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Packers lose 3 straight for first time since 2018

Packers look to rewrite season against Bills

After losing 23-21 to the Washington Commanders in week seven, the Green Bay Packers have reached unfamiliar territory, something they haven't seen in four years.

The team has now dropped three in a row at the hands of the New York Giants, New York Jets and Washington Commanders, the first time that the team has lost three games in a row since 2018.

After the loss to the Commanders, the Packers sit at just 3-4 on the season, two wins behind the Minnesota Vikings in the NFC North. Regression was expected from the team as a result of the offseason, but three losses in a row has never happened under head coach Matt LaFleur. The team hadn't had two regular season losses under LaFleur until the loss to the Jets.

"It's unfamiliar territory for us, especially under coach LaFleur, so we have to keep putting our heads down working," said running back Aaron Jones.

Players and coaches alike continued to express their belief in the team and the expected outcome of the season. Quarterback Aaron Rodgers even said that the three losses and the pending matchup against the Buffalo Bills are a good thing for the team, as he alluded to the team's current adversity.

"This week, nobody's going to give us a chance," said Rodgers. "Going to Buffalo on Sunday Night Football, a chance to get exposed. Shoot, it might be the best thing for us."

Of course the play of the receivers, the play of the linebackers and the overall team morale has been poor, but Green Bay currently faces its biggest problem of the season, and that is on the offensive line.

On Sunday, rookie Zach Tom received the first start of his career at left tackle, a spot that didn't seem like a concern two years ago. It has become obvious that David Bakhtiari, who fills that spot when healthy, is not progressing the way

that Green Bay had hoped.

Consistently getting the two-time All-Pro back on the field has become a challenge for Green Bay, as Bakhtiari missed the first two games of the season, played in 56% of the snaps or less against Tampa Bay and the Giants, more than 95% of the snaps against New England and the Jets, and then missed the entire game against the Commanders.

The injury forces Green Bay to be flexible on the offensive line, often moving players around to see what fits the best for that week. Tom was the main beneficiary this past week, but Elgton Jenkins was able to slide back to guard, with Yosh Nijman filling that right tackle spot.

While Tom and Nijman played fine by any NFL standard, especially against a good Washington front four, Rodgers knows that having Bakhtiari on the field makes a difference.

"When (Bakhtiari) couldn't go, we adjusted to it, and kind of changed a lot of things around to try and give Zach (Tom) some help, but we're a better team when (Bakhtiari) is out there," said Rodgers.

The Green Bay Packers are undoubtedly in a strange spot in terms of what the future holds. Playoffs do not really feel guaranteed at this point for a team that hasn't really thought about missing the extra games since before LaFleur took over. The upcoming schedule consisting of the Bills, Detroit Lions, Dallas Cowboys, Tennessee Titans and Philadelphia Eagles is going to prove to be a major challenge for Green Bay.

Missing on throws, committing penalties and finishing tackles are just three of the issues that Green Bay will need to clean up if the team figures that it can get its season back on track. The Packers have made their own bed, losing three games that they were favored to win, in preparation for a night game in Buffalo, but that doesn't mean the season is over.

Of the 10 games left on the regular-season schedule, seven of those teams are currently at .500 or better. If the season does in fact take a turn for the better, the tough regular season should prepare the Packers for a run. The players and coaches know that it does not get easier, but that doesn't change the expectation.

"We have to stick together," said Packers defensive tackle Kenny Clark. "We are a family and it's not going to get any easier. We have to go into Buffalo and get a win."

The frustration level is at a high for Packers players, coaches and fans, but as Rodgers had said, this next handful of games will really prove what kind of team Green Bay has.

On the endings of each of the last two games, LaFleur has noted his team's desire to finish playing the game, even if it was out of reach. That culminated in a goal-line stop against the Jets and a last-second, desperation play against the Commanders that looked somewhat promising of scoring a touchdown.

That 60-minute mentality will have to be on display now, as there is no more wiggle room for Green Bay.

If the players and coaches really do believe that this team has what it takes to win a Super Bowl, a productive showing against the best team in the AFC on Sunday night is the first step to turning the season around.

Second half troubles

The Green Bay Packers aren't half-bad. The problem is they're only half-good. And that could mean a full-time headache on Sunday night at the Buffalo Bills.

The slumping Packers enter the primetime showdown having lost three in a row to tumble to 3-4. It's not hard to find an explanation that's a lot more than half-baked.

In week five against the Giants in London, the Packers led 20-10 at halftime but were outscored 17-2 in the second half and lost 27-22.

In week six against the Jets at Lambeau Field, the game was tied 3-3 at halftime but the Packers were outscored 24-7 in the second half and lost 27-10.

In week seven against the Commanders in Washington, the Packers led 14-10 at halftime but were outscored 13-7 in the second half and lost 23-21.

Through the first seven weeks of the season, the Packers are plus-22 in first-half scoring. That's seventh-best in the NFL. However, they're a woeful minus-43 in the second half, the second-worst mark in the NFL.

While the Packers have flailed like a blindfolded kid trying to hit a pinata, the Bills have knocked the candy right out of their opponents. They are a league-best plus-67 in second-half scoring en route to their 5-1 record.

Green Bay's offense, unable to adapt to life without Davante Adams, has scored only five touchdowns in the second half. That unit's struggles are somewhat predictable. The problems on defense, however, are completely unexpected considering the perceived talent on that side of the ball and the preseason hype.

The Giants had three "real" possessions in the second half in which they tried to move the ball. They went field goal, touchdown, touchdown. The Jets had four "real" possessions and went punt, touchdown, touchdown, field goal. The Commanders had four possessions and went touchdown, field goal, field goal before draining most of the remaining 3:26 and punting.

In those 11 possessions, the Packers allowed nine scores.

During the second halves of their seven games, the Packers haven't been able to stop the run (league-worst 34 rushing first downs

allowed) or the pass (30th-ranked 7 yards per attempt).

On Thursday, defensive coordinator Joe Barry said, "I don't think there's anything really to read into that or a trend that's happening." That seemed a ludicrous statement at the time, and especially so in light of what happened on Sunday.

On Sunday, the Commanders drove five plays for 69 yards and the go-ahead touchdown, 16 plays for 72 yards for a field goal and nine plays for 46 yards for the clinching field goal. On the 16-play drive, the

Packers gave up a third-and-11. On the nine-play drive, they gave up a third-and-8. On the final drive that drained most of the clock, they gave up a third-and-9.

Unlike his coordinator, coach Matt LaFleur does see a trend. And it's a big reason why his team is in deep trouble.

"That's something that we looked at and it's definitely the consistency at which we play," he said. "We gave up a lot of third-down conversions in the second half. I think the penalties, we had some situations where

it was second-and-6, we get a TFL, it's about to be third-and-7, we get called for a defensive holding, first down.

"We've got to do a better job of making sure we get all 11 guys on the same page doing their responsibility, because there were some times we had some miscommunication and that stuff, that leads to drive-extending plays and explosive plays, and you can't have it."

Zach Tom saves the day

The Packers spent all last week

getting ready to debut a new offensive line. With David Bakhtiari having started the previous four games, the coaches felt confident enough in their left tackle that they could move his backup, Yosh Nijman, to right tackle.

That allowed them to move Elgton Jenkins, who had started five games at right tackle, back to left guard, where he earned Pro Bowl honors in 2020. Jon Runyan, who had started 22 of a possible 23 games at left guard in 2021 and 2022, shifted to right guard.

It all sounded good until the team reported for its Saturday walk-through before departing for Washington. Bakhtiari's knee — the same one that cost him the end of the 2020 season, most of 2021 and the start of 2022 — wasn't feeling right. The Packers held out hope that he'd be able to play but, following a pre-game workout, he was listed among the inactive.

The Packers stuck with all the line changes and inserted fourth-round rookie Zach Tom into Bakhtiari's slot on about 2 hours' notice.

"It was definitely pretty, 'Woah,'" Tom said on Monday.

The late change led to some last-minute scrambling by LaFleur. Some plays that included one-on-one blocks by Bakhtiari had to be scrapped. Other plays were adjusted.

"Let's just say I was a little bit later getting out to the pregame warm-up than typical, shuffling some things around," LaFleur said. "But it is what it is. In a game, that may happen and that's even more chaotic, but at least you had some time to kind of re-organize some things. Obviously, it didn't necessarily help us. It's not like we were very productive offensively."

According to Pro Football Focus, Tom didn't allow a single pressure in pass protection. There were a lot of quick passes and Tom was given plenty of help. Still, it was a solid starting debut for a promising prospect.

"I think I did all right," he said. "I think there's still some things that I need to get better at — using my hands, that's going to be something I continue to harp on. Overall, I think I did all right."

Big underdogs

The Packers are 10½-point underdogs for Sunday. Previously, an Aaron Rodgers-led team had been an underdog of more than seven points just once: the 2014 opener at Seattle, when they lost 34-14 as 8½-point underdogs.

On paper, this is a huge mismatch. Moreover, the Bills are coming off their bye week. For what it's worth — and it might not be worth anything — the Packers were 6½-point underdogs at undefeated Arizona last season when their top three receivers were inactive but won 24-21.

Dark humor

LaFleur managed one laugh during Monday's 22-plus-minute press conference. It was gallows humor, though. What's the state of the receiver corps with Allen Lazard (shoulder) joining Randall Cobb (ankle; injured reserve) and Christian Watson (hamstring; missed last two games) on the injured list?

That's obviously not ideal under any circumstances, and especially so given the quality of opponent coming up. Buffalo is No. 1 in points allowed, total defense and interception percentage and No. 2 in opponent passer rating.

"It's definitely not where we want it to be in terms of that room, but injuries are a part of this game," LaFleur said. "You've got to adjust, you've got to adapt. It's not the first time. We've gone through this before here. So, we've got to get some guys ready to play. Bottom line."

KEYS TO THE GAME

The Green Bay Packers (3-4) will travel to face the Buffalo Bills (5-1) at 7:20 p.m. on Sunday at Highmark Stadium in Orchard Park, New York. NBC will televise the game.

History

In a series that dates to 1974, the Bills lead 8-5. Appropriately with Halloween coming up, Buffalo has been a house of horrors for the Packers. The Bills are 6-0 at home.

Coaches

Green Bay — Matt LaFleur, 42-14, fourth season. Buffalo — Sean McDermott, 54-33, sixth season.

When the Packers have the ball

The Josh Allen-powered Bills offense gets the hype but it's the Buffalo defense that's the real juggernaut. It ranks No. 1 in points allowed (13.5 per game) and total defense (281.5 per game).

Drilling deeper, it's first in rushing yards per attempt (3.52) and interception percentage (4.85), fourth in sack percentage (9.22) and sixth in yards per passing play (5.98).

In the major categories, the "weak" link is third down, where the Bills are "only" 13th. Buffalo's defense vs. four-time MVP Aaron Rodgers must have seemed like must-see TV for NBC when it was shown its slate of games.

The Bills' base defense is 4-3 but they play almost exclusively out of nickel. Up front, it's future Hall of Famer Von Miller and 2021 first-round pick Greg Rousseau as the ends. The 33-year-old Miller, who ranks first among active players with 121½ sacks, is fifth in the league with six this season. Rousseau has four. They are interchangeable but Miller mostly rushes from the right and against the left tackle. A pair of recent second-round picks, A.J. Epenesa and Carlos Basham, provide quality depth.

At tackle, 2019 first-round pick Ed Oliver and Daquon Jones are the starters and 345-pound Jordan Phillips is the next man in. Oliver is the big name but Jones has been the best player. Phillips had 9½ sacks in 2019.

Matt Milano and Tremaine Edmunds are the primary linebackers. They cover a lot of ground and are active at the line of scrimmage. Edmunds has a team-high 36 tackles. Milano, who is one of the game's most underrated linebackers, has 32 and is second on the team with four passes defended. If the Packers do line up to run the ball, Terrell Bernard is the

third linebacker.

The secondary remains strong, even with former Packers standout Micah Hyde out for the season with a neck injury. Hyde's running-mate at safety, Jordan Poyer, is a fantastic player. He is tied for the NFL lead with four interceptions.

Incredibly, in his first four seasons, Poyer started 10 games. Since joining the Bills in 2017, he's started 83 of a possible 87 games and intercepted 22 passes. Second-year player Damar Hamlin is the other safety.

Dane Jackson and rookie first-

rounder Kaiir Elam are the corners and Taron Johnson mans the slot. Relatively speaking, this is the weakest group. According to Pro Football Focus, Elam has given up a catch rate of 76.9% and Johnson has given up the seventh-most yards after catch of any corner in the NFL. Can the Packers take advantage, though, with Randall Cobb (ankle) on injured reserve and Allen Lazard (shoulder) banged up?

When the Bills have the ball

After almost losing to Patriots rookie Bailey Zappe and then losing to

the Giants' Daniel Jones, the Jets' Zach Wilson and the Commanders Tyler Heinicke, the Packers will have to contend with MVP front-runner Josh Allen.

Allen is a remarkable player. A strong-armed but inaccurate quarterback at Wyoming, Allen ranks seventh in the league with a 66.9% completion rate. He has 17 touchdowns vs. four interceptions and is second in passer rating (109.1) and yards per attempt (8.28). He's also the team's leading rusher with 257 yards, two touchdowns and a 5.5-yard average.

Allen is perhaps the best quarterback in the NFL. His favorite target, Stefon Diggs, is perhaps the best receiver in the NFL. He's caught 49 passes for 656 yards and six touchdowns. Diggs ranks in the top four in those categories even while having a bye last week.

Meanwhile, Gabe Davis is perhaps the most dangerous deep threat in the game. He leads the NFL with 27.4 yards per catch, and his four touchdowns have covered 98, 62, 34 and 26 yards.

The other big-time threat is tight end Dawson Knox. While he's caught only 15 passes in his five games this season, he had 49 grabs for 587 yards and nine touchdowns last year. Slot receiver Isaiah McKenzie has 17 catches for 162 yards and three touchdowns.

Explosive Devin Singletary is the primary running back. He has 256 rushing yards (4.5 average) and is second on the team with 22 receptions (7.6 average). The Bills use something that's rare in today's NFL: a fullback. Reggie Gilliam hasn't carried the ball but he does have seven catches.

The offensive line consists of Dion Dawkins at left tackle, Rodger Saffold at left guard, Mitch Morse at center, Ryan Bates at right guard and Spencer Brown at right tackle.

Special teams

Kicker Tyler Bass is 9-of-11 on field goals. His career-long kick was a 58-yarder in 2020. Less than half his kickoffs have resulted in touchbacks, so Keisean Nixon might get some chances on returns.

Punter Sam Martin has averages of 48.2 yards (gross) and 43.1 (net). Of his 11 punts, only four have been returned for 16 yards. LaFleur said Amari Rodgers could be out as returner after his third fumble of the season last week.

With veteran Jamison Crowder out with a broken ankle, rookie Khalil Shakir is the punt returner. Like the Packers, the Bills are happy to take touchbacks on kickoffs. McKenzie has averaged 24 yards on his three returns.

Q&A WITH LUKE TENUTA

The Packers claimed offensive tackle Luke Tenuta off waivers from the Indianapolis Colts on Oct. 17. He was a sixth-round pick in this year's draft by the Buffalo Bills, so Green Bay is his third team during his rookie season.

Q: What's it like joining a new team during the middle of the season?

A: My pops (Jon Tenuta) was a college coach, so I moved six times as a kid, so you get used to it. Obviously, I didn't have to move in the middle of the fall and I was fortunate enough that I would get to stay through the school year. But I definitely got used to moving as a kid, so you pick up and go and go where the football is.

Q: Is it nice having a familiar face here with Yosh Nijman, who played with you at Virginia Tech?

A: It's awesome. It's just like when he was a senior and I was a redshirt (freshman). I came in and learned from him a lot, so it's the same thing pretty much — getting to learn from him. It's awesome having him right next to me (in the locker room) and for him to

show me around all that stuff.

Q: Funny how it works out, that there was an empty locker right next to him.

A: I came in yesterday, I was like, 'No way!' It was awesome. I think in college I was on the same block as him. Now we're right next to each other. So, it's awesome.

Q: He went undrafted in 2019 and didn't play here until last season. So, is that a playbook you can follow, and have you followed his career?

A: Oh, yeah, definitely. All through college, watching him develop and then get the opportunity last year and then keep building on that, so it's been really cool to watch him.

Q: You mentioned your dad earlier. Your mom played college basketball and both your brothers were college athletes. What was it like growing up in such an athletic home?

A: It was cool. Everyone played sports. My mom and pops played sports at Virginia, and my two older brothers, one played college football and the other one's still a professional baseball player. Sports were everything.

As much as we moved with my pops being a college coach, sports helped us make friends and all that good stuff. So, it was awesome growing up with an athletic, competitive family.

Q: I remember talking to T.J. Watt at the Scouting Combine about growing up with J.J. Watt and Derek Watt and how they fought a lot as kids because they were so competitive. How about you with your brothers?

A: Oh, yeah. It was exactly that. Both my front teeth — most of my teeth — knocked out as a kid because of my brothers.

Q: Seriously?

A: Oh, yeah, them throwing me around. It was awesome, though. Now I'm bigger than them so payback.

Q: Awesome?

A: Yeah, yeah. Them being older than me, I got to hang out with the older kids in the neighborhood and got to play with them, so I always thought it was sweet.

Q: So, who has the bragging rights now?

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Packers lose to Commanders, drop 3rd in a row

Green Bay struggles again on offense

Aaron Rodgers finished the game face down on the turf after sailing a lateral out of bounds on a frantic, failed final play.

This is not exactly what the four-time NFL MVP envisioned when he returned for another season in Green Bay.

Rodgers and the offense sputtered, penalties piled up at the most inopportune moments, and the Packers lost their third game in a row, 23-21 to the Washington Commanders on Oct. 23 in Landover, Maryland, for their longest skid since 2018.

Nursing a sore thumb and out of sync with receivers, Rodgers was 23 of 35 for 194 yards and the Packers went 0 of 6 on third down. Green Bay (3-4) had just 232 total yards of offense to Washington's 364 and lost Allen Lazard to a shoulder injury, making him the team's third wide receiver to go down during the first losing streak under coach Matt LaFleur.

"We just got to play better — all of us," said Rodgers, who taped his throwing hand at halftime after jamming the thumb on a couple of snaps. "There's probably a number of plays in every phase that we could've done better. The margin of error is so tight, a couple calls don't necessarily go our way and we don't execute at all on offense in certain situations. ...

"It's not winning football."

Rodgers is right: The problems were not limited to offense. Amari Rodgers continued his struggles returning punts by muffing one that set Washington up in the red zone, and cornerback Eric Stokes was flagged for a costly illegal contact penalty that wiped out a fumble return touchdown and later for unsportsmanlike conduct.

The negatives outweighed the few positives: a 63-yard pick-6 of Taylor Heinicke by De'Vondre Campbell and two touchdown passes from Rodgers to Aaron Jones — the second of which completed a 75-yard drive aided by Washington penalties that pulled the Packers within two with 3:26 left in the fourth quarter and gave them one final chance to end the skid before falling short.

Playing behind a remade offensive

line without All-Pro left tackle David Bakhtiari, Rodgers struggled to find a rhythm, missing wide-open receivers at times and other times putting the ball in their hands for ill-timed drops. The Packers rushed for just 38 yards.

"We didn't run the ball particularly well, didn't catch it particularly well,

and I didn't really move a whole lot to extend plays until that last drive," Rodgers said.

The Packers had no third-down conversions for the first time since 1999 — 370 games ago with Brett Favre at quarterback and before Rodgers graduated high school. It added up

to the Packers "losing to teams that we feel like we're better than," Jones said, and the losses rarely go like this for a team used to winning.

"Our guys are extremely disappointed," LaFleur said. "I don't think anybody thought we'd be in this spot that we're in right now."

With no blitzing necessary and a basic defensive scheme, Washington's front four also played a role in frazzling Rodgers and making him look more like a rookie than a 38-year-old four-time NFL MVP. Only a series of penalties on the Commanders (3-4) made the game close in the final minutes.

Heinicke, making his first start of the season in place of injured Carson Wentz, threw for two touchdowns and was 20 of 33 for 200 yards after starting 1 of 7 for 14 yards with the interception. One of those TD throws was a perfect pass to Terry McLaurin.

Heinicke also found McLaurin for a 12-yard completion on third-and-9 just before the two-minute warning, sparking "Terry! Terry!" chants from the Commanders fans outnumbered by Packers supporters and helping seal the team's second consecutive ugly victory.
