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2 arrested after high-speed chase

Driver, passenger charged with possession of meth

SHAWANO — Two people were arrested on drug charges and other felony counts Thursday including reckless endangerment after a high-speed pursuit in the town of Wescott.

Janine A. Doxtator, 37, of Green Bay, was charged with felony counts of recklessly endangering safety, fleeing an officer and possession of methamphetamine, and a misdemeanor count of possession of drug paraphernalia.

Her passenger, Clayton E. Thunder, 42, of Green Bay, was charged with a felony count of possession

of methamphetamine and misdemeanor counts of possession of drug paraphernalia and an illegally obtained prescription.

According to the criminal complaint, Shawano County sheriff's deputies were alerted to a vehicle that had fled from Menominee Tribal Police and was headed into Shawano County on state Highway 47-55.

Deputies spotted the vehicle at County Road A and a chase ensued at speeds of 70-80 mph in a 55 mph zone, according to the complaint. The vehicle took up both lanes of traffic, according to the complaint, as it continued to cross over the center line.

Stockbridge-Munsee police employed a spike strip to disable the vehicle as it entered Gresham after the eight-mile chase.

During the arrests, authorities found empty gem bags, tin foil with burned residue, pills, a broken glass

pipe used for smoking meth and another glass pipe used for smoking marijuana.

Doxtator could face a maximum 10 years in prison and \$25,000 fine if found guilty of second-degree recklessly endangering safety, and 3½ years and a \$10,000 fine on each count of fleeing an officer and possession of methamphetamine.

She was ordered held on a \$500 cash bond and \$2,000 signature bond set by Judge James Habeck. She is due back in court for an adjourned initial appearance on Sept. 16.

Thunder could face a maximum 3½ years in prison and a \$10,000 fine if convicted of possession of methamphetamine.

Thunder is free on a \$1,500 signature bond set by Habeck and is scheduled for an adjourned initial appearance Sept. 9.

Clintonville to raze municipal pool

Facility has been unused for almost 4 years due to fire

CLINTONVILLE — Progress was made on Clintonville's ongoing swimming pool saga Thursday night.

The Park and Recreation Committee voted to recommend that the Finance and Insurance Committee accept a bid to raze and remove the municipal outdoor swimming pool in Bucholtz Park. The site

would then be filled with soil and reseeded.

The bid of \$37,500 comes from Go Green Recycling and Quarry, Fremont. Justin McAuly, park and recreation director, said in his report that five contractors had submitted bids for the pool removal and ranged as high as \$100,654. McAuly's department will keep some of the fencing and the porpoise.

According to McAuly, the facility has been checked for lead and asbestos. The test for lead was negative; however, the caulking on part of the roof does have some asbestos and has to be removed before the demolition can be completed.

The pool has not been in opera-

tion since a fire of unknown cause damaged part of the bath house in December 2015. The cost to remove the pool will be partially covered by the insurance claim money received after the fire.

The Common Council voted in June to proceed with the installation of a new swimming pond as the outdoor aquatic facility for the city. Early cost projections for renovating and reopening the closed pool came between \$1.5 million and \$5 million.

The swimming pond would have a one-acre surface area, similar to swimming ponds in Black Creek and Shiocton. However, Clintonville plans to have staffed lifeguards at its pond.

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Mast arms go up at Mountain Bay Trail crossing

Shawano Pathways donates \$12,000 to improve safety at Green Bay Street intersection

SHAWANO — The Mountain Bay Trail crossing at East Green Bay Street should be much more obvious to motorists now that mast arms bearing warning lights have been erected at the site.

The crossing has long been a concern for pedestrians and bicyclists, despite attempts to make it safer and the crossing more visible.

The mast arms went up Aug. 27, thanks in part to a \$12,000 donation from Shawano Pathways.

Lt. Mike Musolff of the Shawano Police Department organized a crosswalk compliance check after the mast arms were installed to see how effective they were in alerting motorists — and to determine whether motorists were complying with them.

Shawano Pathways members took the roles of pedestrians, pushing a button at the crosswalk to set off the warning lights on the mast arms. Yellow flags are also available at the crosswalk for pedestrians to carry with them across the street for greater visibility.

About half of the cars stopped for the pedestrians.

Police officers gave out 25 warnings during what was meant to be an educational event, but they also had three arrests — one each for

operating while intoxicated, driving after revocation and an outstanding warrant.

There were a couple of close calls for the volunteers, but they all got home safely, said Nancy Brown-Koeller, Pathways president.

Prior to the installation of the mast arms, the only warning for motorists were the constantly blinking lights at each end of the crosswalk.

“The thinking is with the continuous blinking lights, drivers have it in their mind that it is normal. If the light comes on, the hope is the driver will react to the pedestrian better.”

said. “If the light comes on, the hope is the driver will react to the pedestrian better.”

Musolff stated there were alarming discoveries when talking to some of the drivers.

“Clearly distractions are prevalent as many stated they didn’t see our pedestrians at all,” he said.

Police Chief Dan Mauel thanked the officers and volunteers for an excellent job.

In addition to the \$12,000 from Pathways, Shawano Municipal Utilities installed the mast arms at no cost to the city up to \$5,000. The total cost of the project was expected to be about \$24,000. The city will cover the rest of the cost through savings anticipated from its 2019 capital improvement projects fund.

Shawano Pathways is a nonprofit organization formed to respond to a need for trails and green spaces in Shawano County.

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Bowler man killed in rollover crash in town of Almon

BOWLER — A 25-year-old Bowler man was killed early Monday in a single-vehicle crash on County Road N in the town of Almon, the Shawano County Sheriff's Department reported.

Authorities received a call of a vehicle rollover about 3:02 a.m.

Monday. The reporting party was on his way to work and observed headlights in the ditch.

When deputies arrived on scene, they observed a man lying in the gravel about 15 feet away from the vehicle.

Deputies performed CPR until Wittenberg Ambulance arrived on scene.

The ambulance crew was unable to get a pulse and requested the Shawano County Coroner be paged.

Investigation of the crash showed the driver and sole occupant entered the ditch, striking a culvert surrounded by rocks, which caused the vehicle to overturn and eject the driver.

Deputies were assisted on scene by Wittenberg Ambulance and Bowler Fire Department.

The driver's name was not released as of press time.

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Sudden oak death fungus found in Wisconsin

Buyers of rhododendrons, azaleas urged to watch for disease

MADISON — State plant health officials are advising consumers who bought rhododendrons or azaleas this spring and summer to be on the lookout for signs of a disease that could spread to oaks and kill them.

Plant health staff with the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection have identified *Phytophthora ramorum*, or *P. ramorum*, on rhododendrons at a northern Wisconsin nursery. This fungus causes sudden oak death, which has never been found on the landscape in Wisconsin. There is no human health risk.

The find resulted from a July survey of 59 garden centers and nurseries in the state, after it was reported that potentially infected shipments originating from a Washington state supplier had gone to these businesses. Potentially infected plants were shipped to at least 28 states, many of which have already found the leaf blight dis-

ease at stores receiving the plants. Wisconsin inspectors collected 43 samples, but only one was found positive for the fungus.

Consumers should look for leaf and shoot dieback as potential symptoms. Suspect plants should be sent the University of Wisconsin-Madison Plant Disease Diagnostic Clinic. There is no cost. For information about how to submit a sample, visit <https://pddc.wisc.edu>.

"Given the results of our surveys, we would expect that many of the distributed plants are negative for *P. ramorum*. However, due to the positive detection and because many of the plants had been sold before we received notice, we wanted to enlist citizens in keeping an eye out for symptoms," said Brian Kuhn, director of the department's Plant Industry Bureau. "These plants entered Wisconsin legally, with the proper documentation, and all the businesses involved have cooperated with us."

Susceptible plants at the supplier and the nursery are being destroyed, and owners are disinfecting soil and equipment.

Although the disease may not necessarily kill rhododendrons and azaleas, it could be transmitted to as many as 100 plant species, including hardwoods, softwoods and shrubs. Oaks are at the greatest

risk, because *P. ramorum* is incurable and has killed 30-45 million oaks in California and Oregon. Spores from the disease can travel in plants; soil, gravel and potting mixes; and wind-blown rain and other water sources. Contaminated pots, shovels and other equipment could also transmit the disease unless sterilized with bleach.

The highest bid of \$920 went to Courtney Schenko, of Bonduel 4-H, for her devil’s food poker cake.

“I was a little surprised when the auctioneer started the bidding at \$500,” said cake winner Terry Lamberies, of Clintonville. “But she’s my first cousin once removed, and I know the money will go into her college fund. So it’s money well spent.”

SHAWANO — It's easy to learn how to juggle, according to Dan Kirk.

However, to get people's attention, you need to be a juggler with yellow shoes.

"Way back in the '80s, I found a pair of yellow shoes at the mall that were cheap — because men don't wear yellow shoes," said the Menasha resident. "So I bought those, and I decided that I would wear those when I juggle. People don't remember names, but they remember, 'Oh, this guy juggles. He has yellow shoes.'"

Kirk has entertained audiences across the Midwest and beyond for years with his juggling and jokes, playing with fire and swords, and he brought that fun to the Shawano County Fair with six shows over the holiday weekend.

His first pair of yellow shoes were Chuck Taylor sneakers, which lasted for several years, but Kirk was definitely thrilled when the Los Angeles Lakers came out with a pair of yellow basketball shoes.

"I bought 12 pairs when I found them," Kirk said. "I can't give my wife a hard time about buying shoes."

Kirk first saw jugglers on television and thought learning the craft would be a good way for him to be on television someday. That dream came true in 2008 when he performed on "America's Got Talent."

Kirk didn't learn the craft until he was 16 when a neighbor showed him how to do the three-ball act with golf balls.

"It was addictive," he said. "I wanted to do it, so I kept on practicing."

Ironically, Kirk didn't want to be around people. He went to the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point to learn to be a chemist, but that quickly changed to printing and publishing.

However, his love of juggling led him to perform full time, which he has done since 1993. Some weeks, he'll do as many as a dozen shows.

"God had a different plan for me," Kirk said. "He told me, 'Get out of your shell and go perform in front of people.'"

Kirk has performed at fairs in

SHAWANO — The Shawano County Fair hosted its first old-fashions contest Sunday, bringing out more than a dozen mixed-drink hopefuls to try their beverages out before a three-judge panel.

Contestants were scored on taste, appearance and creativity.

The contest was divided into sweets and sour and judges had water and crackers to clean their pallets between entries.

Ingredients varied to include unexpected choices like diet Sundrop, maple syrup, blackberry and flavored honey from South Dakota.

Garnish also ran the gamut from olives, orange slices and cherries to bacon and venison sticks.

In one case, mixing the drink involved filling a bottle with smoke and pouring the drink in to achieve a smoke-infused taste.

The fair awarded \$75 to the winner, \$50 for the second-place finisher and \$25 for third.

The first place award went to Danelle from Red River Tap in Red River. Brad Luepke, promotions director for the county fair and Shawano Speedway, said he never got a last name because Danelle said it was too hard to spell.

Danelle mixed a blackberry brandy old-fashioned sour with blackberries as garnish.

There were 15 contestants for the event, which was held before a lively crowd on the midway stage.

The event was supposed to take place at the bar under the grandstand, but, according to fair officials, it was moved at the

insistence of the state office of the federal Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms agency because only beer is normally served at the grandstand bar.

The judges were Charlie Harvey of Charlie's County Market, Kayla Mackenzie of WTCH and Dan Zygarlicke, vice president of op-

erations at Reinhart Foodservice.

"It was definitely a success," said Luepke.

Luepke said he may add bloody Marys to the contest next year.

The event was sponsored by Gehm's Club 117 in Bonduel.

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Area teachers participate in workforce development program

SHAWANO — Hard hats and earplugs are not the usual protective gear for teaching. But this summer, four teachers from Shawano and Menominee counties had the opportunity to participate in a workforce experience through the CESA 8 Career Academy Teacher Externship program.

The program, known as CATE, places classroom teachers into area businesses for three- to five-day paid externship experiences during summer break.

The idea for the program stemmed from the state Department of Public Instruction's initiative PI26, which calls for all Wisconsin school districts to embed academic and career planning within grade 6-12 classrooms.

"Classroom teachers are now being asked to become workforce developers, along with teaching their traditional content. But they might not have a good idea about the types of employment opportunities available in their local areas," said Lynn Aprill, director of the Center on Education for Economic Development at CESA 8, who created and manages the program. "The CATE program allows teachers to step through the doors of local businesses, shadowing people from many departments and really learning about the job opportunities available in our own backyards."

The externship teachers will then use that information to create lesson plans that they'll implement in their classrooms this fall.

Shawano County businesses that opened their doors to externship teachers included KI-Bonduel, Tauchen Harmony Valley Dairy and Aarrowcast. Funding for the program came from both corporate sponsors and grants.

Chris Reinke, physical education teacher for Bonduel School District, was impressed with the range of jobs available at KI in Bonduel.

"There's a job for everyone," Reinke said. "If you like to stand, there's a standing job. If you like to move, there's a moving job."

Reinke made connections between her classroom content and the warm-up exercises that employees at KI participate in before their shifts.

"That's a great thing to take back to my class specifically," she noted.

Menominee Indian School District technology education teacher Shiv Verma had high praise for Aarrowcast and the CATE program overall.

"It refreshes our knowledge about

how things have changed," Verma said. "Technology and automation are changing fast, so it's important for us to learn about what changes are going on in industry and then to tell our students. It helps in changing our strategy for teaching."

Area businesses see benefits from the CATE program as well.

Steve Anklam is a representative of Nercon in Oconto, where Shawano staff member Nathan Falk was placed. "It brings those who normally wouldn't know much about our world into our environment and lets them see firsthand what we do," Anklam said. "It also gives them the opportunity to see what challenges/issues we face and also what we do well at and take information away from that to their classrooms."

Also participating in the CATE program was Marie Raasch with the Menominee Indian School District.

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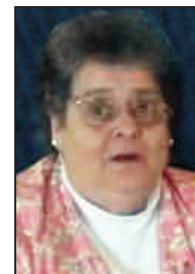

There are ways to reduce your risk of mental decline

You forget where you put the car keys, or you forget someone's name. This can occur at any age and is usually not cause for alarm. In midlife, most adults show stable cognitive function. As we get older, cognitive decline can occur.

These two approaches have been tested independently and together, and both have been independently associated with an improved cognitive profile.

Researchers have shown that moderate or high physical activity reduces the risk of cognitive decline. This translates to 150 minutes or more of exercise per week. That breaks down to just a half an hour, five days a week — not that much.

The Mediterranean diet, with its high intake of fruits and vegetables, has been found to be associated with better cognitive evolution and lower risk of Alzheimer's disease. Mediterranean cuisine is not only good for you, it's delicious and easy to prepare.

Sound quality research has demonstrated no benefits on cognitive performance for the following items: low dose aspirin, high-dose B vitamin supplements (folate, B6, B12), Ginkgo biloba, C and E vitamins (alone or in combination), omega-3 supplementation, beta carotene and multivitamin and multi-mineral supplements. While this list is not all-inclusive, it includes many popu-

lar strategies.

Before buying the claims of marketers regarding health supplement products, look for evidence of effectiveness. If someone recommends an approach and there is no research to support it, avoid it, unless you do not mind being a guinea pig and wasting your money.

Although you cannot buy a pill to prevent mental decline (at least not yet), you can take steps through diet and exercise to improve your chances of avoiding or delaying it.

Landscape shrubs ideal as rest stop and dining opportunity for birds

With September, many of our landscape trees and shrubs become a bounty for songbirds beginning migration south for the fall. Landscaping and gardening for birds is becoming more and more popular as people become aware of the problems birds face during the migration, as well as upon the return to and from their destinations. Providing a valuable food source for them is a simple and pleasurable way to become a part of the natural world.

There are many excellent choices

for landscape shrubs to be used throughout our gardens, yards and properties that produce bountiful berries for songbirds to consume during fall migration, as well as during the long winter season for those birds that stay with us all winter long.

In addition to the nutritious and vital source of food they provide for songbirds, these shrubs are also decorative and ornamental in the garden, serving multiple purposes. There are shrubs available for just about any soil and light situation, making them an important part of the landscape.

Robins, cedar waxwings, gray catbirds, eastern bluebirds, brown thrashers, thrushes of all species, grosbeaks, cardinals, finches and many others enjoy eating the fruits and berries of backyard shrubs.

Many of these species are with us all winter long, changing their habits specifically to make use of fruits, nuts and berries during the winter season. Many of these birds may eat insects and seed during summer and fall, switching to fruits for the winter.

One of the best sources of nutritious food for songbirds during the fall and winter season are the many different species of viburnum found in our area. There are native species of viburnum, as well as many garden hybrids, all of which produce clusters of nutritious, important berries for bird on the move.

Ninebarks are another important source of food for fall and winter birds. Dense clusters of lacy blooms from summer transform to plump, juicy fruits during late summer and fall, ideal for birds as they begin the long journey.

All of our dogwood species are also excellent for birds, providing

food and shelter.

In addition to readily available food sources, berry producing shrubs

also provide important shelter for songbird during the migration, as well as during the winter season. Finding

shelter from predators quickly and easily is important to songbirds, even those visiting backyard feeders where hawks stalk relentlessly and take any opportunity to strike.

Conifers provide excellent shelter, as well as another source of food in the form of fruits and cones in a variety of sizes, shapes and forms. There are juniper berries, white-cedar fruits, tamarack cones, spruce cones and, of course, pine cones. All of these are an excellent source of food for a variety of different bird species ranging in size from tiny nuthatches and chickadees to the larger woodpeckers and even crows.

Other shrubs and small trees that produce berries and fruit for birds that are important during the fall and winter migration are crab apple, mountain ash, staghorn sumac, oaks, hazelnuts, serviceberry, black cherry, highbush cranberry, chokeberry, roses and others.

Add a few of these to your backyard landscaping and enjoy reaping the benefits of colorful, vivacious, trusting songbirds that will be drawn to their delicious, important bounty.

BOOKS ON THE BORDER

Stockbridge-Munsee man, retired from law enforcement, solves cases through novels

BOWLER — Rick Church, an enrolled member of the Stockbridge-Munsee Band of Mohican Indians, spent much of his life in law enforcement, keeping the streets safe from anyone from simple burglars to sex traffickers and smugglers.

Today, Church is happily retired from that life. But Noel Two Horses, his alter ego and protagonist in his books, is not as able to walk away from combating evil and saving the innocent. Two Horses has saved the day in three books so far, and Church brought all of them Friday to his original home on the Stockbridge-Munsee Reservation as he presented them to a small audience at the Arvid E. Miller Library Museum.

Church has a group of retired police officers in his second and third books, all Native American and living in Tucson, Arizona. Some of them are former Border Patrol agents, city police, county deputies and federal agents from the southern part of Arizona, which borders Mexico.

“What led me to write this one was that a friend of mine, who was a Tucson police officer, wanted me to go to a monthly meeting,” Church said. “I didn’t like to go to meetings, but I said, ‘Sure.’ He said it was a bunch of retired cops, so I figured I’d know some of them.”

When Church went to that first meeting, he said he was amazed just how many of them he knew. He started talking with them and was floored by how many stories there were about certain cases.

Church certainly brought a lot of his own stories, having worked as an Arizona State Trooper, a federal marshal and an agent for the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration and the U.S. Department of Justice. Prior to moving to Arizona, Church was a familiar face in Shawano County, working for the sheriff’s department and the tribal police.

“I got sent out on some pretty weird assignments when I was a police officer,” Church said. “I was working as a fraud supervisor in the state of Arizona, and I covered from Phoenix all the way down to the border. When you work fraud cases, you picture ledgers and embezzlement. I was getting involved in cases where

older Mexican guys were selling used caskets.”

Church said those guys even offered him his own casket to keep quiet.

“I told them, ‘I don’t think so,’” Church said with a laugh. “I decided to write some of these down, as weird as they sound. They almost sound like fiction.”

Church noted there were times he would need to go undercover as a drug distributor when he was with the Department of Justice. He would deal with sellers from Cuba and South America, as well as the garden-variety Mexican dealers, and he did it without knowing how to speak Spanish.

“I knew my way around the drug culture, so they didn’t care that I didn’t know how to speak Spanish,” Church said. “Generally, you wouldn’t do a high-level drug deal without somebody talking for you, anyway. You would just supervise and say ‘yes’ or ‘no’ — and it worked. My wife wasn’t too crazy about it.”

In his second book, “War Party,” Church writes about how many of the fictional retired officers are banding together to avenge the death of an im-

migrant and look for a girl who disappeared while crossing the border.

“It’s a sad one because it explains some things that are really happening down on the border right now with families being separated,” Church said, noting that he dealt with some kidnapping cases when he worked in Arizona.

All three of Church’s current books, including his first one, “White Doe,” and his latest story, “Counting Coup,” are going to be put into a single anthology. The books are published through Page Publishing.

Thomas Cobb, author of the book “Crazy Heart,” which became an Academy Award-winning film, reviewed “White Doe” and said, “Rick Church has written a wise and witty thriller, full of breathless encounters and dark, dry humor. It’s a fine read.”

“The people I know always want to know, when is my movie coming out?” Church said.

Church has a fourth book due out soon, titled “Drums Along the Fox,” which takes place in Wisconsin. The book will be published directly through Amazon’s Kindle Publishing, starting out as an e-book and then

coming out in paperback.

“That book details a lot of the drug issues we have on our reservations today — not just on this reservation but, as a rule, the majority of reservations in Wisconsin,” Church said. “The Fox River is a main inlet area for distribution.”

Church said the issue of drug trafficking is particularly prominent today. He said a lot of the young people living on a reservation went to school off the reservation and don’t find much entertainment at the casinos, so much of their “entertainment” is recreational drugs.

“There’s quite a market for it on reservations from one reservation to another reservation,” Church said. “It’s a closed-knit channeling way of life, and it’s generational. You talk to some of these young people in drug treatment, probably because their parents never went to drug treatment or were alcoholics, and their main source of entertainment was on a bar stool. It’s really sad, but there’s an unbelievable amount of money to be made.”

Taylor leads Wisconsin to rout of USF

Badgers' defense stifles Bulls

TAMPA, FLA. — Jonathan Taylor is off and running.

Catching, too.

Taking up where he left off a year ago, when he led the nation in rushing with 2,194 yards and 16 touchdowns, Taylor ran for 135 yards and accounted for four TDs to help No. 19 Wisconsin open the season with a 49-0 rout of South Florida on Friday night.

The junior scored on runs of 37 and 38 yards and also had the first two receiving TDs of his career as the Badgers strive to become a more balanced team on offense.

"You work all offseason like I did, and to have that receiving touchdown come to life, I'm really excited about that," said Taylor, who scooted 36 yards up the left sideline after taking a quick flip from Jack Coan in the second quarter. "It motivates you to see that hard work pay off."

Taylor's second TD reception gave the Badgers a 28-0 lead just before halftime. He finished with two catches for 48 yards after having just eight for 60 yards last season.

"Jonathan was good in a lot of different ways. He was awfully patient on one run, and he had the little screen that he took," Wisconsin coach Paul Chryst said. "You get him in space and he's pretty good."

Wisconsin's defense delivered a dominating performance, too, limiting South Florida to 157 yards total offense and forcing three turnovers, including a fumble that Matt Henningsen returned 16 yards for a second quarter touchdown.

The loss was the seventh straight for USF, which dropped the final six games of 2018 after starting 7-0 and climbing into the Top 25.

"A very disappointing, very embarrassing loss," USF coach Charlie Strong said. "As a head coach, I thought I had them ready to play, and I guess I didn't. And we showed it."

Blake Barnett completed 13 of 30 passes for 109 yards for the Bulls. He was intercepted twice.

The 49-point setback was the

worst in the 23-year history of USF's program, surpassing a 42-3 loss to Arkansas in 2002. The Bulls were

shut out for the first time since falling 16-0 at home to UCF in 2014.

The start of the game was delayed 55 minutes because of lightning.

The takeaway

Taylor joined Melvin Gordon (2014) and Ron Dayne (1996, 1999) as the only Badgers to top 2,000 yards rushing in a season in 2018, and he looks like he's primed for another big year after gaining 100-plus for the 23rd time in 28 career games. Coan carried his share of the load, too, rebounding from overthrowing a couple of open receivers deep in the first half to finish 19 of 26 for 199 yards without an interception.

Last season's collapse prompted Strong to make several changes, including hiring NCAA Division II national championship-winning coach Kerwin Bell as offensive coordinator. The Bulls were held to 26 yards rushing and outgained 433 to 157 overall.

ThedaCare adds new device for heart treatment

ThedaCare has added a new treatment to its cardiovascular care program with the Watchman device.

The Watchman device offers patients with irregular heartbeats, called non-valvular atrial fibrillation (AFib), an alternative to long-term warfarin blood thinner medication.

An estimated five million Americans are affected by AFib – an irregular heartbeat that feels like a quivering heart. People with AFib may be at greater risk for stroke than those with normal heart rhythms.

The Watchman Left Atrial Appendage Closure Device closes off an area of the heart called the left atrial appendage (LAA) to keep harmful blood clots that can form in the LAA from entering the blood stream and potentially causing a stroke.

By closing off the LAA, the risk of stroke may be reduced. In a clinical

trial, nine out of 10 people were able to stop taking warfarin just 45 days after getting Watchman.

“Up to 80 percent of strokes are preventable,” said Dr. Abdelkader Almanfi, director of the ThedaCare structural heart program. “Watchman can help reduce the risk of stroke for certain patients. The recovery time is minimal, generally requiring just an overnight stay in the hospital.”

Watchman is available to physicians who have gone through extensive training on the implant procedure.

The Watchman Device has been commercially available since 2009. According to Boston Scientific Corporation, which produces the implant, the Watchman device is the only FDA-approved implant proven to reduce stroke risk in people with AFib not caused by a heart valve problem. It has been implanted in more than 50,000 patients worldwide.

Storm damage disaster loans available for nonprofits

Certain private nonprofits in Wisconsin that suffered damages in storms this summer and do not provide critical services of a governmental nature may be eligible to apply for low-interest rate disaster loans.

The U.S. Small Business Administration made the announcement recently, following a presidential disaster declaration for Public Assistance resulting from damages caused by severe weather July 18-20.

Private nonprofits located in several Wisconsin counties, including Menominee, Oconto, Shawano and Waupaca, and the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin are eligible to apply. Examples of eligible non-critical private nonprofits include, but are not limited to, food kitchens, homeless shelters, museums, libraries, community centers, schools and colleges.

Private nonprofits may borrow up to \$2 million to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory and other business assets. The interest rate is 2.75% with terms up to 30 years. Applicants may be eligible for a loan amount increase up to 20% of their verified physical damages. Eligible mitigation improvements may include a safe room or storm shelter to help protect property and occupants from future damage caused by a similar disaster.

The Small Business Association also offers Economic Injury Disaster Loans to help meet working capital needs, such as ongoing operating expenses, to private nonprofits. Economic Injury Disaster Loan assistance is available regardless of whether the organization suffered any physical property damage.

Nonprofit organizations are urged to contact their county's Emergency Manager for information. Applicants may apply online at DisasterLoan.sba.gov.

Disaster loan information and application forms may also be obtained by calling the Customer Service Center at 800-659-2955 (800-877-8339 for the deaf and hard-of-hearing) or sending an email to disastercustomerservice@sba.gov.

The filing deadline to submit applications for physical property damage is Oct. 28. The deadline to submit economic injury applications is May 27.
