Speedway among gatherings tribe warns people to avoid

Health department never approved races or Shawano County Fair

Public health officials continue to warn against large gatherings in an effort to prevent the spread of COVID-19, but the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin has taken that guidance a step further with a plea for the public to avoid specific activities and events.

Dr. Amy Slagle, the tribe's COVID-19 incident commander, issued a statement Saturday imploring the public to "stay out of restaurants, bars, flea markets, races, parties and gatherings."

The Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Department issued guidance in May recommending against large gatherings in accordance with recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control.

The department reiterated that guidance in a press release Tuesday but did not go as far as warning against specific events or activities.

"As of right now, it is not recommended to have community events and gatherings," the press release stated.

However, Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Officer Vicki Dantoin said in an interview that she agrees with the more specific recommendations suggested by Slagle.

"I agree wholeheartedly with what she's saying," Dantoin said. "I agree people shouldn't be doing some of the stuff that's going on."

That includes Slagle's apparent reference to the Shawano Speedway races, which, Dantoin said, never had the health department's seal of ap-

proval to open.

The speedway did not require the health department's approval. The department only has the power to make recommendations.

"I never really said it was OK," Dantoin said. "They had some ideas for how they were going to keep people safe and that's what I recommended, so they took that as this was fine for us to do this. I never flat-out said that."

The Shawano Area Agricultural Society took that as a green light to go ahead with this year's county fair, according to agricultural president Dale Hodkiewicz, even though the health department had never been consulted.

"We talked with the health department on the races already, so we're confident we can go forward," Hodkiewicz said in an interview on June 19 announcing the Shawano County Fair would go forward.

That decision is entirely up to the agricultural society, which is not a part of Shawano County government.

An estimated 68,000 attendees visited the Shawano County Fair last year.

"A lot of folks are nervous about it, as am I," Dantoin said.

As of Tuesday, 53 of Wisconsin's 75 state, county and district fairs have canceled, modified or postponed their events for the 2020 fair season.

"We don't really have the ability to stop anything at this point," Dantoin said. "We can put orders out, but we have to be able to enforce those orders, and in order to enforce the orders, the county has to have ordinances or resolutions to allow that. We don't have that here yet."

County Administrative Coordinator Brent Miller confirmed that there is nothing on the books in Shawano County that gives the health department any authority to rule on what events or activities can or can't be held.

"We're one of about 68 counties in the state that have that, too," he said.

Miller said the Wisconsin Counties Association is in the process of working with attorneys and health officials to draft a generic ordinance for each county to review and tweak for each county's needs that would address that issue.

Miller said there was no timeline for when such an ordinance could be brought forward.

In the meantime, Dantoin said, her hands are tied as far as being able to enforce any public health orders.

"I can put out an order but I can't enforce it," she said. "That's the struggle for many counties. We're not the only county in that predicament."

Dantoin said the health department is also concerned about plans for the Shawano County Board to take up a proposed ordinance at its July 22 meeting establishing the county as a Second Amendment sanctuary.

Judging by the turnout at the committee level when that ordinance was discussed, the meeting could easily attract upwards of 100 attendees, well above what the health department would consider a large gathering.

County Board Chairman Tom Kautza announced his intention to have that on the July 22 agenda at the board's meeting last month.

Miller said he didn't know whether that was still the plan but said it would be Kautza's decision.

He said the Department of Administration did share its opinion with Kautza, but Miller would not make that opinion public.

Dantoin said Kautza has not contacted her for the health department's recommendation.

However, she said, "I would tell him it's not a good idea."

Kautza could not be reached for comment by press time.

Younger generations account for most COVID cases here

Health officials worried about ICU bed capacity

Younger generations have accounted for most of the confirmed cases of coronavirus in Shawano and Menominee counties so far, according to health officials.

The elderly population seen as being at most risk for serious illness or death as a result of COVID-19 have had relatively few cases, according to data released by the Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Department on June 25.

Of the 73 confirmed Shawano County cases reported on June 25, seven were under 20 years old; 28 were between 20 and 39 years old; nine were age 40-49; 13 were 50-59; 10 were 60-69; and five were over 70.

Health Officer Vicki Dantoin said the numbers are in sync with what is being seen across other Wisconsin counties.

"There have been more cases in that 20s, 30s age range," she said. "Sixty and above is not real high. That's why we haven't had more serious issues."

As of Tuesday, only 13 of the 77 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Shawano County as of Tuesday have required hospitalization. In Menominee County, there have been two hospitalizations out of eight cases.

"If we're able to keep the COVID away from those people at highest risk, that's the tactic we want to use," Dantoin said.

Dr. Amy Slagle of the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin's COVID-19 incident command issued a statement on June 27 calling for people to avoid restaurants, bars, flea markets, races and large gatherings primarily out of concern for a lack of intensive care facilities.

"You may not be afraid of COVID, but it could kill your elders and those with medical problems," Slagle wrote in her statement. "If they get sick, there may not be hospital beds for them."

ThedaCare Medical Center in Shawano has no ICU beds.

Fox Valley hospitals were already at 87% capacity with only 13 beds available as of June 27, according to Slagle.

"COVID infections are increasing and there is little hospital capacity to take care of those who are ill," Slagle said.

Menominee County, which has had relatively low numbers of confirmed COVID cases since the pandemic began, saw its cases jump from five to eight over the course of last weekend, according to health department data posted Monday.

With a population of about 4,500, according to 2019 estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau, Menominee County had a COVID case rate of 23 confirmed cases for every 100,000 people as of Monday.

According to the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, that puts Menominee County at about par with Shawano County at the moderate level of the case range.

Shawano County had recorded 77 confirmed COVID-19 cases as of Monday, or about 24 out of every 100,000 people, based on the county's population.

"Shawano is still logging one to two new cases a day," Dantoin said. "We're staying pretty consistent. It hasn't gone over that in a while, but that doesn't mean that can't happen at some point."

Dantoin said it's still early in the game for the coronavirus.

"The pandemic is still relatively fresh," she said.

Dantoin said Menominee County had done well with its lockdowns, curfews and other precautions, but two cases added in a single day last weekend "was quite a bit for them as a small community."

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Tribal police still looking for missing woman

Menominee Tribal Police have released new information in their continuing search for a woman missing since mid-June.

Police are asking for the public's assistance in locating 22-year-old Katelyn Kelley, who was last observed at her apartment in the city of Shawano between 11 p.m. on June 16 and 3 a.m. June 17.

The Shawano Police Department has been working with tribal police on the investigation.

police developed further information since the original report that Kelley was last seen on the Menominee Indian Reservation, in the area of County Road VV East and Silver Canoe Road, around

The case began when Kelley's mother reported her missing June 18.

Menominee Tribal Police have continued to follow up on tips received since then.

Police and other tribal entities have since scoured the roadways, forest areas and local bodies of water.

Kelley has not been located, and there have been no arrests in the investigation, police said.

Tribal police are asking that hunters, campers, boaters and area resi-

dents be vigilant and watchful while out in the area.

Police are also asking people to be alert for any signs of unusual activity. If anyone sees or finds anything suspicious or out of the ordinary, they should contact authorities immediately.

Tribal police will continue to investigate any information, tips and leads coming from the community.

Anyone with information or evidence regarding Kelley's disappearance should contact Menominee Tribal Police at 715-799-3881. Information received can be kept anonymous.

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Grignon receives national Leon Reano Award

MIHS teacher recognized for teaching Menominee language, culture

Ben Grignon, a culture and language teacher at Menominee Indian High School, has another award to add to his collection.

The former Wisconsin Teacher of the Year is receiving the Leo Reano Award, a human and civil rights award from the National Education Association. The award goes to individuals who have expanded educational opportunities for people of color and improved intergroup relations in public schools.

Any other year, Grignon would be on his way to Atlanta to receive the award in person. Due to the coronavirus pandemic, however, Grignon will be taking part in a virtual award ceremony.

"It's just kind of funny," Grignon said. "I was kind of looking forward to doing a little road trip. Things happen in the world, and we deal with them as we always have."

It's definitely not the first shift in plans for Grignon this year. With his language and culture classes, there is a lot of hands-on work as he incorporates art into learning about all things Menominee, but once the pandemic shut down all schools in the state in March, Grignon has had to figure out alternative ways to teach students.

"I'm trying to figure out how to best reach my students if we're unable to meet like we used to," Grignon said. "How do I teach traditional arts without having a hands-on aspect? That's everything that I've done for the last six or seven years. I have to adjust how I deliver, and it's going to take a lot of collaboration and reaching out in the community to figure out how we're going to do this."

Grignon noted that his ancestors had to learn to adapt to changes in the world, so it only makes sense that he has to do the same.

"It's within each of us as Menominee people and human beings to reach back and find answers from our history and our ancestors," Grignon said.

Grignon has kept busy with research since he won the Teacher of the Year award in 2018. That same year, he also received a \$12,000 fellowship from the Herb Kohl Educational Foundation.

"I've been looking at the different archives around the United States and really around the world, trying to find ideas for the kids and ideas for myself," Grignon said. "We're trying to reconnect with some of the arts that may have been set aside for a while. We're looking at community, too. There are also pockets of people who know so much, and they're sharing them with their children and grandchildren."

Grignon does all this on top of the classes that he teaches at MIHS. As the traditional arts teacher at the school, he teaches beadwork — he has beginning, intermediate and advanced classes. He also teaches a class called "wood, stone and bone" that he describes as experimental archaeology, where students try to recreate traditional artifacts.

There is also a traditional pottery class, and Grignon shows students how to make the clay the way their ancestors did it, using pit

firing to harden the clay. He also teaches about basketry and weaving, and he shows how to use plant materials to recreate the textiles needed for the baskets.

Grignon has a film class at the school where he showcases films of indigenous peoples and discusses how accurately they're portrayed. The course does not limit itself to American tribes; Grignon delves into the cultures of all First Peoples in the world.

Grignon also teaches through a language club with the Menominee County University of Wisconsin-Extension community.

"The recognition is great, and it brings a lot of much needed happiness around our arts, our culture, our traditions, our language, that they are being passed on, and that we're really thriving," Grignon said.

Wendell Waukau, superintendent for the Menominee Indian School District, is pleased that Grignon is being recognized on a

national level for his contributions to saving and restoring Menominee traditions and culture. Waukau described Grignon as an "ambassador for the community."

"We're excited," Waukau said. "What an honor for Ben and all the outstanding work that he has done. We have some really great teachers in the district, and Ben is so unique in his approach to teaching and learning. When he receives these awards, it's not just about his teaching; it's about so many other things. I know he looks at this like it's not just an award for him, it's an award for his students, his colleagues and his community."

The award Grignon is receiving is named after Leon Reano, a member of the Santo Domingo Indian Pueblo who dedicated his life to learning opportunities for Native American and Alaska Native children. Reano passed away in 1971.

Shawano area cubs rehabilitating in Rhinelander

Bears to be released into wild in mid-October

The illegal killing of an adult black bear sow on June 4 in the Town of Richmond left three cubs on their own. But with the help of a wildlife rehabilitation center, the three cubs are getting proper nourishment and care and will soon be back in the wild again.

The three cubs were safely and successfully captured and then relocated to Wild Instincts in Rhinelander soon after the incident took place.

"They are all doing very well," said Mark Naniot, the director of rehabilitation and co-founder — along with his wife Sharon Larson — of Wild Instincts.

"They've adjusted very well. They're growing very well."

Naniot said the cubs were given an injection upon their arrival to Rhinelander to rid them of worms, parasites, fleas and ticks before being placed in holding cages for a couple days to let the injection run its course.

The three cubs were then introduced to several other cubs on the property. As of June 23, Wild Instincts had 16 bear cubs on site.

Naniot said that cubs "really don't hurt each other. So it's just one big party all day long in there."

He also noted that people could check out their Facebook page — <https://www.facebook.com/wildinstinctswi/> — where videos of the cubs are posted from time to time.

The three cubs and any other bear cubs at the property, which are typically born around the second week of January, will be released back into the wild in mid-October.

At that time, Naniot said they will weigh over 100 pounds. When the three bear cubs arrived, their weight was between 12-15 pounds.

Between now and their release date, the bear cubs are treated daily with big bowls of food. Naniot said a good portion of what the bears consume while in their care is fruits and

vegetables, as that will be what they searching for when they are released back into the wild.

Wild Instincts tries to provide the cubs with as much of a natural setting as they can during their stay, limiting human interaction as much as possible so that they don't become too comfortable around humans.

While the public can't physically go see the cubs, which typically cost about \$3,000 to raise, according to Naniot, people can still lend a helping hand.

Wild Instincts is permitted by the state and federal government, but doesn't receive funding from them, instead relying upon donations, memberships and fundraisers, the last of which is not available in person this year because of the pandemic.

Gresham food pantry to go with the Flo

Facility to provide closer spot for residents to get food

Gresham area residents in need of food will soon be able to find support a little closer to home.

Work has begun to create the food pantry Flo'ing With Kindness, which will open Aug. 1. Community members have already started donating food, and the need is there, based on a food distribution effort that The FRESH Project has done in the community with Feeding America for more than two months, according to Barb Mendoza, organizer.

"When we started, we had 120 bags that we gave to the families," Mendoza said. "It eventually dropped to 90, but we're staying strong at 70."

Mendoza said that she consulted with Merrie Crawford during that time to see if a food pantry in Gresham was feasible.

"This is something that my husband and I have wanted to do," Mendoza said, noting that even though she's the executive director for The FRESH Project, Flo'ing With Kindness is a project separate from that Shawano-based program. "The need is definitely there."

The Shawano Area Food Pantry and Resource Center also suggested a food pantry in Gresham would help those families needing food but not having the ability to travel. Mendoza noted that some Gresham families turn to Tilleda for food assistance, but some cannot afford the gas to travel there and back every month.

So far, Flo'ing With Kindness has received community space on Main

The village is also purchasing several refrigerators for the pantry to use, according to Hoffman, and one village board member, Dave Winter, is donating a deep freezer to store meats and other perishable items. The local Abby Bank branch has also

provided monetary funds to help Flo'ing With Kindness start up.

"With the support from the village, my husband and I decided, 'Let's just do this,'" Mendoza said. "People knew that the need was there, but I don't think they realized how to put it together. I've had experience putting 501(c)(3) nonprofits together, and the paperwork and all that is tedious, but now we have that started."

The project is a personal one for Mendoza, who was born and raised in Gresham. When she's not working on The FRESH Project, she's a substitute teacher at Gresham Community School, so she has seen how much of a need there is for a food pantry.

The name of the pantry is in honor of Mendoza's mother, who she said always encouraged giving to the community.

"It's very humbling," she said. "My husband and I, we like to give back to the community, and we both like to

serve. It's just a good thing to do."

A food drive is planned for July 18 at 10 a.m. The pantry has already received a number of donations but organizers are eager to get more. Mendoza said that Dollar General is also setting up a cart for folks to donate food, and Gresham Townmart is also setting up an area for donations.

There will also be two opportunities for area families to sign up for services. The first is from 3-5 p.m. July 14, with the second event taking place from 6-7:30 p.m. Aug. 4.

Families will have the option of picking up food either on the first or third Thursdays of the month, according to Mendoza.

Once the food pantry has been in operation for six months, it will be eligible to receive discounted food from Feeding America, Mendoza said.

"They'll come, and they'll inspect the food pantry to make sure that we are in regulation," she said.

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Local schools figuring out best way to reopen

DPI guidelines provide some aid, but districts turn to community for help

Schools in the area are preparing for a new year, but it's not likely to be the same as in years past.

After almost four months without students attending daily classes in the buildings, school districts are trying to determine how to reopen the halls of learning while minimizing the risk of spreading coronavirus. The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction released guidelines to schools last week outlining the various steps needed to make sure education continues.

There are three recommended learning environments outlined by DPI — in-person learning, virtual learning, and physically distanced learning. The physically distanced learning would combine in-person and virtual learning by dividing students into shifts to reduce numbers in the classrooms at one time.

The guidelines are expected to help the schools determine what is the best method to bring school back into session, but for Wendell Waukau, superintendent for the Menominee Indian School District, he's going to let the community help determine which route should be taken and not let DPI make the decision for him.

"That's just what they are. They're guidelines," Waukau said. "We're working with our tribal leaders and our (COVID-19) incident command center. We know that any decisions we make have to be in consultation with them; these are public health experts."

Menominee Indian will have several contingency plans in place in case circumstances change, like the state closing schools again, or if an outbreak occurs at a school or affects a segment of a school. Waukau said he and other officials are reaching out to parents via a questionnaire to find out any concerns so they can determine solutions.

"We've got to have a plan, and we'll make it work," Waukau said.

At the Gresham School District, a committee of about 15 people is meeting with its superintendent, Newell Haffner, to determine which option fits best when the new school year begins in two months. Haffner said he hopes to have a plan to present to his school board in August, but he's not putting too much stock in the DPI guidelines.

"There's just so many things up in the air," Haffner said. "You have to develop four or five plans, to be honest, because you don't know what happens. You don't know if a staff member's going to get sick. If a kid gets diagnosed in this room, what are we going to do, and how are we going to get them all checked? There are so many open variables, it's ridiculous."

One thing Haffner hopes to focus on is internet accessibility, which has been an issue in rural areas. He said he has spoken with representatives from internet companies in the area and hopes to find a solution where any family that opts to stick with virtual learning will be able to access lessons and materials online.

"If we can't get a hotspot working at their house, then we'd have to make sure they're one of the few kids we have in the building," Haffner said.

Bonduel School District is also making plans for the new school year, but the mandate is to make in-person learning a top priority, according to Superintendent Joe Dawidziak. That is based on the overwhelming support from a parent survey sent out in June.

"We are going to develop a committee that's comprised of parents from both our district and St. Paul (Lutheran School) and some other stakeholders," Dawidziak said, noting the first meeting would be Tuesday and that a plan should be ready for a school board vote later this month or in early

August. "The thread through all of this is that there would be more harm not having school (in person) than having school."

Dawidziak noted that the final plan Bonduel develops would need a mental health component. It would also need to address any issues that he said have become "political," like whether the district would require masks or just recommend them.

The one constant, in Dawidziak's view, is that the district has to be prepared for circumstances to change.

"It seems like the one thing that's not going to change is that the answer to this question is going to change," he said.

Shawano School District is working on plans to utilize all three of the recommended learning environments. Superintendent Randi Anderson, in an email to the Leader, wrote that she would use guidance from the Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Department and the state Department of Health Services to develop the hybrid and in-person teaching plans.

"I anticipate that sometime during next year we will be in all three of the models," Anderson wrote, noting she planned to provide details to staff and the community by mid-July.

Anderson wrote that the district plans to provide iPads to Hillcrest Primary School students and Chromebooks to students at Olga Brener Intermediate School, setting them up to go home with students to be used.

Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District announced on its website that it intends to fully reopen for classroom instruction. Any final decisions are expected to be determined by the school board no later than August. The district said it would be posting weekly updates on its plans to reopen the schools.

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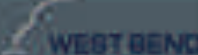

One family member told Watters, "I'm too old not to go," she said.

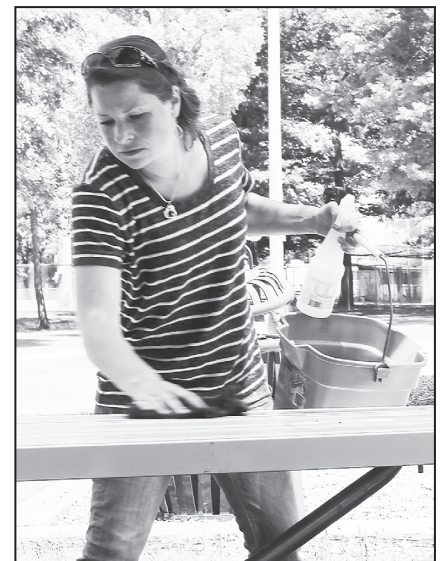
Holding the reunion outside helped to alleviate some concerns, she said. She also brought hand sanitizer and optional masks for attendees.

Clintonville takes 2nd at home tournament

Area schools won't compete during contact days

WIAA releases documents regarding reopening of sports, changes to winter sports

When the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association canceled the spring sports season in late April, it left open the opportunity for schools to be able to compete in some of those sports during a 30-day contact period in July.

The month of July is here and the option to compete in games against other high schools is still on the table, but none of the area high schools indicated that they would be participating.

The WIAA released guidance and recommendations to the state's high schools on June 18, with a goal of allowing athletes to practice and compete wherever it could be done safely this summer.

"It will be the decision of each school's district administrator to determine if athletics and other activities may operate in compliance with state, local and tribal health department directives as determined by each community's most current level of risk," the WIAA stated in its release.

"The health and safety of student-athletes, staff and community remains the top priority in determining all return-to-play considerations."

While auto racing has begun at Shawano Speedway and youth, high school and amateur baseball leagues have started up, spring sports athletes will not be afforded the chance to compete against other teams in July.

Had schools given spring sports teams the green light to compete, travel would have likely been limited as much as possible. With none of the 14 area high schools — Bonduel, Bowler, Clintonville, Gillett, Gresham, Lena, Marion, Menominee Indian, Oconto Falls, Shawano, Suring, Tigerton, Wittenberg-Birnamwood and Wolf River Lutheran — competing, teams would have likely needed to travel to

the Wausau, Green Bay and Appleton areas to find competition, where the number of COVID-19 cases is much higher.

Instead of using the contact day period to compete, schools will conduct practices if it is deemed safe to do so, like in past summers.

Bonduel Athletic Director Matt Dale said the school hoped to have an approved training plan in place after a school board meeting. "The main focus will be on skill and individual development."

The WIAA also identified the potential infection risk of all the sports played throughout the year, as recommended by the United States Olympic and Paralympic Committee in a 16-page document regarding the reopening of school sports.

Several spring sports fell under the moderate risk category (baseball, softball, soccer, tennis and a few field events). It was noted that some of the sports could become lower risk if equipment could be appropriately cleaned between competitors and if athletes wore masks.

Golf and track individual running events — and shot put and discus — were under the lower risk category because those could be done while practicing social distancing and without sharing equipment.

Down the road

Looking ahead to the WIAA fall and winter sports seasons, several aspects of competitions might look different.

To start, the sports being played during those times are listed as riskier.

Football, wrestling, competitive cheer and dance are all considered high risk, with basketball, volleyball and hockey under the moderate risk list.

Transportation to and from game sites is another point of emphasis for when competitions return, as social distancing is to be maintained on buses/vans.

"Multiple buses/vans and/or parental/guardian transportation will likely be needed," the document stated.

Social distancing during contests also needs to be maintained, so benches and sidelines might need to be extended in order to spread athletes and coaches out.

While fans at the Shawano Speedway or local baseball games are not limited, WIAA-sanctioned events for the upcoming 2020-21 school year could be played without fans.

The 16-page document listed three tiers of who should be allowed at events until state and local health departments lift restrictions on mass gatherings.

Athletes, coaches, officials, event

staff, medical staff and security are listed as essential and tier one. Media is tier two, with spectators and vendors deemed non-essential and tier three. Only tiers one and two will be allowed if restrictions are still in effect when WIAA fall sports competitions begin in August.

Girls state wrestling coming to state, plus other winter sports changes

The WIAA held its monthly meeting on June 24, making several changes to winter sports, the biggest being agreeing to add a state girls wrestling tournament.

The first girls state tournament is set for the 2021-22 season.

"I think it's so great for the sport that it was approved for a high school girls state tournament," said new Witt-Birn wrestling coach Duane Potrykus. "The numbers (of girl wrestlers) have been going up dramatically and this will only boost that. The main thing is it now gives that bridge between youth and college wrestling that is going to allow coaches to keep the girls out easier as they can have a goal to work for during their high school years."

Girls would still wrestle boys during the regular season, but female wrestlers would then compete in a separate postseason tournament than the boys.

Another big approval from the WIAA Board of Control was to implement a computerized seeding system for the girls and boys state basketball tournaments.

The WIAA hopes to have the system ready for the upcoming season, and no later than the 2021-22 season.

Extension for renewing expired driver licenses ends July 25

The Department of Natural Resources plans to treat 2,366 sites covering 199.6 acres of non-native common reed, or Phragmites australis var. australis, in wetlands, rights-of-ways, shorelines, public and private lands where written permission from landowners has been received. Non-native common reed is an invasive plant that overtakes native vegetation while providing little value as wildlife habitat. This project is an attempt to eliminate stands and seed sources in many counties to prevent a large-scale invasion as seen in other Great Lakes states.

Against all enemies or just some

Every person that enters the military takes the same oath to “solemnly swear that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic...”

I served in the military for 34 years and was honored with two combat commands. Liberals and conservatives have asked my thoughts about Gen. James Mattis and others. I asked one of the liberals if Mattis was believable because Mattis was critical of President Donald Trump. The response was that Mattis demonstrated compelling credibility based on logic and evidence.

(Editor's note: Mattis was secretary of defense from 2017-19.)

Before I get into Mattis, let me address National Security Advisor John Bolton. As I write this Bolton is on his bookselling TV tour. Bolton worked for President George Bush, who in 2008 said, “I don't consider Bolton credible.” Bolton could have testified before the 2019 impeachment committee but did not. Bolton refused to testify willingly or even with a subpoena. What was Bolton afraid of? Was Bolton afraid to be questioned under oath?

On June 3, Mattis stated that Trump was violating the constitution by calling up the military. According to the National Guard Historian, since the enactment of the 1952 Armed Forces Reserve Act, the guard has been called up 12 times under the control of the

Dwight Eisenhower issued executive order 10730 and federalized the guard but later sent in the 101st Airborne.

What got everyone upset was that Trump referenced the Insurrection Act of 1807, which gives the president the power to mobilize the state militia or active military to enforce laws. That act expanded the 1792 Militia Act which gave the president power to command state militias in cases of insurrection.
