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Some taverns reportedly violating stay-at-home order

Sheriff's department mum on enforcement

SHAWANO — A number of Shawano County bars and taverns were reportedly open for business over the last several days, in spite of the statewide Safer at Home order aimed at curbing the spread of the COVID-19 coronavirus.

While some were open only for food take-out, in compliance with the order, others reportedly had patrons inside eating and drinking, according to complaints received by the Shawano County Sheriff's Department.

Sheriff Adam Bieber posted an open letter to Gov. Tony Evers on his Facebook page last month implying he would not enforce the order.

Bieber urged Evers to lighten the restrictions and wrote that he "will not enforce rules or laws that infringe on the Constitutional rights of our Citizens."

Bieber has not responded to repeated calls or emails from the Leader seeking to clarify his Facebook post.

According to Linda Van Gheem, president of the Shawano County Tavern League and owner of Da Swamp tavern in Seymour, Bieber has made it clear that taverns don't need to worry about any enforcement from the sheriff's department.

"He said he wouldn't enforce anything," Van Gheem said.

Bieber on Wednesday attended a meeting of the tavern league hosted at the Shawano Lake Golf Course.

On Thursday, the sheriff's department received a complaint that bars along Lake Drive were open.

No action appears to have been taken by the sheriff's department in response.

Sheriff's Capt. Ty Raddant said the complaint was "taken for information at this time."

On Friday, according to the daily incident report, the sheriff's department received three more complaints about bars being open, including one caller who reported that "all of the bars in Cecil are open."

It was not clear from the incident report what, if any, action was taken in response.

Raddant was not at liberty to discuss the department's stance on enforcing the governor's order.

"The sheriff says he is the only one that wants to respond to that," Raddant said.

Additional calls were put in to Bieber's office and cell phone numbers for a comment. He did not respond.

The governor's office also failed to respond to several calls.

County Board Chairman Tom Kautza said there was no discussion about the governor's order or enforcement at a public safety committee meeting Wednesday morning.

Kautza was asked about Bieber's open letter to Evers, which was posted April 17, and the county's response to it.

"I don't have it in front of me and I'd like to read it again before I make any comment on it," Kautza said. "I'd like to read it and see exactly what he said."

Anne Retzlaff, owner of Annie's Campground and the Irish Pub and Grub west of Gresham, is adamant about keeping her bar open.

She said she feels the governor's order to close violates her constitutional rights, and encourages other bar owners to open their establishments to the public.

"It is an active, peaceful way to pro-

test," she said. "I am proud to be standing up and fighting for our rights."

The Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Department continues to encourage people to follow social distancing rules and state guidelines for stemming the spread of the pandemic.

"As Wisconsin plans ahead for returning business to normal, we know that we will be living in a 'new' normal," health officer Vicki Dantoin said in a press release Friday. "We cannot forget that the risk for COVID-19 will continue and we will need to keep our social responsibilities and follow quarantine and isolation guidelines if necessary to help protect the public's health."

Van Gheem said she was not aware of what individual tavern league members were doing in response to the governor's order.

However, she said, tavern league members are hurting.

"There's a few that have the curbside pickup that are really stressing out about it because it's really hard to accommodate everybody," Van Gheem said. "They have to make sure they're all scheduled right. Food has to go out at a certain time so you don't have too many people at your bar."

Van Gheem's own bar is closed, she said, and she has been using that time for renovation.

"My bar is just a bar," she said. "We don't have food or anything. There are no carry-outs or anything like that. It's hard to serve anybody out of a bar like mine."

Van Gheem said she expects that some taverns will be re-opening on Monday, May 11, even though the governor's order was extended to May 26.

"Evers doesn't have the power to do that," she said. "He only has it up until 60 days."

That is one of the arguments being made before the state supreme court in a lawsuit brought by Republican lawmakers seeking to get the order overturned.

Van Gheem also said that some tavern league members are concerned that opening in violation of the governor's order could get them in trouble with the public health department, even if the sheriff's department is not enforcing it.

"I don't think they're going to re-open if they're afraid of getting their licenses pulled from the state," she said. "Then they won't open, and the ones that aren't afraid to, I guess they're going to open. I don't really know."

Responses to the governor's order and compliance with it has varied around the county.

"We're still following the state orders, until we're told otherwise that they're either invalid or they change them," Shawano Police Chief Dan Mauel said. "We encourage all of our businesses to adhere to that also."

Mauel said there was been "great cooperation" so far from businesses in the city.

Wittenberg Village President Bill Switalla said he was grateful for the cooperation being shown by businesses in the village.

"Our bars gave no argument to closing at all," he said.

The village board recently voted to waive licensing fees in light of the closures to provide some financial assistance.

"It's tough out there," he said.

Jason Resch, owner of Resch Lanes, 407 Howard St., Wittenberg, said the community has been very supportive.

But he expressed disappointment that so much of the government money intended to assist small businesses went to large companies.

"It was all gone before we could be considered," he said.

Resch Lanes is closed for inside seating and will stay that way until the governor's order on May 26.

However, Resch said, if he saw other bars allowed to be open without any enforcement, he would also open his bar.

Rachel Rasmussen, owner of Rachel's Roadside Bar and Grill, W17298 Spruce Road, Wittenberg, said the

state restrictions are excessive and unfair to small businesses.

However, she is complying with them.

"I see the dangers they are trying to prevent," she said.

Rasmussen also said there has been a lot of community support for the tavern's carry-out food service and, like some other establishments, has used the down time to make improvements.

Hugh McAloon, owner of Tavern Front, 207 W. Vinal St., Wittenberg, said his business will not reopen until there's an official OK.

"Of course we are concerned with not only the fines attached to an unauthorized early open, but also the public perception," he said. "While we may not agree with everything happening, we do need to follow the rules and keep the safety of both customers and employees in mind."

2 businesses now affected by COVID

Officials silent on Bieber's statement not to enforce governor's order

SHAWANO — Shawano County's confirmed cases of COVID-19 rose to 25 as of Tuesday, with two workplaces now affected and under public health investigations, according to the Shawano-Menominee Counties Public Health Department.

Shawano's Dairy Queen confirmed on Facebook Monday that it was the second business to be impacted by the coronavirus and has closed "until it is safe for our staff and fans to return."

Franchise owners John and Patty Seidel said they were working with the health department and look forward to opening in the coming weeks.

Public Health Director Vicki Dantoin said the health department was conducting contact tracing to determine the extent of the potential coronavirus contacts.

"There isn't really a formal num-

ber at this point," she said. "We're doing the contact tracing for folks that are impacted, so that we can make sure that there's hopefully not going to be any additional issues."

The health department reported last week that several people had also been infected at another Shawano business but have not revealed the name.

Dantoin said in an interview last week that it was not a business frequented by the public.

Rumors emerged on social media this week that a nurse practitioner who has been in contact with local nursing homes has also contracted the virus.

Dantoin said she would have to

check to see what could be released on that, given HIPAA (Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act) laws.

However, she said, at this point there are no reports of the coronavirus in local nursing homes.

The health department's daily updates, which now include a category for nursing homes, does not indicate any confirmed cases at those facilities.

Shawano County District 6 Supervisor Randy Young, who chairs the county's Board of Health, said board members get email updates from the health department two to three times a week and was not aware of any nursing home issues or the nurse practitioner rumor.

Meanwhile, a number of Shawano County taverns have begun operating in violation of the governor's Safer at Home order in the wake of comments from Sheriff Adam Bieber that he will not enforce the order on constitutional grounds.

Bieber has not responded to numerous calls or emails from the Shawano Leader for comment.

"I'm concerned that they're open and not following the law," Dantoin said. "The law is the law, and we've got to follow that."

She said the health department is exploring what options it might have in the absence of sheriff's department enforcement.

"We're looking to see what we can do," she said.

The state Department of Health Services did not respond directly to the question of Bieber's lack of enforcement or the issue of bars reopening.

Spokesperson Jennifer Miller responded by email saying that, "People who avoid the safer at home

guidance aren't only risking their health, but the health of those they come in contact with, including those who are especially vulnerable to the illness."

The state Department of Justice also declined to comment on Bieber's statement that he would not enforce the governor's order, citing the fact that the order is currently under litigation.

Young said there hasn't been any discussion by the Board of Health about Bieber's statement or reports of bars reopening because the board has not met since March.

Young, who represents Wards 11 and 12 in the city of Shawano, said he agrees with the city's approach to continue enforcing the Safer at Home order.

"I think the bars and stuff should stay closed," he said. "I think it's a little early to be opening stuff up."

Young said Shawano County should also be following the state guidelines.

The state has loosened restrictions on retail shops, allowing them to open with five or fewer people in the stores at a time, but the order did not loosen restrictions on bars or restaurants, which are allowed to be open for curbside pickup but not for patrons to eat or drink inside.

"It would be nice if the whole county was doing the same thing," Young said, "and stay closed until at least May 26 (as per the governor's order)."

Young said he realizes people are frustrated and businesses are hurting, but the coronavirus remains a threat.

"We're not out of the woods yet," he said.

Light-colored sturgeon creates media buzz

DNR sees 4 to 5 fish with lighter pigment every year

SHAWANO — The sturgeon cameras installed along the Wolf River have provided a vicarious experience for the thousands of people who would normally flock to Shawano to see the sturgeon spawning. They’ve also produced some rare sights.

Social media was abuzz last week with the sighting of a sturgeon that did not have any of the gray pigments that most see when they watch the prehistoric fish come out of the waters. Cameras caught images of a sturgeon that was a light, almost-tan color roaming through the river.

Such sturgeon are a rarity to see, according to Ryan Koenigs, senior fisheries biologist for the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. In a normal year free of pandemics, DNR staff work with about 2,000 sturgeon during their annual river spawning and see anywhere from 800 to 1,500 harvested in February during spearing season. Of those, four or five of them are a tan color.

“It’s not common, but it’s not uncommon,” Koenigs said. “We see it

every year, but it’s less than a half of a percent.”

Sturgeon spawning season is usually a big spectator event at Sturgeon Park in Shawano, along with other sites in New London and Shiocton. The flocks of visitors were curbed this year due to social distancing requirements caused by the coronavirus pandemic.

Koenigs pointed out that humans and other animals have variations of their skin pigmentation, so the sturgeon are no different. With the sturgeon being traditionally gray, biologists see the spectrum from light gray to dark as well, but there isn’t a known reason why a particular fish is the color it is.

“This one’s just so odd because it’s a little more pale in color, but I think it’s just a natural thing within the population, and I don’t know if it started with just a handful of fish that produced progeny,” Koenigs said. “I just don’t know.”

Koenigs recalled a sturgeon caught last year, a mature female, that was almost white in color. The DNR tag sturgeon regularly and conduct tests to find out more about the ancient fish.

Aside from the color change, there’s not any other distinguishable differences between the paler sturgeon and their standard-colored counterparts.

“Anything that they do, they just seem like another fish,” Koenigs said.

Shawano man faces 18 counts of child porn possession

SHAWANO — A Shawano man was charged Thursday with 18 counts of possession of child pornography as a result of a search warrant executed at his residence in the city earlier this year.

Henry M. Hobscheid, 64, could face a maximum possible penalty of 25 years in prison and a \$100,000 fine on each of the counts if found guilty.

According to the criminal complaint, Shawano police received a tip

in February from the Internet Crimes Against Children data system that an image of a prepubescent minor was uploaded from an IP address in the city.

The image was of a female about 7-9 years of age in a sexual pose, according to the complaint. The IP address was traced to Hobscheid, and a search warrant was executed on March 19.

Authorities seized a cellphone, laptop, tablet, flash drives, external hard drives and multiple CDs. A forensic analysis by Shawano County

sheriff’s detectives of the laptops and flash drives revealed images of child pornography, according to the complaint.

The complaint states the images were of prepubescent females in

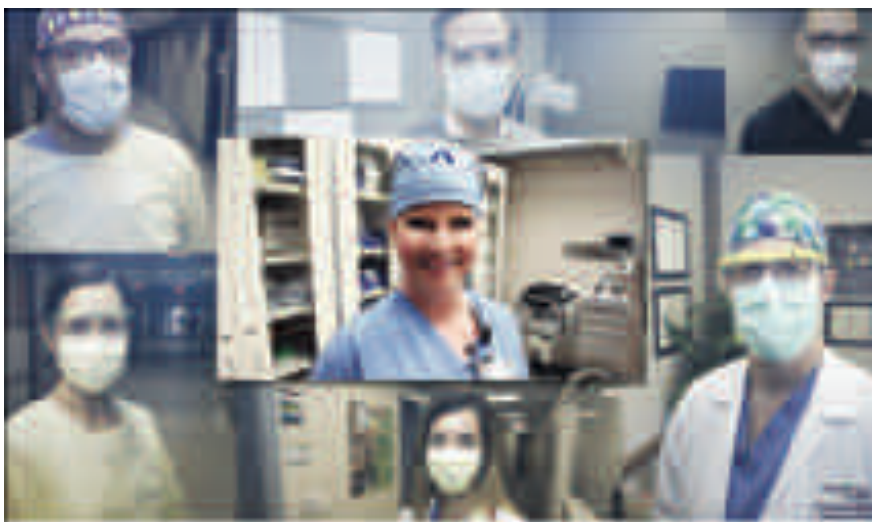
sexual poses or performing sexual acts.

Hobscheid was ordered held on a \$25,000 cash bond and scheduled for a preliminary hearing May 14.

REPORTER: Mr. President, do you support the protesters who are protesting against rationing for the war effort?

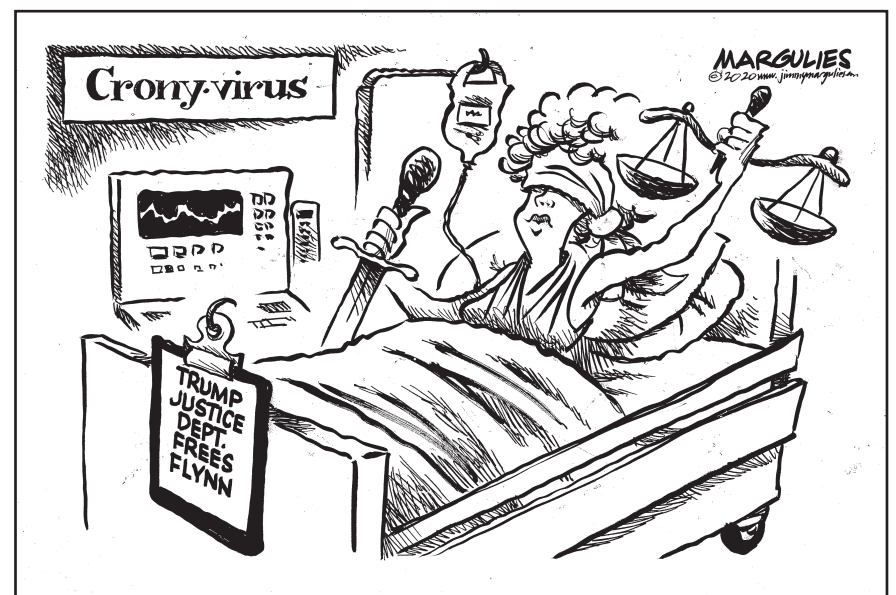

Woman stabbed, throat cut during domestic incident

Rudie is also charged with felony counts of strangulation and suffocation, domestic abuse-related aggravated battery with the use of a dangerous weapon and intimidation of a victim with the use of a dangerous weapon.

Sacred Heart Catholic School has seen success since all Wisconsin schools were ordered to close by the state March 13.

Several teachers sent learning materials home that Friday, so students and families could begin to transition to this new way of learning. Town of Wescott warrior rallies volunteers

More than a quarter-million medical-grade masks distributed in Northeast Wisconsin

GREEN BAY — Saving lives, one mask at a time.

That's how Liz Benecke describes the operation of the Wisconsin Face Mask Warriors — Zone 4.

Benecke, a nurse, lives in the town of Wescott and works in Green Bay. Recently, when she is not working a nursing shift, Benecke has been spending her time at a little strip mall on Green Bay's Velp Avenue, coordinating the distribution of thousands of medical-grade masks to stop the spread of COVID-19.

Under her direction, the Zone 4 operation has sent out more than 258,148 free homemade masks to individuals and businesses in an 11-county area — at least, that was the number as of Tuesday. The operation is a community effort that combines the purposeful drive of a military campaign, the coordination of a perfect NFL play, the logistics of Amazon at Christmas and the dedication of hundreds of people wanting to help others.

There are mask-makers in 11 counties, 33 drivers, 1,000 volunteers sewing, countless donations, dozens of take-out tacos and delivery pizzas, 16-hour days and 4:30 a.m. start times.

The project started when some of Benecke's friends, who are also nurses, asked for help in getting personal protective equipment, or PPE, for work. Benecke got in touch with the Face Mask Warriors, a nationwide group that makes and distributes free cotton masks to support "the most vulnerable and least supported essential workers" from COVID-19, according to the group's Facebook page.

Benecke did a shout out of her own on Facebook, and the local project rapidly exploded.

As the COVID-19 virus began to spread, she thought that distributing masks would be one way to continue to help her fellow health care workers. On March 19, she started making phone calls to every hospital, clinic and nursing home she could find in the phone book in northeast Wisconsin. She made 500 calls and by March 22, she had orders for over 100,000 masks.

In the beginning, she said, some facilities didn't need them or they

had none at all. As the name implies, the group went into "battle mode" after news surfaced of a increase in positive tests at a local meat packing plant.

Though technically in another zone, the Menominee Tribal Clinic was one of the early recipients of the masks, receiving over 600 masks, plus ear savers and face shields.

Dr. Amy Slagle, incident commander for the clinic's COVID-19 response team, said they've dis-

tributed the masks to all their staff members to use at work or at home. The masks were also given to diabetic patients and the elders at the Community Based Residential Facility. "We are now handing out masks to patients as they come or leave the facility for home use," Slagle said.

"We cannot say enough to everyone who have donated to the clinic for the safety of the patients, community and staff," Slagle added. "We are grateful that we have one more safety net in place to keep our frontline workers and patients safe when they enter our doors."

Benecke added that the Menominee clinic helped her network with other tribes in the area, including

the Stockbridge-Munsee near Bowler and the Oneida Health Center near Green Bay.

The masks are medical grade, with three pleats of fabric in the front and a nosepiece to keep the mask rigid and in place on the face. For many facilities, Benecke said, this design is the only option they need, and they are happy to get them. "The national stockpile is empty," she said.

Every item for the project has been donated or purchased with donated money, she said, including the cotton fabric, thread and sheet metal for making the nose pieces. The Green Bay Packers gave a \$10,000 grant, and other groups have also made sizable donations, she said.

The sheet metal was especially welcome, as her group "bought out all the floral wire and jewelry wire" in the area, Benecke said. Their biggest ongoing need is fabric and elastic.

Benecke credited the donors, her family and the core group at the Velp Avenue headquarters for making the operation work. The space is a combination work space and staging area.

The homemade masks are sorted, bagged and sent from the unused office space in Green Bay, which is closed to visitors to keep it as germ-free as possible. A team of five takes orders and gets them ready to send. Volunteers get supplies and place their completed masks in bins outside the building.

Masks are given away to anyone who asks, including individuals. One request came from a woman 45 miles away, whose husband was newly diagnosed with cancer and about to receive chemotherapy, which can reduce resistance to disease.

"We put them in a bag and sent them out," Benecke said.

The biggest request came on April 21, for 25,118 masks.

"We were busy that day," she said. "It's a nerve-racked feat of desperation."

At one facility, she said, after making the delivery, 74 nurses lined up to thank her. They had been required to find masks on their own but were unable to do so, she said.

"All I could do is hand them a mask and pray," Benecke said.

Masks from China sent to tribal clinic

Connection made through Presbyterian Church in Zoar

KESHENA — A tiny congregation in Neopit, a 95-year-old volunteer in Winneconne and the Menominee Tribal Clinic have formed a connection to a group of anonymous Christian donors in China.

The connection is through face masks, handmade covers to prevent the spread of COVID-19. The connection has led to over 200 homemade masks coming from a group of seamstresses in Winneconne and over 100 masks — including hard-to-find N95 masks — from a church in China.

The route to the masks starts in Zoar.

The Orthodox Presbyterian Church in Zoar is one of the oldest in the denomination, dating back over 70 years, according to church member Eric Johnson. The organization also has a church in Morgan Siding and one in Oshkosh, where Johnson is a member. The Zoar church needed someone to fill in as pastor “to come in and preach,” and they reached out to Johnson.

It was at Zoar that Johnson met Chris Caldwell, who is the interim president of the College of Menominee Nation.

Johnson’s wife, Barb, was coordinating a sewing project at the Henrietta Apartments in Winneconne, the home of Millie Mathison, age 95 and mother of Shawano resident Matty Mathison. Seven people were sewing for the Menominee Tribal Clinic. When Eric Johnson learned of the possible donation of masks from a Christian church in China, he contacted Caldwell — a fellow church

member and leader in the Menominee community — to help coordinate the donation in Keshena.

Eric Johnson worked with “Frank,” a church member in China, who does not use his real name because of the threat of persecution by the Chinese government, Johnson said. The group was sending up to 5,000 masks to the United States. They did not make the masks but instead raised the money to purchase and send them.

The cost of shipping was donated by a “generous person in China,” Johnson said. “Even the poorest people are generously donating the shipping dollars, and somebody provided the masks.”

Each mask was individually packaged in sterile packaging, he said. Even so, because of the spread of the disease in China, he quarantined the masks for three days after receiving them.

“I’m a cautious man,” he said.

Johnson contacted Caldwell to accept the donation, which will help pro-

tect patients and staff at the Menominee Tribal Clinic.

He said he did find it ironic that the donation comes from China, which has been named as a possible initial source of the COVID-19 virus.

“It is ironic that we are getting masks. Couldn’t they use them there? Yes, they could,” Johnson said. “The Chinese people who did this want complete anonymity — to be recognized only by what they did,” he said.

From Zoar to Winneconne to Keshena, the project has shown him how connected people are, Johnson said.

“Somebody I don’t know in China reached out and said, ‘I have masks,’” he said. He recounted the Biblical story of the Good Samaritan, who stops to help someone in need, even when others did not.

“I like that story, and I like the instruction that we should help others,” he said.

NOXIOUS WEED NOTICE VILLAGE OF BONDUEL

Notice is hereby given to each person who owns, occupies or controls land in the Village of Bonduel, Shawano County, Wisconsin, to destroy all noxious weeds on such property before the plants bloom.

If such charges are not paid by November 15 of the year in which they are billed, such charges, together with an additional administrative fee for collection equal to ten percent of the total of such charges and fees, shall be extended on the next succeeding tax roll as a tax charged against the property affected and collected in the same manner as are other taxes, pursuant to Wis. Stats. § 66.0517.

\$10,000 fine if convicted. Cantini was ordered held on a \$500 cash bond set by Judge William Kussel Jr. A preliminary hearing date was not yet set.

- Jonathan J. Ortiz Irizarry, 32, of Cecil, was charged May 11 with a felony count of strangulation and suffocation and misdemeanor counts of battery, disorderly conduct and criminal damage to property. He could face a maximum six years in prison and \$10,000 fine on the felony count if found guilty. He was ordered held on a \$500 cash bond set by Judge William Kussel Jr. and is scheduled for an adjourned initial appearance May 26.

- Blade R. Boettcher, 28, of Oregon, Wisconsin, was charged May 8 with felony counts of robbery, substantial battery, operating without consent and in possession of a weapon, and two felony counts of reckless endangerment. He could face a maximum 40 years in prison and \$100,000 fine if convicted. Boettcher was ordered held on a \$50,000 cash bond set by Judge William Kussel Jr. and is scheduled

for an adjourned initial appearance on May 26.

Witt-Birn girls join loaded regional after move to D4

Other area teams also have regional pods changed

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association released girls basketball division placements and playoff assignments for the 2020-21 season, with many area teams having their regional pods changed.

Wittenberg-Birnamwood was the only area team to move from its 2019-20 regional pod. Instead of staying in a Division 3 regional, the Chargers dropped to Division 4, joining a loaded regional that includes Bonduel and Menominee Indian.

Division placement is determined by school enrollment numbers. When Witt-Birn's enrollment number was released, Nick Mechelke — the varsity coach for the Chargers — knew there was a chance the team could get bumped down to Division 4.

"I am happy going down, and I think that this is where we belong," said Mechelke, whose team won the Central Wisconsin Conference-East Division title last season and had just one regular season loss (to Bonduel), but was still handed a No. 3 seed in its Division 3 regional bracket.

The Division 4 regional that the Chargers will be joining was won by Crandon this past season. Crandon topped Bonduel in a sectional semifinal matchup and later qualified for state.

Bonduel was the top seed in the 11-team bracket, defeating eighth-seeded Manawa and fourth-seeded Crivitz to claim a regional title.

In the bottom portion of the bracket, Menominee Indian earned a No. 7 seed. The Eagles topped 10th-seeded Coleman before falling to Crandon.

St. Mary Catholic (No. 3), Shioc-ton (No. 5), Iola-Scandinavia (No. 6), Oconto (No. 9) and Weyauwega-Fremont (No. 11) rounded out this past season's regional.

St. Mary Catholic is the only team from the regional that won't be a part of the upcoming regional pod. SMC switched to another D4 regional.

The regional pod will have 12 teams this coming season, as Amherst is also dropping down a division.

"Those are both quality programs (Witt-Birn, Amherst) that we have been looking up at during my first

two years (as coach)," said Menominee Indian coach Michael Skenadore. "They are well coached and have high quality players, as well as the experience of competing up at D3 during the tournament the last several years.

"I am anticipating that our pod will be stronger top to bottom this year with some really good teams being pushed into the 5-8 seeds, which will make that opening day of tournament play really interesting."

"The addition of Wittenberg-Birnamwood and Amherst certainly make the regional more challenging, as they are both quality programs," said Bonduel coach Jerry Reinke. "We should be familiar with both opponents strengths and weaknesses, which would be a positive, but they also know ours as well."

With the changes, all seven teams from the CWC-East will play in that regional.

"Our regional is loaded with the CWC-East, and it's always tough to play a team three times, which is likely going to happen this year," said Mechelke. "We play eight teams in our regional, so we are going to get good looks at most of these teams."

Looking at last year's overall records, seven of the 12 teams had over a .500 record, while nine teams had double-digit win totals.

Oconto Falls, Clintonville

The 11-team regional that Witt-Birn and Amherst played in this past season was the same one in which

to Niagara. Bowler (No. 12) lost to Wabeno/Laona; Suring (No. 10) fell short against Gibraltar, and Lena (No. 13) was topped by Wausaukee in regional quarterfinal matchups.

Gresham, Marion, Tigerton

The D5 regional that includes Gresham, Marion and Tigerton also gets a bit tougher with the addition of Stevens Point's Pacelli High School for the upcoming season.

Pacelli played in D4 last season, winning a regional title as a No. 5 seed.

Newman Catholic (No. 1), Almond-Bancroft (No. 9), Northland Lutheran (No. 5), Rib Lake (No. 12), Port Edwards (No. 13), Prentice (No. 4), Edgar (No. 3), Tri-County (No. 14), Rosholt (No. 6), Assumption (No. 7), Athens (No. 10) and Wild Rose (No. 2) fill out the now-16-team pod.

Eighth-seeded Gresham earned a win over Almond-Bancroft before being eliminated by Newman Catholic. Tigerton (No. 11) lost to Rosholt, while Marion (No. 15) fell short against Wild Rose in regional quarterfinals.

Shawano

Shawano is the only area team to not have any changes to its regional from this past season.

The Hawks earned a No. 6 seed and knocked off 11th-seeded Antigo before falling to third-seeded New London in its D2 regional.

Hortonville (No. 1) came out of the regional pod. Ashland (No. 8), Waupaca (No. 9), Lakeland Union (No. 4), Mosinee (No. 5), Merrill (No. 7), Wausau East (No. 10) and Rhinelander (No. 2) will round out the 11-team regional.

Let's pump the brakes on the Packers puzzling draft class

If you read my online column previewing the 2020 NFL Draft, I predicted it would be wild because of all things that could go wrong with an entirely virtual draft.

If you are a fan of the Green Bay Packers, the draft was certainly wild, but not because of a bunch of technological issues — it's actually pretty amazing how smoothly the draft ran.

The Packers' nine draft selections left a lot of fans scratching their heads and questioning the scouting abilities of the organization.

The team's puzzling draft approach started in round one,

when the team traded up to pick No. 26 to select Utah State quarterback Jordan Love.

The pick put a shocking end to an otherwise ordinary first round, bringing social media to life and leading analysts to criticize the Packers front office for not helping the team out for the 2020 season after the team made the NFC title game in 2019.

Of course, the reason the pick was so controversial was because a guy by the name of Aaron Rodgers is signed through 2023 (when he's 39) and has been quoted saying he'd like to play into his 40s while also retiring as a member of the Packers.

Ironically, the shocking pick came exactly 15 years after the Packers drafted Rodgers with the No. 24 pick in the first round of the 2005 draft with Brett Favre still on the roster — although Favre had hinted at retirement a few times by that point.

The Rodgers' pick turned out to be the best draft pick ever made by then-general manager Ted Thompson. The Love pick will now forever be attached to current GM Brian Gutekunst and coach Matt LaFleur.

When the Pack traded up, many thought they might take a wide receiver, with guys like Tee Higgins, Michael Pittman and Laviska

Shenault Jr. still available. Others thought they traded up to snag middle linebacker Patrick Queen.

How wrong we all were. Instead of getting Rodgers a new weapon on offense or helping out the MLB position, the team drafted a replacement for Rodgers who shouldn't be a starter for at least three years — when Green Bay could possibly get out of its deal with Rodgers.

In the days after the draft, it was reported that the team was in love with Mr. Love, so much so that the team even contacted the Minnesota Vikings to try and trade up — thank goodness that didn't happen.

The rumor was that the Indianapolis Colts were also looking to trade up to take the QB, so the Packers packaged their fourth-round pick and pick No. 30 to move up four spots to get their guy.

Some of the social media pressure on the Packers organization cooled off by the draft's second day and many said the pick would be an okay one as long as the team addressed some needs in rounds two and three.

The Packers drafted a pair of players across the two rounds and both came at offensive skill positions, but again it infuriated fans because they weren't receivers.

With its second-round pick, Green Bay took bruising running back A.J. Dillon out of Boston College before selecting a tight end/fullback hybrid in Cincinnati's Josiah Deguara in the third round.

Both players show upside and could very well become NFL starters some day, but many mock drafts — take those as you will — had the players going a couple rounds later or undrafted completely.

It was after the third round where I and many other individuals realized that Green Bay might be drafting players to adapt to a new offensive scheme that focuses more on using the run to set up the pass — something LaFleur talked about during his rookie season a lot.

Still, it was hard to truly wrap my head around that thought because Rodgers — while past his prime — has shown he can still sling the ball around the field, especially with a couple potential rookie difference makers at WR tossed in.

With six picks across the final day of the draft (rounds 4-7), I certainly thought the Pack would at least take one receiver.

Wrong again.

After sitting out round four because of the trade for Love, Green

Bay selected Minnesota linebacker Kamal Martin in the fifth, Michigan's Jon Runyan Jr., Oregon's Jake Hanson and Indiana's Simon Stepaniak (all offensive linemen) in the sixth and Texas Christian (TCU) defensive back Vernon Scott and Miami pass rusher Jonathan Garvin in the seventh.

In a draft that was hyped up to be the best in terms of wide receiver talent and depth maybe ever, the Packers pulled off the feat of not picking a single one. A total of 37 wide receivers were picked (of 255 total picks; or almost 15% of the picks).

Don't fear Packer fans, because the team did sign Michigan State wide receiver Darrell Stewart as an undrafted free agent, so there's that.

In all seriousness, it certainly looks like the Packers may be heading in a new direction on the offensive side of the ball.

While Gutekunst makes the picks, he said LaFleur also played a big role, so he's also on board and believes this will give the team the best chance to win now (and into the future) and that's really all that should matter to fans.

While it's fun to read draft grades after the event wraps up (I didn't see Green Bay higher than a C-plus, with most being Ds or even Fs), you truly cannot evaluate a draft class until at least three or four years has passed.

Especially with this draft class, where Love may not start until the fifth and final year of his deal, let's hold off our judgments on the organization's decisions. They certainly know more than we do.

For fans that refuse to acknowledge this year's draft class as a success, the beauty of the NFL is that the drafts are a big part of what keeps individuals employed or not. So either this draft class helps the team to many more years of success and we're all happy, or the draft class flops, and the organization rebuilds.

Wisconsin residents vote against big deer season changes

Bear, turkey season changes voted for

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources released the results for the 2020 Spring Hearing questionnaire, with voters being against drastic deer season changes among the most noteworthy outcomes.

A total of 64,943 voters responded to the questionnaire. Almost all of the responses came online after COVID-19 canceled the 72 public meetings that were scheduled for April 13.

The questions proposed by the Natural Resources Board focused on deer season changes and drew the most interest from hunters around the state.

Question 10 proposed that the current nine-day firearm season in November be extended an additional 10 days. Wisconsin residents voted 41,531-14,380 against it.

Question 13 proposed to invalidate archery and crossbow buck tags during the firearm season, being voted 34,608-17,987 against it.

A closer vote came on the topic of allowing hunting with crossbows in October and then reopening crossbow hunting for the duration of the archery season after the gun deer season has ended (question 14). The vote was 27,407-25,159 against.

A couple deer season questions that voters favored were to eliminate the antlerless-only holiday firearm deer season (32,461-20,057) and to simplify and streamline regulations by eliminating deer management zones and continuing to manage by county units and public or private land antlerless tags (34,368-14,073).

Among some of the other questions favored by voters were to estab-

lish a spring bear hunting season and establishing an earlier opening day for the spring turkey hunting season.

Question 28 opposed the proposed Back Forty proposed metallic sulfide mine that's located on the banks of the Menominee River. Of 42,352 voters, 35,406 opposed the mine.

The lone citizen resolution in Shawano County — reintroducing a Holiday T zone hunt in the county (proposed by Shannon Thiex, of Birnamwood) — was failed by a 301-310 vote. A total of 306 voters expressed no opinion on the resolution.

The results will help guide decisions on potential future rules. No final decisions have been made at this time.

The public input results will be considered during the Conservation Congress convention that may be held later this summer and during a Natural Resources Board meeting.

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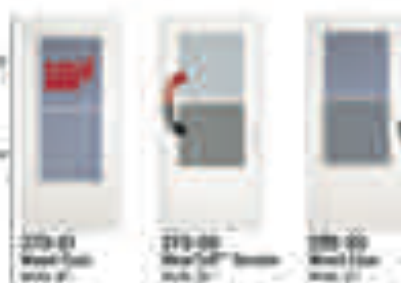
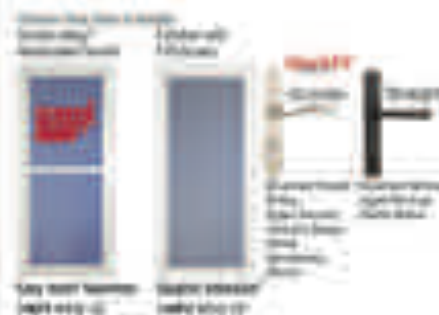
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Shawano grad earns UWGB award

Pack creates minority coach fellowship

Green Bay Packers Head Coach Matt LaFleur has established a minority coaching fellowship, a yearlong, full-time position for young and aspiring minority coaches.

LaFleur announced on Wednesday that former NFL wide receiver Ruell Martin is the first hire for the fellowship.

Martin, who will work with the offense and assist with the wide receivers during his yearlong fellowship, played seven seasons in the NFL for the Green Bay Packers (2006-08), St. Louis Rams (2009), Seattle Seahawks

(2010) and Buffalo Bills (2011-12).

Martin saw action in 82 regular-season games with nine starts and registered 76 receptions for 1,129 yards (14.9 avg.) and seven touchdowns. Martin also played in two postseason contests with one start for the Seahawks, recording two catches for 28 yards.

He originally was signed as an undrafted free agent out of Saginaw Valley State in 2004 by the San Diego Chargers. In 2005, Martin was allocated to NFL Europe and helped the Amsterdam Admirals win the World Bowl.



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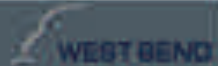

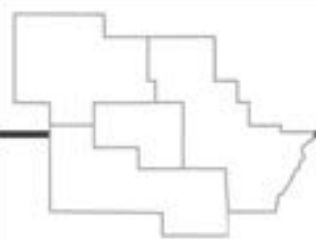

Diet, exercise can help to combat cognitive decline

You forget where you put the car keys, or you forget someone's name. This can occur at any age and is usually not cause for alarm. In midlife, most adults show stable cognitive (mental) function. As we get older, cognitive decline can occur.

It is estimated that up to one-third of adults will experience a gradual decline in cognitive function, known as mild cognitive impairment, as they age. Although the majority of elderly people who note memory changes will not go on to have dementia, 8% of elderly people do develop this condition.

That breaks down to just a half-hour five days a week — not that much.

The Mediterranean diet, with its high intake of fruits and vegetables, has been found to be associated with better cognitive evolution and lower risk of Alzheimer's disease. Mediterranean cuisine is not only good for you,

it's delicious and easy to prepare.

Sound quality research has demonstrated no benefits on cognitive performance for the following items: low-dose aspirin, high-dose B vitamin supplements (folate, B6, B12), Ginkgo biloba, C and E (alone or in combination), omega-3 supplementation, beta carotene and multivitamin and multi-mineral supplements. While this list is not all-inclusive, it includes many popular strategies.

Before buying the claims of marketers regarding health supplement products, look for evidence of effectiveness. If someone recommends an approach with no research to support it, avoid it, unless you do not mind being a guinea pig and potentially wasting money.

Although you cannot buy a pill to prevent mental decline (at least not yet), you can take steps through diet and exercise to improve your chances of avoiding or delaying it.

Heart attack, stroke signs should not be ignored

ThedaCare recommends immediate action, even during pandemic

APPLETON — Health systems nationwide are urging people to seek medical care if they experience signs of a heart attack or stroke.

“Our teams are ready to provide lifesaving interventions for patients,” said Dr. Simone Fearon, medical director and physician leader with ThedaCare Cardiovascular Care. “That does not change as we are responding to COVID-19. We do not want people to delay heart care over fears of the virus.”

Multiple reports across the nation have cited a significant reduction in admissions for heart attacks during the pandemic. Many experts link the decline in the volume of heart attack and

Changes to ensure safety include screeners who will greet patients at the door upon arriving at the hospital. Once there, they will be asked for a temperature check and to wear a mask – for their safety and the safety of others.

Fearon said people with heart attack or stroke symptoms could be

hurting rather than helping themselves by delaying emergency care during this pandemic.

“If a patient delays emergency interventions, the risks for long-term mechanical complications such as weak heart muscle, abnormal heart rhythms and severe valve problems increase,” said Fearon. “Avoiding a 911 call or going to the emergency department can potentially translate into more serious health consequences.”

Fearon advised people to take note of the warning signs from the American Heart Association and seek medical attention immediately if they are experiencing any symptoms.

Signs of a heart attack include chest

discomfort, mostly in the center of the chest; discomfort in other areas of the upper body, mainly in the arms, or the back, neck, jaw or stomach; shortness of breath, often accompanying chest discomfort; and other signs that include cold sweats, nausea, fatigue or lightheadedness.

Stroke signs include sudden numbness or weakness in the face, arm or leg, especially on one side of the body; sudden disorientation, confusion, trouble speaking or understanding; sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes; sudden, severe headaches; and other difficulties, such as sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination.
