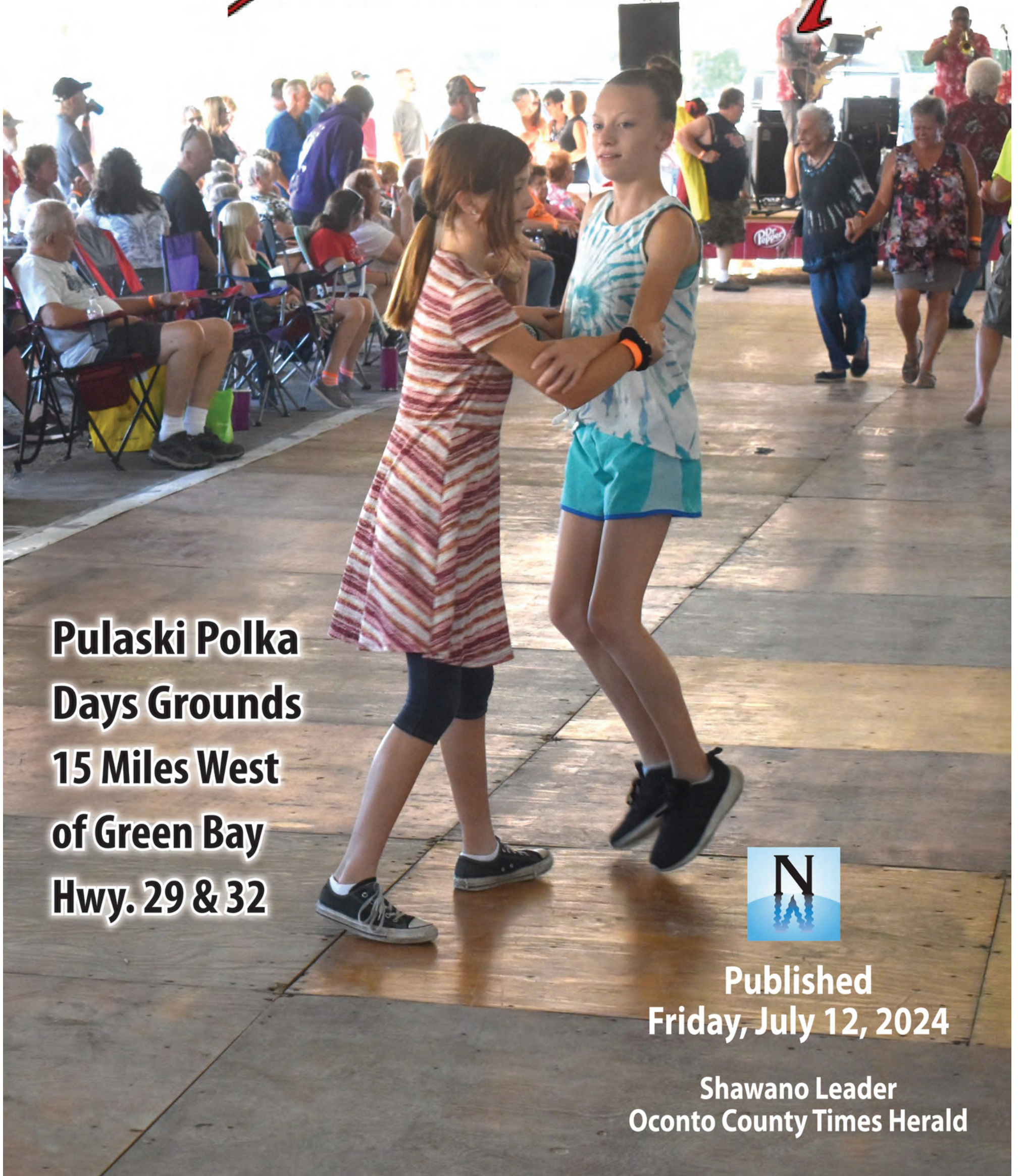

Music is the key at Pulaski Polka Days

Otto created community event 45 years ago

Harold Otto created Pulaski Polka Days 45 years ago for a very simple reason.

“I love polka music,” he said. “It’s still for the people, a great family event.”

Pulaski Polka Days will be held July 18-21 at the Pulaski Community Park. Two tents and the Knights of Columbus building will be used for plenty of polka music and dancing.

“I love all styles of polka music – Bohemian, German, Polish,” Otto said. “The Polish music has a faster beat, and that seems to attract the younger people. They like that.”

Otto, who was raised in Appleton and has been a Pulaski resident for 60 years, has also shared his love of the polka on radio shows for decades.

He got his start on WGEE (93.5 Duke FM), when the call letters were still used by owner WBAY. Today, he can be heard online at www.247polkaheaven.com. His show, “Sunrise Polkas,” can be heard at 8 a.m. Sunday, noon Monday, 5 a.m. and 8 p.m. Thursday, and 2 p.m. Friday.

During Polka Days, he will be broadcasting live from 7-9 p.m. July 18, 8:30-10 p.m. July 19, 6-8 p.m. July 20 and 8-9 a.m. July 21.

Like most festivals, Pulaski Polka Days started small. In the first few years, it was a Sunday-

only event, eventually expanding to include Saturday to make it a weekend festival.

Otto said he managed to book Eddie Blazonczyk, and that was enough to spur the event to bigger and better things.

“We added Friday, and Eddie, he traveled around the country a lot, and he would promote Polka Days,” Otto said.

Later, Thursday was added and featured community activities and fireworks.

Otto continues to oversee the festival, but he’s quick to acknowledge the help received by volunteer individuals and organizations, as well as his wife and family.

He and Noreen will be married 55 years on Oct. 11.

“She’s a super lady,” he said.

The entire festival is run by volunteers.

“There’s a lot of work involved, but it’s worth it,” Otto said. “The volunteers are really dedicated.”

And then there are the business sponsors from Pulaski and the surrounding areas. Otto said the festival wouldn’t happen without their support.

At one time, Otto played the trumpet but has since given that up. He’s content with his radio show, which has an international audience.

“Three years ago, two girls and their dad came all the way from Sweden just to be at Polka Days,” Otto said. “They heard about it from listening to my

polka show.”

Others have visited from Canada, England and all across the United States.

Otto said he never imagined Pulaski Polka Days would get this big.

“You never know what’s going to happen,” he said.

Years ago, Otto also had a television show that moved from station to station, eventually being aired on all four Green Bay TV stations at one time or another.

Dick Rodgers was the first local bandleader to achieve fame, playing in the Bohemian style of the Czech bands in the 1940s. Chicago-born Blazonczyk and his Versatones later updated the sound as the originators of a style known as the “Chicago Push” in the 1960s and brought it to Wisconsin, about the same time as Pulaski’s Alvin Styczynski started a polka band in the “Honky” Polish style.

Pulaski musicians the Maroszek Brothers are celebrating their 50-year anniversary this year.

“I can remember when they were kids,” Otto said.

Thousands of people attend the festival each year, quite an accomplishment for a village of about 4,000.

“People enjoy it, and it makes them happy,” Otto said. “The community really loves it, and we have great support.”

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Want to learn the steps to Wisconsin's state dance?

Think back to your days in elementary school, and you might recall hearing somewhere along the way that the robin is Wisconsin's state bird, the muskie is the state fish, the white-tail deer is the state wild-life animal and the dairy cow is the state domesticated animal.

But the state dance? The polka was designated as the state dance in 1993.

The legislation was introduced at the request of a second grade class from Charles Lindbergh Elementary School in Madison and supported by several groups — including the Wisconsin Polka Boosters Inc. and the Wisconsin Folk Museum. Supporters documented the polka heritage of Wisconsin and provided evidence that the polka is deeply ingrained in Wisconsin cultural traditions.

So, what would it look like if you attended Pulaski Polka Days but didn't know how to dance the polka?

No need to worry. Learn to dance the polka with instructors Duane and Robin Wilks from Omaha, Nebraska.

Free lessons will be offered from 1:30-3 p.m. July 19 in Tent 2 at the Pulaski Polka Days Grounds at Pulaski Community Park, 429 E. Pulaski St.

If you can't make that time, stop in from noon to 1:30 p.m. July 20, also in Tent 2.

Maroszek Bros. celebrating 50 years-plus

In 1971, at the young age of 13, Gene Maroszek began taking concertina lessons in the basement of Art Wielgus's home in Pulaski. In December 1972, he booked his first job with his brother Michael (who played the drums), for a New Year's Eve dance at the South Chase Tavern.

That is when the "Maroszek Bros." were born. As time went on, Gene's brothers Frank, Alan, Scott and Beaver (John) all joined the band.

The band has played in Ohio, Pennsylvania, California, Minnesota, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and throughout their home state of Wisconsin.

They took their polka music to weddings, anniversaries, birthday parties, Oktoberfests, Polish festivals and, of course, their hometown Pulaski Polka Days.

In the 1970s, the Maroszek Bros. recorded regularly at Danceland Ballroom, The Stop Inn Ballroom and at WBAY-TV 2, on a show called "Polka Variety." They

most recently performed nationally on Fox Sports for a Green Bay Packers football game.

The Maroszek Bros. is the only band to have played at every Pulaski Polka Days. Because of this, they were granted a special "Pulaski Polka Days Appreciation Award" in 2014. Then-Gov. Scott Walker declared July 20, 2014, "Maroszek Bros. Day" in recognition of their service for promoting Pulaski Polka Days and encouraging the next generation and the community to love their Polish heritage and polka music.

In July 2022 Gene was inducted in to the World Concertina Congress Hall of Fame.

The Maroszek Bros. have released five recordings through the years. Their latest recording, "A Maroszek Bros. Christmas," was released Dec. 8, 2020.

Currently the band consists of Gene, Frank, Scott and Al Maroszek, Bruce Brzezczkowski and John Wudtke.
