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Livestreaming school board concept hits choppy waters

Full board to discuss issue next week

SHAWANO — The concept of livestreaming Shawano School Board and ancillary committee meetings will go to the full board next week for discussion and approval, but it is doing so without the blessing of the school district's policy and curriculum committee.

The four school board members who attended the committee's meeting Monday expressed reservations on whether the idea could be funded, whether it would impact public discussion with the knowledge that the meeting is being video recorded for all to see and whether there is enough interest from district residents to warrant the expense.

Shelby Kaveinga, a Shawano resident who has been pressing the district for months to provide the service, told the committee that 13 school districts livestream their board meetings, and most of them utilize YouTube to make that happen, including Southern Door and Stevens Point school districts. Two more school districts do not livestream but do record them and put them on YouTube, with a link from those district's websites.

"This isn't unique to Wisconsin," Kaveinga said. "It's happening everywhere, giving people more access to information that's available."

Kaveinga said that YouTube has the capability to provide closed captions for the videos, and storage is free. The district would also have its own page for people to access the meetings after the fact, she said.

"It's easily accessible by the community, which is why most of them of use it," Kaveinga said of YouTube. "As I spoke with people, they said it was very low-cost."

She added that many of them use an iPad or a cellphone to record the meetings, although a laptop computer could also be used for live meetings, and a camera could be used if the district decided to not record

the meetings live but still record and place them online to be viewed.

"If you go and look at any of the schools that are using it, it's a very basic setup," Kaveinga said. "The camera is right here, and you can see the board."

A few of the districts invested in regular or Bluetooth microphones to improve the sound quality of not only the board members' discussion but to allow community input to be more easily heard and understood, according to Kaveinga. That helps the closed captioning option and would satisfy requirements for the Americans With Disabilities Act.

Kaveinga also recommended that committee meetings be livestreamed, as there is much more discussion and debate on the issues than there is when the full board meets.

Kaveinga presented the committee with a petition with about 100 signatures from people who are in favor of the district providing more access to meetings.

Board member Mart Grams dismissed the petition, indicating it does not show true interest.

"I understand you have 100 signatures, not to disrespect your petition, but a lot of people sign regardless of what the topic is," Grams said. "Do you have any evidence that these things are being used by more than five or six people in a school district? Even if it's free, it's going to cause us some disruption. It's probably going to limit speech in many cases."

Kaveinga noted that many of the 100 are teachers in the district, and their interest is because they are unable to make the evening board meetings or some of the committee meetings. The policy and curriculum meeting started at noon Monday, when those teachers are at work and unable to be away from those classrooms.

"The reason I became aware of it is because friends and family members who discuss issues that are

taking place on their school boards," Kaveinga said.

Board member Chris Gull expressed concern about sensitive information being brought up inadvertently during board meetings and then having that information becoming immediately available to all viewing the meeting.

Lisa Hoffman, another resident interested in school board meetings being livestreamed, was confused by Gull's comments, as it is usually required that sensitive and confidential information be taken into closed sessions most of the time and not aired to the public.

"I'm sitting here, and if this was happening at a committee meeting, I would be listening to it, so what's the difference," said Hoffman, who is an alderwoman on the Shawano Common Council. "Wouldn't those things go into closed session? You should be having open, honest dialogue regardless."

Board member Alysia Pillsbury was not concerned about what she says in an open meeting but was concerned members of the public might not speak if they knew their words were going to be out there on the internet. Pillsbury noted she hasn't decided one way or the other on the issue.

"They might withhold comments," Pillsbury said. "We're not cutting back on our discussion, but we have concerns."

When Kaveinga pointed out that she had to get a babysitter to attend Monday's meeting, board member Diane Hoffman said she's had to do the same for the meetings she has attended since she was elected to the board.

"I have six kids, and I have made all of my meetings," she said.

Ex-firefighter, accomplice charged with arson

Pair allegedly broke into home to steal gold nuggets

SHAWANO — A former Mattoon firefighter, accused with an accomplice of burglarizing and setting fire to a vacant home, later returned to the scene in a stolen fire truck, according to a criminal complaint filed Friday.

Cory A. Welch, 34, of Mattoon, and Bryan M. Wendler, 37, of Bowler, are both facing charges of burglary, arson and reckless endangerment.

Welch is also charged with operating a motor vehicle without the owner's consent and impersonating a peace officer.

According to the criminal complaints, Welch and Wendler broke into a house in the town of Hutchins owned by Welch's family members Feb. 29.

They were allegedly searching for \$20,000 worth of gold nuggets that a relative had gotten from a sale of farm equipment and Mack truck hood ornaments they hoped to sell, but they were unable to find either.

Wendler later told authorities they broke into the home because they were drunk and bored.

While there, Welch allegedly poured a bottle filled with diesel fuel onto the floor and set fire to it.

Welch later went to a gas station where he called 911 and reported the fire.

Afterward, according to the complaint, he went to the Mattoon Fire Department, put on firefighting gear and got into the driver's seat of an equipment van.

Welch had quit the department a

month earlier.

Two other firefighters also got into the van to respond to the fire.

The complaint states Welch drove to the fire scene at high speed, nearly losing control on a curve in the road.

Other firefighters at the scene reported he appeared to be intoxicated and his firefighting gear didn't fit, according to the complaint.

Welch and Wendler could each face a maximum 40 years in prison and \$100,000 fine on the arson count if convicted; 12½ years and a \$25,000 fine for burglary; and 10 years and a \$25,000 fine for second-degree reckless endangerment.

Welch faces two counts of reckless endangerment for putting the firefighters in the stolen equipment van at risk and risking the lives of other firefighters by setting the fire.

He could also face a maximum six years in prison and \$10,000 fine on each count of operating a operating

a motor vehicle without the owner's consent and impersonating a peace officer.

Welch on Friday was ordered held on a \$25,000 cash bond, set by Judge James Habeck. No future court date was listed in court records.

Wendler also faces six counts of felony bail jumping, each of which carries a maximum six years in prison and \$10,000 fine.

He is also scheduled for a plea hearing March 31 in a pending case in which he is charged with seventh-offense operating while intoxicated. He was out on a \$4,500 cash bond at the time of the burglary and arson incident, according to court records.

Wendler on Friday was ordered held on a \$35,000 cash bond set by Habeck and was scheduled for an adjourned initial appearance March 31, the same day as his plea hearing in the OWI case.

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New SCEPI chief sees great things for county

Thillman named chief economic development officer

SHAWANO — A strong strategic plan for economic development is the first priority of the new director of Shawano County Economic Progress, Inc., who started his new job on Monday.

Peter Thillman, most recently the vice president of economic development for the Fox Cities Regional Partnership, will replace SCEPI's current chief economic development officer Dennis Heling, who has retired.

Thillman has worked in various economic development capacities since the early 1990s, giving him experience on the municipal, state and regional levels, as well as experience in higher education.

"I think it's a good fit for what's going on right now in Shawano County to try and grow the economy and get things moving again," Thillman said.

Thillman said he'd like to start by getting together with the SCEPI board of directors and getting everyone on the same page in terms of what the economic strategy should be, what direction it should take and what expectations need to be met.

"I can see that there's a strong want for more development and probably more tax base, and then how we go about that and what we're looking for, that will be important to look at," Thillman said. "And, of course, keeping the businesses that we have is also critical, to make sure they're successful and can grow and expand, also."

Thillman said there are challenges in the economy, but the county has some advantages in its favor.

"The one bright thing about Shawano County is I believe the people are here to expand the economy," he said.

Currently, 44 percent of those people leave the county every day to go to work elsewhere.

"That means there's an available workforce here to make business recruitment a little bit easier," Thillman said. "That's the biggest hindrance right now to recruiting businesses. Do you have a workforce?

And it's clear we have a workforce. We just have to make sure that we have the right mix of businesses that can keep people in Shawano County."

Thillman said he was attracted to the job because

he felt it was a good opportunity.

"You're in three market areas you can work with," he said. "You can work with the Fox Cities, you can work with Green Bay and you can work with Wausau. So you're in this kind of prime location and on the Highway 29 corridor. So there's ample opportunity for growth and I think it's poised to take that next step."

Thillman had previously been vice president of workforce and economic development with Lakeshore Technical College in Cleveland, Wisconsin; director of economic development for the city of Green Bay from 2000 to 2005; development zone specialist for the Wisconsin Department of Commerce from 1995 to 2000; and coordinator for the Harland Revitalization Association in Harland, Kentucky from 1992 to 1995.

His starting salary as SCEPI chief will be \$95,000.

The SCEPI board went through two rounds of interviews, including a candidate who turned down the job after it was offered in December just 10 days before he was expected to start.

There were six candidates interviewed during the first round and three interviewed during the second round.

Thillman applied during the second round.

"The hiring committee was unanimous to go with Mr. Thillman," said Eddie Sheppard, Shawano city administrator and member of the SCEPI board of directors.

"He's got extensive economic development experience in the public sector," Sheppard said. "We were very impressed with what we think he's going to bring."

Educational Information

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

- Contaminants that may be present in source water include:
- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses.

Wittenberg Waterworks is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Nueske receives prestigious award for manufacturing

With 215 employees, company named top large manufacturer

WITTENBERG — “It was amazing to win the award,” said Tanya Nueske, CEO of Nueske’s Applewood Smoked Meats, about her company receiving the 2019 Manufacturer of the Year Award. “It’s an honor just to be nominated.”

The award was presented to Nueske’s on Feb. 20 at a ceremony at the Pfister Hotel in downtown Milwaukee. They received the Grand Award in the large category, which includes businesses with more than 200 employees.

“It’s a huge process to be nominated,” said Nueske, who filled out the 35-page application just to be considered for the award.

The Wisconsin Manufacturers and Commerce organization recognizes manufacturers for outstanding achievements in many areas through this annual awards program, which has a 32-year history in Wisconsin.

For the purpose of the award, Wisconsin companies are placed in four size categories where the judges, who are past winners, take into consideration how effective the companies are in research and development, sustainability and commitment to quality. The panel is also interested in a commitment to employee training and development, as well as a commitment to the community in which they are located.

“For us to win an award of this magnitude says a lot about our employees, and the fact that we’re based in a rural community makes this even more special,” said Nueske.

this until it happens,” she said. “It’s the stuff that you do day after day that you don’t think about.”

“After accepting the award, some-

one who knew Dad said, ‘It was your dad talking.’ It’s really neat that someone who knew my dad could share that with me. Makes me feel like I’m

doing something right,” said Nueske.

With 29 years in the business, Nueske realizes how quickly the time goes and how success is dependent upon good employees. She noted that when they made another expansion in 2017 that it was a big transition for the company. The additional building needed three separate entrances to accommodate the increase in personnel, as well as taking safeguard measures to prevent cross contamination and other factors.

Limiting access to different areas can lead to a disconnect among employees, Nueske said. To help keep employees connected, they have large television screens in the break rooms to post information on company gatherings and opportunities.

Students enjoy fun of Read Across America

Learning need
not be repetitive,

GRESHAM — They read books with friends. They read books to the end. They read books in the hall. They read them, read them all.

Elementary students at Gresham Community School spent much of last week dressing up like characters from Dr. Seuss books, working on a variety of class projects and, of course, reading through books as part of the Read Across America program, which usually takes place the first week of March.

"Today, we did a Read Across America activity where the students all sat in the hallway, and kids read books," said Kristen Phillippi, a third grade teacher at the school, on Friday. "Fifth graders read to kindergartners in their classrooms, and then we had a dance party and did some bookmarks."

The week culminated with cake in the cafeteria Friday afternoon and superintendent Newell Haffner reading the Seuss book "Fox in Socks." He wasn't alone, though. Many of the students knew the book line for line and read with him.

Studies show that students need to be reading on grade level by the third grade in order to keep up in all subjects in school in the future, according to the Annie E. Casey Foundation. Phillippi noted that Gresham recently got a new reading curriculum through Core Knowledge Language Arts, which provides a lot of reading material based on student interest.

"We're reading in a lot of content areas. We're reading in science and social studies reading this year," Phillippi said. "We've spent some time looking at main ideas."

Phillippi said previous reading curriculum made it seem like students were reading the same stories repetitively and therefore losing interest. Because the Core Knowledge program is content-based, students can discover the enjoyment of read-

ing by finding out more about the things that interest them.

"They seem to enjoy it more because they're reading about the things they enjoy," Phillippi said.

on the lessons."

Phillippi has her students spend about two hours daily in reading activities of some kind. She noted that the fourth and fifth grades are engaged in daily reading activities for 90 minutes.

Even with a more improved reading curriculum, having Read Across America and its focus on beloved children's author Dr. Seuss really helps to spark more interest in reading for younger children, according to Phillippi.

"I think Dr. Seuss takes all of his stories and he makes up all of the characters and the creatures and everything else, and he makes them fun," Phillippi said. "A lot of times these days, we're missing the fun aspect when we're reading. Because when we read, we're asking this question and asking that question, and we just forget to let the kids read and enjoy it. There's always some standard attached. But with Dr. Seuss, you can still have that, but the stories are purely fun."

Bonduel girls topped by Crandon

Rebounding hurts Bears in sectional semifinal loss

CRIVITZ — For a third consecutive season, the Bonduel High School girls basketball team was eliminated from the postseason by Crandon. Bonduel dropped a 43-29 contest to Crandon in a Division 4 sectional semifinal on Thursday.

Rebounding proved to be a big factor in the game, as Crandon was able to crash the offensive boards and get several shots up per possession while limiting Bonduel to one shot on the other end of the court.

“I think we got beat pretty bad on the boards,” said Bonduel coach Jerry Reinke. “I think Crandon also played unbelievable defense. They took away our strengths and it was tough.”

Bonduel looked to be in control in the first half after working out to a five-point lead.

Junior Kara Troxel hit a 3-pointer three minutes into the game to jump-start the Bears’ offense before sophomore Allaina Robaidek stole a pass and converted a layup to give Bonduel the lead.

Sophomore Brenna Hertzfeldt hit a field goal before freshman Josie Hoffman rattled in a 3-pointer. A free throw from junior Breanna Schnell and bucket from Robaidek gave Bonduel a 13-8 lead with just under six minutes to go in the first half.

Tabitha Renkas sparked a 16-4 Crandon run to help the Cardinals seize momentum going into halftime. Renkas hit two triples and scored 14 of the points on the run.

Although Bonduel’s 2-3 zone was making Crandon work on offense, the Bears were unable to finish the possession by pulling down rebounds. It not only gave the Cardinals multiple chances on the offensive end, but took Bonduel out of its offensive rhythm.

“Our team isn’t the tallest, but their team isn’t that much taller than us. We just need to get in the weight room

so we can box out harder and get the boards that we need to,” said Troxel.

Hawks' Weisnicht, Sherman combine for 39 points

NEW LONDON — The Shawano Community High School boys basketball team couldn't get things going offensively in a 51-36 loss to New London in a Division 2 regional semifinal playoff matchup on Friday.

The teams split their two Bay Conference regular-season matchups, with New London winning a 72-64 battle in Shawano on Jan. 10 before the Hawks earned a 76-62 road win over the Bulldogs on Feb. 18.

Friday's playoff battle was a much different story, with both defenses stepping to the forefront.

New London focused on slowing down Shawano's dynamic senior duo of Carter Weisnicht and Nick Sherman.

"It seemed like they had a lot more people coming at me tonight than they did before," said Weisnicht, referencing how New London double- and triple-teamed him. "There's was people coming from everywhere."

"They were really trying to chase us, trying to keep me and Carter from getting any open opportunities and keep us away from each other so we couldn't make plays," said Sherman.

Shawano's defense didn't surrender a point until nearly 5½ minutes into the game, but the Hawks were only able to score four points over that span — Weisnicht hit two free throws and a field goal.

After Shawano held the hosts scoreless for nearly the next four minutes, New London took control by going on an 11-2 run over the next five minutes.

Sherman hit a 3-pointer with 50 seconds left in the half for the team's first points not scored by Weisnicht. New London answered with a basket before Shawano junior Joseph Mente converted a shot near the basket. The hosts hit a triple at the buzzer to go up 18-13.

New London looked to pull away early in the second half, but Weisnicht willed the Hawks back into

the contest.

Weisnicht hit a shot three minutes into the half for Shawano's first points before knocking down two free throws with 13:42 to play.

After a three-point play by New London, Weisnicht knocked down 3-pointers on back-to-back possessions to bring the team within two, 25-23.

After a time out, Sherman converted a shot off a New London turnover to tie the game.

For the next couple minutes, the teams traded buckets. New London then used a quick 4-0 spurt to go up six and force a Shawano timeout.

Sherman hit a shot to make it a four-point game with about 5:30 to play, but the Bulldogs responded by scoring the next nine points to make it 44-31. New London went on a 16-5 run to end the game.

Over the deciding run, several little things went against the Hawks.

Shawano missed four free throws

and a couple shots near the rim while also surrendering a couple offensive rebounds, which allowed New London to keep draining the clock and extending its lead.

"Our shooting wasn't what we were accustomed to the last month or so but in playoff time, you got to hit your free throws and you got to take care of the basketball," said Shawano coach David Ambrosius, who said he's never had as much fun with a team than he did with this year's squad. "For stretches, we were really good at that, and for other stretches, we kind of came up a little bit short."

Despite the difficult end to the season, Shawano enjoyed a resurgence after a four-win season in 2018-19. The Hawks finished this season with a 12-11 record.

"Last year was a tough one, but this year we knew what we had to do — we worked hard in the summer and worked hard all season,"

said Weisnicht, who led the team with 18 points. "A tough loss tonight, but we set the bar high for the young kids. They know what they have to do now to have a winning season and hopefully go farther in the playoffs next year."

"It's the most fun I've ever had playing basketball. All we ever did was laugh, have fun and compete," said Sherman, who finished with 11 points.

Yelich stakes future to Brewers with 9-year deal

Outfielder earns organization's richest deal ever

PHOENIX — Christian Yelich took to Milwaukee so much he staked his long-term future to the Brewers.

"I've said many times that I've only been here for two years, but it feels like it's been a lot longer," the two-time NL batting champion said Wednesday after finalizing a \$215 million, nine-year contract. "Ever since I came, it's felt like just a natural fit, a place that is great for myself and my family, and formed a connection with the community, my teammates, everyone from ownership and front office on down."

His new deal added \$187.25 million over seven seasons to the remaining \$27.75 million Yelich was guaranteed as part of the \$49.57 million, seven-year contract he signed in March 2015 with Miami.

Yelich was dealt to the Brewers in January 2018, and he won the NL batting title and MVP award as the Brewers reached Game 7 of the NL Championship Series. He added another batting championship and finished second in the MVP vote

last year, when his season was cut short by a broken kneecap on Sept. 10. The Brewers reached the playoffs in consecutive seasons for the first time since 1981-82 but lost the NL wild-card game after wasting an eighth-inning lead against Washington.

"Knowing that Christian is going to be here now for the better part of the next decade certainly allows us to map out how we're going to remain competitive for that time period," Brewers General Manager David Stearns said, "and that was a priority of Christian's, that we have the ability to remain competitive during his term as a Brewer."

If Yelich keeps playing at this level and had he waited until becoming a free agent after the 2022 season, he likely would have commanded far more.

"What everybody sees on the field is an MVP. But we have that same MVP when it comes to the leadership Christian brings — the kind of teammate he is and the selfless things he does in the community, many of which aren't visible because he really doesn't look for attention," Brewers owner Mark At-

tanasio said.

The 28-year-old outfielder had been guaranteed \$12.5 million this year, \$14 million in 2021 and a \$1.25 million buyout of a \$16 million team option for 2022.

Yelich's new agreement includes the same amounts for 2020 and 2021, then adds \$26 million annually from 2022-28, of which \$4 million a year is deferred. The deal contains a \$20 million team option for 2029 with a \$6.5 million buyout, which if

exercised would make the contract worth \$228.5 million over 10 years.

Yelich's contract includes the largest guarantee given by the Brewers, topping the \$145.5 million for Ryan Braun from 2011-20.

Attanasio said talks with Yelich began over lunch last Halloween. Yelich did not discuss an opt-out provision and was not thinking about the potential of free agency.

"I don't have any regrets about it. It's just one of those things in the path my career took," Yelich said.

Yelich acknowledged Braun, who stood nearby, for talking with him through the process of committing to the Brewers. His eyes welled up with tears when he spoke about the people who helped him.

"There's a lot of people that go into today," Yelich said. "I have no doubt that I wouldn't be here without their contributions and their efforts. That's what makes today special. There's been a lot of people that have made my life a priority over theirs."

Yelich leads the major leagues over the past two seasons with a .327 batting average and is second in on-base percentage (.415), slugging percentage (.631) and OPS (1.046).

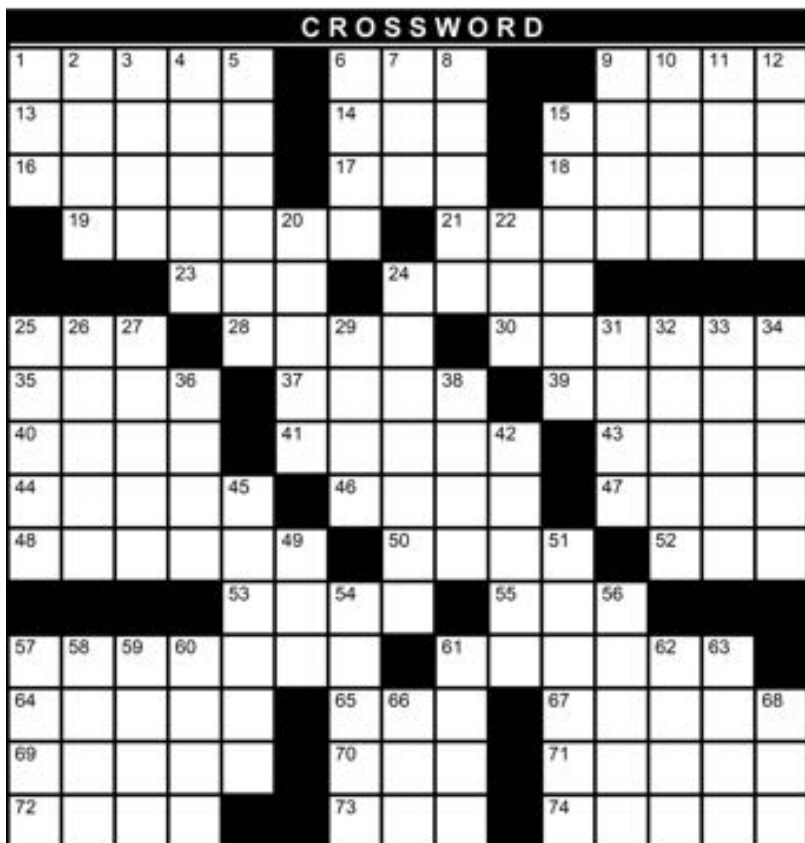

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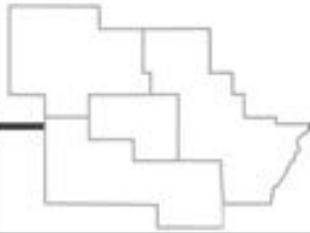

Medical research helps babies with colic

Colic is much more than a parenting annoyance. It is a condition in which an otherwise healthy well-fed baby cries frequently for extended periods. Colic affects up to 25% of babies. It usually appears within the first two weeks of life, most often disappears at 3 or 4 months, and rarely lasts until the baby's first birthday. Interestingly, colic occurs at the same frequency in bottle-fed and breastfed babies.

If your baby cries about the same time each day and nothing you do seems to offer comfort, your baby may have colic. Colic can be defined as crying more than three hours a day, three days a week, for more than three weeks in an otherwise healthy baby. It is recommended that you consult your baby's doctor if you're concerned about your baby's crying, especially if you notice changes in your baby's eating, sleeping or behavior.

Although researchers have investigated numerous possibilities, the cause of colic is unknown. It is still unclear why some babies have colic and others do not. Fortunately, colic does not seem to have any lasting medical consequences. Colicky babies grow and develop normally.

There are few treatment options for colic. Medications, such as simethicone, are no better than placebo, and other medications can have serious side effects. Alternative therapies, such as various herbs, have also failed to show benefits, and some are even dangerous.

A recent research study published by the American Academy of Pediatrics provides hope for the babies and families. This study tested the effect of lactobacillus reuteri (drops) on colic. Colicky infants were randomly assigned to receive either lactobacillus or placebo daily for 21 days.

Forty-six infants completed the trial. Daily crying times were about three times less in the lactobacillus than the placebo group at day 21. There were no differences in weight gain, stooling frequency, or incidence of constipation or regurgitation between groups, and no adverse events related to the supplementation were observed. Lactobacillus in infants improved symptoms of infantile colic and was well tolerated and safe.

Additionally, there is some good research that suggests that using soothing measures is effective in calming babies during crying bouts. These techniques form the core of the five S's approach:

- Swaddling. Avoid overheating, covering the head, using bulky or loose blanket).
- Side or stomach holding. Holding a baby on the back is the only safe position for sleep, but it is the worst position for calming a fussy baby.
- Shhh sound, making a strong "shh" sound near the baby's ear or using a CD of womb sound/white noise.
- Swinging the baby with tiny jiggly movements, no more than 1 inch back and forth, always supporting the head and neck.
- Sucking, letting the baby suckle on the breast, your clean finger or a pacifier.

Remember, colic is temporary.
