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Bomb threat called in to Safe Haven

Perimeter search turns up nothing, incident under investigation

SHAWANO — A bomb threat was phoned in to the Safe Haven Domestic Abuse Shelter early Monday morning.

The call came in around 2:20 a.m., according to police.

Police Chief Dan Mauel said it was a “vague threat for outside the building.” Shelter residents were not evacuated during the incident.

Police checked the perimeter of the facility at 380 Lakeland Road and found nothing.

Mauel said the incident is still under investigation but police do have a suspect.

Safe Haven Executive Director Stacey Cicero said the facility has never before had a bomb threat in its 18 years of operation.

“That was our first call like that,” she said.

Given the nature of the facility, which exists to provide temporary

shelter to people in abusive relationships, occasional threats and unwelcome visitors are no surprise.

“Over the last 18 years, on occasion, we’ve had perpetrators come to the facility, sometimes leaving love notes and flowers in cars, sometimes damaging property, but nothing to the extent of calling in a bomb threat,” Cicero said.

There have been threatening phone calls on occasion and police have been alerted to those.

“It’s always something you have to be vigilant about, because you just don’t know,” Cicero said.

Safe Haven has taken measures in terms of security.

“We’re a very secure facility,” Cicero said.

All entry doors and windows have alarms installed and security cameras keep watch over the facility’s perimeter.

“If a window breaks or is broken into, or a door is pushed open, the alarm goes off,” Cicero said.

“We have live camera feeds right into the shelter advocate’s office so they can see specifically what’s going on outside,” she said. “If somebody comes to the door and rings a buzzer, we can see the person who’s standing on the other side of the door. So we don’t open the door if we don’t know who’s out there, obviously.”

The facility has onsite staff overnight. It was a shelter advocate who took the bomb threat call and alerted police.

The building is monitored by a private security company and the facility has panic alarms, including a silent one, that alerts law enforcement to any problems.

Cicero said Safe Haven also takes due diligence with staff, keeping an eye on the parking lot when they’re coming and going.

The facility currently has eight families in the shelter.

“We’re full right now,” Cicero said.

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2 Bowler women charged in fraud scheme

Two Bowler women are facing multiple fraud and drug charges after allegedly using an elderly man’s debit cards to steal nearly \$8,000 from his bank account.

Shelly G. Davids, 32, and her sister, Kelly A. Davids, 41, are accused of using the victim’s debit cards on numerous occasions from May through August to make personal purchases that totaled \$7,829.

According to the criminal complaint, the two were friends of the victim, who suffers from dementia.

Search warrants executed on the sisters’ residences on Sept. 3 also turned up marijuana and numerous items of drug paraphernalia, including some with residue that tested positive for methamphetamine.

Stockbridge-Munsee Police Chief Jim Hoffman said the allegations in this case, like many others law enforcement deal with these days, are rooted in the drug problem.

“It’s all tied to drugs,” he said. “The methamphetamine problem, that’s pretty much taken over everything we do now. There’s so much

methamphetamine use and abuse.”

Hoffman said the main focus of this case, however, is elder abuse.

“This guy is a vulnerable adult and was allegedly taken advantage of,” he said. “And he’s not going to be able to recover any of that money. Typically, a lot of times this doesn’t get repaid back to the victim.”

Shelly Davids is facing 14 felony counts of theft, five felony counts of misappropriating identification to obtain money, one felony count of possession with intent to deliver methamphetamine and one felony count of possession of methamphetamine.

She is also charged with 40 felony counts of bail jumping.

Kelly Davids is charged with two felony counts of theft, two felony counts of misappropriating identification to obtain money, one felony count of forgery, one felony count of possession of methamphetamine, one felony count of second or subsequent-offense possession of marijuana and one felony count of bail jumping.

The felony theft charges carry an enhanced possible penalty because the victim was “an individual at risk,”

according to the criminal complaint.

Shelly and Kelly Davids could each face a maximum six years in prison and \$10,000 fine of convicted of those charges.

Identity theft for financial gain and felony bail jumping carry the same possible penalties.

The most serious of the drug charges Shelly Davids faces, possession with intent to deliver methamphetamine, carries a maximum 15 years in prison and \$50,000 fine if convicted.

According to court records, Shelly Davids has four other felony court cases pending.

At a court hearing Monday on the new charges, Habeck set a \$5,000 cash bond.

Shelly Davids is due back in court for an adjourned initial appearance Sept. 23.

Kelly Davids was ordered held on a \$7,500 cash bond set by Habeck and is also scheduled for an adjourned initial appearance Sept. 23.

Barefoot waterskiing record set Sunday

Shawano's Ski Sharks, skiers from around the midwest beat Guinness record

SHAWANO — Wet suits and dry suits were the rule on Sunday morning off of Smalley Park in Shawano as a line of water skiers bested a world record with 34 barefoot skiers, then beat their own record with a 38-skier line.

The previous record in the Guinness Book of World Records was 32

skiers, set in 2017.

The team from Wisconsin, Illinois, Minnesota — including Shawano's Ski Sharks — completed the required 300-meter route down the Wolf River, pulled behind one boat. The accomplishment, which was videotaped from the bridge west of Shawano and by a drone camera, must be verified by Guinness before the record is confirmed.

Cloudy skies and cool weather

didn't dampen the mood as the newly-formed team broke the record on their second attempt. They then made several additional passes until they reached their current record of 38. The cheers started on the line even before the skiers hit the water.

A portion of the river was closed to boating Sunday morning to allow the skiers and safety boats the space they needed to perform safely.

On Saturday, members of ski shows from around the state combined their talents in the Scott Coley Memorial Tournament. In this mini ski show, the ski clubs mixed their rosters to create three teams. Each team had to create its own mini-show on the day of the tournament.

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Superintendent: Mill rate could be lower than promised

District seeks long-term fiscal management

WITTENBERG — If property values in the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District continue to climb, residents could pay even less in school property taxes than previously expected.

At the district's Aug. 26 annual meeting, Superintendent Garrett Rogowski updated district residents and the school board about upcoming budget numbers and how they could affect the amount of taxes collected.

The property value in the district has been consistent at roughly \$526 million. Rogowski expects that number to be even higher this year, which will have a positive impact.

"I don't think I'd be way off in estimating that number to increase to \$544 million, which would be great news for our taxpayers" said Rogowski.

The district uses equalized values, which are calculated annually by the Department of Revenue and used to insure statewide fairness and equity in property tax distribution.

Equalized value represents an estimate of a taxation district's total taxable value. This provides for the fair apportionment of school districts and county levy for each of the municipalities, explained Rogowski.

Changes in equalized value don't necessarily translate to changes in property value, which is based on assessed value. They are two separate issues.

For the purpose of the annual meeting, the budget is based on estimates rather actual numbers, which will be tabulated and released by the end of October. Property valuation and enrollment numbers will be provided in September, and numbers for general aid and computer aid will be finalized in October.

"Today we share with our constituents what we think is coming down the pike," said Rogowski.

There had been a dip in student population between 2011 and 2014, but enrollment has stayed relatively stable since then. Looking forward, it should remain between 75-90 students per

grade, according to Rogowski, who is projecting total enrollment to be at 1,140.

He also noted that the student population total is based on a three-year rolling average, so that there isn't a drastic increase or decrease in total revenue for the school board to work with.

The levy rate over the past six years has been stable, even decreased. The projected rate is actually lower than what residents were paying just five years ago without the referendum, said Rogowski.

If the property rates go up, the mill rate will go down. The state average mill rate for 2018-19 was \$9.46 when WBSD was at \$8.01. In comparison, in 2017-18 the mill rate for Witt-Birn was \$8.15, Tigerton \$12.82 and Shawano \$9.71.

Compared to the referendum tax impact rate — which Rogowski and board members estimated at \$1.39 per \$1,000 valuation before the referendum — the rate for 2019-20 is at \$1.01 per \$1,000 valuation.

Rogowski added that, if property values increase to the \$544 million estimate, the rate could decrease by another 30 cents.

A mill rate of \$9.35 per \$1,000 would mean that someone who owns a home valued at \$100,000 would pay \$935 per year. The mill rate could be as low as \$9.01 if all the numbers come in as expected in October.

"We held true to our promise and stayed below the referendum projection we made during the campaign," said Rogowski.

He also noted the district maintained financial stability and the board has demonstrated good fiscal management. The revenue budget for 2018-19 was \$13,387,835, and the district actually took in \$13,444,056, for a surplus of \$56,221. The expenses were budgeted at \$13,387,835, but the district only spent \$13,352,196 — resulting in a savings of \$35,639.

The budget for 2019-20 is \$13,717,594.

Sept. 24, 2015. The cemetery will serve more than 38,000 veterans, their spouses and eligible children within a 75-mile radius of nearby Rhinelander. When completed, Phase I will offer more than 3,380 casket and cremation spaces to accommodate burials.

Some tales about birds that will ruffle your tail feathers

The other day, someone told me about blue jays molting. I had no idea they molt in late summer. I watched for the jays to come to our feeder. I was surprised to see the once beautiful, proud and sassy jays looking so pathetic.

All of the feathers on their heads were gone. They looked so shabby and

unkept. I observed they didn't chase the other birds away like they normally do. I decided to do a little research. As old as I am, I never noticed bald-headed blue jays before.

What I learned is most birds have late summer molts. Some birds have a second molt in the spring, but blue jays only have one.

Did you know once a feather has grown to full size, it is no longer connected to the blood supply? Birds get a new set of feathers annually.

Both the blue jays and the cardinals have beautiful feathers on their heads.

When they lose them, the rest of their feathers are beginning to look dull and worn.

Cardinals and most songbirds lose their wing feathers one at a time from each wing. New feathers replace them before other wing feathers fall out. This molting process ensures the birds can continue to fly. Isn't Mother Nature wonderful?

The feathers on their bodies can be lost simultaneously, so you may see birds with bald spots. Tail feathers fall out slowly, a few at a time.

Often when the birds molt, they stop singing and fighting. They often sulk and hide. It's almost as if they know their appearance has changed. Perhaps it is just a lack of energy or weakness as their body goes through the changes.

Many of you know I have had some "unusual experiences" with birds, causing me to not get too close to them. I do, however, enjoy watching them at the feeder from my kitchen window.

Several of you have asked me to retell some of my bird experiences. I guess I can embarrass myself again and tell you about our talking myna bird.

His name was Sam. We purchased him from owners of a photography business.

The owners told us they had to get rid of him because he often insulted their customers. Sam could speak quite clearly. He could do an amazing wolf whistle, too.

Our kids thought Sam was hilarious. He could mock anyone's laugh, and he often did, having our neighborhood kids in stitches. His vocabulary was sometimes x-rated. He had quite a potty mouth. We tried to teach him manners to no avail.

When I worked for Citizens Bank, we had sales teams. I was a captain of one of the teams. It was expected that the captain of the winning team would have members over for a few snacks and refreshments before being treated to a nice dinner at a supper club.

My team won. I was worried about Sam's foul mouth, so I decided to cover his cage before my guests arrived. It was my hope he would sleep.

When my company arrived, someone laughed. Sam heard and imitated the laugh. One of the board members, Bill Ruechel, asked, "Where is that

laughing coming from?"

Classic cars fill every space at Shawano Lake County Park

SHAWANO — It was a traffic jam for the ages.

Literally.

Cars of all ages, sizes, designs, color, horsepower and function jammed into every available space at the eighth annual Custom and Classics Car Club car show at the Shawano Lake County Park on Sunday.

Fortunately, despite the number of cars pouring into the park, road rage was not to be heard or seen.

Pat Garbelman, outgoing president of the car club, said over 300 cars were expected, and she also expected a lot of satisfaction with the event and the site.

“We get cars from all over north-

east Wisconsin,” she said. “Some camp here, some just bring cars. I’ve heard that this is considered one of the best shows in Wisconsin.” The setting—cars tucked into the trees with Shawano Lake as a backdrop is one of the reasons that the show is so popular.

“The park is very well-kept and everyone who works here is awesome,” she said.

The car show is a fundraiser for local charities, Garbelman said. Last year, the event raised about \$3,000, which was divided among six different charities. The charities are chosen after the event is a success, she said. Among the previous groups to receive donations are Safe Haven, Shawano Area Matthew 25 and the Shawano County Humane Society, she said.

She added that Shawano Community High School students hold the 50/50 raffle and the local AmVets post sells food, increasing the fundraising value of the show.

For the car enthusiasts, a long table of sponsored trophies is the draw, along with the chance to spend the day comparing notes and discussing their cars. Trophies are awarded in three places, thanks to donations by 26 local businesses.

The 85 club members display their cars but aren’t eligible for trophies.

Club member Al Kuck had not only his car on display — a 1933 Plymouth with more than a few additions — he also had a hand-quilted “portrait” of the car created by his wife, Pam. The purple version of the Plymouth is was listed in the “street rod” class, he said.

Jim Hibbert, Oshkosh, was eligible to win, and was found on the ground in front of his 1973 Chevelle, carefully washing bug remains off of the bumper. Unlike some car enthusiasts, he said he never “trailers” his car but drives it to all events. He said he won Best in Show in Antigo this year.

Rick Rautz, Gillett, was showing his 1968 Camaro convertible, but took time to look around the grounds with his friend, Matthew Wichman, Pulcifer.

“Next year, it will be you,” he told Wichman, as he encouraged him to get a car of his own to show.

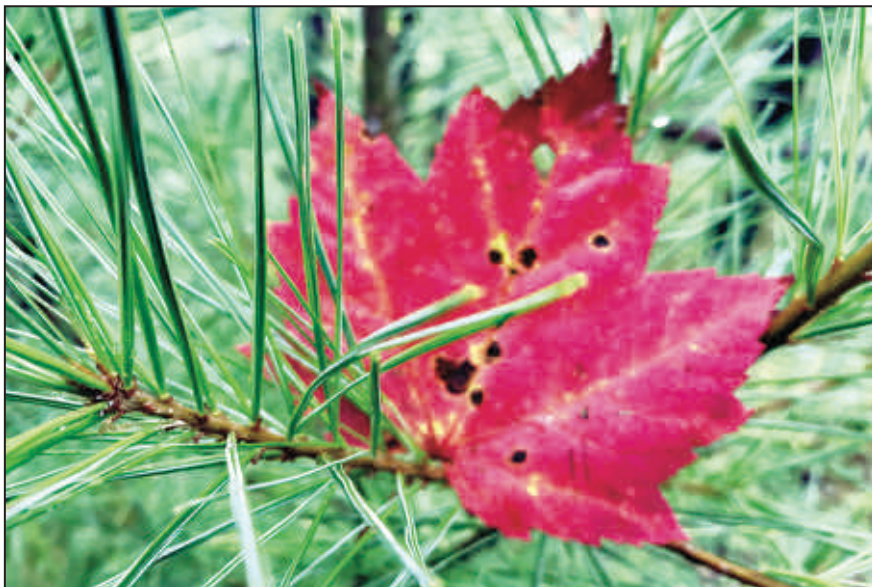

TASTE OF AUTUMN

Having temps lower than normal brings out fall colors early

It has been a cooler than normal a few weeks here in our area, bringing a taste of fall and things to come as summer begins to fade. Already, the signs of the coming fall are becoming more and more numerous in our forest, meadows and gardens.

I took a hike through the Navarino Wildlife Area recently and was surprised to find large sections of forest dominated by already red-dening maples. The colors of fall are definitely beginning to show and this is the perfect place to watch them unfold as autumn arrives.

Cooler weather and plenty of

rain have also resulted in a spectacular display of colorful, wonderfully textured wild mushrooms in our forests and even right in our own backyards. Take a closer look as you explore the fall

woodlands and enjoy the beauty, colors and textures of our many native wild mushrooms and fungi.



The wildflowers of late summer and fall and fall are also putting on a spectacular display. Classic fall blooms such as the many varieties of golden-rod, Joe pye weed, black-eyed Susan, wild sunflowers of many varieties, white turtleheads and gorgeous blue bottle gentians are all in bloom now.

Still to come are the incredible asters. New England aster, blooming in rich purple and yellow, is a favorite of many and usually begin to appear about the middle of September, lasting all of the way till Halloween. Smooth aster, in sky blue, along with Heath aster and frost aster in bright white are others that will shortly be filling our fields, gardens and roadsides with their amazing color and explosive bloom.

The arrival of September also means an incredible migration is underway. Monarch butterflies are on the move and continue to swell in number as they move south through the area. If you're lucky, you may have a monarch roost on your property. A roost is a special tree or section of trees where monarchs in an area gather each night at sunset to spend the evening resting among the shelter-

ing branches. At sunrise, the gathering breaks up and the monarchs move on.

Hummingbirds are also migrating heavily at this time and making stops along the way wherever colorful blooms in our yards, gardens and meadows invite them to fuel up for their journey south.

The sandhill cranes are gathering in ever increasing numbers each night as families of birds begin to join together in staging areas, such as Navarino, where they will remain throughout most of the fall season until the wetlands freeze up, forcing them to journey south.

As the weeks of September pass by, the colors will intensify as more forest trees begin to turn color. In October, the color will peak as the oaks, tamaracks and witch hazels really shine.

Enjoy exploring our area forests and natural areas, as well as your own backyard to seek out the sign of autumn that are growing with each new day.

Dickelman, Hawks shine in rout of GB East

Shawano wins second straight

SHAWANO — The Shawano Community High School football team put on a show in its 50-6 Bay Conference rout of Green Bay East on Friday, giving family members plenty to cheer about on parents' night.

Senior Brayden Dickelman led the charge on offense, rushing for over 300 yards and four touchdowns in the first half.

Junior Gage Timm threw a touchdown pass to sophomore Elliott Lowney and freshman Arland Dillenburg capped the lopsided win with a pair of rushing touchdowns in the second half.

Not to be outdone, Shawano's defense was stifling, spending much of the evening in the Green Bay East backfield to help the hosts earn their second straight win.

The Hawks received the opening kickoff and began driving down the field behind Dickelman. A trio of penalties slowed the drive before Shawano eventually fumbled.

"Some of our slow start tonight could have been the fact that we felt that we were the better team and we're not quite sure how to handle that yet and that's part of the growing process as a team and program — how to handle winning," said Shawano coach Al Tomow. "I thought we learned how to compete, we learned how to win and now we need to learn how to handle winning and that's the next step."

The Hawks' defense forced a punt on East's first drive, giving the offense great starting field position.

The host's fourth penalty pushed the ball back to Shawano's own 48, but on the next play, Dickelman broke free for his first rushing score.

After another GBE punt, the Hawks went on a long, nine-play drive, culminated by a 19-yard touchdown run from Dickelman.

The Red Devils had their best scoring opportunity in the first half on their next drive, as quarterback Alex Schlag broke free on a scramble. But Shawano senior Ben Carroll never gave up on

the play, sprinting from nearly one sideline to the other to catch Schlag at the 1-yard line.

The play proved to be big, as Shawano forced and recovered a fumble on the next play.

"We really talked before the game about trying to shut them out and I saw that he broke free and I just didn't want him to score. I literally did everything I could to catch up to him and ended up catching him. Then we got the turnover, so it turned out really nice. We played really well defensively."

After a holding penalty pushed the Hawks' offense back to their own 2, Dickelman busted free for a 98-yard score to increase the lead to 20-0.

While Dickelman was able to break several tackles on the night, he also was paved some big lanes to run through behind an offensive line of seniors Jagger Theis, Shad Krueger, Keith Tourtillott and Ben Smits and sophomore Jackson Smits.

"They did great and looked really good tonight," said Dickelman of the offensive line. "I'm glad they gave us

such a big first half as a team so we could get some of the younger guys in who didn't play last night."

The JV game was cancelled Thursday, so Tomow was more than willing to insert some junior varsity players into the lineup in the second half.

The Shawano defense kept the momentum going on the next possession, as junior Trace Yeager started the drive with a tackle for loss before sophomore Andrew Popp recorded a sack. On the third play of the drive, Timm picked off a pass and returned it to the Red Devils' 19-yard line.

After a holding penalty moved the Hawks back to the 21 on second down, Timm hit Elliott Lowney with a pass, and the WR eluded a would-be tackler to get into the end zone and up the lead to 27-0.

Shawano's defense looked to force a three-and-out on the ensuing drive, but the hosts were flagged for roughing the punter. The Red Devils picked up a couple more first downs before a trio of pass breakups and a tackle for loss by senior Nick Sherman turned the ball over on downs.

On the third play of Shawano's next drive, Dickelman put an exclamation point on his monster night with a 57-yard touchdown run and then a two-point conversion run to make it 35-0.

Shawano's defense finished off its shutout in the first half after Yeager registered a tackle for loss and Tourtillott sacked the opposing QB.

Green Bay East scored its lone touchdown on the first offensive play of the second half.

Despite most of the Hawks' starters sitting the second half, the offense continued to roll with some of its junior varsity players.

Sophomore Carson Popp took over at quarterback and helped the Hawks put together several long drives. Dillenburg did most of the damage on the ground, with help from junior Kaleb Lowney and freshman Ashton Henning.

Dillenburg scored a touchdown late in the third quarter and about halfway through the final quarter to cap the game's scoring.

The win pushed Shawano's record to 2-1 overall and in the Bay. It marked the Hawks first home win since Oct. 7, 2017 and means the team needs just two more conference wins to lock up a postseason berth.

The Hawks will try and earn one of those wins on Friday on the road against New London.

"We just have to keep working hard and coach Tomow is always telling us that we aren't done yet and that we still have more to prove," said Dickelman. "We want to make the playoffs this year, so we need to pick up two more wins and keep working hard."

Packers' D, Aaron Rodgers beat Bears in opener

Amos records key interception against former team

CHICAGO, ILL. — Aaron Rodgers doesn't have to lay waste to a defense to enjoy Packers football.

He sure had a good time seeing what his guys on the other side of the ball did Thursday night to the archrival Bears.

"Yeah, it was fun to watch," Rodgers said after Green Bay opened the NFL's 100th season with a 10-3 victory over Chicago. "It's been a long time since I've seen a performance like that. Obviously, a lot of credit to Mike Pettine and his staff, but to those players, just incredible.

"We didn't do them a whole lot of favors with our performance on offense. I mean every time we needed something, a stop, they came up with some really big plays."

It was a defensive battle also marked by sloppy offense and penalties. A lack of action in the preseason

clearly damaged both offenses, and Rodgers at times looked uncomfortable in the attack designed by new coach Matt LaFleur. But he is a two-time league MVP, and he hit Jimmy Graham in the second quarter for the only touchdown.

That aggressive Green Bay defense would have made Vince Lombardi proud in the latest edition of the NFL's longest rivalry, which the Packers lead 98-95-6. Green Bay has won 16 of the last 19 regular-season meetings, and Rodgers is 17-5.

Chicago's defense hardly slacked,

getting five sacks — tying the most it has had against Rodgers. But it could do little with the ball and the Packers had five sacks of Mitchell Trubisky, who never found his stride, and was sacked on Chicago's final offensive play. Former Bears safety Adrian Amos picked off an end-zone pass into double coverage with 1:58 remaining, the only turnover of the contest.

"It feels real good," Amos said. "It feels great to come back to win and how we did as a defense."

Mason Crosby made a 39-yard field goal in the final period for Green Bay, while defending NFC North champion Chicago got a 38-yarder from Eddy Pineiro.

Each team had 10 penalties, there was a total of 467 yards of offense, and several drops. At one point, Chicago had three straight penalties to put it in a first-and-40. No, the Bears didn't convert.

Still, take nothing away from either defense. They both controlled the line of scrimmage almost throughout the night, and Trubisky was particularly bothered by it, going 26 of 45 for 228 yards.

"Three points is ridiculous," coach Matt Nagy said. "Any Chicago Bears fan ... should be upset."

Rodgers was 18 for 30 for 203 yards, hardly vintage A-Rod, and certainly unlike his performance in leading the Packers back from a 20-point hole in the second half of the 2018 opener against the Bears.

Of course, he had all that support Thursday night from the likes of newcomers Preston Smith (1 1/2 sacks), and Za'Darius Smith (a sack), enough to give Green Bay the boost it needed.

The opening series couldn't have been uglier for Green Bay. A run and a pass netted zero yards, then Rodgers was sacked heavily by Roy Robertson-Harris for a 10-yard loss.

Well, maybe it could. Rodgers was sacked again on the next three-and-out and Chicago took over at the Packers 36 after a punt. Chicago had forced 17 yards in losses on those series, and the Packers had minus-12 yards through one period.

Rodgers erased such ineffectiveness quickly at the start of the second quarter, launching a 47-yard completion to Marquez Valdes-Scantling. Two more completions got the Pack to the 8, and Graham did what most former basketball players turned tight ends should, winning a jump ball in the end zone.

By halftime, Green Bay had out-gained Chicago 119 yards to 98.

Cephus rejoices after scoring twice in Badgers win

Wisconsin shuts out second straight opponent

MADISON — Quintez Cephus has been through a lot.

The junior wide receiver missed the final five games of Wisconsin's 2017 campaign because of a broken right leg and did not play at all last year after being expelled from school following sexual assault charges.

Cephus was acquitted by a jury last month, reinstated by school officials and was ruled academically eligible for last week's opener at South Florida.

After hauling in only three catches

for 39 yards in the Badgers' 49-0 victory last week, the Georgia native finally had his breakout game at Wisconsin.

Cephus scored his first two touchdowns of the season, Jonathan Taylor rushed for three touchdowns and caught another, and No. 17 Wisconsin cruised past Central Michigan 61-0 in its home opener Saturday.

"I think that was just a moment where I realized what God has in store for me," Cephus said of scoring his first touchdown — a 36-yard strike from junior quarterback Jack Coan — at Camp Randall Stadium since the ninth game of the 2017 season. "He's brought me to this point, and to have a little success was a great thing for me."

Cephus finished with six receptions for 130 yards.

While Cephus and Wisconsin had 599 yards of total offense, Central Michigan (1-1) managed just 58 yards

and three first downs.

Taylor had 102 yards on the ground, surpassing the 100-yard rushing mark for the 24th time in 29 career games. The 2018 Doak Walker Award winner also had his third receiving score of the season after having none in his first two seasons with the Badgers.

Through two games, Wisconsin's defense has pitched two shutouts, forced a safety and allowed just 215 total yards and 41 yards rushing, the team's lowest two-game totals since at least 1998.

Wisconsin opens Big Ten play against Michigan on Sept. 21 at home.

The takeaway

After missing Cephus on two deep throws last week in the season opener, Coan found the receiver for a 36-yard score and a 46-yard strike

on Saturday. Coan finished 26 of 33 passing with 363 yards (fifth highest in program history) and three touchdowns. He had zero turnovers for a Wisconsin offense that has found a nice rhythm heading into a bye week.

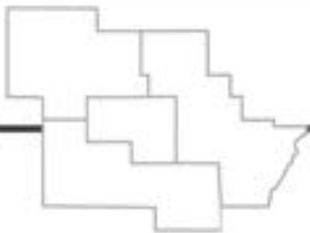
