1976 double-murder trial scheduled next July

A key motions hearing is set for Jan. 29

A Lakewood man is back on course to stand trial for a 1976 double murder in Marinette County after being ruled competent to assist in his own defense.

Raymand L. Vannieuwenhoven, 83, is charged with two counts of first-degree murder in connection with the shooting deaths of David Schuldes, 25, and Ellen Matheys, 24, at the McClintock Park campground in the Town of Silver Cliff in July 1976.

The case went unsolved for more than 40 years until, investigators say, DNA found with Matheys' body was positively matched to Vannieuwenhoven in early 2019.

He had been held since spring at Mendota Mental Health Institution near Madison, where psychologist Anna Garcia determined in June that he was not able to assist in his own defense but had the potential to become competent again with treatment.

Garcia more recently found Vannieuwenhoven has recovered to a point where the trial could proceed, prompting the defense to bring in psychologist Kevin Miller of Green Bay for a second opinion.

Miller's report also found the defendant competent to continue. During a Nov. 4 hearing in Marinette County Circuit Court, attorney Travis Crowell told Judge James A. Morrison that the defense would not contest Miller's conclusions.

Morrison asked Vannieuwenhoven directly if he thinks he's competent to stand trial, and the response was, "Yeah."

"All right," the judge said, "So it

seems to me that you think you are, your doctors both think you are, the state thinks you are and your lawyers. So who am I to say they're all wrong? I'm going to find that you are competent to proceed in this case going forward."

Morrison said the defendant will now remain at the Marinette County Jail, having been released from Mendota, and he reinstated bail at \$1 million cash. Crowell said the defense does intend to file a bail modification motion. Motions must be filed by Dec. 2, with replies due Dec. 16 and a motion hearing Jan. 29.

A two-week jury trial has been scheduled beginning July 19, with a final pretrial conference June 22.

Crowell's co-counsel, Lee Schuchart, told Morrison he has done some case-law research regarding potential challenges to investigators' searches but would like to file a more complete brief after the evidentiary hearing in January.

"I would still like to file a motion ahead of time to have the hearing, so I'd put everybody on notice as to what the issues are, but then I would like to have the evidentiary hearing and then a briefing schedule after that," Schuchart said.

Special prosecutor Mark Williams, who is working on the case with District Attorney DeShea Morrow, said he agreed that it would be helpful to be able to file written briefs after the motion hearing.

"I have no problem giving both of you the opportunity to write briefs to basically argue how the facts fit into the law as the facts have been shown at the hearing," Morrison said. "But I don't want to come in here on the 29th and have either side get ambushed by the position of the other ... so you've got to tell us what the challenge is by

Dec. 2."

At Schuchart's request, Morrison also asked prosecutors to submit a preliminary witness list by Dec. 2, including any experts who would be interpreting the autopsy report, which was conducted in 1976 by a pathologist who has since passed away.

Both sides said they planned to introduce motions. While the defense may challenge aspects of the search, prosecutors are preparing a motion to allow testimony regarding past actions by the defendant that might show a proclivity to commit the murders.

As the hearing drew to a close, Morrison addressed about a half-dozen members of the victims' families who attended the session, especially with regard to the length of time the case is taking, with a trial scheduled more than two years after the original arrest.

"This is a very complicated case," Morrison said. "It requires state-of-the-art, scientific evidence and actions that are claimed to have occurred decades ago. ... There's a lot of work on the part of the attorneys to try to get their arms around all those facts."

COVID-19 concerns have limited the amount of resources available, he added.

"We have one courtroom in this courthouse that the county has built for us specifically to be able to try cases in a large enough courtroom so that we can socially distance," Morrison said. "I've no idea how long COVID's going on, but we have to assume that it's going on for a while yet."

The judge said no one is trying to slow down the process.

"I know it's burdensome to everybody involved — the victim's families, and the defendant and his family and certainly the court system," he said. "Nobody here is doing anything to slow-walk this case, I assure you."

Students back in class with stringent precautions

Oconto Falls School District officials monitoring COVID numbers carefully

Oconto Falls students went back to in-person school on Monday, with officials doing their best to balance concerns about a local COV-

ID-19 surge with educational needs.

Public health officials logged more than 30 new positive tests for coronavirus every day in Oconto County through the first nine days of November, and more troubling, deaths from COVID-19 were on the

rise. After logging only four fatal cases in the county from March through September, another 15 people have died since mid-October.

Oconto Falls started the year with a four-day school week, with students coming to class on Mon

day, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, and Wednesdays set aside for virtual instruction and deep-cleaning of buildings.

With the numbers rising, the district spent four weeks in all-digital learning, resuming the four-day face-to-face model this week. All along, internal data has shown that with stringent restrictions in place, COVID-19 spread has been less evident in the schools than in the community at large.

Superintendent Dean Hess told the board the main reason for coming back was that students learn more effectively when they're in class. He acknowledged that the Centers for Disease Control recommends severe restrictions when community spread amounts to 200 cases per 100,000 population, and the Oconto County rate as of Monday was 1,317 cases per 100,000.

"If we utilized the core indicators of the CDC, we wouldn't be coming back face-to-face," Hess said. "The feedback that we got from a majority of the people that we serve and from you, the board, was to use more internal data. When we

look at the positive cases that (the schools) have as well as the number of quarantines that we have, those numbers are less than we're seeing in the community, but they're still very concerning; hence why we did go virtual for a period of time."

Hess said the challenge for educators and the community at large is to find a balance between safety needs and educational needs. That's why the district crafted the current plan, which is to meet face-to-face for two weeks in November and December, with two-week hybrids of virtual learning and holiday breaks centered around Thanksgiving and Christmas.

"This isn't the perfect plan. There's no blueprint right now for addressing the kind of situations that we find ourselves in," he said. "There are people who are coming together and taking a look at what truly are conflicting priorities. You try to figure out what's the most safe environment for the students, and that probably isn't the same environment that's most conducive to their learning."

Noting that young people are

not only involved in school but also outside in the community, Hess thanked parents and students who are exercising caution during the current days of significant community spread.

"I will say to parents and community members, we greatly appreciate anything that you're doing to try to mitigate that risk within your family or within your groups that you socialize with," Hess said. "Anything that anybody can do relative to each of our choices will have a positive impact on us trying to sustain face-to-face learning as much as we can."

He acknowledged that he fields emotional comments both from parents who want their kids in the classroom and those who are concerned for their children's health, and he urged those parents to recognize that each side of that debate wants the best for the young people.

"Anybody that's in education recognizes that our ability to work with kids face-to-face is critical. Not every student is going to engage in a virtual environment in a similar manner," Hess said. "Everybody's

passionate about this topic, whether you're a parent, a student, an educator, a support staff member, board members, it doesn't matter, everybody that's involved in this, you've invested of yourself toward betterment of students."

The school board addressed several other pandemic-related proposals during Monday's meeting. They approved proceeding with middle- and high-school athletics with stringent safety precautions in place and accepted a recommendation to postpone the biannual trip to Spain for students in the Spanish language program, which had been planned for spring 2021.

The high-school sports arrangements include shortening the girls and boys basketball seasons by three weeks and eliminating multi-team wrestling tournaments. Wrestlers may only wrestle once every seven days and must shower immediately after each match. Spectators are limited to two to four family members per athlete.

Abrams theater slated for \$7K federal grant

CARES Act dollars are supposed to cover pandemic-related losses

Abrams Spotlight Productions Inc. is one of 385 community organizations to be awarded a COVID-19 Cultural Organization Grant from the state Department of Administration.

The community theater group is in line for a \$7,004.97 grant, according to the announcement made last week by Gov. Tony Evers' office.

The grants, part of Wisconsin's allocation through the federal CARES Act, are designed to help nonprofit organizations whose primary mis-

sions are to produce, present or exhibit cultural disciplines such as music, dance, theater, literature and the visual arts, or items of environmental or scientific interest. "Just like small businesses, cultural organizations have taken a major financial hit," DOA Secretary Joel Brennan is quoted as saying in the Evers press release. "We're all in this

together. We hope that these funds will make it possible for us to be able to enjoy the museums, theaters and music from these organizations once it is safe to do so again."

Abrams Spotlight Productions is based in the Byng Community Theater in Abrams. Lockdowns and regulations ordered by Evers forced the troupe to cancel its 2020 season, which was to include performances of "My Fair Lady" and "Elf the Musical."

Announcement of the grant is "not a contractual commitment," according to the notice sent to the

grant recipients.

"Following receipt of this notice, the recipients identified in the award table will be contacted by the state to formalize a contractual commitment. Grant awards are contingent upon successful negotiations and the state's determination of its best interests. The state remains the sole determinant of its best interests," the notice states. "All program costs and grant agreements must adhere to applicable state statute, the program grant announcement, CARES Act provisions and guidance from the U.S. Department of the Treasury."

Four held in methamphetamine bust

Suspects arrived as officers prepared to execute search warrant

Four people are in custody after police stopped their vehicle just before they were planning to execute a search warrant in Oconto.

According to the criminal complaint filed in Oconto County Circuit Court, authorities were preparing to search a Luby Avenue residence for drugs Oct. 27 when three men and a woman arrived and started loading a sport utility

vehicle with items from inside.

Police and sheriff's deputies moved in and apprehended the foursome. Inside the SUV they recovered a white mesh bag loaded with paraphernalia and a tan-and-white bag with a car radio inside. The radio was broken open, and inside was a gallon-sized bag filled with "a large amount of white/translucent crystalline substance," which later tested positive for methamphetamine, the complaint said.

All told, the complaint said officers confiscated 270 grams of meth and 94 grams of marijuana. All four suspects denied any knowledge or possession of the drugs.

Court records identify the defendants as Edward Phillip Lindahl, 38, Oconto; Manuel Antonio Herrera-Hernandez, 31, Green Bay; McKenzie Paige Ottesen, 29, Green Bay, and Armando A. Pena, 24, Green Bay. Each was charged with possession with intent to

deliver amphetamine, misdemeanor possession of THC and possession of drug paraphernalia. In Lindahl's case the felonies have enhanced potential penalties because they are a "second or subsequent offense."

During their initial court appearances Oct. 30, bond was set at \$50,000 cash for Lindahl, \$25,000 cash each for Herrera-Hernandez and Pena, and \$15,000 cash for Ottesen. All were scheduled to be back in court on Thursday.

RESOLUTION OF TOWN BOARD PROPOSING TO EXCEED LEVY LIMIT

Resolution 2020-01

Town of Lena, Oconto County

Whereas, the State of Wisconsin has imposed levy limits on town, village, city, and county levies for 2020 and thereafter under s. 66.0602, Wis. Stat.;

Whereas s. 66.0602, Wis. Stat. limits the allowable local levy for 2020 to a percentage increase of no more than the greater of (a) zero percent of the 2019 payable 2020 adjusted actual levy as calculated under the state's levy limit law* or (b) a percentage equal to the percent change in equalized value due to net new construction less improvements removed, which for the Town of Lena is 1.052%;

Whereas, the town board of the Town of Lena, Oconto County, believes that for the 2020 tax levy (to be collected in 2021) it is in the town's best interest to exceed the state levy limit as described above by a greater percentage than 1.052;

Whereas, the Town of Lena's 2019 payable 2020 adjusted actual tax levy was \$168,968, and further whereas the state law would limit this year's increase to \$1,777 (\$168,968 x 1.052%), for a total allowable town tax levy of \$168,304 (\$170,745 less \$2,441 for the 2021 personal property aid payment) before adjustments for 2020 (to be collected in 2021);

THEREFORE, the town board of the Town of Lena, Oconto County does hereby resolve and order as follows:

1. The town board supports an increase in the town tax levy for 2020 and all following years that will exceed the amount allowed by the state levy limit.
2. The town board directs that the question of increasing the allowable town tax levy for 2020 and all following years (to be collected in 2021) by 10 percent (\$16,830 ÷ \$168,304) which would increase the town levy by \$16,830 for a total town tax levy (after adjustments) of \$185,134 (\$168,304 + 16,830), shall be placed on the agenda for the special town meeting to be held on November 19, 2020.

The other seven Panthers with significant varsity experience are seniors Amelia Rice (forward),

Brenna Morrissey (forward), Tori Hutchinson (guard), Morgan Kowalczyk (guard) and Autumn Magnin (guard) and juniors Paige Applebee and Hailey Peitersen (forwards).

Senior Taylor Ash (guard) and juniors Grace Oninski and Jaden Reed (forwards) are also expected to contribute this winter.

"It will take lots of effort from everyone, so not just skill, but effort. As long as everyone is putting in the work to improve and get better then it will help in the future," said Euclide of what it would take for the team to have a successful season. "We need consistency, and we need to learn to play together. Every year we lose the seniors so it's always a struggle trying to figure out how the team will manage."

Oconto Falls wasn't the only team in the NEC to graduate key seniors from last year. A total of 14 other all-conference players graduated, including five of the seven first-team selections.

Wrightstown and Freedom are the teams that tied for the conference title last year and Solarek expects them to be near the top of the conference again. The new coach believes the entire conference will provide challenges on gamedays.

"By being in a tough conference, it's going to take a lot of determination and motivation," said Goebel. "By staying after practices and shooting off the machines or even just taking the time in the workout rooms to build strength. But more importantly it's going to take teamwork. We have to be able to motivate each other when we are struggling."

Oconto Falls unable to finish drives during home loss

Panthers end regular season with 3-3 record

The Oconto Falls High School football team put together several promising drives when it had the ball but was unable to finish drives in the end zone during a 19-0 nonconference loss to Denmark on Friday in Oconto Falls.

Oconto Falls' defense played well enough to win, but was haunted by two touchdowns on fourth-down plays.

"I didn't think we had the edge we needed to play tonight," said Oconto Falls coach Nick Bohl. "We did battle, but I just don't think we had our A game, and we got to bring our A game every single night."

Oconto Falls started the game with the ball and got the ball near midfield behind a balanced running attack by seniors Owen Huber, Hunter Mallien and Logan Joachim, but the hosts eventually had to punt. Senior Owen Seidl got off a good punt, pinning Denmark inside its own 10.

The Vikings marched the ball to the Oconto Falls 5-yard line after 14 plays. Facing fourth-and-4 after the Panthers stuffed a couple runs, Denmark threw a touchdown pass to cap the drive.

Oconto Falls next offensive drive got inside the Denmark 30 — led by runs from Huber, Joachim and junior Dylan Thomson — but eventu-

ally the Vikings got the ball back on a turnover on downs.

The host's next offensive drive got to the Denmark 42 before three-straight incompletions forced Oconto Falls to punt. A 32-yard pass from senior Tucker Bouche to Thomson got the drive moving before first-down runs from Huber and Mallien.

Oconto Falls' defense then made its second-straight stop, forcing and recovering a fumble in the final minute, but the offense eventually turned the ball back over on downs before the first-half clock ran out.

"As a team, I think we got pretty tired," said Thomson of what led to the offensive drives stalling. "We got a lot of guys playing both ways. I don't think we were there mentally. It was a tough game, it was a fight."

The second half started with Oconto Falls' defense forcing a three-and-out. The ensuing possession gained roughly 18 yards, including a first-down carry by Thomson, but the drive stalled and the hosts punted.

Denmark's next possession went 79 yards and was capped by a touchdown to make it a two-score game. A costly fourth-down penalty by Oconto Falls gave Denmark a free first down, and four plays later the Vikings scored.

Thomson gave Oconto Falls a boost with a long kickoff return before Huber ran for a first down on a third-and-4 play. Just when the Panthers looked to have some

The hosts worked the ball to their 43-yard line before a penalty and sack led to a fourth-and-22 play. An incomplete pass gave Denmark the ball back, and they capitalized, throwing a 25-yard touchdown on fourth-and-4.

Oconto Falls final offensive possession ended after four incompletions before Denmark ran the remaining time out.

"We had a couple good drives. We got a couple first downs, and then I just feel like as a team we didn't have enough energy and push after those couple first downs," said

Huber. "We just kind of ran out of energy — that kept happening drive after drive after drive. Then the defense would get put out there, and especially for the people playing both ways, it's hard to get back out there and be like 'we got to do this.'"

"But I really feel like from last year to now, this game would have been 40-0, but we held our part and it's 19 — way better than 40-0."

The matchup served as the regular season finale for Oconto Falls, which is now 3-3 overall. The Panthers are a No. 3 seed in a Division 3 playoff pod that includes No. 1 Freedom, No. 4 Northland Pines and No. 2 Wrightstown. Oconto Falls is scheduled to travel to face Wrightstown on Friday at 7 p.m.

"I think it's just coming to practice, we got to be focused, got to give it 100 percent and treat it like it's our last game of the year every time," said Thomson on what it'd take to bounce back after the shut-out loss. "No messing around. It's the first time Oconto Falls has been in the playoffs in awhile, so we really got to take this serious; got to go out there and battle."

According to the WIAA website, Oconto Falls is in the playoffs for the first time since 1998.

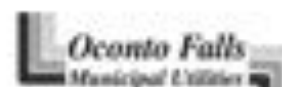

Oconto pair charged with armed robbery

Accused of befriending man, stealing more than \$100k worth of goods from him

A man and woman from Oconto are being held after allegedly robbing a man at gunpoint Oct. 29.

Joshua Uphill, 22, and Jessica Humblet, 20, are each charged with armed robbery, theft and misdemeanor battery in connection with an incident in which they are accused of holding up a Mississippi man and taking two bags filled with merchandise.

According to the complaint, the man told authorities he moved to Wisconsin to make a new life with Humblet, but she and Uphill surprised him. Uphill allegedly brandished a gun

and Humblet used a Taser to stun him, and the pair left with the man's back pack and a duffel bag.

After neighboring counties were alerted, Marinette County authorities found Uphill and Humblet at a cabin near Amberg, where they recovered the bags containing about 40 watches valued at a total \$60,000, a \$50,000 trust fund, portable chargers, Bluetooth radios, and the victim's driver's license.

During a brief appearance in Oconto County Circuit Court on Nov. 2, bond was set at \$20,000 cash for Uphill and \$5,000 cash for Humblet. They were due back in court Thursday.
