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County Board declares state of emergency

Resolution allows special powers through July 17

OCONTO — The Oconto County Board voted unanimously Thursday to ratify a state of emergency resolution in the wake of what the World Health Organization has described as a pandemic from the novel strain of coronavirus dubbed COVID-19.

County Board Chairman Paul Bednarek had signed the declaration two days earlier on March 17, proclaiming a state of emergency through July

17 enabling the county “to employ and expend all available resources to protect the health, safety and welfare of persons and property in Oconto County.”

The vote was 24-0 to ratify Bednarek’s action, with seven supervisors not in attendance, in a meeting that was moved from the board chambers at the Oconto County Courthouse to the more spacious conference room at the adjacent Law Enforcement Center.

The board also passed a variety of more routine business items, including the election of Brandon Hytinen as the county’s new highway commissioner. Hytinen has been assistant highway commissioner under Pat Scanlan, who last month announced

his retirement from the position effective April 3.

Salaries were set for the next four-year terms of the county clerk, register of deeds and treasurer, who will be elected in the November election.

The resolution – approved 23-1 with Supervisor Gary Frank dissenting – provides a 6.8% increase over the incumbents’ current salaries to \$62,010 in 2021, followed by 2% annual raises for the next three years to \$70,296.01 in 2024.

The board did postpone action on resolutions related to the closeout of the county Revolving Loan Fund and applications for two related Community Development Block Grant projects.

Alleged stalker sentenced to nine months in jail

Judge denies Dietze work-release privileges

OCONTO — A Gillett man awaiting trial on 11 counts of stalking was sentenced last week to nine months in the Oconto County Jail for witness intimidation after authorities said he violated the terms of his bail in a related case.

Randel G. Dietze, 54, formerly of Oconto Falls, was sentenced to one year of probation in June after agreeing to plead no contest to witness intimidation in exchange for dismissal

of sexual assault charges stemming from a 2017 domestic incident.

He was later charged with stalking and bail jumping in connection with the alleged harassment of a witness in the sexual assault case, a friend of the alleged victim, a total of 11 times during 2018. A 12th stalking charge was filed in March 2019 but dismissed after the judge ruled prosecutors did not prove probable cause at a preliminary hearing.

Court records indicate Dietze’s probation was revoked and he was taken into custody after a Feb. 23 incident in which he tailed the witness up U.S. 41-141 northbound from Green Bay into Oconto County, even after she sped up to 85 mph in attempt to get away from him.

She saw Dietze turn on his turn signal when she exited at the Brown

Road overpass, and an officer she had called with her cellphone said the woman was clearly frightened, but Dietze continued up the highway after all, according to the probation revocation and warrant filed with the court.

Dietze claimed he didn’t see who was driving the other vehicle, and it was a coincidence they were on the highway together, the document said.

Judge Michael T. Judge ruled Dietze will not be eligible for Huber Law privileges, under which inmates may be released during work hours to report to a job.

At one point, the stalking case was scheduled to go to trial March 2-6, but it was delayed. The calendar currently shows a motion hearing in the case scheduled for April 17.

Oconto Falls closes city buildings to public

City meetings are canceled until further notice

OCONTO FALLS — The City of Oconto Falls has closed all municipal buildings to the public, until further notice, over concerns about the coronavirus (COVID-19).

These buildings include city hall, police department lobby, Oconto Falls municipal utilities, and the public works building.

All city public meetings are also canceled until further notice.

“At this time, it is our intention to maintain all essential/critical city functions with our employees continuing in their normal capacity, while working within the facilities closed to the public,” according to a press release signed by Mayor Brad Rice. “Residents will see no change in the level of service provided including public safety (Police/Fire/Ambulance), curbside services, etc. The recycling center will remain open to the public during this time.”

Oconto Falls Municipal Courts will remain open on Monday and Wednesday during their normal times.

People with business in the courts are asked to use the north entrance of City Hall to enter the building.

All residents needing to make utility payments to Oconto Falls Municipal Utilities can do so by mailing, placing their payments in one of the

drop boxes located around the city, or by utilizing the online payment portals on the utility website.

The drive-through window at city hall can be used for transactions such as pet licensing, burn permits, boat

launch permits, and garbage bags.

Voter registration and in-office absentee voting will be done by appointment only. Residents wishing to register or vote by absentee ballot should call city hall at 920-846-4505,

ext. 106, to make arrangements.

County needs poll workers for April election

Substitutes sought for workers in their 60s and older

OCONTO — Kim Pytleski, Oconto County Clerk, is calling on residents of Oconto County willing to serve as poll workers for the April 7 election to replace poll workers who are unable to serve due to age or health

concerns from the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

Oconto County has approximately 140 poll workers, known as election inspectors, who serve at polling places. A significant number of them are in their 60s, 70s and 80s, and many might have other health conditions.

“If you are a state, county or municipal employee, a teacher, a student or someone who is looking for temporary work, we need your help,” Pytleski said.

In Wisconsin, election inspectors are appointed at the municipal level.

Anyone who is interested in working should contact the clerk's office immediately.

Wisconsin law also allows people to serve as election inspectors in other municipalities within their county. If you are willing to serve in a municipality outside of your own, let your clerk know and they can alert the county about your availability. You can also contact the county directly and can find contact information for county clerks at <https://elections.wi.gov/clerks/directory>.

Municipal clerks will provide

training for any new election inspectors before the election.

The Wisconsin Elections Commission and the Wisconsin Department of Health Services are working to provide local election officials with guidance for ways to conduct the election safely and securely.

Voter turnout at the polling place is expected to be much lower than normal, but workers are still needed to process a much higher number of absentee ballots than normal.

Patients are allowed to have 1 symptom-free support person

OCONTO FALLS — Hospital Sisters Health System has adjusted its no-visitors policy at its eastern Wisconsin hospitals, including HSHS St. Clare Memorial Hospital in Oconto Falls.

Visitors are not allowed at any of the hospitals until further notice. The

new and only exception to this policy allows for one approved adult visitor, who is free of cold or flu symptoms, for the duration of a patient's stay under the following circumstances:

- Obstetrical patients may have one support person.
- Pediatric patients under the age of 18 may have one parent or guardian present.
- Patients nearing end-of-life may have one support person; extenuating circumstances will be evaluated.
- Outpatient services patients should ask their support person to wait in the car until their service is complete.
- Patients having surgery may have one support person.
- Patients seeking emergency care may have one support person who is

required to be in the patient room at all times; extenuating circumstances will be evaluated.

HSHS said it is imperative to make these changes for the safety of all patients and hospital staff to reduce the risk of infection and to preserve important health care resources during this public health emergency.

Hospital officials encourage the use of phone calls, text or video chat if available.

WIAA board cancels annual meeting, postpones decision on spring sports seasons

STEVENS POINT — The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Board of Control voted to cancel the 2020 annual meeting and to delay making a determination on the continuation or cancellation of the spring sports seasons and tournaments at a special meeting today.

Responding to a report by the chair of the WIAA sports medical advisory committee, the board exercised its authority to make emergency decisions afforded by the

membership's constitution to cancel the annual meeting scheduled for April 22. The decision is in response to the concern and efforts to prevent and control the spread of the infectious disease COVID-19.

The amendments to the membership's constitution, bylaws and rules of eligibility advanced to the annual meeting for a membership vote will be tabled and addressed at the annual meeting in April 2021. The WIAA's financial report and discussion of old and new business will be conducted

at the 2020 Area Meetings in the fall.

Given the directives of Gov. Tony Evers and the Department of Health Services, and after lengthy discussion, the board decided to postpone any decision to cancel the spring sports seasons and the spring state tournament series until a later date. This position is consistent with the current state and local guidelines, as well as advice from the sports medical advisory committee. A clearer position may unfold as developments arise and new information becomes

available.

The board discussed bringing closure to the 2020 winter seasons as result of the cancellations of the Boys and Girls State Basketball Tournament Series. It determined how teams and athletes will be recognized in accordance with their advancement to the various levels of the tournaments.

The board also voted to authorize the WIAA executive director to access the WIAA financial reserves to navigate through the remainder of the 2019-20 fiscal year.

In-person portion of spring hearings canceled due to virus

Public input can be made online

MADISON — In light of COVID-19, the Wisconsin Conservation Congress and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources are canceling the in-person portion of the 72 spring hearings that were to be held in each county on April 13.

The public will continue to have the opportunity to provide input on the natural resources advisory questions from the DNR, Natural Resources Board and WCC through the online input option.

The online input option will be provided through a link that will be posted on the spring hearing page and will go live at 7 p.m. April 13. The online version will remain open for three days (72 hours). Results will be posted as soon as they are available.

Each year, citizens can recommend changes to natural resource issues through the submittal of citizen resolutions. In addition, two of the

five WCC seats in each county are up for election.

Resolutions can either be emailed to springhearinginfo@wisconsin.gov or mailed to Kari Lee-Zimmermann, Conservation Congress liaison, P.O. Box 7921 WCC/4, Madison WI 53707-7921. All citizen resolutions must be received by close of business on April 6. Resolutions must also meet the requirements identified on the spring hearing webpage.

Those who complete the online input form (April 13-16) will be able to see the resolutions that were submitted by individuals indicating they reside in that county.

"This is an unprecedented time in history and I'm glad that we have the online option so that we can continue to gather input on these important natural resource questions," said Dr. Fredrick Prehn, chair of the Natural Resources Board.

Information about the spring hearing questions can be found on the DNR website (search keywords "Spring Hearings").

"The recent implementation of

online voting allows the WCC and its delegates the opportunity to vote without having to appear in person. Following the guidelines from state and federal agencies, members will still have the opportunity to let their voices be heard when it comes to conservation issues," said Larry Bonde, chair of the Wisconsin Conservation Congress.

County residents have the option to run for a seat on the Conservation Congress and to elect delegates from their county to represent their county views regarding natural resources on the Conservation Congress. Also, individuals can bring forth new conservation issues of a statewide nature to the attention of the Conservation Congress through the citizen resolution process.

"As far as the delegate elections go, we will be extending the terms of each of the WCC delegates by one year," said Bonde. "If a current delegate no longer wishes to serve, the seat will become vacant and the county chair can appoint someone to fill the remainder of the term."

Packers Hall of Fame Inc. postpones 50th induction banquet

GREEN BAY — The 50th Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame Induction Banquet, originally scheduled to be held on April 18, has been postponed as part of the collective effort to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

Tom Konop, president of the Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame Inc., made the announcement March 17.

The hall of fame is a nonprofit corporation independent of the Green Bay Packers that guides the hall as a historic national sports venue and educational resource to the Green Bay community and the state of Wisconsin. The hall raises funds through its annual induction banquet, golf classic and other events to preserve the history of the Green Bay Packers and expand its archives.

Originally established in 1967 as a temporary display in the concourse of the Brown County Veterans Memorial Arena, the Packers Hall of Fame moved into its own facility in 1976 near Lambeau Field. In 2003, it was relocated to the lower level of the Lambeau Field Atrium, and it was closed in November 2013 for renovations. The Packers Hall of Fame reopened in August 2015, and is now located on the main floor of the Atrium across from 1919 Kitchen & Tap.
