Farmers market merges with FRESH Project

New partnership expected to sustain local program

SHAWANO — Most folks who go to the Shawano Farmers Market when it opens for the season should see a lot of the vendors they've come to know and love, but it will definitely have a FRESH new outlook.

The market officially came under the purview of the FRESH Project, a nonprofit organization created three years ago to help bring healthy food to areas of the county where ease of food access is scarce. In that time, the project created a mobile market, a winter market to cover the months when the Shawano Farmers Market was in hibernation, Share the Bounty tables around the county during the summer months and more.

Barb Mendoza, FRESH Project executive director, said she was ap-

proached by market representatives in November and asked if her program would be interested in taking it over. She said some of the board members were growing tired of handling the market year after year, but they did not want it to go away.

"They decided they no longer wanted to do it," Mendoza said. "But instead of disbanding, they thought, 'Why don't we call Barb and see if they would like to run it?' And they did."

The addition of a project that boasts an average of 50 vendors each season is not expected to impact the existing programs, according to Mendoza. In fact, other projects are growing, as well.

The mobile market's community-supported agriculture program, where participants receive regular boxes of fresh meat and produce, is expanding. Currently at 71 participants, Mendoza

expects to see it grow to over 100 this year.

"We're working with communities to find where we can bring the mobile market and also working with our farmers to say, 'This is what we're looking for,'" Mendoza said. "We're going to work again with Cedar Wedge Farms, Porter's Patch, Five Star Lamb, Johnson's Family Cattle and some other organizations."

Also, the FRESH Project is adding the Menominee Reservation to its purview after focusing mainly on Shawano County. Mendoza said there are plans to help with their community gardens.

Adding the Shawano Farmers Market provides a little more sustainability to the FRESH Project, according to Mendoza.

"We're able to apply for more grants now to help run our programs,"

she said. "I think this is going to be a really great thing for us. It's not just for us; it's for the community."

The only change to the market patrons will likely see is the change in the logo, which will incorporate the FRESH Project art. Mendoza said everything else will remain status quo, even though she plans to keep looking for more vendors to participate, and she also plans to highlight vendors more through cooking demonstrations and other activities at the market.

"You won't see much change, except for a few small changes we found through surveys last year," Mendoza said. "We're listening to what the people want, and we'll try some new things."

Mendoza plans to continue the seedling program, which allows vendors to try selling at the market for free one Saturday before making a formal commitment.

She also hopes to expand the partnerships with the vendors to expand other programs. For example, any unsold produce with the potential to spoil before the next market could be placed on the Share the Bounty tables to help those in need and reduce food waste.

"A lot of times, they don't go to a market on Sunday (to sell), so what

are they going to do with it?" Mendoza said.

The Shawano Farmers Market starts June 20 and runs through Oct. 3 from 8 a.m. to noon. Market vendors sell fruits, vegetables, flowers, land-

scaping plants, maple syrup, bread, cheese, fish and meats, and some booths sell crafts. Local musicians perform, and master gardeners are also available to help with gardening quirks.

The FRESH Project has helped many who found it difficult to access some types of food due to distance from grocery stores, especially the elderly and disabled. More than 30,000 pounds of produce have been donated and distributed to those in need since the FRESH Project started in 2017.

"We would go out to the elderly centers when they have their weekly lunches, and they were our biggest supporters," Mendoza said. "They want it. They need it, and they're too old to garden. Our low-income families were excited, too."

Mendoza noted that the new venture with the farmers market, along with all of the FRESH Project's other programs, would not be possible without the help of volunteers.

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Police looking at officer mental wellness

State push to address mental health comes as officer suicides rise nationwide

SHAWANO — Suicide rates among law enforcement officers outpaced the number of officers who died in the line of duty last year, according to a recent study.

Nationwide, according to Blue HELP and the Caruth Police Institute, 228 officers died by suicide compared to 132 deaths in the line of duty.

There have been 26 recorded law enforcement suicides so far this year.

Shawano Police Chief Dan Mauel said officer suicides have touched him personally, with two officers he either worked with or went to school with early in his career having taken their own lives.

Mauel also said there have been three or four suicides in counties adjoining Shawano in the last three years.

The suicide rates and mental well-being in general were topics of discussion last month at the Wisconsin Police Chiefs Association conference.

“One of the pushes this year, and has been for probably the last couple of years, from the Division of Law Enforcement Services-Wisconsin Department of Justice is the mental wellness and well-being of police officers and law enforcement officers,” Mauel said.

The city began offering various physical wellness opportunities available to all city employees a few years ago.

“It saves money on insurance and it

can save money on workman’s comp claims,” Mauel said. “What I’d like to do, and other agencies are doing the same thing, is try and work in a mental wellness aspect for that.”

Mauel said the state Department of Justice has been encouraging departments to have peer support teams.

“I’d like to have a peer support group at some point soon,” Mauel said. “That’s been shown to be the best first line of defense for any officers that are having some issues.”

A peer support team would be a group of officers within the department trained to watch for signs of mental stress and assist fellow officers by talking to them about what they’re going through.

Mauel said many people might not realize what officers have to deal with and what they’re forced to witness on the job, even in a small city like Shawano.

“We don’t have the violent crime trauma as much here. We do, but not very often,” he said. “But we have traffic accidents. We have baby deaths. We have baby homicides. We have all kinds of other traumatic injuries, domestic violence situations where there are horrific injuries. Human beings aren’t meant to see that. We’re seeing that all the time.”

Mauel said he has seen a lot over the course of his career that he wishes he hadn’t seen.

“It’s hard to get over that sometimes,” he said. “In the early days you

were told by your supervisor, ‘Just suck it up. That’s what you signed up for.’ Well, it isn’t what we signed up for. It isn’t what our officers signed up for.”

The department does have an employee assistance program where officers can get counseling for free.

However, even though the visits are confidential, there remains a stigma attached to it for some officers.

“The cynical people that we are and the type-A personalities that we are, first of all, we don’t admit that we have issues,” Mauel said.

Then there is fear that if mental health counseling is discovered, it could lead to being put on desk duty or losing some esteem from fellow officers, Mauel said.

Some law enforcement agencies are removing the stigma by making counseling sessions mandatory.

“If we would require everybody, all employees to do a session once a year, that way you could go without that stigma,” Mauel said.

Mauel said other agencies with detectives who deal with crimes against children require the sessions twice a year.

“They’re requiring it every six months just because of the things they deal with with children, the atrocities they see with the sexual abuse of children and child pornography. It’s just a way of keeping people, I guess, pointed north,” he said.

The state Department of Justice is also pushing the idea of departments

having chaplains, Mauel said.

“We don’t have a chaplain, but I think it would be foolish not to look at it,” he said.

Mauel said there were two particularly traumatic incidents over the past several years that required bringing in a team of law enforcement professionals to help officers who responded deal with the emotional aftermath.

Those incidents included a crash that took the lives of several teenagers and the Catherine Barker case in 2018, when officers doing a welfare check discovered a dead infant that was not reported by the child’s mother.

“You’re not meant to see that,” Mauel said. “It’s not normal to see that.”

The department brought in a team from Kewaunee County after both those incidents to do stress de-briefing for the responding officers, Mauel said.

As for the day-to-day stress of the job, Mauel said officers rely on their brother and sister officers.

“That’s part of what the peer team is,” he said. “It helps to talk.”

Mauel said something that’s not helpful is the vitriol and rhetoric sometimes aimed at law enforcement on social media.

Fortunately, those attacks aren’t coming from Shawano residents, Mauel said.

“This is a great community, and they support law enforcement,” he said.

Matsche Farms may get gas service

WPS plans to extend gasline from Birnamwood

BIRNAMWOOD — At the Jan. 27 Birnamwood Village Board meeting, Scott Shepard of Wisconsin Public Service brought information regarding a proposed gas line to be extended to the Matsche Farms Inc. N9035 River Road, Birnamwood.

The project has several steps to pass through before it can be accomplished.

The first step involved getting a resolution passed through the town of Almon to allow WPS to bring service to the area. According to Heather Matsche, Almon town clerk the resolution was passed at the November town board meeting.

The next stage involves applying to the Public Service Commission to approve a franchise for WPS to service the area. When approval comes from the PSC then WPS will proceed with securing funding for the project.

"We are still at the beginning stages of the project and this is a courtesy call to let you know what's being planned," said Shepard.

The village of Birnamwood is already served by WPS, which would make it the logical connection point, said Shepard. He noted there is a high pressure line in the village and a regulating station south of the village so it would make sense to connect into the existing infrastructure.

Village President Mike Sprague asked about the possibility of serving other customers on the proposed route. Shepard said that the possibility exists, and once everything is approved, WPS will most likely reach out to those property owners.

The project is still in the approval and planning stages, but Shepard assured the board that any construction would be in compliance with any highway and environmental regulations.

Board member Jody Dombrowski expressed concern about the cost to the village, and Shepard explained that the village would not need to provide any approval or funding for this project.

There is no timeline set for the project.

CLINTONVILLE — The Clintonville Area Foundation board of directors gathered at the Living Room Coffee Shop to award \$12,500 in grants to nine local charitable organizations Friday morning.

Lynn Aprill, CESA 8, accepted a check for \$1,250 to sponsor two Clintonville area teachers to the CESA 8 Academy Teachers. Participants will work side-by-side with industry peers to better understand their workforce needs and, later, integrate what they've learned into the classroom.

Sheri Wendorf of Clintonville Ambulance Service accepted a check for \$1,000 to support a two-day flu vaccination clinic for up to 150 residents who might not otherwise have access. "Many residents would not get the vaccination if not for the flu clinic," said Wendorf.

Marilyn Berkvan accepted a check for \$1,000 for the Clintonville Historical Society to tell the story of Clintonville. "We plan to purchase two swinging displays for the museum. We have lots of things to display," said Berkvan.

"The Girl Scouts support leadership programs. We serve 94 girls," said Virginia Ritchie, as she accepted a check for \$750. She said they pro-

vide supplies and financial assistance so all girls are able to participate, regardless of financial means.

Amy Goerlinger of Make-A-Wish Foundation of Northeast Wisconsin accepted a check for \$1,000 to help grant a wish to a Clintonville area child diagnosed with a critical illness.

The Mission of Hope House of Wisconsin, headquartered in New London but serving the Clintonville area, received the largest grant of \$3,000. "We are able to provide shel-

ter for families which most places can't," said Barbara Van Handel.

Tim Ewing, of Navarino Nature Center, said they will use the \$2,000 grant to replace material and equipment for the Marvelous Mammal program. "We are also in need of smaller snowshoes. We have first and third grade students from Clintonville coming out next week," said Ewing.

The Phoenix Players were organized two years ago and, according

to Mary Beth Kuester, they recently received their nonprofit status. "We plan to use the \$1,000 grant to sponsor the 'Sister Act.' This allows us to bring affordable, live theater to Clintonville," said Kuester.

A check for \$1,500 went to St. Vincent de Paul. "Anyone can become homeless overnight when you are living paycheck to paycheck. We actually go out and meet with people who are going through hard times. They may have lost their job, or their car blew up and they had to use the rent money for the car," said Becky Fickel, a St. Vincent de Paul volunteer. "We thank the folks in Clintonville who help us to help people get a place to live in Clintonville where it is based on a percentage of their income. We help people to have a good life."

Established in 1995, the Clintonville Area Foundation's mission is to enhance and improve the social cultural, educational, health and well-being of people in the Clintonville area. In 2000, it became a geographic affiliate of the Appleton-based Community Foundation for the Fox Valley Region. Since 2000, the Clintonville Area Foundation has awarded more than \$400,000 in grants from charitable and scholarship funds created within the the Clintonville Area Foundation by individuals and families.

'Fat Sunday'

A Polish tradition continues in Wittenberg

On the Sunday before Ash Wednesday, the families of Holy Family-St. William Catholic Church in Wittenberg held their own style of Mardi Gras feast.

This is not the place to look for shrimp creole or king cakes. The menu is Polish sausage cooked in sauerkraut (kapusta-kielbasa), beef and rice-stuffed cabbage rolls (golabki), potato dumplings, mashed potatoes, green beans, pickles and homemade pie. Meatballs are available as well.

Although the cuisine is different, the meal shares the Mardi Gras spirit of camaraderie and abundant homemade food.

"You could call it our 'Fat Sunday,'" said Linda Steeb, parish member and meal organizer.

The event is one of two major fundraising dinners that the parish holds.

"The whole parish works on it," said Steeb. "The whole family works on it."

The "whole family" includes all members of the Steeb family, she said, plus the larger parish family. Planning, cooking and serving the Polish meal takes nearly everyone in the parish, she said.

Families meet at the church early in the week to prepare the dumplings (975 of them this year) and freeze them; the 500 cabbage

rolls and were made Saturday and baked Sunday morning. Other parts of the meal are also made ahead of the event and warmed in a row of roasters that lined the back of the kitchen in the church's hall.

Individual parish members make and donate pies.

On Sunday, the men of the parish tackle the serving line, wait tables and do the cleanup as part of a tradition that dates back some 40 years when Franciscan brothers from Pulaski came to Wittenberg to serve the meal.

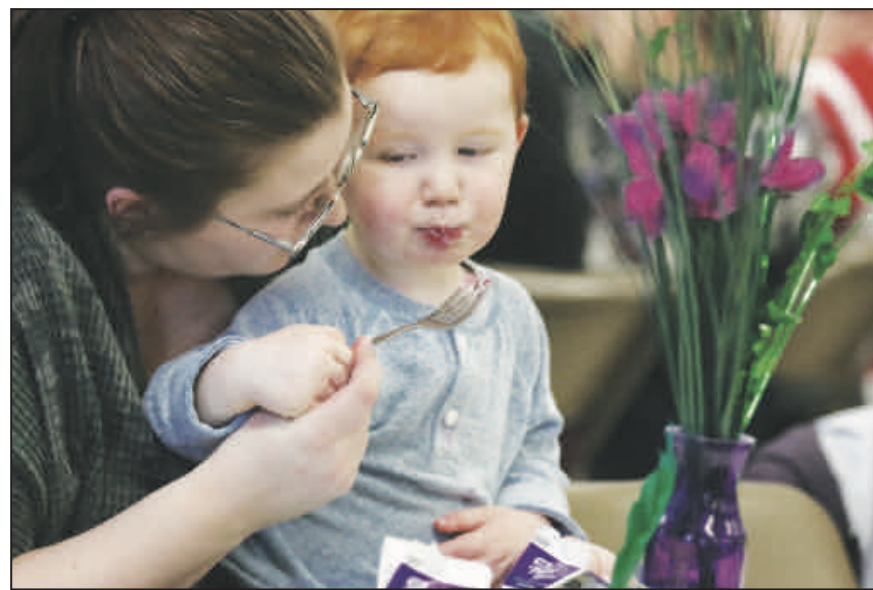
Steebs said the parish usually serves 300 or more, including many takeout orders. She said customers come from churches all over the area, with Polish food lovers coming from as far as Oshkosh or Crivitz. Dinners are also delivered to a senior living center in Wittenberg.

"It's a meal that not every parish makes," she said.

Mary Ann Spranger, and her daughter, Theresa Dombeck, both from Elderon, agreed that the chance to enjoy Polish food is what brings them to the dinner every year. They both said the golabki is their favorite part of the meal.

"We have Polish heritage in our family," Spranger said. "I do make cabbage rolls, but they are always better when someone else makes them."

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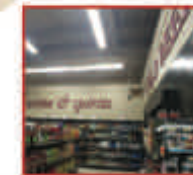

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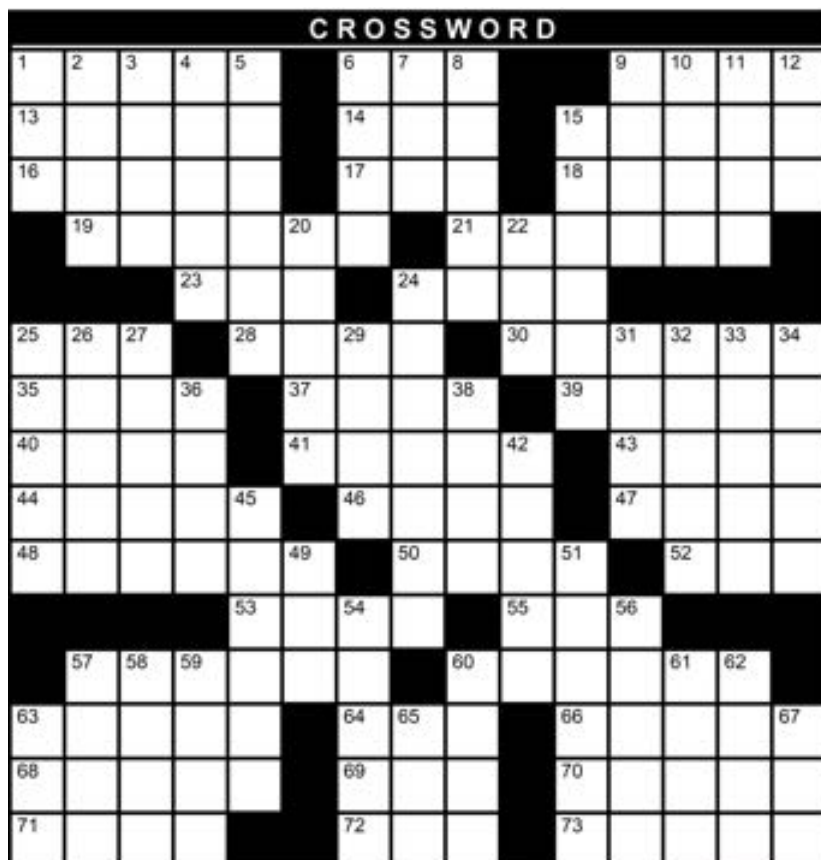

Three Bears lock up spots at state

Toellner, Sokolski
and Banker place in
top 3 at sectional

SHAWANO — Bonduel High School wrestlers Jayson Toellner, Max Sokolski and Isaac Banker all qualified for the state tournament by placing in the top three of their respective weight classes while competing at the Division 3 Bonduel sectional, which was hosted by Shawano Community High School on Saturday.

Toellner, a junior, won the 132-pound weight class, while Sokolski and Banker, also juniors, head back to state after second-place finishes in the 138 and 195 classes, respectively.

Toellner started the day with a first-period pin before securing a 2-1 decision win in the semifinal.

The junior then pinned his first-place match opponent in the second period.

"It's achieving a goal I've had since freshman year, and it just feels amazing to finally go," said Toellner, of qualifying for state.

Sokolski and Banker each wrestled five matches on the day, fending off elimination several times.

Sokolski began his day with a 5-1 decision win but was then pinned in his next match.

Sokolski claimed a 16-1 technical fall win to stay alive, and then he earned a first-period pin in the third-place match to lock up a spot at state. The junior capped his day with a 14-9 decision win to jump up to second place.

Like Toellner, Banker pinned his first opponent in the first period. He then suffered a 7-0 decision loss in the semifinal, forcing him into the elimination bracket.

Banker responded with a third-period pin before a 16-0 technical fall victory in the third-place match. The junior ended the day with a 6-2 decision win in the second-place match.

"Qualifying for state for a third time is huge for me," said Banker, who plans to approach state one match at a time, like he has in the past. "Every

year, there is something different that just feels special about making it to state, and that stands true again."

The qualifying trio will now get ready to try and make a deep run at the 77th annual WIAA Individual Wrestling Championship Tournament, which runs Thursday through Saturday at the Kohl Center in Madison.

Banker has made it to state in all three years of his high school career, while Sokolski joined Banker at state a season ago. While Toellner is making his first appearance, he has a couple of great examples to go to for guidance.

"I'm going to rely on them to keep me calm and cheer me on and use their experience in state to avoid making mistakes from the stress of the tournament," said Toellner.

With his top finish at sectionals, Toellner was awarded a bye into the second round at state. Toellner, sporting a 39-8 record on the season, will face Kenosha Christian Life sophomore Harley Rivera (27-10) or Cochrane-Fountain City junior Zach Foley (35-10) on Friday.

Sokolski won his opening match at state as a sophomore before being eliminated after back-to-back losses.

"I've already experienced all of it,

but last year I came up short of my goals," said Sokolski. "This year, I'm not going to let that happen."

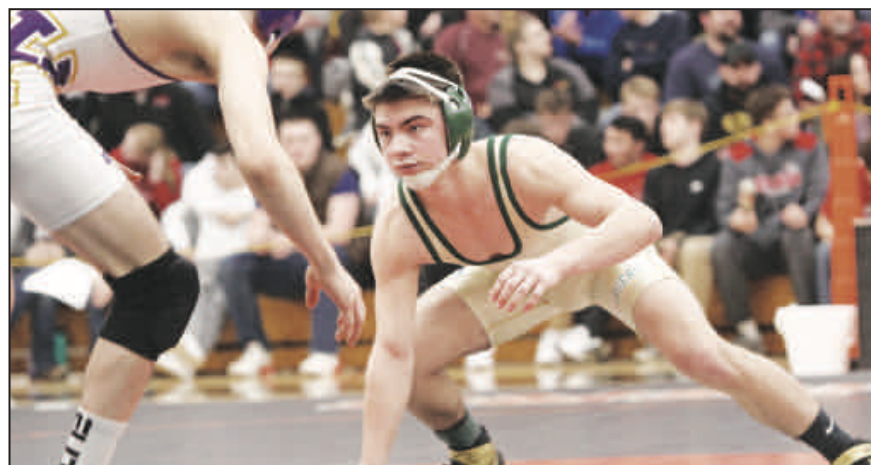

Letter, Kakwitch reach 1,000 points in battle

Bonduel earns road win over Menominee Indian

KESHENA — Bonduel's Cole Letter and Menominee Indian's Norman Kakwitch each topped the 1,000-point mark in their high school careers during an entertaining Central Wisconsin Conference-East Division boys basketball clash on Thursday.

Bonduel led the entire game, fending off several Menominee Indian runs and picking up an 83-67 victory.

Needing seven points, Letter knocked down a corner 3-pointer with 4 minutes, 15 seconds remaining in the first half to hit the 1,000-point mark.

"It's definitely a dream come true," said Letter. "Kids put in a lot of time, I know I put in a lot of time to this. It's something I lay in my bed and think about. It's the reason I get up at 5:45 every morning to go to the gym and shoot. It's indescribable."

Kakwitch needed to score 28 points to reach the milestone, and he achieved the mark with 2:41 remaining in the game after converting a shot in the lane despite being fouled. Teammates then swarmed the senior and led him out of the gym in celebration.

"It's been one of my high school dreams ever since I saw one of my idols, Ron Frechette, hit it my freshman year. It's one of the goals I was working for every summer and all my hard work finally paid off," said Kakwitch.

Both coaches subbed the 1,000-point scorers — who both thanked their teammates, coaches and families for their support along the way — out so a packed gym could applaud each player one last time.

While Letter's first points didn't come until halfway through the first half, he helped set up his teammates as the team jumped out to an early double-digit lead.

Menominee Indian had a difficult time getting into a rhythm on offense, with Kakwitch providing the first seven points to keep the team in it.

Bonduel got its lead up to 15 points a couple times in the first half, including after Letter's triple for his 1,000th point.

"It's fantastic. Seriously, I've been coaching 22 years, and I've never had a kid that's worked as hard as Cole Letter does," said Bonduel coach Duke Copp. "He's a phenomenal leader. He does everything the right way and I knew back when he was in fifth, sixth grade when I took over, I said, 'I can't wait to get that kid in my program.' He came in as a freshman and has been dynamite ever since."

Bonduel junior Carson Robaidek tallied nine first-half points, while Letter and junior Garrett Engel had seven and senior Justin Bahr six. Kakwitch had half of Menominee Indian's 24 points at halftime.

Like many of the team's previous meetings, the game remained competitive despite one team seeming to be in control.

Menominee Indian was able to trim the deficit down to six early in the second half on a 3-pointer from Kakwitch.

After the team's battled back and forth for the next several minutes, Bonduel used a 8-0 run to create some breathing room and go up 19 points. Senior Noah Beilfuss hit 3-pointers on back-to-back possessions during the Bears' run.

A pair of Kakwitch 3-pointers kept Bonduel from running away with the win. His three-point play to reach 1,000 points got Menominee Indian within 13 points, but the hosts couldn't get any closer the rest of

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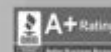

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Murmurs can say a lot about the heart

APPLETON — Young or old, around a third of all people experience heart murmurs at some point in their life. An estimated 30% of children (mainly ages 3 to 7) and 10% of adults are affected by this type of irregular heart-beat. Most cases are harmless. Still, it is good to have your pulse on this condition, said Dr. Babar Parvez, a doctor specializing in clinical cardiac electrophysiology for rhythm disorders of the heart at ThedaCare Cardiovascular Care in Appleton.

“A heart murmur is detected as a doctor listens to a person’s heartbeat using a stethoscope. When we hear more of a swooshing or swishing sound, we suspect a heart murmur,” Parvez explained. “Most of the time, we’re not concerned. In some cases, we need to look at treatment options immediately.”

A heart murmur is simply disordered blood flow throughout the heart chambers. Experts categorize heart murmurs as either harmless, called “innocent” heart murmurs, or abnormal, which should be taken seriously. Innocent heart murmurs are common during pregnancy.

“Most people can live their entire lives well with a heart murmur, while others need to be monitored more closely,” Parvez noted. “Many times, heart murmurs come and go, depending on what a person is doing. For example, if they’re exercising or are anxious, a heart murmur can develop temporarily. When the situation calms, it goes away. Most children outgrow them.”

There is no treatment for an actual heart murmur. If it’s caused by a more serious heart condition, doctors treat that heart condition first with medications, surgery or other therapies. The heart murmur usually then subsides.

Heart murmur symptoms are subtle or mimic other heart conditions. For an innocent murmur, a person will experience no symptoms. When the murmur hinders the heart’s normal function of pumping blood, a person can experience shortness of breath, dizziness, chronic cough, rapid heart-beat, chest pain or bluish skin.

For more serious states of heart murmurs, an underlying structural defect is usually the cause. These defects may have been present since birth, and may include a leaky heart valve, holes in the heart, an inflammation and infection of the heart valves and inner lining of the heart chambers or an abnormal thickening of the heart muscle. Parvez said it is important patients get a proper diagnosis.

“Specific heart problems are connected to specific types of heart murmurs,” he said. “We listen for the distinct sound of the heartbeat, and also the timing of it to determine if the murmur occurs when the heart is pumping or resting. At all times, we consider a patient’s medical history and symptoms.”

A medical evaluation might also include some diagnostic tests that look at the heart structure and detect everything from an enlarged heart and electrical activity to a leaky valve and irregular blood flow.

Federal programs insure farmers' hemp crops

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced the availability of two programs that protect hemp producers' crops from natural disasters.

A pilot hemp insurance program through Multi-Peril Crop Insurance provides coverage against loss of yield because of insurable causes of loss for hemp grown for fiber, grain or CBD oil, and the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program coverage protects against losses associated with lower yields, destroyed crops or prevented planting where no permanent federal crop insurance program is available. Producers may apply now, and the deadline to sign up for both programs

is March 16.

"We are pleased to offer these coverages to hemp producers. Hemp offers new economic opportunities for our farmers, and they are anxious for a way to protect their product in the event of a natural disaster," said Farm Production and Conservation Undersecretary Bill Northey.

The MPCPI pilot insurance is a new crop insurance option for hemp producers for the 2020 crop year. The program is available for eligible producers in certain counties in 21 states, including Wisconsin. Information on eligible counties is accessible through the USDA Risk Management Agency's Actuarial Information Browser.

Among other requirements, to be

eligible for the pilot program, a hemp producer must have at least one year of history producing the crop and have a contract for the sale of the insured hemp. In addition, the minimum acreage requirement is 5 acres for CBD and 20 acres for grain and fiber. Hemp will not qualify for replant payments or prevented plant payments under MPCPI.

NAP provides coverage against loss for hemp grown for fiber, grain, seed or CBD for the 2020 crop year where no permanent federal crop insurance program is available.

NAP basic 50/55 coverage is available at 55% of the average market price for crop losses that exceed 50% of expected production. Buy-up coverage is

available in some cases. The 2018 Farm Bill allows for buy-up levels of NAP coverage from 50 to 65% of expected production in 5% increments, at 100% of the average market price. Premiums apply for buy-up coverage.

For all coverage levels, the NAP service fee is \$325 per crop or \$825 per producer per county, not to exceed \$1,950 for a producer with farming interests in multiple counties.

For information on USDA risk management programs for hemp producers, visit farmers.gov/hemp to read our frequently asked questions. For information on the U.S. Domestic Hemp Production Program, visit USDA's Agricultural Marketing Services' website.

Stomach flu not easy for children — or their parents

As a parent, have you had the experience of going through more than 10 diapers a day, changing countless outfits or sitting up all night with a wastebasket next to your child's head? If so, then you know how miserable you and your child can be and how much you wish them to feel better.

Stomach flu with vomiting and diarrhea is usually a viral infection, and is most common in the winter. Vomiting usually occurs before diarrhea by a day or so, and normally lasts one or two days. When children are vomiting frequently, it's important to rest their stomach.

Parents should stop feeding all dairy products to their children, and they should make sure children are hydrated.

For children younger than 1 year, use an oral rehydration solution such as Pedialyte. You can try Pedialyte with older children, but some children will refuse it. Older children can have

any clear liquid like sports drinks, ginger ale, clear soda or fruit juice. However, sometimes fruit juice can make diarrhea worse.

The secret to getting through the vomiting phase of stomach flu is frequent, small amounts of fluid. Start with sips and increase the amount as tolerated.

When vomiting stops for 12 to 24 hours, try reintroducing food through frequent, small, bland snacks such as applesauce, bananas, soda crackers, dry toast, dry cereal, rice cereal and chicken soup broth. Avoid dairy until children are feeling better for four to five days, and avoid anything spicy until your child has fully recovered. Slowly increase the size of meals while decreasing the frequency.

Hydration is key. The main goal of treating the stomach flu is preventing dehydration. Make sure your child has wet diapers or is urinating at least twice a day. If their diarrhea is so frequent that you cannot tell if they are urinating, check for tears.

If your child has diarrhea but no vomiting, you don't need to change their diet. It is not a cause for alarm unless it lasts for over two weeks.
