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No contest plea entered in fatal narcotics case

Reckless homicide charge modified in plea agreement

An Oconto County woman who had been charged with first-degree reckless homicide in connection with a man's heroin overdose has pleaded no contest to the manufacture and delivery of narcotics in Marinette County Circuit Court.

Chasity Denny, 30, is one of two people who had been charged with first-degree reckless homicide in the Feb. 17, 2019, fentanyl overdose of Terry Westphal of Pound.

She is currently serving three years at Taycheedah Correctional Institution in Fond du Lac, to be followed by three years of extended supervision, for the manufacture and delivery of heroin. Judge Michael T. Judge recently denied a motion to modify the sentence.

An Oconto County jury found her guilty of drug trafficking but not guilty of first-degree reckless homicide in the death of Jeffrey Dean Pecha on Sept. 12, 2018.

Two weeks after the Oconto County jury found her not guilty, Marinette County officials charged Denny and co-defendant Brian Blasing in Westphal's death.

During a Sept. 23 plea hearing, Marinette County District Attorney DeShea Morrow introduced an amended complaint that withdrew the reckless homicide count

Denny pleaded no contest to the new charge and a separate charge of manufacturing and delivering cocaine. Morrison scheduled sentencing for Feb. 12 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

In Oconto County, Denny's attorney last week filed a notice of appeal over Judge's decision not to modify her sentence. The motion had argued that Judge improperly considered the actions of Denny's significant others, actions of her own for which she was never charged, and the homicide charge of which the jury had found her not guilty.

Judge categorically denied the latter two allegations but conceded he was concerned that Denny had been romantically involved with three individuals who were involved with drug crimes and fueled her addiction.

"This court sentenced the Defendant to prison of initial confinement for three years because it was

against Denny and substituted the charge of manufacturing and delivering narcotics. Judge James A. Morrison agreed the new charge was "in the best public interest."

concerned about this Defendant's rehabilitation," Judge wrote in his decision denying the defense motion.

He noted that Denny herself acknowledged that being held in the Oconto County Jail, awaiting trial, had kept her clean.

"I feel that being incarcerated has saved my life, and I'm now on the road to recovery," she told a pre-sentence investigator.

When sentencing Denny, Judge said her interests are best served by getting treatment for her addictions in the prison system. He granted her access to the prison's substance abuse program, which allows for possible early release upon completion.

Three years "was the minimum amount of time the Defendant needs to get a grip on her addiction to methamphetamines, to complete her (high school equivalency diploma), and obtain work skills so that she can be a productive member of our society," Judge wrote.

Blasing, meanwhile, is scheduled for an Oct. 15 status conference in Oconto County Circuit Court and a Nov. 9 status conference in Marinette County Circuit Court. He is still awaiting trial on reckless homicide charges in both counties.

New trial sought in child sex assault case

A Pound man convicted of repeated sexual assault of the same child is asking for a new trial, saying that the defense was never told about potential credibility issues involving two key prosecution witnesses.

An Oconto County jury convicted Tyler Readman, 45, in January, but found him not guilty of a related misdemeanor charge of fourth-degree sexual assault, regarding incidents at his Suring business.

During a Sept. 23 motion hearing, one of the witnesses from the trial testified that she heard two other witnesses talking in the hallway with a third person during a break. One said she wasn't sure what to say on the stand and the third person said, "Don't worry, I'll tell you later."

The witness said she told a court security officer what she had heard, and the officer said he would inform District Attorney Edward Burke Jr. that someone was coaching a wit-

ness in the corridor.

Defense attorney Nicole Masnica then called Burke to the stand, and the DA said he told the officer to pass the information on to then-defense attorney Rick Meier.

Masnica said the defense never heard about the incident, quoting Meier as saying, "If I'd heard about this, I would have done something."

"Attorney Burke knowingly withheld impeachment evidence concerning the credibility of two of its complaining witnesses and used the non-disclosure to his advantage during his questioning of witnesses and closing statement," Masnica wrote in a brief filed Oct. 2.

She is asking Judge Michael T. Judge to vacate the verdict, order a new trial, and remove Burke as the prosecuting attorney at the new proceeding. Burke has until Oct. 16 to submit a written response. Judge has scheduled a Dec. 11 hearing during which he will set a new trial date or sentence Readman, depending upon his ruling on the motion.

Panther Path completion latest success for school district, hospital, chamber

Eight years of cooperation among educators, businesses and the school district have led to progress in developing a walking trail system in the city of Oconto Falls.

The progress was celebrated Sept. 30 when a ribbon-cutting ceremony was held for a 1,500-foot segment that essentially completes a loop around the campus that includes Oconto Falls High School, Oconto Falls Elementary School, the school district office and ST Paper Stadium.

"We've been working on this for about eight years," said Jerry Moynihan, the schools' activities and athletic director. "It's an example of the community coming together."

Results have included the Panther Path, new sidewalks down South Main Street down to HSHS St. Clare Memorial Hospital, and improvements to the West Side Trail, a pathway through the woods adjacent

to West Side Beach.

Originally a project between the school district and hospital, the fundraising efforts got a boost when the Oconto Falls Area Chamber of

Commerce joined the effort and established the Run For The Trails, a run/walk event with 5K, 10K and half-marathon routes.

"Especially in these times, there's

no better way to relax than to turn off social media and get out and enjoy the outdoors," Moynihan said.

Gail Yatso, chamber president, said the Run For The Trails, held Sept. 26, incorporated parts of the various trails in its routes.

"We had mostly non-local participants, and all those out of towners just raved about Oconto Falls and our trails," Yatso said. "I'm very proud of our community; they really enjoyed it."

David Lally, director of business development and advocacy for HSHS hospitals in eastern Wisconsin, said access to physical activity is still one of the top needs identified by survey respondents in the recent community health assessment, and he praised the "community momentum" toward that goal in Oconto Falls.

St. Clare President and CEO Chris Brabant added that the new sidewalks have enhanced the safety of students walking to the schools.

Proceedings of Sept. 30

Bond was set at \$10,000 cash for Tyler J. Klempke, 20, Crivitz, after he was charged with two counts of second-degree recklessly endangering safety and possession of a firearm by a person convicted of a felony, as well as misdemeanor disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Sept. 25. His initial appearance was adjourned until Oct. 15.

A Feb. 3 jury trial was scheduled for Alexander Louis Boatright, 22, Maple Grove, Minnesota, who faces a charge of tampering with a GPS tracking device, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Jan. 8. A final pre-trial conference was set for Jan. 25.

Proceedings of Sept. 29

William J. Matchopatow, 32, Keshena, pleaded guilty to a charge of sex registry violation, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Aug. 24, 2019. Judge Michael T. Judge scheduled sentencing for Dec. 8 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

Knoerzer, 36, Oconto Falls, who faces charges of child abuse-intentionally causing harm and strangulation-suffocation, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred June 30, 2019. A final pre-trial conference was scheduled for March 15.

Ades, 58, Oconto, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and pleaded not guilty to a charge of bail jumping, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred July 8 while awaiting trial on charges of attempted second-degree sexual assault, strangulation and suffocation, possession of methamphetamine, maintaining a drug trafficking place, and misdemeanor disorderly conduct and possession of drug paraphernalia, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred May 24. After a preliminary hearing Daniel Duran Rockman, 25, Gillett, was bound over and pleaded not guilty to intentionally subjecting an individual at risk to abuse with a likelihood of causing bodily harm, and misdemeanor bail jumping, disorderly conduct, and resisting or obstructing an officer, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Sept. 5. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for Nov. 12.

Proceedings of Sept. 25

After a preliminary hearing, Nathan John Lloyd, 20, Waupaca, was bound over on a charge of second-degree sexual assault of a child, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred April 25. Arraignment was scheduled for Oct. 15.

A charge of battery to a police officer was dismissed without prejudice against Kourtney Miranda Garcia, 24, Oconto, and she pleaded not guilty to misdemeanor charges of resisting or obstructing an officer and disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred July 20. A pretrial conference was scheduled for Oct. 15.

Shawnee Marie Chapman, 26, Lac du Flambeau, waived her right to a preliminary hearing on charges of possession with intent to deliver heroin and misdemeanor possession of drug paraphernalia, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Aug. 10. She stood mute and a not guilty plea was entered on her behalf; a pretrial conference was scheduled for Oct. 15.

Proceedings of Sept. 24

Bailey John Skrobel, 23, Green Bay, was sentenced to three years in prison, followed by three years of extended supervision, for possession of a firearm by a felon in connection with an incident that occurred Dec. 5. Judge Michael T. Judge ruled that after two years, Skrobel may be eligible for the Substance Abuse Program, which allows for early release if he successfully completes the program. Upon release, he must maintain absolute sobriety, have no contact with anyone who uses or sells illegal drugs or drug paraphernalia and complete and follow through on any assessments and treatment deemed appropriate by the Department of Corrections.

A bench warrant was authorized for Jacquelyn Marie Kummerer-Braun, 29, Green Bay, after she failed to appear

for a preliminary hearing on charges of attempted vehicle theft and misdemeanor counts of resisting or obstructing an officer and theft of movable property, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Aug. 25.

Robert J. Haanpaa, 33, Marinette, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and pleaded not guilty to possession of methamphetamine (second and subsequent offense), in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Aug. 10. A further plea hearing was scheduled for Oct. 5.

Judge Michael T. Judge approved a motion to reduce bail to \$5,000 cash for Christopher G. Judge ordered that Halase maintain absolute sobriety and that any firearms be removed from his residence, among other conditions of bail. A preliminary hearing was scheduled for Oct. 7.

A bench warrant was authorized for Sarah E. Stoneburner, 34, Oconto Falls, after she failed to appear for a plea and sentencing hearing on two counts of fraud against a financial institution, in connection with incidents that allegedly occurred Jan. 11 and Feb. 8.

An April 7-9 jury trial was scheduled for Joshua J. Young, 27, Oconto, on charges of second-degree recklessly endangering safety and child abuse, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Oct. 1, 2019. A final pretrial conference was scheduled for March 26.

Jason Kenneth Curtis, 25, Oconto, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and was bound over on a charge of taking and driving a vehicle without the owner's consent, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred May 28. Arraignment was scheduled for Nov. 12.

Kyle Andrew Collins, 32, Shawano, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and pleaded not guilty to possession with intent to deliver amphetamines, possession with intent to deliver heroin and bail jumping, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred July 23. A pretrial conference was scheduled for Oct. 15.

Mackenzie E. Lee, 26, Three Lakes, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and pleaded not guilty to possession with intent to deliver heroin, bail jumping and misdemeanor possession of drug paraphernalia, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Aug. 10. Twenty-one related charges were dismissed but read into the record. Judge Michael T. Judge ordered Ahnen to pay \$40,425 in restitution and maintain absolute sobriety during probation, and she must comply with any treatment/assessment and any resulting recommendations made by the Department of Corrections.

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No contest plea entered in fatal narcotics case

Reckless homicide charge modified in plea agreement

An Oconto County woman who had been charged with first-degree reckless homicide in connection with a man's heroin overdose has pleaded no contest to the manufacture and delivery of narcotics in Marinette County Circuit Court.

Chasity Denny, 30, is one of two people who had been charged with first-degree reckless homicide in the Feb. 17, 2019, fentanyl overdose of Terry Westphal of Pound.

She is currently serving three years at Taycheedah Correctional Institution in Fond du Lac, to be followed by three years of extended supervision, for the manufacture and delivery of heroin. Judge Michael T. Judge recently denied a motion to modify the sentence.

An Oconto County jury found her guilty of drug trafficking but not guilty of first-degree reckless homicide in the death of Jeffrey Dean Pecha on Sept. 12, 2018.

Two weeks after the Oconto County jury found her not guilty, Marinette County officials charged Denny and co-defendant Brian Blasing in Westphal's death.

During a Sept. 23 plea hearing, Marinette County District Attorney DeShea Morrow introduced an amended complaint that withdrew the reckless homicide count

Denny pleaded no contest to the new charge and a separate charge of manufacturing and delivering cocaine. Morrison scheduled sentencing for Feb. 12 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

In Oconto County, Denny's attorney last week filed a notice of appeal over Judge's decision not to modify her sentence. The motion had argued that Judge improperly considered the actions of Denny's significant others, actions of her own for which she was never charged, and the homicide charge of which the jury had found her not guilty.

Judge categorically denied the latter two allegations but conceded he was concerned that Denny had been romantically involved with three individuals who were involved with drug crimes and fueled her addiction.

"This court sentenced the Defendant to prison of initial confinement for three years because it was

against Denny and substituted the charge of manufacturing and delivering narcotics. Judge James A. Morrison agreed the new charge was "in the best public interest."

concerned about this Defendant's rehabilitation," Judge wrote in his decision denying the defense motion.

He noted that Denny herself acknowledged that being held in the Oconto County Jail, awaiting trial, had kept her clean.

"I feel that being incarcerated has saved my life, and I'm now on the road to recovery," she told a pre-sentence investigator.

When sentencing Denny, Judge said her interests are best served by getting treatment for her addictions in the prison system. He granted her access to the prison's substance abuse program, which allows for possible early release upon completion.

Three years "was the minimum amount of time the Defendant needs to get a grip on her addiction to methamphetamines, to complete her (high school equivalency diploma), and obtain work skills so that she can be a productive member of our society," Judge wrote.

Blasing, meanwhile, is scheduled for an Oct. 15 status conference in Oconto County Circuit Court and a Nov. 9 status conference in Marinette County Circuit Court. He is still awaiting trial on reckless homicide charges in both counties.

New trial sought in child sex assault case

A Pound man convicted of repeated sexual assault of the same child is asking for a new trial, saying that the defense was never told about potential credibility issues involving two key prosecution witnesses.

An Oconto County jury convicted Tyler Readman, 45, in January, but found him not guilty of a related misdemeanor charge of fourth-degree sexual assault, regarding incidents at his Suring business.

During a Sept. 23 motion hearing, one of the witnesses from the trial testified that she heard two other witnesses talking in the hallway with a third person during a break. One said she wasn't sure what to say on the stand and the third person said, "Don't worry, I'll tell you later."

The witness said she told a court security officer what she had heard, and the officer said he would inform District Attorney Edward Burke Jr. that someone was coaching a wit-

ness in the corridor.

Defense attorney Nicole Masnica then called Burke to the stand, and the DA said he told the officer to pass the information on to then-defense attorney Rick Meier.

Masnica said the defense never heard about the incident, quoting Meier as saying, "If I'd heard about this, I would have done something."

"Attorney Burke knowingly withheld impeachment evidence concerning the credibility of two of its complaining witnesses and used the non-disclosure to his advantage during his questioning of witnesses and closing statement," Masnica wrote in a brief filed Oct. 2.

She is asking Judge Michael T. Judge to vacate the verdict, order a new trial, and remove Burke as the prosecuting attorney at the new proceeding. Burke has until Oct. 16 to submit a written response. Judge has scheduled a Dec. 11 hearing during which he will set a new trial date or sentence Readman, depending upon his ruling on the motion.

Panther Path completion latest success for school district, hospital, chamber

Eight years of cooperation among educators, businesses and the school district have led to progress in developing a walking trail system in the city of Oconto Falls.

The progress was celebrated Sept. 30 when a ribbon-cutting ceremony was held for a 1,500-foot segment that essentially completes a loop around the campus that includes Oconto Falls High School, Oconto Falls Elementary School, the school district office and ST Paper Stadium.

"We've been working on this for about eight years," said Jerry Moynihan, the schools' activities and athletic director. "It's an example of the community coming together."

to West Side Beach.

Originally a project between the school district and hospital, the fundraising efforts got a boost when the Oconto Falls Area Chamber of

Commerce joined the effort and established the Run For The Trails, a run/walk event with 5K, 10K and half-marathon routes.

no better way to relax than to turn off social media and get out and enjoy the outdoors," Moynihan said.
