Flagpole dedicated at Memorial Park

Park system's largest flagpole result of community donations

SHAWANO — City officials and local veterans groups held a ceremony Tuesday to dedicate a new flagpole at Memorial Park.

The 55-foot pole, bearing a 10-by-15-foot flag, was the result of community donations from the veterans groups and other organizations.

"This flag represents all the veterans in our community, and they continue to give back to the community in so many ways," Mayor Ed Whealon said. "Not only this, but other projects that go on in our community are benefited by these veterans groups, and we're grateful

for that. And I know the citizens appreciate what the veterans do for our community."

Whealon said the flagpole, located roughly in the center of Memorial Park, is fitting given the park's name.

"It's the largest flag in the park system," Park and Recreation Director Matt Hendricks said.

The total cost of the project, including running electrical line underground so the flag could be lighted, was about \$12,000.

The veterans groups donated about \$10,000 of that specifically for this project, while the other \$2,000 was covered by funds that have been donated to the city's parks projects by people who did not designate a specific project for it to be used, Hendricks said.

Shawano Alderman Seth Mailahn spearheaded the effort.

"It was brought up to me, and I grabbed the bull by the horns, I guess," Mailahn said. "With the help

of Matt and some other people, we got kind of a little grassroots thing going right away, and it took off."

"All these organizations said right away, right off the get-go, they would pitch in and make it happen," he said.

Organizations that donated to the flagpole project included AmVets Post 10, Shawano Youth League, Disabled American Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars 2723, American Legion posts 117 and 217 and Vietnam Veterans of America Chapter 206.

"I'm grateful to live in a community that so many different organizations and partners in this community come together for so many different projects just to make Shawano such a great place," Mailahn said. "It just makes me very happy."

Tuesday's ceremony included color guards from the various veterans groups. Ralph Beversdorf sang the National Anthem.

2 facing drug charges after crash with bus

3rd person charged with felony bail jumping

WESCOTT — Two people were arrested on felony drug charges and a third for bail jumping Wednesday after their SUV struck a Menominee Transit bus in the town of Wescott.

Amanda A. Stage, 23, and Joel E. Greer, 46, both of Green Bay, were each charged with felony counts of possession with intent to deliver cocaine and second or subsequent offense possession of marijuana.

Stage is also charged with felony bail jumping.

According to the criminal complaint, Stage, who was driving the SUV, was operating after revocation and was out on bond for two felony cases in Shawano County.

A third person, Lakeshia R. Wayka, 29, of Green Bay, was charged with felony bail jumping and a misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer.

According to the criminal complaint, Wayka had fled the crash scene on foot prior to the arrival of deputies. She was later located on North Lafayette Street in Shawano.

Wayka was also out on bond in a felony case in Brown County, according to the complaint.

A fourth person in the vehicle, a 37-year-old Green Bay woman who was out on bond in an unrelated case, was not arrested or charged in connection with this incident.

The crash occurred around 6:30 p.m. Wednesday on state Highway 47-55.

Shawano County Sheriff's Department Lt. Jesse Sperberg said the SUV was heading west when it went through a stop sign at Lake Drive and struck the northbound bus, causing it to roll onto its side.

According to the criminal complaint, the SUV had been going about 70 mph when it blew through the stop sign.

The bus driver, who was the only person on the bus, and occupants of the SUV received minor injuries.

According to the criminal complaint, Stage appeared to have been using marijuana prior to the crash.

Sheriff's K-9 Rekon alerted deputies to the presence of drugs in the vehicle and in a grassy area about 15 yards from the crash where Greer had been

seen "digging around," according to the complaint.

Authorities recovered wrappers from flavored cigars that, according to the complaint, are commonly used for smoking marijuana after the original tobacco has been removed.

Authorities also recovered plastic bags from the grassy area that contained 3.1 grams of cocaine and 1.2 grams of marijuana, according to the complaint.

Authorities also found \$2,355 in cash in Stage's purse, along with an ATM receipt showing a withdrawal of \$3,500.

Stage and Greer could each face a maximum 12½ years in prison and a \$25,000 fine if convicted of possession with intent to deliver cocaine, and 3½ years and a \$10,000 fine for second or subsequent offense possession of marijuana.

Stage and Wayka could each face a maximum six years in prison and \$10,000 fine if convicted of felony bail jumping.

According to court records, Stage is awaiting trial in a felony case of possession with intent to deliver narcotics and was out on a \$10,000 cash bond set by Judge James Habeck at a hearing in January.

She was charged in August with felony bail jumping stemming from a misdemeanor charge of fourth-offense operating while revoked. She was out

on a \$500 cash bond and \$500 signature bond set by Habeck in that case, according to court records.

At her initial appearance on the new charges Thursday, Habeck ordered Stage held on a \$20,000 cash bond. She is scheduled for an adjourned initial appearance on Sept. 23.

Greer was ordered held on a \$10,000 cash bond set by Habeck and is also due back in court for an ad-

journed initial appearance on Sept. 23.

According to court records, Greer has previous felony convictions in Brown County for manufacture and delivery of cocaine and possession with intent to deliver cocaine.

Habeck ordered Wayka held on a \$500 cash bond. She is scheduled for a preliminary hearing Sept. 19.

Gallagher goes back to school

Congressman visits Bonduel classrooms, checks out high school programs

BONDUEL — Bonduel Elementary School had extended an invitation to U.S. Rep. Mike Gallagher to attend its spring patriotic concert in May, hoping to show a member of Congress some of the good things about the school.

Gallagher, R-Wisconsin, was unable to attend due to scheduling conflicts, according to principal Brad Grayvold. But his office indicated that he would still like to visit the school. On Wednesday, Gallagher made good on that promise, visiting two elementary classrooms before traveling to Bonduel High School and seeing the technology education

facilities and a new greenhouse for the agriculture program.

Grayvold answered some of Gallagher's questions about the school's 4-year-old kindergarten program. He noted the state gives schools the option of having the program meet every other day for a full day or for a half-day every school day. Grayvold said the unusual number of bad weather days and school cancellations prompted the school to go the half-day system.

"If they come on a Thursday, they might not be back for a full week" if wintry weather impacts the schedule, Grayvold said.

Gallagher's first stop was the first-grade classroom of Lela Schwitzer, who organizes the annual patriotic

concert. Schwitzer eagerly welcomed the Congressman, but not as much as one student who jumped out of his seat and gave Gallagher a big hug.

"He represents us. So for our families, if we have a problem or there's something we need him to know, we write to him or we call him," Schwitzer said to her students. "He has staff members who can help us, and he goes to the government officials to help solve our problems."

Schwitzer added that Gallagher represents her in two ways. Besides her role as a teacher, Gallagher represents Schwitzer as a member of the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin.

Gallagher quickly jumped into his role in the government and

noted that the students would learn more about it in their social studies classes over the next few years. A student was quick to point out that they weren't just learning about the United States; they were learning about everything in the universe.

"You're learning about the whole universe?" Gallagher said. "Wow, that's a lot of ground to cover. There's a lot of planets and stuff."

Gallagher's mood with the class was upbeat and jovial, and he took every opportunity to make fun of himself. One such opportunity came when he saw a board in the classroom that gave information about Washington, D.C., but did not include details on the Legislative Branch.

"That's all right," Gallagher said when Schwitzer apologized. "No one cares about Congress. Less cool than the president, I guess."

In between the humor, which included students' claims that Gallagher was a "legend" and that George Washington was a "pirate," the Congressman gave a basic explanation of the three branches of government and how no one branch has ultimate control.

"What's unique about our government is that you guys are in charge," Gallagher said. "All of the people in Wisconsin, even the people in Minnesota and Michigan and Texas ... all of the individual citizens in the 50 states that form the United States are who are in charge. Those people elect people like me to serve on their behalf, and those people can also tell people like me to go home and not reelect me."

Gallagher then engaged in a more in-depth discussion about government with Mark Margelofsky's sixth-grade class, which had more knowledge of American history than the younger students. He told the students how he represented more than 730,000 people in northeast Wisconsin in the House of Representatives.

Gallagher, at one point, asked Margelofsky if he was crossing the line by telling so much about the U.S. government, but the teacher shrugged it off.

"I'm excited because you're

getting into stuff I was going to be teaching them this year anyway," Margelofsky said. "We'll see if they have good memories."

Gallagher's last stop was Bonduel High School, where he got to

see the school's greenhouse and the improvements made to its tech ed department. He learned about how the school is able to create different items with computerized numerical control equipment.

Teacher Travis Schindel explained to Gallagher how local businesses donated money to provide much of the equipment used today, even those businesses that are not in the boundaries of the Bonduel School District.

"They can't get enough of it," Schindel said of the students' response to utilizing the new equipment. "They're used to all of this computerized stuff. They're seeing how they can take this stuff from the computer side and use it on the manufacturing side."

Gallagher was pleased with how the district was able to pique students' interest in manufacturing and building things.

"I think the biggest challenge we have is convincing them that, this isn't your grandfather's manufacturing," Gallagher said. "This is highly advanced, and with advances in automation come opportunities, and you can make a lot of money doing this advanced work."

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2 vacant posts filled in Menominee County

Register of deeds/treasurer resigned in July

KESHENA — Vacancies in two key Menominee County departments that languished for more than a month have now been filled, according to County Administrative Coordinator Jeremy Weso.

Louise Madosh had been the

county's register of deeds and its treasurer up until July 30 when she resigned to take a job with the Menominee tribe, Weso said.

The Menominee County Board has since decided to split Madosh's old job into two part-time positions.

A new treasurer, Marybeth Pecore, was appointed by the board on Aug. 22.

On Tuesday, Gov. Tony Evers appointed Menomin Hawpetoss as the county's new register of deeds.

The post is an elected position, and Hawpetoss will fill out the remainder of Madosh's term, which ends on Dec. 31.

Hawpetoss won't officially start as register of deeds for another two weeks because she is currently employed by the College of Menominee Nation and has to give notice, Weso said.

However, Hawpetoss is hoping to come in and work on an interim basis in the meantime to catch up on the backlog created by the vacancy.

"We didn't have a deputy register of deeds," Weso said. "All the vital records for the community are available in the state registrar's office, but the actual recording of deeds and things like that, we had to wait until there was an actual register of deeds."

Bowler man killed in rollover crash identified

BOWLER — Authorities on Thursday released the name of the 25-year-old Bowler man killed early Monday in a single-vehicle crash on County Road N in the town of Almon.

The Shawano County Sheriff's Department said the deceased was

John J. Inzeo.

The crash is still being investigated.

Authorities received a call of a vehicle rollover about 3:02 a.m. Monday. A passer-by was on his way to work and observed headlights in the ditch.

When deputies arrived on scene,

they observed a man lying in the gravel about 15 feet away from the vehicle.

Deputies performed CPR until Wittenberg Ambulance arrived on scene.

The ambulance crew was unable to get a pulse and requested the coroner be paged.

Investigation of the crash showed the driver and sole occupant entered the ditch, striking a culvert surrounded by rocks, which caused the vehicle to overturn and eject the driver.

Deputies were assisted on scene by Wittenberg Ambulance and Bowler Fire Department.

Trail bridge closed as county and Shawano Pathways work to repair it

Nails, screws, rotting timber have made it hazardous

SHAWANO — A bridge that serves as a major crossing for those utilizing the Mountain Bay Trail is getting some needed renovations, even though the work is requiring hikers, runners and bicyclists to find a way around.

Signs on both sides of the bridge at Sturgeon Park warn about its closure, but that hasn't stopped some from trying to cross as fixes are taking place, according to representatives from Shawano Pathways, an organization dedicated to improving outdoor recreational opportunities in the area.

Volunteers with the group have helped to remove layers of rotting timber and getting rid of nails and screws at the base level of the bridge in order to prevent people from being injured and in the hopes of not dealing with near-future problems.

Matty Mathison, one of the volunteers, said that there were three layers to the bridge, but two layers have been removed because of the hazards. Besides the aging timber causing parts of the bridge to warp and cause tripping hazards, there are parts where the wood has rotted around nails and screws holding them in place, which poses the risk of coming through shoes and puncturing the skin.

"The bridge is 327 feet, so that's 600-something feet of wood," Mathison said, noting that people are angry that work hasn't been done on the bridge sooner. "The nails and the screws and even the bolts, when you try to pull them out, they break or they bend. It was basically a crowbar on every board (to remove them)."

Mathison noted there had been previous attempts to fortify the bridge, but untreated materials were used, which caused them to decay sooner.

Other volunteers pointed out that removing the damaged and decaying boards was not an easy task.

"We were laughing, but we were crying at the same time," Greg Sturm said during a work session Wednesday.

Pathways worked with Shawano County, including parks director Keith Marquardt to figure out a solution. As Pathways removed layers, the county has started to add a new layer of treated wood. An \$8,000 Rotary grant with matching funds, along with Shawano Pathways donations totaling \$5,000 and another \$5,000 from the county has helped to pay for the work being done.

Dan Pohls, another Pathways vol-

unteer, noted that one of the layers of wood had been set at a diagonal angle, which had required more nails and screws to keep everything in place.

"We also had the star screws, the T-25s, that were also in there, too, and that was just from the second layer that was rotting away," Pohls said.

Pohls and Sturm pointed out that some had been missed when volunteers first swept the bridge, which prompted the latest work session this week. As they worked, people came up to the bridge on foot or on a bicycle, wanting to cross, according to Sturm.

"There were still a dozen people wishing they could cross even though there were signs saying it was closed," Sturm said.

That included runners from Shawano Community High School. Sturm said they ran across the bridge — even as workers were working — and one of them tripped and fell. He said he hoped she wouldn't be sliced by a nail or screw.

"She did catch the roughness of the bridge and was bleeding some," Sturm said.

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Hunters urged to have deer tested for CWD

MADISON — Deer hunting seasons are right around the corner, with the archery and crossbow season beginning Sept. 14. The Department of Natural Resources reminds hunters who harvest deer to have adult deer tested for chronic wasting disease.

This year, CWD surveillance will occur throughout 18 counties in northern Wisconsin as part of a multi-year rotation across the state. Enhanced surveillance efforts will also occur around wild and captive positive detections and in counties with low sampling numbers in recent years.

In addition, surveillance will continue in the Southern Farmland Zone and in select locations in CWD-affected counties in the central, northeast and west-central part of the state. This includes counties that have had a wild deer CWD positive detection (Adams, Juneau, Portage, Eau Claire, Lincoln, Oneida and Marquette counties) as well as in the wild deer herd surrounding CWD positive captive deer facilities (Marathon, Eau Claire, Oneida,

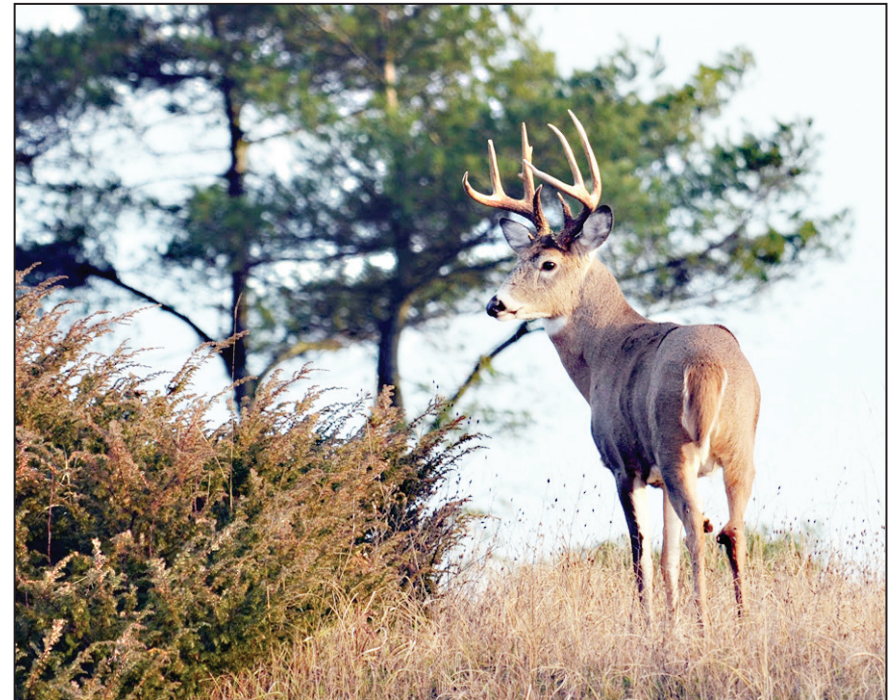
Shawano, Waupaca, Marinette and Oconto counties). Hunter service testing, free of charge, will continue to be provided for adult deer harvested statewide.

As in previous years, CWD sampling will be offered at various locations throughout the state. Options for CWD sampling include both in-person and self-service options.

Self-service kiosks are a convenient way for hunters to have their deer tested for CWD, and feedback shows that hunters appreciate this option. Kiosks provide a 24/7 drop-off option for hunters to help enhance sampling numbers, provide for ease of use and increase options in the world of electronic registration.

"The cooperation of hunters and private businesses is vital to the success of our sampling process. DNR staff thank all those who continue to assist with CWD surveillance," said Tami Ryan, DNR's acting director for the Bureau of Wildlife Management.

Hunters are reminded that CWD surveillance efforts focus on testing adult deer, since older deer are

more likely to test positive for the disease. For their convenience, the DNR recommends hunters contact staffed sampling stations in advance to verify hours of operation.

Hunters can also visit the DNR website for updated information on baiting and feeding bans throughout the state.

Trump's approval rating below 50% in Wisconsin

Biden, Sanders believed to have fighting chance against president in 2020

MADISON — A poll released Wednesday shows that President Donald Trump's job approval in the key swing state of Wisconsin remains below 50%, a troubling sign for Republicans 14 months before the 2020 election.

The Marquette University Law School poll also showed voter unease with the direction of the economy and tariffs, while there's strong support for gun control measures in the wake of mass shootings in Ohio and Texas.

The poll offers the latest glimpse into voter attitudes more than a year before the election. Wisconsin is one of four swing states — Pennsylvania, Michigan and Florida are the others — that could determine the outcome of the 2020 election because their electorates are so evenly divided. Trump carried Wisconsin by fewer than 23,000 votes in 2016, becoming the first Republican presidential candidate to win the state in 32 years.

The poll showed Trump's approval rating was 45% among registered voters, while 53% disapprove of the job he's been doing. That is nearly unchanged from Trump's

46% job approval from the last Marquette poll five months ago.

For the first time, the poll asked voters about the large field of Democratic candidates running to take on Trump. Sen. Joe Biden came out the strongest, with 51% support compared with 42% for Trump in a head-to-head contest.

Pollster Charles Franklin noted Biden's high name recognition, given the former Delaware senator's eight years as vice president under President Barack Obama. But he also cautioned that the poll measures only current voter attitudes and is not a predictor of what might happen in the election that's more than a year away.

"We are in the second inning of a ballgame," Franklin said.

Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders, who won the Democratic presidential primary in Wisconsin in 2016, had 48% support compared with 44% for Trump.

Biden was atop the Democratic field with 28% support, followed by Sanders at 20%, Sen. Elizabeth Warren, of Massachusetts, at 17%. No one else was in double digits.

The numbers are particularly likely to change given the high percentage of voters who said they didn't know enough about other

Democratic candidates to form an opinion, Franklin said.

On the economy, more people — 37% — said they thought it would get worse over the next 12 months compared with those — 26% — who thought it would improve. Thirty-three percent said they thought it would stay the same.

On tariffs, 46% said they hurt the economy while 30% said the help it.

Democrats have been blasting Trump's approach to trade and increasing tariffs, particularly on China. Democratic U.S. Rep. Ron Kind, who represents mostly rural western Wisconsin, said the tariffs have been particularly painful for farmers who were already struggling and going bankrupt at record rates in the state.

"I've never seen a president work harder to plunge our nation into a recession," Kind said Wednesday during a call with reporters.

The poll also looked at state issues, including how voters feel about the job being done by Democratic Gov. Tony Evers and the Republican-controlled Legislature. This is the first poll conducted since the Legislature passed, and Evers signed, the state budget in July.

Evers' job approval rating was 54%, up from 47% in April. The Legislature's approval rating was 52%, up slightly from 50% five months ago.

Evers has been calling on Republicans to pass a universal background check bill for gun purchases and a "red flag" law that would allow judges to take firearms away from people determined to be a risk to themselves or others.

The poll showed very strong support for both measures, with 80% supporting background checks and 81% favoring red flag laws.

Republicans have voiced opposition to the measures and Evers has threatened to call a special session for them to take it up. But even doing that wouldn't force lawmakers to act on the measures.

The poll of 800 registered voters was taken between Aug. 25 and Aug. 29. It has a margin of error of plus or minus 3.9 percentage points, but that grew to 5.3 percentage points when asking only Democrats questions. Issues-related questions had a smaller sample size, resulting in an error rate of about 5.5 percentage points.

Gun violence solution not found in disarming good people

It's been a busy summer dealing with mass shooters in America.

Two back to back shootings in Texas and Ohio that killed more than 30 people in early August left

us concerned that the culture of violence was escalating. Having another incident in Texas with seven more dead has prompted even more discussion on the Second Amendment and how closely we should be adher-

ing to it.

Those are just the shootings that actually happened. Tips prevented four other shootings from potentially happening. One of those involved a hotel cook who threatened to shoot his co-workers, and when the guy was arrested, authorities found an arsenal of weapons in his home.

Anger and arsenals — never a good combination.

However, it becomes very easy and convenient to pin the blame on guns. People fail to remember that there are millions of gun owners out there who have never used their weapon to resolve their frustration. The guns are there for protection,

but when one is used in a crime, all some people can see is the weapon and not the person behind it.

The debate continues in the halls of the United States government, but there is already some decision-making in the business sector. Walmart's corporate office announced Tuesday that it would stop selling handgun ammunition in the hopes of not continuing the cycle of violence in America. Of course, having a lawsuit filed against the company in regards to what happened in El Paso on Aug. 3 probably had something to do with that, but it seems like a good precaution.

Also part of Walmart's edict is that they plan to discourage people who patronize their stores from open-carrying guns. That goes away from narrowing the supply line and instead indicates that everyone who owns a gun is a threat.

The lawsuit filed against Walmart claims that if the store had security guards, the mass shooting in El Paso could have been prevented. It's certainly possible guards could have affected the outcome, but it's no guarantee. We've had shootings in malls and shopping centers that have security, but unless you plan on posting guards at every corner of the store, you'll still find someone crazy who will try to satisfy their rage with a blanket of bullets.

Besides, it appears Walmart is forgetting the past. I point to a Washington Post story from 2018. A gunman opened fire inside a Walmart in Washington state and wound up paying for it with his life when a customer carrying a gun decided to fight back.

The incident didn't even start out as an attempt to shoot up the store. The Post reported that the initial police call indicated a drunk driver was traveling the wrong way on a road, and that escalated to a carjacking where people were injured. Tim Day then arrived at the Walmart, fired some shots into a display case and ran back out to attempt another carjacking. That's when two people with guns confronted Day, and one shot him.

A witness at the scene named Brian Adams told a Washington television station that something far worse could have happened if Day had not been confronted by people with the ability to fight back.

"He is a hero," Adams said. "If this customer hadn't done what he did, who knows what would have happened."

With the mass shootings that have taken place over the years, we've focused on the shooters and failed to see that there are other people out there who have guns and understand how to use them properly. To

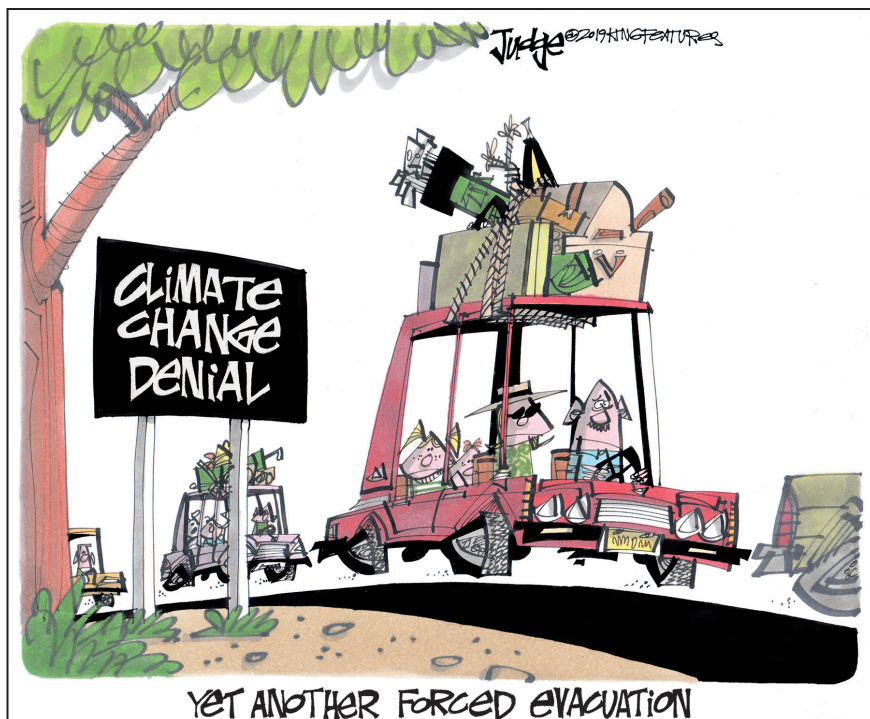
disarm them is not going to stem mass shootings. It's going to make them additional targets — additional victims.

We don't need more victims. We need more stories of good people rising up and dealing with the bad people, and just the bad people. If Congress doesn't have a solution, then we, the people, have to take charge, and if that means we carry our guns to protect ourselves, our families and our friends, so be it.

I acknowledge that Walmart is in a difficult position with the lawsuit, and it's not easy figuring out a solution after a crime has been committed. Walmart should definitely consider hiring security guards, especially for its bigger stores. The plan to stop selling ammunition is also sound, even though people will just go elsewhere for the bullets.

What is not wise is for Walmart to tell the good guys to leave their guns at home. If that is going to be Walmart's policy, then the company needs to put up signs at every entrance saying "Enter at your own peril," and the policy will just be a dog whistle for any future gunmen looking for easy pickings when they decide to finally go off the deep end.

Lawmakers use costs to rebuff records requests

In May, as the state Legislature's Republican-controlled budget committee considered a plan to spend far less on education than what Democrat Gov. Tony Evers

proposed, Sheila Plotkin started filing public records requests.

Plotkin asked nearly every member of the Joint Finance Committee for correspondence they had received from Wisconsin residents about

education funding.

All of the legislators Plotkin contacted provided responsive records for free. All, that is, except one: state Rep. John Nygren (R-Marinette), the panel's co-chair, wanted Plotkin to pay \$100.41 for location costs.

To Plotkin, this was a nonstarter.

"I'm a citizen on a fixed income and cannot afford \$100.41," said the 81-year-old retired educator from

Madison. "I reject these charges. I think it is an attempt to price individual citizens out of" public records.

Similarly, Wisconsin Freedom of Information Council President Bill Lueders asked Nygren in June for communications about the state budget. Nygren had claimed that the Republicans' budget bill was crafted based on public input, so Lueders asked to see what members of the public said.

Nygren agreed to produce the records — but only if Lueders paid an upfront search fee of \$334.66. Lueders declined, noting that in numerous past requests, no legislator had ever before charged him location fees.

Most recently, state Assembly Speaker Robin Vos (R-Rochester) demanded that I pay nearly \$200 in search fees. This was in response to a request I made in July for emails about proposed legislation to keep the names of lottery winners secret. I sent the same request to the bill's other leading co-sponsors — state

Rep. Gary Tauchen (R-Bonduel) and state Sen. Dale Kooyenga (R-Brookfield) — and they provided records at no charge. Wisconsin Lottery Director Cindy Polzin also responded to the same request and released records for free.

The hefty search fees from Nygren and Vos come after an appeals court blasted fellow GOP state Rep. Scott Krug (R-Nekoosa) for refusing to release electronic records, in response to a lawsuit filed by Lueders in 2016. A three-judge panel held that records that exist in electronic format must be produced electronically upon request.

Based on that appellate ruling, Plotkin won a settlement in her own suit against 14 state lawmakers — including Krug and Vos — who had similarly refused to release emails in electronic format.

Now that legislators are barred from charging print copy fees for emails, it appears, some are finding new ways to impose significant search fees on requesters.

State law allows public officials to

charge the "actual, necessary and direct cost" of locating records when this is \$50 or more, but the law allows authorities to waive or reduce fees when doing so is in the public interest. Nygren and Vos chose not to do that.

There's no question the public interest would have been served by waiving the fee for Plotkin, who regularly requests emails and correspondence that Wisconsinites send to lawmakers. She posts the findings, which often show that lawmakers vote against the wishes of those who contact them, on her website, we-the-irrelevant.org.

Open government is a proud tradition in Wisconsin. Charging requesters exorbitant fees frustrates that tradition and the spirit of the public records law. The citizens of this state deserve better from Nygren and Vos.

Exports not the answer for changing milk prices

Growth in export markets has long been lauded as the measure of success in American agriculture. Last year, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue credited exports

for being a "major driver of the rural economy, generating 20% of U.S. farm income and supporting more than a million U.S. jobs."

Those statistics conceal a hidden truth that most farmers know first-hand: exports don't actually bring better prices. In dairy, exports have reached historic highs — now topping 15% of the total U.S. milk supply — but that growth has failed to provide farmers a livable wage.

In a recent webinar hosted by Wisconsin Farmers Union through the Dairy Together initiative, dairy economist Chuck Nicholson ex-

plained, "price impacts of export growth tend to be limited. One of the reasons for that is the milk supply response. If we have opportunities to sell more product, typically the industry can respond fairly readily."

In other words, opening new markets generates demand in the short term, but farmers quickly ramp up supply right along with it. Any price increase is quickly neutralized.

Nicholson's analysis shows that for every 1% increase in dairy components exported, the all-milk price increases by only 10 cents.

Despite the limited impact on milk prices, the U.S. Dairy Export Council aims for a goal of exporting 20% of the U.S. milk supply, a 5% increase from 2018 levels. USDEC claims that export growth benefits everyone in the industry: farmers, consumers, and everyone involved in the complex dairy supply chain. Nicholson's analysis suggests that may not be the case.

"The primary benefits will go to farms that are growing because they

are the ones that will be supplying that additional product that goes into export markets," he said. "Other benefits will go to supply chain partners like the processors and exporting companies that are also part of facilitating trade flows of dairy products outside the U.S."

Exports do contribute to farm income, but the profits are not distributed equally among dairy farmers or throughout the supply chain. Nicholson explains the income distribution issue this way: "The average milk price does not increase that much by increasing exports. So farms that are not growing are going to see milk revenues that look a lot like the revenues we would see if we weren't exporting very much. The place where there is a difference is farms that are growing will see a larger demand for their milk. The benefits are not higher prices, but bigger quantities."

That's why many farmers feel pressured to expand their operations to stay afloat, but others cannot or

do not want to manage a large dairy operation. For them, higher prices are the only way to stay in business. Since the price bottomed out in 2014, 7,339 U.S. dairy farms have called it quits.

If we want to save the 37,000 dairy farms that remain, as well as the rural communities they support, we need higher prices. If higher prices are the goal, then exports are not the answer. To bring real prosperity to dairy farmers and rural communities, we need a national system to balance milk supply with profitable demand.

Keuschel said a bid was put in for Smalley Park to host the 2021 Division 2 Show Ski National Championships, "and this is a good showing of how perfect our site and town would be for it."

The Guinness World Record currently sits at 32 skiers and was set in

Shawano in 2017. A total of 35 skiers, with some coming up from Florida, are prepared to try and set a new record Sunday.

This event is also free for the public to attend.

"We have been working very hard to help use our ski team's platform to promote Shawano and what it has to offer," said Passehl. "Bringing Guinness World Records to our town is an awesome way to showcase our city and it's waterways."

"When the organizers of these record attempts ask to host them in our hometown, we feel proud to have the perfect ski site and a supportive community to accept the invitation to host and participate in the World Records."

No boat traffic will be allowed on Wolf River between 7-11 a.m. to allow the record attempts in a safe environment. Media members will be positioned atop the road bridge and a barricade will be in place to warn motorists of their presence, but it is not expected to impede traffic flow.

New DNR phone app harnesses technology for a better hunt

I have a love-hate relationship with technology. Part of me loves trail cameras, Bluetooth (when it works), computers and cell phones. I'd love to tell you I'm writing this story on a manual typewriter similar to the one Ernest Hemingway used, but the truth is that it's written on a fairly new desktop PC.

I resisted smartphones longer than most. My wife bought me a very basic Tracfone cell phone shortly after I suffered an aortic dissection in April 2004, primarily so I could call for help if something happened to me

while deer hunting. This primitive phone could make calls (reception was actually very good) and cost 25 cents per text (I remember the first time I sent a text with it; I was so happy I'd figured it out). The screen was barely large enough for three lines of text.

We left for a trip to Chicago, stopping for a dental appointment right before gassing up. I noticed I had almost no minutes left, so I called Tracfone headquarters (in the Philippines) and told the operator I'd probably need more minutes just to complete the call to buy more minutes. She could not get my credit card to work, even though I used the card a few minutes later to buy gas.

For the next two days, I ruined my weekend dealing with a multitude of Tracfone employees, none of whom could get my card to work (all the while using the same card to pay for restaurants, a motel stay and more). I finally used my wife's cell phone to make a three-way call with the guy from my bank (English-speaking guy in Omaha) and the person from TracFone.

Mr. Omaha gave Tracfone Guy a transaction number to let me buy minutes, at which point the Tracfone Guy said, "What's that?" Every credit card transaction has a number associated with it. The fact that he didn't know that meant that I was officially done with Tracfone.

That led to my first smartphone with U.S. Cellular, a basic Motorola model that I initially loved.

Neither that phone nor my second Motorola had a very good camera, and of course, I'm a photographer at heart. I'll never understand paying \$1,000

for a phone, but U.S. Cellular recently offered a good deal on a Google Pixel 3A phone with a very nice camera, so I pulled the string.

I still love shooting my recurve bow, hunting deer with a muzzleloader, throwing knives and tomahawks into a stump target at our Fox Valley Muzzleloaders Club rendezvous in October, and many other low-tech activities. But when a beautiful sunset, pileated woodpecker or funny daughter situation appears, I love whipping out the cell phone and deploying the built-in camera like agent Maxwell Smart might have done on Get Smart. If you aren't old enough to get that reference, just Google it.

Those of us who live in the boonies know that cell phone service is never a sure thing. There are many dead spots in rural New London, including most of our home. We saw AT&T install a brand new cell tower two miles from our house (on our muzzleloader club property, no less), but after waiting for months, they still aren't offering service for us.

Apps like a free one being offered by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources look promising.

The DNR offered the Hunt Wild Wisconsin app last year, and has added many features to this year's model. The Natural Resources Board recently promised to expand Chronic Wasting Disease sampling and deer carcass disposal locations, and the app can help hunters find those sites to get their deer tested and properly dispose of carcasses to help prevent spreading the disease.

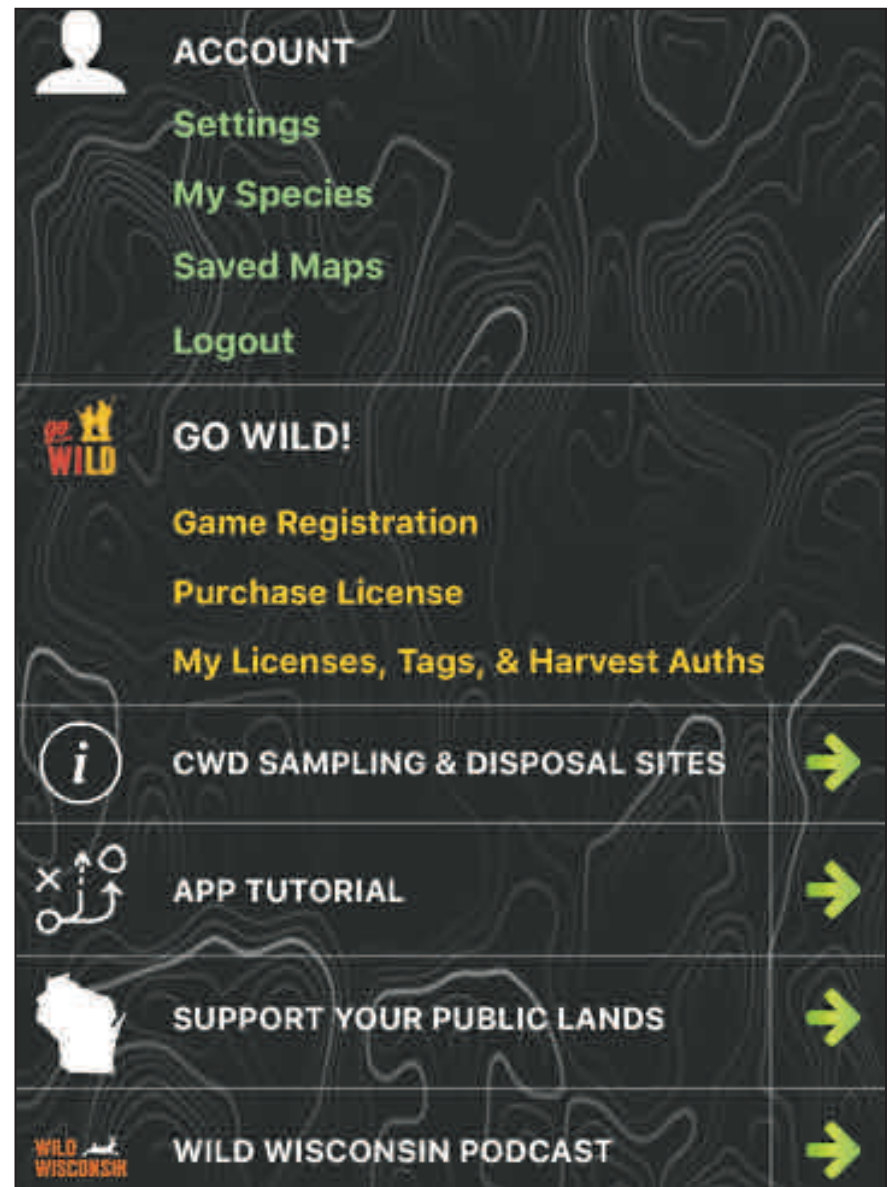
The best part of the app is that you can access topographical maps, land boundaries and hunting zones with or without a cell phone signal once it's downloaded.

You can find prime habitat "layers" based on the species you are hunting. This is ideal for those who don't have their own land to hunt or want to try new public hunting areas. You can also save those spots and record trails, too.

Hunt Wild Wisconsin also shows shooting hours based on location and a summary of regulations. You can access your personal Hunt Wild account to buy licenses and register harvests.

To find links to the revised app, go to the DNR website and enter "Hunt App" in the search box. You can also find it in the iTunes or Google Play store, depending on the type of phone you own.

If you have trouble navigating the app, there's a tutorial on the site as well. What would our hunting forefa-

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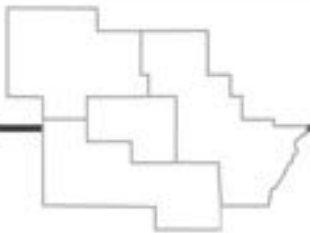

ThedaCare vehicle shows importance of safe ride home

NEENAH — Those living in Northeast and Central Wisconsin may soon notice a unique car featured at community events. A “Choose Your Ride” car, which is half police car, half taxi, has recently been donated by Bergstrom Automotive to be used by the Trauma Program at ThedaCare Regional Medical Center-Neenah.

“One choice can lead to a lifetime of consequences,” said Dr. Ray Georgen, the ThedaCare System trauma medical director. “We want people to really think about their actions and decisions. Hopefully, a car like this will encourage them to have a conversation about safety and make responsible choices.”

The car is intended to remind people to choose a safe ride home and not drive while impaired. Impairments could include drinking or drugged driving, or driving while distracted. It’s all aimed to encourage injury prevention, an important aspect of the trauma program.

“Day in and day out, people are faced with difficult decisions,” Georgen said. “We want this car to represent an easy decision, do not

drive while impaired.”

The taxi portion of the car repre-

sents choosing a designated driver, ride service or taxi as a safe ride. The police car portion represents the possible consequences if you drive while impaired. When it comes to the monetary aspect, a taxi or ride service is much cheaper when compared to the repercussions of impaired driving,

which could cost thousands of dollars, according to Georgen.

The car will be used by local law enforcement agencies, in partnership with ThedaCare. The goal is to have the car seen by as many people as possible. Similar cars have been used in cities across the country.

'Wrenches in Time' features 1947 John Deere D tractor

BIRNAMWOOD — Shawano County's 349th barn quilt is now on display on a beautifully restored barn owned by John and Diana Resch at N11137 Hutchins-Aniwa Townline Road, Birnamwood. The name of the quilt pattern is "Wrenches in Time."

The quilt features an image of a 1947 John Deere D tractor. John Resch purchased the tractor six years ago.

Wilfred and Gretchen Resch purchased the 240-acre farm in 1945. Shortly thereafter they built a new barn and began dairy farming. They raised eight children, Robert, Genevieve, Thomas, John, Trudey, Andy, Emily and Caroline, all of whom worked alongside their parents on the family farm.

John Resch remained to farm with his dad in 1970, so they added onto the barn and eventually purchased an additional 160 acres of land. Soon after John and Diana got married in 1982, the families incorporated as W.J. Dairy, Inc. They

continued milking 60 Holstein cows and raising the young stock as replacements. To diversify, cash crops of corn and soybeans were grown with the purchase of an additional 70 acres of crop land.

After John and Diana's daughter, Rosalind, and son, Alex, left the farm to pursue other careers, the transition from dairy to cash crops was completed in 2011 when the dairy herd was sold.

Now, as John Resch approaches retirement, most of the land is being rented for growing cash crops, but the barn still remains as a monument to the family farm and its past.

"We really like the barn quilt," Diana Resch said, "and are so pleased to be part of the wonderful Shawano County barn quilt project."

The Resch barn quilt was painted by the Shawano County barn quilt project committee and was put on display by LeRoy Raddant of Raddant Electric in Shawano with the help of his grandson, Keenan.
