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More national restrictions outlined in COVID response

'Stay home' clear message from officials

WASHINGTON — The White House on Monday urged all older Americans to stay home and people of all ages to avoid crowds and eating out at restaurants.

President Donald Trump and the coronavirus task force at its daily briefing released the guidelines as the U.S. government moved to try to blunt the impact of the virus, racing to bolster testing and aid even as financial markets fell and Americans scrambled to reorder their lives.

Among the new recommendations: Over the next 15 days, Americans should not gather in groups of more than 10 people, schooling should be at home and discretionary travel and social visits should be avoided. If anyone in a household tests positive for the virus, everyone who lives there should stay home.

The president, in an appearance in the White House briefing room, when asked when the pandemic would subside, said that "if we do a really good job" the crisis could pass by July or August, a far less optimistic take than in his earlier predictions that it could be over within weeks.

The U.S. surgeon general said Monday that the United States is about where Italy was two weeks ago in the coronavirus struggle, a sign that infections are expected to rise.

"We are at a critical inflection point in this country, people," Surgeon General Dr. Jerome Adams told Fox News. "When you look at the projections, there's every chance that we could be Italy." Yet he said the U.S. has opportunities to mitigate the pandemic.

The administration did not immediately define what an "older American" was in terms of the rec-

ommendation to stay home.

Trump has implored Americans not to hoard groceries and supplies, saying there is no need to do so, as the White House works to get diagnostic testing much more widely available after lagging on that front for weeks. It was not considering enacting or recommending a nationwide curfew, nor enacting limits on domestic travel, according to a senior administration official who spoke on condition of anonymity to address spiraling rumors.

On Monday, national security officials said there had been a cyberattack involving the computer networks of Health and Human Services, but the networks were operating normally. They didn't detail the nature or scope of the problem or identify the foreign entity.

The U.S. effort has been hobbled by a series of missteps, including flaws with the testing kits first distributed by the federal government and bureaucratic hurdles that held up testing by private laboratories.

Brett Giroir, a senior health administration official, said community testing sites manned by the Federal Emergency Management Agency and members of the U.S. public health service would be capable of testing 2,000 to 4,000 people each day, not every week. He said the federal government would begin deploying these sites on Monday.

Also expected is updated federal guidance on restaurants, bars and other establishments. California and Illinois are among jurisdictions that have ordered restaurants and bars to close to help slow the spread of the virus.

Nearby, the Supreme Court said it is postponing arguments for late March and early April because of the coronavirus, including a round

over subpoenas for Trump's financial records.

Other court business will go on as planned, like the justices' private conference Friday and the release of orders in a week's time. Some justices may participate by telephone, the court said in a statement. Six of the nine justices are 65 and older. That puts them at higher risk of getting very sick from the illness if they are exposed, according to demographic guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The last time oral arguments were postponed was in 1918, due to the Spanish flu epidemic. In 2001, they were relocated, but not postponed, after an anthrax scare.

Larry Kudlow, director of the National Economic Council, said the White House is working toward \$800 billion in fiscal relief, with about half of that having been approved through executive actions and legislation and much of the remainder being sought through a payroll tax cut that has been met coolly by both parties in Congress.

The worldwide outbreak has sickened about 175,000 people and left more than 6,700 dead.

Kevin Hassett, a former White House economic adviser said the global economy is sliding into a recession and forecast a "very terrible" second quarter for the U.S., with negative economic growth. Hassett said the April jobs report could show as many as 1 million jobs lost due to the coronavirus.

"I think that the odds of a global recession are close to 100% right now," Hassett told CNN on Monday.

Also, the White House said Monday it would cancel the holiday Easter Egg Roll held annually on the South Lawn.

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Veterans service office raising funds for flag holders

The staff at the Shawano County Veteran Service Office is working with churches, cemeteries and veterans organizations to place metal medallion flag holders on all Shawano County veteran graves.

Flag holders are used to display flags on veterans' graves for Memorial Day each spring.

The project began in 2012 when the Veteran Service Officer Nick Benzinger read an article about a similar project in another county. Benzinger approached the Shawano County Board about funding a project in Shawano County. In 2013 the County Board approved \$2,000 a year for five years for the purchase of flag holders.

Individual donors, service organizations and churches have also contributed financially and have helped

with the installation of the markers. Now that the county funding has ended, the project is funded entirely by donations.

Individual markers cost about \$8 each. The Veterans Service Office estimates that \$640 needs to be raised each year to honor deceased veterans on an ongoing basis.

Anyone wishing to make a donation or help with this project, or those who know of graves that need markers can call Benzinger at the 715-526-9183.

The veteran service office has purchased and distributed more than 3,000 markers to over 60 cemeteries throughout the county. Benzinger hopes to have all existing graves marked by 2021 and then plans to provide the holders for placement on new graves as needed.

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Still delivering after 40 years

Shawano nurse eagerly welcomes new lives into the community

SHAWANO — Countless children have been born in Shawano's hospital in the last four decades, and Debbie Fabry has had a hand in delivering many of them.

Fabry, a registered nurse at Family Birth Care at ThedaCare Medical Center-Shawano, has been a common face during deliveries, helping parents to bring their children into the world. Days, nights, weekends and holidays, Fabry has worked at the hospital for the last 40 years to bring joy to families.

Fabry's interest in nursing grew out of a visit she made to the hospital with an aunt, when Fabry was 10 years old. At the time, her younger cousins were not old enough to be allowed into the hospital, but Fabry was at the right age.

"I was very nervous walking through the halls and trying to act so grown-up," Fabry said. "I kept looking in the rooms as we went by, thinking 'I wonder why all of these people were here. I wonder what they need or what's happening with them.'"

Fabry recalled telling her mother as a child that she wanted to be either a nurse or an airline stewardess. Following that hospital visit, the airline industry lost a potential employee.

"I just thought that I wanted to help these people who are sick or needy," she said.

In Fabry's senior year of high school, she wanted to learn how to become a licensed practicing nurse, and her opportunity came before she even graduated from high school. She had planned to graduate a semester early to start her nursing education, but officials from Northeast Wisconsin Technical College called and asked her if she'd like to start right away, even before getting her diploma.

"I had to get special permission from my high school to graduate two to three weeks earlier than my semester ended in January," Fabry said. "I moved to Green Bay, but I still had to go back and take my finals so I could get my diploma."

Fabry became a licensed practicing nurse in 1980 at what was then Shawano Community Hospital, and then she pursued further education in 1982 to become a registered nurse. She obtained her bachelor's degree in 1984.

Fabry's classes gave her experience in all hospital departments, but when she got to her last class in maternity, she knew that was where she wanted to be.

"I was very intrigued with maternity nursing," Fabry said. "I just really liked taking care of the moms and the babies, just helping them through the process. I just knew that I liked that and hoped I could find a job doing that."

Living in Suring, Fabry had the choice of working in Oconto Falls or Shawano, but Fabry was interested in working in Shawano because of the maternity ward. Hospital officials at the time told her she would need to start out as a general nurse — the same as other new nurses who came before her. But a week after starting, the officials came back and said there was a nursing position open in the maternity ward.

In larger hospitals, Fabry would have had to choose whether to work in labor and delivery or working with mothers after the birth. With Shawano's hospital being as small as it is, Fabry is able to work with parents

through every aspect, from the moment they arrive at the hospital to the moment they leave with their new child.

"This just feels like my area to be, helping the moms through the birth process, and I find it really rewarding to be part of this big, major event in their family — the birth of a child," Fabry said. "We all celebrate in the end. It can be very intense when they're going through labor, but then the other side is that it's very rewarding helping them get to that point."

While most of the births were happy ones, there were occasions where children were born stillborn or other complications developed. Fabry decided to add to her repertoire by learning to be a perinatal counselor.

"Helping them to honor their baby, even though it's not the outcome they hoped for, it's still special to them," Fabry said. "Even if it's a miscarriage or a stillborn, it's important to help them work through that."

In the last 40 years, the process of delivering babies has changed a little. Fabry remembered that there were no electric monitors to detect fetal

heartbeats and no epidurals when she started, and more male doctors were involved with delivering babies. Now, most of the doctors for maternity are female.

Deliveries took place in a delivery room decades ago, and only the father of the child was allowed to be present for the delivery before mothers were sent to their rooms and babies were put in their own special area to be cared for. Now, according to Fabry, babies get to stay in the hospital room with their mothers from the beginning if they are in good health, and rooms are now big enough for families to share in the delivery.

Fabry has been asked if she'd like to do more management work in recent years, but she insists she'd rather be with the patients.

"I just want to be at the bedside, taking care of the patient," Fabry said. "I think that's what's kept me going at times when it's seemed hard, and I just spend time with the patients. At the end of the shift, you can tell you made a difference in their lives that day."

Helen A. Cieslewicz, 93, of Wittenberg, passed away peacefully surrounded by members of her family at North Crest Assisted Living Center under the care of Ascension Hospice, on Tuesday, March 10, 2020. Helen was the daughter of the late Leon Bruski and Frances Frydach Bruski. She was born July 13, 1926, in the town of Franzen. She attended Birch Grove School in Marathon County, St. Adalbert School in Rosholt and high school in Bevent and Rosholt.

After graduation, Helen moved to Chicago to work as part of the war effort at Felt and Tarrant Comptometer on North Paulina Street. She wrote every day to Vince, who was fighting with the South West Pacific Theatre of World War II. She sealed each letter with a kiss. 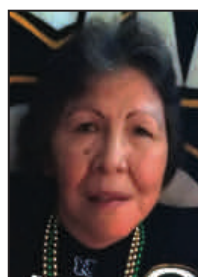

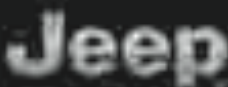

Wisconsin Gov. Tony Evers Monday announced a ban on gatherings in the state of any more than 50 people.

Evers announced the ban on Twitter:

“Folks, it’s on all of us to practice social distancing and take every step possible to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. That is why I have directed @DHSWI Secretary-designee Andrea Palm to order a ban on mass gatherings of 50 or more people.

Critical infrastructure and services such as grocery stores, food pantries, childcare centers, pharmacies, and hospitals will be exempt from this order.

This isn’t a decision I made lightly and we understand this will have an impact on Wisconsin workers, families, businesses and communities, but keeping folks safe and healthy has to be our highest priority.”

Area churches respond to COVID-19 concerns

Area churches are dealing with the impact of COVID-19 health concerns.

Some churches are cancelling Sunday services or letting church-goers know they can participate online if they’re not comfortable attending.

The Catholic Diocese of Green Bay’s Bishop Ricken has lifted the obligation to attend Sunday Mass for the next three Sundays. However, Mass will still be offered.

Hope Community Church announced on its website that the church would not be gathering Sunday, but a full worship service will be offered online.

ThedaCare locations restrict visitors

Hospital, emergency department visits affected by new rules

NEENAH — Due to the rising levels nationwide of coronavirus COVID-19, ThedaCare has implemented heightened visitor restrictions including screening at entrances.

At all ThedaCare facilities, including ThedaCare Medical Center-Shawano, all visitors, contractors and vendors will be screened at entrances. Visitors with any of the following symptoms will not be able to visit and will be prohibited from entering: fever of at least 100.4, cough, sore throat, muscle or body aches, headaches, fatigue

(tiredness) or shortness of breath within the past 48 hours.

Visitors will not be able to visit if they have been exposed to anyone with any of these symptoms within the past 48 hours, or if they had contact with someone known to have coronavirus or actively being tested for coronavirus within the last 14 days.

At ThedaCare hospitals, clinics and surgery centers, no visitors will be allowed in rooms of patients with pending or positive COVID-19 tests, except under extreme circumstances or in a guardian situation. Visitors must be age 16 or older, except under extreme circumstances. One visitor or support person may remain with the patient for the duration of the visit. After a visit is

complete, visitors must leave the building and cannot remain in waiting areas, public areas or cafeterias.

Some exceptions may be made for end-of-life situations or other extreme circumstances. Visitors who are coughing or showing signs of illness will be asked to leave the facility. Additional restrictions may be imposed based on the clinical status of the patient or provider judgment.

In ThedaCare emergency departments, visitors are prohibited in adult ED patient areas. Visitation will be based on the clinical team's judgment.

Only one visitor allowed per pediatric patient; parent, guardian or caregiver only.

ThedaCare understands excep-

tions may need to be made on a case-by-case basis.

Visitors who are ill should not visit patients. Family members are encouraged to use other ways to connect with their loved ones through phone or video calls.

Patients with symptoms that are more than mild, and with an exposure history, should call their primary care clinic to receive treatment advice before deciding to visit a clinic or hospital.

The majority of people with mild symptoms may not need to come to the clinic or hospital at all. In many cases, the most appropriate course is to treat mild symptoms at home as this will reduce the risk of COVID-19 spread to others.

SAM25 shuts doors in virus response

SHAWANO — SAM's House, Shawano's homeless shelter on East Richmond Street run by Shawano Area Matthew 25, will close temporarily and is directing its efforts to "find alternative living arrangements for the next several weeks," according to a press release Monday.

"Keeping our guests, volunteers and staff safe is our highest priority," Muffy Culhane, SAM25 board

president, said.

SAM25 will keep in touch with its guests to ensure every person in the shelter has a safe place to go, according to the release.

Those needing assistance can call 715-851-7252 for referral to services and resources.

The press release added SAM25 "will continue to re-evaluate the situation and hopes to reopen the shelter as soon as possible."

Jen Bisterfeldt, shelter director, said on March 13 that SAM25 is not just concerned for its clients, a vulnerable population, but also its volunteers who tend to be older and also are a group with a greater chance to contract the disease.

SAM25 added the decision was made after consulting other shelters in the area, as well as health care professionals on its board and the community, that keeping the

shelter, with its tight communal environment, without adequate showers, bathrooms and no laundry facilities at this time, could encourage the spread of a virus like COVID-19.

SAM25 continues to wait for state approval of building and renovation plans addressing those needs at its facility.

Area casinos still open despite Potawatomi closure

SHAWANO — Area casinos are open and are looking to stay open even as one of the state's largest, the Potawatomi casino in Milwaukee, announced on its website it was temporarily suspending all operations as of March 17.

Illinois' gaming board has also closed its casinos and video gaming for two weeks, starting on Monday, in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, according to the agency's website.

Matthew Mann, speaking for the Ho-Chunk Gaming Commission,

said the tribe's Wittenberg casino was open and planning to stay open but added additional announcements could be made by March 17.

He added there hasn't yet been a noticeable rise in patrons due to the Potawatomi announcement or Illinois closures. The Illinois Gaming Board has suspended all video gaming operations at all licensed video gaming establishments and suspended gambling operations at all casinos until March 30.

The Ho-Chunk tribe will review and respond to COVID-19 under its Continued Operations Plan, its

emergency response document and last consulted during the swine flu outbreak in 2009, Mann added.

Mann continued the executive managers of its casinos in Nekoosa, Madison, Black River Falls, Tomah, Wisconsin Dells and Wittenberg, will meet to decide on preventive steps.

The spokesman assured the public that the tribe is in constant contact with the state public health department, local public health departments and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) for guidance.

Mann also quashed a rumor that some Ho-Chunk members in the Wittenberg area were positive for coronavirus, saying there are no cases. The Ho-Chunk health department also confirmed, "At this time, there are no suspected or confirmed cases of COVID-19 in our jurisdiction."

Efforts to reach North Star Mohican Casino Resort and Menominee Casino Resort for their COVID-19 responses were unsuccessful on Monday. The casinos' websites do not mention the virus.

Mammography services in Shawano

In May 2018, Prevea Health, in partnership with HSHS St. Vincent, St. Mary's, St. Anthony and St. Clare Memorial Hospital, acquired a 3-D and digital mobile mammography unit to provide residents in small communities, such as Shawano, greater access to breast health screenings.



The mobile mammography unit is equipped with mammography technology that has the capability to provide 3-D and/or digital images. It features four charging units and a writing room, and is staffed by a registered

mammography technologist. It travels on a regular basis to Prevea Health centers in northeast Wisconsin at the Prevea Shawano Health Center on the third Wednesday of every month.

Between May 2018 and December 2019, the mobile mammography unit and its staff have provided 128 patients in Shawano with mammograms. Out of those 128 patients:

- 5 patients required additional imaging for suspected breast cancer
- 8 patients received a mammogram for the first time
- 4 patients had not had a mammogram in more than 5 years

"Many of these patients are women who may not have otherwise received a mammogram due to the burden of having to travel to another community for many years services are available," said Tammy Field, marketing manager at the Prevea Shawano Center in Atwood. "Our mission, with others as it takes, have screening breast screenings directly to them. If we can catch cancer early with a mammogram, it is likely more treatable."

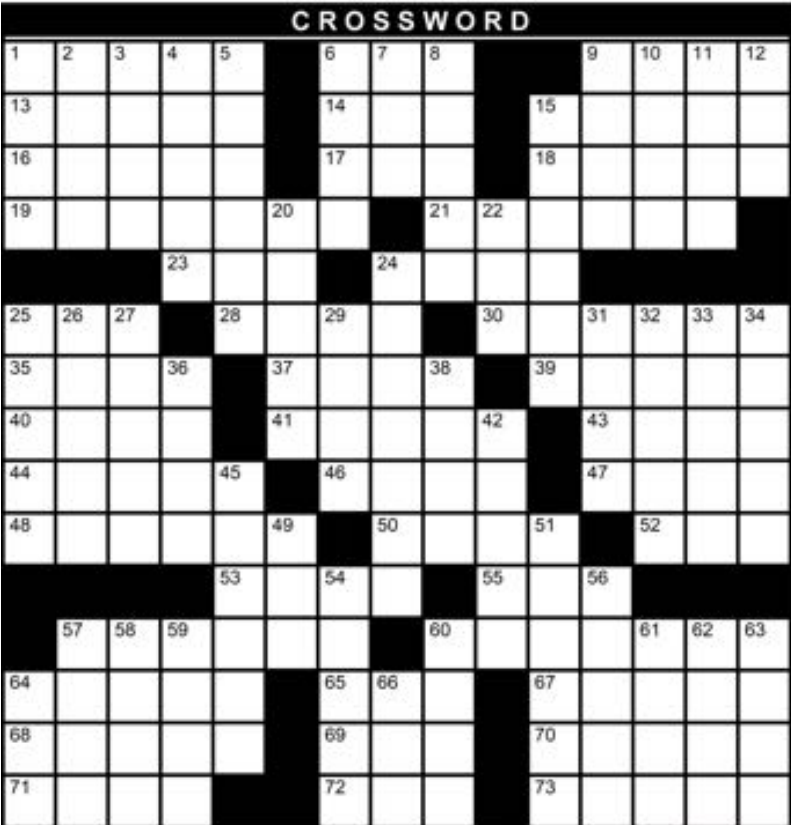

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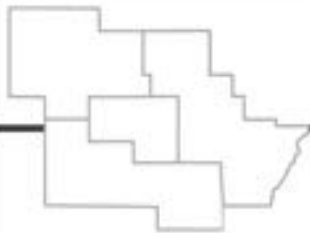

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COVID-19 causing complications for election

Shortage of cleaning products, cap on gatherings among challenges

SHAWANO — In-person absentee voting got underway at Shawano City Hall Monday, even though the building is technically closed due to COVID-19 coronavirus concerns.

There is currently no access for the public at City Hall, but city employees are still at work inside.

Those wishing to cast absentee ballots can ring the buzzer, and city staff will step outside to assist them, Deputy Clerk Lesley Nemetz said.

"We take the necessary paperwork with us and they complete the process outdoors," Nemetz said, including the necessary checks for a valid photo ID.

"This is called curbside voting," she said, adding that it's a service poll workers can also provide on election day for voters who are unable to get out of their cars.

"It takes a little bit longer," Nemetz said. "People definitely need to be a little more patient and understanding, and if they have their vehicle parked right up by the building, we can have them stay in their vehicle. We can hand them everything they need."

Absentee ballots can also be mailed. The deadline to request an absentee ballot by mail is the Thursday prior to the April 7 election.

The Wisconsin Elections Commission held a webinar for county and municipal clerks Monday addressing some of the special challenges being faced this year in light of the coronavirus.

Clerks have been advised as to what precautions they can take as far as sanitizing the voting machines and voting utensils such as stylus, pens and pencils, said Shawano County Clerk Pam Schmidt.

However, she said, things like hand sanitizers, Lysol and wipes are hard to come by.

"As you know, all local stores are out right now," Schmidt said. "(Clerks) have been given instructions to wipe down the touch screens but getting the product is next to impossible right now."

As far as the city of Shawano is concerned, however, City Hall is well-

supplied with sanitizers and cleaning products for the election, according to Nemetz.

"We had some products delivered last week, and a few things are still on their way," she said.

The state commission is encouraging absentee voting and Schmidt said she has emailed all municipal clerks in the county to prepare for an influx of absentee ballot requests.

"We are encouraging voters to vote by absentee ballot," she said.

Schmidt said she has been in constant contact with the municipal clerks.

"I've sent multiple emails this week regarding the COVID-19 and absentee ballot requests along with encouraging them to email me or call my office with questions," she said.

One major voting change this year caused by COVID-19 concerns is the way ballots will get to residents of nursing homes.

Nemetz said there is a new mandate from the state that special election deputies who used to deliver those ballots can no longer go into the nursing homes.

She said she has been in talks with nursing home administrators and activities directors in the city to work out the protocols for getting ballots to the residents.

Nemetz said the ballots will either be mailed or delivered to the activities directors onsite. The activities directors and administrators will then get those ballots to the residents and then back to the city before election day.

"We're still ensuring that the nursing home residents can vote and that there's still a fair way to do it," Nemetz said.

Nemetz said it's a little more work for nursing home and city staff, but nothing nursing home residents will notice.

"I really don't foresee there being any big change as far as the residents are concerned," she said.

Another new complication that arose on Monday was Gov. Tony Evers' announcement of a ban on gatherings of more than 50 people during the health crisis.

"If that's still in effect, there's going to have to be some new protocol that occurs," Nemetz said, "because there are times when we have a large amount of people in our building."
