Board of Health discusses next steps after state Supreme Court ruling

Court decision struck down stay at home order, but pandemic response continues

SHAWANO — Shawano County Board of Health members gathered remotely for a video conference Monday, meeting for the first time since social distancing and stay-at-home orders were issued by the state in March.

Though those orders have been nullified by a state Supreme Court decision, the Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Department is still encouraging those practices as the COVID-19 pandemic continues.

Public Health Director Vicki Dantoin said much of the department's focus for the past two months has been on tracing people who might have had close contact with someone who has been confirmed as having COVID-19 or is awaiting test results.

Three office staff have been working on that, along with additional assistance the health department has been able to bring in from veter-

ans services and the University of Wisconsin-Extension office.

"We've also been working with the tribal communities and they have been doing contact tracing along us," she said. "We have a good local team going."

Dantoin said public updates and community guidance has also been a priority.

The health department has also been working with a lot of local businesses, long-term care facilities and other types of facilities.

"Just kind of discussing their plans and answering questions," she said.

Board member Deb Lidbury commended Dantoin and the health department for its work, but had harsh words for Sheriff Adam Bieber's statements while the governor's order was still in effect that he would not enforce it.

"I'm very disappointed with our county sheriff's response to the stay at home order," Lidbury said. "Shawano County has gotten a lot of

negative press because of our bars opening because they don't feel any sort of oversight."

Lidbury said she had considered offering a motion to the board expressing disappointment with the sheriff, but chose instead to just give her personal opinion on the matter.

Lidbury wondered whether Shawano County's public health department could issue its own stay at home order as did Brown County and the city of Appleton, but understood why it might not be practical.

Obviously you have to have enforcement when you make an order like that," she said.

Dantoin said the question of whether the health department can issue its own citations has been in limbo the last few days.

"Since the supreme court decision, that has made it more difficult for us as health officers to figure out what is it that we can do," she said.

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Not guilty plea in child porn case

Shawano man charged with 18 counts of child porn possession

SHAWANO — A Shawano man charged with 18 counts of possession of child pornography waived his preliminary hearing and entered a plea of not guilty on all counts May 14 at a hearing conducted by video due to coronavirus concerns.

Henry M. Hobscheid, 64, could face a maximum possible penalty of 25 years in prison and a \$100,000 fine on each of the counts if found guilty.

The charges were filed as a result of a search warrant executed at his residence in the city earlier this year.

There was no future court date set, with Judge William Kussel Jr. noting the uncertainty of the COVID-19 health crisis and the additional complication of the state Supreme Court decision Wednesday striking down the governor's Safer at Home order.

The hearing was held via video, with all participants in segregated locations due to the coronavirus concerns.

The case was set for a pre-trial conference on a date yet to be determined.

According to the criminal complaint, Shawano police received a tip in February from the Internet Crimes Against Children data system that an image of a prepubescent minor was uploaded from an IP address in the city.

The image was of a female about 7-9 years of age in a sexual pose, according to the complaint. The IP address was traced to Hobscheid, and

a search warrant was executed on March 19.

Authorities seized a cellphone, laptop, tablet, flash drives, external hard drives and multiple CDs. A forensic analysis by Shawano County sheriff's detectives of the laptops and flash drives revealed images of child pornography, according to the complaint.

The complaint states the images were of prepubescent females in sexual poses or performing sexual acts.

Hobscheid is being held on a \$25,000 cash bond.

Shawano man faces 10 child porn counts

SHAWANO — A Shawano man is facing 10 counts of child porn possession after authorities executed a search warrant at his residence on May 15.

Johnie E. Chandler, 40, could face a maximum 25 years in prison and \$100,000 fine on each count if found guilty. He is also charged with two felony counts of bail jumping and a misdemeanor count of possession of a controlled substance.

City police received a cybertip on May 1 that an IP address located in Shawano had solicited child porn in a chatroom known to be used by dealers in child pornography, according to the criminal complaint,

which states the IP address was traced to Chandler.

Police and sheriff's deputies executing the search warrant seized an android phone that contained video filed of prepubescent females, in at least one case as young as 6 years old, in sexual poses or engaged in sexual activity.

Some of the files also contained prepubescent females in bondage, according to the complaint.

The sheriff's department is still analyzing other electronic devices seized at Chandler's residence.

Chandler was ordered held on a \$50,000 cash bond set by Judge William Kussel Jr. He was scheduled for an adjourned initial court appearance on May 26.

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Shawano-Menominee County district attorney's race on tap for November

County supervisor Aaron Damrau challenging incumbent Greg Parker

SHAWANO — At least one local race is already shaping up for the November election, with the announcement of a challenge for the Shawano-Menominee County district attorney's office.

Aaron Damrau, a Tigerton-based attorney who was elected last month to the Shawano County Board, has announced he will run against incumbent District Attor-

ney Greg Parker, who has held that office since January 2007.

"I'm running for district attorney because I strongly believe our community can do better in effectively prosecuting crime," Damrau said.

"Shawano County has been notorious for the last 50 years for being tough on crime. I'm running because I believe that in order to face the challenges of our time, we must be simultaneously tough on crime and smart on crime," he said.

Parker said he believes his office

has established a reputation for being tough but fair on crime.

"I have been and remain committed to aggressively prosecuting sex predators that victimize children within our community," he said.

Parker cited more than 60 prosecutions brought against traveler sex predators as a result of working with the county sheriff's department, Shawano police and Internet Crimes Against Children, or ICAC, units.

"The ICAC unit and I have prosecuted numerous child pornographers in the area, many of them receiving substantial prison sentences thereby removing them as a threat to children in the community," he said.

"My prosecutors and I continue to serve crime victims in prosecuting domestic violence offenders, sex offenders and drug offenders," Parker said.

"Our area continues to see increasing numbers of drug offenders who feed their habits by victimizing others," Parker said. "We are seeing more drug traffickers bringing larger amounts of drugs into the community, and they are being aggressively prosecuted."

Damrau said the drug epidemic has spiraled out of control over the past 14 years all across Shawano and Menominee counties.

"Using 1980s law and order tactics to address the drug epidemic isn't working," he said.

"Our counties need a district attorney who is able to think outside of the box and who is willing to listen to differing opinions and ideas," Damrau said. "We deserve a district attorney who is willing to look to other counties for the best practices in addressing the drug epidemic; someone who is able to work as a team within the county to implement the best practices."

Parker cited the establishment last year of drug court, aimed at prioritizing treatment over prosecution of certain offenders.

"Some drug offenders convicted of possession of drugs such as meth, heroin, cocaine and other highly addictive drugs are being offered drug court," Parker said.

He said he, along with Judge William Kussel Jr., probation and parole, the public defender's office and sheriff's department work as a team in managing the treatment and accountability process of the participants in the drug court.

"Finally, the recent addition of a new prosecutor in my office is a big help in chipping away at the backlog of cases in the office," Parker said.

Other local races on the ballot in the Nov. 3 election include the county clerk, county treasurer and register of deeds.

The deadline to submit nomination papers is June 1.

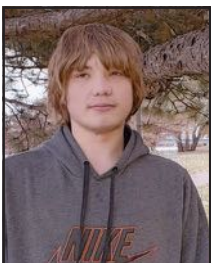
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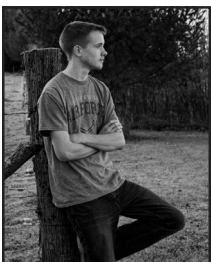

County Clerk Schmidt announced that the Certificates of Elections were given to each Board member. The receipt of the certificate is to be signed by each supervisor and returned to the Clerk. The Honorable William F. Kusel, Jr., Circuit Court Branch 3 Judge, administered the Oath of Office to the County Board supervisors. The oaths were then signed by each supervisor as well as Judge Kusel and are on file with the County Clerk's Office.

5. Introduction of new County Board Supervisors.

The County Clerk read the names of the new County Board Supervisors and the areas that they will be representing.

6. Election of County Board Chairman and Vice Chairman.

A County Board Chair and Vice Chair will be elected to serve for the 2020-2022 term. Supervisors Ainsworth, Hoppe and Tober were selected by current Chairman Erdmann to serve as tellers to collect and tally the votes. County Clerk Schmidt announced that the election of the County Board Chair and Vice-Chair will be conducted by secret ballot and the first ballot will be the nominating ballot for the Chair. Supervisors cast their nominating ballots. The ballots were collected and the results were as follows: Rick Giese, Tom Kautza, Kathy Luebke and Deb Noffke. Each candidate was asked if they would accept the nomination. Giese, Luebke and Noffke all declined the nomination. Leaving Kautza as the sole candidate, according to County Board rules, a vote is needed to elect Kautza as chair. Supervisors cast their ballots. As a result, 27 votes were received for Kautza. Kautza was declared the County Board chair for the next two years.

At this time, Kautza chaired the meeting. Chairman Kautza indicated that supervisors would now cast a ballot to nominate a vice-chair. The nominations received were for Rick Giese, Arlyn Tober, and Randy Young. Each candidate was asked if they would accept the nomination and was given three minutes to address the Board. Supervisor Tober declined the nomination. Supervisors were then to cast a ballot for Giese or Young. Votes were tallied and the result was Giese received 15 votes and Young received 12 votes. Supervisor Giese received the majority of votes cast and was declared the County Board Vice-Chair.

7. Election of Highway/Parks Committee representatives.

Three supervisors are to be elected by district to the Highway Committee. The County Board Chair and the Committee on Committees will then appoint the remaining two supervisors to the Highway/Parks Committee. Chairman Kautza indicated that endorsed ballots are now to be cast for a representative in the Eastern District. A map including the representative's names was provided to each supervisor. Results were as follows: Conradt received 17 votes, Ferlecki 3, Luebke 1, Noffke 4 and Tipton 1 (One vote was cast for Gueths who is in the central district - vote did not count). Conradt receiving the majority of votes cast was declared the representative for the eastern district. Supervisors then cast their ballot for a representative for the central district. Results were as follows: Ainsworth 2, Bolin 4, Gueths 16, Marquardt 1 and Young 4. Gueths receiving the majority of votes cast was declared the representative for the central district. Supervisors cast their ballots for the western district representative. Results were as follows: Erdmann 5, Giese 8, Knaak 6, J. Miller 2, Switalla 2 and Tober 4. Erdmann and J. Miller declined the nomination. The lowest vote getter being Switalla, was eliminated and the Board then voted for Giese, Knaak or Tober. Results were Knaak 7, Giese 12, Tober 8. Lowest vote getter being Knaak was dropped. Neither candidate (Giese or Tober) received the majority of votes so a 3rd vote was required. Board members voted for Giese or Tober. Results were Giese 16, Tober 11. Giese was declared the winner for the western district.

New job brings unexpected challenges

New Bonduel municipal director starts as pandemic 'explodes'

BONDUEL — There's usually a bit of an adjustment period when starting a new job. When that period occurs during a statewide shutdown and worldwide pandemic, it makes the adjustment even more challenging.

Fortunately for Jesse Rankin, the new director of municipal operations for the village of Bonduel, his new job is something of a homecoming and that allowed him to step comfortably into his new role.

Rankin is originally from Bonduel and a Shawano Community High School graduate. He and his wife, Kristine, were high school sweethearts and returned to the area two years ago to live in Shawano.

Rankin said his familiarity with both communities make him a good fit for the position. He started the job with pride in his village, he said, and he wants to maintain that pride. "I want to do the right thing to make Bonduel the best it can be," he said.

Rankin's professional back-

ground includes 20 years in the military and experience in government contracting. That experience helps him manage the many facets of municipal operations, he said.

As municipal operations director, Rankin oversees the infrastructure of the village, including water and sewers, roads upkeep and snow removal. Most of that work is done outside, he said.

He also works with the village zoning commission and with state engineers on state roads that go through the village.

"It's a pretty encompassing job," he said.

He began March 5. Shortly after that, "the pandemic exploded and everything went sideways," he said.

He described the process as a "lot of hurdles to overcome. There is no handbook to tell you about a pandemic," he said.

His new job started with identifying what needed to be done for the community and how to do it safely, limiting exposure to his staff and taking such steps as rotating shifts. By rotating schedules, he

reduced the likelihood of staff working side by side.

However, he said, there are times when schedules have to overlap. "I can't send a man down a manhole with only one person," he said.

For the future, he said he hopes to help the village develop a commercial district, maintain water and sewers to current subdivisions and expand them to rural areas, he said.

A major concern for the village will be the two-year upgrade of state Highway 117, which runs north and south through Bonduel's downtown. Although the state Department of Transportation will do the work, the village will need to coordinate with them, redirect traffic and help the many visitors who travel through Bonduel find their way.

Work on the north side of the street will be started in 2021, and on the south side in 2023, he said. The south side project will include placing new sewer and water lines, adding to the scope of the project.

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Jesse Rankin, standing outside his Bonduel office, began as director of municipal operations in Bonduel shortly before the state issued Safer at Home orders. That changed how his department worked, but the work went on, he said.

Virtual ceremony brings grads together in spirit

Marion High School eager to honor students now instead of waiting for uncertain future

MARION — There is no second take in a traditional graduation ceremony.

Once the graduates march down the aisle, whatever happens next is there forever — stumbling on the stairs, forgetting to turn the tassel, skipping a section of the valedictory speech.

Marion High School graduates aren't going to have to worry about that happening as they go through the school's first virtual graduation, a necessity due to schools being closed through June 30 because of the coronavirus pandemic. The school is one of two in the area — the other being Bonduel — that plans to have a virtual graduation on May 22, the same night it had planned its original graduation.

School officials in Marion spent much of the last week bringing in graduates one at a time to get into their caps and gowns and have a professional photo taken. The individual photos, being taken by North Woods Studio in Bowler, are being made into a composite group photo, as the coronavirus pandemic kept the school from getting a traditional group shot.

Then the grads, 25 in all, walked across the high school stage where they received their diplomas and moved their tassels from right to left. With a few family members watching from the gym floor, the grads then went for family photos. Principal Dan Breitrack said the graduates would also be receiving any athletic and academic honors during their visit to the school.

"It's almost like we're going through stations," Breitrack said.

However, if the grads forgot to move the tassel or anything else, there's a chance to go back and do it again.

All the joy will be woven together into a video, which will debut on graduation night at <https://classof2020.marion-mustangs.org>. The ceremony begins at 7 p.m.

Breitrack said the school district felt it was important to do something to honor the students now instead of waiting for later in the summer, when some students might already be moving on to college or other things.

“We really want to honor the students while they’re here,” Breitrick said. “Talking in our admin team, we thought, ‘Why kick the can down the road? Let’s honor them on the day they were going to be honored.’”

It has been tradition for Marion to hold its graduation the Friday before Memorial Day, and doing the virtual ceremony allows families who would have expected relatives coming from out of town to still come and celebrate at home at their own discretion, according to Breitrick.

“The majority of the families have their parties on Saturday or Sunday or even Monday, but this still gives them the opportunity to do this,” he said.

There were very few snags as the school ushered in families one at a time for filming and fun last week, according to Marion School District Superintendent James Bena. The high school tried to accommodate families that might be working during the day with some evening times, and vice versa.

While the virtual ceremony comes close to honoring Marion’s graduates, it’s not quite the same as the traditional event schools have enjoyed for decades, in Bena’s view.

“They are two different, unique situations,” Bena said. “Certainly, nothing can replicate the feeling of having most of the community in a packed field house, but at the same time, we’re doing everything to try to replicate the prestige and the respect that comes along with a graduation ceremony.”

Kyla Zillmer, Marion’s valedictorian, enjoyed the opportunity to at least get her diploma, but she agreed that the virtual ceremony did not fulfill what she imagined the big day would be like.

“We’ve been dreaming of this day for 13 years, but I guess the school made the best out of this situation. They did the best they could,”

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Zillmer said.

Zillmer’s address will also be part of the ceremony, the same as it would have been in a traditional graduation. She said her speech entails how hard it has been — not just with the pandemic, but all through their K-12 education — as well as sharing some of the happy memories along the path to learning.

“It’s been hard not seeing them for so long and then having to say our farewells without seeing each other,” Zillmer said.

The school is still considering having an activity in the summer like a cookout where graduates and their families could come together for a formal farewell, as long as health regulations permit.

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Area schools try to finalize graduation plans

The closure of all K-12 schools through the end of the academic year has required high schools to rethink one of their biggest events of the year — graduation.

Most area schools schedule their graduations at the end of May or early June, but the coronavirus pandemic has already caused the cancellation of the in-person ceremonies for those times. As a result, administrators, staff and some students came together to decide whether to delay graduation to later in the summer, hold ceremonies via the internet or some other alternative.

Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School plans to hold an in-person ceremony July 24, according to Superintendent Garrett Rogowski. He noted it would all depend on what health guidelines are still in place at the time. If the schools aren't allowed to provide the usual pomp and circumstance, "we will adjust and provide an alternative option for that same evening," Rogowski said.

Marion High School is already planning to have an alternative ceremony — keeping its May 22 graduation date intact, but moving the whole ceremony online, according to school principal Dan Breitrick. The ceremony, scheduled to begin at 7 p.m., will be on the website <https://classof2020.marion-mustangs.org>.

Bonduel High School also plans to have a virtual ceremony May 22, but the school is going one step further and showing the ceremony at the drive-in theater for Shawano Cinema, 1494 E. Green Bay St., Shawano at 8 p.m.

Shawano Community High School officials are tentatively planning to hold graduation Aug. 7, but principal Scott Zwirschitz told the Shawano School Board on Monday that there will also be a senior class video aired at 5:30 p.m. May 29. There will also be a drive-thru event at the school the same day where banners and signs honoring graduates will be set up.

Menominee Indian High School also plans to have an August traditional ceremony, scheduled for Aug. 5,

according to principal Chuck Raasch.

Clintonville High School plans to hold a traditional graduation ceremony at 2 p.m. Aug. 2, provided the state loosens up social distancing rules. Kelly Zeinert, the school's principal, said the in-person ceremony was the top choice for the majority of 80 families that returned a survey seeking input.

Oconto Falls High School Principal Jake Beschta said several committees are working on various ideas to honor students with virtual ceremonies to honor their scholarships and other awards as well as to recognize their graduation. Those ceremonies are usually done in person. An in-person commencement exercise is still possible, but "the questions are when and with what restrictions," Beschta said.

Lena School District Superintendent Ben Pytleski said because of the shutdown, any in-person graduation ceremony would have to be held in July at the earliest, and the district hopes to set a date soon.

"We have every intention to honor our Class of 2020 with a full commencement ceremony," Pytleski said.

Tigerton High School plans to hold its graduation in mid-July.

Suring High School is organizing a senior car parade through the village at 1 p.m. May 23, which is graduation day for the Class of 2020. The district is also hoping to hold a formal graduation ceremony during the summer.

Bowler High School wants to do an in-person graduation ceremony, according to principal Kim Ninabuck, but has not set a date yet. There are some plans to run a virtual recognition of students on the school's social media.

Gillett School District officials were also gathering more information about their options and are hoping to have announcements soon.

Gresham Community School is currently utilizing social media to do a senior spotlight on all of its graduating seniors, according to high school principal Benjamin Henninger. A date has not been set for graduation, but officials are still planning for one, "although this possibility is looking increasingly unlikely at this time," Henninger said.

Retired at 96, Jury celebrates 100 years

Balloons, yard sign honor life well-engineered

SHAWANO — Maurice Jury celebrated four years of retirement this year. Considering he retired at age 96, his celebration also includes a nod to his 100th birthday.

From farming as a boy to repairing dehumidifiers in his 90s, making mechanical things work has been a part of the new centenarian's life.

The connection to engineering may have stemmed from his birth, which was in a box car in a New Mexico railroad yard. The date was May 19, 1920.

Jury's family moved to the Texas panhandle when he was a baby. In 1925, his father bought a dairy farm in the panhandle.

He was a young teen when he saw the first effects of the Dust Bowl. In 1924, he was outside his Texas home and saw a black cloud coming.

"I hit the back door about the time that it hit," he said. "It was black inside the house."

He knew all along that dairy farming was not for him. The mechanics that kept a farm going — that was where his skills and interest were. "When I was only 18, I rewound an electric motor and put it on the milk cooler," he said.

He took his interest in things mechanical to Texas Tech at Lubbock, Texas, where he studied electrical engineering.

"On Dec. 6, '41, I was suddenly awoken around midnight and couldn't get back to sleep," he said. "I took a walk and got back to my room and went to sleep, and woke up the next morning to hear the news about bombing Pearl Harbor."

By the end of April 1942, he had enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Corps. His training in mechanics and engineering made him a good fit to take care of C-47 airplanes and gliders. He eventually made it to Australia and islands in the South Pacific as an aerial engineer. He put in 1,000 hours in the air overseas.

"I flew with planes when they flew," Jury recalled, "and when they were on the ground, I worked on them."

When the war ended, he finished school in mechanical engineering and found a job with Allis-Chalmers in Milwaukee, working in their

nuclear power department. He helped to develop a high pressure water pump and a control rod drive mechanism for a plant in Sioux Falls, South Dakota.

Not long after that, though, a nuclear accident at Three Mile Island in Pennsylvania put an end to the nuclear program. "Suddenly it's 'not in my backyard,' and it quit, just like that."

He moved to Madison to work at the Oscar Mayer meat packing plant. There, he developed a mechanical process for making long sticks of bologna — 37 pounds in each stick.

"There was raw pork in and came out as a long, frozen stick of bologna," he said.

Jury stayed with Oscar Mayer until he was 65, then he used his experience with refrigeration to repair dehumidifiers. He also took care of lawnmowers, snowmobiles and anything else that had an engine in need of repair. He retired from that venture when it became too hard to pull the cords on the machines.

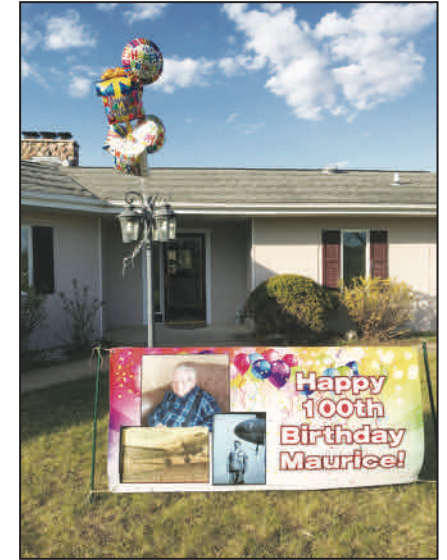
After that, he worked on broken sewing machines until he lost feeling in the tips of his fingers. That was the last time he retired, four years ago.

Jury was married twice but had no children. His first wife, Esther, passed away in 1972. In 1978, he married Josephine, who passed away 13 years ago. Though Jury never had a daughter, he had the next best thing in Lana Holland, a 42-year Madison neighbor. She stepped in as his caretaker when Josephine died.

"It got to the point where he couldn't live alone anymore, and I didn't want him to go to a nursing home," Holland said. "So we bought a house in my hometown of Shawano." It's handicap-accessible and allows her to provide round-the-clock care, she said. The home, on the south side of Shawano on the Wolf River, has a great view of the water, she added.

Holland said she enjoys Jury's company.

"He's got a smile on his face ev-

ery day," she said. "He doesn't focus on the negative, always in a good mood, and never, ever complains about anything."

As Jury's age puts him at risk for serious complications from COVID-19, Holland planned a non-traditional birthday, complete with a yard sign and balloons. They plan to spend the day as they do many other days, watching from the house as "George and Martha," two bald eagles, soar over the Wolf River.

Coronavirus changes delivery of summer school

Enrollment in Shawano programs expected to drop as a result

SHAWANO — School buildings are still closed through June 30 due to the coronavirus pandemic, making it necessary for the Shawano School District summer school program to go virtual like regular classes.

The Shawano School Board received an update on plans for summer school Monday, learning that the virtual learning was the only feasible way to keep summer school going altogether.

"We've gone through a few different plans, hoping we'd be able to open up," said Rod Watson, the district's summer school coordina-

tor. "It doesn't look like we're going to be able to do that this year."

A survey was sent out to parents in the district to see what would be preferred. Watson said the virtual option was not the most popular, but that parents understood it was the best choice during the pandemic.

"If we're going to have the summer school program, we're only going to be able to have it virtually," he said.

A lot of the original nuts and bolts will remain in place. Summer school will run four days per week from June 15 through July 16. Watson said about 20 minutes worth of schoolwork will be part of daily activities, an option shown to be

popular on the parent survey.

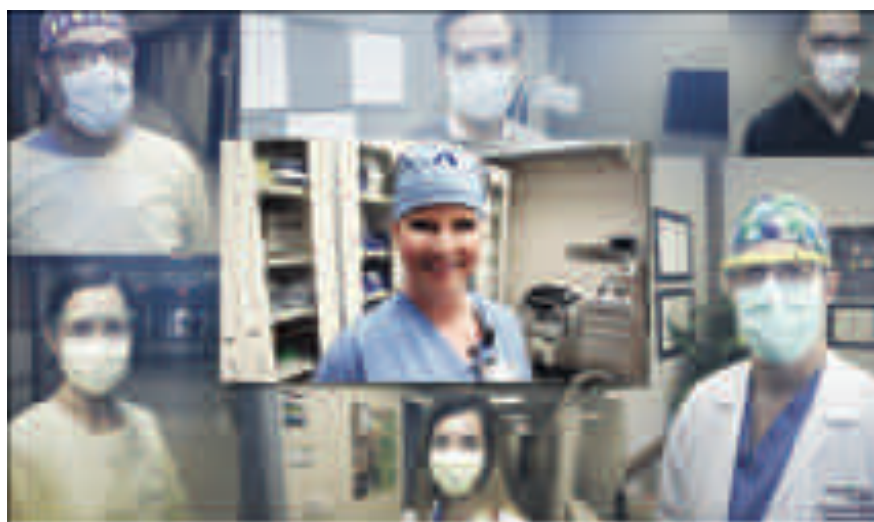
The lessons will be sent through regular packets to families, as feedback from Hillcrest Primary School and Olga Brener Intermediate School showed the packets — which were the learning option for those two schools in the last month — were received better than the online learning offered to middle and high school students. School administrators had pointed out in previous meetings that many rural areas lack the infrastructure to provide sustainable internet service.

"We're aware that there are some pretty significant technology gaps in our community," Watson said.

Some of the fun classes, such as

sports and performance classes, do not convert well to virtual learning, according to Watson, so those classes will not be part of the usual offerings. As a result, enrollment numbers are expected to be down; Watson noted there were about 500 students signed up for summer school prior to learning that traditional summer school could not take place.

Watson pointed out that, due to missing over two months of regular classes, the district wanted to be sure to prioritize students who were having difficulty in reading, math and other standard subjects before offering enrichment courses.

Grants given to 48 city businesses

More than \$175,000 awarded to assist with occupancy costs

SHAWANO — The city is reporting that 48 Shawano businesses have received money from an emergency grant program aimed at helping local businesses with occupancy costs during the economic shutdown that was forced by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The city awarded a total of \$175,098, with businesses receiving an average of \$3,500.

The temporary relief program was designed to assist small businesses with immediate grant assistance of up to \$5,000 to help cover occupancy expenses for up to 60 days — including rent, mortgages, utilities, insurance and other property-related business expenses.

Federally funded programs, including the Economic Injury Disaster Loan and the Paycheck Protection Program, had been made available to small businesses, but both of those programs quickly ran out of money due to the demand, leaving small businesses who weren't first in line out of luck.

The local grant money came from the city's Tax Incremental Finance (TIF) districts.

TIF districts are areas where municipalities invest in infrastructure, such as sewer and water, to attract development where it might not otherwise occur, or to make improvements, such as eliminating blight.

Student debt financial flu sickening our economy

The United States is sick with a financial flu.

Our country has a health care crisis with the COVID-19 virus. Thousands of people are dying daily, and there is no end to this tragedy in the immediate future. Our economy is suffering at a level we haven't seen since the Great Depression. People have been having to make difficult decisions when it comes to how to spend the limited resources they have available.

There is a parallel challenge that is facing those who have acquired student debt. Even before the coronavirus, that debt depressed the purchasing power of a large part of the labor force. Many of those 46 million students affected are a part of the \$2.5 trillion owed in student debt.

Many borrowers have not been able to afford a home or even a car. Others with a little more income still have had a difficult time paying for mortgages, auto loans and daycare. One in three report the amount owed on their loan exceeds their monthly rent or mortgage bill.

The millennial generation (those born from 1981-1996) is the most educated in history. However, millions continue to be burdened by crushing student loan debt. Of those individuals who are now 25-34 years of age, 45% carry student debt. When baby boomers were that age, the figure was 16%. Young households have lower incomes and fewer assets than previ-

ous generations did at the same age. This debt has disproportionately affected students of color, low-income students, first-generation college students, women, veterans and seniors. These students have needed more help in accessing their educational dreams.

Higher level educational degrees are a prerequisite for a majority of gainful employment in modern-day America. According to Andrew Ross, professor of social and cultural analysis at New York University, "Today, it is impossible to ignore that work-force entrants, especially the college educated, have to take on large debt burdens simply to prepare themselves for employability."

In 2015, three-fourths of the graduates had some amount of debt with an average being more than \$35,000 per student. Despite this statistic, Republicans in Congress have killed, stifled or otherwise repudiated any comprehensive loan forgiveness.

Part of this resistance could be traced to the student loan industry. Student debt is profitable. Last year, Sallie Mae and Navient had a combined profit of \$1.2 billion. Interest rates are set yearly so debts from each

year of education could have a different interest rate. Rates doubled in 2005 and doubled again in 2013.

Thankfully, due to the pandemic, federal government loans have been granted a temporary disaster relief forbearance through Sept. 30, which may be adjusted based on further direction from the U.S. Department of Education. During this time, no payments will be due. All interest on loans will be waived.

Sixty-four percent of graduates with debt in Wisconsin puts the state in the top ten in the nation, according to the 14th annual report on the burden of student loan debt on college graduates by The Institute for College Access and Success. The amount of debt being carried by graduates also ranks high compared to the rest of the nation. Wisconsin class of 2018 graduates leaving college had an average debt load of nearly \$32,000.

Gov. Tony Evers realizes that student debt is preventing folks from starting a business, saving for retirement and holding back our state and our economy. He has signed an executive order creating a Governor's Task Force on Student Debt. The task force will be tasked with assessing student debt in Wisconsin and providing long-term strategies to reduce education-related debt, prevent abusive practices by loan companies and improving financial literacy education.

One in five students in the United States were behind in student loan payments before the pandemic. Due to workers being out of work or having reduced hours for long periods of time, budgets will be even tighter after there is a vaccine for COVID-19. There are bound to be even more student loan defaults.

Moving forward, we need reform. The accumulation of more and more student debt by future post-secondary students is not sustainable. We need to ensure that a great education at our technical colleges, two-year universities and four-year universities is not out of reach for Wisconsin students and families.

"If the United States is to have any kind of durable middle class in the 21st century, it will be to match those countries that provide free public education (beyond high school)," Ross said.

It should not be acceptable to have nearly two out of three graduates starting out their careers with tens of thousands of dollars of debt. Our government needs to come up with plans for loan forgiveness and for supplementing most of the expense of education beyond high school. If we don't, our country will continue to contend with a financial flu that sickens our economy.

State program set up to spur recovery

Small and minority-owned businesses eligible for grants

MADISON — Gov. Tony Evers announced \$75 million in assistance for small businesses as part of the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation's "We're All In" initiative.

The program is a comprehensive effort to celebrate and help Wisconsin's small businesses get back on their feet and support best practices to keep businesses, consumers, employees and communities safe, the governor's office said.

Funded largely by federal dollars received through the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act, this initiative will provide direct assistance to small businesses most impacted by the duration and restrictions of the COVID-19 pandemic.

These \$2,500 cash grants will assist with the costs of business interruption or for health and safety improvements, wages and salaries, rent, mortgages, and inventory. Businesses will be able to apply for grant assistance in early June.

The We're All In initiative will include:

- Grants in the amount of \$2,500 to small businesses with 20 or fewer FTEs impacted by COVID-19 that have not already received WEDC COVID-19 assistance. Up to 30,000 businesses may receive grants. More details about the program will be available later this month with businesses able to apply for grant assistance in June.

- Ethnic Minority Emergency Grants, which provide \$2 million in grants for ethnically diverse Wisconsin micro-businesses who suffered losses due to the pandemic. The grants are aimed at sole proprietorships or businesses with five or fewer employees that have not received assistance under either SB 20/20 program or SBA's Paycheck Protection Program.

One thousand grants of \$2,000 each will be administered in partnership with Wisconsin's 19 ethnic and minority chambers of commerce. More details are available at <https://wedc.org/programs-and-resources/>

minority-business-development.

- A series of guides for businesses looking to implement best practices to keep employees, customers, and communities safe throughout the COVID-19 crisis.

These guides are an essential part of the We're All In program and were developed in consultation with the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, Department of Tourism, Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection, Department of Safety and Professional Services, as well as industry leaders and public health experts throughout the state.

"Wisconsiners have done an incredible job of banding together throughout this crisis and it's more important than ever for us to continue respecting each other, supporting each other, holding each other accountable and protecting those who are vulnerable," Evers said. "We are still encouraging people to stay home as much as possible, practice physical distancing and good hygiene, and take protective measures like wearing a mask in public, but as more businesses continue to reopen around the state, we need to go all in on doing this together."

Grant recipients will become We're All In businesses by committing to safety protocols and using them in their shops, cafes and places of work to protect their customers, employees, and communities.

This network of Main Street businesses will form the backbone of the We're All In initiative, along with support from major Wisconsin businesses, communities and other associations.

"These grants will help businesses in the short term, and we need Wisconsiners to join our long-term economic recovery by supporting those small businesses as patrons and customers," Evers said. "We know that folks need to feel safe and confident as employees and consumers for this to work, so that is why we need to be all in together."

Playoff road gets easier for Bonduel and Menominee Indian boys teams

Most other area teams also see changes to regional pods

The Bonduel and Menominee Indian boys basketball teams saw their playoff road get a bit easier when the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association released division placements and playoff assignments for the 2020-21 season.

Iola-Scandinavia and Lourdes Academy — the No. 1 and 2 seeds, respectively, from this past season — are no longer part of the Division 4 regional pod.

The two teams eventually met in a sectional semifinal, with Iola-Scandinavia advancing. I-S had its shot at state wiped out when the coronavirus canceled the end of the boys season.

Only Horicon was added into the pod, which now will feature 12 teams instead of 13.

Manawa (No. 9), Oconto (No. 8), Coleman (No. 5), St. Mary Catholic (No. 12), Weyauwega-Fremont (No. 13), Winnebago Lutheran (No. 4), Shiocton (No. 3), St. Mary's Springs (No. 11), and Crivitz (No. 6) round out the regional pod for 2020-21.

Clintonville, Oconto Falls, Wittenberg-Birnamwood

The D3 regional pod that includes Oconto Falls, Wittenberg-Birnamwood and Clintonville swapped out Brillion for Marinette for the upcoming season.

Marinette was a No. 12 seed in D2 this past season.

Brillion was a No. 10 seed, and was eliminated by seventh-seeded Oconto Falls. The Panthers were eliminated by second-seeded Freedom.

Clintonville was a No. 4 seed, but was upset by fifth-seeded Northland Pines in a regional semifinal.

The D5 regional pod that Marion and Tigerton play in had several

changes made to it.

Sharing an unforgettable hunt with my brother

You know what's better than having a successful hunt? Getting to share that hunt with somebody else.

For the first time in over a decade, I enjoyed my first successful hunt with somebody else, and what an experience it was.

After an unsuccessful solo week on several public properties, my brother, Sawyer — who went along as a caller — and I hit the family private land woods in Chippewa County on May 7 in search for a bearded turkey.

We deployed a similar tactic to when I harvested a bird in 2018, walking about 50 yards into the property and listening to the first gobbles of the morning before choosing which birds to go after.

The gobbles were few and far between on the low 40-degree morning, and a bit of doubt started to creep in for me.

We decided to head toward where a majority of the gobbles, but as we approached, we realized the gobbling birds were on the other side of the creek that runs down the west portion of the property.

A year ago, the birds would always start on the east side of the creek before pitching across it and heading to a neighbor's cow pasture, so I knew there was a chance they could cross the water and come to us, but I still wasn't super confident.

I set up my \$4 hen decoy and we settled in.

"This has to be the worst setup of my life," I said as I sat down, with just my head up against a slanted tree trunk.

The gobbling was decent on the limb, but we also heard hen clucks mixed in, so I knew we needed to pull the hens across the creek if we wanted to punch a tag.

After flying down at about 5:40 a.m., the birds began to work away from us, so I decided to have Sawyer toss in a few clucks to try and peak the bird's interest.

It worked, as a bunch of birds started to vocalize with us and move closer to the creek.

After throwing in some jake yelps and excited hen yelps, a dom-

inant tom established his presence, gobbling several times within a minute and chasing off some jakes.

"Should we turn around?" asked my brother, as we were facing an open area instead of the actual gobbles.

"No, we should be good. They'll swing one way or the other. I don't think they'll just barrel right through," I answered.

Within a couple minutes, I heard a turkey fly across the water and land behind us. Then a second bird and finally a third.

I twisted my head so I could see over my right shoulder and saw a pair of hens and a tom closely behind.

They were indeed swinging to one side of us, and I thought the hunt was about to be over as they only needed to come another 10-15 yards to be in the open where my shotgun was pointed.

But in typical turkey hunting

fashion, the hens got nervous, began putting and turned around.

To my surprise, the tom stayed and began spitting, drumming and displaying just 10 yards behind us.

The tom clearly saw my decoy, but he wasn't about to ditch his live hens. He was committed to having the decoy come to him, which obviously was impossible, so the standoff began.

For about the next 40 minutes, the tom put on a show while only moving about 10-15 feet. He didn't gobble again until a crow flew over, but was spitting, drumming and displaying as his head changed from one color of the flag to the next.

For the longest time, I forgot my brother was sitting just a couple feet behind me and to my left, as he didn't make a peep.

What made the experience even crazier is that my brother didn't realize the tom was that close for about 20 of those minutes. I had

tried to tell him what spitting and drumming sounds like, but it's hard to really recognize unless you've heard a real turkey do it.

With my neck and back tightening up and legs completely numb, I decided to make a move after about 30 minutes. I somehow went undetected as I laid down flat on my back before twisting around to face the tom.

I realized about halfway through the move that it was still too thick in the woods to pull off a shot, but remained in the awkward position anyway.

After another 10 minutes, several other birds had started gobbling, so I decided it was time to end the encounter one way or another. If I scared the tom or missed, we'd simply go after another.

"I think I'm going to try and sit up and shoot this bird," I whispered.

I thought the tom heard me talking as he broke strut. I figured I was busted, but instead, the tom began walking to the left and toward the open area. Not wanting to wait any longer, I found an opening within the woods that I could shoot through and waited for his head to appear in it.

Boom!

"Go see if I got him, I can't move my legs," I said.

Sawyer ran toward the bird, but because it didn't flop, couldn't see it at first.

"Where is it?" he asked as he scanned the woods.

"Check by that log," I said.

After finding the 21 pound, 44 inch long bird that had a 9 3/4 inch beard, 1 1/4 inch spurs and a few feathers missing from the middle portion of his tail fan, the best moment of the hunt occurred.

Sawyer turned around and proceeded to wrap me in the biggest bear hug ever. It instantly was among the most memorable hunting moments I've ever had.

Sawyer was more excited than I was in that moment, and that's saying something if you know me and my love and passion for turkey hunting.

Pictures, smiles and high fives capped the hunt and put a stamp on a truly unforgettable hunt.

ters on state lands will remain closed until May 26. Refunds will be issued to all customers.

All events and special event permits are canceled until May 26.
