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All lanes should be clear on Green Bay St. for fair, DOT says

Railroad crossing reopened Thursday following 3-week closure

SHAWANO — All lanes of traffic on East Green Bay Street between Main Street and Airport Road should be open during the upcoming Shawano County Fair, according to the contractor in charge of the state Highway 22 reconstruction project for the Department of Transportation.

In his weekly progress report on the project, Kevin Lohff of JT Engineering, Inc. said all lanes were anticipated to be open from 6 a.m. Wednesday through 6 a.m. on Sept. 3.

The county fair starts Wednesday and runs through Sept. 2.

Lohff also announced late Thursday afternoon that the Green Bay Street railroad crossing, which closed down all lanes of traffic between Hamlin and Ellis streets, was officially reopened.

"We have had a very good three weeks of work, which is allowing us to open a day early," he said.

Lohff said there could still be right-lane closures in that area early next week to complete small work operations such as signing and landscaping.

Shawano Public Works Director Scott Kroening said he confirmed with Lohff that all lanes of traffic would be open during the fair, though it might not necessarily all be paved.

"The two center lanes will be paved," he said. "The two outside

lanes may or may not be paved. If they mill it, they're going to pave it, but they might not mill it."

The lane closures will commence again after the fair as needed to complete the road work, Lohff said.

The entire project is expected to be done by late October or early November.

Some businesses along East Green Bay Street said the road construction has been an inconvenience for customers and delivery vehicles but hasn't drastically affected business.

"It's a little bit slower around here but most people, if they need their cleaning done, they have to get in here," said Tanya Martin, manager at Martin's Cleaners. "We hear plenty of complaints about it, but there's nothing we can really do about it. Most people can figure out their way in and out."

Greg Seymour, general manager at American Marine and Motorsports, said work crews have been moving traffic along fairly well and customers have been handling it pretty well.

"At certain times it slows things down, but generally speaking I don't think we've had too much trouble," he said.

Meanwhile, at Qualheim's True Value, Store Manager Gail Lemmer said the road work has had no impact at all.

"I figured it would kind of get us, but we have not seen that," she said.

"In fact, (Wednesday) sales were up."

Shawano Country Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Nancy Smith said she hasn't heard any chatter about problems businesses might be experiencing because of the road work.

Kroening said he hasn't heard any complaints personally, but some impact was evident just by driving through the area.

"You can tell some of those businesses are affected just because there's no cars sitting in there," he said. "I guess they're putting up with it and hopefully they're seeing the silver lining of the new pavement out in front of their place."

According to Lohff's weekly update, work completed since the last update includes completion of new curb ramps on Green Bay Street, installation of new track and new signals at the railroad crossing and continued asphalt paving operations.

The anticipated work schedule for the week of Aug. 26 includes:

- Continue work on the new box culvert at Murray Creek.
- Continue milling and paving operations on Green Bay Street between Airport Road and Main Street.
- Restoration and pavement marking operations in areas that are paved.

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Shawano landfill reopened after 2 weeks

SHAWANO — The Shawano landfill was open for business again Tuesday, two weeks after a hauler damaged a structural beam supporting the garbage and recycling transfer station.

The facility was deemed unsafe for operation after the Aug. 6 accident.

City staff had expected the repairs

to take at least five weeks, but things moved along faster than expected after Chuck Felts of Felts Construction in Shawano reached out to his contacts with Boldt Construction in Madison.

Public Works Director Scott Kroening said all the damaged beam material was replaced with new material.

"They came in with a pile of guys and started taking care of business," he said.

There was no cost estimate avail-

able as of press time for the work done.

In a news release Tuesday, the city offered its appreciation to Felts Construction and Bolt Construction for their immediate response in completing the repairs.

"We apologize for any inconvenience and appreciate your cooperation during this temporary shutdown," the city wrote.

Arvold remembered for listening, caring

Longtime Shawano physician passes away

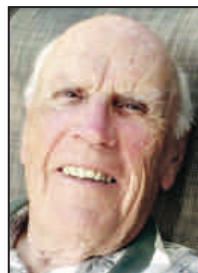
SHAWANO — One of Dr. David S. Arvold's longtime patients, Joyce Paynter, remembered her former physician as "so personable and interested, always, and interested in my children."

Arvold died Aug. 21 at the age of 96.

Paynter starting seeing Arvold in the early 1960s until he retired in 1990.

"He just listened," she said. "He listened to everything I had to ask him."

Unheard of now, "he made house calls. If someone had the chicken pox

and you weren't sure about it, he'd be there and say, 'Yup, that's what it is,'" Paynter added.

Born Nov. 28, 1922, in Reedsburg, Arvold received his medical degree from the Univer-

sity of Wisconsin-Madison through the Navy V 12 program during World War II. He married Patricia Bowditch in 1944 and served his internship in Evanston, Illinois before moving to Shawano in 1946 or 1947. He joined the Cantwell-Peterson Clinic (later the Shawano Clinic).

An active pediatrician, he delivered the third of Paynter's four children. She was disappointed that a different doctor delivered her youngest child

because Arvold was on vacation.

At the clinic, he served as a general practitioner, covered the emergency room, functioned as the clinic radiologist and performed OB-GYN surgery. He enlisted in the Air Force in 1950 at the outbreak of the Korean War and served stateside. When Arvold retired 43 years of practice, in an interview in the (then) Shawano Evening Leader, he said, "You go through a lot with every patient — the grief and joy, if you can help, it's all worthwhile."

Paynter also recounted Arvold's love of golf, participating in a regular golf foursome at Golden Sands Golf Course until age 95. He was an enthusiastic Packers fan, becoming a season ticket holder in 1959, the year Vince Lombardi came to Green Bay. Arvold went to all of the team's home games, including the "Ice Bowl" in 1967.

Paynter gave credit to the Arvolds

for contributing to the community and they enjoyed dining at the Spinning Wheel. Arvold remained active through his later years with Paynter remembering Arvold slalom water skiing while in his 70s; a feat captured in a photo in the Evening Leader.

He played trumpet, including in a jazz band in college and piano (by ear) for singalongs at the Shawano Club, which he attended regularly. He was a longtime member of the First Presbyterian Church choir.

One memory Paynter was reluctant to share because the clinic owners were not happy with him although "one of my favorite things" was Arvold leading a conga line around the dance floor, playing his trumpet to "The Saints Go Marchin' In." at the Shawano Lake Golf Club.

Pella Fire Department treasurer accused of embezzlement

More than \$20K allegedly taken from department funds

SHAWANO — Felony charges were filed Thursday against the Pella Fire Department's treasurer, who is accused of embezzling more than \$20,000 of the department's funds for his own use.

Lyle L. Krueger, 45, of Marion, is facing felony counts of theft in a

business setting and misconduct in office.

He has also been charged with a felony count of possession of methamphetamine after authorities executing a search warrant at his

residence Saturday found drugs and drug paraphernalia, according to the criminal complaint.

The alleged embezzlement took place between October 2018 and August 2019, according to the complaint.

The complaint alleges Krueger made out checks to himself during that time totaling about \$24,000.

According to the complaint, Krueger worked as a dump truck driver but managed the fire department's records from a home computer.

Krueger told authorities he had borrowed the funds with the intention of paying the money back, according to the complaint. He also stated the whole thing began after he was injured and laid off work and needed money to make his house payments.

According to the complaint, financial records also show some ques-

tionable payments to area casinos.

Krueger could face a maximum 10 years in prison and \$25,000 fine if convicted of theft in a business setting, and 3½ years and a \$10,000 fine if found guilty of misconduct in office.

He could also face 3½ years and a \$10,000 fine if found guilty of possession of methamphetamine.

A \$10,000 cash bond was ordered for Krueger by Judge James Habeck at a hearing Thursday.

Krueger is due back in court for an adjourned initial appearance on Sept. 9.

City reviews capital projects for next year's budget

Wish list for 2020 exceeds available funds

SHAWANO — City officials Wednesday had their first glimpse at a preliminary capital improvement budget for 2020, with an eye on deciding which proposed projects would make it to the final draft or be put off for another year.

It was the first of a series of joint-Common Council/finance committee budget discussions expected to continue into October.

Officials haven't yet begun looking at the operational budget for next year. At this point there is no proposed levy or tax rate projection.

"We still don't have our assessed value numbers or any numbers from the state that are not just preliminary," City Administrator Eddie Sheppard said. "We're still waiting for the (property) revaluation numbers to come in and that will really drive the direction and set things up for us."

Sheppard said he hopes to have the

revaluation figures within a couple of weeks.

Overall, the city is in good shape financially, according to Sheppard, particularly with the retirement of two Tax Incremental Finance districts that will go entirely back onto the tax rolls.

TIF districts are areas where municipalities invest in infrastructure, such as sewer and water, to attract development where it might not otherwise occur, or to make improvements, such as eliminating blight.

Whatever increase in tax revenue that results from development in those districts goes to paying back the debt the municipality incurred from making improvements to the district.

The retired districts include TIF District 2, created for the Raasch Industrial Park, and TIF district 3, created for water, sewer and street improvements to the Ziegler Avenue residential area after being annexed from Belle Plaine.

According to previous city estimates, those closures would add

roughly \$160,000 to the tax base, \$80,000 of which would go into the general fund. The other \$80,000 would go toward debt service.

The city doesn't yet know what its health insurance costs will be for next year, but there are no major changes planned for next year such as the staff reorganization that was put in place this year.

Barring anything unexpected coming up, Sheppard said, "I'm confident we'll be able to put something good together."

In the meantime, the focus is on the capital improvements budget.

The city borrows for capital improvements every two years and 2020 will be the second year of the latest round of borrowing.

The city expects that by the time this year is over, there will be \$60,000 left over from this year's projects that can be added to capital improvement projects and purchases in 2020.

However, a preliminary wish-list from department heads for additional projects and purchases presented at Wednesday's meeting totals about \$230,000.

The list includes some park bath-

room upgrades at some of the older park facilities; audio-visual upgrades at City Hall, particularly in terms of the equipment used to broadcast Common Council meetings; improvements to the city's web site; a conference room for the police department that can also double as a command center; a new cemetery truck for the parks department; and a new garbage truck for the department of public works.

Also on the list is the potential \$30,000 the city could contribute to a dog park, provided there are matching donors.

At this point, the proposed capital improvements budget includes only the amount the city has borrowed for, but some tax levy revenue could also be set aside to cover some of those costs.

"We'll be able to levy some dollars," Sheppard said. "We typically do."

City staff will take a second look at the wish list to prioritize the items on it before bringing it back to city officials for further discussion.

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District tax rate expected to drop again

Shawano expecting more state aid, including high poverty aid

SHAWANO — Officials with the Shawano School District are anticipating that its tax rate will decrease slightly, based on estimates that property valuations could go up 2%.

The Shawano School Board voted 7-1 Monday on the budget draft to be presented at the district's annual meeting Sept. 23. Board member Mart Grams voted against.

Business manager Louise Fischer estimates that the tax rate, currently at \$9.69, would drop to \$9.62 if the value estimates hold true. If they're conservative, the rate could drop to \$9.53 if property valuations went up 3%. The rate is based on \$1,000 of equalized valuation, so someone who owns property valued at \$100,000 currently pays \$969, and the bill would drop to \$962 with a 2% increase.

"Shawano School District is very good at managing its money," Fischer

said. "They've always been very frugal, very conscientious of what they spend."

Fischer believes the district will experience its third consecutive year of declining enrollment, although firm numbers will not be known until the official count takes place on the third Friday in September. She estimates the district is losing 25 students this year, and since state aid is based on student count, it will impact how much money Shawano receives, as the funding is determined on a three-year rolling average.

Fischer said the state's biennial budget provided more money per student, about \$175. The district also qualifies for high poverty aid for the first time in four years, and the aid is determined by the percentage of students qualifying for free and reduced meals.

"It does not mean more money for the district," Fischer said. "What it means is money from the state that goes against the property tax levy."

About 64% of the district's budget revenue comes from state aid; the remainder comes from local property taxes.

"The state controls about 85% of a district's revenue, and that's through the property taxes and the state equalization aid," Fischer said. "When they're talking about the state budget and how they're going to divvy up the state equalization aid, obviously we want more, not less."

Fischer touched on the school voucher program, which allows students to attend private schools using public funding. She said about \$728,000 is allocated in the district's budget to cover vouchers for students going to St. James Lutheran School, Sacred Heart Catholic School and Wolf River Lutheran High School.

There are potentially 92 vouchers available to the three parochial schools, and about 56 cents of the district's tax rate pays for those vouchers, according to Fischer.

"Because we have three parochial

schools in our district, that number has been maximized every year," she said.

The district is expected to see increases in health and dental insurance premiums for employees, salary increases and more totaling about \$500,000. To counteract those increases, the district eliminated some positions, including one administrator, cut individual school budgets and the district's wellness budget and went with a different life insurance vendor, among other things.

"The district is presenting a balanced budget at this time for 2019-20," Fischer said. "This may change between now and October. But for right now, we're balanced."

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Nelson facing charges on endangering food supply

Suspect in Diemel brothers' disappearance remains in jail

FORT SCOTT, KAN. — Garland “Joey” Nelson, charged by Missouri prosecutors with tampering with a vehicle rented by Nick and Justin Diemel, Bonduel, will face new allegations in Kansas.

The Kansas City Star reports authorities in Bourbon County, Kansas, have charged Nelson with “endangering the food supply.” According to the statute listed on the state legislature’s

web site, endangering the food supply means “bringing into this state any domestic animal which is infected with any contagious or infectious disease or any animal which has been exposed to any contagious or infectious disease.”

Prosecutors say Nelson didn’t have proper health papers when he delivered 35 calves from his family’s farm near Braymer, Missouri to a farm in Fort Scott, Kansas, in May. Tomme Feil, Nelson’s mother, said her son returned the remaining calves when his partner’s bank claimed them as collateral.

Nelson’s partner in the Kansas cattle deal, David Foster, said the calves brought to his pasture were sick.

A mid-August story in the Star quoted Foster as saying, “They were

starved; they were malnourished. It was almost a complete loss.” He said he and Nelson bought 131 calves together but 96 died while in Nelson’s care.

Foster was quoted as saying Nelson was to raise the calves and the farmers would split the cost after the animals were sold. One hundred of the calves belonged to the Diemel brothers, Foster said.

The Star reported Foster claimed Nelson owed him more than \$151,000. Feil told the newspaper that Nelson agreed that her son owed Foster money but disputed the amount. She said several people owed her son money and he planned to pay Foster back when others paid their debts to him.

Nelson, 25, is being held without

bond in the Caldwell County, Missouri, detention center and is waiting for a Sept. 16 preliminary hearing. Nelson, arrested July 29, is charged with the state felony for driving a white Ford F250 pickup truck, rented by the brothers on their arrival in Missouri on July 20, from his farm in Braymer to a commuter parking lot in Holt, where it was abandoned.

The Diemels disappeared July 21 while visiting Nelson’s farm about a cattle deal. Human remains found on the farm, about 70 miles northeast of Kansas City, have not been identified.

Investigators have consistently labeled Nelson as their lone suspect since July 31.

Stipends increase for extracurricular advisers

Board members concerned about disparity in compensation

SHAWANO — The Shawano School Board approved stipends totaling \$36,700 for advisers in clubs and activities at its meeting Monday.

The total is an increase from last year, when advisers received \$31,630 for overseeing such activities as chess clubs, FFA and the winter musical. Individual advisers received increases ranging from \$45 to \$300.

The lion’s share of the increase comes from adding a new position, Skills USA adviser, which will receive \$2,400 this year. According to Joel Wondra, the district’s athletic and activities director, the post had been voluntary, but the district saw worth in adding it, as the adviser helps to prepare students to participate in state

and national Skills USA competitions.

Wondra said he met with the district’s finance committee earlier in the month, and it recommended the increase in stipends.

He said previous amounts were tied to when the district’s beginning teacher pay was \$37,000. Earlier this year, the district increased the pay base to \$40,000, so it made sense to increase the stipends, as well, Wondra said.

Board member Beth McFarlane expressed concern over how the individual stipends were reached, as the annual stipends range from \$600 to \$4,000.

“You have the FFA adviser getting \$4,000 while FBLA only gets \$800,” McFarlane said. “I mean, that’s a big discrepancy.”

Wondra said he just did proportional increases based on already existing

stipends, but suggested the compensation was based on how many students were in the club or organization and how much time the duties require of the adviser.

Wondra said the finance committee also recommended monitoring the advisers to see how much time is taken up by administering to the student organizations and see if changes need to be made to the stipends for fairness.

Board member Chris Gull suggested having advisers regularly report how many hours they dedicated to a particular organization to get a clearer picture on whether the stipends adequately compensate them.

“There’s obviously a huge disparity,” Gull said. “It’d be nice to take a look. We don’t want to be short-changing FBLA if they’re doing as much as FFA.”

School board joins Native American mascot ban

Audience paints picture of degradation and discrimination

SHAWANO — The Shawano School Board will be joining the Wausau School Board and other boards around Wisconsin in sponsoring a resolution seeking the ban of Indian mascots.

The board voted unanimously Monday to be a co-sponsor of legislation to go to the Wisconsin Association of School Boards at its annual convention in January that would seek to force the 31 school districts who still have such mascots to change them to something less racially offensive. School districts in Madison and Sun Prairie have joined the effort, and

school boards for Milwaukee, Green Bay, La Crosse and Eau Claire are scheduled to vote on the issue next week.

Shawano had previously had the Indian as a mascot until 1993, when the board voted to change it to today's mascot, the hawk. However, 31 other school districts in the state still have Native American mascots.

Tricia Zucker, Wausau School Board president, said that having mascots that degrade or discriminate against indigenous people have been shown through studies to have a detrimental effect on students at those schools.

"Wausau School Board has, tradi-

tionally, not submitted resolutions, so this is the first we're going to do," said Zucker, who noted that she spoke with WASB representatives on the issue and learned the subject had never been brought forward. "It seemed like an opportune time; actually, it seems decades late but you can't undo the history."

Zucker, who is a member of the Ho-Chunk Nation, said that part of the discussion leading to her board's unanimous approval of the resolution was bringing in other school districts for co-sponsorship in order to show the issue has strength and merit.

"I embarked on an overly ambitious effort reaching out to other districts,"

Zucker said. "It gives me shivers to think that this conversation is actually happening."

The issue is no longer just one of personal opinion, according to Zucker, and there are studies that show the mascot issue affects Native Americans and non-Native Americans alike. She noted the American Psychological Association called for a ban of native mascots in 2005.

"You're a powerful co-sponsor, having made this change years ago," Zucker told the Shawano School Board. "You're setting an excellent example for the state of Wisconsin."

Several area residents spoke out in favor of the board supporting the ban. Among them was a former Shawano Indian mascot, Richie Plass, who is a member of both the Menominee and

Stockbridge-Munsee tribes.

Plass said he was the mascot in winter 1969 after being asked by the principal, basketball coach and athletic director to fill the role.

“They wanted me to dress up and lead the basketball team, and I told them, ‘We don’t do that for show,’” Plass said. “They asked me to take some time and ask my parents and other people.”

Plass said he performed once at a home game, and he received a lot of support from the crowd, applauding and cheering. Then he was asked to do so again at an away game in Kaukauna, where the response was not so supportive.

“As I brought the team out onto the floor, the whole gymnasium started to laugh,” Plass said. “It kind of freaked me out, as I was 16, 17 years old. I stood over by the bleachers.”

It went from bad to worse as the fans shouted at Plass, and children pulled at his costume. He said he remembered being pelted with paper cups and orange and banana peels. Some guys also spat on him.

“I have been addressing this issue for just over 50 years,” Plass said, noting that he put together a traveling exhibit 15 years ago that included the old mascot on marketing items and other historical materials to help educate schools and communities.

Plass noted that it warmed his heart to see that there is a Native American group in the Shawano schools and that the response from students after a presentation last year was one of warmth, understanding and gratitude.

“It’s time for it to go,” Plass said of Native American mascots. “I am a standing, living, breathing former mascot who will just say this — we, as Indian people, are given our rights and protections through the United States Constitution. What these other schools and teams are doing, they’re racially discriminating and breaking the law against us. It’s time to change.”

Starlyn Tourtillott, a former school board member with children attending Shawano schools, also urged support, pointing out that being silent on the issue is the same as being complicit.

“We just saw a hate crime occur in our community,” Tourtillott said, referring to the arrest of a Shawano teen accused of vandalizing nearby schools with graffiti that included swastikas and racial slurs. “It’s past time being complicit and saying that it’s some

other school district’s issue to deal with. Let’s be a leader. Let’s be brave on this issue.”

Tourtillott noted that 19-20 percent of the district’s student enrollment is Native American.

“As a parent with my children, I’m here to tell you that this is an important issue,” she said. “I don’t want them to walk into an area or an environment where they feel it is hostile to learn.”

Tracy Obermeyer, chairwoman for

the district’s Title VII Parent Advisory Committee, said that, although the resolution hadn’t come to her committee’s attention, she believes it would support the board on the issue.

“Removing the negative stereotypes, using our sacred mascots and things like that, is definitely something that paints a wrong picture on who our people are,” Obermeyer said.

Board member Mart Grams, who said at a board meeting two weeks earlier that the district shouldn’t be telling other districts what they should do, changed his stance and threw his support behind the resolution.

“I talked to 53 Native Americans in the last couple of days. Many gave me the same story you did,” Grams said to the audience. “What really grabbed me were two issues. One was the evidence that it leads to lower learning and lower reading scores, etc. The one that bothered me ... was the listing of the 31 schools with mascots, and I would take those as serious, as demeaning.”

Deadline nears for Dairy Margin Coverage sign-up

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced that producers of nearly 17,000 dairy operations have signed up for the Dairy Margin Coverage program since sign-up opened June 17.

Producers interested in 2019 coverage must sign up before Sept. 20. DMC offers protection to dairy producers when the difference between

the all-milk price and the average feed cost (the margin) falls below a certain dollar amount selected by the producer.

“We’re encouraged by the number of dairy producers who have signed up for this new program, but we are hopeful that we will get more folks in the door,” said Bill Northey, USDA’s undersecretary for Farm Production and Conservation. “We are well

ahead of the number of producers covered at this time last year under the previous safety net program, with more producers enrolling every day.”

To date, more than 60% of dairies with established production histories have enrolled in the program. Wisconsin has seen the most participants, with more than 4,832 dairy operations enrolled.

USDA’s Farm Service Agency

began issuing program payments to producers July 11. DMC provides coverage retroactive to Jan. 1. The producers who have signed up to date will receive more than \$219.7 million in payments for January through June, when the income over feed cost margin was \$8.63 per hundredweight, triggering the sixth payment for eligible dairy producers who purchased the \$9 and \$9.50 levels of coverage.

Community Read keeps noses in books

Menominee library featuring bestseller 'There There' for fall

KESHENA — The Menominee Public Library has chosen its latest selection for its Community Read program, now in its ninth year of existence.

The novel "There There" by Tommy Orange, a national bestseller publishing through Penguin Random

House, will be the latest book folks on the Menominee Reservation will be buzzing about this fall. The library held its kickoff event Wednesday with people picking up the book, enjoying some lunch, watching performers at an open mic just outside the library and later, making earrings with birch bark.

The kickoff is one of several events the library will hold over the next month to promote reading in the community, culminating with a visit from Orange himself on Sept. 24. The event will be held at the cultural learning center at the College of Menominee Nation, N172 State Highway 47-55, Keshena, with

doors opening at 5 p.m. for a presentation at 6 p.m. and a book signing and question-and-answer period to follow.

Other events include a pow wow sweat on Sept. 4, a presentation on Alcatraz on Sept. 9 and a book buzz on "There There" on Sept. 17. A book buzz is an opportunity for members of the public to get together to discuss a book.

All three events begin at noon and will take place in the upper floor classroom for the library, which is also the S. Verna Fowler Academic Library for CMN.

Orange's novel followed a dozen characters representing a number

of Native American communities as they travel to the Big Oakland Powwow. There are characters like Jacquie Red Feather, who has recently become sober and is traveling back to the family she left behind; Dene Oxendene, who is going to the powwow to work in memory of his late uncle; and Orvil, a 14-year-old who will be performing traditional dance for the very first time.

"There There" has received the PEN/Hemingway Award, the National Book Critics Circle John Leonard Prize and the Center for Fiction First Novel Prize. It has received acclaim as one of the best books of the year for 2018 from the New York Times,

the Washington Post, National Public Radio, Time magazine, Entertainment Weekly and the San Francisco Chronicle, among others.

Maria Escalante, library director, said she selected the book for the Community Read fall slot because she thought it would resonate with members of the Menominee and other tribes, as the book deals with the plight of urban Native Americans as they deal with their tribes' complex histories and cultures.

"It's something that many of our people can relate to," Escalante said.

The Community Read program was started in 2011, with the library presenting two books each year, one in the fall and one in the winter, according to Escalante. The program had been funded through grants in the beginning, but now it is sustained through a partnership between CMN, the tribe and Menominee County.

"We all have something we can contribute financially, and that's how we keep it going," Escalante said. "I'm never sure how long these partnerships last, but so far, it's going good."

Escalante noted that the program started by accident. She said that the library had invited an author who had written a book on Jim Thorpe to speak, and that went over very well with folks on the reservation. Then the library was able to get a Big Read grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, and it selected a book for the community to read and discuss but did not host an author presentation.

"We were just getting people to read, and then we thought it would be really nice to have the author, and we didn't expect them to come, but actually, they were happy to come to stuff like this," Escalante said. "It hasn't been that difficult."

Escalante said she tries to alternate the books so that some of the selected choices are written by Native Americans and some are written by non-natives.

"We just had Jamie Ford, and he's not a Native author," Escalante said. "His background was Chinese."

Throughout the years, the library has featured books by writers like Hattie Kauffman, a Native American journalist; Jessica Jackley, an author and entrepreneur; Jeanette Walls, who wrote "The Glass Castle"; Sherman Alexie, who wrote "The Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian"; and Robert Morgan, past winner for the Thomas Wolfe Memorial Literary Award.

"Some of them are bigger names, and some of them are people you've

never heard of," Escalante said.

The program has remained successful through the years. Escalante usually purchases 200 books for each Community Read, and rarely has there been any books left by the time each campaign ended.

"People like to read," Escalante said. "A lot of book clubs come and get their books, and they're happy because they don't have to pay for it. It's free."

She added that many times, community members will say they appreciate the program, as some of the books are ones they ordinarily wouldn't have looked at were it not for the library spotlighting them.

"You never know how people are going to react, but for the most part, we'll get books that appeal to a wide audience," Escalante said.

The ordinance does not pertain when both parties are adults. The ordinance includes inappropriate images/video and also texting that involves content of a sexual nature, again when one of the parties involved is a child. This is a growing problem with underage children using social media. Currently the only tool that law enforcement has is to charge minors that are sexting with possessing or sharing child pornography. If they are charged as an adult, that charge carries a 3-year minimum mandatory penalty in prison. If two juveniles are charged, it is a long process that involves several county agency's time (Sheriff's Dept., DA, Human Services, etc.) which may or may not result in charges. With the ordinance in effect, in many cases, law enforcement could then just issue an ordinance citation. Questions by several supervisors were fielded by Kowaleski and Lenzner. Ordinance No. 9-19 was adopted 25 Yes, 0 No, 2 Absent. A summary of Ordinance No. 9-19 was published in the Shawano Leader on Saturday, July 27, 2019.

Fawn survey offers insights into deer survival and predation

Nature designed a fawn's spotted coat as the ultimate camouflage. The white spots break up the otherwise solid brown appearance, protecting it from predators.

There's the challenge of the annual Fawn Survey, which combines the knowledge and expertise of seasoned biologists with the sheer enthusiasm and sweat equity of volunteers. Finding the supremely hidden

critters is the tough part.

Despite the mosquitoes (not bad) and weather (pretty good), the crew managed to catch and radio collar a record 128 fawns this spring on 50 private properties in southwest Wisconsin — 28 more than goal, explained Dana Jarosinski, assistant project coordinator with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. There were no accidents or injuries during the annual search for fawns.

Most of the deer were captured and collared in Iowa County. This is the third year of the fawn survival study, which will wrap up next year. Once the collars are in place, the fawns are monitored throughout the spring and summer to determine survival rate and causes of death. Monitoring then continues throughout the year.

"We were a little bit worried about whether or not we were going to be successful because of how the winter was, with the adult deer and the does," Jarosinski said. "It started off a little bit rocky. We didn't have as many fawns, but

when the peak came around May 26 and 27, like it usually does, we had a string of really successful days and knew that we would easily pass our goal."

Volunteers from age 8 to 80 donated 1,800 hours of their time to the cause, including middle- and high-school students who get hands-on wildlife research, noted project coordinator Wes Ellarson.

"When you're working with people that are interested in following this kind of thing in their career path, it's cool to show them some of their first experiences in the field," he said.

Keeping volunteers motivated and spirits high, even after long days of searching for fawns, is one of the biggest challenges to the project, according to Crew Leader Samantha Bundick. However, it always lifts spirits when a fawn is discovered.

"They're very charismatic little animals," she said. "Seeing everyone's reaction to that is always a ton of fun to watch."

Searching for fawns in the woods also turns up other critters and natural wonders — both good and bad, according to Daniel Storm, the DNR's deer and elk biologist.

"We always see lots of cool things when we fawn search: turkey nests, snakes, mushrooms, etc.," Storm said. "This was a really good year for monarch butterflies, so that was pretty cool. The ticks weren't too bad actually. The black flies and mosquitoes weren't too bad either, until after Memorial Day."

Storm agreed that keeping morale up with the volunteers can be tough at times.

"Fawns are hard to spot and we really have to actively look to find them consistently," he said. "Keeping people motivated to actively search

can get tough if it's especially hot or if we've gone long stretches without finding fawns. The biggest challenge is just coordinating everything; lining up properties each day and making sure our gear is stocked."

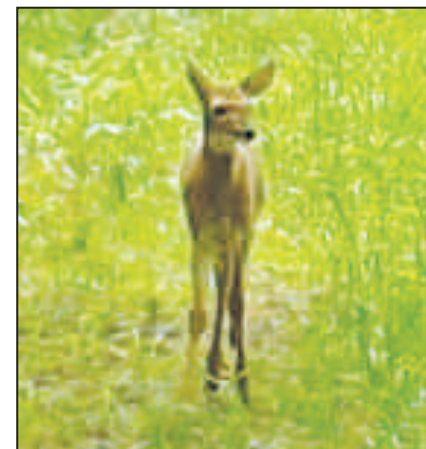
The annual surveys have yielded some hard data to answer persistent questions about which predators and other killers take the most fawns. It's important to remember that a fawn is defined as a deer born that spring, so those young deer surviving the fall and winter hunting seasons then face the challenge of winter's cold and potentially deep snow.

"In the Northwoods, fawn survival can be low following a severe winter, as low as 25 percent, but more often closer to 50%," Storm said. "In the Shawano/Waupaca area, fawn survival was around 50 to 60 percent. In Iowa County, fawn survival has been 60 to 70 percent so far, but we're still in the middle of our study."

"We're just now doing our summer fawn surveys (observations) now. We wait until the end of summer, because fawns are harder to observe earlier in the summer and because we want to wait until the summer is essentially over, since most of the fawn mortality occurs earlier in the spring and summer. This tells us how the many new deer made it to the hunting season and will tell us how winter impacted fawn production."

Although the multi-year study is no longer radio-collaring fawns in Shawano and Waupaca County area, he does have data to share.

"In the Shawano/Waupaca area, there wasn't very much coyote predation," Storm said. "In fact, the number one cause of death was starvation, which indicates that some does were abandoning their

fawns because those does were coming out of winter in bad shape. In the north, coyotes will take their fair share, but black bears were number one (predators). In Iowa County, coyotes have been the number 1 cause of death for fawns so far, but we're only half way through this study."

If there's a lesson that everyone can learn from the fawn study, it's that most of this spring's fawns seen or found alone are not orphans.

"We occasionally see the mother, but not too often," Storm said. "Typically, the doe will be bedded away from the fawn. They mostly just go to the fawn to nurse them. Otherwise they mostly keep away, to make it easier for the fawn to hide. So when people see a fawn by itself it is almost never abandoned."

Joke's on Perdue if 'whine cellar' comes back to bite him

There's a time to be funny, and there's a time to shut up and listen. U.S. Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue apparently can't tell time.

It has not been an easy go of things for American farmers. The recent wave of tariffs that has engulfed many farmers in its unforgiving wake, combined with changing climate and falling commodity prices has made many of our beloved food producers feel like they're on a deserted island the size of a pickup truck with bloodthirsty sharks circling.

With all that's going on, it's understandable that many of those farmers are frustrated with America's food policies, and some of them let Perdue know that. Instead of being a professional, and instead of assuring farmers that their concerns have merit and will be taken seriously, Perdue decided to test out a future career as a comedian.

The joke: What do you call two farmers in a basement?

The punchline: A whine cellar. The verdict: Perdue should not quit his day job. On second thought, maybe he should, as his purpose as agriculture secretary is to work with the farmers, not line them up and deliver a sucker-punch to the gut that says, "I really don't care about you."

The ongoing trade war with China has left many farmers on edge. The U.S. Department of Agriculture's own data shows that the farm sector is in debt to the tune of \$426.6 billion, according to a Fox Business report. When you go to a federal official seeking answers, you shouldn't walk away feeling like the government doesn't care whether your livelihood lives or dies.

American Farm Bureau Federation President Zippy Duvall recently said that tariffs are higher than farmers have seen in decades. He said the bureau's economists showed exports to China were down in the first half of 2019 by \$1.3 billion, a tough pill to swallow with the total market in 2018 being \$9.1 billion, which is a steep drop from the \$19.5 billion in exports to China in 2017.

This is a crisis. This is not something to be laughed off. Considering Perdue was born into a farming family

in Georgia, you would think he would have more respect for the trade. Other agriculture secretaries have worked hand in hand with the American farmer to make sure the people are getting enough to eat without putting those farmers into bankruptcy. Perdue's joke indicates he's less than interested in helping the people who grow the corn and raise the cattle.

President Donald Trump's administration is pledging a \$16 billion aid package to the farmers who have been impacted by the China tariffs and the continuing trade war. However, the last Trump aid package for our agriculture community did little to buoy farms that lost business because of the administration's policies.

That should be something Perdue addresses and finds a solution to. As agriculture secretary, he needs to find ways to keep farms from giving up and buckling from the losses and debt. We don't have a society anymore where everybody produces their own food and trades for the stuff they don't have.

This might sound like it's coming from a person who has no sense of humor. This is not the case, as anyone who knows me knows I try to keep things as light as possible — at least most of the time. However, most

people with a lick of common sense knows better than to make a joke out of someone's misery.

Think about it. How many people would recite jokes about boarding schools in front of Native Americans? How about jokes about the Holocaust in front of Jewish people and other Europeans who had families live through that era? Jokes about slavery in front of black people?

Obviously racial and bigoted jokes are frowned upon, but poor taste in humor is not limited to a person's skin color or religious preference. How many jokes are uttered in mixed company about 9/11, or any of the school and mall shootings? Anything that turns a serious plight into something trivial at the expense of other people is something that should be pondered carefully — or best avoided entirely.

So Perdue should cut out the jokes when he's meeting people. He's not fit to be a comedian, and unless he can focus his attentions on finding a solution to America's agriculture black hole, he might not be fit to manage the nation's farmers, either.
