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Packers beat Bears, take over all-time wins lead

Rodgers salutes Soldier Field in possible last game at Chicago

A win over the Chicago Bears pushes the Green Bay Packers to the winningest franchise in NFL history.

The first matchup in this storied rivalry came in 1921, when the then-Chicago Staleys (a name that would change to the Bears a year later) shut out the Packers 20-0 on the back of a 45-yard touchdown run from Pete Stinchcomb.

Since that game, the rivalry has evolved to include such NFL Hall of Fame players as Walter Payton, Ray Nitschke, Gale Sayers and Brett Favre. While players and championships come and go, one thing has remained constant in the rivalry — Chicago holding the record for most all-time wins in NFL history.

In the offseason, many pointed at the week two matchup between the teams as the game where Green Bay could pass Chicago in all-time wins. Since Chicago won its week one matchup against San Francisco and the Packers lost their week one matchup to Minnesota, that anticipated matchup was delayed. In a divine circumstance, the teams came together in week 13, tied in the all-time NFL win column.

Winning this game puts the Packers at No. 1 all-time in wins, with 787. This is the first time since 1920 that the Bears have not held the record for the most wins — another NFL history-defining chapter in this storied rivalry.

“That’s a pretty cool deal for us to be the all-time winningest franchise,” said Green Bay Packers head coach Matt LaFleur.

Since games continue to be played, this record is not set in stone for Green Bay, and Chicago has a chance to reclaim its spot atop the list in two weeks. Over the next two weeks, Green Bay is on bye and then hosts the Los Angeles Rams at home on Monday night.

The Bears, on the other hand, have a bit more difficult schedule as they match up with Philadelphia, followed by Buffalo. While this record

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may change a couple times over the course of the rest of the season, one thing hasn't changed — Aaron Rodgers owning the Chicago Bears.

In what could be his last appearance at Soldier Field, Rodgers saluted the crowd as he walked off the field with his 24-5 career record against the Bears. In those 29 games, Rodgers has thrown for 6,695 yards (230.9 per game), 64 touchdowns (2.2 per game) and only 10 interceptions (0.3 per game).

“Right now, we’ve flipped the all-time series. We’ve flipped the all-time wins,” said Rodgers. “I’ve had a lot of success against them, so I think in a few years, you look back and you feel pretty good about your contributions to the rivalry.”

Rodgers’ contributions to rivalry have been more than plentiful, as he has hooked up with receivers Randall Cobb, Davante Adams and Jordy Nelson on numerous occasions. A

newcomer seems to have emerged into that list in Christian Watson.

Now, it’s probably not likely that Rodgers is going to spend as much time with Watson against the Bears as the other four players, but in the two games that Watson has played against Chicago, he has recorded 57 receiving yards, 46 rushing yards and two combined touchdowns.

“I definitely had a feel for it — just the intensity of the game. I felt it from the first drive,” said Watson, on what it feels like to play in this rivalry. “Obviously, you feel the fight every single play, and I mean it’s exciting to get any win, but it’s definitely (exciting) to get a win against the Bears and a win against an NFC North opponent.”

In a disappointing season for Green Bay, Rodgers and the Packers proved that they still own the Bears, beating them twice. While Chicago was able to build such a strong lead

in the win column through the 1940s, ’50s, ’70s and ’80s, Favre and Rodgers have done more than enough to swing the rivalry back in Green Bay’s favor.

Overall, the record between the two storied franchises is 105-95. With Chicago seemingly finding its next franchise quarterback in Justin Fields, the Packers may need to act quickly after Rodgers inevitably retires.

Does that include Jordan Love, or do the Packers go a different route? Nobody really knows the answer to that, and it may not be known for the next couple of years.

What is known, though, is that the Packers are 10 games ahead in the head-to-head record and at the top of the all-time wins list, something no team other than Chicago has accomplished since 1920.

Receiver room revamped

The offseason trade of Davante Adams played a big role in the colossal disappointment that has been the Green Bay Packers' 2022 season. How general manager Brian Gutekunst replaced Adams could play a big role in the franchise's quick rebound.

Second-round pick Christian Watson leads all NFL rookies with nine touchdowns, including seven touchdown receptions, on the strength of an astounding four-game stretch of eight touchdowns. Fourth-round pick Romeo Doubs showed plenty of promise before suffering an ankle injury that's essentially cost him the last five games. And, in a smattering of snaps, seventh-round pick Samori Toure has delivered a couple big plays.

"I'm very high on those guys' ceilings and what they could do as a group," Gutekunst said Monday.

Watson has taken the league by storm in one of the most incredible turnarounds imaginable. He infamously dropped a 75-yard touchdown at Minnesota on his first NFL snap in week one. Hamstring issues and a concussion limited him to only 81 snaps the next eight weeks. His season appeared to be going from bad to worse when he dropped his first two targets against Dallas in week 10.

And then came the play that changed everything, a 58-yard touchdown pass that jumpstarted Green Bay's upset win over the Cowboys. He scored three touchdowns vs. Dallas, two vs. Tennessee, one vs. Philadelphia and two vs. Chicago. His eight touchdowns in four games tied Randy Moss' NFL record for most touchdowns in a four-game span by a rookie receiver.

"You've got to give that kid a lot of credit because, obviously, the way the season started, going into camp with the (knee) surgery and then having to miss that time and falling behind because of different injuries and stuff," Gutekunst said. "I think a lot of guys, that would've been it, right? 'Hey, let's get to the next season and see how it goes.'"

"But I give him a lot of credit for not losing faith and not losing his work ethic because, when the opportunities presented themselves, he's made the most of them. I think the thing I'm most proud about

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with Christian right now is he really has a desire to be great and he's not walking around here like he's arrived in any way. I think he truly wants to be the best version of himself that he can be, and he knows there's still a lot of work out there for him."

Gutekunst rolled the dice on Watson in this year's draft. With six receivers off the board in the top 20 picks, he used his first-round picks on linebacker Quay Walker and defensive tackle Devonte Wyatt. At the start of day two of the draft,

he didn't just trade his two second-round picks to select Watson. He traded his second-round picks to the rival Minnesota Vikings.

It's one thing to make a trade. It's another to make a trade with a division foe. Imagine the outcry had Watson been a Year 1 bust while the Vikings got a couple stars. Instead, Watson looks like a future star.

"I always have a sigh of relief when our players do well," Gutekunst said. "I'm not really looking back on all that. I'm just

really happy for the player and for Christian. He's done a heck of a job on his own, fighting through some of these things and just being prepared for his opportunities. It's not easy making it in this league, especially as a young player and coming in with a quarterback who has a standard that is so high. Those guys have been fighting really hard to get to that standard, and to see it come to the other side of it is really nice to see."

There's definitely more room for growth. Despite practically taking up residency in the end zone, he's only caught 15-of-26 targets the past four games. The Packers have to find ways to get the ball into the hands of the rookie with rocket speed and suddenly sure hands.

"Obviously, you want to get your playmakers the ball, and he's done a great job when we've gotten him the ball of making some big-time plays," coach Matt LaFleur said. "We'll continue to look, and I think right now is a great time for us to look at different ways that you can potentially get him the ball, whether it's on those jet sweeps and what else we can build off of that."

"But he is an explosive player, no doubt about it. You've seen it two weeks in a row where he just outruns everybody. He's a guy that you want to give as many opportunities to as possible."

No regrets

This past offseason, Gutekunst could have gone one of two ways. One, he could give quarterback Aaron Rodgers a contract extension to free up salary cap space to make additional moves to fortify a roster that reached NFC Championship Games in 2019 and 2020 and was the No. 1 seed in 2020 and 2021. Or, he could have traded Rodgers and moved forward with Jordan Love.

Gutekunst went with the first option. Going about as all-in as possible by kicking tens of millions of cap dollars into future seasons so he could re-sign linebacker De'Vondre Campbell and cornerback Rasul Douglas and add a few veterans, the Packers seem destined to miss the playoffs after an unprecedented three consecutive seasons of 13-plus wins.

"No regrets. Not at all," Gutekunst said. "Obviously, heading into the season, being the No. 1 seed the last two seasons leading into this season, a lot of high hopes. "We were certainly expected to

be competing for a championship, and we are still in it. If we're able to dig our way back into this thing, we still feel like we have the ability to do that. But this season has not gone as we expected. But I think back then when we made those decisions, certainly, we were looking at a different outcome right now."

Will Bakhtiari be back?

When the Packers signed David Bakhtiari to a four-year, \$92 million contract extension in November 2020, it was a reward to a player who was on his way to first-team All-Pro honors for the second time in his career.

About six weeks later, Bakhtiari suffered a torn ACL at practice. The injury not only derailed Green Bay's run to the Super Bowl but it derailed his brilliant career. He missed almost all of the 2021 season and the start of the 2022 season. When he's played, he's been great. But the knee remains the great unknown. He was a part-time player against the Giants and Lions and a surprise inactive against the Commanders.

Moving forward, Bakhtiari has cap charges of \$29 million in 2023 and \$33 million in 2024. The Packers could move on this offseason

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and create some cap space; he's due a \$9.5 million roster bonus on the third-day of the 2023 league year. Or, they could roll the dice with a premier player at a premium position with the belief that the worst is

behind him.

Gutekunst wouldn't tip his hand on which way he was leaning.

"I thought he played really, really well, and (the knee) was holding up really well, and then just

snakebit with the appendectomy (before the Chicago game) and what he's going through right now," Gutekunst said. "But he's playing at a very, very high level. Left tackles don't grow on trees."

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Love debate heats up as season slips away

With playoff chances dwindling, will team make QB switch?

With a broken thumb, Aaron Rodgers continued to start at quarterback for the Green Bay Packers. With injured ribs, Rodgers started at Chicago.

If/when the Packers are eliminated from the NFC playoff race — they're hanging on by a whisker with a 5-8 record entering their week 14 bye — the Packers could make a call to the bullpen to Jordan Love.

Does Love need to play?

Would it be nice for Love to play?

Will Love play?

General manager Brian Gutekunst, speaking on Dec. 5 during his mandatory, once-per-regular-season news conference, addressed each of those questions.

First, it's the narrative that Love needs to play to show the Packers what he can do both in terms of being the long-term successor at quarterback and for activating the fifth-year option on his contract, a \$19.8 million decision that must be made by May 1.

The team's controversial first-round pick in 2020, Love has gotten substantial playing time in three games in three seasons.

He struggled in a regular-season start at Kansas City when Rodgers was out with COVID in 2021. He struggled while playing with mostly backups in the 2021 finale at Detroit. And he was sharp in relief of Rodgers during the fourth quarter at Philadelphia last month, when he led the team to 10 points in two possessions.

That's not much playing time, but three years of behind-the-scenes work carries a lot of weight in the long-term projection.

"We're really pleased with his progression and what he's been able to do," Gutekunst said. "I think that it would be really good for him, the growth that you need to go through, seeing things for the first time, making those mistakes that you need to make. But I think from our end of it, we've seen what we need to see."

If that sounds like nonsense — can the team really have a strong belief in a player one way or the other without significant playing

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time? — that was the consensus of three personnel executives who talked to Sports Illustrated's Packer Central.

"I'd say that, yes, you'd have some sense of whether a guy has 'it' by then or not," one of them said. "Three years is a good length of time to have a body of work to observe/make a judgment on that. Especially at that position, seeing how he operates daily, how he interacts with guys on and off the

field, how locked in he is during practice and also how successful he is against the starters while running the scout team."

That doesn't mean there wouldn't be upside to getting Love in the lineup. There's no substitute for experience and handling situations in the heat of the moment. The Packers, for instance, knew Rodgers was going to be a successful starter before he replaced an injured Brett Favre at Dallas in 2007.

Rodgers had an up-and-down first season as a starter in 2008 before leading the team to the playoffs in 2009, winning the Super Bowl in 2010 and winning his first MVP in 2011.

"Obviously, we've seen him for three years in practice and doing the things that he's doing," Gutekunst said. "I think there was a stretch here while Aaron's been banged up where he's had a lot of reps with the 1s, which was great

for him. I think it was great for us to see, but it was also just really, really good for him to experience game-planning each week.

"I think quarterbacks got to get into this league, play a bunch of games before they learn how to win, but I do think we feel very confident that Jordan can move the ball, score points and do the things that we ask of our quarterbacks."

Presumably, Rodgers will be in the starting lineup next Monday night against the Los Angeles Rams. After winning again at Chicago on Sunday, he said the thumb was "close to being a nonissue" and the ribs will be "close" to healed following the bye.

But if the Packers lose that game and are officially knocked out of the playoff race, will it be time to give Love those meaningful reps for the final games at Miami on Christmas and at home against Minnesota and Detroit to close the season?

Rodgers has said he'd be willing to step aside "without any bitterness or resentment."

Gutekunst, however, wasn't ready to say Love would get those opportunities.

"I think obviously if we get to that point, we'll kind of look at those things," he said.

"But I think no matter even if we're eliminated from the play-offs which it wouldn't be ideal, we're going to still go out to win the game, and I think that's really important. There's a bunch of guys in that locker room that deserve that, so we're going to go out to win the game and we're going to make the decisions that are in the best interests of us going and winning the game."

Would Gutekunst like to see Love go win a game?

"Sure," he responded. "I mean whoever's playing, you know what I mean? It's one of those things, it's as long as I think whoever gives us the best chance to win needs to be out there. It's only fair to this locker room. That's the way I feel about it. I think Matt (LaFleur) feels the same."

"Again, there's always kind of different ways to look at things, but football's a little bit different game than some others, so we'll make those decisions when we get there and what's best for the football team and going out and winning those games."

Q&A WITH CHRISTIAN WATSON

Having traded Davante Adams, the Packers entered the 2022 NFL Draft in dire need of an impact receiver. Early in the second round, general manager Brian Gutekunst sent his two second-round picks, Nos. 53 and 59, to Minnesota in exchange for pick No. 34, which he used on Watson.

After dropping a 75-yard touchdown pass on his first NFL snap and playing only 81 snaps the next eight games due to injuries, Watson has scored eight touchdowns the last four weeks — tied with Hall of Famer Randy Moss for most in NFL history by a rookie receiver. After scoring two touchdowns at Chicago, here was his postgame interview.

Q: You caught the touchdown pass on fourth down. Even though you missed so much time, do you feel like you have chemistry with Aaron Rodgers?

A: For sure. For sure. I think the more reps I get with 12, the better that chemistry gets. I've got a ways to go personally, in terms of getting to the level that I want to be at, to be able to connect with 12 even more, but I'm still a work in progress.

Q: Do you feel unstoppable? Not every play but that you're too talented to be stopped for too long?

A: I think that's my mindset, for sure. That's the mentality everyone has to have, honestly, when they're out there. When you're going every single play, it's a one-on-one between you and the man across from you. So, I think that's the mentality everyone has out there, and it's definitely the mentality I have, for sure.

Q: Have you thought about what your numbers might be and where this team would be if not for the injuries?

A: Obviously, there's what ifs and stuff like that, but I can't predict any of that. I think that God had a plan for me and it's working out just the way he planned.

Q: You got bragging rights over the Bears. Do you have a feel for the rivalry?

A: For sure. I definitely had a feel for it and just the intensity of the game. I felt it from the first drive. Obviously, you feel the fight every single play, and I mean, it's exciting to get any win, but it's definitely exciting to get a win against the Bears and get a win against an

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NFC North opponent.

Q: What's the feeling of taking the all-time NFL lead with 787 wins?

A: It's exciting. I can only speak for myself but I truly feel blessed to be part of an organization like the Green Bay Packers. Regardless of how the season so far has gone for us, I'm just happy to be part of this organization.

Q: Can you take us through the jet-sweep touchdown? You got past Sammy Watkins and he started celebrating. What's that feeling like?

A: Yeah, to be honest, if I see nothing in front of me, it's looking pretty good. Honestly, that's exactly what I saw: I saw no one. I saw the corner go in with Sammy on his little crack block and I knew if the corner's not coming off there's no one that's going to make the play from the inside.

Q: Was your leap into the end zone planned?

A: No, actually, that was not

planned at all and, when I was in midair, I had no clue what I was doing. So, I've got to come up with something beforehand if I'm going to do something like that because that was definitely not what I was trying to do or planned on doing.

Q: The last four games, you've had 17 touches and eight touchdowns. Have you ever had a stretch like that?

A: I have not. I have not. Not even close, honestly. Obviously, having a run-first team in college, we weren't relying as much on the pass game as we were the run game in college. So, it wasn't expected of me nor were the opportunities always present. But I'm just doing what I can with the opportunities when they come.

Q: Entering the draft, some scouts thought you were really talented but really raw. Have you improved that much during your time or were you pegged as being rawer than you actually were?

A: I think I was definitely pegged as being rawer than I truly was. I definitely feel like I have a lot of growth, a lot of potential, as well. I was in an offense that was really successful at what we did and, if I only needed to run three or four routes for us to be successful and win championships in college, then that's exactly what we were going to do.

But I think there was a lot that scouts or anyone who turned on the tape wasn't able to see out of me just because we didn't need to do that to be successful. So, I think I've been able to continue to prove that I can do more and more than people thought I could do, but I think there's a lot of room for growth, as well.

Rodgers, Packers rally in 4th quarter to beat Bears

Watson scores 2 more touchdowns

Aaron Rodgers figured the Green Bay Packers were in a good spot and would find a way to pull out the win. Given his history against the Chicago Bears, it wasn't exactly a big leap of faith.

Rodgers led three fourth-quarter scoring drives, receiver Christian Watson took an end-around 46 yards for a touchdown in the closing minutes after Jaire Alexander intercepted Justin Fields, and Green Bay rallied to beat Chicago 28-19 on Dec. 4 in Chicago.

The Packers (5-8) looked like they were on their way to another loss after dropping seven of eight. They trailed by 13 in the second quarter and were down 19-10 through three before before outscoring Chicago 18-0 in the fourth on the way to their eighth straight win over their rival.

The Bears (3-10) lost their sixth game in a row.

"There was probably a lot of people that felt good at 19-10," Rodgers said. "So did I."

AJ Dillon ran for a 21-yard touchdown in the opening minute of the fourth. Mason Crosby kicked a 32-yard field goal to give Green Bay a 20-19 lead with just under five minutes left after Chicago's Cairo Santos had a 40-yard attempt blocked.

The Bears drove to the Packers 43 before Alexander stepped in front of a pass intended for Equanimeous St. Brown.

Three plays later, Watson sprinted untouched to the end zone, leaping across the goal line with his arms spread.

The Packers opted to go for 2, and Rodgers completed a pass to Mercedes Lewis, making it 28-19 with 1:51 remaining.

Fields was then intercepted at the Green Bay 5 by Keisean Nixon.

The Bears were left frustrated and vowing to do better after failing to convert late in a game yet again. Chicago has six losses by one score, and this was almost the seventh.

"You have to find ways to close games out," coach Matt Eberflus said. "We're excited about these

next four games to get ourselves in position to do that. We were right there to get that done, and we'll get that done in the future."

Rodgers didn't exactly dominate the Bears. But he showed he still owns them, as he shouted last year toward the crowd at Soldier Field.

Rodgers, who exited last week's loss to Philadelphia with a rib injury and has been dealing with a broken right thumb since early October, improved to 25-5 against Chicago including the playoffs.

The four-time MVP completed 18 of 31 passes for 182 yards and a touchdown.

"He always gives you confidence that we can go out there and execute whatever the play is," coach Matt LaFleur said.

"I thought our o-line was doing a great job and then his ability to extend plays, just have that poise to kind of hang in there and allow those guys to go off schedule and work, gives me a lot of confidence."

Watson had 48 yards receiving and a touchdown reception — the rookie's seventh in the past four games — to go with that huge run. Dillon ran for 93 yards, and the Packers moved ahead of Chicago for the NFL lead in regular-season wins with 787.

"It is crazy and it is awesome to be a part of. Most wins in football at this level, it is really an honor to be part of the Packers and be part of that winning tradition," Dillon said.

The Bears led 19-10 with 1:50 left in the third after Santos kicked a 28-yard field goal. The Packers pulled within two in the opening minute of the fourth on a 21-yard run by Dillon to cap a four-play, 82-yard drive aided by a pass-interference penalty against Jaylon Jones.

Then the Packers blocked Santos' kick to stay within two.

Crosby nailed a 32-yarder to give the Packers a 20-19 lead with 4:49 remaining after Rodgers failed to squeeze a 14-yard pass to Robert Tonyan in the end zone.

Rodgers said his thumb is "close to being a non-issue," and his ribs probably will be, too, for Green Bay's next game in two weeks.

Jones has been a constant presence in the community dating back to his time in high school and college, and especially since coming to Green Bay in 2017. In his six years with the Packers, Jones has jumped at every opportunity to take part in community events.

Having grown up with two parents in the U.S. Army and with other loved ones who have served, causes affiliated with the military are particularly important to Jones. During his time in Green Bay, he's been a big part of the Packers' Salute to Service efforts, from sending videos to veterans to speaking to youth at military academies and taking part in events like the team's Huddle for Heroes aimed at honoring veterans.

He's visited service members in the hospital and visited military bases, including Fort Bliss in his native El Paso. He also devoted his time this year to serving as the team's Salute to Service spokesperson to help honor those who serve their country.

Jones also has been involved with numerous programs and charities that benefit kids. He has attended a variety of events at the Boys & Girls Club, both in Green Bay and in Milwaukee, and he hosts football camps during the

offseason in El Paso and Wisconsin.

Jones also has a special connection with kids battling illnesses, including cancer. He frequently visits children in the hospital or those who are facing health issues, whether in person or over video chat, and has highlighted them and their courage through the My Cause My Cleats campaign.

He has taken his community involvement to the next level in recent years by building upon the work of his foundation, the A&A All the Way Foundation, with his twin brother, Alvin. The A&A All the Way Foundation is dedicated to making an impact in the lives of children through charitable giving and action and executes events that inspire, educate and promote unity and diversity across multiple communities.

The foundation helps address children's basic needs, providing opportunities for recreation and fitness, and supporting children in military families. Through the foundation, Jones has done turkey giveaways for needy

families in both El Paso and Green Bay, run football camps for kids and given bikes away to students.

His Yards for Shoes campaign donates a pair of shoes to children at Boys & Girls Clubs throughout Wisconsin for every rushing yard he gains up to 1,000 yards. The foundation also includes the Freedom Is Campaign, which focuses on honoring military families each month by raising funds to provide joy-filled experiences to children who have parents serving in the military, such as a trip to the zoo or a family movie night.

As a nominee, Jones will wear a Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year helmet decal through the end of the season in recognition of his accomplishments on and off the field.

All 32 team winners will be highlighted as nominees and recognized for their important work during the weekend leading up to Super Bowl LVII. The 2022 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year will be announced during NFL Honors, a primetime

awards special to air the Thursday before Super Bowl LVII, on NBC.

All 32 nominees will receive up to a \$40,000 donation in their name to their charity of choice. The winner of the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year award will receive a \$250,000 donation to the charity of his choice.

For the eighth year, each Walter Payton Man of the Year nominee will also take part in the Charity Challenge, a social media campaign designed to support and promote team nominees.

Fans can vote on Twitter by using #WPMOYChallenge followed by their favorite nominee's last name or Twitter handle. The player whose unique mention is used the most between Dec. 6 and Jan. 8 will receive a \$25,000 contribution to his charity of choice, while the second- and third-place finishers will receive \$10,000 and \$5,000 donations.
