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Late ballot request forms cause some confusion

Surge in absentee ballot requests expected for November

The timing of ballot request forms that have shown up in voters' mailboxes within the last few weeks has caused some confusion, particularly for voters who had already requested a ballot, but the mailings are nothing new.

"Political parties and other special interest groups have sent absentee ballot request forms out in the past," Shawano County Clerk Pam Schmidt said. "With the COVID-19 going on, we will most likely be seeing more mailings."

Schmidt said it was the timing of the most recent mailings so close to the Aug. 11 primary that confused some voters.

"The voter had already requested their absentee ballot and had returned it to the municipal clerk, and then they received the mailing — which was a request for an absentee

ballot," Schmidt said.

"That is what caused a little confusion. Had the requests been sent not so close to the August election, or after the August election in preparation for November, I think there would have been less confusion," she said.

The third-party mailings are legal and typically not a problem, unless the voter is casting a ballot for the first time and doesn't include a photo ID with the request.

"It is stated on the post card that the voter receives that a copy of their picture ID is required," Schmidt said. "When the clerk receives the request without the ID, they have to contact the voter, which is a little difficult if they don't have the voter's phone number."

If that is the case, the clerk might write the voter a letter requesting the ID be sent. Once the ID is on file, they no longer have to send it with future requests, unless they move to a different address.

"We expect that there will be an influx of absentee ballots for the November election," Schmidt said. "People can request an absentee ballot now for the November election and when those ballots are available, the clerk will send the ballot to the voter."

An absentee ballot request form can be obtained by calling the municipal clerk where the voter lives, the county clerk's office or by going to the elections website at elections.wi.gov.

Schmidt said many voters will use MyVote (Myvote.wi.gov) to request their ballots.

"MyVote is simple and when used, the system sends the clerk an email with the voter's request," she said. "If they've requested an absentee ballot previously, their ID will be on file so it won't need to be uploaded through MyVote. If no ID is on file, the voter will have to upload the picture ID."

City loses out on Wolf River Trail money

DOT pulls \$250K grant as a result of state court decision

After nearly a month of uncertainty, the city of Shawano was officially informed Tuesday it will not get an anticipated \$250,000 state grant that would have helped fund the city's Wolf River Trail project.

An unexpected state Supreme Court ruling last month put the funding in limbo just as the city was getting ready to award an engineering contract for the project.

A walking trail that would connect Kuckuk, Judd and Sturgeon parks has been a goal of city officials for more than two decades.

The city has been purchasing properties for the trail, which would run along the Wolf River, as they have become available for more than 12 years.

The city had initially been awarded a state Department of Transportation grant of \$250,000, which was estimated to cover 40-50% of the project's cost.

On July 10, the Wisconsin Supreme Court issued a decision in the case of Bartlett v. Evers concluding that three of the 78 partial vetoes Gov. Tony Evers made to the 2019-2021 budget were unconstitutional and invalid.

One of those vetoes created the \$75 million Multimodal Local Supplement Program, from which the city got its \$250,000 grant for the Wolf River Trail project.

The state budget provided general purpose revenue to fund local road projects under the Local Roads Improvement Program.

The governor's partial veto provided that the funds could be used for local grants, rather than exclusively for local road improvement projects.

The DOT informed the city via email on July 14 that it was reviewing the court ruling to determine the

impact on local projects and would provide more information as it becomes available.

City Administrator Eddie Sheppard said the city got that answer on Tuesday.

"We were notified our project was one of the ones that will not receive funding based on the change," he said.

Sheppard said there were roughly 150 projects that had qualified under the Multimodal Local Supplement Program and were reconsidered under the Local Roads Improvement Program because of the court ruling.

Shawano's Wolf River Trail was one of 11 that didn't make the cut under the new criteria because they were not street-related projects.

"Obviously, every thing slows down again," Sheppard said. "We don't start working on the engineering. We sort of just table that project until we're able to regroup and formulate a plan."

Sheppard said the trail is not a project the city will be focusing on for the 2021 budget cycle.

Neopit man sentenced for child sex abuse

Kapishkowit gets 2 1/2 years for crime committed in 2018

A Neopit man who sexually assaulted a teenage girl in 2018 was sentenced Aug. 6 in federal court to 2½ years in prison for sexual abuse of a minor.

According to court documents, Robert J. Kapishkowit, 26, told authorities that he was intoxicated on the night of June 15, 2018, when he committed a sex act with a minor female who was at a friend's residence in Neopit.

After the act, the girl talked briefly with her friend and then walked home. The girl reported the offense in fall 2018.

A FBI agent and the Menominee Tribal Police detective met with the girl on Nov. 27, 2018, and then met with Kapishkowit who was in the Dodge Correctional Institution

as his supervised release in another case had been revoked.

Kapishkowit told the investigators that, in June 2018, he was living at a Neopit home when the girl came over for a sleepover. The defendant said he left the house for a while and drank at a neighbor's house. When Kapishkowit returned, he saw the girl in the living room, knew that she was a minor, and had unprotected sex with her.

Kapishkowit's attorney, Tom Phillip, wrote the court that his client grew up poor, mostly fatherless and at times, lived in shelters with his mother.

Kapishkowit has never married, has no children, and had only "one good job" at American Foods which lasted eight months in 2017. Commuting to Green Bay from Zoar for work was difficult and he regrets losing the job.

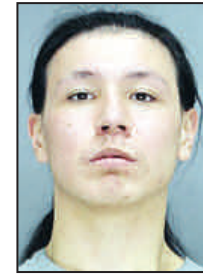
For periods of time, Kapishkowit has used marijuana and synthetic marijuana daily and has had periods of binge drinking.

He has prior felony convictions for taking and driving a vehicle without consent and bail jumping and a misdemeanor conviction for possession of drug paraphernalia, according to online court records.

Kapishkowit has goals of graduating from college, getting a stable job and owning a house, Phillip wrote.

Philip sought a 2½-year sentence, writing that it would protect the public while his client was in prison and should sufficiently deter him from reoffending.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Andrew Maier also pursued a 30-month sentence, according to Kenneth Gales, a spokesman for the U.S. Attorney's Office.

Kapishkowit faced maximum statutory penalties of 15 years in prison and 37-46 months under the advisory guidelines, which factor in the seriousness of the crime, the defendant's

criminal history and other relevant conduct.

In sentencing the defendant, Judge William Griesbach noted the seriousness of the crime the defendant committed and said the sentence needs to deter others would might consider similar actions, according to a statement released by the U.S. Attorney's Office.

Kapishkowit's prison term is to be followed by five years on supervised release.

He is currently detained at the Brown County Jail.



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Sarnwick expected winner of Democratic primary

He would face off against Tauchen for 6th District Assembly in November

Richard Sarnwick looked poised to face off against incumbent Wisconsin Rep. Gary Tauchen for the Sixth District Assembly seat in November as a result of Tuesday's primary.

Sarnwick, a Shawano doctor, was winning the Democratic primary against Simon Moesch, a Shawano resident and 22-year-old graduate of Northern Michigan University-Marquette by a margin of 61-39% with 98% of precincts reporting.

The incomplete tally, which still needs to be validated by the Board of Canvass, was 1,422 votes for Sarnwick and 912 for Moesch as of press time Tuesday.

Moesch announced late last month he was dropping out of the race for the Democratic nomination, saying he had been given an opportunity to go back to school and further his education.

Both names were still be on the ballot in Tuesday's primary, though Moesch had urged his supporters not to vote for him.

Had Moesch won the primary, it would have left Tauchen with no challenger on the ballot in November.

Sarnwick is making his second run against Tauchen after being defeated two years ago.

There was one other contested primary race covering the western portion of Shawano County.

In the District 35 Assembly race, Calvin Callahan appeared to have defeated Donald Nelson for the Republican nomination by a margin of 72-28% of the vote with 91% of

precincts reporting.

Four Shawano County offices up for election in November had incumbents running unopposed for the Republican primary Tuesday.

District Attorney Greg Parker won 2,072 votes; County Clerk Pam Schmidt garnered 2,143; County Treasurer Deb Wallace had 2,139; and Register of Deeds Amy Dillenburg had 2,146.

Parker faces a challenge in November from Democratic opponent Aaron Damrau.

Richard W. Bluhm, 96, W2KXD, of Chester, New Jersey, died Sunday, July 19, 2020, after a short illness. He was born Nov. 15, 1923, in Summit, New Jersey, the fifth child of Herman W. and Frances M. (Ryszczyński) Bluhm of Millburn.

From an early age, Richard was fascinated by the amazing new technology of radio, building his own crystal set and earning his amateur radio license in his teens. When he was 14, he used his radio to help the emergency effort during the 1938 hurricane that devastated the East Coast. He graduated from Millburn High School with the Class of 1940. One of his best radio friends, Henry Elwell, introduced Richard to his little sister, Hilda, and the result-



ing romance led to wedding bells on Dec. 3, 1944, a marriage that would last almost 62 years.

Richard served in the military intelligence wing of the U.S. Army Signal Corps during World War II, decoding encrypted enemy messages in support of our troops. Returning to civilian life in July 1946, he earned bachelor's and master's degrees in electrical engineering from New York University, taking classes at night while supporting his young family. He worked in the aerospace division of Bendix Corp., designing jet guidance systems and components for the race to the moon, and later at ADT, retiring

in 1988. He maintained his connection to ham radio throughout his life, reaching out to the world through his basement array and the tower he built on the hill.

He was a lover of good music, especially Count Basie, Benny Goodman and other big bands. For many years, he and Hilda vacationed with their three sons at Lake Champlain in Vermont for a week or more, where they would sit on the cabin porch devouring mystery and science fiction novels. He served for many years as treasurer of Ironia Free Methodist Church.

Richard is survived by his three sons, Charles (Connie) Bluhm, Cinnaminson, New Jersey; Warren (C.J. Townsend) Bluhm, southern Door County; and Bruce Bluhm, Chester, New Jersey; two granddaughters, Beth and Johanna; his stepmother, Mabel

SCHS grads finally walk the stage

Pared-down ceremony moved out to football field

More than 120 Shawano Community High School graduates walked across the stage Aug. 7 to get their diplomas.

In a summer where graduations have gone virtual or been canceled entirely, SCHS officials waited until almost the last minute to decide whether to give members of the Class of 2020 the opportunity to have an actual graduation ceremony.

"We decided to push it off into August to see if COVID had slowed down," said Scott Zwirschitz, SCHS principal. "It really hasn't, but we felt, with the safety precautions we put in place, we thought we could work it out."

The Shawano graduation didn't have all of the usual bells and whistles. Instead of the usual speeches including the valedictorian addresses, there was only a brief speech by Zwirschitz. There were no live music performances from the band, choir or orchestra, with the school opting to play recordings of "Pomp and Circumstance" and the Star Wars' "Throne Room March" soundtrack.

The ceremony, moved from the school's gymnasium to the football field, had the graduates sitting six feet apart from left to right and front to back. A limited number of family members got to watch from the sides and the field's bleachers.

"Everybody honored and recognized the social distancing," Zwirschitz said after the ceremony. "It's about everybody being responsible, and I think everybody has been."

Not all of the graduates were able to make the ceremony. Zwirschitz noted that several had already started their tours in the military, while others had already left for college. There were also some foreign exchange students in the class who had already returned to their home countries.

"As most of you know, this has been a very difficult five months for these seniors, and we had difficult times trying to get everything in for this group," Zwirschitz said to the crowd. "Tonight, we get to be out here on a perfect evening celebrating

the Class of 2020."

Zwirschitz asked the crowd to stand and applaud.

"I believe it is only fair that with what this group had endured that they've earned a standing ovation," he said.

Zwirschitz said the class's student council officers served as his sounding board as he tried to figure out whether holding an in-person graduation would be safe. Coronavirus cases have been increasing at an accelerated rate, with Shawano County crossing

the 200 threshold in positive cases last week.

"(The officers) helped me organize the cap and gown handout, the diploma handout, the video that was shown and also the senior video," Zwirschitz said. "They helped me along the way, and they also helped me make the decision to host this tonight. I think we made a perfect choice."

SCHS had also held a virtual graduation ceremony May 31, similar to what high schools in Bonduel and Marion held.

Zwirschitz admitted he didn't give out as much information about graduation as parents and grandparents had been hoping for out of fear that the information would have to change or be retracted due to evolving conditions during the pandemic.

"I kept my cards close to my chest until I was positive we were able to do certain things," Zwirschitz said, "and this ceremony is another example."

Zwirschitz noted that, because of the coronavirus and the school still being mostly closed, there was no rehearsal for the ceremony like there would have been in a regular year. The ceremony went off with few hitches, one of them being a breeze blowing the Wisconsin state flag in a graduate's face as he traversed the stage.

Despite paring down the ceremony to its basic essentials, Zwirschitz took a moment to wish the graduates well.

"You have gone through more than any class has gone through," Zwirschitz said. "It's been tough. We've endured, and we're here tonight to celebrate. I want to congratulate you, and I look forward to seeing what you accomplish in the future."

Rain brings out beauty at Navarino prairie

Late summer blooms line the nature center walkways

Black-eyed, brown-eyed or ox-eyed; showy or stiff, false or bouncing: The names attached to prairie flowers and grasses are as diverse as the plants that cover the grounds of the Navarino Nature Center in late summer.

A small group of hikers explored the plant community Saturday with nature center naturalist Tim Ewing. They found, between rain showers, a bright group of flowering plants that the nature center brought in to

create a prairie on what had been a “pine barrens.”

The area’s pine forests had been cut by settlers to grow crops, but the Great Depression of the 1930s forced many farmers to abandon their land, leaving the acreage in the slow process of natural reclamation. The pine barrens that resulted include some prairie plants along with bushes and scrub trees.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources began a prairie reclamation in the area, and in the past few years the nature center staff has been building the prairie environment with hundreds of transplanted plants. The plants bloom at different times of the summer, Ewing said, but late August and early September are ideal

for finding tall, colorful wild plants.

The walk through the prairie trails is one of the few in-person activities at the center this year, Ewing said. Although there have been camps for kids, with attendance strictly limited, more parents have opted for take-home camp kits that bring nature home instead of bringing kids to nature.

The prairie walk on Saturday was an alternative to an annual trolley ride through the prairie, which was abandoned because of the difficulty in social distancing on a trolley.

Still, William Church, Cecil, and his 4-year-old son, Cillian, thought it worth it to get a hike in between thunderstorms.

“Cillian is interested in everything,”

William Church said, also noting that the trip was an opportunity to do a family activity away from the house.

On the walk, Ewing pointed to different types of sunflowers, telling Cillian that while some only got as tall as he was, other types would be taller than his father.

Being the shortest in the group proved to be an asset for Cillian, who discovered a blue spiderwort at his eye level. The plant only blooms for about four hours, Ewing said, so he was lucky to spot it.

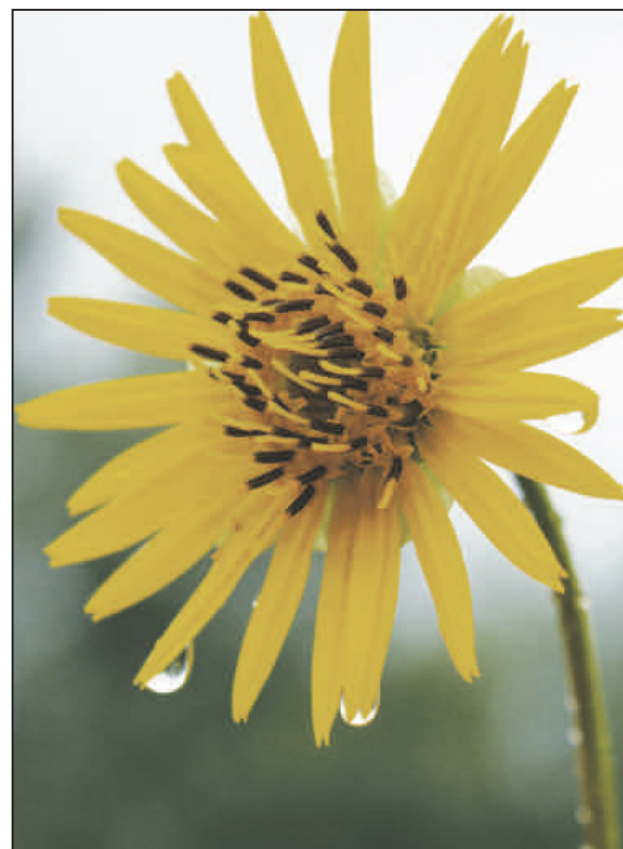

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Tigerton schools plan four days of in-person learning

Kindergarten programs to be shortened or eliminated to limit students in class

Tigerton School District will be holding classes in school four days a week, with Wednesdays being student-free for deep cleaning.

Kelley Strike, the new superintendent, said the school board approved the new plan, which has cleaning staff coming in on Wednesdays and Saturdays to do major cleaning, although basic daily cleaning is also expected to take place. Students will be in school on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, unless families opt to pursue virtual learning with the district.

"We have a lot of safety protocols in place such as increase sanitation, social distancing," Strike said. "I'm adjusting some schedules to limit grade-level cohorts."

At the elementary level, special classes like art and music will be in the regular classroom instead of students traveling to a specific room for the subject, according to Strike. Meals will also take place in

the classroom instead of the cafeteria, she said.

Meals will be split into several periods at the middle and high school levels. Strike said that lunch had previously been at one time for all students.

"We've put a lot of social distancing things in place," Strike said.

One casualty in the district is its 3-year-old kindergarten program. Strike said the need for additional space is requiring the postponement of the program this year. Also, 4-year-old and 5-year-old kindergarten will only be a half-day instead of full to break them into two groups, she said, in order to have fewer kids in a classroom.

"With the younger kids, it's harder to social distance," Strike said, noting that 5-year-old kindergarten could be put back to a full day later in the year if health conditions improve.

Families concerned about the coronavirus and the increase in positive cases can opt to enter into virtual learning, where classes are online. Teachers will be able to

help those students on Wednesdays if there are any questions or concerns they might have, according to Strike.

Having the in-school students working online Wednesdays will also allow students to be prepared if the pandemic goes south, and the school district must go to all virtual learning like schools statewide did in March.

"If we establish those routines, it should make it smoother if we have to move in and out of virtual learning," Strike said.

A survey sent out to residents in the district showed that the Tigerton area had an easier time with virtual learning than other rural districts, but there are still some people who live in areas where internet infrastructure is non-existent, according to Strike.

"About 14% had difficulty participating virtually," Strike said. "Some had a little disruption, but 14% had some real issues. We're continuing to look into that."

If Shawano County's risk level for coronavirus were to drop back to a low or moderate level, Tigerton would look at reestablishing five days of in-school classes, according to Strike. Currently, the county's level is moderate-high.

"That would open up the use of some spaces," Strike said.

Like most school districts in the area, Tigerton is still up in the air as far as transportation plans. With more parents planning to drive their children to school and seat spaces on buses becoming fewer, it's unclear what the district will do once school starts in September.

"We're going to go with the protocol of one student per seat unless they're part of a family," Strike said. "We can't do a full six feet apart, but we'll distance as much as possible with that option."

New duties planned for community ed director

Shingler to manage district's marketing efforts

An updated job description for Shawano School District's community education director passed the district's executive committee with flying colors on Aug. 5.

The description will go to the school board for final approval on Aug. 17.

The issue of the director's job duties came up in July when the board was approving pay raises for administrators. While most administrators were getting increases just under 2%, the community education director was slated to see a pay hike from \$45,000 to \$65,000, and some board members balked at the idea of such an increase without seeing, in writing, what additional duties the director would take on to merit the higher pay.

"I wanted to add community outreach to this position and raise it to a

cabinet level," said Randi Anderson, district superintendent. "We need to ramp up our marketing if we want to reach that plan of being a district of destination."

The director, Robyn Shingler, will need to take the lead in the district's marketing and community engagement, a job that has not been assigned to a specific person for several years. Shingler will be expected to represent the entire district, in addition to Shawano Community Education at community events and communicate regularly with community members to identify specific needs and wants that the district should address.

"She will be a key position in our community partnerships," Anderson said.

Shingler will also be tasked with being the public relations spokesperson, regularly collaborating with the superintendent on issues that need

to be released to the public. She will also be responsible for printing and distributing quarterly newsletters for the district.

Shingler will work in concert with Social School 4 EDU, a marketing firm hired by the district earlier this year, to monitor social media content for the district. She is also expected to promote the district through print publications, radio, television and networking with organizations.

Branding consistency will also be on Shingler's list of things to do.

"We won't change things overnight, but we'll put a plan in place to look at what colors we're going to use, what our hawk is going to look like — because we have a variety of hawks out there (in publicity materials) — even what fonts we're going to use," Anderson said. "Being consistent will help us reinforce the social media side."

The new job description will also elevate the community education director position to a "cabinet" posi-

tion, according to Anderson, the same as principals and other directors in maintenance, human resources, technology and more.

Board member Diane Hoffman praised the plan bringing the position back up to a higher cabinet level but was confused as to why it stopped being that high to begin with.

Board member Michael Sleeper said the new job description should "spell out" what Shingler will be expected to do to earn the extra \$20,000 in pay.

Board member Chuck Dallas appreciated learning of the job duties but felt it should not have been necessary for the board to delay Shingler's pay hike until the new job description was completed.

"I thought this was truly a micro-management issue in how this was handled," Dallas said. "On all other boards I work with at very high levels, all I worry about is the CEO."

Team returns 2 swimmers with state experience

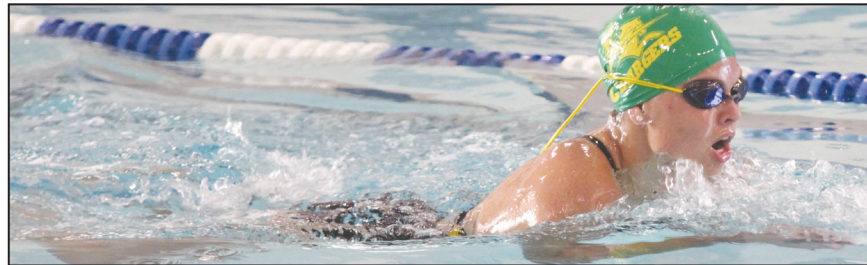

OPINION

There are no easy answers for school reopenings

Parents are terrified, and they should be. COVID-19 is extremely infectious.

It's a tough time for parents and school districts. They are forced to make decisions they don't want to make.

With no federal guidelines to follow, each school district must wrestle with how best to accommodate all students in a safe environment. Options include returning to virtual learning started in the spring, the usual in-class instruction or some combination of the two.

This is not the first time our country has faced a pandemic of this nature. In the United States about 675,000 people died from the Spanish influenza pandemic of 1918-1919. We can learn from the experiences of 100 years ago.

In 1918, schools invested in nurses. Students were under the constant observation of qualified persons who gave students a degree of safety. Nurses had the opportunity to educate both the children and their parents by providing health information. Today, however, because they have been cut from school budgets over the years, many school districts across Wisconsin are without regular access to a nurse.

During the 1918 pandemic identified "planning that brings public health, education officials, and political leaders together" as the key to successful responses.

In Los Angeles, the mayor, health commissioner, police chief and school superintendent collaborated to moni-

tor infection rates, provide teachers additional training, and created and delivered homework to 90,000 students. Such cooperation also helped schools as they reopened. Unfortunately, due to our political divide, we don't have the cooperation necessary to safely open our schools. President Donald Trump, who should be leading this effort, dismissed the first set of guidelines set forth by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, where the nation's foremost health experts are employed. He touted that they were "too tough and too expensive."

So, now our children are a part of a national experiment. Other countries have tried opening schools with disastrous results. Israel opened schools when they had a low infection rate, but they had to close them again when they saw a spike in infections.

Schools in Victoria, Australia, have learned that plans can disappear quickly when the unpredictability of the virus comes into play. They found it can be really complicated due to the vulnerable kids, so many with disabilities, so many homeless.

In one scenario that occurred in Victoria, a student tested positive for coronavirus six days after in-person schooling opened. All face to face learning had to be suspended while the school was cleaned and contact tracing

was conducted. No timeline was given to parents or students about how long that tracing would take. This caused them to wait for day-to-day updates on whether school would resume the next day.

Trump keeps saying he wants schools to open in-person five days a week. Education Secretary Betsy DeVos, who should be looking out for the well-being of all school-age children, agrees with him. They even go so far as to say that federal funding should be withheld for noncompliance.

Seventy percent of parents don't want schools to open up as usual. But the Trump/DeVos plan has no regard to how physical distancing would work in schools that are already crowded. It has no regard for who will pay for PPE's (Personal Protective Equipment), cleaning supplies, extra buses, or additional school supplies. It has no regard for the health and safety of educators, students, their parents, caregivers, or grandparents.

In a study which graded the opening of schools during COVID-19 in four countries, only Uruguay got an A. They reopened slowly in stages while schools and the surrounding communities had strict mask wearing and social distancing.

Even with the distribution to school districts of 2 million cloth face masks and more than 4,200 infrared thermometers announced by Gov. Tony Evers, schools have so many more needs.

When schools had to go to virtual classrooms last spring, it was evident

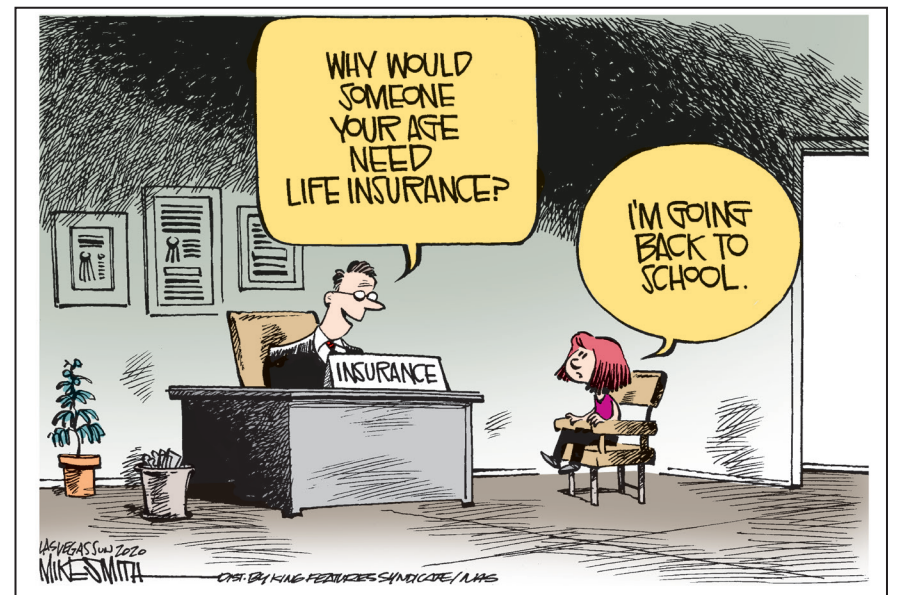
where high speed internet access was not available in many areas of Wisconsin. It is crucial that all students have broadband access. The newly formed Governor's Task Force on Broadband Access is a step forward to make sure every residence, business, and institution in the state has affordable access to broadband.

While we are worrying about preventing the spread of COVID-19, we must also consider the social and emotional effects that a hybrid or in-person structure will have on students and educators. Going back to school has the potential to cause educational trauma for students, teachers and staff members. Getting sick, watching others get sick and/or bringing COVID-19 back home to their families and communities will cause intense pain and suffering.

Leaders should not be making back-to-school decisions as a way to please politicians and cave to social pressure. We should not rush into having in-person school this fall. By also listening to our educators, staff members, and students, plans can be developed which are best for all involved.

No parent should have to make the tough decision between their child's health and safety, and their family's economic stability. Perhaps starting the school year with virtual learning and then easing into in-person education is the answer.
