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Krueger found not guilty of reckless homicide

Epileptic seizure caused 2017 crash that killed Appleton woman

SHAWANO — A Shawano man charged with reckless homicide in the death of a 41-year-old Appleton woman in a crash two and a half years ago was found not guilty Friday of that and another felony count after a four-day jury trial.

Brian J. Krueger, 33, was accused of recklessly causing the death of Naomi Gregurich in a two-vehicle crash on state Highway 29 near the intersection of Rangeline Road in the town of Herman on June 29, 2017.

He was also charged with a felony count of reckless injury for injuries sustained by one of Gregurich's two sons, both of whom were passengers in her vehicle.

A third felony count was amended to a misdemeanor charge of reckless driving-causing bodily harm for injuries to the other child.

After nearly eight hours of deliberations, the jury acquitted Krueger of the two felonies but found him guilty of the misdemeanor.

Krueger was the driver of a 2013 Ford Focus that was traveling east on Highway 29, when he lost control of the vehicle, crossed the median, and struck a westbound 2008 Saturn being driven by Gregurich.

Krueger was driving a delivery vehicle for the Bumper to Bumper auto parts store in Shawano.

Krueger has epilepsy and suffered a seizure while driving.

The state argued at the trial that after several recent seizures — including one just the night before — Krueger would have been aware he should not be driving.

"This case boils down to this — personal responsibility," said Assistant State Attorney General Tara Jenswold, who prosecuted the case alongside Shawano-Menominee County District Attorney Greg Parker.

"This defendant had a responsibility to take himself off the road," she told the jury during closing arguments.

Krueger had also been involved in two previous minor accidents also caused by epileptic seizures while

driving. He had his driver's license temporarily suspended after these incidents.

The jury heard testimony over the four-day trial from medical experts, law enforcement that responded to the fatal crash and the two previous minor crashes, witnesses to the crashes and witnesses to Krueger's epileptic episodes.

The crux of the case, however, came down to the recent seizures the state cited and whether they could be classified as actual seizures or less severe epileptic episodes that wouldn't have required Krueger to temporarily give up his driving privileges.

The law requires that anyone with a license who experiences an epileptic episode that results in altered consciousness or loss of bodily control must report the incident and be suspended from driving for 90 days for medical review.

The defense argued that the episodes Krueger experienced in the month prior to the crash did not meet that threshold.

Krueger himself took the stand to explain to the jury his epileptic condition and the difference between a grand mal seizure, which would have meant a three-month loss of driving privileges, and a petit mal, which is a brief and less severe epileptic episode.

"Only people with epilepsy understanding he can sometimes have an episode

he can feel but that no one observing him would even notice.

He said he does not lose consciousness or bodily control during these episodes.

He also said the episode he experienced the night before the crash was not really a seizure and that it passed quickly.

Krueger's defense counsel, John Miller Carroll, also argued it would have been up to the doctors and the Department of Transportation's medical review board to determine whether Krueger should have been on the road, not Krueger.

Miller Carroll questioned the state's contention that Krueger was taking a risk by driving the day of the crash that was unreasonable and substantial.

"If he had had a grand mal seizure the day before, that would have been unreasonable," he said.

He argued Krueger's actions did not meet the standard of criminally reckless conduct.

Krueger could have faced a maximum 25 years in prison and a \$100,000 fine had he been found guilty of second-degree reckless homicide.

The misdemeanor count of reckless driving-causing bodily harm carries a maximum possible penalty of one year in jail.

Sentencing was scheduled for Feb. 7.

Lions raising funds for school music programs

CLINTONVILLE — The Clintonville Lions Club is asserting itself as the Friends of the Clintonville High School Music Department and working on a fundraising campaign to help the school out.

The campaign is expected to raise funds that would go directly to the department for acquiring needed items that cannot be obtained through the school district budgeting process.

Top among the needs are the replacement of the acoustic choral shells placed behind the choirs

when they perform on stage to better project their singing voices out to the audience. The current shells have been around for quite a few years; they are difficult to set up and store, according to band director Josh Heyer.

New ones come on wheels, can easily set up by one person and can be stacked for storage. Cost of a new set of shells is estimated to between \$10,000 and \$12,000, Heyer said.

The band is in need of replacing some of the larger school-owned instruments. Replacing a tuba can cost

as much as \$5,000 for a new one or \$2,500 for a good quality used one, according to Heyer.

Another need of the music department is funding to provide scholarships to students to attend musical arts summer camps and to provide financial assistance for department field trips.

The amount of money raised will be announced at the intermission of the Wisconsin Singers show Feb. 14, which is a fundraiser for both the music department and the Lions Club.

Clintonville mayor, district 4 races only two contested elections

CLINTONVILLE — There are only two contested races in the city as the 2020 spring election approaches.

Alderman Mike Hankins has returned his papers to seek reelection

in District 4. He is facing a challenge from former alderman and mayor Lois Bressette.

Mayor Richard Beggs is serving his second round as mayor. Challenger Laurie Vollrath has turned in her papers as a candidate to oppose him.

Alderman Chuck Manske took out nomination papers to seek his second term on the City Council, but he did not file them as he has decided not to seek another term in District 2. Newcomer Peggy Zaemisch has filed her papers as a candidate in that district.

All other incumbent aldermen are seeking another term on the council including Ben Huber in District 1, Branden Braden in District 3 and Rusty Mitchell in District 5.

The spring election will be held April 7.

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may request to vote an absentee ballot. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least 10 consecutive days before the election. The elector must also be registered in order to receive an absentee ballot. *Proof of identification must be provided before an absentee ballot may be issued.*

You must make a request for an absentee ballot in writing.

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the primary or election or both. You may also submit a written request in the form of a letter. Your written request must list your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote, the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different, and your signature. You may make application for an absentee ballot by mail or in person.

Making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail

The deadline for making application to receive an absentee by mail is:
5:00 p.m. on Thursday, February 13, 2020.

Note: Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined to home or a care facility, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk regarding deadlines for requesting and submitting an absentee ballot.

You may also request and vote an absentee ballot in the clerk's office or other specified location during the days and hours specified below for casting an absentee ballot in person.

Nelson granted 2nd delay for hearing

Prelim on Diemel murder charges delayed to Feb. 6

KINGSTON, MO. — Garland “Joey” Nelson’s preliminary hearing on first-degree murder charges in the deaths of Nick and Justin Diemel, both of the Bonduel area, has been delayed for a second time.

The hearing was initially expected to take place in November but the court granted a request from his defense counsel to hold the matter over until Jan. 20.

After another request by his attorney, Garland’s preliminary hearing has now been rescheduled for Feb. 6.

Nelson, 25, has been held without bond in the Caldwell County Detention Center since his arrest July 29 for tampering with a motor vehicle, a state felony. Court documents show Nelson admitted to driving a white Ford F250 pickup truck, rented by the brothers on their arrival in Missouri on July 20, from his farm in Braymer to a commuter parking lot near Holt, where it was abandoned.

The affidavit added Nelson admitted he acted alone in driving the truck to the commuter lot, according to Associated Press reports.

A news report on kmbc.com, a Kansas City, Missouri, television station, cited court documents as saying the Diemels were expecting a \$250,000 check from Nelson as part of a cattle deal. Nick, 35, and Justin, 24, were owners of Diemel Livestock

in Bonduel and had livestock dealings in multiple states.

“It is believed Nick and Justin Diemel never left the property after they arrived and were intentionally killed,” the

charges said per the AP.

Nelson also faces two counts of abandonment of a corpse, two counts of tampering with physical evidence, two counts of armed criminal action and one count of unlawful possession of a firearm.

The firearm charge stems from Nelson’s felony conviction in federal court for “Fraud Using Property Mortgaged or Pledged to Farm Credit Agencies.” Under state law, felons are forbidden to have or use firearms.

The Braymer man served 13 months of a 24-month sentence at Leavenworth Camp, for selling at least 114 cattle mortgaged to the federal Farm Service Agency. The camp is a minimum-security satellite facility of the more-famous Leavenworth Penitentiary in Kansas. Nelson was released in March 2018 and farmed with his mother.

During the course of the investigation, Nelson reportedly admitted to having access to and using a .30-30 caliber rifle to kill two small animals July 20. Investigators think Nelson used the same rifle to shoot the brothers.

The KMBC website cites an affidavit filed with the charges that Nelson gave many misleading explanations of events in his attempts to

mislead law enforcement in locating the Diemel brothers.

Documents show he told police he removed the cell phones belonging to the brothers and disposed of them along the roadway while walking back to Holt, Missouri, where he arranged for someone to give him a ride to another location. That person has not been identified and no additional persons have been charged in the investigation.

Documents cited by the television station state Nelson eventually told authorities when he arrived back at the farm, he found two bodies believed to be the Diemel brothers, each dead and stuffed inside of a 55-gallon metal barrel in a pole barn just south of the residence.

The affidavit states the bodies were moved through a pasture one at a time in a skid loader bucket to an adjacent pasture where they were covered with diesel fuel and burned. After they were burned, Nelson said one or both of the bodies were placed in a manure pile by a metal barn. He said a skid loader was used to crush the barrels and placed elsewhere on the property.

Documents show Nelson said he returned to the pole barn at one point and used a shovel to remove what he believed to be blood from the floor where it is believed the brothers were killed.

Authorities said a .30-30 cartridge was located in the bloodstained clothing reportedly belonging to Nelson. They also confirmed DNA tests of blood stains found on the clothing belonged to Nick Diemel.

In the area of the affidavit relating to evidence, authorities state burned human remains were found in a manure pile on the property in

Braymer, and based on DNA comparisons, it is believed the remains are those of Nick and Justin Diemel.

The affidavit states two crushed barrels were also located on the Braymer property, and a neighbor reported hearing multiple gunshots coming from the farm between 11:15-11:30 a.m. on July 21, according to the charging documents. He allegedly drove away in the truck about 11:45 a.m.

Judge Kevin Walden has been assigned to the case. Kanoy continues to preside over early proceedings against Nelson. Nelson’s attorney, Ryan Williams, filed for a change in judges Oct. 7. The reason for the request could be that Kanoy issued an ex-parte order of protection against Nelson in January 2015, barring him from having contact with a woman he was residing with at the time. On March 4, 2015, a final order was issued that meant Nelson could no longer reside at an address in Hamilton, Missouri.

Nelson will also face charges from Bourbon County, Kansas, for “endangering the food supply.” According to the statute listed on the state legislature’s website, endangering the food supply means “bringing into this state any domestic animal which is infected with any contagious or infectious disease or any animal which has been exposed to any contagious or infectious disease.”

Prosecutors say Nelson didn’t have proper health papers when he delivered 35 calves from his family’s farm to a farm in Fort Scott, Kansas, in May. Tomme Feil, Nelson’s mother, said her son returned the calves to a Kansas farmer when his partner’s bank claimed them as collateral.

Texas driver flees deputy, gets stuck on logging road

Driver said ‘see ya’ before running from traffic stop

WITTENBERG — A Texas driver who said “see ya” before fleeing from Shawano County authorities Monday got stuck on a logging road and was arrested after a short pursuit, according to the criminal complaint.

Jay R. Selle, 58, of Zavalla, Texas, was spotted by a deputy speeding and running a stop sign in Wittenberg shortly after 2 a.m. Monday, according to the complaint.

The deputy who pulled Selle over noticed that Selle’s speech was slurred and could smell alcohol coming from the vehicle, according to the complaint.

Selle claimed he had had two beers about an hour ago.

When the deputy told Selle he

wanted to perform a field sobriety test, Selle first said, “OK,” then put the vehicle in gear and said “see ya” before driving off.

The deputy pursued the vehicle as Selle drove south on County Road M and then turned onto a logging road where his vehicle spun sideways and ran into the deeper snow in the woods and got stuck.

Selle was charged with a felony count of attempting to flee or elude

an officer. He could face a maximum 3½ years in prison and a \$10,000 fine if convicted.

He was also charged with a misdemeanor count of resisting an officer and cited for first-offense operating while intoxicated.

Selle was ordered held on a \$2,500 cash bond set by Judge James Habeck. He is scheduled for an adjourned initial appearance on Feb. 3.

Feathery, crystalline structures of ice may form upon trees, shrubs, branches and just about any other surface if conditions are right on chilly winter mornings. Perfection at its finest, each crystal showcases Mother Nature's expertise at design and patterning.

In the winter forest, pay close attention to the bark of the forest trees. You can even learn to identify different trees by the artistic qualities of their fascinating bark. Of course, everyone knows white birch, as well as the shagbark hickory, but can you identify the textures and designs of the bark of black cherry, red pine, American beech or dogwoods?

The formations of ice we find along open water also showcase nature's expertise at sculpting and creation of three-dimensional works of art. Icicles and bell-shaped structures and hanging branches decorated with jewel-like ice formations are and pendants are miraculous in their beauty and spectacular in their winter elegance, especially on a sunny day when they glisten like jeweled ornaments.

The winter lichens offer another example of elegant natural art. Some lichens our feathery or hairy an appearance while others form bubbly shields that sprawl over the bark and branches of trees, as well as rocks and boulders. Lichens are present in many different colors including sea-foam green, blue, many different

shades of green, even pink, yellow and gold.

exposed limestone is painted with the colors of nature, as mosses, algae, lichens and the effects of wind and weather paint incredible design over the surface of the stone.

We don't need to look any further than the snow itself for an elaborate display of nature at work. A close-up

view of snowflakes through a microscope or magnifying glass reveals the hidden patterns, textures and design that create the wondrous flakes of snow that dance through the winter skies.

Fans relish playoff game at Lambeau Field

GREEN BAY — It's hard to imagine the National Football League postseason without the Green Bay Packers. But for the last two seasons, Packer players and fans had to watch the playoffs from their couches.

With the team making a trium-

phant return to the postseason — and knowing Sunday's game against the Seattle Seahawks would be the last at Lambeau Field this season after the San Francisco 49ers win on Saturday — fans soaked up every moment of the playoff atmosphere.

Despite temperatures in the low 20s on what was a mostly cloudy afternoon, many fans still beat members of the Packers to the stadium, filling up the parking lots surrounding Lambeau several hours before kickoff.

Green and gold attire could be seen in almost every direction, with the occasional Seahawks logo or colors sticking out like sore thumbs.

From time to time, a "Go Pack Go" chant would begin, while others reacted to the AFC divisional game that was going on.

Other fans could be found watching live bands in several locations around the stadium — Titledown District, Johnsonville Tailgate Village and Kroll's West.

The Titledown District was also the area where the most kids were found, with a skate rink and tubing hill at Ariens Hill, which opened at 10 a.m.

When the Lambeau gates opened two hours prior to kickoff, a few hundred fans filtered in to take in the pregame warmups. All fans in attendance received a rally towel that said "The Pack is Back."

Some fans stayed outside the walls of 1265 Lombardi Ave. to enjoy some more tailgating fun, but just about everyone was in their seats by the time the game kicked off.

In true Lambeau fashion, fans showered Packer players with loud cheers when they took the field.

way, 78,998 fans (the second-largest playoff crowd in Packers history) did their part in trying to make an

impact on the game. When Seattle had the ball on offense, noise levels hovered in the 90-100 decibel range, while the Packers' offense operated with almost no noise at all.

The Packers' offense gave fans plenty to cheer about in the first half before the fans helped the defense make a key stop in the fourth quarter to seal up a 28-23 win.

One of the loudest cheers of the night came when rapper Lil Wayne led the crowd into "Roll Out the Barrel" between the third and fourth quarters. Los Angeles Lakers star Anthony Davis was also in attendance.

Loud chants of "Go Pack Go" echoed throughout Lambeau as fans headed for the exits and into the snowy night — with smiles, hugs and high-fives galore.

While the green and gold faithful won't get the chance to cheer their team on at Lambeau this Sunday, they did leave the stadium with memories that will last a lifetime.

Packers knock off Seahawks to reach NFC Championship Game

Adams breaks Packer playoff record while starring for offense

GREEN BAY — The Green Bay Packers built a comfortable lead before hanging on in the final minutes to claim a 28-23 victory over the Seattle Seahawks in a NFC Divisional Round playoff game on Sunday at Lambeau Field.

“Well, all I can say is that was pretty indicative of our entire season right there with another game going right down to the wire,” said Packers rookie head coach Matt LaFleur.

As it was for most of the regular season, it was the Aaron Jones and Davante Adams show on offense for Green Bay, while Za'Darius Smith and Preston Smith starred for the Packers' defense. Jones and Adams scored two touchdowns each, while the Smiths registered two sacks each.

Green Bay started hot on offense, and with the defense helping out by forcing several Seattle punts, the Packers were able to build a 21-3 halftime lead.

The Seahawks found some rhythm in the second half, mostly due to the escapability of quarterback Russell Wilson, and were able to trim the deficit down to five with over nine minutes to play.

With Seattle nearing midfield with about three minutes left, a gassed Green Bay defense needed a big play. Preston Smith came through for the team, sacking Wilson on third down to force a punt.

Green Bay's offense never gave the ball back, running out the final 2 minutes and 32 seconds.

“It wasn't always pretty at times, but you know, it was great at the end of the game there — we made plays when we had to,” said LaFleur.

“Our defense stepped up and was able to get that sack on Russell.”

It was a sigh of relief for Packers fans after the team's playoff meltdown against the Seahawks back in 2014.

Now, the Pack is just one win away from playing in the Super Bowl. Green Bay will head to California to take on the top-seeded San Francisco 49ers on Sunday at 5:40 p.m.

Green Bay's offense (which started Jared Veldheer at right tackle after Bryan Bulaga was a late scratch with an illness) accumulated 344 total yards for the game, getting things started on the first possession of the game.

It took the Packers just 4:23 to move the ball 75 yards. Jones busted free for a 23-yard run on the first offensive play before quarterback Aaron Rodgers found Adams for 14 yards and tight end Jimmy Graham for 13. Rodgers found Adams wide open up the left sideline on a 20-yard pass to cap the drive.

It proved to be a sign of things to come for Adams, who set a new Packer playoff game record with 160 receiving yards. He finished the night with eight receptions.

After the teams traded several punts, Seattle found the scoreboard late in the opening quarter when kicker Jason Myers connected on a 45-yard field goal.

The Packers' offense responded by scoring touchdowns on its final two drives of the half.

Rodgers connected with Adams on passes of 11, 18 and 15 yards before Jones powered into the end zone from a yard out to make it a 14-3 game. After Seattle missed a field goal, the Packers' offense put together an 11-play, 60-yard drive that culminated in another 1-yard

touchdown run from Jones.

Up 21-3 at the half, Green Bay looked to be on its way to a rout, but Wilson turned in a jaw-dropping second half to will Seattle back into the game.

Seattle scored touchdowns on its first three drives of the half. Green Bay was only to match the first one, when Rodgers hit Adams for a 40-yard touchdown on what was an incredible route and run after the catch by Adams.

In the third quarter, Seattle possessed the ball for almost 12 minutes. A four-and-a-half minute drive midway through the final quarter by the Packers' offense gave the defense just enough of a breather to put together one final stop.

Rodgers completed two big passes on the offense's final drive to help run the clock out. The veteran QB threw a perfect pass to Adams for a 32-yard gain on third-and-eight before connecting with Graham for just enough on a third-and-nine play.

“It's a special feeling. That's kind of what we talked about in the huddle before the last drive — these are the moments that you work for and you think about in the offseason,

the chance to put a game away,” said Rodgers of the final drive.

For the game, Green Bay converted on nine of its 14 third-down chances. The Packers also scored touchdowns every time they reached the red zone and didn't turn the ball over.

Green Bay will look for a similar showing against the 49ers, who dismantled the Packers 37-8 on Nov. 24.

The win set the tone for the Hawks, who claimed seven of the first nine weight classes.

Junior Colten Herm kept the momentum rolling in the 145 class, winning by pin in just 56 seconds.

After senior Ben Carroll picked up a forfeit win at 160 pounds, junior Gage Timm took the mat for the 170-pound match.

Timm scored the first takedown and held on to lead 2-0 after one period. The junior then pulled off a reversal in the second period before pinning his opponent at the 3:38 mark.

Patience helped Timm earn the pin, taking advantage of one of the limited opportunities in the first period before working his way out of the down position in the second.

“This (win) is a huge momentum

booster for us knowing that they (West De Pere) have been steam-rolling some teams over the past weeks. Now, it’s looking a lot better for us on our conference goals,” said Timm.

Shawano junior Carter Schmidt rallied from an early deficit in his matchup at 152 pounds, but eventually was pinned at the 3:09 mark. Sophomore Brenden Stempa battled at the 182 class, but ran out of time in a 7-2 decision loss.

Sophomore Brady Stomberg (106) and freshmen Connor Majeski (120), and Hayden Stange (132) all lost by pins in the first period. Junior Wyatt Brandt (126) dropped a 9-1 major decision. Shawano forfeited the 113-pound weight class.

WITTENBERG — The Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School girls basketball team continued its strong start to the season, rolling to a 58-37 victory over Amherst on Jan. 7.

The win pushed the Chargers record to 10-0 overall. Witt-Birn improved to 5-0 in the Central Wisconsin Conference-East Division, giving the team a two-game lead in the standings already.

Witt-Birn used a strong defensive showing and an aggressive offensive approach to take care of a tall and intimidating Amherst squad, which had just one conference loss coming in.

On offense, Witt-Birn senior Olivia Curley and junior Abi Fraaza drove to the rim any chance they could, capping the plays with field goals, assists to teammates or trips to the free-throw line. The Chargers attempted just five 3-pointers in the game.

Witt-Birn had a number of its shots blocked around the basket, but that didn't stop the team from consistently getting the ball down low.

Coach Nick Mechelke was thrilled with his team's willingness to mix it up with much taller defenders, singling out Curley's ability to get to the rim and finish some tough shots.

"You can't be scared to go in

there (the lane)," said Curley. "They are tall, but what are they going to do? They're not going to punch you, they're not going to do anything like that so you might as well take it to them like they would do to us."

After Curley and Fraaza combined for 18 points to help the team to a comfortable halftime lead, the Chargers got to the free-throw line throughout the second half to keep adding on to their lead.

Witt-Birn attempted 18 of its 26 free throws in the final half. While the Chargers weren't too efficient at the line (making 15), it proved to be a big determining factor, as Amherst only shot six free throws the entire game.

Fraaza finished the contest as the Chargers top scorer with 18 points, while Curley added 17.

Junior Emma Herb provided 13 points, with 10 of the points coming in the second half.

Herb, Witt-Birn's go-to post player, was a big factor on the defensive end of the court, helping alter Amherst drives to the rim and piling up rebounds.

The junior grabbed 12 rebounds in the game and also tallied three steals.

Fraaza also had three steals while pulling down 11 boards — six of which came on the offensive glass. Curley had four steals, while freshman Reese Rogowski had two.

"We stress playing solid defense and help defense. They've honestly bought in," said Mechelke of his team's defense. "Our goal is to not let someone score 40 points. We play smart, we work together and we're getting better at not taking chances — making teams work for their opportunities."

Witt-Birn kept most of Amherst's offense behind the 3-point line and did a strong job of limiting the Fal-

cons to just one shot on each possession.

Witt-Birn's defense flexed its muscles in the opening half, surrendering just nine points.

Amherst had a 5-4 lead at the 14:17 mark of the first half, but didn't score again until the 7:35 mark, when Witt-Birn led 11-7. The next Falcon points came at the 4:10 mark, which made it a 19-9 game.

While Amherst was able to find a little rhythm in the second half, Witt-Birn never let the lead slip below 15 points, getting up to a 26-point lead with a couple minutes to play.

"We knew right away that they (Amherst) was going to be tough and was ready to beat us because we're the undefeated team in the conference and everyone wants to beat us," said Fraaza, who expects to get every opponent's best shot every time on the court.

"We need to keep working as a family and together, and just working harder each and every day at practice to get better and prepare for the good teams that are coming up in the playoffs."

Heling reflects on his time with SCEPI

Team building seen as highlight of last six years

SHAWANO — When someone asks Dennis Heling what his crowning achievement is during the time he was with Shawano County Economic Progress Inc., he'll cite the way communities are working together on economic development.

Heling looked back on his six-plus years as the chief economic development officer for SCEPI on Friday during an open house at the Shawano Country Chamber of Commerce, where the SCEPI offices are also located. He said that municipalities and the county are cooperating better to bring industries and jobs into the area.

"I think we were able to build a great working relationship with the municipalities, the county and the city of Shawano," Heling said. "This allowed us to work with everything from municipal organizations to businesses, and we were able to drive projects home like Belmark, Nueske's renovation, the Reinhart project — all of those projects that really required a team effort to get accomplished."

There have been some challenges in the job for Heling, most notably in trying to help businesses get workers.

"We're seeing a maturing of the region, and I think that's a definite challenge," Heling said. "For businesses, it was a challenge having workers for their businesses on all levels, not just entry-level but even the higher-level positions."

Heling said it was time for him to step back and let someone else continue the work that he's carried on. Who that will be is still unknown, as SCEPI's board of directors offered the job to someone and was rejected.

"From the organization's standpoint, it's best to build a little more capacity for the organization," Heling said.

Heling said he plans to "pursue other avenues" in retirement. One of those is increasing his involvement in Junior Achievement, an organization that goes into the schools and teaches work-readiness and financial skills.

Heling added that he'll still be helping with a couple of SCEPI projects that are well into development, although he didn't specify what those projects are, other than they involve the city of Shawano and its administrator, Eddie Sheppard.

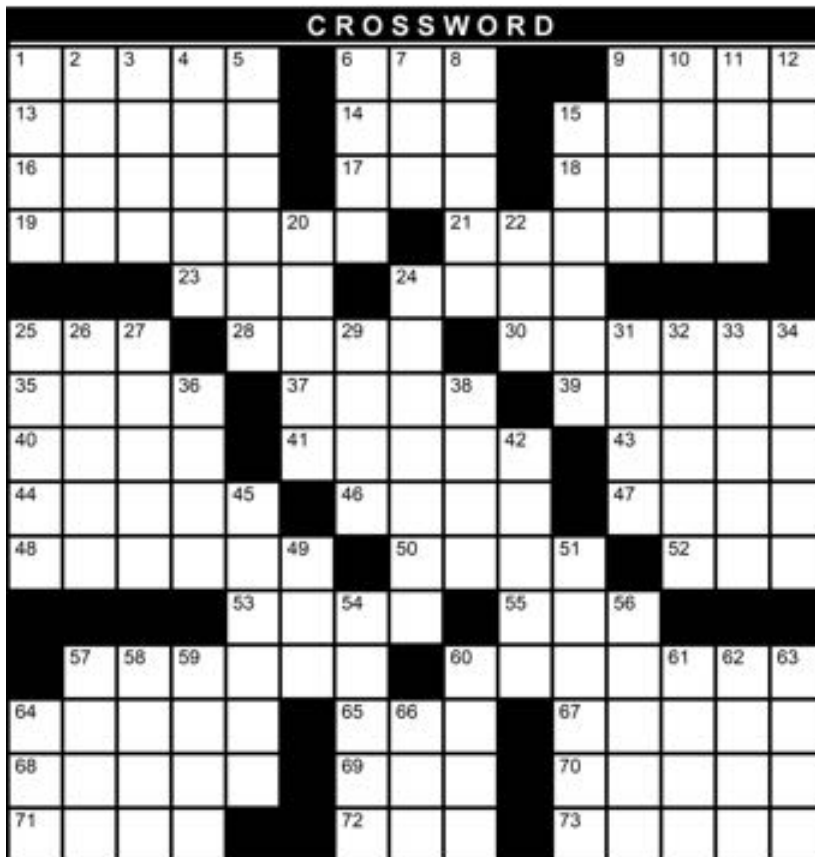

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may submit a request to vote an absentee ballot to their municipal clerk. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least 10 consecutive days before the election. The elector must also be registered in order to receive an absentee ballot. Proof of identification must be provided before an absentee ballot may be issued.

You must make a request for an absentee ballot in writing or online at MyVote.wi.gov.

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the primary or election or both. You may also submit a written request in the form of a letter or you may apply for an absentee ballot online at myVote.wi.gov. Your written request must list your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote, the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different, and your signature. You may make application for an absentee ballot in person, by mail, by fax, by email or at MyVote.wi.gov.

Making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail

The deadline for making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail is:
5 pm on the fifth day before the election, Thursday, February 13, 2020.

Note: Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined to home or a care facility, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk regarding deadlines for requesting and submitting an absentee ballot.

Voting an absentee ballot in person

You may also request and vote an absentee ballot in the clerk's office or other specified location during the days and hours specified for casting an absentee ballot in person.

It is important your mood can be influenced by the weather. Winter is one time of the year of sadness and depression that can occur in winter. In fact, many of us have seasonal episodes or even often with depression that is some degree, but if the sadness and depression goes beyond the "winter blues", that person may have Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD).

Symptoms of Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD):

- Sad, anxious or "empty" feelings
- Feelings of hopelessness and a pessimism
- Feelings of guilt, worthlessness or helplessness
- Irritability, restlessness
- Loss of interest or pleasure in activities and socializing
- Fatigue and decreased energy
- Difficulty concentrating, remembering details and making decisions
- Difficulty sleeping or oversleeping
- Changes in weight
- Thoughts of death or suicide

Did you know that about 10% of people who live in states with long winter nights are at high risk for seasonal affective disorder? In addition, seasonal affective disorder has been during the last years of winter and cold more often in winter than ever.

Fortunately, there are ways to combat the disorder and return to your normal mood. To manage symptoms of SAD, you can try the following:

- Get enough sleep

Using alcohol or drugs to cope can make the depression worse about a year later. Although there is no test for seasonal affective disorder, your health care provider can make a diagnosis by asking about your history of symptoms. Tell the doctor about how you have been feeling.
