000 would be needed to build a house, which includes all the materials but not the labor. He still needs to find the lot, he said.

Popp's time frame for this business is to raise funds for the next six months and start construction by this time next year. Ideally, the product will be ready to market within two years with all of the certification testing done.

"I want to make sure I'm ready to deliver when the marketing kicks in," said Popp. "I need to make people aware of the product."

He plans to market to construction companies and home builders and knows he needs to get both on board to get his company going.

(f) Painted wall sign: a wall sign painted directly on a building façade.

- 1.) Painted wall signs shall be professional painted. Professional hand painting is permitted.
- 2.) No part of the painted wall sign shall wrap around the corner of the building onto another façade, unless that façade, is also eligible for a painted wall sign.
- 3.) Painted wall signs shall use a durable and long-lasting paint designed to withstand the elements. Acrylic or mineral-based paint products are recommended.
- 4.) Painted wall signs shall not diminish a building's architectural integrity.
- 5.) Painted wall signs shall be regularly maintained or touched up to maintain legibility and avoid the appearance of peeling paint, per Section 10-150(7).
- 6.) Murals or works of art which in no way identify a product shall not be regulated under this Chapter.
- 7.) A painted wall sign would count towards a business's permitted business signs.

(a) Removal of abandoned painted wall signs shall either involve complete physical removal of the abandoned sign from the wall or repainting of the entire wall containing the abandoned sign, so that the said wall matches the building's other facades and the abandoned signs is no longer visible.

Wet fall should help conifers in winter

As we move into December, the beautiful conifers of winter take center stage in the landscape as most of our trees and landscape shrubs, with the exception of oaks and beeches, now stand bare of their leaves.

Conifers provide beauty, texture and interest all through the winter season, especially elegant when blanketed in tufts of fresh, white snow.

Conifers need plenty of moisture going into the winter season. Thankfully, we had a wetter than normal fall season, which should, in most cases, provide these trees with sufficient moisture to get them through the coming winter.

If you live in an area that was drier, or have

sandier soil, it is important to give them a good soaking before the ground freezes. In many cases, that has not happened yet, or the ground froze temporarily and then thawed back out with our warm spell over the past few weeks.

Conifers are an excellent choice for the landscape, garden and yard. They are certainly much more than “evergreens.” There are now conifer varieties available in shades of

blue, yellow, even those with reddish and purplish tips. There are conifers available in many different shapes, sizes and forms. Of course, the beautiful texture they provide is extravagant.

There are native conifers such as arborvitae, tamarack, juniper, some spruce varieties, some pines, fir and hemlock. There are garden hybrids created of many of these varieties, as well. In addition, there are non-native Asian and European conifers that are popular on the market.

Surprising to many, blue spruce is not native here in Wisconsin. Colorado blue spruce is native to states west of us. However, it grows

quite well here in our climate and is one of the favorites of many landscapers, gardeners and designers. Many fantastic hybrids have been created from this tree. Dwarf versions, weeping versions, columnar forms and many others are now available.

The northern white-cedar, or arborvitae, is another favorite of many gardeners. Another native tree that has been hybridized into a variety of shapes, sizes and forms, the texture, fullness, color and importance to wildlife make this an attractive tree.

Often, white cedar is used as a privacy hedge or living screen, as the fast-growing trees fill in quickly to form a dense growth of foliage.

Hemlock, yews, as well as junipers are also popular landscaping plants. The junipers, including our native red cedar, are extremely useful in the landscape as they adapt to a variety of conditions, from wet to dry. There are junipers that grow columnar, junipers that creep, or spread,

junipers in beautiful, powdery blue, yellow, gold, as well as many shades of green. In addition, the fruits and berries are attractive to birds and

other wildlife.

Of course, when people think of the holiday season, evergreen boughs for decor, as well as Christmas trees, are extremely popular. The fragrant boughs of fir, spruce, cedar and pine make them wonderful for use in containers, garland, tabletop displays and more.

Never harvest evergreen boughs or trees from the wild, unless it is on your own property. It is not legal to harvest greens from state, county or federal land.

Enjoy the beauty and grace of the winter confiners this season and prepare to plant more in coming years to provide food and shelter for wildlife, as well as beauty in the garden and yard during all four seasons.

Rodgers throws 4 TDs, Packers beat skidding Giants

Green Bay moves to 9-3

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Aaron Rodgers threw four touchdown passes in the snow, and the Green Bay Packers rebounded from a dismal West Coast performance to beat New York 31-13 Sunday.

The Packers sent the Giants to their eighth straight loss, their worst skid since 2004.

Rodgers finished 21 of 33 for 243 yards with no interceptions on a slippery, snowy day at MetLife Stadium. Rodgers hit Davante Adams on touchdown passes of 8 and 17 yards, found a wide-open Allen Lazard for 37 yards and capped the performance with a 1-yarder to Marcedes Lewis.

The Packers (9-3) also intercepted Giants rookie Daniel Jones three times, with the picks setting up 10 points.

Jones, who had not thrown an interception in the last two games, finished 20 of 37 for 240 yards, including an 18-yard touchdown pass

to Sterling Shepard. Aldrick Rosas added field goals of 27 and 45 yards for New York (2-10), which has a 7-21 mark since Pat Shurmur took over last season.

A light snow started falling

before game time and it quickly covered the field, forcing work crews to shovel the yardage lines during breaks. It also made it look like Wisconsin, and the Packers had no problem in beating New York for the third straight time.

The last time was in the NFC wild-card game in January 2017. Rodgers also threw four touchdown passes in that one, a game that started New York on a three-year run that has seen it win 10 games and change coaches and general managers.

The Packers scored the first three times they had the ball, with the first two drives ending on touchdown passes by Rodgers. The first covered 8 yards to Adams and the second was the strike to Lazard on a crossing pattern.

In between the scores, Jones had an 18-yard touchdown pass to

Shepard, who recently missed five games with his second concussion of the season.

Kevin King, beaten on the Shepard catch, got revenge quickly, intercepting Jones' pass at the Green Bay 36. It set up a 47-yard field goal by Mason Crosby and pushed the lead to 17-7 early in the second quarter.

On the ensuing possession, the Giants had the ball for 9:31 before settling for a 27-yard field goal by Rosas. He would add a 45-yarder midway through the third quarter to cut the deficit to four points.

Rodgers responded, leading the Packers on a 14-play, 75-yard march. It ended with him taking a quick snap with the Giants having too many defenders on the field and finding Adams in the end zone for a 24-13 lead.

New York never got close again.

Badgers take back Axe with rout of Gophers

Wisconsin earns Big Ten Title berth

MINNEAPOLIS — Jack Coan delivered two momentum-shifting touchdown passes in the snow for No. 13 Wisconsin, Jonathan Taylor added three touchdowns to his FBS-leading total and the Badgers forcefully repossessed Paul Bunyan's Axe by beating No. 9 Minnesota 38-17 on Saturday to win the Big Ten West Division.

Quintez Cephus caught five passes for 114 yards, including a 47-yarder for a score midway through the third quarter that gave Wisconsin (10-2, 7-2) a 17-7 lead. Coan connected with Taylor for a 28-yard touchdown strike late in the second quarter that gave the Badgers the lead after a slow start, sending them to the Big Ten championship game for a rematch with Ohio State.

Tanner Morgan passed for 296 yards and two touchdowns for the Gophers (10-2, 7-2). They watched their dream season take a painful hit from their oldest rival after ending a 14-game losing streak to the Badgers a year ago with a 37-15 victory at Wisconsin.

Minnesota was seeking to go undefeated at home for the first time since 1954, but the Badgers reasserted their recent dominance by taking home the traveling trophy for the 22nd time in the last 25 seasons. They took a 61-60-8 series lead.

Morgan had two turnovers that led to 10 points for the Badgers, who scored touchdowns on each of their first four drives in the second half. Two of them covered 90-plus yards. Taylor, the Heisman Trophy contender who had 200-plus rushing yards in each of his last three games, gained only 76 yards on 18 carries.

Badgers coach Paul Chryst and offensive coordinator Joe Rudolph called a shrewd game, though, with well-timed reverses and screen passes to put the Gophers on their heels after their first four possessions went nowhere. Minnesota had defensive end Carter Coughlin in coverage on the touchdown throw

to Taylor after a safety blitz, and Cephus had a favorable matchup with linebacker Thomas Barber on his backbreaking score.

Coan went 15 for 22 for 280 yards, the most of his career in a Big Ten game.

The Gophers delivered the first blow on their second play of the game, when Bateman used a stop-and-go route to badly beat freshman cornerback Semar Melvin for a 51-yard score on a perfect strike from Morgan for a 7-0 lead. With

starting cornerback Rachad Wildgoose out with a foot injury and Minnesota boasting the top two receivers in the Big Ten in Bateman and Tyler Johnson, the Badgers had their hands full in the secondary.

They counteracted naturally with a pass rush that's one of the nation's best, with the fifth-most sacks in the FBS, harassing Morgan into plenty of off-balanced and hastened throws and hitting him hard when they came close. Caesar Williams, elevated to the starting lineup with Wildgoose's absence, stepped up repeatedly against the second-highest scoring team in the conference.

Williams picked off Morgan's pass when a pressured throw sailed over Johnson in the second quarter, and early in the fourth quarter he broke up back-to-back passes to Johnson in the end zone on third and fourth down with the Badgers leading 24-10. His interception came immediately after Wisconsin's 14th lost fumble of the season, the second-most in the FBS.

The Gophers lost mammoth right tackle Daniel Faalele to a leg

injury in the second quarter, which sure didn't help their cause against a Badgers defense that was eager to rebound from that humbling performance against Minnesota last season.

The takeaway

The Badgers might be wincing next month about what that one-point loss to Illinois on Oct. 19 might have cost them, but their recovery over the final four games was another testament to Chryst and his staff. Coan proved that the Badgers can still move the ball when they need to when Taylor is being bottled up.

The Gophers were humbled a bit by one of their border-state rivals for the second time in the last three weeks, taking some of the shine off this breakthrough in coach P.J. Fleck's third season.

Up next

Wisconsin heads to Indianapolis for the sixth time in nine years since the conference title game was created. The Badgers lost 38-7 to Ohio State on Oct. 26.

Clintonville tax rate up slightly

Common council approves 2020 budget

CLINTONVILLE — The Common Council approved the 2020 budget at its Nov. 19 meeting in the Community Center.

Taxpayers in Clintonville will see an increase of 54 cents per \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

The new tax rate will be \$10.64 per \$1,000 of assessed value. That is a tax increase for the city's portion of the property tax bill of \$44.41 for a home assessed at \$80,000, the average assessed value of a home in Clintonville.

The total tax levy is \$2.38 million, which is \$128,799 higher than the 2019 budget.

"The more I read the budget, the more I'm impressed. It gets better every year," said Mayor Rich-

ard Beggs. "The budget format is revamped and easier to understand. Overall, it is good for the city. It doesn't include money for the swimming pond, but we'll get there."

Clintonville resident Terry Lichtenberg appeared before the public hearing for the budget Nov. 18 in support of something being done to provide outdoor swimming.

According to City Administrator Sharon Eveland, the city's assessed value is about \$400,000 higher than the previous year.

The city had a 1.27% net new construction rate.

Eveland reported that the city lost about \$5 million in value as the result of a settlement between the state of Wisconsin and Creative Converting over its equalized value, which is assessed by the state.

This resulted in a tax refund of

\$107,000 to Creative Converting as part of the settlement with the state regarding its equalized value.

The new budget includes a 2% cost of living allowance for city employees.

The health insurance premiums for 2020 will increase by 34%, and the budget will absorb those costs.

The budget also includes a part-time community service officer.

It also includes hiring an assistant city administrator and reorganization of the public works department.

The tax levy is to cover a balance of \$875,757 of debt service.

The 2020 total budget for debt service is just over \$1 million.

Eveland said the city struggles to keep the tax rate down, especially because it is heavily impacted by decreasing property values.

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Ballbachs celebrate beekeeping with barn quilt

GRESHAM — Shawano County's 356th barn quilt, called "Honey-bee," is on display on a barn owned by John and Lorraine Ballbach Jr. at W9790 Thurner Lane, north of Gresham.

They chose the pattern featuring a honeybee because they are full-time beekeepers.

"We think the Shawano County barn quilts are just awesome and have always wanted one for our farm," Lorraine Ballbach said. "Ours is beautiful. I love it."

John Ballbach has been a beekeeper since he was 16 years old, helping his father on their farm near Port Washington. His parents, John Sr. (also known as "The Bee Man") and Rae Ballbach, got into the bee business after John Sr. quit his foundry job. At their peak, they were running 600 hives.

After selling their farm in Port Washington, they purchased the farm on Thurner Lane north of Gresham from Dan Thurner and his family, who were dairy farmers and owned 80 acres. John and Rae relocated in 1989, moving "up north" for better honey production.

At that time, John Jr. and Lorraine lived in Random Lake and kept bees as a hobby. In 2009, Lorraine quit her job in hospice care and started selling raw local honey with her husband. They had 12 hives by 2010.

In 2018, John and Lorraine left Random Lake where they'd lived for 19 years and relocated to the farm north of Gresham. They have 75 hives today and hope to raise even more.

Because of Wisconsin's cold winters, the Ballbachs take most of their hives to Paducah, Kentucky, in December, leaving only a handful in Wisconsin. When they bring them back in the spring, they have to "queen check" to make sure the bees didn't kill off the queen bee.

"Whenever there is stress in the hive, like traveling for a long distance in a car, the bees blame the queen and kill her," John said. "Of course, if that happens, we have to install a new queen, which is a process in itself."

The Ballbachs sell their honey and beeswax products on their farm and at various farmers markets and festivals throughout Wisconsin. They feature several varieties of honey, including basswood, which has a light minty aftertaste, tradi-

tional clover and summer blend, which is a mixture of everything the bees collected over the summer.

They also have starthistle, which has a caramel taste.

"We look forward to people com-

ing to visit and see our honey farm," Lorraine said.
