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Old Wescott Town Hall could become alternative academy

District researching concepts to help bright students not fitting into common mold

SHAWANO — The Shawano School District has plans to restore the former Wescott Town Hall to an institute of learning, if plans discussed at the executive committee meeting on Feb. 12 move forward.

The district is considering making the old schoolhouse, which is finally in the district's possession after sorting through paperwork, into an alternative academy for grades 6-12. Superintendent Randi Anderson said that district officials are still doing research into the issue, but the idea is to provide a place for those who are exceptionally gifted to explore issues that are not typically introduced in a traditional classroom setting.

"This is just starting to scratch the surface," Anderson said. "We are looking at what kind of alternative programming can we put into place to serve that underserved population."

The town of Wescott returned ownership of the old town hall to the district in July after leasing it for \$1 over 50 years ago with the stipulation that it needed to be used for town purposes. Wescott stopped using it as a town hall around 2006 but still maintained it and occasionally rented it out for community use. Wescott decided last year to return the building to the district's care, which took district officials by surprise.

Anderson said one learning model the district is looking at is Altitude Learning, based in California, which offers project-based learning and student-driven programming.

"If a kid is passionate about taking apart computers, he's going to take apart computers. If she's passionate about the outdoors, she's going to be using that outdoor space to create a garden," Anderson said. "It's going to be self-driven,

self-passioned, getting those students engaged as they haven't been in the past."

Anderson noted that nothing has been finalized, and if the district decides to move forward with the alternative academy model, it might require collaborating with other school districts. The district might reach out to Bonduel, Clintonville and Menominee Indian school districts to see if there is interest.

"There's multiple solutions out there," Anderson said, adding that Rod Watson, Shawano Community Middle School's associate principal, is helping to research the possibilities. She said that planning for the building will begin in earnest in June, which is not only when the regular school year ends but is also when the district plans to be through most of its strategic plan preparation.

School board member Beth Mac-

Farlane embraced the idea, which would help students who are quite intelligent but might feel held back in the existing classroom model.

"I think this would fit really smart ones," MacFarlane said. "They don't always fit the mold in a regular school setting."

School board president Tyler Schmidt also voiced support for the alternative academy concept, thinking it could serve a similar purpose that the LEADS Primary Charter School serves.

"I think it's a good idea to try that," Schmidt said. "I think building the confidence of the kids is so key, and that's what I think LEADS does. That is so integral in some kids' lives, just having the confidence to speak up for what they want or how they want to learn or how they do learn."

Summer school changes get green light from board

Shawano to go to five hours of instruction daily with a four-day week

SHAWANO — Summer school will be four days per week for the Shawano School District instead of five, following a vote Monday from the school board.

Rod Watson, associate principal at Shawano Community Middle School, presented his plan to the district's executive committee. He said he investigated the possibility of making the school week shorter without increasing the number of weeks summer school is in session.

The school day will increase slightly from 4½ hours to 5 hours every Monday through Thursday for five weeks. Breakfast and lunch will still be served five days per week.

A survey was sent out to parents, with 328 responding, and 86% favored a four-day school week, according to Watson.

"It was a pretty resounding mandate for a four-day school week," he said.

Some parents commented that only having school Mondays through Thursdays is a good thing for those families who plan weekend trips. Watson told the committee that Friday attendance in summer school tends to drop compared with the rest of the week.

"Some commented with the four-day week that they would start using our program, when they hadn't before," Watson said. "It would be something less cumbersome for them."

Parents who are also employees for summer school commented that the four-day week would cause less stress for staff.

Even with the overwhelming support, some parents commented on the survey concerns about whether free meals would be offered on Fridays, as the district has in recent years offered the lunches to all school-aged students, whether they attended summer school or not. There were also questions about whether daycare would be provided Fridays as it had been previously.

There was not as much support for the school days being an hour longer, even though it would prevent summer school from going from five weeks to six, according to Watson. About 65% of survey respondents favored a longer day.

Watson said the argument was understandable for the youngest students, as the existing schedule saw their attention waning in the last hour of the day, so he opted for an additional half-hour instead as a compromise.

"A longer day would go past what is optimal for them," Watson said. "It would create behavior issues."

He said the four-day week would save the district in operating costs, noting teachers would be working fewer hours under the new system.

School board member Michael Sleeper praised the plan.

"It's a creative, proactive approach," Sleeper said.

Scheduling aside, Watson announced he is trying to get more classes set up that utilize science, technology, engineering and mathematics, which educators refer to as STEM. Included is a weeklong camp in July involving TimberPro and other businesses, where students can learn about how they use robots to make things.

"At Hillcrest, it will be design and challenge-based," Watson said. "At the middle school, it will be robotics-based; they'll be building Lego robots and work with the software."

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O'Kimosh gets three years for stealing rifle

He took it to exchange for drugs

GREEN BAY — A Shawano man who stole a .22 rifle from his uncle to trade for methamphetamine was sentenced Thursday in federal court to three years in prison and three years' supervised release for being a felon in possession of a firearm.

Brett L. O'Kimosh Jr., 42, was indicted with Mary Ann Dodge, 33, of Shawano, and Anthony J. Boyd, 22, formerly of Green Bay, for burglary, and O'Kimosh and Boyd were also indicted for felon in possession of a firearm in connection with a May 16, 2018, incident in Keshena.

According to O'Kimosh's attorney Krista Halla-Valdes, O'Kimosh and his two co-defendants, all addicts, wanted to get drugs but had no money. O'Kimosh knew his uncle had a gun that he could steal so he suggested driving to his uncle's home. O'Kimosh and Boyd went in the home. O'Kimosh did not expect his aunt to be there.

O'Kimosh and Boyd were chased out of the house after O'Kimosh's aunt confronted him. Boyd had already taken some golf clubs from the garage and put them in the vehicle. While O'Kimosh's aunt followed them out to the garage, Boyd grabbed a chainsaw, but O'Kimosh told him to put it back, which Boyd did.

Boyd knew someone in Neopit who would take the gun in exchange for drugs and the three co-defendants drove there. The gun was exchanged for methamphetamine and synthetic marijuana which they all used. O'Kimosh likely possessed the gun for less than one hour.

A relative reportedly chased O'Kimosh and Boyd out of the house and called the police.

After being arrested, O'Kimosh sent his uncle a letter apologizing for his offense. O'Kimosh plans to pay his uncle for the cost of the gun and appreciate the continued support of his uncle.

O'Kimosh had a prior drug conviction and faced an advisory guideline sentence of 41-51 months in prison. Assistant U.S. Attorney Andrew Maier considered O'Kimosh most responsible for the three co-defendants and recommended a sentence slightly below the guideline range to achieve parity with the sentences of his co-defendants.

Halla-Valdes sought an 18-24 month sentence. She wrote the court that although burglary is a serious offense O'Kimosh committed it in daytime and without breaking into a home. It involved a relative, which is a betrayal, but that decreases the level of fear that normally would accompany a burglary of an occupied residence.

"To sum it up in one sentence: this was addicts looking for something to steal to be able to get a fix," Halla-Valdes wrote.

All three co-defendants pleaded guilty to burglary charges last year. Dodge received a four-month sentence in August, and Boyd was sentenced to 18 months.

O'Kimosh was to be sentenced on Jan. 6 but was delayed as he had been charged in Shawano County Circuit Court with a child sex offense.

On Jan. 28, O'Kimosh pleaded no contest to child enticement-sexual contact and Circuit Court Judge James Habeck withheld sentence and placed O'Kimosh on four years' probation with a condition of jail time deemed served at 346 days in custody.

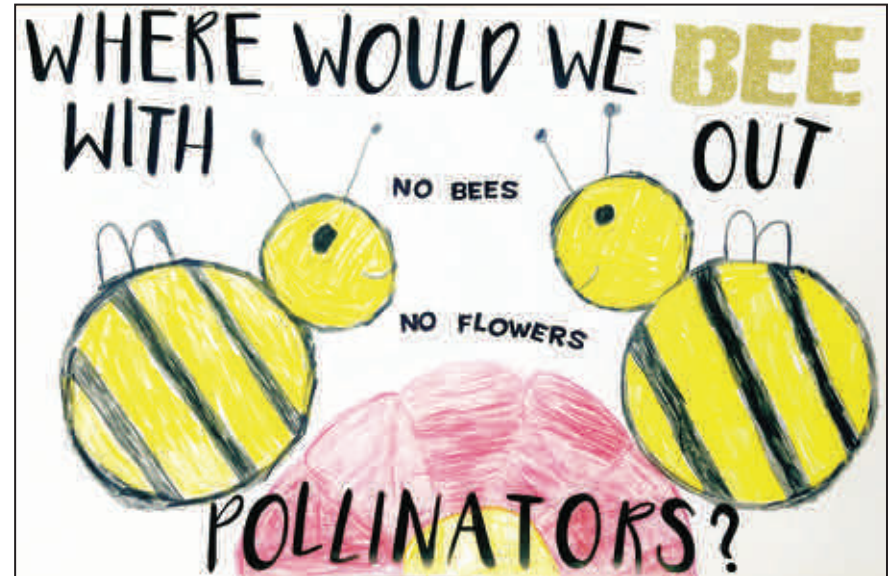

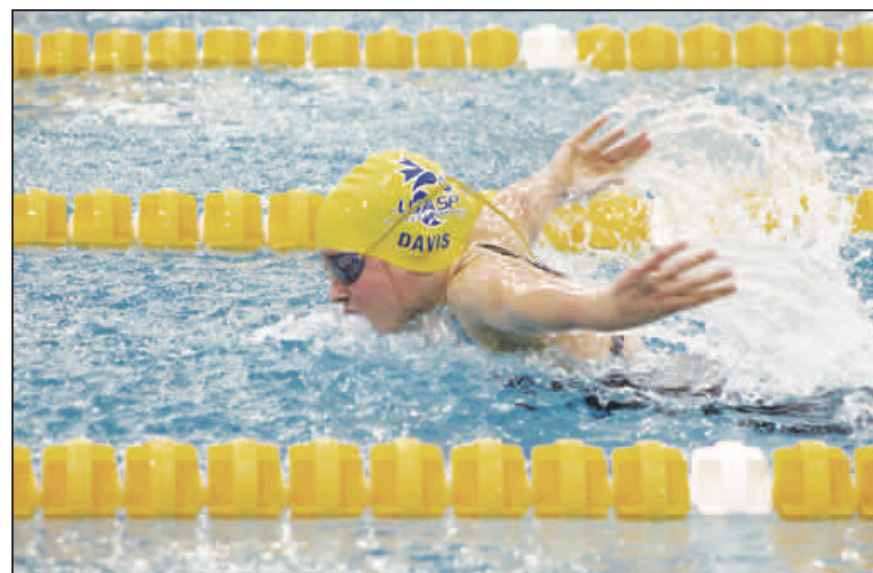

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Too much salt hazardous to people's health

Current health advice warns against consuming too much sodium. Unfortunately, this warning is not being followed by many Americans. There is new information that should get the attention of those who over-consume salt.

Medical researchers performed a systematic review of studies to assess the relation between the level of habitual salt intake and stroke or cardiovascular disease. They examined data from 13 studies, with 177,025 participants who were followed for up to 19 years.

The researchers discovered that higher salt intake was associated with greater risk of stroke and cardiovascular disease. The observed associations were stronger the larger the sodium intake (dose-response) and the longer the follow-up. Habitually consuming two teaspoons of salt a day, compared with one teaspoon a day, is associated with a 23% increase in the rate of stroke and a 14% increase in the rate of total cardiovascular disease.

Evidence of the dangers of excess salt consumption has become undeniable. The causal relation between habitual dietary salt intake and blood pressure has been established with numerous scientific studies. Yet, most adult populations from "Westernized" nations consume an average of more than two teaspoons daily.

Reducing salt intake by one teaspoon a day at the population level

could avert some 1.25 million deaths from stroke and almost 3 million deaths from cardiovascular disease per year worldwide. For the prevention of cardiovascular disease, everyone should consume

less salt.

How can you reduce the sodium in your diet? Read labels. Some foods are available in a low-salt or unsalted form. Take the salt shaker off the table. Cook without salt, and use salt substitutes like lemon juice, vinegar and herbs.

Reduce seasonings that taste salty, such as bouillon cubes, meat tenderizer, soy sauce and steak sauce. Substitute fresh fruits and vegetables for canned and processed foods. Avoid canned soups, dry soup mixes, canned or processed meat and fish, ham, bacon and sausage, salted nuts and peanut butter, frozen dinners, preseasoned mixes, snack foods and fast food.

Carefully read the labels on all over-the-counter drugs. Some contain high amounts of sodium. If in doubt, ask your doctor or pharmacist.

80% of Heart Disease *is Preventable*



Heart disease is the leading cause of death in the United States, nearly one half of all Americans some form of cardiovascular disease. But the good news is that 80 percent of heart disease and stroke events can be prevented by lifestyle changes and treatment.

If anyone of these deaths were preventable, it would have been 173. The result of CAD is atherosclerosis, which is a buildup of plaque in the arteries, which can lead to heart disease and stroke.

Heart disease risk factors

Several health conditions, such as diabetes and high blood pressure, can lead to heart disease. There are other risk factors for heart disease. There are other risk factors for heart disease.

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), about half of all Americans 45 years old have one or more of the major risk factors for heart disease: high blood pressure, high cholesterol and smoking.

Some of the risk factors for heart disease cannot be controlled, such as your age or family history, but many of them can be controlled, for example:

- High blood pressure
- High cholesterol
- Diabetes
- Obesity
- Unhealthy diet
- Physical inactivity
- Too much alcohol
- Tobacco use

Taking steps to control these risk factors can decrease your risk of heart disease.

The American Heart Association (AHA) reports that an estimated 80 percent of cardiovascular disease, including heart disease and stroke, are preventable. You can take steps to prevent heart disease by making healthy choices and managing any health conditions you may have.

Signs and symptoms

The symptoms can be warning signs of the type of heart disease. For example, the signs of a heart attack include chest pain and feeling uncomfortable, whereas the signs of heart failure could be shortness of breath and leg swelling. It is important to note that different symptoms can have different meanings. You should be aware of warning signs and symptoms and know when to seek medical attention.

Preventing heart disease

By living a healthy lifestyle, you can help keep your blood pressure, cholesterol and blood sugar under control and lower your risk for heart disease. There are several steps you can take to help prevent heart disease.

- **Check cholesterol** - Depending on your age, your health care provider should check your blood levels of cholesterol every 10 years.
- **Check and control blood pressure** - High blood pressure can have no symptoms, so it is important to have it checked on a regular basis. Your health care team should measure your blood pressure at least once a year, and if you have high blood pressure, you should have it checked more often. If you have high blood pressure, your health care team will discuss strategies to help control and manage blood pressure.
- **Manage diabetes** - Talk to your health care team about symptoms of diabetes. Keeping your blood sugar under control will help prevent you from having heart disease.
- **Take your medicine** - If you take medicine to prevent high cholesterol, high blood pressure, diabetes, follow your health care provider's instructions carefully.
