Elderly murder suspect not competent to stand trial

MARINETTE — The Lakewood man accused of murdering a Green Bay couple in 1976 has been ruled incompetent to stand trial, at least temporarily, in Marinette County Circuit Court.

Judge James Morrison made the ruling Thursday after hearing testimony from a psychologist who examined Raymand Vannieuwenhoven, 83. He was arrested a year ago after authorities said DNA tests linked Vannieuwenhoven to the murders of David Schuldes and Ellen Matheys, whose bodies were found at the McClintock Park campground July 9, 1976.

Dr. Steven Benson, testifying from his home, said the defendant is not currently competent to aid in his own defense, but his condition could improve with intensive inpatient treatment.

Vannieuwenhoven had a stroke about 10 years ago and has issues with his short- and longer-term memory and reasoning, Benson said.

"There were issues relative to expressive speech, articulation (speaking clearly), anomia (word-finding problems) and significant issues with regard to memory," Benson said.

For example, he was able to give a rough outline of his work history and upbringing but not specific details, and he was unable to recall when his wife died but was able to state that their marriage lasted 51 years, three months and 27 days, he said.

Because he has been able to live independently, albeit with assistance from his family, Vannieuwenhoven's condition by definition is considered a mild neuro-cognitive disorder rather than major, Benson said.

"I felt there was a probability he could become competent, given the fact that he has been able to live independently for an extended period of time," Benson said. "I also qualified that opinion by saying that a more comprehensive neuro-psychological evaluation was warranted."

With such treatment, it's more likely than not that Vannieuwenhoven could become competent enough to stand trial, Benson concluded.

State mental health institutions in Winnebago and Medota have a restorative treatment program, beginning with a comprehensive evaluation of the patient's mental condition, he said.

"We're looking to be able to sustain or to improve his executive functions," Benson said. "We have to be able to determine whether he is

able to function in such a way that he can access memory, historical details, without interference from other types of, say, for example, the delusions that have been outlined in my report, or just loss of focus because he just can't stay focused on something for long enough minutes at a time."

The ruling includes an order that Vannieuwenhoven be treated with psychotropic drugs, which was included over the defendant's objections.

Morrison scheduled a status conference for 2 p.m. June 24 but acknowledged that with the ongoing coronavirus concerns, "All bets are off on time."

At the beginning of the hearing, Morrison noted that on March 22, the state Supreme Court issued three orders related to the COVID-19 response — one which specifically stated only court hearings affecting constitutional interests or safety could be held, and any sessions that are held should be done via available internet technology.

About 10 minutes into the hearing, the Zoom connection failed and Morrison was unable to restore it, so Benson's testimony resumed via speakerphone.

TAKE NOTICE that a referendum election shall be held on April 7, 2020 in the Suring Public School District for the purpose of approving or rejecting a Revenue Cap Resolution adopted by the School Board of said District on January 8, 2020.

The Revenue Cap Resolution reads as follows:

RESOLUTION TO EXCEED REVENUE CAP COMMENCING WITH THE 2020-21 SCHOOL YEAR BY AN AMOUNT OF \$900,000

BE IT RESOLVED by the School Board of the Suring Public School District, Oconto County, Wisconsin, that the final school district budget shall include an amount not to exceed \$900,000 in excess of the revenue limits imposed by Section 121.91 of the Wisconsin Statutes each year for a period of five years on a non-recurring basis, beginning with the 2020-21 school year and ending with the 2024-25 school year, for the purpose of paying District operation and maintenance costs and upgrades and enhancements to facilities and equipment, technology, curriculum and technical education.

The referendum ballot will ask District electors: "Shall the School Board of the Suring Public School District be authorized to exceed the revenue limit under Section 121.91 of the Wisconsin Statutes beginning with the 2020-21 school year through the 2024-25 school year on a nonrecurring basis by an amount of \$900,000 each year for the purpose of paying District operation and maintenance costs and upgrades and enhancements to facilities and equipment, technology, curriculum and technical education as provided in the foregoing resolution?"

A "yes" vote is in favor of the resolution set forth above and is a vote to approve exceeding the revenue limit under Section 121.91 of the Wisconsin Statutes for the 2020-21 through 2024-25 school years on a nonrecurring basis by an amount of \$ 900,000 each year for the purpose of paying District operation and maintenance costs and upgrades and enhancements to facilities and equipment, technology, curriculum and technical education.

A "no" vote is opposed to the resolution and is a vote to deny exceeding the revenue limit under Section 121.91 of the Wisconsin Statutes for the 2020-21 through 2024-25 school years on a nonrecurring basis by an amount of \$ 900,000 each year for the purpose of paying District operation and maintenance costs and upgrades and enhancements to facilities and equipment, technology, curriculum and technical education.

2.) After the first meeting of the Board of Review and before the Board's final adjournment, no person who is scheduled to appear before the Board of Review may contact, or provide information to a member of the board about the person's objection except at a session of the Board.

3.) The board of review may not hear an objection to the amount or valuation of property unless, at least 48 hours before the board's first scheduled meeting, the objector provides to the board's clerk written or oral notice of an intent to file an objection, except that upon a showing of good cause and the submission of a written objection, the board shall waive the requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days with proof of extraordinary circumstances for failure to meet the 48 - hour notice requirements and failure to appear before the Board of Review during the first 2 hours of the first scheduled meeting.

4.) Objection to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the board of review within the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. The board may require objections to the amount or valuation of property to be submitted on forms approved by the Department of Revenue, and the board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. Persons who own land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land may object to the valuation of that land or only to the valuation of improvements to that land. No person may be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount of valuation or property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the board in support of the objections and made full disclosure before the board, under oath, of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.

5.) When appearing before the Board, the person shall specify, in writing, the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.

6.) No person shall appear before the Board of Review, testify to the Board by telephone or subject or object to a valuation: if that valuation was made by the Assessor or the Objector using the income method; unless the person supplies the Assessor all of the information about income and expenses, as specified in the manual under Sec. 73.03(2a), that the Assessor requests. The Village of Suring has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph which provides exceptions for persons using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or of the duties of their office or by order of a court. The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under Section 19.35(2) of Wisconsin State Statutes.

7.) The Board shall hear upon oath, by telephone, all ill or disabled persons who present to the Board a letter from a physician, surgeon or osteopath that confirms their illness or disability. No other persons may testify by telephone.

Notice is hereby given of a spring election and a Presidential Preference Vote to be held in Oconto County on April 7, 2020, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, for a referendum, if any, in the sample ballot below.

INFORMATION TO VOTERS

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot, except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

AT THE PRESIDENTIAL PREFERENCE VOTE

A voter may cast only one vote in the presidential preference primary.

Where Paper Ballots are Used

To vote for president, the voter shall choose the ballot of the party of his or her choice on which to vote. *If you vote in more than one party, your vote will not be counted.* On the ballot of his or her choice, the voter shall make an (X) or other mark in the square next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice or shall, in the alternative, make an (X) or other mark in the square next to the words "Uninstructed delegation," or write in the name of a person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

Within the party of his or her choice, the voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice or shall, in the alternative, fill in the oval next to the words "Uninstructed Delegation," or write in the name of a person of his or her choice for a candidate in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the write-in line.

When using an *electronic ballot marking device ("ImageCast Evolution-ICE")* to mark an **optical scan ballot**, the voter shall touch the screen or use the keypad to select the party of his or her choice. Within the party of his or her choice, the voter shall touch the screen or use the keypad to select the name of the candidate of his or her choice or shall, in the alternative, touch the screen or use the keypad to select the words "Uninstructed Delegation," or type in the name of a person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

Where Touch Screen Voting is Used

The voter shall touch the screen at the party of his or her choice. Within the party of his or her choice, the voter shall touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice or shall, in the alternative, touch the screen at the words "Uninstructed Delegation," or type in the name of a person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

AT THE SPRING ELECTION

Where Paper Ballots are Used

The voter shall make a mark (X) in the square next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall make a mark (X) in the square next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall make a mark (X) in the square next to "no" if opposed to the question.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided, and fill in the oval next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question or fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an *electronic ballot marking device ("ImageCast Evolution-ICE")* to mark an **optical scan ballot**, the voter shall touch the screen or use the keypad to select the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen or use the keypad to select "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen or use the keypad to select "no" if opposed to the question.

Where Touch Screen Voting is Used

The voter shall touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen at "yes" if in favor of the questions, or the voter shall touch the screen at "no" if opposed to the question.

The vote shall not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

Spoiled Ballots

If a voter spoils a **paper or optical scan ballot**, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initiated by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

The voter may spoil a **touch screen** ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official **paper ballot** is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show, but so the printed endorsements and inspectors' initials on the outside do show. The voter shall deposit the voted ballot in the ballot box or the deliver the ballot to an election inspector for deposit and deposit any un-voted ballots in the discard box. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official **optical scan ballot** is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter shall insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official **touch screen ballot** is cast, the voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

2019 ENROLLED JOINT RESOLUTION 3

To **renumber and amend** section 9m of article I; and to **create** section 9m (1) of article I, section 9m

a. of article I, section 9m (5) of article I and section 9m (6) of article I of the constitution; **relating to:** the rights of crime victims (second consideration).

Whereas, the 2017 legislature in regular session considered a proposed amendment to the constitution in 2017 Senate Joint Resolution 53, which became 2017 Enrolled Joint Resolution 13, and agreed to it by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, which proposed amendment reads as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 9m of article I of the constitution is renumbered section 9m. (2) (intro.) of article I and amended to read:

[Article I] Section 9m (2) (intro.) This state shall treat crime victims, as defined by law, with fairness, dignity and respect for their privacy. This state shall ensure that crime victims have all of the following privileges and protections as provided by law: In order to preserve and protect victims' rights to justice and due process throughout the criminal and juvenile justice process, victims shall be entitled to all of the following rights, which shall vest at the time of victimization and be protected by law

in a manner no less vigorous than the protections afforded to the accused:

- (a) To be treated with dignity, respect, courtesy, sensitivity, and fairness.
- (b) To privacy.
- (c) To proceedings free from unreasonable delay.
- (d) To timely disposition of the case; the opportunity to attend court, free from
 1. unreasonable delay.
- (e) Upon request, to attend all proceedings unless the trial court finds sequestration is necessary to a fair trial for the defendant; involving the case.
- (f) To reasonable protection from the accused throughout the criminal and juvenile justice process;
- (g) Upon request, to reasonable and timely notification of court proceedings; the
 2. opportunity to.
- (h) Upon request, to confer with the prosecution; the opportunity to make a statement to the court at disposition; attorney for the government.
3. (i) Upon request, to be heard in any proceeding during which a right of the victim
4. is implicated, including release, plea, sentencing, disposition, parole, revocation, expungement, or pardon.
- (j) To have information pertaining to the economic, physical, and psychological effect upon the victim of the offense submitted to the authority with jurisdiction over the case and to have that information considered by that authority.

SECTION 2. Section 9m (1) of article I of the constitution is created to read: [Article I] Section 9m (1) (a) In this section, notwithstanding any statutory right, privilege, or protection, "victim" means any of the following:

1. A person against whom an act is committed that would constitute a crime if committed by a competent adult.
2. If the person under subd. 1. is deceased or is physically or emotionally unable to exercise his or her rights under this section, the person's spouse, parent or legal guardian, sibling, child, person who resided with the deceased at the time of death, or other lawful representative.
3. If the person under subd. 1. is a minor, the person's parent, legal guardian or custodian, or other lawful representative.
4. If the person under subd. 1. is adjudicated incompetent, the person's legal guardian or other lawful representative.

(b) "Victim" does not include the accused or a person who the court finds would not act in the best interests of a victim who is deceased, incompetent, a minor, or physically or emotionally unable to exercise his or her rights under this section.

SECTION 3. Section 9m (4) of article I of the constitution is created to read:

[Article I] Section 9m (4) (a) In addition to any other available enforcement of rights

or remedy for a violation of this section or of other rights, privileges, or protections provided by law, the victim, the victim's attorney or other lawful representative, or the attorney for the government upon request of the victim may assert and seek in any circuit court or before any other authority of competent jurisdiction, enforcement of the rights in this section and any other right, privilege, or protection afforded to the victim by law. The court or other authority with jurisdiction over the case shall act promptly on such a request and afford a remedy for the violation of any right of the victim. The court or other authority with jurisdiction over the case shall clearly state on the record the reasons for any decision regarding the disposition of a victim's right and shall provide those reasons to the victim or the victim's attorney or other lawful representative.

(b) Victims may obtain review of all adverse decisions concerning their rights as victims by courts or other authorities with jurisdiction under par. (a) by filing petitions for supervisory writ in the court of appeals and supreme court.

SECTION 4. Section 9m (5) of article I of the constitution is created to read: [Article I] Section 9m (5) This section does not create any cause of action for

damages against the state; any political subdivision of the state; any officer, employee, or agent of the state or a political subdivision of the state acting in his or her official capacity; or any officer, employee, or agent of the courts acting in his or her official capacity.

SECTION 5. Section 9m (6) of article I of the constitution is created to read: [Article I] Section 9m (6) This section is not intended and may not be interpreted

to supersede a defendant's federal constitutional rights or to afford party status in a proceeding to any victim.

SECTION 6. Numbering of new provisions. If another constitutional amendment ratified by the people creates the number of any provision created in this joint resolution, the chief of the legislative reference bureau shall determine the sequencing and the

numbering of the provisions whose numbers conflict.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution is agreed to by the 2019 legislature; and, be it further

Resolved, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be submitted to a vote of the people at the election to be held on the first Tuesday in April 2020; and, be it further

Resolved, That the question concerning ratification of the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be stated on the ballot as follows:

QUESTION 1: "Additional rights of crime victims. Shall section 9m of article I of the constitution, which gives certain rights to crime victims, be amended to give crime victims additional rights, to require that the rights of crime victims be protected with equal force to the protections afforded the accused while leaving the federal constitutional rights of the accused intact, and to allow crime victims to enforce their rights in court?"

EXPLANATION

The Wisconsin Constitution, article I, section 9m, currently provides that the state shall treat crime victims "with fairness, dignity and respect for their privacy." That provision also mandates that the state ensure that crime victims have certain "privileges and protections" relative to the accused and the criminal case. Separate from these constitutional provisions, chapter 950 of the Wisconsin Statutes provides a "bill of rights" for victims and witnesses of crimes.

The proposed amendment would make five general changes to article I, section 9m, of the Wisconsin Constitution.

First, in 16 subsections, the proposed amendment would expand the rights of victims by creating additional rights and incorporating other statutory rights into the constitution.

Second, the proposed amendment would incorporate into the constitution a definition of "victim" similar to the definition currently in statute.

Third, the proposed amendment would create an additional mechanism by which victims could enforce their rights as victims.

Fourth, the proposed amendment would incorporate into the constitution a limit on governmental liability for any violation of victims' rights, similar to the limit currently provided by statute.

Fifth, the proposed amendment would provide that it may not be interpreted to supersede a defendant's federal constitutional rights or afford party status in a proceeding to any victim.

A "yes" vote on this question would amend the Wisconsin Constitution as summarized above.

A "no" vote on this question would decline to amend the Wisconsin Constitution as summarized above. A "no" vote would not alter existing protections for crime victims.

Oconto Co. voters have few decisions

Most candidates are unopposed

OCONTO — Two local referendum questions and a handful of contested races are on the ballot in several Oconto County municipalities when voters go to the polls (or send in their absentee ballots) for Tuesday's spring election.

The Suring School District is asking voters for permission to exceed state-imposed revenue limits by \$900,000 yearly for five years starting with the 2021-22 academic year. It would be a renewal of a five-year commitment approved in 2015, under which the district has been exceeding the limits by \$750,000 annually.

The Little Suamico Town Board voted in September to place an advisory referendum on the April

ballot regarding whether to allow all-terrain and utility vehicles to operate on town roads.

In Gillett, interim Mayor Josh McCarthy is challenged by Jerry Luther, owner of the Gillett Shell Station for the past 16 years. McCarthy was City Council president when former Mayor James Beaton resigned in October and has handled the mayor's duties since then.

A registered write-in candidate emerged for the Gillett School Board, where incumbent Ron Lenz and former board member Nanette Mohr are on the ballot. Katie Daul works in administration at HSHS St. Clare Memorial Hospital. Voters may vote for up to two board members; incumbent Tracy Winkler decided not to run for re-election.

There are also three candidates for two seats on the Oconto Falls School Board, where incumbent Lisa Peitersen is not seeking another term. Incumbent Jan Stranz is on the ballot with challengers Adam Adler

and Randy Vann.

Five people are running for three positions on the Suring Village Board, incumbents Randy Schuettelpelz and Dave Kuchenbecker and challengers John E. Fredenburgh, Stephanie Lupe and Angie Whiting.

Lupe and Jeff Whiting are vying for the right to succeed Municipal Judge Philip Fischer.

There are five candidates for four seats on the Oconto City Council, incumbents Kim Bronikowski, Dean Reed, Roger Reed and Al Schreiber, along with challenger Tina Frye.

Of the 31 districts comprising the Oconto Board of Supervisors, 28 have only one candidate running unopposed.

The three contested races are:

In District 2, representing part of the town of Little Suamico, incumbent Marcia Ellis is challenged by David Pribyl.

Incumbent Supervisor David Behrend is challenged for reelection by Fran Wranosky in a rematch of the

2018 election in District 7, which represents parts of the towns of Chase and Morgan. Behrend won that race by just one vote.

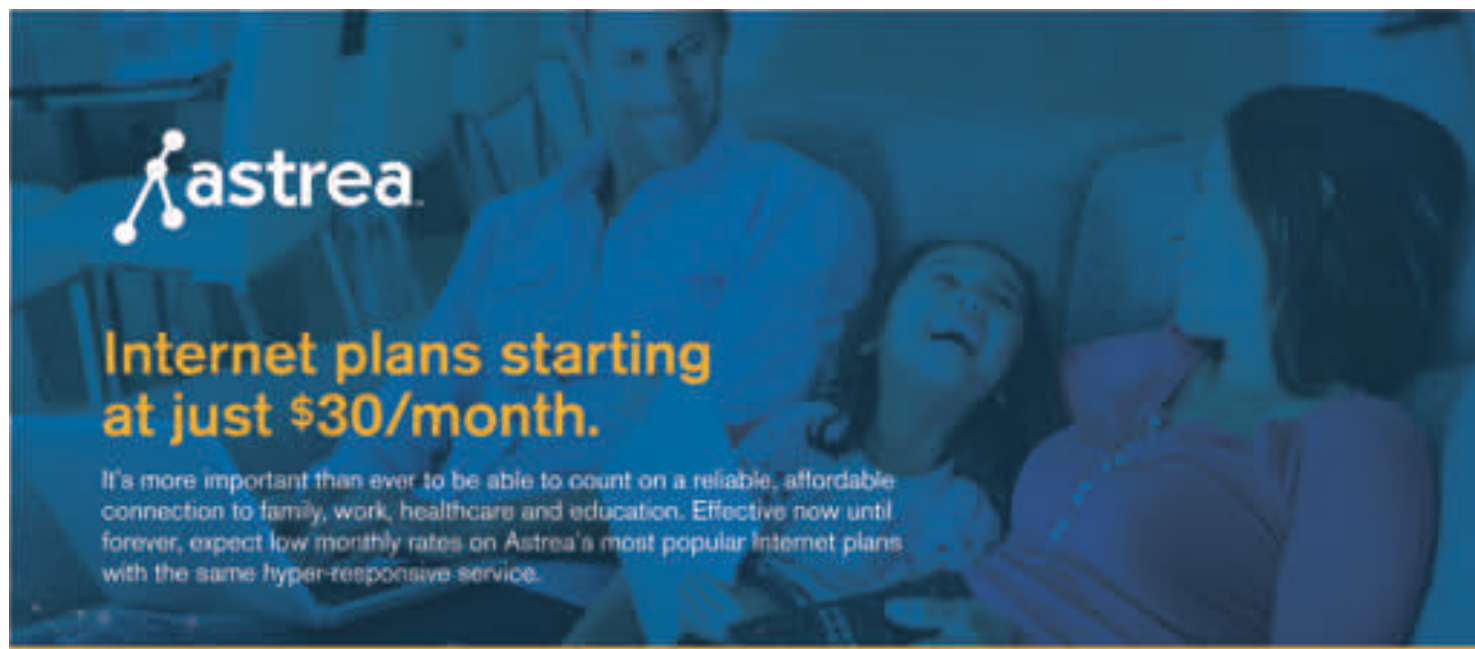
Supervisor Richard Nelson is not running for re-election in District 24, serving part of the town of Gillett and part of the city of Gillett. Former Gillett mayor and alderwoman Irene Drake faces Tracy Ondik, director of the Gillett Area Ambulance Service.

Statewide, voters have a partisan presidential primary and a choice for Supreme Court between Justice Daniel Kelly and challenger Jill Karofsky, as well as a state constitutional question related to the rights of crime victims.

Although all but Joe Biden and Bernie Sanders have dropped out, 12 candidates are on the Democratic presidential primary ballot. President Donald Trump is unopposed for the Republican nomination.

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Oconto County Board moves to extend terms

Resolution covers eventualities in case of a postponed election

OCONTO — Although the state seemed to be preparing to conduct the April 7 election despite the general coronavirus precautions, the Oconto County Board was planning to meet Tuesday to discuss the possibility the election would be postponed.

The agenda for the Tuesday afternoon meeting included a resolution extending the terms of the 31 incumbent supervisors in the event of an election postponement.

By state law, the county board's

term begins on the third Tuesday in April after the election. A federal judge on Friday denied the city of Green Bay's lawsuit to postpone the election, but other lawsuits remained pending to delay the election or tallying the results until as late as June 1.

The resolution before the board would appoint the incumbents effective April 21 and continuing "until a successor qualifies."

The board was also to consider adoption of revisions to the county's employee handbook to bring it in line with the federal Families First Coronavirus Response Act signed into law by President Donald Trump last week.

Public Health Manager Deb Konitzer was also expected to provide an update on the county's activities in light of the statewide Safer At Home program.

The board was scheduled to meet at 1 p.m. Tuesday, after this edition was sent to press. Watch for meeting coverage at newmedia-wi.com.

PSC OK's transmission linerebuild into county

PEWAUKEE — The state Public Service Commission has approved an electric reliability transmission line rebuild project between the Bayport Substation in Brown County and the Pioneer Substation in Oconto County.

American Transmission Co. submitted its application for the Bayport-Pioneer rebuild project last spring, and the order for the certificate of authority was issued March 19.

"The existing Bayport-Pioneer transmission line infrastructure needs to be rebuilt and upgraded to better serve the electric needs in Brown and Oconto counties," said Jim Pericolosi, ATC project manager. "The PSC's approval to replace outdated structures and wires significantly improves the region's electric reliability and supports the area's economic growth, which has been increasing over the last several years."

The project was announced in early 2018 and includes replacing the transmission structures between the Bayport and Pioneer substations, replacing existing 69-kilovolt wires with 138-kilovolt wires, installing a

second set of 138-kilovolt wires and making upgrades at the Bayport, Pioneer, Pulliam, Sobieski and Suamico substations.

The project is estimated to cost \$47 million. Construction is projected to begin in late 2020, with an in-service date of 2022.

State grants \$186K for county broadband

OCONTO — The Oconto County Economic Development Corp. and Bertram Communications have been awarded \$182,058 for Phase II of a fixed wireless project to expand high-speed internet access in the northern sections of the county.

One of 72 grants the state Public Service Commission awarded in the latest round of Broadband Expansion Grants, this phase of the project is expected to help build and equip two wireless towers in the towns of Spruce and Mountain.

The fixed wireless service will reach 18 business and 301 residential locations within the footprint of the antennas. The County Board in December pledged \$2,000 to the project, and OCEDC is adding \$500.
