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Pack needs to clean up mistakes to reach ceiling

Defense forces three-and-outs to beat Patriots

Week four proved to be another successful week for the Green Bay Packers, as they narrowly took down the New England Patriots on an overtime field goal.

Coming into the game, the Packers were favored to win against a team who was down their starting quarterback. Almost immediately into the game, Patriots back-up quarterback Brian Hoyer was knocked out of competition with a head injury. That set the stage for fourth-round draft selection Bailey Zappe to make his NFL debut.

Packers head coach Matt LaFleur has said numerous times that a win is a win no matter what the competition is, but it still begs the question of how the Packers went to overtime against a third-string quarterback.

"The bottom line is as soon as you think you have a game won before the game's even played, a lot of times that bites you in the butt," said LaFleur.

Coming off a game against Tampa Bay in which they held Tom Brady to 12 points, the defense was once again expected to hold an injured Patriots team to a limited score. It could be due in part to Jaire Alexander missing the game with an injury, or Adrian Amos getting hurt early in the game, but mistakes seem to be holding the Packers from reaching their full potential.

The Packers have uncharacteristically turned the ball over this season — Aaron Rodgers has thrown three interceptions and the Packers sit at a minus three mark in the turnover differential category.

Turnovers haven't been the only problem for the Packers though, as missed assignments and drops have aided in a slow start for Green Bay's offense. The key issue coming into the season surrounding Green Bay was their receiving core. Bringing in three new receivers, it was expected that Green Bay's offense was going to start slow. Even if the offense looks different, Rodgers is not worried about the recent struggles.

"Look, Romeo is growing. He's making some plays," said Rodgers,

when asked about Romeo Doubs' fumble. "I hit him twice in that last drive, so obviously I have confidence in him."

Not only were young players making some of those key mistakes, but Rodgers did not exclude himself from blame when talking about his week four performance.

"It's frustrating for sure," said Rodgers, about his interception that was returned for a touchdown. "I felt like that before the game. I even said it, 'I think the only people that can beat us is ourselves.' I felt that last week, even though Tampa is a great team."

Though the offense has struggled in relation to recent memory, the defense has done more than its part to reach a 3-1 record. Not only did the Packers defense win the weak three matchup on a stopped two-point conversion, but they also forced New England into three straight three-and-outs to end the game, including overtime. Rashan Gary once again paced the Packers defense with

seven tackles and two sacks.

High expectations have begun to become a reality as Gary has become one of the best edge rushers in the NFL.

"It's tough to hold people down in this league," said LaFleur on his thoughts regarding the defense's season performance. "Offensively, we spotted them seven points too, so you have to take that into account. There's been a lot of great moments, and you're only as good as your last performance."

With the offense starting slow in the early part of the season, the defense may continue to be relied on. A matchup against the 3-1 New York Giants in London presents a challenge for Green Bay, outside of the football field.

"The league is constantly progressing, and we'll face different challenges every week," said LaFleur. "We're going to have another 3-1 team in London, and that's a challenge in itself. In terms of whoever

can handle the travel the best typically will go out there and perform the best. And you know, you look at the Giants, and Saquon Barkley is definitely a force."

Moving forward, winning ugly may need to be the mantra for this Packers team as it's offense continues to develop. As seen with Rodgers' blossoming connection to Doubs and a continuation of cleaning up the mistakes, the Packers may have to take time to reach it's full potential. Echoing LaFleur, Rodgers talked about how Green Bay needed to win this game, as wins are hard to come by in the league.

"This is a game we had to win for sure," said Rodgers. "You can't be 2-2 losing to a third-string quarterback and not playing great in all three phases, so we had to have this one. That doesn't take anything away from the joy of winning, but this is one we had to have."

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REPORT CARD: QUARTER SEASON REVIEW

With four games in the book, the Green Bay Packers are 3-1 at the unofficial quarter pole of the 2022 NFL season. They are a flawed team, to be sure, but there also are some undeniable building blocks as the season continues in London against the New York Giants on Sunday.

“Especially for the young guys, just understanding not every win is going to be pretty,” receiver Allen Lazard said after the overtime victory over the Patriots. “The end of the first quarter of the season, they got an experience

now that we’ve had good wins. We’ve had gut-wrenching wins and, obviously, a loss that we’re not too proud of, either.

“Getting that first quarter out of the way and that experience, kind of be able to knock off the rust for the rest of us and attack the rest of the season in a strong passionate way I think we’re setting ourselves up great.”

Here’s what’s great, and not so great, starting with four building blocks.

Aaron Jones and A.J. Dillon

Following the trade of Davante Adams, the Packers entered the season having to ride the dynamic duo of run-

ning backs Aaron Jones and A.J. Dillon. And that’s just what they’ve done. The Packer are seventh in rushing per game (145) and ninth in rushing per carry (5).

Jones has never been looked more explosive. Of the 29 backs with at least 40 carries, Jones is No. 1 by a wide margin with his 6.8-yard average. On its own, his NFL-best 4.42 yards after contact would rank 16th, according to Pro Football Focus. In 2019, his forced a career-high 48 missed tackles. With 18 already, he’s on pace for 76.

Dillon has found tough sledding on his opportunities but really delivered down the stretch against the Patriots.

David Bakhtiari’s return

A five-time All-Pro, left tackle David Bakhtiari suffered a torn ACL at practice on Dec. 31, 2020. His comeback included two surgeries, one game last year, one more surgery and a belated debut this year. Bakhtiari started the week three game at Tampa Bay, then played 70 snaps against New England.

Before the injury, Bakhtiari was arguably the best offensive lineman in football. If he can play at anywhere close to that level in December and beyond, the Packers will feel good about their chances for contending for a Super Bowl.

Rashan Gary and Kenny Clark

How high were the expectations for Green Bay's defense? So high that its No. 7 ranking in points allowed and No. 5 spot in total defense somehow seems disappointing.

Two players who have not been disappointments: defensive tackle Kenny Clark and outside linebacker Rashan Gary.

Clark, the established star on the defensive line, ranks third among all interior defenders in PFF's pass-rushing productivity, which measures sacks, hits and hurries per pass-rushing snap.

Gary is tied for third in the NFL with five sacks and is one of only two players with at least one sack in every game. He is sixth in PFF's PRP.

Special teams

Green Bay ranks 21st in Football Outsiders' special teams rankings. That's not great. It's also not 32nd, where the Packers have been routinely perched over the last several years.

The great special teams produce big plays on returns and limit opposing returns. With Amari Rodgers returning kicks, the Packers haven't created any big plays. But at least they've prevented them.

In three of the first four games, the coverage units were tremendous. The offseason additions of defensive backs Rudy Ford, Keisean Nixon and Dallin Leavitt have been excellent, and veteran punt Pat O'Donnell has played a huge role in Green Bay scoring field-position advantages.

Here are three areas where the team can grow:

Rookie experience

First-round linebacker Quay Walker has been a starter since Day 1 of training camp. Fourth-round receiver Romeo Doubs played a lot the first two weeks and started the last two games. Those early snaps, presumably, will pay dividends as their experience level builds.

Walker is second on the team with 25 tackles and he forced a big fumble at Tampa Bay. He hasn't been great but that ridiculous combination of size and speed has shown up at times with a remarkable ability to cover a lot of ground in a hurry. His goal-line tackle of a scrambling Bears quarterback Justin Fields is the most obvious example.

Doubs has been really good and really bad. The good is his suddenness to win deep and his ability to manufacture yards after the catch through speed and power.

YAC is the hallmark of Matt LaFleur's passing attack and Doubs is a

real weapon.

On the other hand, he fumbled his first catch each of the last two weeks and had the end-zone drop vs. New England.

Walker and Doubs look like future stars. Will they reach that level this year?

Run defense

Green Bay's run defense ranked 24th in yards allowed per attempt in 2019, 21st in 2020 and 30th in 2021, the first season with Joe Barry as defensive coordinator. Surely, the re-signing of All-Pro De'Vondre Campbell, the additions of Walker in the draft and defensive tackle Jarran Reed in free agency, and the growth of second-year defensive tackle T.J. Slaton would turn weakness into strength. Right?

Not so much. The Packers enter week five ranked 22nd with 4.97 yards allowed per carry. They couldn't stop Minnesota's Dalvin Cook in week one, couldn't tackle Chicago's David Montgomery in week two and couldn't stop New England's backs from getting around the corner in week four.

The Packers will need to play much, much better against NFL rushing leader Saquon Barkley on Sunday in London against the Giants.

"Quite frankly, I think we've got to play more physical. We can't just sit back and catch" blocks, LaFleur said.

Turnovers

The Packers have been one of the best teams in the NFL throughout Aaron Rodgers' tenure at quarterback because of, well, Rodgers. But turnovers have been a big part of the success, too. From 2008 through 2021, the Packers ranked second in giveaways, second in takeaways and second in turnover differential.

Through four games this year, the Packers rank toward the bottom of those lists with seven giveaways, four takeaways and a minus-3 total. Rodgers has thrown three interceptions — he had 13 the past three seasons — and Rasul Douglas doesn't have an interception after grabbing five picks last year.

There isn't a more important stat in football than turnovers. The Packers are flirting with disaster unless they can find their typical turnover dominance.

"We always talk about the ball. When you lose the turnover battle, you're kind of putting yourself back against the 8-ball," LaFleur said. "To be able to come out in top and lose the turnover battle I think it says a lot about our guys, just the resiliency that we look for."

KEYS TO THE GAME

The Green Bay Packers (3-1) will take on the New York Giants (3-1) at 8:30 a.m. at Tottenham Hotspur Stadium in London. NFL Network will televise the game. It will be shown locally on WLUK-TV Channel 11.

History

The Packers lead the series 34-26-2, including 29-23-2 in regular-season play. The Packers have won the last three, including 31-13 in snowy New York in 2019. This is Green Bay's first international game; the Giants are 2-0 in London, with victories over the Dolphins in 2007 and Rams in 2016.

Coaches

Green Bay — Matt LaFleur, 42-11, fourth season. New York — Brian Daboll, 3-1, first season.

When the Packers have the ball

Coming off games against the powerful defenses fielded by the Buccaneers and Patriots, it will be another big-time challenge against the Giants. New York ranks ninth with 17.8 points allowed per game. The Giants are 27th in yards allowed per rushing play (5.08) and 15th in yards allowed per passing play (6.65). They are the only team without an interception.

So, what are they doing well? They've dominated situationally, ranking second on third down (29.4% conversions) and in the red zone (35.7% touchdowns).

Led by former Ravens defensive coordinator Don "Wink" Martindale, who led that team to a cumulative No. 1 ranking in points allowed from 2018 through 2020, the Giants operate out of a base 3-4 alignment.

Former first-round picks Leonard Williams and Dexter Lawrence anchor the defensive line. Acquired from the Jets in 2019, Williams had 11½ sacks in 2020 and 6½ sacks in 2021. He doesn't have any this season. The 340-pound Lawrence is a beast against the run and already is halfway to his career high with two sacks.

Kayvon Thibodeaux and Azeez Ojulari are the outside linebackers. The fifth pick in this year's draft, Thibodeaux has four pressures in his two games. Ojulari and backups Jihad Ward and Oshane Ximines have one sack apiece.

Tae Crowder is the every-down linebacker. He's second on the team with 25 tackles. Micah McFadden and former Cowboys star Jaylon Smith

split time as the other linebacker. Smith, a bust during his brief opportunity with the Packers a couple years ago, had seven tackles vs. Chicago last week.

Adoree Jackson and Fabian Moreau are the cornerbacks, Xavier McKinney and Julian Love are the safeties, and Darney Holmes enters as the slot in nickel situations. Aaron Robinson had been one of the starting corners but suffered a knee injury vs. Chicago and probably will not be available, Daboll told reporters on Monday.

Love leads the team with 27 tackles. McKinney is tied for third with 20 and leads with three passes defended. Moreau gave up seven touchdowns last season with Atlanta.

When the Giants have the ball

The Giants are 18th in scoring with 19 points per game. They haven't topped 21 this year. They are second in rushing per play but 32nd in passing per play. They're 31st in sack percentage, 27th on third down and 23rd in the red zone.

Last week, Patriots starting quarterback Mac Jones was out with an ankle injury. Could the Packers dodge another starter this week? New York's Daniel Jones was knocked out of last week's victory over Chicago with an ankle injury. Then, veteran backup Tyrod Taylor suffered a concussion.

"Daniel is feeling a little bit better today. We'll just see how that goes," Daboll said. "I just think each day we take a look at him. He can throw from the pocket just fine. Obviously, he has another skillset that you can utilize, whether that's move the pockets or zone-reads. So, I'd say the first thing we do is make sure he's as healthy as can be, and if he can do the things we need him to do for that gameplan, then we talk about it. If he can't, then he can't."

Regardless of the quarterback, the Giants' offense runs through elite running back Saquon Barkley. Fully healed from a torn ACL, he's been a terror. Through four games, he is No. 1 in the NFL in rushes (84) and rushing yards (463). His 5.51-yard average ranks seventh among backs. With Barkley and Jones (6.23-yard average) leading the way, the Giants are averaging a robust 5.75 yards per carry.

The Giants' receiver corps is a mess. Veteran Sterling Shepard, their top player at the position, will miss the rest of the season with a torn ACL. Kenny Golladay, as has been the story for much of his career, is out due to injury — a knee this time. Rookie Wan'Dale Robinson suffered a knee injury in the opener and hasn't played since.

Kadarius Toney, last year's No. 1 pick, has been out with a hamstring injury. It's possible Robinson or

Toney will return and join Richie James and David Sills as the receivers. James and Barkley have a team-high 15 catches. Tight end Daniel Bellinger has caught eight passes.

The offensive line features first-round picks Andrew Thomas at left tackle and rookie Evan Neal at right tackle. The veteran interior, filled with castoffs from other teams, is soft. Left guard Ben Bredeson is from Hartland and played at Michigan. While Thomas is a stud, right guard Mark Glowinski and Neal are the weak links.

Special teams

Green Bay's special teams met its match last week against New England but should have an edge this week. The Giants are 20th in punt returns, 26th in kickoff returns, 29th in punt coverage and 20th in kickoff coverage.

Kicker Graham Gano is a weapon. He's made 9-of-11 field goals, including all four from 50-plus yards. Punter Jamie Gillan is averaging a whopping 51.1 yards per punt. He's put six inside the 20 but has three touchbacks.

For Green Bay, Pat O'Donnell leads the NFL with 11 punts placed inside the 20. Mason Crosby is 4-of-4 on field goals, including last week's chip-shot game-winner, but he is 30th in touchback percentage and 31st in net average.

Q&A WITH ROMEO DOUBS

Q: The other day, (receivers coach) Jason Vrable said you go to the Don Hutson Center by yourself to catch passes. How did that start? And why?

A: I had too much time throughout the day. I figured coming here, it would be a completely different schedule than I would usually have. I'm first year in the NFL. We have a lot more time than we think so I frequently like to make time to go to the Don Hutson and catch footballs. It became a routine. I've been doing it frequently on my own time.

Q: What's the schedule? Every day? After practices?

A: It's just a routine. Every day, I make sure I find some time to catch footballs. That's just respecting the game. Not only is it going to get me better as a player, I truthfully just want to respect the game as much

as I can.

Q: How many balls are you catching?

A: I catch maybe 100, 150 balls.

Q: Are you standing in front of the JUGS? Or that fancy new one in which you can run routes and it will fire them to a specific spot?

A: The JUGS. I'm stationary and rotate ways three or four times. One round, maybe two rounds, with each. I just want to find things I can do to progress and make myself a better player so I'll be reliable, just like everyone else that's here.

Q: Is it just you?

A: It's just me sometimes. Juwann (Winfree), he's catching footballs — I see him all the time after practice catching footballs. Christian (Watson) and Samori (Toure) and myself, we're either working top of the routes or catching footballs on the JUGS. So, it's not just me. There's a lot of us doing extra stuff.

Q: How long have you been doing that?

A: I forgot when I started. I think I started maybe camp. I don't know. I forgot. Again, I'm just trying to show some humility. Anything I do, there's a reason behind it, and I'm just being myself, being a football player and just being a great person to this community. This is probably the best city to be in. I'm just fortunate and blessed, man. I can't thank God enough, seriously.

Q: Everyone has noted you've taken a professional approach to everything. Where does that come from?

A: You've just got to be able to attack the days that you get, man. Some days, it isn't always going to go your way. You're going to have good, bad and ugly days. I try to not preach that to y'all here or whoever watches this after. I try to make that muscle memory for me

Packers grind out OT win vs. Patriots

Crosby's 31-yard field goal pushes Green Bay to 3-1

A walk-off 31-yard field goal from Mason Crosby clinched a 27-24 victory for the Green Bay Packers over the New England Patriots on Oct. 2 in Green Bay.

On Green Bay's second overtime drive, the Packers marched 50 yards in 12 plays, spanning six minutes and 53 seconds. Receptions from wide receivers Allen Lazard, Randall Cobb and Romeo Doubs led to four straight carries from running back A.J. Dillon to set up Crosby's game-winner.

Once again, Dillon was one of the main focuses of the offense for Green Bay, as the Boston College alum totaled 73 yards on 17 carries. Dillon's running mate Aaron Jones,

logged 110 rushing yards on 16 carries.

Similar to Green Bay's win over the Chicago Bears in week two, the

run game looked to be the featured part of the offense. With Jones and Dillon taking 33 carries out of Green Bay's 35, quarterback Aaron

Rodgers recorded one rush for one yard and rookie Christian Watson recorded one carry for 15 yards.

Watson's lone carry proved to be the starting point for the Packers' offense, as he brought the carry into the end zone to not only score Green Bay's first six points of the game, but also to record his first career touchdown.

Coming into the game, Patriots starting quarterback Mac Jones was ruled out of the game, due to an ankle injury. Backup quarterback Brian Hoyer was subsequently ruled out of the game early, as he suffered a head injury. That set the stage for fourth-round draft selection Bailey Zappe to get his first bit of regular season NFL experience. Zappe went 10-for-15 with 99 yards and a touchdown.

Rodgers, on the other hand, threw for 251 yards and two touchdowns on 21 completions. Rodgers' third quarter touchdown pass to Doubs was his 500th career touchdown, between the regular season and the playoffs. This makes Rodgers the fifth player in NFL history

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to record 500 touchdowns, joining fellow quarterbacks Tom Brady, Peyton Manning, Brett Favre and Drew Brees.

"It's a fun number — that is a lot of touchdowns," said Rodgers. "A lot of different guys involved in that."

New England jumped out to a 3-0 lead, with running back Damien Harris recording 22 yards on the drive. The biggest play of the drive though came when Hoyer hit New England wide receiver Nelson Agholor for 27 yards. On Green Bay's subsequent drive, Rodgers completed a 1-yard pass to Doubs, which he fumbled.

After forcing New England to punt twice in a row, Green Bay finally got on the board with 13 minutes to go in the first half on Watson's rushing touchdown.

After two punts each, the Patriots found themselves marching late in the second quarter. A Rashan Gary sack, fumble and fumble recovery gave the Packers the ball back with just over a minute remaining.

With just 13 seconds left, Rodgers' pass intended for Lazard was intercepted and returned for a touchdown by Patriots corner Jack Jones. This was just Rodgers' fourth

interception returned for a touchdown in his career.

"I have thrown four pick-sixes and at least two of them on that route, so those are frustrating," said Rodgers.

Scoring came quick in the second half, as the Packers marched down the field in 10 plays, culminating in a 20-yard touchdown reception from tight end Robert Tonyan. Jones and Lazard led the way on the drive, recording 29 yards on the ground and 32 yards through the air, respectively.

New England answered, scoring a touchdown of their own, by way of a 25-yard receiving touchdown from Zappe, to go up 24-17 with just over 11 minutes remaining.

Green Bay immediately answered, moving down the field in nine plays. Doubs completed the drive with a 13-yard receiving touchdown.

The Packers' defense then stepped up to end regulation, as they forced New England to punt twice, one due to a Green Bay punt downed at the 2-yard line.

In overtime, the Packers went three and out, before the defense once again forced the Patriots to punt.

Gary was a standout on defense, as he recorded two sacks and seven tackles overall. Gary has now started the year with four straight games with a sack.

"I am just chipping away, day-by-day," said Gary on his hot start to the season. "I am not really paying attention to it. I want to go as a team and as a unit, you know, that is what I am trying to add to."

Following the game, Rodgers spoke on what could be his last career matchup against Patriots head coach Bill Belichick. Rodgers currently has a 2-2 record against

Belichick and the Patriots, with one loss coming after replacing Favre in game in 2006.

"Yeah, it likely is the last time — a lot of respect for Bill, it's nice to beat him — that brings us to 2-1, but I played a lot in '06," said Rodgers. "A lot of respect for Bill, he is a legend and deserves all of the credit that he gets."
