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Green Bay teen arrested in bonfire explosion

Armstrong charged with 13 felony counts after barrel with gasoline burns Pulaski students

A Green Bay teen has been arrested and charged with injuring at least 13 people during a bonfire incident in the Town of Maple Grove that took place during Pulaski High School's homecoming week in October 2022.

Samuel J. Armstrong, 18, has been charged with 13 felony counts of injury by negligent handling of explosives or fire when a diesel and gasoline mixture came in contact with the bonfire and the fire "began shooting out," according to the criminal complaint. If convicted, Armstrong faces a prison sentence of 3½ years and/or \$10,000 fine for each of the counts.

A Shawano County detective wrote in his report that he responded to a residence on Cedar Drive in Maple Grove on Oct. 15, 2022, after learning that several people between the ages of 16 and 18 were admitted to hospitals in Green Bay for burns and other injuries. The detective reported he could a spot that was "still smol-

dering" indicating a fire had been burning. The firepit was about 30 feet east of a two-story home, and the detective found empty containers and beer cans, along with a blue plastic 55-gallon barrel with the diesel/gasoline mixture.

The detective spoke with a man at the home, who told him how the fire got out of hand and burned people. The man told the detective that two people, including Armstrong, moved the blue barrel.

The detective interviewed Armstrong, who was 17 at the time, with an attorney present two days later, on Oct. 17, and was told "we decided to throw a barrel" on the fire, according to the detective's report. Armstrong allegedly said he did not think the barrel would do what it

did and injure someone.

Armstrong indicated to the detective that he and another person, identified in the report as "TJF," moved the barrel closer to the fire, and at about 10:50 p.m. was told by someone to "just do it," and the pair allegedly threw the barrel into the fire.

Armstrong allegedly tried to help put out the flames on one of the victims when he was punched from behind, according to the criminal complaint. He claimed four or five people went after him, and he ran into a nearby cornfield, where he hid for about five minutes before leaving in his vehicle.

The criminal complaint indicates that Armstrong said he'd consumed six beers.

One of the victims told a detective he was burned on the back of his legs, suffering second- and third-degree burns, according to the criminal complaint. The victim reported seeing several others on fire and tried to assist by smothering the flames with his hooded sweatshirt before realizing

he'd been burned, as well.

Another person interviewed by detectives claimed Armstrong made multiple comments about wanting to throw the barrel on the fire, even though a number of people warned him not to.

A victim indicated to a deputy that no one wanted to call 9-1-1 because a number of the underage people at the bonfire had been drinking alcohol.

At least one person had to go to the burn center in Milwaukee after suffering burns to his face, hands, legs and back.

Armstrong made an initial appearance Aug. 3 before Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. and was assessed a \$100,000 signature bond. He waived his right to a preliminary hearing, according to court records. The stipulations include absolute sobriety and no contact with any of the victims.

Armstrong's next hearing is at 1:30 p.m. Sept. 13.

Keshena woman charged with child abuse, escape

Tourtilott allegedly tried to strangle a deputy and fled a transport van

Bond was set at \$75,000 cash on Aug. 4 for a Keshena woman charged with abusing a 4-year-old girl and escaping from custody after her arrest, among several other alleged crimes.

Shannon May Tourtilott, 32, of Keshena, faces felony charges in Oconto County Circuit Court of first-degree reckless injury, repeated abuse of a child causing bodily harm, reckless child abuse causing great harm, child neglect with a consequence of

great bodily harm, second-degree reckless endangerment and first-degree reckless endangerment

She also faces charges for escape from criminal arrest, battery by prisoners, attempted strangulation and suffocation, battery or threat to a law officer, along with four counts of misdemeanor bail jumping and misdemeanor charges of discharging a firearm within 100 feet of a building, resisting or obstructing an officer and two counts of disorderly conduct, in connection with incidents that allegedly occurred May 22, May 25 and July 31.

According to the criminal complaint, the girl was taken to a Green Bay hospital May 25 with bruises and scratches all over her body said to have been sustained when she fell off

a swing several times. Hospital staff notified police because the injuries — including a laceration of the pancreas and general abdominal pain — allegedly weren't consistent with that kind of incident.

Later that afternoon, police were called to the girl's father's home in the Town of Gillett after Tourtilott, his live-in girlfriend, allegedly threatened to kill herself, going outside and firing a rifle into the air. The incident began when the father questioned a scuff on the little girl's face that had occurred while he was away from the house for a while on May 22, the complaint said.

Interviews with the girl and her siblings uncovered allegations that Tourtilott was "mean" and pulled hair and smacked them on occasion, according to the complaint.

After the charges were filed against Tourtilott, the complaint says, a Shawano County deputy went to her mother's residence July 29 to attempt to bring her into custody when she allegedly resisted arrest. After the suspect was restrained and handed off to an Oconto County deputy, Tourtilott allegedly reached through the prisoner divider window of the transport van and started strangling the deputy from behind with the transport belt, forcing the deputy to pull over near the intersection of state Highway 22 and U.S. Highway 141.

The deputy got out of the van and Tourtilott allegedly climbed out of the vehicle and ran into a grassy area along the Highway 141 ramp, where two other deputies took her into custody.

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Wimberger talks budget, PFAS, Supreme Court

State Sen. Eric Wimberger met with the board of the Oconto County Economic Development Corp. on Aug. 3 to discuss the impact of the newly passed 2023-25 state budget on local municipalities.

Wimberger, R-De Pere, represents the 30th Senate District, which includes the City of Oconto and the towns of Little Suamico, Abrams, Oconto, Pensaukee, Stiles and Little River on the east side of the county. He is a member of the Joint Finance Committee that amended Gov. Tony Evers' proposed budget before the Legislature considered it. Evers signed and partially vetoed the final version of the budget July 5.

In an interview with NEW Media after meeting with OCEDC, the senator said he and the OCEDC board talked about the shared revenue, workforce housing, land use and development and other local issues, and he asked for suggestions as he works on a bill to disburse \$125 million in PFAS mitigation grants.

Sen. Mary Felzkowski, who represents most of the rest of Oconto County, was the point person for figuring out the details of a provision to increase the amount of state shared revenue going to the state's cities, towns and villages.

"A lot of municipalities are going to be in a lot better shape funding their EMTs and other emergency services," Wimberger said. "I think that's a good step in the right direction."

School districts with historically lower revenue limits will see a state aid increase to \$11,000 per student, and public, charter and choice schools saw increased funding in general, he said.

"Schools are certainly in better shape than they were," Wimberger

said. "The trouble is always when people say things like 'We need to fully fund our schools, but then don't have an idea as to what the definition of 'fully funded' means.'"

Wimberger said in his view

the challenge is to make sure students can achieve their potential.

Inclusion of the PFAS funding in the budget is a feather in Wimberger's cap, because he has spent more than a year arguing for relief on behalf of property owners and municipalities impacted by PFAS contamination in Marinette County. He was able to convince the Joint Finance Committee not only to meet the governor's request for funding but to increase it to \$125 million.

"That's a very good start," he said. "Because I was the squeaky wheel, now I'm in charge of applying the grease."

He is responsible for drafting a bill that allocates the dollars to those who need it.

"When there's environmental damage involved, we have to work through those and figure out the right path," Wimberger said. "We have to find the balance of making sure the pollution is taken care of, making sure the people who caused the pollution don't skirt over responsibility that would otherwise be there for them to face, and also to maintain property values of the people who have polluted land is important."

Another issue Wimberger was pleased to advance in the budget was funding for the southern bridge near De Pere, which is expected to provide a new way for drivers to cross the Fox

River between De Pere and Wrightstown.

The state Supreme Court saw an ideological shift just before the Aug. 3 interview with the installation of newly elected Justice Janet Protasiewicz, giving justices with a liberal judicial bent the majority for the first time in several years. Wimberger said the shift isn't necessarily consequential as long as the rule of law continues to prevail.

"I guess that's to be determined," he said. "You've had a couple of justices talk openly about topics that sort of pre-judge cases if they were to come, and that's not good news for our system of government, but I guess it's to be seen if it's just rhetoric and they'll abide by our rules or not."

A group of Democrat-leaning organizations wasted no time in filing a lawsuit against what they called Wisconsin's gerrymandered legislative districts. The state Supreme Court chose the district maps after a legal battle between Evers and the Legislature that traced its roots to the maps drawn after the 2010 Census.

"You know, there's only one map that was declared to be gerrymandered, and that was Gov. Evers' map," Wimberger said. "It was determined to be gerrymandered by race, because his map had cracked the Black population in Milwaukee."

There have been no new facts or law since that decision to justify a lawsuit, he said. The only change is the arrival of Protasiewicz to tip the perceived Ideological scales.

"If you can simply bring a new case because a new judge would have done something differently in your mind, then there are thousands of cases in front of the Supreme Court, or if you're a local judge retiring and you don't like how your adjudication of property was handled in your divorce proceedings, you'd be able to just re-open it, and you simply can't do that in our system," Wimberger said. "There's something much more fundamental than the maps themselves at issue."

Falls FunFest taking shape quickly

First festival in years scheduled Aug. 19

What started as a social media challenge is on the verge of becoming reality less than three months later as the Oconto Falls FunFest returns Aug. 19.

Activities and entertainment are planned on the Memorial Field parking lot and part of the nearby park from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m., according to organizer Max Mayer.

"A woman was doing research on something else and she came across some of the news coverage from Falls FunFest years ago," Mayer said. "She posted something like 'We need to bring these back!' That was around the end of May, and three months later here we are."

The plans, which were scheduled to receive a final OK from the Oconto Falls City Council on Aug. 8, include a car show, a variety of vendors, meat smoking competition, and children's activities including a bouncy house and games.

Gates will open around 10 a.m., with the car show and other activities expected to run through 4 p.m., at which time judging and prizes are to be awarded, followed by live music starting at 5:30 p.m. featuring The Rotten Ones, an area band that plays a mix of old and new rock, country and blues.

Food and beverages will be available; the last piece of the puzzle was the temporary beer license that was on the council's agenda.

Falls FunFest has been incorporated as a 501(c)(7) social club, a non-profit organization but not a charity. The IRS website puts social clubs in the same category as labor organizations and business leagues. A committee of local volunteers has been formed to oversee the organization.

"We've got a great crew that came together at the last minute," Mayer said.

When Mayer brought the idea to the city council in July, he got permission to block off a portion or all of Central Avenue for vendors and other activities including the band, but the committee decided to

make this first event a little smaller, he said.

The meat smoking competition will be open to anyone with a knack for creating magic with their smokers, Mayer said. Participants will smoke a rack of ribs or pork but, and all entry fees will be directed into the cash prizes.

Larry Kasynski of radio station WOCO is planning live broadcasts and will provide music for the crowd in between broadcasts until the band begins to play, he said.

Mayer's mother, Loretta Shellman, was an integral part of the original Falls FunFest, which ran for many years in conjunction with the annual community wide rummage sales. The sales are in progress Aug. 10-12 this year, but Memorial Field was already reserved so the new FunFest had to take a different weekend.

"It feels appropriate for me to be involved in bringing it back," Mayer said. "We started late; it's a miracle we're at where we're at. We had a long way to go and a short time to get there."

Mayer sees Falls FunFest as a piece of the puzzle to revitalize downtown Oconto Falls.

"Events like this are central to Main Street rebuilding efforts across the country," he said. "As downtown becomes not as much of a strictly retail hub, communities are working to add a social center element, making use of available green space and the like."

He envisions the reimagined Falls FunFest as the first in a number of events the committee will spearhead over the course of a year. He'd like to see an alumni homecoming dance and perhaps some kind of Halloween event, among other ideas.

Still owner of the old Shellman Publishing building, 105 S. Main St., Mayer said he is working on a variety of project to be housed there, including the Falls FunFest offices and his digital marketing firm Maxergy. He is in the process of developing a social media platform for local communities and has staged technology classes for senior citizens and other beginners.

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A National Night Out

Oconto County turned out in big numbers Aug. 1 to celebrate the annual National Night Out observance in at least six communities.

Police, fire and rescue personnel and other local agencies and organizations brought people together to show families their services.

The gathering at Ebenreiter Community Square in Gillett was that city's first National Night Out celebration in about 10 years, said library director Shannon Stoner, who organized the night with Police Chief Shane Breitenbach. More than 100 people were already touring the grounds when the event began at 5:30 p.m.

The chief was busy getting soaked as he spent time in a dunk tank behind the library. The folk duo Homegrown performed under the library's pergola, the Gillett Area Chamber of Commerce gave away freeze pops, and the

VFW and its Auxiliary provided root beer floats.

A Mexican food truck and O.J.'s pies were also set up near the library, which also featured face painting and bucket raffles. Gillett Area Ambulance and Fire Department personnel greeted visitors in front of their vehicles.

At Oconto Falls High School, similar scenes played out with an even larger crowd, as the Oconto County Farmers Market moved across town for a week. Five food trucks and nearly two dozen vendor tents busied themselves serving a group that numbered in the hundreds.

The Eagle III helicopter landed in the field behind St. Anne Catholic Parish in Lena, giving the National Night Out audience a chance to get a closeup look at the rescue equipment on board.

Observances were held in Oconto, Suring and Little Suamico in addition to the Gillett, Oconto Falls and Lena events.

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Pathways plans different quilt fundraiser

Stein hand-crafts quilt made out of jeans pockets featuring 20 barn quilt designs

Shawano Pathways will continue its legacy after ending Bike the Barn Quilts with a new event, Make Tracks on the Mountain Bay State Trail. The new fundraiser will be highlighted by a distinctive raffle item, a Bike the Barn Quilts quilt.

Make Tracks is scheduled for Sept. 30. Bike the Barn Quilts ended its 10-year run in 2022.

Cindy Stein, president of Shawano's Crafty Boutique Gift Shop, hand-crafted the quilt. Crafty Boutique donated it to Pathways. The unique quilt is crafted from denim jeans pockets that feature 20 of Shawano County's barn quilts.

"Some of the folks from Pathways' Bike the Barn Quilts were shopping in our store last year," Stein said, explaining how the Barn Quilts quilt came about. "They saw our Shawano display of items and saw the towels with the barn quilts applique on them."

According to Stein, the people said, "What a great idea. It's our 10th anniversary. Everybody who signs up will get a towel."

They asked if it was possible, and Stein agreed. "Thank goodness they did it far enough in advance. They needed 200 towels. I made the barn quilt patches by copying the quilt pictures online from the Chamber of Commerce website."

Stein then copied the images onto printable fabric, made her own patches and appliqued them onto the towels. She completed the 200 towels but had leftover barn quilt patches, and she wondered what to do with them.

"I like the idea of recycling, and I use blue jeans to make quilts, potholders, aprons. You can do a lot with blue jeans," Stein said. "I like to incorporate the pockets. So, I took 20 pockets and applied one of the patches to each of them, then I put the pockets on squares."

With that, the 54-inch-by-64-inch Bike the Barn Quilts quilt was created.

"I gave Pathways the quilt last year to use as a door prize for the Bike the Barn Quilt's last event, the 10th anniversary, last year. They said 'no'

and saved the quilt for this year," Stein said. "And this year, the quilt is a raffle item."

Stein said that she came to Shawano from Green Bay in 2016.

"I discovered this senior gift shop with senior crafters," she said. "There are about 25 of us now that make all of the items in the shop. We rent the space from the civic center (225 S. Main St., Shawano), and we have our little store."

The store is loaded with hand-crafted items, from holiday décor to Barbie doll clothes and everything in between — including many one-of-a-kind items.

"The most popular are the kitchen scrubbies and the bowl holders," said Stein, who then elaborated on how she came to be president. "The previous president had to step down from the position and no one was interested in stepping up for over a year. In the December 2018 crafters' meeting, she said that she absolutely couldn't do it anymore. So, at the February 2019 meeting,

everyone said: 'So, what are we going to do?' and everybody pointed to me."

"I'm one of the youngest crafters," she continued. "The oldest crafter here is, I believe, 92."

"I knew I would need help in the position, so Priscilla King became vice president and Bill Becker is treasurer," she continued. "Our team has done very well."

Stein came to Crafty Boutique with a long history of working with crafts and needlework.

"I can do anything that anybody does in here. I'm very crafty; I can do any craft," she said.

Her vast experience and talent make her a perfect match for crafting the Barn Quilts quilt. She shared that she has been involved in crafting "since I could walk."

"My mom always did any kind of needlework," Stein said. "By the age of 4, all of us could embroider pillow cases. That was our summer activity; we learned how to do this. My mom

had to make all of my clothes, because I was tall and outgrew the children's sizes by third grade. From the age of 12, I was making my own clothes."

Crafty Boutique crafters are able to accommodate special orders. All of the crafters work independently and bring their creations into the shop to be sold.

"If someone comes up to us with an idea, we can usually find somebody to do it," Stein noted.

The Bike the Barn Quilts quilt is on display at Beans and Books Espresso, 215 N. Main St., Shawano. Tickets for the Make Tracks on the Mountain Bay State Trail raffle of the quilt are on sale at the business until Nov. 14. Tickets are \$5 for one, or \$20 for five and are also on sale at All Aboard Nutrition, 620 S. Main St., Shawano. The drawing will be held Nov. 15. Just 500 tickets will be sold. The winner doesn't need to be present to win.

"I still have the daily journal you required us to write. It's a precious slice of my tweener life," he said.

I noted he had "grown up good," and then we got on with the appointment. He recommended surgery on both hands, one at a time, requiring months of severely curtailed activities and physical therapy.

I thought long and hard about it. My hands are almost identical to my mother's at this age, though not nearly as wracked by painful

arthritis. If only I had inherited Mom's stoic disposition instead of her two bum thumbs. Like her, I decided to live with it. I massaged my hands, used topical anesthetics, took ibuprofen until my cardiologist ordered me to stop. Then I visited Eric at the Green Banana in Lakewood. He recommended his popular CDB balm. It works wonders, and I'm managing quite nicely.

A younger relative told me some time ago in the sweetest possible way that old folks should quit the whining and witching, because we actually have it pretty good. She suggested we celebrate our anatomy instead of denigrating it. I'm going with that, because there is no fountain of youth. If I must grow old, I'll do it gracefully and gratefully. If I can't be young, I can still think young and act young.

It works. In fact, I am having the time of my life.

Jennifer Morris' favorite Menominee word is *wēskewat*. It translates into English as "it is good." A member of College of Menominee Nation's teacher education department, Morris' efforts were deemed *wēskewat* by the school's administrators. At the school's May commencement, she was announced as CMN's Faculty of the Year. I caught up with Morris on her return to campus this August, and she agreed to share her thoughts on the eve of CMN's fall semester.

Morris received her bachelor of arts degree from Alverno College, majoring in history with minors in biology and chemistry. She earned the first of her master's degrees from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee in history with an emphasis in Museum Studies. She returned to Alverno to earn her second in education.

As a graduate student, Morris had stints working as a "pathology lab technician, assistant theater technical director, cafeteria manager and a chemical manufacturing operator." Her diverse resume reveals that prior to taking a position at CMN, Morris also worked as a museum curator, classroom teacher and a vice principal.

Morris began CMN in 2011, seeing her employment at the school as "an opportunity to move back by family and explore a new area of education." Since then, she has served in various roles that include "STEM resource coordinator, adjunct faculty member

and the dean of retention."

In the last dozen years, Morris has worked on various initiatives that include retention efforts such as Project Success and the Carnegie Math Pathways. She also serves on grant and scholarship projects, such as the First Nations Launch Rocket Team, which is a tribal college and university competition that "requires students to conceive, design, fabricate and compete with high powered rockets."

Morris also serves on academic committees at CMN, including the Higher Learning Commission writing and steering teams. In this capacity, Morris contributed to the school's reaccreditation proposal this past academic year. In July, CMN learned their application was approved, thereby ensuring students that the standards set in their coursework is nationally recognized.

I asked Morris what led her to stay at CMN. She responded: "It's the best place I've ever worked. An amazingly kind, talented and accepting community that teaches and inspires me to be a better person every day." She

added: "I want to provide relevant experiences that help students gain the knowledge and skills they feel are meaningful to them, their family and their community."

In the coming year, Morris is excited to "continue celebrating CMN's 30th anniversary and also the 50th anniversary of the Menominee Restoration Act." She explained that "The dedication of the people who led these efforts is awe-inspiring. The opportunity to celebrate them together is inspirational."

Morris' message for new students is to know that "You are brilliant, we love you, and we are honored you are willing to share your time with us." Her advice to new faculty is "the same advice I was given," which is to, "build strong relationships by listening twice as much as you speak."

CMN's fall semester begins Aug. 14. A tribal land grant college, chartered by the Menominee People, the school offers courses in both Keshena and Green Bay.

CMN is open to all, and staffed with instructors such as Morris who said education is "all about you, your community, your organization, your needs and your success."

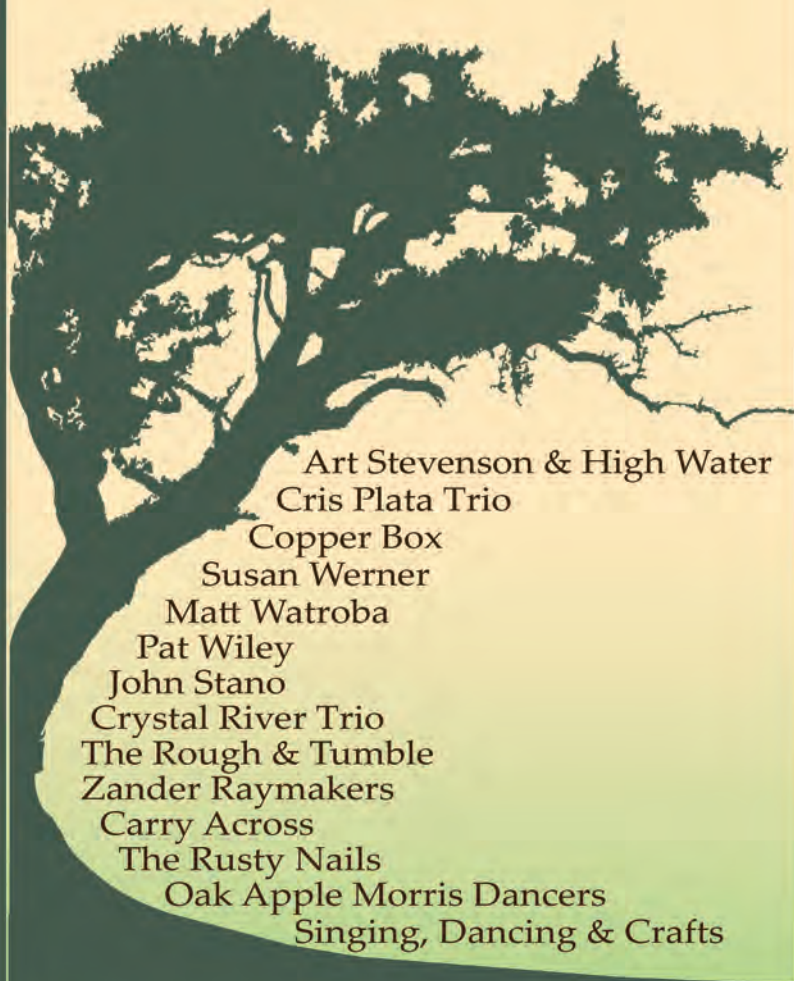
Schwitzer is also working with the College of Menominee Nation's Sustainable Development Institute to develop a video game based on

His whole demeanor had changed from that of despair to hope and well-being. It was the quilt that made the difference.

A Quilt of Valor is not a charity quilt. It is not a blanket. It is a healing and comforting gesture — a tangible thing recipients can wrap around themselves and know someone thinks about them with love and caring. Nationally, more than 350,000 Quilts of Valor have been presented to veterans since 2003.

Shawano residents are invited to a public information meeting Aug. 15 regarding proposed improvements to West Green Bay Street between Bartlett and Main streets.

The meeting will take place from 5-7 p.m. in the community room at

Videographer kicked out of Speedway

The disqualification of a driver at the Shawano Speedway on July 22 kicked off a series of events that led to the dismissal of a longtime videographer from the racetrack.

Driver Johnny Whitman was cited for a weight infraction following his win in the IMCA Modified feature race, which caused him to be disqualified. Instead, the prize money went to second-place finisher Mike Wedelstadt.

The disqualification led to videographer Mike Thorne to question the interpretation of the rules during one of his videos.

Thorne operates Mike's Video. He records and uploads the races to social media on a near-volunteer basis, something he has done for more than a dozen years.

"I guess when you have something to say, you should just keep it to yourself," Thorne said later in a social media post. "This is how they fix their drama that they create. It's sad, because

I really thought they might listen and actually want to talk."

A few days after the incident, Thorne received a letter from the Shawano Area Agricultural Society, which operates the Shawano County Fairgrounds and Shawano Speedway.

In addition to rescinding Thorne's lifetime membership, the society's executive board returned his \$300 membership fee.

"Some of your actions lately have been determined to be detrimental to the Shawano Area Agricultural Society," according to the letter. "We are requesting that you cease video taping at the Shawano Speedway. It is very detrimental to the organization when videos are shown that do not have correct information or things are said that are just assumptions.

"Also, due to your current actions, the Shawano Area Agricultural Society has determined that your presence is not welcomed at the Shawano Speedway."

Thorne repeatedly pointed out on social media he did not shoot the video

at the scales and only commented on it. He also said he was never approached by the society or any board member to discuss the matter.

"I was never invited to a meeting with the executive board to discuss anything," he said. "I would have gladly done that and expressed why I said what I did, which in all essence were questions from race fans and drivers. Couldn't even do it face to face."

Social media was full of comments, numbering more than 1,000, about Thorne's banishment from the track. The videographer noted that he had more than 250 phone messages as well.

Several people expressed disappointment and anger with the Speedway. Brad Luepke, marketing and promotions director for the Shawano County Fairgrounds and Shawano Speedway, did not return a phone call seeking comment and clarification. Messages sent through the group's Facebook page also went unanswered.

However, the Shawano Speedway Facebook did include this partial post: "The Shawano Area Agricultural

Society will not tolerate individuals, especially those who are employed by or have media credentials, representing or promoting themselves that do not have the best interest of the organization in mind."

Thorne said he doesn't regret any questions he raised.

"I thought Johnny Whitman got screwed," he said. "I still believe he did, because nobody has given me any information that he didn't."

Thorne said he was OK with being the sacrificial lamb, as long as the issues he raised get addressed.

"Getting rid of me doesn't cover (the problems) up. They're still there," he said. "I never expected that it would come to this point that I would be kicked out of a track that I came to as a kid, grew into as an adult and had one of the best jobs you could ask for.

"But it's OK. If this all opens eyes to some of the issues, then being kicked out was worth it. You can replace me, but you can't replace the track."

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Backup QB competition one to watch

It is known that Jordan Love is the new leader of the Green Bay Packers, but what is still uncertain is who will take his role behind the starting quarterback.

Green Bay opens its preseason schedule in Cincinnati this week, as coaches, players and fans will get the first look at what to expect this season.

Obviously, all eyes are going to be on Love, but with the release of backup quarterback Danny Etling earlier this week, the backup quarterback position is a situation to monitor. As of now, the contenders for that spot are fifth-round draft selection Sean Clifford and free agent signing Alex McGough. Both players found success in their previous roles, with Clifford achieving multiple Big Ten Player of the Week awards at Penn State and McGough winning USFL MVP with the minor league Birmingham Stallions.

"There's been some good competitions," said Packers general manager Brian Gutekunst, talking about the backup quarterback position. "Each guy has their moments, which is good."

While there, McGough threw for 2,565 yards and 23 touchdowns with 534 yards rushing and eight rushing touchdowns in two years.

According to Gutekunst, both quarterbacks have an opportunity to win that backup position and reiterated that there are many more opportunities to be had.

"It is very early in camp, but they have done some good things — I think Matt (LaFleur) is very happy with some of the things that they have done," said Gutekunst. "They all have athleticism and the ability to make plays with their feet, which is important. As of right now, my mindset is, 'Let's see who comes out of that group.'"

Given the lack of experience in the quarterback room right now, Green Bay could opt to sign a veteran later this month. Current available free agents at the quarterback who could fill that veteran presence include Joe Flacco, Nick Foles and Chase Daniel.

Gutekunst's comments do seem to suggest that the team will continue to stay young, which is why this first preseason game is so important for every player — but especially Clifford and McGough.
