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Parents want school board to do right by its teachers

Survey by former employee shows many unhappy about treatment by superintendent

It has been a rough year for teachers everywhere, but survey results announced at the Shawano School Board's June 7 meeting indicate the public schools' rough patch started even before the pandemic wreaked havoc.

Frustrated parents served as the voices for those teachers and spoke their own views on the school district's current state of affairs. Many of those who commented in the survey believe the school district's woes come from the top, from Superintendent Randi Anderson and, in some cases, from the board itself.

Chris Marcks, who until mid-May worked in the district's human resources office, reported the results of a survey she distributed among current and former employees. With 47 responses, over half of them from employees who have been with the district more than 10 years, the results were not rosy.

Marcks' survey showed one in three respondents were actively looking for another job, and 81% of respondents claimed they would leave the district if the right opportunity came along. Among those who said they had left or would be leaving, 89% said their departure was for a preventable reason.

Some of the anonymous comments show a lack of faith in Anderson, and others have said their building administrators are good while expressing disdain for district leadership. Comments included the following:

- "I feel as though students are looked at and referred to as \$9,500, which sickens me! I have NEVER seen Randi Anderson in my building."
- "The superintendent is taking the district in the wrong direction. They keep hiring administrators and coaches while raising class sizes. More and more keeps getting shoved at us."
- "Superintendent Anderson cares about herself, and the board is loyal to her to a fault. If all of your administrators say there is a problem and you are

losing staff at record numbers, there is a problem at the top."

- "That the staff, parents, teachers and community needs to feel like we are being heard. I feel that the school board isn't hearing the problems because they don't want to admit that there is a problem."

When asked to rate on a scale of one to five how much respondents trust the information that's shared by the district, 48.9% chose one, while 36.2% chose two. No responses selected a four or five.

There were also no four or five ratings on a question asking how well the school board listens to staff members. Over 55% rated the board with a one, while another 27.7% chose two.

Marcks told the board that she has a desire to see her two children get the best education possible, but she feels community members are kept in the dark about a lot of things — including the fact that board meetings could now be attended in person for the first time since March 2020.

"Why hasn't the public been informed about the ability to attend board meetings?" Marcks asked.

She said she has tried to solicit information from staff members who were too scared to speak up, saying some feared losing their jobs. She read some of the comments from staff aloud.

Shawano parent Chelsea Gilling also read aloud some of the comments and said she's saddened that there are so many teachers who feel there is a culture of fear.

"This is so alarming," Gilling said. "These are our community members. These are our brothers, sisters, neighbors, friends — people that are teaching our children and people that taught us. For this many concerns to be going on, this is extremely alarming. I think this needs to be looked at, and I think we need some apologies here."

Sheila Aumann, another parent, told the board that she's had wonderful experiences with the teachers at Shawano's public schools and doesn't want them to leave for other places.

"To be successful, we need to get and keep wonderful teachers," Aumann said.

Jeana Winslow, a parent who unsuccessfully ran for a seat on the board, also had issues with the perceived distrust in the district, and she felt the board needed to pay more attention to it.

"It starts with you guys," Winslow said. "This is your responsibility, and we vote you guys in to be the voice of the community. I truly hope and pray that you guys take a look at this survey and keep an open mind."

Winslow recalled the board's meeting on May 17 when it voted to increase teachers' salaries by only 1.24%. Echoing words spoken by board member Mart Grams at that time, Winslow called the raise a "slap in the face," and she encouraged the board to do everything it could to show that teachers matter, saying it's no wonder they're leaving.

"I saw one person here fighting for our teachers, and that was really disheartening," Winslow said, her voice breaking. "After the year that we've had, I really feel like this was a slap in the face. I hope this comes back as an agenda item, and that you guys rethink that. I don't care where you have to make cuts to find that."

She was impressed with how many teachers commented in the anonymous survey but at the same time felt the district was in a bad place because so many teachers were unhappy.

"It hurts my heart," Winslow said. "I didn't think there were that many voices that would speak up, and we have almost 50 that are coming forward."

Board President Michael Sleeper did not address the survey, but he encouraged community members to continue to comment and bring issues to the board's attention.

4 charged in concealing drug overdose death

Shawano woman among those suspected of covering up reservation woman's death

Four people were charged last week in federal court in connection with a burned-out vehicle found on the Menominee Reservation that is suspected of concealing the drug overdose death of a woman.

Timothy M. Snider Jr., of Green Bay, was charged with distribution of a controlled substance, use of a communication facility in the furtherance of a narcotics offense and conspiracy to obstruct justice. Emerson K. Reed and Keith D. Wilber Jr. were both charged with misprision of a felony and arson, while Kayla M. Childs, of Shawano, was charged with misprision of a felony.

Misprision of a felony is charged when an individual knows about a felony, aided in concealing it and failed to notify authorities. Conviction carries a maximum punishment of three years in prison.

An affidavit filed in federal court in support of a criminal complaint alleged that Snider gave heroin to Stephanie Greenspon, who fatally overdosed on Aug. 3. Messages on Greenspon's Facebook account indicated she had contacted Snider about obtaining a 0.1 gram of "down" or heroin. Snider indicated he had some and it was good.

At the time, Snider was wearing a GPS bracelet as a condition of his

release on pending drug and bail jumping charges in Brown County. GPS and cell tower data put Greenspon at Snider's residence on the afternoon of Aug. 2.

Witnesses later said that Snider had told them that he had given Greenspon heroin and she had died on the evening of Aug. 2.

Reed said Snider asked him to help dispose of Greenspon's body, according to the criminal complaint, and Reed called in a favor Wilber owed him by also asking to help with Greenspon's remains.

On Aug. 19, a logger checking on a tract of land on S.E. Bass Lake Road, in Keshena, found a burned-out vehicle. Tribal police responded, and human bone fragments, two shell casings and a license plate were recovered.

The vehicle's owner was Greenspon's boyfriend, according to the complaint, and the man said that Greenspon had been driving his Hyundai Tiburon in early August while he was in jail.

The former boyfriend gave authorities a name of an individual he believed Greenspon had visited on Aug. 3. That person implicated Snider, who told authorities someone else must have given Greenspon heroin because he saw her in the Tiburon outside his residence on Aug. 3 acting "out of it."

Snider's GPS data revealed that he traveled from Brown County to the

reservation on Aug. 4, according to the complaint. Times recorded on camera footage along the same route showed the Tiburon and a Jeep Cherokee and matched the time from Snider's GPS data.

Cellphone data showed that Reed and Wilber had spoken to each other during the trip to the reservation, and Wilber, according to the complaint, later told investigators that Reed had asked him for help with a "cold one," presumably an overdose victim, Greenspon.

Wilber told authorities that he told Reed and Snider to take Greenspon's remains to a remote area on the reservation. Greenspon's body was transported in the front seat of the Tiburon, according to Reed.

Wilber and Childs met Reed at the location where the vehicle was discovered, according to the complaint. Reed allegedly said that Snider wanted Greenspon's body cut up and buried so it wouldn't be found.

Wilber told authorities that the purpose of transporting the car and

Greenspon to the reservation was to conceal the death that resulted from the heroin sale.

Reed knew that Snider was on GPS monitoring so he took him from the reservation to a restaurant in Shawano, where Snider's girlfriend picked him up and returned to the Green Bay area. Snider's GPS data corroborate these movements.

After Snider returned to Green Bay, Reed, Wilber and Childs returned to the Tiburon where Greenspon's body remained inside. They moved the vehicle to another location on the reservation, where Wilber and Reed doused it with a fluid and set it on fire.

Childs and Wilber left in Wilber's truck, according to the complaint. Reed allegedly said he later obtained cash and heroin from Snider.

The four defendants are in custody and made their initial court appearance last week. Preliminary examinations are set for June 15-16.

The defendants, except for Childs, are in custody.

Notice of 2021 Board of Review for Town of Richmond, Shawano County

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Review for the Town of Richmond, Shawano County, Wisconsin, shall hold its first two hour meeting on Wednesday, June 23, 2021 from 6:00 P.M. to 8:00 p.m. or later, at the Richmond Town Hall, N5170 County Road MM, Shawano, Wis. 54166.

Please be advised of the following requirements to appear before the board of review and procedural requirements if appearing before the board:

1. No person will be allowed to appear before the board of review, to testify to the board by telephone, or to contest the amount of any assessment of real or personal property if the person has refused a reasonable written request by certified mail of the assessor to enter on to property to conduct an exterior view of the real or personal property being assessed.
2. After the first meeting of the board of review and before the board's final adjournment, no person who is scheduled to appear before the board of review may contact or provide information to a member of the board about the person's objection, except at a session of the board. Open book shall occur no less than 7 days prior to the board of review.
3. The board of review may not hear an objection to the amount or valuation of property unless, at least 48 hours before the board's first scheduled meeting, the objector provides to the board's clerk written or oral notice of an intent to file an objection, except that upon a showing of good cause and the submission of a written objection, the board shall waive that requirement during the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, and the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days with proof of extraordinary circumstances for failure to meet the 48-hour notice requirement and failure to appear before the board of review during the first 2 hours of the first scheduled meeting.
4. Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the board of review within the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. The board may require objections to the amount or valuation of property to be submitted on forms approved by the Department of Revenue, and the board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. Persons who own land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land may object only to the valuation of that land or only to the valuation of improvements to that land. No person may be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the board in support of the objections and made full disclosure before the board, under oath, of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.
5. When appearing before the board of review, the objecting person shall specify in writing the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.
6. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board by telephone, or object to a valuation if that valuation was made by the assessor or the objector using the income method of valuation, unless no later than 7 days before the first meeting of the board of review the person supplies the assessor with all the information about income and expenses, as specified in the assessor's manual under s. 73.03 (2a), Wis. stats., that the assessor requests. The Town of Richmond has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph that provides exceptions for persons using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or the duties of their office or by order of a court. The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under s. 19.35 (1), Wis. stats.
7. The board shall hear upon oath, by telephone, all ill or disabled persons who present to the board a letter from a physician, surgeon, or osteopath that confirms their illness or disability. No other persons may testify by telephone unless the Board, in its discretion, has determined to grant a property owner's or their representative's request to testify under oath by telephone or written statement.
8. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board by telephone, or contest the amount of any assessment unless, at least 48 hours before the first meeting of the board, or at least 48 hours before the objection is heard if the objection is allowed under s.70.47 (3) (a), Wis. stats., that person provides to the clerk of the board of review notice as to whether the person will ask for the removal of a member of the board of review and, if so, which member, and provides a reasonable estimate of the length of time the hearing will take.

2 motorcycle riders killed in Highway 47 accident

Two people on a motorcycle are dead after a three-vehicle crash June 5 on state Highway 47 required detouring traffic for four hours.

Deputies with the Shawano County Sheriff's Department witnessed a motor vehicle crash involving the motorcycle, a pickup truck and a minivan just after noon on the highway near Highline Road in the Town of Hartland, Lt. Jesse Sperberg reported. According to the evidence at the scene and witness statements, the pickup truck was southbound when a motorcycle struck its rear, causing the motorcycle to cross into northbound traffic.

The motorcycle was then struck by a minivan.

The motorcycle was operated by a 36-year-old man and a 13-year-old passenger, both from Appleton. Both were deceased upon initial contact by law enforcement. A 71-year-old Shawano man and a 64-year-old Shawano woman in the van were transported to hospitals with serious injuries. The pickup truck was driven by a 65-year-old Black Creek man, who was uninjured.

Highway 47 was closed to traffic until almost 4:30 p.m. for crash reconstruction.

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Higher lake levels could be approved this month

SAWM annual meeting attendees get review of recent agreement

The ongoing discussion over water levels on Shawano Lake could be resolved within the month, members of Shawano Area Waterways Management learned June 5 during the nonprofit's annual meeting at Smalley Park.

Eagle Creek Renewable Energy (ECRE) has submitted a request for a two-year amendment to its current permit that would bring water levels in Shawano Lake, the channel and the Wolf River pool above the dam to its historical level of 802.9 feet above mean sea level (msl) year-round. The level was drawn down to 802.5 above msl in 2015, starting a lengthy controversy.

The Federal Energy Resources Commission plans to expedite the ECRE request, which has the support of SAWM, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and a number of local fishing groups.

SAWM board member Jeff Puissant walked the group through the details of the recent agreement, saying the ultimate goal is a permanent agreement to keep the waterways at their historic level.

"The DNR is supportive from a biological standpoint — that's a very, very key word. They do continue to express concerns about what that level will do to FEMA flood-plain mapping," Puissant said. "If we were required to do full updating of the mapping, that would cost us about a quarter of a million dollars, which obviously as a small association is way beyond what we could manage."

A meeting is being organized later this month with city, county, village and town officials to explain the agreement to them, he said.

The current flood plain as defined by the Federal Emergency Management Agency is 804 feet above msl, just over an inch higher. But Puissant said since the dam was automated about six years ago, it's proved very reliable at maintaining water levels.

"Their concern is if we're starting 4-5 inches higher, do they need to adjust the mapping?" he said. "Our belief is now that the dam has proved that

it's automated, that they can manage the water level extremely well, and so I think it's a non-event. But I'm not a scientist or a dam operator by any means; we're just using human logic."

If the federal commission approves the higher level, the river will rise in a matter of hours, although the lake will take weeks, or longer if it's hot and dry, Puissant said.

DNR Conservation Warden Clark Delzer said it's been a long, involved process.

"I do want to thank you guys for the time and effort, the many meetings that a lot of you have attended to get that amendment. I know that's not easy sometimes, working with those large agencies," Delzer said. "I'm on the lake all the time and I know how shallow it can get, so I definitely understand the concerns."

The warden spoke at the annual meeting to review DNR regulations that boaters need to follow, including requirements for 100 feet between personal watercraft, the fact that the legal limit for blood alcohol content is the same on the water as on the road

(0.08%), and the threshold for what makes a boating accident reportable — \$2,000 in damage and/or injury.

He applauded the 150 or so SAWM members for their active involvement in the issues.

"I've spent a lot of time at different lake association meetings, and it's always really refreshing to come to one where there's a lot of people," Delzer said. "The fact that I had to park two blocks away is a good thing. That really shows that you guys care about our waterways and, you know, put in the time and commitment to make these waterways the best that they can be."

Tim Day reported on the recently completed draft of SAWM's strategic management plan for the next 10 years, saying that it will be a valuable document to guide the group's activities.

"We can focus our efforts better when we have a road map on things like the native invasive plants, water quality and clarity — and that includes things like the water level issue — recreation navigation, the

fishery, shoreline development and education."

Having a comprehensive plan also makes SAWM eligible for a variety of DNR grants, Day said. The plan is expected to go before the group's board for approval later this month, after which it will be distributed to stakeholders and posted on SAWM's website.

The key takeaway from the plan, Day said, is that Shawano Lake contains excellent water quality, especially compared to other shallow, low-land drainage lakes in the state.

Gary DeFere, the group's president, said the turnout at Smalley Park was about average for an annual meeting, in part because of the outdoor setting without the food spread that has been traditional when the group holds its annual meeting indoors. The warm sunny weather was ideal, he said.

"We thought we'd try it outside because of all the crud going on," DeFere said. "We couldn't ask for a better setting."

High-speed chases on rise in county

Bieber wants more deputies so they can focus on traffic patrols, ticketing offenders

The Shawano County Sheriff's Department is seeing an increase in high-speed chases, and it is asking for more punitive consequences in the hopes of getting people to slow down on the county's roads.

"This is something that the district attorney is going to work on with higher punishment rates for folks that take off on law enforcement," Sheriff Adam Bieber said June 2, at the county's public safety committee meeting.

Bieber recounted one instance where a deputy was responding to a call for a domestic disturbance on Lake Drive in the Town of Wescott when the driver of the vehicle in front of him suddenly took off at high speed. That vehicle eventually crashed, he said.

"Our guy wasn't chasing him; he just took off," Bieber said. "We've had other high-speed chases, and it's very concerning."

There was another high-speed chase recently that came from Oconto County, the sheriff noted. The case was a peeping tom incident in Gillett and one where folks were concerned about a possible kidnapping, he said.

"That was a very long chase that ended over on (state Highway) 47, when we were able to spike his vehicle," Bieber said.

Shawano County is seeing this problem because other counties have adopted a no-chase policy for its law enforcement, according to Bieber. Many times when someone drastically increases speed, other law enforcement agents will let the vehicle go.

"We're seeing the problem here," Bieber said. "Imagine the Gillett case. You had a guy who was possibly trying to kidnap kids. If you don't stop that guy at that time, you could lose him, and he could have someone kidnapped or locked in the trunk area. You can lose valuable evidence if you just let someone go like that."

The county does not always give chase, Bieber noted, with action determined on a case-by-case basis. Determining factors include the amount of traffic on the road and whether the incident is taking place at a school before or after it's in session.

"We can call off a chase if we think it is too dangerous for the public," Bieber said.

The sheriff's department recently changed its policy about car vs. deer crashes, with deputies only responding if someone is injured or if the road is blocked. Bieber said that should help to free up deputies for other things like traffic patrols.

Reckless driving is the No. 2 complaint that deputies are called to, according to Bieber, with most of them speeding. The No. 1 call is crashes, he added.

"I get about a dozen calls for speeding and extra patrols," he said. "In my opinion, that's the No. 1 concern of our public is traffic safety."

Bieber told the committee that he could hire three extra deputies, solely tasked with traffic control, and the tickets they'd write up could easily make up the salaries and benefits the county would have to provide. He said he could put them on U.S. Highway 45 and state highways 47 and 29, where the speeding incidents are the most frequent and egregious.

"This county definitely needs it," Bieber said. "We have eight to nine state roads that run through Shawano County, and we're unique because no other county has that many. We have a lot of traffic that criss-crosses through our county, and it's a concern. It's on county roads, as well."

The sheriff said he'd be willing to work with the Shawano County Board of Supervisors on a proposal to get more deputies and have them focus on speeding and other traffic violations.

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Sheriff's department needs to replace body cams

Company that furnished current cameras defunct; ARA funding eyed to pay for project

The Shawano County Sheriff's Department has received preliminary approval to replace cameras for deputies, squad vehicles and the sheriff's office itself to the tune of over \$460,000.

The county's public safety committee gave its blessing June 2 after learning that the existing cameras were provided by a company that no longer exists. As such, the department can no longer get replacements when current cameras are damaged.

Chief Deputy George Lenzner told the committee that the replacement project would not be able to wait indefinitely.

"This is a project that, next year, we're going to have to do," Lenzner said. "The body cams that we have, the company is defunct. We're having a hard time getting replacements."

The body cams are utilized as digital evidence with the Shawano-Menominee County District Attorney's office, according to Lenzner. So having functional cameras are

essential to making cases.

The current body cams desired by the sheriff's department are already being utilized by Shawano Police Department and Bonduel Police Department, and the purchase would be extended to the Stockbridge-Munsee Police Department, Lenzner said.

"It's something that, in this day and age, I can't imagine us going without body cams," Lenzner said. "We can't get this from our own budget."

Lenzner said he was hopeful that some of the \$4 million the county has received from the American Rescue Act could go toward the large expense. He said the replacement would include deputy body cams, cameras in squad vehicles and even the cameras in the interrogation room.

"If that, for some reason, doesn't meet the definition of what we can get with this money, we could go on the capital improvement plan, just to be safe," Lenzner said, noting that the committee's approval was for the capital improvement funds as a safeguard.

The \$460,000 would cover the cameras for a five-year period, accord-

ing to Lenzner. He noted that it could be done in one lump sum if the ARA mandates it, as the five-year period includes an annual subscription fee.

Supervisor Tom Kautza suggested that, if the ARA funding guidelines would not allow the body cams to be purchased, the county might consider getting a grant through the state. He noted that the grants have preliminary approval from the Wisconsin Assembly Criminal Justice and Public Safety Committee, as of May 27.

"Currently, the use of body cameras is not mandated in Wisconsin," Kautza said. "However, if an agency does utilize this technology, the state does mandate the agency to have written policy regarding use and storage of cameras, limitations on officers that wear the cameras and record retention."

Lenzner said it was unlikely the state would assist, noting the Outagamie County Sheriff's Department is funding its camera replacement on its own, and the Brown County Sheriff's Department is getting some assistance through the Green Bay Packers.

"We don't have the spare body

cams anymore," Lenzner said. "When one's down, we have the problem of officers going out there without body cams now. With all the lawsuits going on in the state, I don't think it's something we want to get into."

Administrative Coordinator James Davel pointed out that while depending on money from the federal government carries its share of risk, he believes the ARA funds would be the best option to get the sheriff's department the cameras it needs. Even if the project gets approval from the capital improvement projects committee, that doesn't then prohibit the county using ARA money instead.

"It's a big bill, but it's something we really need," Davel said. "As we get into this, the amount of video that's asked for in the short time I've been coordinator, it's amazing how many times video has come up, and attorneys are asking for the video. In the age of the lawsuit, and specifically what law enforcement goes through, I think it's a very beneficial thing to our team here."

Jail staff getting thin, sheriff's department warns

Higher pay in private sector, issues with inmates among reasons officers leaving

The Shawano County Jail is losing staff at a concerning pace for the sheriff's department, and a number of factors are at work.

Four corrections officers have resigned recently, including two in the last week, Chief Deputy George Lenzner told the county's public safety committee on June 2. He noted there were five new applications for the positions, so he's hoping to fill some of the slots.

"We're going to get some interviews set up very, very quickly,"

Lenzner said.

Also vacant is a mental health coordinator position, which Lenzner reported had no applicants as of the meeting.

The jail administrator, Greg Nelson, is retiring on July 1, and there is currently one applicant to replace him, according to Sheriff Adam Bieber.

One of the resignations came due to getting a better paying job and better benefits at Walmart, according to Lenzner and Administrative Coordinator James Davel.

Supervisor Theresa Serrano, who has been a fierce advocate for the county's law enforcement, was appalled at the news.

"You make more at McDonald's than you can as a county employee," Serrano said.

Davel noted that the resignations include day shift jail workers, which

he noted was unusual, as it's the night shift that is typically more stressful on staff.

Bieber noted that it wasn't just the pay that was causing jail employees to flee. He cited two or three inmates and their demeanor were a factor.

"Their frustrations are with some of the inmates that have been locked up for quite a while," Bieber said. "There's nothing we can do about that."

Lenzner noted that the problem inmates are locals waiting to go off to prison, but with the pandemic forcing the courts to hold off on trials for a year, jail prisoners have been inside longer than normal. Some have been in jail for more than 18 months.

Bieber said he has met with the jail staff to brainstorm solutions, but there are some issues that are difficult to resolve.

"Right now, we're at a critical spot,"

Bieber said. "There's low morale, so we're hoping we can find good leadership with this new jail administrator position that will bring in a new perspective, hopefully."

Bieber also urged the committee to look at a way around the county's current hiring policy, which requires interviews to happen on a set day rather than trying to accommodate applicants' schedules.

"If we set a date, some of these people have already gone and taken jobs somewhere else," Bieber said. "If the date doesn't work for a person, we need to be flexible enough to invite them in for a one-on-one interview. That doesn't necessarily go with our ordinance. We don't have people knocking down the door to get in here. They have other options."

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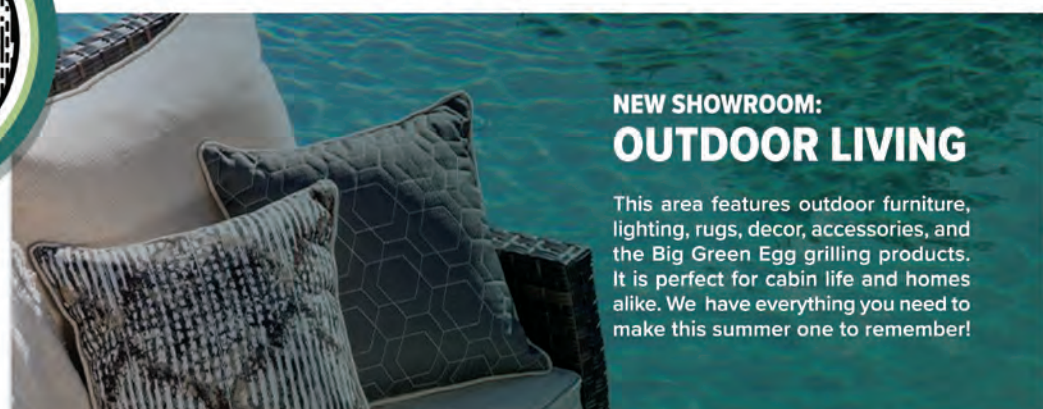
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Field day looks at protecting water quality

On June 24, from 4:30-7:30 p.m., a field day will showcase how the practices utilized by local farmers are protecting local water quality and how others can help at home.

Speakers will provide more details about the types of farming practices, their importance to soil health, and how homeowners can improve the soil health and decrease the run-off at their homes.

The field day will start at Tauchen Harmony Valley, W2648 River Road, Bonduel. The Tauchens are using no-till, interseeding, and grazing to increase their soil health, increase infiltration, and decrease large run-off events.

The second location, starting at 6:30, is the Muellers Farm, W5497 County Road BE, Shawano. The Muellers are using grazing techniques to ensure their dairy cows are happy and healthy. Grazing also adds the benefit of continual ground cover to help slow down and stop any large run-off events.

Water quality has been a growing concern for watershed residents and farmers. In 2019, the Upper Fox and Wolf River Watershed Demonstration Farms Network was established by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA NRCS) and Waupaca County Land

and Water Conservation Department, in partnership with Fond du Lac, Green Lake, Marquette, Outagamie, Portage, Shawano, and Winnebago counties and the Green Lake Association.

The mission of the network is to demonstrate to farmers and general public that the right combination of traditional conservation practices and other innovative technologies functioning on the landscape can produce viable and sustainable economic and environmental benefit. There are 10 demo farms located within the watershed. Here in Shawano County, Tauchen Harmony Valley is a participating farm.

"Due to having such few members, we were able to get to know each other very well," Hoffman said. "All of our memories have helped us gain skills to use as an advantage to succeed at our different college and career choices."

She went on to say how many different personalities are together in the small graduating class.

"For such a small class size, we are very different," said Hoffman. "We have different passions, career paths, college choices, skills, interests, fami-

lies and friends, but we all came from the same place. We grew up together, and I am honored that we all get to graduate together."

Scholarship awards were also handed out to qualifying recipients. This was highlighted by 13 of the graduating seniors, who were entering some form of education, receiving a scholarship from the Gresham scholarship fund.

Former Gresham teacher Michael Phillips was the guest speaker at the graduation ceremony, and instead of giving a traditional speech, Phillips created a slideshow with each graduate's face photoshopped on a Marvel superhero. Phillips talked about the resilience that the graduating class went through in a pandemic.

"You sometimes may have wanted to escape into an alternate reality," said Phillips. "You always remembered that with great power, comes great responsibility. And in the end, we can't wait to see all of the marvelous things you'll do in this universe."

Gresham Superintendent Newell Haffner fought back tears as he gave a speech about what the 2021 graduating class meant to him, as well as shared a memory of each of the 14 graduates.

"You guys are awesome," said Haffner. "It was an honor to teach you, to be a principal to you, to be a superintendent to you. Just remember that you are also awesome, every single one of you."

Valedictorian Addison Boucher gave a speech wishing her fellow graduates "good luck" on their first few steps into the real world.

"Seniors, we are going to face new challenges, try new things and make new friends," said Boucher. "What we need to remember is that we can do this. There is so much to see out there, and graduating high school is just the beginning of our journey. I think we are all going to love what the future holds."

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Museum tells story of Menominee clans

Exhibit in Oshkosh opens to acclaim, powwow as it features James Frechette's carvings

It's rare for a museum to open a new exhibit with a powwow.

In this case, though, Oshkosh Public Museum wouldn't have opened up its exhibit on the Menominee Clans Story any other way.

The new exhibit, featuring over 30 wood carvings created by the late Menominee artist James Frechette that symbolized the various clans and the story itself told in audio in both the English and Menominee languages, opened June 5 with a powwow taking place outside on the grass. Vendors sold Native jewelry, clothing and other attire, and a frybread stand greeted visitors when they crossed the street from the parking lot.

Of all of the exhibits that the museum has opened, this one was the most important to get right, according to director Brad Larson. Oshkosh, like most northeast Wisconsin communities, sits on Menominee ancestral land, and even though it's no longer land specifically for the tribe, Larson felt it was important to honor the people who walked the land centuries earlier.

"We could have had a smaller exhibit opening, but we didn't want to. We wanted to do it right," Larson said. "We really wanted to honor the clans and the Menominee, and we knew the way to do that is through this powwow. Anything else would be second rate, and we just didn't want to do second rate."

The museum has enjoyed a lengthy relationship with the Menominee tribe, dating back to almost when the facility opened in 1924, according to Larson. Oshkosh has a number of collections that are deeply intertwined with the Menominee culture, he said, with some of it available for people to see in the People of the Waters exhibit one floor down from the clans exhibit.

Richard Frechette, James' son, noted his father started learning about the clans and art when he was very young. He said that James would visit tribal elders and listen to them tell stories in the 1930s and 1940s. The son then learned of the stories from his father.

"He didn't know he was going to do a project like this," Frechette said. "When he went to start carving, he didn't carve. He started painting. Then he decided to carve, and it wasn't just carving. He did in-depth research on every figure. He drew numerous

drawings — very detailed drawings — of how each figure is and what that carving represented in the clans. Then it went off from there."

Frechette sees his father's work as a way to keep the Menominee culture alive. He said that his father left nothing to chance and would not stop until the figures were perfect.

"Everything he did was very de-

tailed," Frechette said. "He did everything very meticulously."

James Frechette has had a powerful influence on his son, even after passing in 2006.

"I have a picture of him and Mom," Richard Frechette said. "Every morning, I turn to the right, and I see them."

Karen Hoffman, who claims she's just nosy but is also part of the

Frechette family through marriage, said that the exhibit seemed destined to be, although it baffled her how it all came together.

"It was a really organic development of disparate pieces that seemed to come together," Hoffman said. "It was not random and not really happenstance, but not really planned, either."

Hoffman said that James Frechette's work is "huge" to breaking down stereotypes about the Menominee and Native Americans in general.

"Too many people don't realize that Native people still exist, and when they think of us, they think that we're either in the past or locked away on some prison camp reserve," Hoffman said. "They don't realize we work at Toyota. We work at Phillip Morris. We're out and about. We're artists."

Richard Frechette and Hoffman both felt palpable emotion at the powwow during the family dance. Hoffman recalled flippantly saying beforehand that James would be dancing with them that day, but it turned out to be true for them.

"It brought a tear to my eye, I can tell you that," Frechette said. "It was hard to fight it back."

This is our twentieth Annual Drinking Water Quality Report. We want you to be informed about the water we deliver and you use every day. The Consumer Confidence Report is available to the public upon request. We are dedicated to providing you, our customer, with safe, clean and high quality drinking water. We want to share with you the results of our efforts. If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact the Director of Public Works at (715) 526-3512. To learn more, please attend any of our regularly scheduled Field Committee meetings. The meetings are usually held the last Tuesday of each month at 8:00a.m. at the Public Works Department, 2905 E. Richmond St., Shawano. The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources website is also a great source of information on drinking water. Where Our Water Comes From

The City of Shawano Public Works Department owns and operates the water supply and distribution system for most of the City of Shawano. The area along Green Bay Street east of Waukechon St. is served by Shawano Lake Sanitary District. The Shawano water system presently consists of four active ground water wells constructed in the Elk Mound Group of the Cambrian Sandstone, a 500,000 gallon elevated storage tank, a 2 million gallon ground storage reservoir and the water distribution system. The distribution system consists of approximately 58 miles of water main. The system pumps 1.5 million gallons of water per day from our four wells. The employees at the Shawano Public Works Department work around the clock to provide top quality water to every tap. We ask that all our customers help us protect our water sources, which are the heart of our community, our way of life and our children's future.

Educational Information

Sources of drinking water both tap water and bottled water include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which shall provide the same protection for public health.

DPW Tests for Water Quality

The DPW staff monitors many different contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State Laws. In addition, we also monitor on a weekly basis for potential harmful bacteria. Out of all the constituents that we are required to test, none were in violation. The EPA has determined that your water is safe at these levels. We are proud to report that the water provided by the City of Shawano meets or exceeds established Federal and State water quality standards.

Current Tests Results

Here are the number of contaminants that were required to be tested in the last five years. This report may contain up to five years worth of water quality results. If a water system tests annually, or more frequently, the results from the most recent year are shown. If testing is done less frequently, the results shown are from the past five years.

Definitions of Terms

In the previous table you may have found many terms and abbreviations you were not familiar with. To help you better understand these terms, we've provided the following definitions:

Action Level (AL) - The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) - Highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) - The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter - One part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l) - One part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

Picocuries per liter (pCi/L) - A measure of the radioactivity in water.

Total Coliform Rule (TCR) - A measure of testing that has been performed since the early 20th century.

Treatment Technique (TT) - A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Additional Health Information

Inorganic Contaminants

Arsenic. Some people who drink water containing arsenic in excess of the MCL over many years could experience skin damage or problems with their circulatory system, and may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

Barium. Some people who drink water containing barium in excess of the MCL over many years could experience an increase in their blood pressure.

Chromium. Some people who use water containing chromium well in excess of the MCL over many years could experience allergic dermatitis.

Copper. Copper is an essential nutrient, but some people who drink water containing copper in excess of the action level over a relatively short amount of time could experience gastrointestinal distress. Some people who drink water containing copper in excess of the action level over many years could suffer liver or kidney damage. People with Wilson's Disease should consult their personal doctor. Drinking Softened water may raise your exposure to higher levels of copper.

Fluoride. Some people who drink water containing fluoride in excess of the MCL over many years could get bone disease, including pain and tenderness of the bones. Children may get mottled teeth.

Lead. Infants and children who drink water containing lead in excess of the action level could experience delays in their physical or mental development. Children could show slight deficits in attention span and learning abilities. Adults who drink this water over many years could develop kidney problems or high blood pressure. Lead in drinking water is rarely the sole cause of lead poisoning, but it can add to a person's total lead exposure. Infants and young children are typically more vulnerable to lead in drinking water than the general population. It is possible that lead levels at your home may be higher than at other homes in the community as a result of materials used in your home's plumbing. If you are concerned about elevated lead levels in your home's water, you may wish to have your water tested. All potential sources of lead in the household should be identified and removed, replaced or reduced. Additional information is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (1-800-426-4791) or from the EPA's web site at www.epa.gov/safewater/lead.

Nitrate. Nitrate in drinking water at levels above 10 ppm is a health risk for infants of less than 6 months of age. High nitrate levels in drinking water can cause blue baby syndrome. Nitrate levels may rise quickly for short periods of time because of rainfall or agricultural activity. If you are caring for an infant, you should ask advice from your health care provider. Females who are or may become pregnant should not consume water with nitrate concentrations that exceed 10 ppm. There is some evidence of an association between exposure to high nitrate levels in drinking water during the first weeks of pregnancy and certain birth defects. The Wisconsin Department of Health Services recommends people of all ages avoid long-term consumption of water that has nitrate levels greater than 10 milligrams per liter (mg/L).

The **Total Coliform Rule** requires water systems to meet a stricter limit for coliform bacteria. Coliform bacteria are usually harmless, but their presence in water can be an indication of disease-causing bacteria. When coliform bacteria are found, special follow-up tests are performed to determine if harmful bacteria are also present in the water supply. If this limit is exceeded, the water supplier must notify the public by newspaper, television or radio. DPW treats the water with chlorine as a disinfectant. We are not required to add chlorine, but do so as a precautionary measure.

MCL's are set at very stringent levels. To understand the possible health effects described for many regulated constituents, a person would have to drink 2 liters of water every day at the MCL level for a lifetime to have a one-in-a-million chance of developing the described health effect.

Drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some constituents. It's important to remember that the presence of these constituents does not necessarily pose a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's safe drinking water hot line (1-800-426-4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers.

EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Environmental Protection Agency's safe drinking water hotline (1-800-426-4791) or from their web site at www.epa.gov/safewater/hfacts.html.

As you can see by the table, our system has no violations. We're proud that your drinking water meets or exceeds all Federal and State Requirements.

All sources of drinking water are subject to potential contamination by constituents that are naturally occurring or manmade. Constituents can be microbes, organic or inorganic chemicals, or radioactive materials.

The fact that our system is based on deep well water reduces the risk of certain contaminants associated with surface water systems, such as cryptosporidium.

The SCADA systems controls the wells, reservoir and water tower. The SCADA system provides alarms when the tower level is too high or low and when there is a power outage that requires the operators to use standby generators.

The City is committed to providing quality water to the residents of Shawano and from time to time extensive maintenance must be completed to maintain our high level of quality. Lead Consumer Notice

During the year, we failed to provide timely lead results to persons served at the sites that were tested as required by the Lead and Copper Rule. However, we did provide these results and also provided 2020's results in a timely fashion.

What's new for 2021

Water main replacements that are coordinated with 2021 street reconstruction projects are in the following areas: Circle Drive, The 1 and 200 blocks of S. Smalley St, the 800 block of Lieg Avenue and the 400 block of W. Division St. In March the City also started replacing lead water services for homeowners that have lead services. There is no cost to the homeowner for this.

All wells have been maintained based on the DNR recommended schedule.

The DPW provides clean safe water to all its customers. We are also responsible to inspect the plumbing in your building to make sure that there is no possibility that it could contaminate the city water supply. Cross-Connection inspections will be done at approximately 200 businesses and 300 residences during 2021. If your home or business is to be inspected this year you will be notified by mail to schedule an inspection. If you would like to have your home or business inspected for a lead water service, please call DPW to schedule that inspection.

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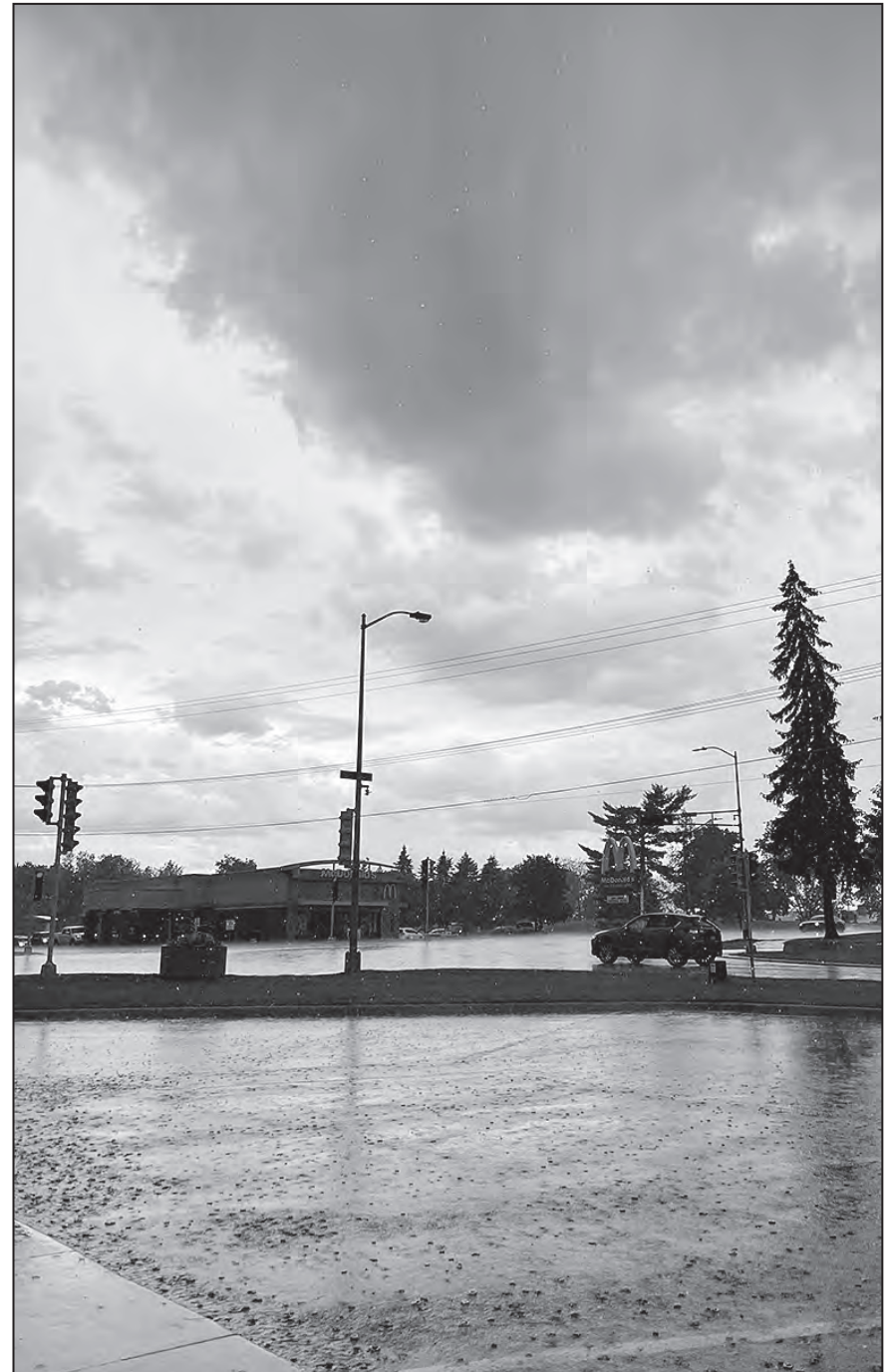

3 Menominee tribal officials suspended by legislature

Tribal Administrator Jonathan Wilber, Human Resources Director Tasha Caldwell and an administrative planner with the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin have all been suspended with pay, according to a press release from the tribe.

The release, posted on the tribe's Facebook page, claims that the suspensions are based on a series of facts revealed recently but does not give

specific details about those facts or allegations. The Menominee Tribal Legislature has ordered internal investigations, according to the release, and it will consider further action once the investigations are complete.

The tribe has made interim appointments to keep the government running, according to the release, but it does not specify who is taking charge.

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Educating culturally responsive teachers

Dr. Lauren “Candy” Waukau-Villagomez is a “change agent” for Native American education. In the administrative world, that moniker refers to someone who is hired from outside an organization to be a catalyst for reinvention. For the College of Menominee Nation professor known endearingly as “Dr. Candy,” it means transforming the Western model of education into one that produces culturally responsive teachers.

Serving for the past decade on CMN’s teacher education faculty, Waukau-Villagomez’s commitment to empower future educators has not gone unnoticed in our community. Yet, this year was one in which she was justly lauded.

In April, Waukau-Villagomez was recognized as the 2021 Wisconsin Indian Education Association’s Indian Elder of the Year Award winner, and this past May, she was presented with CMN’s Faculty of the Year Award. While Waukau-Villagomez appreciates the awards, the praise for her efforts is not what motivates her.

“I love teaching,” she said. “I come from a family of educators, and we each try to empower our young people

fessional calling.

“My mother ran the Head Start Program on the reservation as a part of The War on Poverty. She served as the director for at least 25 years,” she said. “My stepfather didn’t graduate from school, but he was a traditional teacher who’d joke he earned a degree from the school of hard knocks.

“My mother and stepfather had a strong belief in the necessity of educating young people and helping all Menominee people to aspire to something beyond what they were doing. My sisters, Lynn Skenadore, Lisa Waukau, Leslie Teller and I all became teachers. My daughter, Samantha Villagomez, is a special education teacher at the Menominee Tribal School.”

Waukau-Villagomez explained that

to be excellent teachers and leaders in their schools and in the community.”

Waukau-Villagomez credits her mother and stepfather, Delores and Mani Boyd, for her pro-

the trauma of previous generations’ Western education resonates with their descendants.

“Education is still difficult for Natives because of the Boarding Schools whose goal was to change Native children into the white man’s image,” she said. “It didn’t work for many because Natives were too resistant. Native people want an education, but not accultural assimilation.”

Waukau-Villagomez received a bachelor’s degree in child development and preschool from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, a master’s degree in guidance and counseling from the University of Wisconsin-Stout, a master’s degree in special education from D’Youville College in Buffalo, New York, and her doctorate in educational administration from Penn State.

Waukau-Villagomez conveyed that, while her educational journey wasn’t always easy, it was necessary for her to become the educator she wanted to.

“When things were difficult, I would tell myself that if Grandfather Keshena could make it through Carlisle Indian School, I could make it through Penn State,” she said.

Waukau-Villagomez’s first post-doctorate employer was the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota, which was followed with a stint serving the Lac du Flambeau Indian Reservation in northern Wisconsin. Next, Waukau-Villagomez joined the faculty of her alma mater, D’Youville College, which included teaching future Canadian educators who came to the United States to earn their teaching licenses. In those positions,

Waukau-Villagomez honed her skills for changing a process to reflect the value a strong education brings to a community.

While reflecting on teaching with her sister, Lisa Waukau, the two siblings recognized the necessity of using the regional language known as Menominee Indian English versus teaching solely within the American Standard English vernacular.

“We found that Menominee students learn best from hearing stories read aloud — which is, of course, reflective of the oral tradition,” Waukau-Villagomez said. “They can then discuss concepts using the Menominee Indian English they grew up with. For formal presentations, we expect American Standard English. My daughter, Samantha, recognized this process as the ‘code switching’ required in academia.”

Waukau-Villagomez is happy to be sharing her knowledge as a member of the CMN faculty.

“I love what I do, and I know that my mother and stepfather would be proud that I am helping to train pre-service teachers in the Menominee community,” she said. “I am happy to teach non-Natives too. All teachers need an education that values and responds to cultural differences.”

Waukau-Villagomez’s stepfather gave her the name, Keskesakaeh, which means “the time just before dawn.” The name is prescient, as it evokes the image of a change agent for Native American education that Waukau-Villagomez embodies.

Oh My Peonies prepares for busy summer

Marion flower farm contains 2,000 plants with 150 types of flowers

A local flower farm is looking forward to a busy summer.

Oh My Peonies, located just outside of Marion, is operated by siblings Lee Mielke and Sue Anderson who grew up in the farm house on the property.

In 2000, Mielke started to plant peonies to brighten up the community. He planted peonies while working a job as a farmer. In 2014, he retired from his job and ultimately decided to focus on the peonies. Mielke had originally planted irises, but after troubles with those, he switched to peonies.

"Irises take too much work and too long to bloom," said Mielke. "With peonies, you do not have to tear them out of the ground every year."

Anderson mentioned that Mielke constantly planted more peonies every year. The farm currently houses 2,000 plants with 150 varieties of flowers.

Oh My Peonies is run as a business, where customers are able to order flowers, cut their own or just come to see all of the various peonies in bloom.

The cut-their-own flower option started in response to the COVID-19 pandemic that began in March 2020.

"A lot of people were itching to just get out and be out in the open," said Anderson. "This was a wonderful place for them to come and tour and see the beauty of nature."

Due to the success of the cut-their-own flower events, Mielke and Anderson decided to run that again in 2021.

Anderson said that flowers are often cut for special events, like weddings and other ceremonies. She added that customers are welcome to come to the farm, where they can pick out flowers to take or to visit their website, <https://www.ohmypeonies.com>, where the flowers can be ordered and shipped.

Mielke mentioned that the flowers normally bloom in early to mid-June. With this timeline, Anderson anticipates that June weekends will be very busy.

"People really want to be able

to come and view the garden," said Anderson. "It is a great time for them to walk around and view the gardens with the different varieties of flowers."

According to Anderson, Oh My Peonies has turned into a destination for people outside of Shawano County to visit.

"I was just talking to a girl who is coming from Upper Michigan," said Anderson. "We have people coming from upper Illinois and the La Crosse area; we have had people travel from four hours away to come here for the day."

Anderson said that she constantly updates the website, as well as their

Facebook page, <https://www.facebook.com/search/top?q=oh%20my%20peonies>, in order to keep people outside of Shawano County informed about the farm.

With word spreading around and the positive experiences that customers have had at Oh My Peonies, Anderson said that they are receiving order requests from Jan. 1 all the way until the end of the year.

Anderson mentioned that people within the community love seeing the bright colors of the flowers as well as enjoying the aroma.

"People love being able to see Mother Nature at her best," said Anderson. "There are different things that people like about the peonies, like the scent and the peonies' calming presence."

She added that some visitors were able to bring family members and friends out of nursing homes during the pandemic to have a calming experience.

During the pandemic, Oh My Peonies ran in conjunction with Wiscon-

sin's mandates regarding when public places could reopen. They were able to reopen in June 2020. Anderson said that staff and customers felt safe enough during the pandemic due to everyone being outside and socially distant.

With more people getting vaccinated and more people wanting to get outside, Mielke and Anderson expect to see a very busy summer.

According to Anderson, peonies thrive in Wisconsin due to our state's specific growing conditions.

"Wisconsin has just the right weather, in terms of a dormant season," said Anderson. "We do have freezing during the fall and winter months — the roots actually have their best growth period during the fall months."

She added that all of the feedback from customers has been positive.

"We have customers who come back year after year," said Anderson. "The people traveling from La Crosse often say it was worth the road trip."
