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Shawano Farmers Market still to open

Restrictions require market to move back to Washington Street

SHAWANO — The Shawano Farmers Market had finally found a beautiful home last year in Franklin Park, but due to the pandemic, it's back out on the street.

Hopefully, that's temporary, according to Barb Mendoza, executive director for the FRESH Project, which took over the market's operation this year. It is necessary in order to keep with social distancing guidelines set up to curb spreading the coronavirus, she said.

The farmers market will open June 20, its originally scheduled opening date, and continue through Oct. 3, but the market will not be set up in Franklin Park like it was last year. Mendoza said the market will be set up in the 200 block of South Wash-

ington Street, where it had been for several years before improvements on Franklin Park were implemented, and the market will be set up with one entrance and one exit.

"Our vendors will be just meat and produce farmers, or anyone who has anything prepared at home that can be brought in and packaged and ready to be sold," Mendoza said.

For now, vendors cannot sell flowers or crafts under the state guidelines for farmers markets that items be edible.

"We're considered food-essential," Mendoza said. "Flowers are not food-essential."

Mendoza noted there will be no entertainment and education activities like there have been in years past, at least for the time being. She said the purpose is to get shoppers in to get what they need and out again as quickly as possible.

"People are still able to come out and get their produce and needs," she said.

Mendoza said the new rules are difficult because they have prompted

most of The FRESH Project's fundraisers to be canceled in order to minimize the risk of spreading coronavirus, but she understands the necessity of them.

"We're really excited that we can do (the farmers market), even though it's limited," Mendoza said. "It's not just for the Shawano community; it's for anybody who wants to come."

There will be volunteers monitoring the market to make sure people are moving expeditiously and not stopping to socialize, Mendoza said. The main reason for moving the market back out of the park is the temptation for people to gather, she said.

Mendoza has almost a dozen vendors in place for now, as it's taking time to contact all previous vendors to let them know what the new rules are.

The FRESH Project is also finalizing plans for its mobile market, where food distribution takes place in various communities, according to Mendoza.

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Virtual sales to assist local farmers

Event also raising money for the FRESH Project

SHAWANO — A Facebook page aimed at supporting local farmers and raising money for the FRESH Project was set to go live Saturday, May 23, and will offer online purchases of Shawano County dairy and farm products.

The virtual farmers' marketplace is an extension of the "Shop Local Shawano County" Facebook page started by Nitta Charnon, finance director for Shawano County, in response to business closings caused by the coronavirus pandemic.

Charnon has held two virtual sales events for local businesses so far, with six businesses participating in the first and 19 in the second.

The events allow businesses to promote and sell their goods online and make them available via curbside pickup or delivery.

"It's been going good," Charnon

said. "We had a really nice response."

Charnon said additional businesses have contacted her wishing to participate in the next virtual event, which is not yet scheduled.

She has been focusing in the meantime on the partnership with the FRESH Project.

Virtual sales is an idea not expected to go away even after the pandemic passes and stores are fully opened.

"I honestly think with everything that's happened, I don't see the virtual events going away," Charnon said.

"We've gotten a lot of feedback that people like it. I think it's just an added benefit to the businesses."

The FRESH Project fundraiser will sell Wisconsin milk from Charlie's County Market and locally produced cheese, eggs, honey, beef sticks and maple syrup.

Businesses supplying the local products include Belle Plaine Cheese, 5 D Ranch, Pingel's Meat Processing, Sweet Timber Maple, Milo's Poultry and Keune Farms.

Charnon said she wanted to not only support local farmers but provide assistance to the FRESH Project as

well.

"They do a lot of community work. They're doing a lot of education. They do community gardens, provide meals to those who are low-income or less fortunate," Charnon said.

She said the food needs caused by the pandemic and its closures have stretched the FRESH Project's resources.

"They're really struggling through all of this," Charnon said.

The Facebook event will run through June 7.

Customers will be able to pick up their purchases at the Shawano County Fairgrounds on Saturday, June 13.

"I think it's very important for people to buy local," Charnon said. "It really helps our businesses here in the county and keeps people employed here. It help with taxes. If we bring in sales tax and keep the sales tax here in our county. That helps keep our taxes lower as well."

Essential fear vs. essential business — which one wins?

Fear resulted in control. The first level of fear was created by experts with a little science sprinkled in. The science was based on computer models and very high death predictions.

March 24, Wisconsin Secretary-designee of Health Andrea Palm warned that, on our current path in the next two weeks, Wisconsin would see 440-1,500 dead by April 7.

May 17, 453 have died, but they want you to believe it was all because you gave up your freedom and remained home.

The second level of fear was from the health field. I have nine family members working in the health field. Because so much was unknown about the COVID-19 nurses and others prepared protocols for the most contagious and the worst ever. Their fear was real, so they shared their concern with family members; this sharing of fear that came from trusted family hospital workers validated the computer model predictions and fear communicated by the science experts.

The third level of fear was for our children. Students had to go home. No teacher, parent or grandparent wants their children to become ill. Now we know that those under 30 years old are the least vulnerable among us. Why are we allowing everything to be canceled that a child looks forward to?

Following the April 6 Supreme Court ruling regarding voting at polls, the mainstream media and social media spread fear.

April 7, in-person voting would

result in many deaths and Republicans want to kill us.

April 24, two friends and I were at the Madison protest. We walked around the capitol several times and determined that at the south

entrance there were about 1,500. The sidewalks and the grounds around the capitol were full with a total of 5,000 people to view the convoy. A friend was at the park-and-ride north of Madison, and counted vehicles and passengers estimating 3,000 people making up the convoy, total 8,000. Where is the spike from — the April 24 protest or the April 7 voting?

Government has forced everyone into a few locations — large stores, grocery stores and gas stations. Where is the big spike? Are you getting suspicious? Have you noticed the similarities between the Wuhan China virus predictions and global warming predictions? It does not matter that the number of deaths predicted were way off. You stayed home and gave up your freedom is why the numbers are down, not because science computer models were wrong.

We are told that we must listen to the science experts, but there are confusing statements by the experts.

Feb. 19, in USA Today, Dr. Anthony Fauci said, "The only people who

need masks are those who are already infected to keep from exposing others." Fauci stated that the danger from the coronavirus is "just minuscule." He stated that people should take precautions against the seasonal "influenza outbreak, which is having its second wave." Fauci identified the seasonal flu as the "real and present danger," so Fauci advised, "Wash your hands as frequently as you can, stay away from sick people and cover your mouth when you cough."

May 12, Fauci told Congress, "There's no guarantee that the vaccine is actually going to be effective."

ecutive order to be unconstitutional; Bieber would not enforce that order. Does the May 13 Supreme Court decision overturning Gov. Tony Evers' order validate Bieber's decision? If the sheriff had broken the law, the attorney general or state legislature would have acted against the sheriff; I am not aware of any action against Bieber.

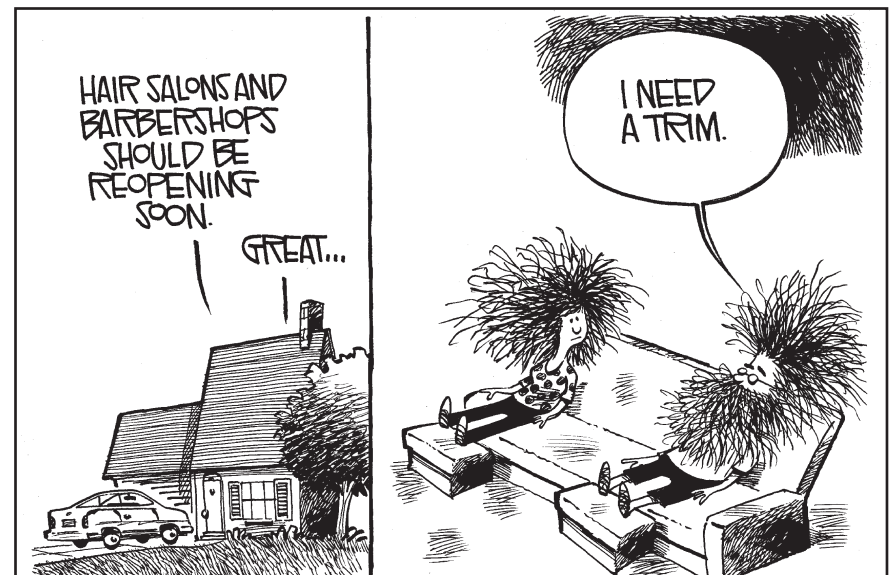
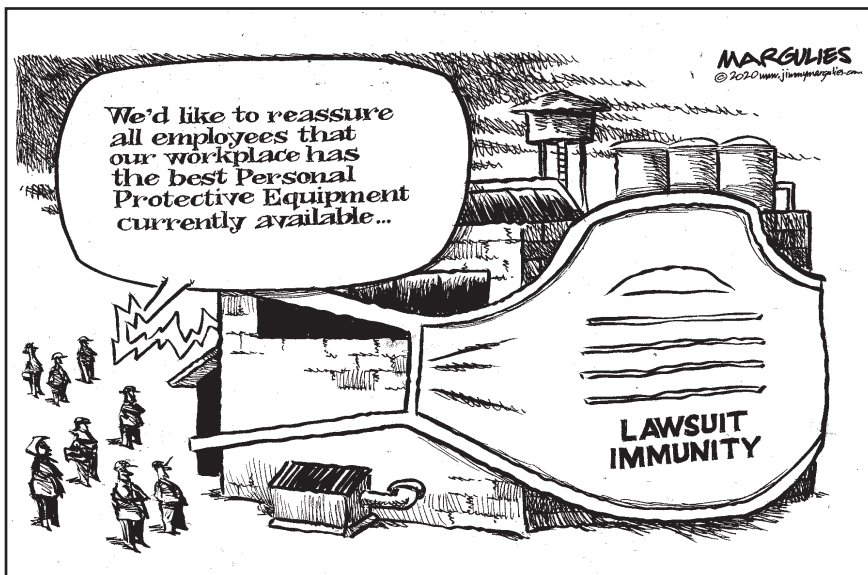

Seattle, Betty met Glenn Dawson, whom she married in July 1951. The couple moved to Minneapolis shortly thereafter, where they purchased a home in St. Louis Park and raised their daughter, Deborah, and where Betty has continued to live these many years. Betty worked as a bookkeeper at White Farm Equipment, then moved on to Minneapolis-Moline, and retired in 1983.

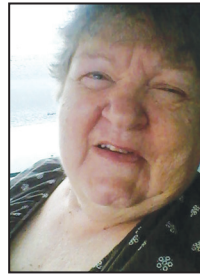

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Leader gets 4 newspaper awards from WNA

News team recognized for education, breaking news coverage

The Shawano Leader earned several awards from the 2019 Wisconsin Newspapers Association Foundation's Better Newspapers Contest.

City Editor Lee Pulaski received first place in the local education category. Pulaski entered pieces he'd written regarding Gresham Community School's \$6.5 million referendum, a new greenhouse at Menominee Indian High School and the updating of Shawano School District's tobacco policy to address Native Americans and their cultural involvement with tobacco.

Judges for the contest noted that the "stories in this package clearly serve the NEW Media citizenry by delivering specific, relevant news that helps readers learn about their educational community."

Reporter Tim Ryan earned a second-place award for breaking news in recognition of the story he'd written about how a Shawano County Sheriff's Department dispatcher assisted a local couple in delivering a baby during an unpleasant winter storm.

The contest judges commented that Ryan "gives sense of urgency to the story, creatively weaving in 911 call excerpts into the story. The technique helps the reader understand the dispatcher's perspective."

The Leader was recognized with a third-place award for the best head-

lines. The headlines noted were, "SLAM! DUNK. Potholes lie in wait for unwary drivers," "City again marking territory for dog park" and "Final Floor. Last load of MTE flooring headed for NCAA Final Four setting."

The Leader also received an honorable mention for all-around newspaper photography. Judges mentioned the award was due to "eye-catching cover photos and

beautiful photo essays."

"There is a competitive spirit among journalists to create their best work, sometimes under intense deadline pressure. To have that work recognized by peers means a lot," said Carol Ryczek, editor-in-chief. "We need local journalism more than ever. I am so proud of the NEW Media team and the way they work together to keep our local communities informed in ways that no other media can do."

The awards were handed out in early May, even though the WNA had intended to honor its awards recipients at an awards ceremony on March 20. The coronavirus pandemic postponed and then canceled the event, so WNA distributed the awards to each individual publication.

1. No person shall be allowed to appear before the board of review, to testify to the board by telephone, or to contest the amount of any assessment of real or personal property if the person has refused a reasonable written request by certified mail of the assessor to view such property.
2. After the first meeting of the board of review and before the board's final adjournment, no person who is scheduled to appear before the board of review may contact or provide information to a member of the board about the person's objection, except at a session of the board. Open Book shall occur no less than 7-days prior to the board of review.
3. The board of review may not hear an objection to the amount or valuation of property unless, at least 48 hours before the board's first scheduled meeting, the objector provides to the board's clerk written or oral notice of an intent to file an objection, except that upon a showing of good cause and the submission of a written objection, the board shall waive that requirement during the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, and the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days with proof of extraordinary circumstances for failure to meet the 48-hour notice requirement and failure to appear before the board of review during the first 2 hours of the first scheduled meeting.
4. Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the board of review within the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. The board may require objections to the amount or valuation of property to be submitted on forms approved by the Department of Revenue, and the board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. Persons who own land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land may object only to the valuation of that land or only the valuation of improvements to that land. No person may be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the board in support of the objections and made full disclosure before the board, under oath, of all that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.
5. When appearing before the board of review, the objecting person shall specify in writing the person's estimate of the value of the land and improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at the estimate.
6. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board by telephone, or object to a valuation if the valuation was made by the assessor or the objector using the income method of valuation, unless the person supplies the assessor with all the information about income and expenses, as specified in the assessor's manual under s. 73.03 (2a), Wis. Stats., that the assessor requests. The City of Shawano has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph that provides exceptions for persons using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or the duties of their officer or by order of a court. The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under s. 19.35 (1), Wis. Stats.
7. The board shall hear upon oath, by telephone, all ill or disabled persons who present to the board a letter for a physician, surgeon, or osteopath that confirms their illness or disability. No other persons may testify by telephone unless the Board, in its discretion, has determined to grant a property owner's or their representative's request to testify under oath by telephone or written statement.
8. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board by telephone, or contest the amount of any assessment unless, at least 48 hours before the first meeting of the board, or at least 48 hours before the objection is heard if the objection is allowed under s. 70.47 (3) (a), Wis. Stats., that person provides to the clerk of the board of review notice as to whether the person will ask for the removal of a member of the board of review and, if so, which member, and provides a reasonable estimate of the length of time the hearing will take.

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How to lower COVID-19 risk while eating out

Advice for seniors and other diners returning to the table

As restaurants and bars reopen to the public, it's important to realize that eating out increases the risk of exposure to the new coronavirus.

Two of the most important public health measures for keeping illnesses to a minimum are nearly impossible in these situations: First, it's hard to eat or drink while wearing a face mask. Second, social distancing is difficult in tight spaces normally filled with back-to-back seating and servers who weave among the busy tables all evening long.

So, what should you look out for, and how can you and the restaurant reduce the risk? Here are answers to a few common questions.

How far apart should tables and bar stools be?

There is nothing magical about 6 feet, the number we often hear in formal guidance from government agencies.

The "6-foot" rule is based on old data about the distance droplets can spread respiratory viruses. These droplets tend to settle out of the air within 6 feet, but that isn't always the case.

Aerosols can spread the virus over larger distances, though there remains some uncertainty about how common this spread is. Particles generated by sneezes or someone running can travel up to 30 feet.

Talking alone has been shown to generate respiratory droplets that could be infectious.

If there is a fan or current generated in a closed space such as a restaurant, particles will also travel farther.

This was shown in a paper from China: People in a restaurant downwind of an infected person became infected even though the distance was greater than 6 feet.

The closer the distance and the greater the time someone is exposed to a person who is infectious, the greater the risk.

If the servers wear masks, is that enough?

If servers wear masks, that will afford a layer of protection, but customers eating and talking could still spread the virus.

One way to mitigate that risk in this imperfect situation, at least from a public health point of view, would

be to have tables surrounded by protective barriers, such as plexiglass or screens, or put tables in separate rooms with doors that can be closed. Some states are encouraging restaurants to limit each table to only one server who delivers everything.

Should I ask for disposable utensils and wipe everything down?

Regular dishwashing of plates, glasses and utensils, and laundering of napkins and tablecloths, will inactivate the virus. No need for disposables here.

The table should also be cleaned and disinfected between uses and marked as sanitized.

Menus are a bit more problematic, depending on the material. Plastic menus could be disinfected. Disposable menus would be more ideal. Remember, even if someone touches a surface that has infectious virus, as long as they don't touch their mouth, nose or eyes they should be safe. So, when in doubt, wash your hands or use hand sanitizer.

Can I get the virus from food from the kitchen?

The risk of becoming infected with the new coronavirus from food is very low.

The virus also is not very stable in the environment. Studies have shown it loses half its viral concentration after less than an hour on copper, three and a half hours on cardboard and just under seven hours on plastic. all of the virus.

The use of masks and maintaining good hand hygiene by food preparers should significantly reduce the risk of food contamination.

Is outdoor seating or a drive-through any safer?

Vulnerable people may want to pass on dine-in options and focus on pickup or perhaps outside dining if the conditions are appropriate.

Drive-up windows or carry-out are probably the safest.

Overall, outside dining is safer than indoor dining with everything else being equal on a nonwindy day due to the larger air volume.

Rodgers surprised Packers drafted Love

Veteran QB also expresses confidence in team's receivers

Packers star Aaron Rodgers acknowledges Green Bay drafting a quarterback in the first round surprised him and complicated his hopes of playing his entire career with the same team.

The Packers traded up four spots in the first round last month to take Utah State quarterback Jordan Love with the 26th overall pick. The move has raised speculation about Rodgers' long-term future in Green Bay, no matter how much team officials emphasized afterward that the two-time MVP remains the clear-cut starting quarterback for the foreseeable future.

"I think the general reaction at first was surprise, like many people," Rodgers said May 15 in a conference call that marked his first public comments on the Packers' draft. "Obviously I'm not going to say that I was, you know, thrilled by the pick necessarily, but the organization is thinking not only about the present but about the

future. And I respect that."

The 36-year-old Rodgers has been with the Packers since they selected him with the 24th overall selection in 2005. Former Packers quarterback Brett Favre predicted on "The Rich Eisen Show" earlier this month that Rodgers would finish his career somewhere other than Green Bay.

Rodgers, who owns the best career passer rating in NFL history, has four years remaining on his contract after signing a four-year, \$134 million extension in August 2018 that included more than \$100 million in guaranteed money.

"There are some new factors that are out of my control," Rodgers said. "My sincere desire to start and finish with the same organization, just as it has with many other players over the years, may not be a reality at this point. As much as I understand the organization's future outlook and wanting to make sure they're thinking about the team now and down the line, and I respect that, at the same time I still believe in myself and have a strong desire to play into my 40s. I'm just not sure how that all works together at this point."

Packers coach Matt LaFleur says he understands Rodgers' reaction to the Love selection. When asked

whether the Packers' draft choices might motivate Rodgers, LaFleur said the veteran quarterback doesn't need any extra incentive.

"He's one of the most competitive people I've been around," LaFleur said. "You can see that competitiveness every time we step on the field. I don't think it's going to drive him any more than if we would have drafted somebody else. That's who he is. That's how he's wired. That's why he's achieved the things he's done throughout his career."

Rodgers also expressed confidence in his team's receiving corps after the Packers made the surprising decision not to draft any wideouts. Davante Adams was the only Packer to catch as many as 50 passes or accumulate as many as 500 yards receiving last season.

"For them to not pick a guy early on to me says they really like our guys and have faith in them," Rodgers said. "I feel really good about that group, and obviously the front office did as well."

Rodgers finished 12th in passer rating and 21st in completion percentage last season, but he still threw 26 touchdown passes and only four interceptions. The Packers went 13-3 and won the NFC North title, but the season ended with a 37-20 loss to the San

Francisco 49ers — their third NFC championship game defeat in the last six years.

Of course, the Packers have dealt with this type of potentially awkward quarterback transition before. Rodgers is all too familiar with it.

Rodgers spent his first three NFL seasons backing up Favre before earning the starting spot in 2007, a move that led to Favre's exit from Green Bay. Favre was 35 when the Packers drafted Rodgers.

The difference is that Favre openly pondered retirement at the time the Packers drafted Rodgers, and Rodgers has talked about how he wants to play several more years.

Rodgers says he's always had good relationships with his backup quarterbacks and expects a similar dynamic with Love. He said he's had "some great conversations" with Love and noted they have something in common as players who weren't heavily recruited out of high school.

"He didn't get asked to be drafted by the Packers," Rodgers said. "He's not to blame at all. He's just coming in excited for his opportunity. We had a great conversation the day after the draft, and I'm excited to work with him. He seems like a really good kid with a good head on his shoulders."

WFCA All-Star Game and activities suspended

Logan Stuart and Chad McVeigh are on all-star rosters.

Dickelman was set to play in the large school game as a member of the North roster. Block, Stuart and McVeigh are all on the South roster that will compete in the 8-player game.

Packers' Montravius Adams faces marijuana, driving charges

ELKO, GA. — Green Bay Packers defensive lineman Montravius Adams was arrested in Georgia last week and charged with possession of marijuana and driving offenses.

He was stopped May 19 just after 6 p.m. on suspicion of driving with a suspended registration and no

insurance, according to a Houston County Sheriff's Office report. It was not immediately clear why police had such suspicions.

An officer detected a scent of marijuana, which was found in a search of the car, the report said.

He faces misdemeanor charges of possession of less than an ounce

of marijuana, driving with a suspended registration and driving without insurance.

Adams was released from the Houston County Detention Center on \$2,964 bond.

The Packers said in a statement they are aware of what happened but will not comment further be-

cause it is an "ongoing legal matter."

Adams, 24, is a 2017 third-round draft pick from Auburn. He had 19 tackles last year while playing in 14 games and making two starts. He finished with 26 tackles and 1½ sacks in 2018 while playing 16 games and making one start.

Wisconsin 2020 elk hunt application deadline is Sunday

Application fee is \$10

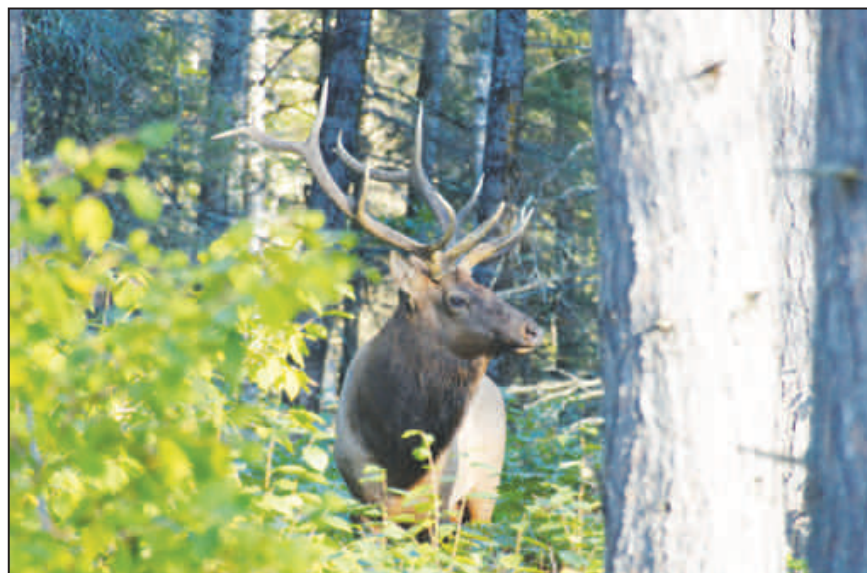
MADISON — Wisconsin hunters have until Sunday, May 31 to apply for a chance to participate in northern Wisconsin's 2020 elk hunt.

This fall marks the third official elk hunt in state history.

Once widespread across North America, elk were eliminated from Wisconsin in the 1880s. Thanks to the support of many partners and the backing of Wisconsinites, the herd is back. Elk hunting season is open Oct. 17 to Nov. 15 and Dec. 10-18. Only Wisconsin residents are eligible to receive an elk tag.

Wisconsin residents can submit elk tag applications through the Department of Natural Resources' Go Wild license system. Each potential hunter may apply once online or by visiting a license agent. The application fee is \$10.

In addition, one bull tag is raffled off by the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation. Raffle tickets are also \$10 each, and there is no limit on the number of raffle tickets a hunter may purchase. An elk hunting license is \$49 for those who draw a tag.

"More than 60,000 Wisconsinites applied during the first two years of managed elk hunting, and we're looking forward to another great hunt in 2020," said Kevin Wallenfang, DNR deer and elk ecologist. "You never know; you just might be the next lucky hunter out there."

For each application, \$7 goes

to elk management and research in Wisconsin. During the first two hunting seasons, applicants generated over \$400,000. These funds are being used to enhance elk habitat, which benefits the elk herd and many other wildlife species. Funding also contributes to ongoing elk research and monitoring.

Hunters who draw a tag will be notified in early June. Prior to obtaining the elk hunting license, all winners are required to participate in a Wisconsin elk hunter education program offered in early September. The class will cover regulations, hunting techniques and more.

The 2020 hunting season is only available for the northern elk herd. Although the state's central elk herd has grown steadily since reintroduction in 2015 and is projected to reach approximately 100 elk this summer after calving, hunting is not recommended for the central herd in 2020.

Only bull elk may be harvested. An elk tag may be transferred to a Wisconsin resident youth hunter 17 years old or younger or an eligible Wisconsin resident disabled hunter.

For information regarding elk in Wisconsin, search the DNR website using the keyword "elk."

Shawano Speedway given the green light to start racing

Guidelines in place for everyone's safety

SHAWANO — After several weeks of careful planning, race tracks around the state are opening up. Shawano Speedway has a practice night scheduled for Saturday before the first week of the season on June 6.

Brad Luepke, the speedway's marketing and promotions manager, spent about 50 minutes on Facebook Live on May 21 detailing what things would look like on a race night, at least to begin the season. The full video can be found at <https://www.facebook.com/Shawano-Speedway-262974367190/>

The speedway's grandstands are open to spectators (both on practice night and regular race nights), but fans are to follow social distancing guidelines. Luepke said families or groups that are comfortable being around each other are free to sit near each other, but to sit at least 6 feet away from other groups in the stands.

The raceway's grandstands seat

3,500 people, so Luepke said there was no reason for people not to be spread out. There is no limit to the amount of fans the speedway can allow in on a night.

Masks are recommended, but not required. Social distancing guidelines are to be followed whether fans are in the stands, bathrooms, food lines, or anywhere else on the race grounds.

A \$15 pit pass is available for the practice night, while general admission is free. Prices for race nights will remain the same as in previous years, and can be found at <https://www.shawanospeedway.net/shawano-speedway-admission>.

There are no parking procedure changes.

On practice night, the pit gates will be locked after the races wrap up — in previous years, the pits had remained opened for spectators. Food and drink will be available for purchase.

Practice is set for 5-8 p.m., but will be extended to 3-8 p.m. if the raceway

can get an ambulance on site.

The bathrooms and picnic tables on the speedway grounds will be sanitized often throughout race nights. Hand sanitizing stations will be positioned around the grounds.

The food menu will be limited to start the year, which will help food preparers get the food into people's hands quicker and avoid clustering of people.

Instead of four food windows to order at, there will be two. The other two windows will be used for food pickup.

All food (and condiments) will be placed in styrofoam containers. Luepke urged fans to throw away their containers as soon as they are done eating and not leave trash in the stands.

Another recommendation Luepke mentioned was limiting the amount of human interaction on the grounds — having just one member of a family or group buy tickets or food, instead of having several people do it.

While programs are still available to fans, the souvenir shop is closed.

Promotional nights are on hold for now, but many could be canceled or reorganized to meet safety standards.

There were a few changes for the drivers and their pit crews.

Drivers were encouraged to bring their own pens to sign in. Driver's meetings were eliminated, with the speedway printing out anything drivers need to know on a given night instead.

Pit crews were asked to stay in their pit area, while the food shack that is typically available for the individuals in the pit is closed.

In terms of action on the track, the only big change is that hot laps will be eliminated for the season.

Near the end of the live video, Luepke said the fate of the racing season is now in the hands of fans and drivers. He said to use common sense and respect everyone else's space.

The practice night will be a test run for drivers, but also for the speedway as it adjusts to all its new guidelines.

Schofield woman killed on County Q

WITTENBERG — An 82-year-old Schofield woman died as a result of injuries sustained in a two-vehicle crash in the town of Wittenberg on Tuesday, according to the Shawano County Sheriff's Department.

The crash occurred at about 6 p.m. on County Road Q east of Cardinal Lane.

The preliminary investigation indicates a 48-year-old Wittenberg man was traveling eastbound on County Road Q and crossed the center line into oncoming traffic, striking a westbound vehicle head-on.

The second vehicle was driven by

an 83-year-old Weston woman.

Drivers from both vehicles were taken to a Wausau area hospital. The Weston woman was said to be in stable condition.

The condition of the Wittenberg man was unknown.

The Schofield woman, a passenger in the second vehicle, was airlifted to a Wausau area hospital where she later succumbed to her injuries and was pronounced deceased, the sheriff's department said.

Alcohol does not appear to be a contributing factor in the crash, which is still being investigated.

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
