Barbershop 'vintage grunge' downtown

Facade features faces of yesteryear

SHAWANO — The distinctive blue and red swirl of the barber pole used to be the ticket to draw customers in for a shave and a haircut.

Now, those colors swirl in a different way on Main Street in Shawano. The building facade of what will become the home of the Shawano Barbers is awash in red, blue, black and white. Instead of a swirl, the colors are stencil and spray paint images of celebrities of the past. Johnny Cash leads customers into the doorway, and Marilyn Monroe can be found street side.

Spencer Young, owner of Forever Young Designs, called the design "classic vintage, with a little grunge."

That's exactly what Shawano Barbers owner Jesse Krajenka is looking for.

"We wanted celebrities from this era, because a lot of barbering comes from this old-school, classic time," Krajenka said. "It's a dying trade, and a true barber is hard to find. We figured (the mural) would stand out in Shawano and in the whole area — it is so unique."

For Young, the building mural is an enjoyable part of his graphic arts business. The Seymour resident said he does all kinds of graphic

design, but he is most known for the large fence outside of Lambeau Field in Green Bay. On a smaller scale, he also designed the Shawano Barbers business logo.

The Shawano Barbers is currently located in the 500 block of Main Street in Shawano. Krajenka is spending this week between his new site at 113 S. Main St., Shawano, and the Shawano County Fair. Of-

ficial date for regular hours at the new location is Tuesday.

The shop offers men's haircuts, beard work, straight razor and hot towel shaves — traditional barber services, he said. He said he also offers city designs in hair, with fresh fades and an edgier style of hair cutting.

Krajenka said he move to the new location allowed him to design his interior space with a clean, pro-

fessional look. For a small specialty business such as a barber, he said he was looking for quality rather than quantity in his shop space.

"The first impression is everything," Krajenka said, speaking of both his craft and location. The public, he said, "will see that this is awesome."

Activities planned for Library Card month

SHAWANO — As students prepare to head back to school, there is one essential school supply that requires no shopping and doesn't cost a penny — a library card.

This September, Shawano County Library is joining with the American Library Association for Library Card Sign-up Month to encourage parents, caregivers and students to obtain a free library card.

Whether it's providing access to free programs, educational apps, homework help or technology workshops, a library card is one of the most cost-effective back-to-school supplies. Resources at the Shawano County Library are available to anyone with a library card.

Studies show children who are

read to in the home and who use the library perform better in school and are more likely to continue to use the library as a source of lifetime learning. "Throughout the school year, our library offers a variety of programs to stimulate an interest in reading and learning," said Kristie Hauer, library director. "Story hours expose young children to the joy of reading and encourage school readiness, while older children have access to technology and digital tools and help from library staff to use those resources."

Throughout September, the Shawano County Library will host many activities at the main library and branches, including bonus checkouts on the hoopla digital

database (10 instead of the usual four), free replacement library cards and half off library fines from Sept. 9-14.

- Free book giveaway at Bonduel Founders' Day on Sept. 21.
- Family activities at Tigerton's Applefest on Sept. 28.

County Board supervisor remembered by her peers

Bonnie Olson passed away last week at 63

SHAWANO — Shawano County Board members this week remembered Supervisor Bonnie Olson as a caring and dedicated representative of the county.

Olson, 63, passed away Wednesday after a battle with cancer.

"Bonnie certainly was a caring board member who thought about Shawano County and her constituents," said Board Chairman Jerry Erdmann. "She was always looking out for the county and what was in the best interests of the people of Shawano County."

Erdmann said Olson was also more than willing to take on different duties.

Olson represented District 17, which covers Wards 1 and 2 of the town of Belle Plaine and Ward 1 of the town of Richmond.

She had been on the County Board for nine years and four months.

"Bonnie was probably one of the most like-minded people I have ever served with," said District 1 Supervisor

Deb Noffke.

"She read everything. She would think about everything in the (board) packet from both perspectives," she said.

"Any time we enact something, there's always a cause-effect," Noffke said. "There's always two sides. She was very thorough. Just a very diligent board member."

Noffke, who served with Olson on the social services and administrative committees over the years, also said Olson was a very fair person.

"She's somebody I really admired," she said. "I don't know how they'll replace her. They won't."

District 13 Supervisor Kevin Conradt sat next to Olson at County Board meetings and works for Olson Rural Electric, the company owned by Olson and her husband, Dick. He also served with her on the capital improvement projects committee.

"She was always a pleasure to work with," Conradt said. "She was very knowledgeable and wasn't afraid to give her opinion. She was very understanding and knowledgeable of what she was voting on and she wasn't afraid to ask questions."

Erdmann said he will seek to appoint someone to fill out the remain-

der of Olson's term on the board prior to the April election.

"If it were a short period of time, I would wait until next spring's election but due to the fact there's enough months remaining, we will put an ad in the paper and look at hopefully getting in some interested people and decide from there and appoint a person," he said.

In addition to the County Board, Olson was on the Pella Mutual board of directors for many years. She earned her pilot's license and was a member of the Shawano Blue Skies.

She was a member of St. Martin Lutheran Church in the town of Belle Plaine, where she served as president of the Ladies Aid and enjoyed singing in the church choir.

Bonnie also loved the outdoors and was an avid deer hunter, gardener, and enjoyed taking care of her flowers. She liked canning and was always looking forward to time spent quilting with her daughter.

A memorial service will be held for Bonnie at 11 a.m. on Saturday at the St. Martin Lutheran Church in the town of Belle Plaine, W8302 Belle Plaine Ave.

Goga retires and sells Family Vision Center

Martell looks forward to private practice

WITTENBERG — A chance discussion at the gym paved a path for retirement for one and a path to owning a business for another.

Doctors of Optometry Raymond Goga and Ken Martell struck up a conversation at the YMCA one day discussing their futures.

Goga was thinking about retirement but hadn't made any plans toward that goal. Martell, working for Shopko Optical since 2000, was thinking about going into private practice. What grew out of that conversation was a win-win scenario for both.

Goga owned and operated Family Vision Center, his private practices in Wittenberg and Marathon City, and was in a partnership at Envision Eyecare with Dr. Chris Marquardt and Dr. Jeff Sarazen in Wausau.

Last year, Goga had sold his portion of the Envision Eyecare clinic in Wausau to his daughter, Dr. Erin Goga, who had been working in the Wittenberg office since 2009.

In 1977, Goga opened the clinic in Wittenberg mostly because he

got such a warm reception when he was first looking in the area.

"Wittenberg has always been so good to me," said Goga, fondly. "The bank and all the other businesses were so good to me. I made some good friends — not just pa-

tients, I made friends."

Twenty years ago, on the suggestion of a patient at his Wausau clinic, he opened another office in Marathon City. With three locations, he has been a very busy man.

Martell grew up in Wausau and has been with Shopko since 2000, working out of the Wausau and Marshfield locations. The last three years, most of his focus had been in Marshfield.

"Shopko was a good company to work for, it's just unfortunate what happened," said Martell, referring to the company filing for bankruptcy earlier this year.

He noted that this will be a better opportunity for him as well as less traveling time between Marathon City and Wittenberg.

"It's a nice business to be in a private business," said Goga who acknowledged that corporate security is nice, but he has enjoyed being a business owner.

He and his wife, Julie, will continue travelling, which is something they have always made time for in the past. Goga plans to spend more

time with his music; he's taught himself both drums and guitar. In 2013, he self-published a novel, "And the Band Played Nam," about a teenage girl band that toured with the USO. He admits there may be another book in him.

When he first came to Wittenberg, he played for the baseball team, which helped him form long, solid friendships. At 70, he now plays on a softball team but has also been having fun with pickleball, which is a fast-paced combination of tennis, badminton and ping pong. The paddle sport was created for all ages and skill levels and is gaining popularity in Wausau.

At 47, Martell is looking forward to making friends here over the next 20 years.

He and his wife, Stephanie, live in Wausau. Their son, Steven, 20, is majoring in biochemistry and neurobiology at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and wants to do research. Daughter Katie is a senior at Wausau East and is thinking about working in physical or occupational therapy.

Woodlawn Cemetery, once neglected, now beautiful resting place

Did you know there are over 100 cemeteries in Shawano County? There is a website that lists the cemeteries, along with a map showing where they are located.

Researching the history of cemeteries, I learned that, in the late 1800s, the Shawano Cemetery, as it was known then, was very neglected. It was filled with weeds and it was difficult to get to the graves.

In 1898, a group of women met at the home of Mrs. H. Nabor to discuss how they could improve and beautify the cemetery. The ladies organized the Shawano Cemetery Improvement Society on

July 6, 1898.

The ladies walked up muddy Green Bay Street, to the cemetery, shovels and rakes in hand, to clean up the weeds and the mess made by loose cattle and horses.

The society gathered up enough money to purchase a lawn mower in 1899. The ladies grew flowers at home, and when they were sturdy, they planted them by the graves.

In 1908, the first caretaker was hired. A vote was taken to officially name the cemetery Woodlawn Cemetery.

In 1910, the cost of a cemetery lot was \$50. In 1910, the association, now incorporated, purchased markers for pauper's graves. They sought a grant to fix soldier's graves.

In 1918, the association asked the city to build a chapel in memory of the soldiers and sailors. A memorial circle was designed as a tribute to them. I am sure those of you who are familiar with the cemetery have seen the white

headstones to the west of the circle. Twenty lots were reserved for World War I veterans.

Woodlawn Cemetery is also the final resting place for many who served in the Civil War. There are over 900 veterans buried in the cemetery.

Old cemetery records tell us the first person buried in the cemetery was a veteran. However, he did not lose his life at war. His name was George S. Miller. He was home on furlough and fell from a grain wagon, causing his death.

Finally, in 1924, the Shawano City Council agreed to build a chapel at the cemetery. It was a slow and tedious process. The cornerstone, containing a time capsule, was laid on May 18, 1937.

On July 6, 1941, the lovely stone building was dedicated as "The Little Church in the Pinewood." There is a simple altar in the church where babies were baptized, happy couples were married, and last rites were given. The non-denominational church is on the Wisconsin Historical Society register.

A portion of the west side of the cemetery, added in 1932, was turned over to the Catholic Cemetery Association.

In 1987, the conveyance of the cemetery property and all the trust funds from the trustees of the Woodlawn Shawano Cemetery Association to the city of Shawano were recorded.

In 1995, the chapel was given a much-needed facelift. The roof was repaired, new carpeting was installed and a fresh coat of paint was applied. The original Schulmerich Carillon, placed in the chapel in 1968, was updated to digital. The update was made possible from the Helen Wegenke memorial funds.

The lovely bell chime songs can be heard ringing through the trees as they bring comfort and peace to those visiting the cemetery. Although I have heard them often, they always cause me to stop and reflect.

The most recent project at Woodlawn was the Veteran's Memorial. It included two monuments, eight new flag poles, five benches and landscaping. The project was funded by donations from several military organizations and private individuals. The single largest contributor was the Shawano AmVets.

The Woodlawn Cemetery is maintained by Shawano Park and Recre-

ation Department. Patti Pingel is the primary custodian. She is a dedicated and conscientious employee, who can be seen braving the elements as she mows, weeds and cares for the grave sites.

Although Woodlawn Cemetery is one of the most beautiful and well-maintained cemeteries in the area, unfortunately there are always those who either don't know the rules or don't choose to follow them.

Picking flowers, driving over lots or graves, disrespecting grave sites or bringing animals into the cemetery grounds are prohibited. The cemetery clean-up periods are between Oct. 1 and Nov. 15 and between April 1 and May 1. Decorations and containers that remain following the clean-up periods are considered abandoned and will be removed.

The cemetery is open daily one-half hour before sunrise and until one-half hour after sunset.

COURT NEWS

Possession with intent to deliver marijuana

Two Shawano residents have been charged with multiple felony drug counts after police responded to a report of a disturbance at their residence in the city.

Marcus L. Whitley, 35, and Samantha J. Shawanokasic, 31, are each charged with possession with intent to deliver marijuana and maintaining a drug trafficking place.

According to the criminal complaint, police responded to a disturbance on Eberlein Park Drive at about 9:30 a.m. on Aug. 17.

Whitley and Shawanokasic were both taken into custody on outstanding warrants, but during those arrests police observed drug paraphernalia and a small plastic bag containing plant material, according to the complaint.

Police returned later with a search warrant and found vape cartridges holding a total 325.14 grams of marijuana, the complaint states.

Whitley and Shawanokasic could each face a maximum 3½ years in prison and \$10,000 fine if convicted of the felony drug counts.

Whitley also faces felony counts of second offense or subsequent possession of marijuana and misappropriating identity information to avoid penalty.

Whitley and Shawanokasic were both ordered held on a \$500 cash bond set by Judge James Habeck. They are due back in court for an adjourned initial appearance Tuesday.

Recent proceedings in Shawano-Menominee

County Circuit Court include the following:

- Luke J. Sanford, 30, of Gresham, was charged Aug. 26 with felony counts of taking and driving a vehicle without consent and bail jumping. He could face a maximum six years in prison and \$10,000 fine on each count if convicted. He was released on a \$1,000 signature bond set by Judge James Habeck. A future court date was not set.

- Dolores E. Garcia, 36, of Green Bay, was charged Aug. 26 with felony counts of possession of methamphetamine and bail jumping. She could face a maximum 3½ years in prison and \$10,000 fine if convicted of possession of methamphetamine and six years and a \$10,000 fine for bail jumping. She was ordered held on a \$750 cash bond by Judge James Habeck and is scheduled for an adjourned initial appearance Sept. 9.

- Manuel Mendoza, 39, of Keshena, was charged Aug. 26 with a felony count of possession of methamphetamine, and, in a separate criminal complaint, with felony retail theft. He could face a maximum 3½ years in prison and \$10,000 fine on each charge if convicted. He was ordered held on a \$2,500 cash bond by Judge James Habeck on the charge of possession of methamphetamine and a \$500 cash bond on the retail theft charge. He is scheduled for an adjourned initial appearance in both cases on Sept. 19.

- Shua Y. Vang, 34, of Shawano, was charged Aug. 23 with a felony county of possession of

narcotic drugs. She could face a maximum 3½ years in prison and a \$10,000 fine if convicted. She was ordered held on a \$500 cash bond by Judge James Habeck and is due back in court for an adjourned initial appearance Sept. 16.

- Misty D. Curry, 41, of Keshena, was charged Aug. 22 with a felony count of possession of methamphetamine. She could face a maximum 3½ years in prison and a \$10,000 fine if convicted. She is free on a \$500 signature bond set by Judge James Habeck and is due back in court for an adjourned initial appearance Sept. 16.

- David C. King, 38, of Birnamwood, was charged Aug. 19 with a felony count of strangulation and suffocation. He could face a maximum six years in prison and a \$10,000 fine if convicted. He is free on a \$1,000 signature bond set by Judge James Habeck and is scheduled for a preliminary hearing on Nov. 22.

- David A. Faust, 30, of Birnamwood, was sentenced Aug. 16 to eight months in Shawano County Jail with work release privileges on a felony charge of fleeing an officer in a vehicle that took place on May 14, 2018. Faust had pleaded guilty to the charge.

- Daniel I. Fulton, 41, of Green Bay, was sentenced Aug. 15 to nine months in jail as a condition of five years' probation on a felony count of child enticement-sexual contact that occurred in April. Fulton, who pleaded guilty to the charge, was also ordered by Judge James Habeck to register as a sex offender for 15 years.

A HARDY LOT

Hibiscus forms amazing backdrop during late summer

One of the more stunning and flamboyant blooming shrubs now comes into bloom as summer begins to slide into autumn and the days begin to shorten. Hardy hibiscus, also known as rose mallow, features blooms that may reach 6-10 inches across in some selections, making it a prized addition to the summer garden.

Reaching 5-6 feet in height at full maturity, these shrubs provide a breathtaking display during late summer, where they form a beautiful backdrop or create an impressive specimen plant for long-term enjoyment.

Once they begin to bloom, these shrubs can bloom for several weeks, featuring dozens upon dozens of large buds that unfurl into massive, crêpe paper blooms.

Most of the hardy hibiscus for our area bloom in shades of pink, red or white, though there are other varieties in pale yellow, lavender and purple.



Do not confuse these shrubs with the tropical hibiscus shrubs often sold in garden centers that are not hardy in our area and feature tropical colored blooms in red, yellow, orange and other bright, tropical colors.

Also known as rose mallow, a native shrub to the wetlands of Wisconsin, these hybrid hardy hibiscus have been bred to display some of the biggest blooms found in the garden during any time of the year. Some may exceed 8 or 10 inches across when the shrub has matured after 3-5 years in the garden.

A word of caution to gardeners who grow this plant: these shrubs are notoriously late in coming up in the spring, often, not emerging above the soil until around June 1. Many gardeners have assumed the shrubs did that return when out in the garden in April and May, and simply dug them up while they were still dormant. Allow plenty of time for this shrub to naturally emerge in late spring or early summer. Once the new growth appears, the stems and canes grow rapidly, forming

buds in late July and August.

Even when not in bloom, hardy hibiscus makes an attractive and statuesque display plant in the garden. Many feature colorful foliage in rich purple or deep green. Some are rounded and heart shaped in leaf, while others are finally cut, almost like a Japanese maple.

Many popular varieties of hardy hibiscus are sold. Some feature candy cane colored blossoms in patterns of red and white. Others feature a bull's eye bloom with a dark eye zone surrounded by a lighter or swirled pattern among the outer pedals. Others are solid colored in beautiful pastel pink, scarlet red, wine and rose.

Most varieties of hardy hibiscus grow best and reach their best proportions in full sun. Many are also adapted to part shade. Be sure to read the specific plant tag for each variety to determine placement in the garden.

Wittenberg has business that's Down to Earth

New location offers toxin-free environment

WITTENBERG — When Kristy McRae decided to move her Down to Earth Healing and Massage business to a vacant building in downtown Wittenberg, her prime concern was for the health and well-being of her customers.

"We basically gutted the building all the way down to the studs," said McRae.

Since the point of her practice is to remove toxins from the body so that it might heal itself, ordinary construction products were not going to be sufficient.

With just the outside walls left intact, the entire building at 105 W. Vinal St. got new wiring, plumbing and insulation. Beyond a cosmetic makeover, the top priority was using safe, green building products so that clients with sensitivities could safely utilize her services.

McRae noted that the new insulation is made up of ripped jeans and fabric. The paint she used was free of volatile organic compounds, and the floors are made of bamboo — a renewable resource that is also VOC-free. A specialized air filtration system is part of the heating, ventilation and air conditioning system. She has additional air filtration devices in the areas where she plans to teach classes.

To complete these improvements, McRae received a \$1,000 matching grant from the Wittenberg Area Development Corp.

"It was amazing they were willing to do that for us," she said. "We are very, very grateful."

McRae said she is also grateful for discovering the practice of Reiki, which she said helped ease the symptoms of depression that she struggled with about 10 years ago. She said that her busy lifestyle and multiple jobs left her feeling frazzled and led to a series of panic attacks. Unable to calm herself, McRae said she decided to look for alternative treatments before taking prescription medication.

"Reiki, also known as energy healing, saved my life," said McRae.

While unaccustomed to the newfound calmness at first, McRae said she felt compelled to learn more about Reiki and went on to become a certi-

fied Reiki master teacher.

In 2014, McRae became a certified massage therapist and set up shop on Howard Street. Her location in the basement, however, posed a challenge for some clients with mobility issues.

So when the opportunity came to buy the building on Vinal, she took a leap of faith and bought it.

"Depression is on the rise in our society," said McRae. "I feel a lot of people don't know what to do, and lot of what I offer is what has worked for me." She added that people with any kind of illness or condition should check with their physicians before utilizing her services.

Trained in a variety of massage styles, McRae is able to incorporate several techniques to best help her clients. She offers massage cupping, which involves placing cups on the skin to create suction and help reduce pain and inflammation. Neuro-muscular release is retraining the muscle memory so the feeling of a muscle "knot" goes away. Ashiatsu massage involves her standing on top of the massage table and, with the assistance of railings attached to the ceiling, she walks on the body, offering better control and a deeper massage.

Also in her practice is a top-of-the-line infrared sauna. Held together by magnets rather than glue, the sauna offers a space to detoxify the body or help treat skin conditions such as eczema or psoriasis. The sauna, currently available to her existing clients, will be available for new clients at a later date.

She also offers sound therapy with therapeutic bowls — a practice that has shown success with autistic children, as the sound vibrations are calming, she said.

McRae is looking forward to holding classes one night a week this fall, including Reiki. She can comfortably fit 13 in the main room and would like to offer meditation and yoga for children. She plans to bring in guest speakers and teachers.

McRae lives in Birnamwood with her husband, Scott, and their two daughters, Madalyn and Vivian.

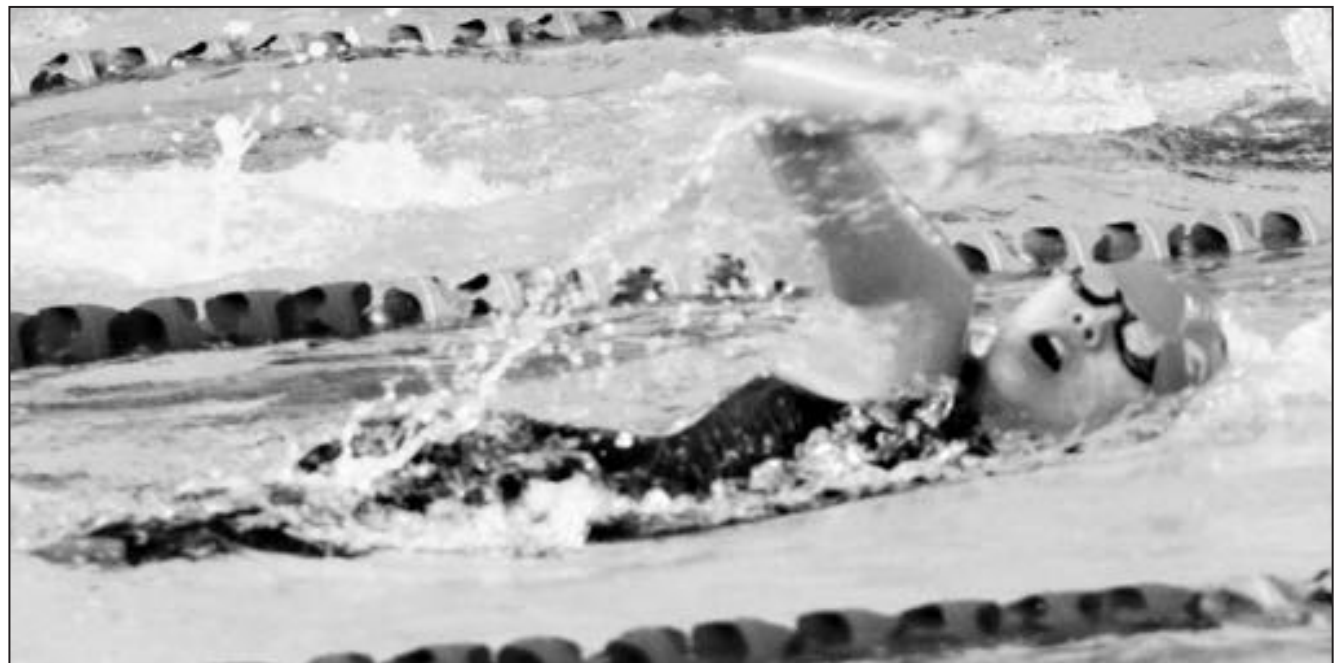

Eagles fly past Timberwolves in return to 11-man

Tiger Dixon passes for 3 TDs in win

KESHENA — It wasn't a picture perfect start for the Menominee Indian High School football team, but the Eagles didn't lose hope and eventually pulled away for a 27-12 nonconference win over Living Word Lutheran on Saturday.

The game marked Menominee Indian's return to 11-man football after spending the previous four seasons playing 8-man.

Senior quarterback Tiger Dixon passed for 327 yards and three touchdowns to lead the charge for the Eagles on offense.

Senior running back Pasen Waupoose also had a big game in the balanced Menominee Indian attack. He carried the ball 18 times for 102 yards, including a 37-yard touchdown run to cap the win.

After Waupoose's touchdown run, Living Word Lutheran decided to call the game with too many players injured.

Sophomore Andre Corn hauled in five receptions for 202 yards and a pair of scores, while sophomore Allen Smith had the other touchdown reception from Dixon.

The Eagles quarterback was able to extend several plays with his athleticism, allowing receivers to continue to work the secondary and eventually spring open.

"We have a lot of speed at receiver, you've seen the plays we can break off," said Dixon, who credited his blockers for giving him time to move around and make plays. "I said (to the receivers before the season started), 'by the time I get out of the pocket, our set play is done. You guys just run with me and I'll hit you guys (with passes).'"

"That's not something that just happens, that's from our communication and that's just part of what we do."

Hoping to get off to a strong start, Menominee Indian instead might have been too excited to start the game. The hosts committed several penalties

and was loose with the football on the opening possession of the game.

After the teams each punted twice, Living Word Lutheran got on the scoreboard first after scooping up a fumble and returning it for a score.

The Eagles were forced to punt on their next possession, but recovered a fumble to get new life. Several plays later, Dixon hit Smith for a 20-yard touchdown pass on fourth down. After the two-point conversion, Menominee Indian led 8-6.

The Timberwolves looked to be on their way to the go-ahead score, but fumbled inside the Eagles' 5. Four plays later, Dixon hit Corn for a 67-yard score to make it 14-6.

LWL opened the second half returning the kickoff 86 yards to tighten up the game, but Menominee Indian halted the two-point try to cling to a two-point lead.

The Eagles ensuing drive ended in Dixon's third touchdown pass, as he found Corn for a 59-yard score.

After stuffing a fourth down play to end the Timberwolves' drive, the Eagles looked to be on their way to delivering the knockout blow, but fumbled near the goal line.

Menominee Indian again forced LWL to punt, and this time, the hosts were able to put the game away with Waupoose's highlight reel touchdown run.

"We had some things not go our way (early in the game), but this is a pretty resilient group through thick and thin," said Menominee Indian coach Chris Clache.

"I couldn't be happier with our guys. They responded very well. We talk about adversity all the time and how you respond and react to it. I think they did a very good job of re-

sponding to it." Menominee Indian will look to carry the momentum over into its next game, a Central Wisconsin Conference-Small Division clash at Rosholt.

SHAWANO — With a week of practice under their belts, area volleyball teams are eager to start playing matches.

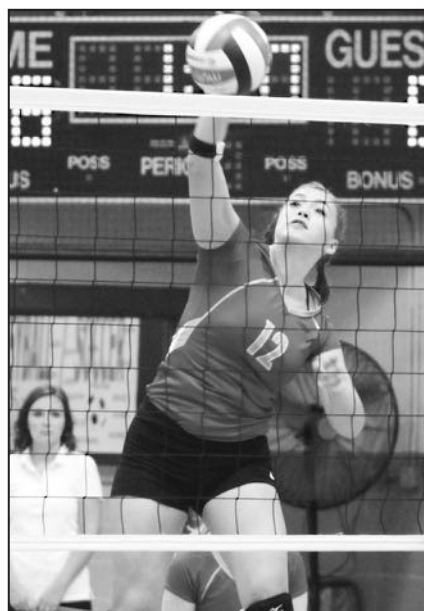

FSA now accepts debit card payments

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency is expanding its payment options to accept debit cards and Automated Clearing House debit.

These paperless payment options enable FSA customers to pay farm loan payments, measurement service fees, farm program debt repayments and administrative service fees, as well as to purchase aerial maps.

"Our customers have spoken, and we've listened," said Bill Northey, USDA's undersecretary for farm production and conservation. "Finding ways to improve customer service and efficiency is important for our farmers, ranchers, producers and forest landowners who work hard for our nation every day. Now our customers can make electronic payments instantly by stopping in our offices or calling over the phone."

Previously, only cash, check, money orders and wires were ac-

cepted. By using debit cards and ACH debit, transactions are securely processed from the customer's financial institution through Pay.gov, the U.S. Treasury's online payment hub.

While traditional collection methods will continue, offering the new alternatives will improve effectiveness and convenience to customers while being more cost effective. In 2017, the average cost to manually process checks, a process that included navigating multiple systems, cost USDA more than \$4.6 million. The expanded payment options will cut the time employees take processing payments by 75%.

"At USDA, we're focused on modernization to improve customer service," Northey said. "If half of our customers use these new payment options, we'll see a \$1 million savings in one year. These new payment methods are one part of a much larger effort to expand options for our customers, as well as to make our services more effective and efficient."

The announcement marks the beginning of a multi-phased roll-out of new payment options for USDA customers. Ultimately, payment option flexibility will be extended to allow farmers and producers to use debit cards and ACH debit payments to make payments for all FSA programs, including farm storage

facility loan repayments, farm loan facility fees, marketing assistance loan repayments, Dairy Margin Coverage administrative fees and premiums and Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program fees.
